Castle Quay development plans released.

What is your view of the new Castle Quay development?

At the beginning of last month the drawings for the next stage of the waterfront development were made public. The proposed £150m Castle Quay development by Dandara may be a tad tall for many Islanders intent on preserving the shape of St. Helier's skyline. Most will not contest the stunning overall design of the complex and concept behind the plans but, for some, this factor is too great an issue to let slide. Speaking in the Jersey Evening Post early last month, the president of the Association of Jersey Architects, Paul Harding urged the public to see the benefits of American architect Eric Kuhne's design. Mr Harding suggested that the alternative to making the most of the land on this site would put extra pressure on other developments (in the countryside for example). The planned skyscrapers could be as tall as 17 or 20 stories high, making a bold and progressive architectural statement on Jersey's skyline. Will it receive the blessing of the general public or is it too tall an order?

New drinking legislation implemented

Those 2 litre bottles of "Irn Bru" and "Diet Coke" can now be confiscated.

The Jersey Evening Post reported last month that Police officers will now be given the legal power to seize alcohol from those aged under 18 who are unaccompanied by an adult in parks, on beaches and in other public places. They will also be able to confiscate drink from young people, as well as adults, when they have unlawfully entered the place where they are drinking. States Members yesterday voted in favour of the new powers to combat the issue of underage drunken behaviour. Before the proposition was debated, the confiscation of alcohol from a minor had dubious legal standing. In drafting the new law, the States had consulted the Youth Council, which articulates the concerns of young people in the Island. The council complained that young people should not be specifically targeted by legislation when the law could equally be aimed at adults.

Hungry? Contrary to popular belief it is not illegal to feed seagulls - it is, however, not recommended to feed them as doing so only increases the size of the urban population.

What does the law say? The Herring Gull is protected under the Conservation of Wildlife (Jersey) Law 2000 and the removal of eggs and/or nests can only be undertaken by those licensed to do so.

Why are there so many around? Seagulls only congregate where there is a ready source of food and water and a valid nesting site - urban areas give the gulls ready access to these resources. If people were more careful with their food waste Jersey would probably find it had less of a seagull 'problem'.


Whats the problem with them? Gulls have been known to 'attack' people. The reason for this behaviour is their ability to learn quickly - when hand fed once the next step is to take food from a hand, whether it is offered or not.

Is culling the answer? Culling would temporarily mean that there were less birds, but it is our actions that cause there to be so many 'nuisance' birds. At the end of the day we need to realise two things: that our actions have consequences, and that we do not live in isolation from our environment - we share the island with the wildllife.

Interesting fact: The Herring Gull regularly drinks fresh water when it is available. If none is around, the gull will drink seawater. Special glands located over its eyes allow it to excrete the salt. The salty excretion can be seen dripping out of the gull's nostrils and off the end of its bill.

Hostage released for pizza

An Australian prison guard held hostage for two days was released after a ransom

demand for pizzas was met. Up to 20 inmates at the Risdon Prison in Hobart, Tasmania, seized the guard in a protest over conditions in the maximum security jail. Initially they made 24 demands to authorities, but eventually gave up their hostage after agreeing to 15 pizzas, Coke and garlic bread instead. "At midnight, the final sticking point with the inmates was that they were requiring pizzas to be delivered. Our staff member was negotiated out with the delivery of 15 pizzas," Graeme Barber, Tasmania's director of prisons, told The Advocate newspaper. The guard is recovering from his ordeal at home.

Man shoots his own car

A US man who shot his car when it wouldn't start ended up in jail after shocked neighbours called police. John McGivney pulled out a gun and fired five rounds into the bonnet of his Chrysler. When asked what he was doing, McGivney, 64, said: "I'm putting my car out of its misery." He then calmly tucked his gun in a pocket and went back inside his home in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. Police arrested him for discharging the firearm, a .380caliber semiautomatic, in public. After being bailed, McGivney said the car has been giving him trouble for years and had "outlived its usefulness". He called the shooting "dumb" but said he didn't regret it. "I think every guy in the universe has wanted to do it," he said. "It was worth every single damn minute inside that damn jail."



Granny rugby-tackled jay walker

A 77-year-old granny made a citizen's arrest in Germany when she rugby-tackled a 25-year-old jay walker. The pensioner sat on him

until police arrived - because he had walked across a road before the light was green. 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




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Liquid - Kelly Llorena 080705

With great performances by the two leads, The Interpreter is a worthy addition to a DVD collection - the last sequence, set within the United Nations buildings is particularly satisfying.

Although this hasn't got a very high IMDB score, Cursed has been hailed by some as a return to form for Wes Craven, creator of the Nightmare On Elm Street series. Cursed sees a werewolf loose in Los Angeles change the lives of three young adults, who, after being mauled by the beast, learn they must kill their attacker if they hope to change their fate. Starring Portia de Rossi, Mya, and Shannon Elizabeth, Cursed isn't for everyone but if you're looking to invest minimal brain power in a Saturday night gore fest this could be just the badger.

Highly acclaimed, yet harrowing movie following a pregnant Colombian teenager who becomes a drug mule to make some desperately needed money for her family. The pellets of heroin weigh 10 grams each are 4.2 cm long and 1.4 cm wide and they're on their way to New York in the stomach of 17-year-old Maria. The movie shows how its often the poor and desperate that take the risks and punishments in the drug trade. More than any government anti-drugs campaign, Maria Full Of Grace has succeeded in opening peoples eyes to the fact that using drugs has a hugely negative effect on the exploited. Well recommended.



The Island is the latest summer blockbuster from Michael Bay. director of Bad Boys, The Rock, Armageddon, and bless him, Pearl Harbour. It stars Ewan McGregor as Lincoln Six-Echo, a resident of a seemingly utopian but strictly contained facility of the near future. Like all of the inhabitants of this carefully controlled environment, Lincoln hopes to be chosen to go to the "The Island" - a paradise reportedly the last uncontaminated spot on the planet. But Lincoln soon discovers that everything about his existence is a lie - he and all of the other inhabitants are actually human clones whose sole purpose is to provide "spare parts" for their original human counterparts. Realising it is only a matter of time before he is "harvested," Lincoln makes a daring escape with a beautiful fellow resident named Jordan Two-Delta (Scarlett Johansson). Relentlessly pursued by the forces of the sinister institute that once housed them, Lincoln and Jordan engage in a race for their lives to literally meet their makers

Scarlett, how much more physically demanding has this movie been than others you have done?

SJ: It's certainly been more physically demanding than 'Girl With The Pearl Earring'... We've been doing a lot of running, it has been physically demanding, it is something you want to be in shape for. Early on, I was coming home with, like, shin splints: "Okay! I got to start working out." But, you know, I think you don't realise how hard you run when you are running for your life. I mean don't know if you've ever run for your life before, to freak out and a full sprint. Yeah, it has been quite physically demanding.

Ewan, Were you worried about the action scenes?

EM: I wasn't worried about it. I was excited to do this kind of stuff with him, Michael, because I don't think there's anyone that does it better. Some of the chases on the freeways, some of that stuff just looks unbelievable. And the way they kind of weave us in and out of it, to put us in the action without putting us in any danger, was very satisfying to watch. What's been really nice about it is that very little of it has been done on a blue-screen,

most of it is done in front of a camera with special effects crew and stuntmen and/or Scarlett and myself, and that's always really exciting to do. It sometimes looks a bit amateurish, if you like, because it has to be that way – it's done with ropes, pulling cars over, it comes to people moving things around, pyrotechnics – but that's what makes it fantastic, its not all being done on a computer afterwards. Some of it is, but not very much. There's a sequence where there's a jet bike that flies, and because Tom Lincoln's a speed freak and he's designed bikes and cars and boats, and we see through Lincoln's dreams that he's inherited this, so when I come across the jet bike I somehow work out to ride it and get Scarlett on the back and take off, it's a bit clumsy like.

How do you feel they went?

EM: I've trained quite hard for the film and I'm in good shape, you know, I'm never going to be Arnold Schwarzenegger. One I don't choose to look like that and secondly I don't think I've got what it takes to physically be like that. I've got a family and kids and stuff, I don't want to spend eight hours in the gym. I couldn't get that big, but I'm very happy with the way that I feel.

And has it been the most physical film you've done?

EM: Yeah, in terms of running we've done a lot of running. We're being chased all the time and a lot of its on foot and you do get knocked about, and Michael's always very keen for us to get knocked about. He always likes to knock the actors about. Yeah it's an action movie where you do get hurt.

Scarlett, were you surprised to be offered this role?

SJ: I wasn't surprised; I was pleased that the studio and Michael could see me outside of a dramatic actor, or outside of In Good Company or Lost In Translation. I've had twelve years of all different kinds of films, but I have never done an action film. It's nice to know they think I can go the distance.

Is it a challenge to stay level headed given you've had a meteoric rise in terms of your acting career?

SJ: I don't know, I just do things.... I do magazines and things when I want to. I think to stay level-headed you have to know when to say, "No, you know I've had a really long week I can't deal with this right now..." You have time for yourself and the time when you are working and never mix the two up. In a sense I am always working, I find even when I am trying to spend time off, I always have something going on with a film I am working on — working on scripts, when it is coming out, working on ideas, working on things that need to rewritten, all kinds of things. I mean to actually do that kind of work...The media side of it that is what gets you lop-sided. When you start believing it - "I am the most incredible thing of the last ten years!" or whatever they are saying. And you start to incorporate that into you private life. If you separate the two things and realise that one is used to help you in your work, and then you have your own private time and private life.

"I'm never going to be Arnold Schwarzenegger... I don't choose to look like that... I've got a family and kids and stuff, so I don't want to spend eight hours in the gym"

What did you find in the script that was close to your tastes as an actress?

SJ: I think as a movie watcher and an audience member am always one for a good genre movie. If it's done well, Jurassic Park is one of my favourite movies of all time because it transports you, or an Indiana Jones movie. It doesn't have to be some character drive story for you to believe it for two hours. And when I read the script I really bought it, I thought wow this is fantastic. It was very exciting; I was turning the pages, wanting to know what will happen. I thought if this is done how I am thinking and reading it then it will be larger than life, a really fantastic science fiction thriller. And of course when I met Michael and he showed me some of the work he had been doing with digital storyboarding and that kind of thing, it was kind of like, yes this is going to be really cool.

Is it strange having to wear white the whole time?

SJ: Yes, it's really flattering and glamorous. Ewan and I are sweaty and smelly and greasy the whole time, it's so funny. This is not a glamorous industry at all. Trawling through greasy, oily water. But it is a little bit different in the prep for an award show.

How much fun has it been working with Ewan?

SJ: It's been so much fun. I couldn't wish for a more lovely or sweet person to work with. It's very rare that you actually work for the whole day and then you actually want to hang out with somebody off set. He's such a sweetheart, he's got a wonderful family, and he's such a regular guy. I mean we laugh a lot, especially when you are working this hard, working this long on a show, you want to make sure you can laugh a lot when no one else is laughing. Everybody is working so hard, and you've been running for your life, you want to be silly about it. I would love to work with him in other capacities, outside of this film, in a dramatic piece, in a comedy. We make a good team.

What exactly does The Island represent?

SJ: There's certainly no island in the movie as such. The Island is the idea of paradise, not just paradise but the only place that is still liveable, the only place with clean air and water. We're hoping to reach it...

Ewan, where is The Island set in terms of sci-fi?

EM: I've always thought of it, if you want to use the terms, as being a kind of futurist thriller as opposed to sci-fi. They have futuristic elements — we shot in Detroit for LA, they're going to work on the skyline of Detroit to an extent to make it slightly futuristic but what I think he's done very cleverly, he's made it not a too-distant future so maybe its in twenty years time which keeps it familiar enough, I think it's a clever way to explore this idea of cloning, that we can keep it quite close to a real now.

James Bond?

EM: I don't know the answer to that question — they haven't come to me. You'd have to think seriously about it because it's an incredible part to play. There's a lot of speculation at the moment but they haven't approached me. As far as I can tell they haven't approached anyone else but I may be wrong, they could be on the phone to Leonardo Di Caprio right now.

Do you miss London?

EM: Yes very much. I love it here though as well, I'm growing to like it here. With children it's a good town, it's easy.

Do you feel balanced in your career?

EM: Yeah, I'm really happy at the moment. I don't really feel any pressure to do one thing or the other. I'm very lucky in that respect – I've got great representation, and a great wife – I don't feel that I'm pressured into anything so its easy for me to do that. And when some script comes through the post if I read it and go 'I'll do that' – I'm in a position where I can, regardless of it being I 20 million or nothing.

Finally, Scarlett, if you were literally stuck on an island what would you take?

SJ: How many things are you allowed?

Three.

SJ: I would take a giant tub of water... A bayonet knife, I could think of things that would be useful like rope. I don't know – my sister, sun block and my mum. The girls.

rom Musicals to Shakespeare, Blockbusters to Street Art, programmers are finding ways to entertain their public indoors and out this summer. This page looks at some of the events to look forward to in Jersey this August and wonders why we don't take better advantage of the natural venues this stunning island has to offer.

The Jersey Film Festival (13th – 19th August, Howard Davis Park) gives you a chance to view films with the family all wrapped up under the starry night sky overhead. Free to enter and with a retiring collection for a different charity each night, the festival draws audiences into the island from the UK, Ireland, Europe and even the Americas. Surprised? I was when I found it featured in the Observer list of the 20 UK summer events not-to-be-missed. The theme this year is the musical. There will be screenings of Phantom of the Opera, Moulin Rouge, Chicago, The Sound of Music and Chitty Chitty Bang Bang which promise to keep everyone happy: anyone can have a dance and a sing-a-long. Back by popular demand is Grease (pictured) so get back into the pink lady chic and 'T' Bird swagger that set the island alive in 2003 at the Opera House.

It was the '50s American drive-in that inspired Kevin Lewis (festival organiser, host and projectionist in one) to set-up the festival II years ago. Started at Belle-View as a drive-in proper, the original site has become a housing estate so Howard Davis Park stepped up as the perfect alternative venue: it is centrally located and a great spot for settling on the grass with a rug and a hamper (as is the current culture).

It was difficult to learn even these small facts from Kevin when I saw him on a busy Saturday at the New Forum Cinema. A relentless flow of children, their parents, and their popcorn punctuated our furtive chat at the box office where he pin-balled between the old school ticket dispenser, the assistant-less cloakroom and the trilling phone. He happened to be telling me how he found the festival a little stressful to run as a one-man team.

Speaking rapturously of Cannes and Dinard, Kevin's dreams for the future are grand. He hopes one day it will put Jersey on the map in its own right. I'd like to buy into his enthusiasm but as he tells me the funding for the festival from Tourism is in jeopardy, it seems only too likely we might have to live without this patently popular event in the future.

The Waterfront Enterprise Board (WEB) tell us this year The Waterfront will not be host to the nights of music by the sea that the Opera House and WEB put on last year: World music, Jazz and Opera performed by the London Opera Players. Holding such events in future years may be a problem if plans for the Waterfront go ahead. Events seem to be dropping like flies. Maybe it's the heat.

Thank goodness then that Durrell Wildlife Conservation Trust is not going to be turned into a car park. It is home to one of the brightest events of the summer: The Tempest brought to you by Oddsocks (2nd - 10th August) and the Arts Centre. Punters can look forward to Oddsock's characteristically unconventional approach to the Bard but with all the essential essences of plot and language intact. Past years have seen energetic performances, creative staging and the occasional teal landing on the performers.

At the end of the month there is fowl play at the Opera House! The Olivier award-winning musical story of the ugly duckling Honk (30th August - 3rd September) is staged within the ever enchanting walls of the auditorium. Performed by the young people's theatre company Stomp it is a cracking tale of life on the duck pond. If you haven't seen the inside of your beautiful Edwardian theatre in weeks, take the plunge now and feel glad still to have the chance.

The Arts Centre continues its Alfresco arts this month with a wealth of street entertainment including the earth goddess with puppeteers in her skirts: 'Big Mama' from Les Quatre Saisons; Top break dance crew 'Physical Jerks'; Simon MacDonald's stories for children, 'Jolly Mixtures' performed earlier this summer at Glastonbury; 'Four Seasons' and 'Prohibited Bathing', visual physical comedy from Bris de Banane; Fun and ingenuity with Hoodwink's 'Tock Tick!' and DNA's trilogies of classic tales from Ladybird books and European Folk Tales. Check it all out!

So, this August has something to entertain anyone who may be loitering around this beautiful island in the sun looking for fun. Let's hope there's at least this much and more to enjoy in future summers: get out there and show your enthusiasm!



The Death and Life of Charlie St Cloud / Ben Sherwood / £6.99


Aaaah, Charlie. This is it, folks, the definitive book of summer 2005. Once upon a time women on both sides of the pond fell head over heels for Charles, the foppish romantic in 'Four Weddings...' Here, for your delectation, is a comparable American tragic hero, more sensitive than foppish but equally lovable. As a teenager Charlie causes the death of his beloved younger brother, Sam. Since then, he spends every day atoning for what he did and waiting for the opportunity to discover the purpose of his own survival. Enter the Ellen MacArthur-esque Tess, sailor extraordinaire and all-round beautiful coolperson. It would be a mistake to assume that this is fluffy summer chick-lit (see below if fluff is your bag). This is a unisex, one-size-fits-all book that will appeal across the genders and generations. The plot encompasses universal themes of what it is to die, what lies beyond, and how the living cope with death, all wrapped up in an ethereal, dream-like atmosphere reminiscent of a modern fairy tale. Read it and weep, if you are that way inclined, or just bask in the otherworldliness that Sherwood creates. Turn off the mobile and throw a sickie, 'cos once you start it you won't want to be disturbed.



Good News Bad News / David Wolstencroft / £6.99 All school boys know that any spy plot worth its salt follows the luckily..., unluckily... pattern used to stunning effect in The 39 Steps. In this first novel by Spooks creator David Wolstencraft, we are treated to a compelling adventure, rich in espionage tradecraft. Protagonists Charlie and George are thrown together in a heart-in-the-mouth rollercoaster ride. The premise of setting two operatives to neutralise each other

might not be totally original (think Mr & Mrs Smith, and anyone remember Prizzi's Honor?) but the exhilaration of the ensuing twists, detours and deviations that sweep us along shoulder to shoulder with the spies makes this a worthy beach-mate.

Gallery talks to Holt & Le Sueur, the force behind JerseyLive

G Gallery
WH Warren Holt
WLS Warren le Sueur

GThis is JerseyLive's third year, what made you want to get it started? What was the motivation for the both of you?

WH Because we've been promoting dance events, it seemed to be a logical step. But for me, going to Glastonbury in 97, I felt the whole thing. For me, on a personal level, I thought 'I want to do this, this is what I want to do, I want to put together a festival'. That was my influence, Glastonbury.

WLS My first experience of anything 'festival'y was the Stone Roses Stick highland gig. I didn't think anything at the time, with regard to what we do now, but I was just awestruck with the whole giganticnous

WH You just think, "that many people together" and, "that atmosphere".

WLS I think anybody that goes to a festival such as that must be overwhelmed by it. G You weren't thinking about how many toilets you needed back then....

WLS (laughs) Yeah, I never considered anything like that but.....

WH It just morphed.

WLS You just throw yourself in the deep end don't you....

WH I think the will and desire to do it means you don't consider the implications and what it's going to take, whatever comes up, you just do it.

G Did you pick other things up from other festivals?

WLS No not really, we had our own vision. You just have to find the sub-contractors to do the individual parts, even down to fencing.

WH There are obviously choices, we both chose the orbit (stage) as it's such a beautiful stage and we just agreed on all the setting as such, it seemed so natural.
WLS We just went head first really and took the plunge.

WH You add your own slant on it. This year we're hoping to add in little extras and alter the production a bit more so we'll get that wow factor, put more into it.

WLS Last year we were still running around mad while The Thrills were still

sound checking, which is a 'no no' really but that's down to experience.

G It's three years now, are you finding that you get more support?

WLS We are getting more support and being more accepted for an authoritative point of view. I think people realise now we're not going away and are serious about what we want to do. We've got a long term plan. Each year things change, health and safety laws. We're not experts at that kind of thing but we are learning and evolving with the festival

WH It's so important to us, health and safety, it's our number one priority, then the production comes and everything else. We used to run the production and promotion and not concentrate so much on that...

WLS We've learnt that if you run an event safely, the event will run itself. We used to feel, in a naive way, that we were victimised and that people were coming down on us. WH That we were being picked on. But now that we don't, we can embrace all that now and we realise that it's all constructive. You learn from your mistakes. And this year we can implement.

WLS From the likes of Tourism's point of view we're more accepted now. They can see we're serious.

WH They've realised it's a good event. You saw in the paper last week, I 500 at the castle, 3500 at summer sizzler, that's 5000 people and not one arrest. It's just good natured events. There were 38 arrests in nightclubs and bars on the same weekend. G There are more festivals springing up

these days, what do you think makes Jersey-Live different?

Well it's a beautiful island isn't it. The attraction from the UK, the way I used to view Jersey, was as an up market, beautiful place and it is...

G Bergerac etc....

WLS Also the date we picked (1st weekend in September), all our core market, the locals, are here en masse. All the students are still here, mums and dads are back from their summer holidays....

WH It's the last party of the summer.
WLS There are holidaymakers, if you want to call them that, if we get those any more.
From a date point of view is still great. From tourism's point of view, September is a great month for them. Also we're not in competition with any UK festivals.

G What about Europe?

WH There are two others we know about that some of our bands are playing at. The Futureheads and The Bravery are both flying out on the Sunday to Bologna and there's one in Ireland who we've forged links with, The Flectric Picnic.

WLS In terms of your major festivals, it gets closed off with reading and we're extending the festival season.

G In terms of last year, did you gain any insight or knowledge that you will be implementing this time?

WH We've done a lot of planning, particularly disembarkation. We're changing the route into the festival. We've got 15 coaches, it's a big operation.

G What about feedback from the public?

WH We didn't really hear one negative. I think everyone went to a site that the majority of people didn't know existed. One of the big statements that we heard was 'It didn't seem like we were in Jersey', and because of that it gave them something new to consider and people felt proud of it. The overview and perception was a 100% success really.

WH There were 1000 people who queued down the driveway at the RJA and I was astounded by the way people were there at 11.30. But the thing that got me was, with such an apathy in Jersey, they were still doubting what it was, but when they got in, they were calling friends on their phones and saying; 'you've got to get up here now''. They saw the stage with 30 foot PA wings and were overwhelmed with what was going on.

G So with that in mind, have you changed anything this year?

WLS We're sticking with the layout but

things that will enhance the site, to create the environment for the level of artist we've booked. The line-up that we have this year.... Martin Elvorne, our contact and the main programmer from Glastonbury, reckons that the setup we've got is worth 40,000 attending at the main stage of a UK festival. That's really powerful. Within the industry, agents that we don't deal with are amazed.

WH They think we've sealed an amazing

They can't believe we've managed to book it.

People with other festivals too, I think we are getting their back up a bit. Route du Rock wanted Kasabian and so did Electric Picnic. They got the Canadian band, Arcade Fire, a band we wanted. They're going to be amazing.

G You're obviously getting attention in the UK then, how are you promoting to the Uk market?

Condor (ferries) are very pro-active on that side of things, they're hitting all the UK regionals. We've sold out two campsites now.

G There's that mush support

Tourism have sub contracted Glastonbury's press office to get us on the radar in the UK. Already we're getting pre-editorial in the NME and we're getting postevent too. We got national coverage on CDUK, I know it's a teenie bop pop kind of programme but it's still national coverage.

It's great for the island....

G What about researching new bands coming through?

That's the research we do, we get lists of bands sent through and we'll research on websites and just listen to band after band after band.

for three years running now we've compiled lists and sent them out to our email database. A lot of the bands, our database didn't know who some of them were when we sent it out

WH The Jersey public made some good choices.

We think that, in a way, our email database respects us for trying to get the

WH it gives them a chance to research too WLS we book them so far ahead, The Bravery and Kasabian this year and Razorlight last year, it's great. For us, for me personally, booking Too Many DJs is a big highlight for me, I'm going to end up being their chaperone.

For me it's The Bravery, I was quite into my new romantics music when I was I 5 or I 6 and I like that style of music.....

WLS They like to get their kit off!

At Glastonbury they stole the show
The bass player crowd surfed the
second to last tune and then ran backstage
and came back and played the last tune
wearing just a bass guitar.

With the strength of the band's you've got booked, and you mentioned camping, will you be tall in it back to two days?

WH We plan on implementing it.
WLS It's part of the long term plan. The
core objective at the moment is to do a
slick, smooth safe event and sell out. Once
we've achieved that we'll consider two days.

We'll be looking to increase attendance slightly to allow us to afford to go to two days.

WH Just one step at a time really, just being methodical.

WLS We're trying to walk and then run.

G. With the number of people you could get over here in the long term for a festive would make it great...

WH We'd have to put on more ferries to get them over.....

WLS Condor (ferries) have been great with us, they're in it for the long term and have supported it from day one.

H We've had no help from the airlines.

WLS Absolutely none. In fact, one of our verbal marketing strategies, if anyone contests the price of the ticket, we just turn around and just say it's cheaper than your tax on a UK return flight!

We're trying to keep it good value for money, it would be £35 or £40 in the UK. We have kept it really, really low, as low as we could possibly do it.

G With respect to the festival then, what are your plans for 'lerseyLive' as a brand?

WLS With the festival I think we've achieved something that people are proud of, and we've instilled a lot of confidence in the local bands. We believe we're helping to cement the local live scene. People talk about local bands in a way they never used to

G It gives them another step on the ladder I guess....

One of the main offshoots, and one of the other things we'll be implementing, is the JerseyLive Sessions at the Havana Club. It's going to be every Friday night and we'll be bringing UK bands over and running them with local bands.

We called it the Jersey Live music festival, we dropped 'music' so now it's the Jersey Live Festival but people are just saying JerseyLive now. Jersey's always had a kind of...the word Jersey conjures up the wrong image, I think JerseyLive adds a bit of appeal. A lot of people from Bournemouth are coming over.. Once the word's out there.

WH I think once we've hit NME, we've got our first half page ad in NME in two or three weeks and we'll get some attention from that. We're already selling hundreds off island.

We haven't really gone to town on marketing yet and there are 4500 tickets sold already. It's still so small compared to UK stuff but locally it's unheard of. Everyone is 'lastminute.com' in Jersey. It just gives us a lot more breathing space because we have some security.

It gives us space to be creative.

We sold 300 tickets on the gate last year, but this year there won't be any, we've put a ban on it this year. The involvement people have sought this year is brilliant; Chris from Condor, Karl from de Gruchy and Jersey Post have been great, really proactive. Tourism, Jersey Arts Trust and the JEP, who have given us full reign and support if we give them news as and when, all we have to do is give them decent news.

WH Tourism have given us security, as such, the support we've needed to get us off the ground.

WLS It's been hard work.
G Well, you'll be accounting for good visitor

Research shows that each visitor spends £70 a day, times that by a few thousands and it's great for the island

WLS This year we've got all the agents, we only had one last year, and we've got A&R coming over from some labels, asking us about local bands.

G Are you going to get involved in management at all?

VLS Maybe in a few years time.

WH It would be nice to look after them, we've got a good friend finishing Uni at the moment and in music management, he's very good.

about, there are some great local bands over here, with the right focus...they can do a lot better..maybe in two years time....

What's interesting is that I didn't used to rate local bands because I had nothing to compare against but since we've been getting sent CDs from local bands, 5 or 10 a week, we go through 40 or 50 CDs in one night. If 5 of them are jersey, you could bet that 3 out of five will make it to the re-listen pile and out of 45 or 50 UK bands there may be one. Jersey bands in general are much better than UK bands...

G why do you think that is?

They're better educated and they get better music training. There's a good standard. I wish some of them didn't have the egos though. Hopefully.

For local bands, they need something to aspire to, I think everyone aspired to that, even us and it's really important we get the local lads networking with the UK acts. The ones that we're bringing over are the 'bubblers' so they'll be on a similar level but they're out there playing week in, week out. That's one of the downsides for the local bands, they cant' play 4 or 5 times a week like UK bands do. It's key for us that they'll be able to network, swap phone numbers and swap contacts and gigs.


G Building Jersey music as a whole...

We know we can achieve it, it's part of our plan, we will achieve it. There's no stopping us now, the machine is rolling.

WH What we like about the machine rolling is that it's bigger than us, it's bigger than us, it's bigger than the band. We want JerseyLive to be bigger than any band we get over, like what Glastonbury has, no band is bigger than Glastonbury. That's what we want to tell people, that JerseyLive is bigger than me and Warren. We feel now that it is in motion and if we weren't at the helm now somebody else would be...

It would still roll, hopefully we'd like to think that somebody else would keep it going...

WHO ARE THEY?: Punchy modern rock outfit the Bravery features Sam Endicott (vocals/guitar), John Conway (keyboards), Anthony Burulcich (drums), Michael Zakarin (guitar), and Mike H. (bass).

WHERE ARE THEY FROM: New York five-piece got their start in early 2003. After playing its first gig at the Stinger Club in Brooklyn in mid-summer, the Bravery's post-punk-influenced dance rock was all the rage. This eventually led the Bravery to a recording contract with Island Def Jam in the States and Loog in the U.K.

WHAT DO THEY SOUND LIKE: "People always say we sound like New Order and Duran Duran," laughs Sam, "It's funny, because I don't really know those bands that well. I've listened to a few of their songs recently, though, and they sound cool – just not like us."

QUOTE: "We're called the Bravery because that's the mindset I was in when I was writing the songs," says Sam. "Everyone my age wants to know what they're going to do with their lives. They all think that they're worth nothing and heading nowhere. People are drowning in these thoughts and I just got sick of it. I didn't want to be like that".






THE FUTUREHEADS

WHO ARE THEY?: The band began as a trio of vocalist/guitarist Barry Hyde, bassist Jaff, and drummer Pete Brewis.Vocalist/guitarist Ross Millard joined after with Hyde's little brother Dave, who eventually took over drums duty from Brewis.

WHERE ARE THEY FROM: Sunderland - Hyde and Brewis were tutors at a lottery-funded organisation called the Sunderland City Detached Youth Project, which aimed to get kids off the street by having them play music instead.

WHAT DO THEY SOUND LIKE: Taking the best of post-punk, new wave, and pop as inspiration, Sunderland's the Futureheads are among the best of the U.K.'s "angular" movement, which also includes Franz Ferdinand and Bloc Party.

QUOTE: "We wanted to make startling, surprising, sensational music. Most bands were devoid of sexuality. They didn't even look like they were enjoying it. Performing should be a totally reciprocal thing when you play, an interaction between standing bodies."



WHO ARE THEY?: The brash indie rock sounds of the Ordinary Boys come from Preston and are William J. Brown (vocals, guitar), Charles Stanley (drums), and James Gregory (bass).

WHERE ARE THEY FROM: Inspired by the Kinks, the Jam, and the Smiths, the foursome formed the Ordinary Boys in Worthing, England, near Brighton, in spring 2002. They'd already been playing in various bands since their early teenage years, and obviously took their name from the Morrissey song. But by the time they reached their early twenties, the four childhood mates wooed their native England with their swaggering post-punk/pop style of music.

WHAT DO THEY SOUND LIKE: Sick of the downplayed, downtrodden music around them, the four were determined to reintroduce tunes to a moribund guitar scene. As youngsters, their early musical experiences had been necessarily tied to the then all dominant Britpop movement so the concept of guitar pop was a natural one from which to draw. Debut album "Over the Counter Culture" distils their world-view into twelve bursts of straightforward shots at the state of the nation. The songs detail the lives, loves, losses and twisted dreams and desires of the average person in an average country in an all too average time.

QUOTE: "It's not fxxxing difficult to get addicted to cocaine. Why glamorise something that's so easy?"

WHO ARE THEY?: Paul Carden (Vocals), Dave Dutton (Bass), Nick Kilroe (Drums), and Robbie Ross (Guitar).

WHERE ARE THEY FROM: The Black Velvets are four lads from Liverpool with a shared love of everything from T-Rex to AC/DC to The Stone Roses to Guns 'n' Roses. Their music is unashamedly big in sound and produce



that, if you're going to stick your neck out and be bolshy, (which they are) sounds like Led Zep with melodies by The Beatles.

WHAT DO THEY SOUND LIKE: In an era when rock music is back, The Black Velvets offer swaggering timeless rock and not some retro pantomime version either and avoid the introspective stylings of grunge and the brattishness of nu metal. Their agent, Steve Strange (Eminem, Coldplay) thinks they are the best new live band he has seen in 10 years and Bill Curbishley (manager of The Who) was similarly blown away when he saw them support his band. Sanctuary were so impressed after seeing them perform that they immediately offered to manage them, rival managers offered them a £20,000 advance, but the band went with their instincts and signed with the biggest rock management company in the world which fits perfectly with their ambitions.

WHAT JOBS DID YOU HAVE BEFORE YOU MADE IT? I've had to work carrying kebabs round and delivering things to chip shops, bar work, kitchen porter just all kinds of really crappy jobs - but you have to get money somewhere! I got sacked from most of my jobs because I kept leaving to do gigs.

WHO ARE THEY?: Calling your band Art Brut leaves little room for imagination. Just as Slayer could only be a heavy metal band, this London-based five-piece could only be erudite, paint-stained chaps, fresh from the school of design - sharp suited young men playing art-punk. Eddie Argos (Vocals), Chris Chinchilla (Guitar), lan Catskilkin (Guitar), Fredie Feedback (Bass), Mikey B (Drums). WHERE ARE THEY FROM: New Cross, London.

WHAT DO THEY SOUND LIKE: Brilliantly simple, cleverly stupid artpunk. Argos' one-liners and clever song themes induce several audible moments of authentic laughter. His playful demeanor is one of the many finer details the band uses to take an old sound and mould it to their own - Art Brut aren't simply a calculated culmination of previous bands - they are Art Brut, and they're here to entertain us.

QUOTE: 'We are the band that made Israel and Palestine get along now... all that good will and will power!"

Clor: Clor

On Saturday night I accosted a boy wearing a Clor t-shirt in order to congratulate him on his garb. I had not been the first that night. If Clor are already causing a stir in a sticky club on a tiny island in the middle of some sand dunes, at this point weeks previous to their debut release, they are surely poised for some sort of global assault. There isn't enough room here to tell you the many ways in which Clor are amazing. This album sounds like what the Velvet Underground would have made if they had been born forty years later and wanted to make a dance album. It is compulsively pranceable, it is frenetic, it is schizoid, it is spiky. It has all the gloss of pop but the ingenuous, spontaneous energy of punk, and a gentle intelligence characteristic of neither. These perverse electroid love hymns beat down upon your skull and each one deserves your ardour. Especially magnificent is the explosively impudent 'Good Stuff', 'Stuck In A Tight Spot' with its chaste lullaby vocals casually laid next to charges of filthy metal guitars, and the building neurotic rhapsody of 'Making You All Mine'. But all you need to know is that 'Clor' is effing good and maybe the best album you can buy this year. So do it. AG



Young to Eternity: The Subways

The Subways have come a long way in the last few years. As a young teenager, lead singer Billy Lunn, frustrated with small town life, decided to form a band with his brother Josh and his girlfriend Charlotte as an escape from it all. Now almost a year after appearing on the Jersey Live stage and winning the 2004 Glastonbury battle of the bands, The Subways hit us with their eagerly anticipated debut album. Following the two singles "Oh Yeah" and "Rock and roll Queen", both of which are three minutes of spine tingling, raw and reckless rock, "Young to Eternity" starts off in the same vein with the brilliant "I Want to Hear What you Have Got to Say", which leaves you nodding your head and desperate for some more. There is a lack of complexity and intricacy in the songs but that is their strangely endearing appeal, take "Mary" which opens with the lines "Mary is my best friend / She makes me my tea / She lets me stay around her place when there's nowhere else to be", it is simply not pretentious, just plain and simple Rock. But this is not a flawless album, the quieter, slower tracks are more boring than melodic and Charlotte's backing vocals verge on sounding a little too much like a chipmunk. Overall this is a good debut which is at it best when it shows off the arrogance and energy of youth. S



Independently Blue: Hayley Hutchinson

You could easily be forgiven for assuming that Ms Hutchinson is a born and raised Southern gal rather than the Yorkshire lass that she is. Country overtones permeate the album, the guitar seeming to twang with a lazy Southern drawl. This is Hayley's debut collection, written exclusively by her, and the musicianship is unarguably polished and the performance tight and neat. However, it all feels just a little too tidily wrapped. 'Here's the Love' kicks the album off with a competent, well-produced commercial track, and the first half does provide a fair bit of interest. A couple more pacey numbers reminiscent of Kirsty MacColl, and Hayley's tender, sensitive voice lending itself to the two delicate ballads; 'Climb Through' and 'I Have to Say I Love You', all add to her integrity. Unfortunately, the album starts to lose momentum half way through with most of the later tracks being instantly forgettable. In the more rock-flavoured 'Deadman' you can almost hear the musicians straining at the leash as Hayley's voice fails to provide the extra bite and attitude called for. Sadly, the word of choice to sum up the impact of the album would be... 'nice', which is worse than labelling it 'auditory GBH'. At least that would imply an element of punch instead of the half-hearted slap that 'Independently Blue' delivers. *JT*

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Tides

Wayne Pegler, the chef at Tides Restaurant in St Aubin, knows what you and I like to eat. He's created a menu that successfully caters for the eclectic mix of diners. Young and old, tourists and locals, and it's not easy to please everyone but Wayne manages it well.

But it's not just the talent of the chef that Tides Restaurant has at its disposal. Situated in St Aubin, high up on Mont Du Boulevard, the restaurant boasts spectacular uninterrupted views over the whole of bay where you can see right from St Aubin's harbour all the way to St Helier.

The hotel in which the restaurant is located has a old world charm that leaves you with the feeling that you have just entered a stately home where the international team of staff are as attentive and polite as you would expect to find in any quality hotel. Yet the gardens, with their palm trees, swimming pool and sun lounges leave you in no doubt that this is a hotel where people come to relax and enjoy themselves.

The set dinner available at Tides is a menu of excellent value, at just £19.50 for 4 plentiful courses you can't go wrong. However, if the choices on the set menu are not enough to tempt you then the reasonably priced à la carte menu is superb and features dishes for the traditional pallet as well as the more adventurous.

We decided to try both the set dinner and the a la carte menu. As a starter I choose the Assiette of Salmon, Chive Fromage Blanc and Toasted Brioche, a tasty quadruplet of salmon goodies including smoked, poached and traditional Scandinavian gravalax. BD chose Carpaccio of Scotch beef fillet tapenade, with fresh figs, rocket, parmesan and summer truffle dressing (£6.50), the carpaccio was cut much thicker than we had tried before and the portion was enough to serve as a main course but delicious none the less.

Having washed the starters down with cool and zesty lemon sorbet, we were ready for the main course.

I chose a summery filet of cod topped with an unusual soft herb crust and accompanied by egg noodles, spinach and the creamiest oysters served au gratin. Accompanied by a chilled glass of crisp Sancerre and a magnificent view, it was a moment to savour.

BD chose a fish course of roasted sea bass with chorizo, cannelloni of local crab, slow roasted peppers, basil and feta (£12.50). The chorizo was an unusual combination with the sea bass, but it worked well; the cannelloni was quite flat but lifted by the tomato coulis.

Despite having had plenty to eat with the first three courses it would have been rude not to try the homemade warm chocolate tart with candied orange and vanilla ice-cream which we shared. The chocolate was light and fluffy and the warm pastry surrounding the pie was just like what you would find on a homemade apple pie, thick, crusty and well worth the calories.

The restaurant bar is open all evening so there is plenty of time for after dinner tipples watching the coloured lights on Victoria Avenue twinkle in sea.

Indiao

When you're writing your first restaurant review it's actually quite worrying. Not considering myself to have a great knowledge of food, it was with a little trepidation that I agreed to go along to Indigos. I mean, I don't live on Pepparamis and Irn Bru, but having read several A.A. Gill reviews and imagining meeting a Gordon Ramsey and having to criticise his Sauce Bearnise I was hoping I was up to the job.

Once I arrived though, all thoughts of intimidating Scottish chefs melted away. Paul, our South African host for the

evening, escorted us onto the terrace and the view, sweeping over St Aubins Bay, which combined with a Gin and Tonic and the relaxed chatter of my reviewing partner in crime Alana, made me feel totally at home. Indigos is part of the Hotel Christina situated a little way up Mont Felard. It has been running for two years, and Paul explained that during the first year of operation, the staff worked to create an atmosphere of relaxed efficiency while the chef, Mark Rowan (not Scottish or at all threatening as it turned out) has perfected a wide ranging menu that should suit all tastes. We certainly agreed with him after a couple of hours and a few glasses of chilled Rosé.

After delliberating for a fair while on what delectable morsels we were going to pick, we were presented with our starters. On a beautiful sunny evening, fish seemed to be an obvious choice and while I selected prawn & avacado with marinated tiger prawns and guacamole & chilli served on a sesame flat bread, Alana chose steamed local mussels with thai spices, coconut and corriander.

A really nice touch were the sorbets, which were presented to us after the entrees. Not only did they taste light and delicious, but they served to refresh the palette and prepare for the main courses. Alana's filet steak was a good cut of meat and although cooked a little too much for her liking produced a smile. Also, plumping for a steak, but of the fish variety, my seared tuna with warm green bean and potato salad, poached eggs and sauce vierge was certainly a good choice. The main courses were presented with a side order of choice - new potatoes for me and fries for the lady - all very nice.

My favourite part of the meal though was undoubtedly the dessert which really did finish the meal off perfectly. Although it seemed an odd choice on such a warm evening, Alana chose the Bakewell pudding with caramel sauce and vanilla ice-cream, while I had a glazed lemon tart with creme fraiche and berry compote. Although mine was delicious, once I had tried the Bakewell and Alana the lemon tart we agreed to swap - both were delicious - the glazed lemon tart just the perfect tartness and the Bakewell pudding working well with the caramel sauce and delicately flavoured vanilla ice-cream.

The whole experience was really quite relaxing despite my initial reservations. Our fellow diners were quite a wide mix, of ages and social backgrounds and the infomality of Indigos does seem to be going some way to attracting a younger market. Prices aren't at all high which also helps. The friendly efficient manner of the staff

made for seamless and not at all overbearing service, and while we didn't feel that we had enough bread, that may be just because we were especially hungry. We particularly appreciated the lack of music - it all goes to help make a great, relaxing evening. I do hope that the next time I have to, the experience is just as pleasant.

n November's edition of *Gallery*, the inclusion of the surf article, 'Troubled Waters' was met with mixed opinions by the readership. It marked the magazine's first sports feature and, while it attempted, on a personal level, to provoke a reaction with those that glanced along its lines, 'Trouble Waters' proved that the magazine was being read, people were interested, and a relationship with the readership was being formed.

After the 'outlaw' aritcles on Base Jumping and Free-Solo Climbing to the recent focus on Wakesurfing, the inception of the mid-summer months have reverted our attention back to the world of wave riding. 'Troubled Waters' sought to rationalise the transformation of the sport on a local level and interpret the reception of its growing popularity, whilst using the wriiten word to combat negativism and achieve an understanding from which surfing may move forward. Season after season, more people are buying boards or at least dusting off the Mals that have stood for too long at the back of a cluttered garage. But for those unaccustomed to the world of surfing, newcomers must be aware of at least one legend of the discipline before getting their feet wet.

Eddie Aikau...

In 1970s Hawaii, long before surf culture - and all its trappings of fashion, and media attention iconicism - became dominant in Western popular culture, one surfer stood apart from others who lived on the edge of society's equation for 'appropriate living.' On the small Island of Maui, one member of this global collective achieved legendary status for his commitment to the sport; achieving what surfers today consider the ultimate in wave riding. Eddie Aikau typified the consumate 'waterman', and embodied the Hawaiian peoples' intimate time-old relationship with the natural forces of the sea. From an early age Wiamea Bay on Maui's north shore was Eddie's playground. This world renouned stretch of coastline would become Aikau's life, and the currents, swells, rocks and weed that made up Wiamea's in-shore topography would become as embedded into Eddie's mind as the sight of the back of his hand. He was the North Shore's first lifeguard, saving the lives of hundreds of swimmers (and often experienced surfers) in his career. He quickly achieved local celebrity status and the slogan 'Eddie would go' amoung his friends; often paddling out in high seas and storm conditions undaunted by the potentially leathal waves that terrorised the bay.

But in March 1978, Eddie's life would be cut tragically short, and the circumstannces in which he would loose his life immortalised his presence in the hearts and minds of the surfing fraternity. After joining the Hokule'a expedition, an attempt to recreate the ancient oceanic voyages between Hawaii and Tahiti, the party ran into immediate trouble. With gale force winds and storm swell conditions of over 15 feet, the boat was to overturn 20 miles from the coast of the island of Lana'i. After a frustrating night and day gripping the up-turned hull, Eddie urged the captain to let him paddle for help. After the second time of pleading he was allowed to take his surfboard and make the impossible journey to Lana'i, the nearest island. Turning back towards the party after 50 yards, Eddie waved for the last time and disappeared amid the mid-ocean breakers. The party were rescued the following morning, but Eddie Aikau was never to be seen again.



"San Francisco? Man, that's the strangest place on earth, and it's full of hippies and freaks and weird bums left over from the 1960s, and it's damn dangerous man, what'cha wanna go there for?" This is what I was asked by the taxi driver on the way to LAX airport. If people from LA - who seemingly kill each other for fun - thought that, what must the place really be like?

When I got into San Francisco at midnight, the German guy at the hostel - who looked like he was created from DNA swept off the floor of a Kraftwerk gig - warned me that people were getting mugged a lot in the city and to watch my step. While Los Angeles has the reputation of being edgy and dangerous, San Francisco is perceived as peace, love and flowers in your hair. Sadly not the case any more.

In fact, I've never seen so many pushy and violent homeless people in a city before, and I used to walk through cardboard city in London on my way to work, so I have a decent frame of reference here. I think those guys in London have since sold their cardboard boxes to first-time buyers and bought farmhouses up north. But in San Francisco you get hassled by bums, junkies, the homeless, the drunks, the beggars, the jittery shark-eyed crack addicts, homeless kids who just want smokes, shouters, shakers, stumbling freaks that look like they've just escaped from the Jim Rose Sideshow and a nice guy called Rico who just wanted to tell me he likes my t-shirt. And to ask if I could spare a few bucks.

The next morning I was informed by somebody at the bus stop that I was lucky not to have been mugged. And could I spare a few bucks. I decided to change hostel and stay out on Haight Street where all the hippies lived. Some peace and love seemed like a good idea right now. This was the epicentre of the 60s peace movement and there in Haight Ashbury was where it all began. Today, there are still reminders of that and it seems that every other shop in the area sells bongs and smoking paraphernalia to clientele of all ages. On the edge of the park – where the famous love-ins took place - were two women, in their late 50s/early 60s smoking a joint and laughing their wrinkly asses off. In fact, you could smell it everywhere and everyone seemed to be smoking.

That night in a bar people were also getting stoned. You're not allowed to smoke normal cigarettes in any bar in California but it seems that if you know the right bars in San Francisco they turn a blind eye to stoners. "Oh dude, you get it off your doctor here," one guy tells me. "You just have to get the right card and the doc gives it to you to ease your pain and trust me man, it's really strong stuff." I looked this up and it's true. You can get strong weed from a doctor in San Francisco, which frankly saves a lot of time and hassle, not to mention taking criminal dealers out of the equation.

However, it's not all Dudes getting toasted, drinking White Russians and going bowling. They have to work too or end up like the bums begging for chance. In Haight, the Hostels are often run by these people and while they welcome you like a long lost brother and pronounce full stops as "man" or "dude" it soon wears thin. It's fun until you realise that years of LSD, pure MDMA and enough weed to put the entire field of the Grand National into a deep sleep have really taken their toll. They now have the organisational skills of an eight year old and you can't help thinking that a cold-hearted capitalist wouldn't have triple booked my room. Despite offering to share my bed in the spirit of my host's ideal and beliefs, the Norwegian girls just weren't "digging" the idea.

San Francisco is a place that clings to it's past in the face of an increasingly controlled and corporate present. It's not that the hippies and peace campaigners have lost, it's just a case of being outnumbered, but they still do their best to make a difference and make their point. For that you really have to congratulate them. Outside of City Hall, 1,541 pairs of boots were laid out each representing a soldier killed in the Middle East since the start of the war in Iraq. By the time you read this, the number of boots will have increased significantly. People here are still protesting and still preaching tolerance, but sadly their way of life is dying out – like Jedis with joss sticks instead of lightsabres.

"Brother, you have to watch out for The Man," this wizened old fella tells me on a city bus. "If you're not careful they will control us all and it's started already brother, it's started already." I dismissed him as another old hippy that missed the last bus back to sanity some time in the 70s, but when I got to the Airport I began to see what he meant.

I was questioned by the Department Of Homeland Security and searched – although they wouldn't tell me what for. And now it seems you have to take your shoes off before going through security as well as having fingerprints checked and photo taken. Something ugly is winning out here despite the people's best attempts to keep the place open and tolerant. Something ugly is stamping its boot down on the face of what San Francisco used to stand for. The Land Of The Free is becoming less free all the time. Maybe I've just read Nineteen Eighty Four a few times too many or maybe the old guy on the bus is right. But out here, times they really are a changin'.

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Home Bleaching

How does it work? Tooth whitening agents are placed in custom trays, which are in contact with your teeth over night. This process bleaches your teeth a little at a time, until you have reached the desired effect.

What does it involve? The first step is making a custom tray mould of your teeth. This reservoir is filled with the whitening treatment and is inserted into your mouth which you wear while you sleep.

Pros: Ability to fine tune - you can choose specific teeth to whiten. If you did feel any sensitivity you can stop and wait for the sensation to settle before you decide to continue. Perfect supplementary treatment to the others detailed here.

Cons: Although you have to wear the tray all night it does mean you don't have to go to work with it on!

One Hour Home Bleaching

How does it work? You are given a 'generic' shaped tray with the whitening agent already in it that you wear for 60 minutes.

What does it involve? The same process as the home bleaching but this more concentrated system only takes one hour.

Pros: Only takes one hour to do, no waiting to get moulds made. Perks up every tooth giving you a very natural look. Possibly less sensitivity.

Cons: The system is not tailor made for your mouth so individual teeth cannot be selected for extra whitening should they need it remember though that a natural smile would not necessarily be the same shade all over!

Laser

How does it work? Works with either with an Ultra-violet or laser-light.

What does it involve? The whitening will be carried out at your dentists. Essentially its still a bleaching process using Hydrogen Peroxide - the light breaks the Hydrogen Peroxide down, oxygen enters the enamel and dentine bleaching coloured substances while the structure of the tooth is unchanged.

Pros: Although involving lasers, the whole process is relatively painless. Only takes about one hour.

Cons: For safety's sake, precautions must be taken to ensure that all soft tissues in and around the mouth are protected. Possibility of sensitivity.

Smile Design - Cosmetic Veneers

How does it work? A more detailed and permanent procedure that will give you a designer smile. Basically involves cementing a custom made facing of porcelain to the tooth. An ideal way of treating discoloured, poorly aligned or unsightly teeth, closing gaps or repairing chips.

What does it involve? Smile design is a complex process. After a detailed oral examination you discuss with your dentist what it is you dislike about your teeth. Moulds are taken and sent to a specialist cosmetic laboratory to design your new smile. After a short time they are returned with your new smile created in wax clearly showing your stunning new look.

Pros: You can have a gleaming smile like a Hollywood star or decide on a more subtle appearance - its totally up to you.

Cons: Much more extravagant approach to getting white teeth - can be very pricy compared to other options but will guarantee you stunning results.





Paul Bennett of Saxon Bennett Lifescaping gives us his view on the use of colour in the modern home.

The demands of Lifescaping are no different to those we find in life in general. The fetishes inherent in life itself are typified by the streams of 'fashioned' people we traverse in the street on a daily basis. They are perpetual advocates of the desire to be new; to be different and innovative.

Like those who must have the same (or better) ipod, car or holiday, we all want to be a part of the crowd. But at the same time, you and I both know we also seek to stand out from that very same crowd. If an order of eight Buds and one crème de menthe frappe would do it, maybe I'll just have a Bud.

So, you've got the new car or bike and you're planning to get another car, bike or whatever. You've got the new home and you want it to be daring, to show you're laissez-allez, but at the same time a bit safe, because you don't want to be open to the acerbic whit of others less on the cutting edge than yourself. You want your home to be fresh and light and open, Oh, and cosy and secure, 'womblike'. "You see, I would really like a strictly disciplined space, audaciously modern, linear, strong and severe; I do love Chintz though".

No colour of course, just a tone poem of greys (or similarly but more expensively 'Grays'). What about Paul's 'Sludge'? I've never seen so many shades of , well — mud. But bright. You see, I always think of yellow as a sunny colour, and red - well it's so warming — the blues and greens make me feel tranquil. "(Sighs) I think maybe the cream — again'. Oh it's not cream, it's 'Warm Candlewax' Quitely-Sphiss.

So, how much, or how little, colour should we use? Most of us choose colours from, at most, a couple of square inches of sample. And most of us have also had a shock when the colour, which looked a little bland by the square inch, knocks you optical socks off when your house is painted in it. The thing to bear in mind with colour is that lack of colour can be as shocking or exciting as any amount of colour. Don't think that a colour advisor is being prissy when he says that there are colours within a colour which you, with your sad amateur eyes, can't see. Let the scales fall and believe, there really is green in that brown (or blue in that red) and it matters. When you put it next to the brown with red in it you'll see what we mean.



WHICHWAYNOW? Build A Winning CV



What could be the worst thing about committing to a career move? I can tell you, it has nothing to do with the job and working environment you will leave behind. The biggest mistakes about such a change of tack arise in preparation for your future path. Once again, you must prepare to sell yourself, and all the attributes you have mustered, to a possible future employer. Intially, your preoccupations should not be towards an outdated wardrobe, a sun-kissed complexion or brushing up on your apetite for current affairs. Way, way before you get the chance to visually and verbally impress, the employer will need to be bowled over by you, as a complete person, on two simple sheets of A4 paper. If you get the CV stage right you will surely be met by enthusiastic inquisistion by the interviewer. Get it wrong, and you'll be left dangling, wishing that you never had the balls to make a change in the first place. *Gallery* has some basics that anyone should adhere to during the CV building process.

The way you present information on your CV is relatively flexible and will depend on what you have to offer. However, it is generally recognised that all CVs tend to include the following sections:

PERSONAL DETAILS

PERSONAL PROFILE AND CAREER OBJECTIVE

EDUCATION

EXPERIENCE

POSITIONS OF RESPONSIBILITY/ACHIEVEMENTS/INTEREST

REFEREES

PERSONAL DETAILS

Keep this section brief, no more than a quarter of a page. Ensure you are easily contactable at the address given and if necessary include term-time/home addresses with dates for availability at each. E-mail addresses are useful. Choose one that your mother would approve of! Date of birth is usual but not mandatory. Nationality is not mandatory but can be useful, particularly to clarify your ability to work in a country. International students may wish to use this section to clarify their work permit status.

Note: Although some international students choose not to include nationality on a CV, some UK employers do not recruit non-EU nationals who need work permits and may even screen out applicants at a later stage of selection if not previously disclosed.

Marital status, gender and health status are not included unless specifically and legitimately requested for this post.

PERSONAL PROFILE AND CAREER OBJECTIVE

If you use a profile, keep it brief at three or four lines maximum. Use it to demonstrate your career focus/current aims and perhaps evidence of two or three main strengths and where they were developed. See our example CVs for details. Avoid generic skills statements like 'good communicator, team worker with strong analytical skills'. Profiles are optional and the information could alternatively be adequately covered in your covering letter.

EDUCATION

Usually stated in reverse chronological order, with your most recent experiences first, back to your secondary level education. Include dates, the name of the institution and town. Full addresses are not required. Integrate your education and qualifications into one section.

Also, think about the relevance of the information. Summarise GCSEs but market your later education more fully and with language that an employer will be familiar. Suggestions include a list of relevant modules, information about projects and dissertations undertaken, average grades to date or predicted result and/or skills developed.

For example:

Data analysis, interpreting statistical information and the ability to use relevant computer packages;

teamworking, communication and presentation skills developed during group projects; creativity, initiative and design ability for artistic studies. It can be tempting to try to cover up a poor grade by not mentioning it at all but there may be ways of limiting the damage on paper. If you are unsure about how to approach this, consult your careers adviser.

EXPERIENCE

All experiences count, whether paid, voluntary or shadowing. Aim for reverse chronological order with rough dates to illustrate how long you were there. Focus on your responsibilities, achievements in the role and illustrations of where skills were used or developed. Try to give yourself a job title and use terminology relevant to the post you are applying for or that shows commercial awareness.

You may wish to create a separate section for experiences particularly relevant to the post applied. Examples headers include 'relevant experience', 'technical experience' or 'legal experience'. Similarly, as your experiences grow, it may be appropriate to summarise some experiences together.

An example would be:

Summer 2004 - A variety of customer service roles including bar work, waitressing and telesales. Developed an awareness of customer relationship management and improved my influencing skills when working with challenging clients under pressure.

POSITIONS OF RESPONSIBILITY/ACHIEVEMENTS/INTEREST

These are all relevant sections to include and can be used to demonstrate that you are motivated to pursue other activities, have an interest in a relevant career and take the initiative to develop your involvements and skills. Again, try to focus upon recent achievements and what your contributions were, skills developed and outcomes. Employers will not necessarily spend time trying to make sense of your experience.

REFEREES

Two referees are the norm, one academic and one work-related, or a character referee if allowed. Give their phone number and email along with their title and full contact address. Always ask for their permission first and remember to keep them informed of your career aspirations and achievements to date. If a reference from your immediate manager is not possible, perhaps use someone else in the company. If using an international referee, perhaps confirm that a fax/e-mail in English is okay.

If you are running out of space, and not explicitly requested, it is acceptable to state 'References available upon request'
