RETROSPECT

Five years in custody for Teenage heroin courier ANOTHER EXAMPLE OF JERSEY'S ZERO TOLERANCE STANCE TOWARDS DRUGS

Last month the Jersey Evening Post reported that a teenager who imported heroin with a street value of up to $\pm 103,000$, and a small amount of crack cocaine was sentenced by the Royal Court to five years in youth custody. Crown Advocate Sally Sharpe said that Inacio de Castro (19) arrived with his girlfriend from Gatwick in January and their luggage was searched. The drugs were found in the heels of three boots belonging to de Castro's girlfriend found in his suitcase. When interviewed, de Castro - a first offender - said that they had missed their flight to Jersey the previous day and that while they were staying overnight at a hotel in Gatwick a man they met had placed the drugs in the boots. The accused said that the man had told him the drugs would be collected from Jersey Airport. He claimed he had not been paid for the job but would be done a favour in return. On completion of his sentence he will be deported.

SIX OARSMEN COMMEMORATED 60 YEARS OF LIBERATION: A 19 HR WEYMOUTH TO JERSEY ROW.

Last month six individuals relived one man's remarkable war-time escape from Jersey. The team mirrored the voyage to freedom made during the Occupation by Islander Dennis Vibert. The event had been due to take place on 9 May, Liberation Day, but was delayed - and owing to weather conditions it was also reversed, making Weymouth the starting-point. Frankie Le Quelenec, Christine Pallot, Gina Le Claire, John Fowler, Michael Mayo, John Searson and cox Mick Tréhorel set off at 7.30 on the morning of the 15th August and arrived in Bonne Nuit Bay at 2.25 am the following day. The original feat achieved by Mr Vibert, and the actual boat named 'Ragamuffin' in which he made his daring escape on September 21st 1941, can be viewed at the Jersey War Tunnels Visitor's Centre. Mr Vibert was eventually rescued by HMS Brocklesby on September 24th, 1941 after spending three days at sea.

Landmark child legislation

AIMSTO REDRESS INEQUALITIES WITHIN THE CUSTODY PROCESS. EFFECTIVE FROM AUGUST IST. The new Children Law is based almost entirely on the Children Act which was passed in England and Wales in 1980. The law states that married fathers will no longer have automatic sole custody in respect of the child or children concerned. Advocate Rose Colley, managing partner at Viberts Jersey Lawyers and one of the Island's most prominent family lawyers welcomes the new legislation, commenting that, "the new law represents a shift to equality." The Children Law makes further changes in that if parents are unmarried, the father, for the first time, has the power to seek legal rights of his own as of right. Fathers will now be allowed to apply for parental responsibility which is essentially the same as existing custody rights. Speaking generally about the new law, Advocate Colley commented: "This is a highly significant event which brings Jersey's family law into the 21st century. Custody issues are a hugely sensitive issue for all those affected. This new legislation should make the process quicker, less stressful and less administratively burdensome."

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


SAVE THE KREMLIN FROM CROWS!

Russian officials are releasing birds of prey into Moscow to save the Kremlin from a plague of crows. A spokesman for the Kremlin told Russian media the crows have started to pick the gold leaf off the ancient presidential residence. The Kremlin is world-famous for its golden domes - which the crows are slowly ruining. The city is now employing five trained birds of prey from Siberia, three falcons and two eagles, to deter the persistent crows. A government ornithologist said: "The birds do not have to kill all the crows. That would be impossible. But just their presence should be enough to frighten the majority away." He added tourists need not worry about dead crows landing at their feet as the birds of prey will only be released early in the mornings when the Kremlin is still closed to the public. The Kremlin has used birds of prey before to scare off crows after one flew into a communist party member's office in the 1970s and stole highly classified papers to make its nest.

A Russian book publisher claims the original version of Gulliver's Travels was a pornographic novel. Neonilla Samukhina says it featuries Gulliver in steamy encounters with 6ins tall Lilliputians or working as a sex toy for 60ft giants. Ms Samukhina, from St Petersburg, is to market the 'original version' after buying the manuscript. The Erotic Adventures of Lemuel Gulliver is to go on sale in Moscow book stores this weekend. Hermann Real, director of the Ehrenpreis Center for Swift Studies based in Germany and one of the world's leading experts on the writer, dismissed the new work as "an elaborate hoax, mainly devised to promote sales".



It is true that first thing in the morning I am not the most placid person in the world but when one day early in 2005 I shook the sleep from my head and drew back my eyelids to see Fiona Phillips and Eamonn Holmes chuckling about 'chavs' I felt like an angry dog being poked with a very large, barbed, acid-soaked stick. It is true that anything issuing forth from the vapid echoing skull of Phillips is guaranteed to irk, but this I felt was hypocrisy in the extreme, akin to Lulu/Bono/George Bush criticising, well, anyone. It was a mark that the lingo had finally toppled over into the middle of the lukewarm mainstream, and incidentally also that TV presenters ensconced in the safety of their studio couch will say things that they wouldn't outside a five-mile radius of a Marks and Spencers foodhall.

In addition to this Julie Burchill earlier this year added to her crimes against humanity, which to date include sleeping with Tony Parsons and being causelessly mean to John Peel, a programme on Sky One entitled 'Chavs'. Julie apparently is qualified to talk about this because she is one, although her 12-year-old boarding school girl voice argues, in its ever-ridiculous way, a different case. Although Burchill's attempts to celebrate chavdom suggested a different take from the usual smug dismissal of the proles, it still suggested a separation that grated. It just seemed awry that the 'chavs' were being discussed simply because they were on the other side of the camera, literally or otherwise, like so many rare monkeys being studied. Maybe the rise of chav baiting is not entirely unrelated to the fact that many hacks wouldn't have got to where they were without all that unpaid work experience on The Times whilst shacked up at Mummy's pad in North London.

But why is it that Kappa tracksuits, caps, 'vulgar' gold jewellery and eleven year-old mums are fair game for a laugh whilst Jeremy and Susan with their spacewagon, dinner parties, 'tasteful' gold jewellery and boorish, swollen children dressed cap-a-pie from the Boden catalogue are not? Take fox hunting and mugging; you could say that, whilst both are unjustifiable activities, one has a victim more capable of defending itself. We "pour scorn" on the "dregs of society" "sponging" benefits and neglecting to lift a finger except to fetch another can of Special Brew, but the children of the bourgeoisie do exactly the same, from the 12 year-old receiving £50 pocket money thrice-weekly to those that have reached and passed well beyond adulthood- the metaphorical teat of the boob that was unwitting enough to spawn it is suckled till it bleeds, and there is no weaning. The only real difference here is that whilst benefits are bestowed upon you by a faceless organisation, your parents are, well, your parents. If you are looking at two groups of people, one of which assumes it owns the world, the other of which is trying to claw back its own corner, I know with which it is easier to sympathise.

The class system has been present for many hundreds of years, whether we admit it or not, and traces of it can be found in many places across time and space from medieval feudalism to the Hindu caste system. Whether it is right or wrong is another question altogether, but it does exist. I am not blameless in perpetuating these divisions myself, or unused to calling people pikeys if they cross my path, or posh twonts, or other, less printable things. (Also I drink Earl Grey tea and buy the Guardian, situating me on dodgy ground either way.) However, I suggest we abandon these class distinctions in favour of a more general misanthropy. Or philanthropy, depending on your demeanour. People are people; they are good or they are bad and the rest is irrelevant.

Yet it is difficult not to be judgemental, indeed sometimes dangerous, so I have devised a solution to this hierarchical tussle. An annual event, similar to the Olympics in both grandeur and importance; the Class War. Events will be strategically planned to avoid imbalance and participants will be selected much in a similar way as they are for jury service. Sporting events will include darts, skiing, pool and polo. Other events will be less sports-orientated and will include a spelling bee, a text speed challenge (txt spd chllg), a food fight (sushi and lamb shanks v Maccy Ds and fag ends) and a wealth attainment skills test (inheritance and fraud v benefits and personal accident claims), all building up to the grand car rally finale where the four wheel drives and beemers will battle it out against the resprayed souped-up pepperpot-alloyed bad boys, Wacky Races style. 


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Football movies have been a bit hit-and-miss in the past. When Saturday Comes consists mostly of Sean Bean with a big mullet standing around in the rain looking very angry. Bend It Like Beckham may have launched the careers of Keira Knightley, highlighted cultural differences within Britain, and still managed to find time to be quite funny, but you couldn't get over the feeling that it was missing some 'real' football. And even it's biggest fans would have to admit that Escape To Victory, good old Christmas classic that it is, is faintly ridiculous. Rocky in goal? Michael Caine the midfield general? Pele beating the Nazis? Ossie Ardilles...? Good effort, but not quite there.

Goal! looks set to end the search for a decent football movie. At a time when 'the beautiful game' is more about rich Russians, caviar and satellite TV money than the traditional pork pies and cold mugs of tea, Goal! aims to be the film that makes 'soccer' a success on the big screen.

(According to the press release), the story follows Santiago Munez who crossed the Mexican border into America with his family when aged 10. He had two things in his possession: a soccer ball and a tattered picture of the World Cup. Now a young man, it seems that the land of opportunity his father brought him to has little or no opportunity for a guy with his passion for playing soccer. Unnoticed and unable to find any useful outlet for his skills other than playing for a small, local, less-than-amateur side, Santiago (Kuno Becker) works menial jobs as part of the poor illegal immigrant community of East Los Angeles.

But when Brit Glen Foy (Stephen Dillane), an amiable former football player randomly spots Santiago at a local match, while

visiting his daughter, he recognizes a deft, fast and brave footballer - the kind of talent that the English Premiere League may well be hungry for. After failing to get a visiting sports agent to take a look at him, Glen tells Santiago that if he can get himself to England, he'll arrange for a trial with the only club he has a chance with - Newcastle United. One club – one chance.

Santiago believes this is the opportunity he's waited for all of his life. Convincing his father is another story: "There are two types of people in this world," declares the stubborn elder Munez, "People in big houses, and people like us who cut their lawns and wash their cars." As an illegal immigrant, if Santiago chooses to make the journey to the UK, he will be turning his back on his family forever as he'll never be able to come back. Now thrust into a foreign land where football is a religion and Newcastle's St. James Park its cathedral, this young Latin American must prove that he's got the grit and the game to become a part of one of the most beloved football clubs in the world. Muddy fields, cold winds and crunching blows, not conditions he's experienced or is prepared for, it seems Santiago is destined for failure in a foreign land. "Goal!" is the story of this young man's fight to prevail against the odds in his own ultimate challenge - to become a Premiership footballer. (End of press release).

THE ASSASSINATION OF RICHARD NIXON: 15

A chilling drama that explores and exposes the dark side of the American Dream by focusing on the tragic true story of Sam Bicke (Sean Penn), a disillusioned everyman who, in 1974, was driven to plot the assassination of the 37th president of the United States. Despite the fact that his marriage is breaking up and that he hates his job, Sam tries desperately to succeed both at home and at work; all he wants is to win his family back and to start a business of his own. THE JACKET: 15

The Jacket centers on a military veteran who returns to his native Vermont suffering from bouts of amnesia. CULTURAL HUNGER // DEBBIE KRUPSKI



When you see an upturned bin on King's Street, what explanation occurs to you? Hooligan or seagull? Do you think this would be different if you were living in, say, landlocked Leicester or Poznan? Are you accustomed to travelling through fields on trains or edging into Edgware on tender hooks? What does it mean to you to live here?

Starting on the 13th September, the States will debate the cultural strategy lodged au Greffe on the 19th of July by the Education, Sport and Culture Committee. The document they are facing has been a long time arriving. The history behind its creation can be traced to attempts born from the argy bargy between the arts organisations of the late 90s. Consultants have been drafted in from the UK, the responsibility for culture has changed hands within the States since, with the Committee for Education, Sport and Culture now holding responsibility for all cultural matters. Attempts at a buoyant, honest, representative and helpful cultural strategy have turned out various documents which have all been washed away by relentless pace of cultural life carrying on regardless, refusing to fit. Nevertheless, who pays the piper, calls the tune.

The first in the line up of these attempts to reach a viable cultural strategy for the island laid all arts organisations on an equal, left wing footing around a single pot of gold. Unviable. Next comes spring project of 2003 which was sent out to no fewer than 200 select individuals with a 'do you want to be happy?' style questionnaire. (40 responded). From such auspicious beginnings we now have the current, snappily titled 'P.154/2005', a cultural strategy, which could more honestly be titled 'thoughts for reorganising the arts organisations'.The document is modified from one previously drawn-up for the UK.

Are you a practicing artist? Have you acquainted yourself with the cultural strategy which, if passed, will have implications for your practice? If so, what is your response? Is it the kind of strategy you would like to see? What would be? I asked three questions of my correspondents to probe their understanding of what culture might mean, the nature of Jersey's unique cultural identity and their thoughts on our need for a cultural strategy. Here is a summary:

WHAT IS CULTURE?

Culture is an abstract concept that contains the elements that binds a society together and which forms its identity. The elements arise from a place's geology, geography, environment, history and social development and contains inherited values, beliefs, knowledge. What it is not is the arts-and-heritage mix, which often is used as a shorthand, though the way a community views arts and heritage is part of the whole.

IN WHAT WAY IS THE CULTURE OF JERSEY DISTINCT FROM THAT OF THE UK?

The differences derive from the same list given above. Its small size and island geography, its geology (especially the red granite), environment (further south), history and social development (proximity to and relationship with France), its isolation leading to a greater sense of unity and independence, its flexibility in approach to changes imposed from outside, an experience of self-help especially during the Occupation, all inform its separate identity.

DO WE NEED A CULTURAL STRATEGY?

In so much as civilisations develop an awareness of the cultural elements and their importance and enshrine this awareness into government, and in so much as government funds may be required for cultural matters from time to time, yes we do. But it should be Jersey's own cultural strategy (Genuine Jersey) and not someone else's. When the States members begin their discussions, will they be asking why we can't have a Genuine Jersey cultural strategy? Will they be paying attention to that which the document misses? In my respondents' opinions: the bits that are missing are some of the most vitally important elements of Jersey's rich and diverse culture.

WHAT LIKE?

Jersey has absorbed multiple languages. The island has adapted over time to drastically changing circumstances: look at the way agriculture is reinventing itself. What organisations does the paper omit to mention? To name a few - the Alliance Français, the Commission Amicale, the Amitiés franco-britannique, the Association of Jersey Architects (surprising when you think of the public pile-up resulting from any discussion of the waterfront). What about the currently growing Polish communities, the Italians, Chinese communities? What became of the once loved Chinese food festival? At least the Portuguese runs still. But that is part of the canon already – it is seen. Without recognition funding is essentially stemmed from the grass roots level and strains cease to exist.

Is the strategy just that – a representation capitalising on the colour and majesty of cultural expression a people - when given the freedom to do so - naturally generates? Or is it a stab at policy – a direction of those cultural expressions that are already visible, fitting easily with existing definitions, understandings and practices. Does the document reflect the diversity around us or does it seek to redirect it?

Who has been consulted? Were you (artist) reader? I would suggest large numbers of artists / musicians / dancers remain unaware of the strategy's existence and the possible effects its implementation could have on their lives. Who do we know certainly wasn't engaged? The National Trust of Jersey which is in possession of the greater majority of vernacular and heritage properties was not (prior to the creation of the first document discussed here). What are the all-important fiscal implications of the strategy? They are not clearly stated.





The Girl Who Married a Lion Alexander McCall Smith, £6.99

It sounds improbable, marrying a lion, but Kumalo's daughter evidently did. Equally dubious is the tale of the girl who was swallowed whole by a snake, then regurgitated covered with smelly slime but otherwise unharmed, or the brave hunter duped by a beautiful woman who turned out to be a leopard.

This enigmatic collection of traditional stories from Zimbabwe and Botswana at first glance seems simplistic, and even childish. However, viewed as a whole, the book creates a vivid insight into the character of the people of sub-Saharan Africa. Not dissimilar to Aesop's fables, the tales are mainly cautionary. The overwhelming images throughout are that of Man being indivisible from the animals with whom he shares this challenging land, and a powerful sense of community, largely lost in our own society.




The Road Taken

Michael Buerk, £7.99

From the outset this book grabs you by whatever your tender bits are, and manages to sustain its grip throughout its 400-odd pages. The life of a foreign correspondent, and certainly that of a war reporter, is a surreal one, and Michael Buerk's astounding ability to place the reader firmly at his shoulder as he re-

counts his vast experience in the field brings that life into reach for even the most couch-dwelling of us. His sense of pace, exhilaration and a deep-seated humanity paint a thrilling picture of some of the most momentous events of the past few decades, without resorting to sensationalism. It was his report from Korem in October 1984, that first highlighted the enormity of the Ethiopian famine to a stunned world. Mr Geldof saw the broadcast, and the rest is history.



Geldof in Africa Bob Geldof, £20

Given its size, price and high-gloss presentation, Geldof in Africa easily comes under the 'coffee table' umbrella. Although there is a fair quantity of interesting and sensitive text, the book comes across more as a collection of artistic photographs than as a contemporary comment about what and where

Africa is today. The photographs are impressive, though, and it is a great credit to Sir Bob that most of the images were taken by him. This is a BBC publication complementing the recent series of the same name, and is basically a good-looking portrait of the many countries Bob visited, and despite the price tag, it's selling by the cartload. Let's face it, Geldof's a bit like a Polo; people like him.

BLACK & WHITE 050505- SIMPLE MINDS

The Scottish legends that are Simple Minds have come a long way since the late 70s when they graced the Glasgow scene as Johnny and the Self-Abusers, and when they headlined at Roskilde in '83; if you are in your early 20s now, you were in nappies then. So, nearly three decades in the maturing, can they meet the demands of today's music consumers? Black & White 050505 has all the right elements needed to please. They say that 'quality will out', and the album certainly is rich with SM's indisputable pedigree. There's Charlie Burchill's distinctive lead guitar signature; a pervasive bass that hits your solar plexus just how you like it; a satisfying beat with a definite presence, not just a shadow; and a great voice at the front. Unfortunately, the great voice seems to be a blend of Bono's and Billy Idol's, instead of Jim Kerr's with its own identity. In fact, at the opening of Home, I expected to hear "It's a nice day for a... white wedding..." coming at me. Despite this red herring, Home is a powerful track and will be a successful single. Their sound has evolved, and this millennium sees a mellower and less urgent SM, but this, sadly, could be mistaken as a euphemism for 'tired': the title track is hardly a match for earlier hard-hitting, political statements such as Biko and Belfast Child. One more moan- only nine tracks? Where's the rest? By the way, if you're racking your brains as to the 050505 significance, it's only the date they finished recording, so rack no more. JT ***

THE GREATEST- IAN BROWN

It would be too easy to comment on the title of this latest vehicle to fund the coming winter's feathercuts and designer parkas. Featuring a collection of singles, album tracks, collaborations and new song Return of the Fisherman, this could be the ideal buy for anyone who has recently completed their Oasis and Kasabian back catalogues. Corpses In Their Mouths is winsome and nostalgic with its Roses hat-doffing but strangely sounds less dated than the more dancey tracks which have the knack of coming off like bad early nineties pop. Though songs like Love Like A Fountain and Golden Gaze have some infectious fast food charm about them, the lyrical transcripts from this collection would be best employed in some sort of anti-drug campaign. Tearing into Ian Brown is a bit like kicking a puppy dog but the fact that the undeniable highlight of the album is Unkle's Be There suggests that this monkey is probably best when somebody else is grinding the organ.AG **

THE BACK ROOM- EDITORS

After whetting the proverbial appetite with three great singles, Birmingham-based Editors finally release their debut album, The Back Room. One look at the cover art will tell you this is not going to be an album full of joyous pop songs and first impressions are not misleading; The Back Room is steeped in brooding, dark songs with intelligent lyrics and epic sounds. A better opening to a rock album you will be hard pressed to find, as after they have raced through opener Lights, it is straight into the singles Munich and Blood with all their tidal waves of cascading guitar riffs and power vocals. But Editors are not all about sombre drive; this is balanced by the melancholic beauty of songs like the slow builder Fall or the strangely uplifting Distance. It is in fact almost impossible not to like what is on offer here. Editors have taken the first significant step out of the gloom of The Back Room and into the light of what should prove to be a long and enduring journey. S ***1/2

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A TASTE OF THAI

It had sounded such a good idea in the text Katz had sent me - open-air cinema, flowery Cath Kidston deckchairs and champagne. But Moulin Rouge had hardly started before we realised we had a serious problem. Hayfever. Our persistent sneezing was getting persistent "Shushs!" from our fellow cinema-goers.

But suddenly, instead of the troublesome grass pollen, across Howard Davis park was wafting a delicious smell of another sort of grass ... lemongrass. Memories came flooding back of our Thailand adventure, when our rucksacks were Berghauses rather than Prada, and we followed the irresistible aroma out of the park and across the road, towards the looming turrets of A Taste of Thai.

Now I'd always dismissed the restaurant as a sort of huge white elephant – or rather a red and gold Ganesh-type elephant – and could never quite bring myself to venture in. I think it was the dark red décor and Tiffany-style lamps that put me off, even though they probably were authentic Thai exports. A Taste of Thai has only been open a year – the owner, Steve De La Haye looks rather like a tanned extra from The Beach, and has brought over all the exclusive ingredients to recreate his favourite Thai dishes, along with three five-star Thai chefs. I couldn't believe how busy the restaurant was; accountants braving the spicy Jungle curry, tourists snacking on Thai fish cakes, and lots of exbackpackers seeking to relive their Thailand experience. And if, like me, your memories of Thailand are a little ...shall we say.... blurred, Steve will personally select menu options for you.

Sympathetic to our sneezing, Steve suggested we start with one of the soups – Tom Yam, a heady blend of the very same aroma we'd smelt wafting across the park; galangal, lemongrass and lime leaves. Despite looking like a bowl of old dishwater, the potent, sharp broth is like a ritual cleansing – it's a perfect cure for hayfever, hangovers, broken hearts – just about anything. And if you want to know the secret of how the Thai girls stay so slim, it's all in the cuisine – if you avoid any of the coconut milk-based dishes, everything is unbelievably low in calories. Being a little more sensitive than Katz, I opted for the Tom Kha Gai soup – a softer, creamier version with all of the taste, but less of the punch of the original.

The soup left us cleansed and refreshed, ready to attack the rest of the menu. Choosing a dish from the wide variety isn't difficult, with a helpful spice guide that gives every dish a heat rating, ranging from 1 (korma) through to 5 (volcanic). There are also photographs of the specials – handy if your Thai's a bit rusty. Steve was on hand to recommend a few favourites, and first to arrive was the dubiously named Gaeng Suparod, a gentle yellow curry served inside a hollowed-out pineapple. It's not a combination I would have thought of, but it works, with the curry absorbing the sweet flavours of the fruit.

Next was the Pla Samon Pai Thai - a whole bass, crispy and blackened then sprinkled with ginger and lemongrass and soused in tamarind sauce with a little pot of fresh chilli on the side for the adventurous. It certainly lived up to the description "a mouth-watering explosion of flavours", although in my case it was eye-watering when I accidentally spilt the fresh chillies over it. Katz drew the short straw and got the head-end, and was a bit put off by the fishy eye staring up at her. She's always been a bit squeamish, personally I don't think she's recovered from the time she bought a bag of what she thought were roasted chestnuts from a Thai roadside vendor ... only to crunch into the shell of a roasted beetle! She much preferred Steve's new creation - and it's not on the menu, so you have to be in the know if you want to sample it. Just ask him for the Pou Ja – an adventurous dish of pork and crab meat stir-fried together with red curry paste and some exclusive herb imports - all served in the crab shell. It was so scrummy, we almost didn't have room for my favourite - the roast duck Gaeng Phet Ped Yang (that's Thai red curry to you and me), all served with heaps of delicately scented jasmine rice. Of course, if you want to be really Thai - order a basket of steaming sticky rice, and eat it with your fingers, dunking scoops into the curry.

Too full for dessert, Steve insisted we sample his famous Thai whisky. At 80%, the smoothly deceptive Sang Som is responsible for the downfall of many an unwary backpacker, who regain consciousness in some brothel or opium den. At least, that's the excuse they always give. It reminded Katz and I of the time when, under the influence of a couple of glasses of Sang Som, we remembered to take our malaria tablets before we passed out, but forgot to swallow them, and woke up foaming at the mouth, convinced we'd both got rabies.

Our verdict? Brave the dark and mysterious interior and you're guaranteed an authentic Thai meal, served by people who know what they're talking about. Appearances can be deceptive, as Katz and I know well – we swapped sun-bleached shorts for fake Ralph Lauren from the market to blag our way into the Bangkok Peninsula when the backpacker lifestyle got too much for us. And whether you want a wonton or are just partial to Pad Thai, it's certainly one way of visiting Thailand without leaving Jersey.







GLOSSARY: TYPES OF LEATHER

The sheer number and variety of types of leather can be baffling - use this Gallery glossary to figure out which type is good for you.

Pure Aniline Leather

A top grain leather that has been soaked in aniline dye but receives no additional coloring. It may contain a protective treatment such as Scotchgard. The most expensive leather as well the best quality. The most soft and supple of all leathers. The natural grain of the leather has not been sanded or buffed in any way, and will develop a rich patina with age. A very small percentage of hides are actually pure aniline leather.

Semi-Aniline

A top grain leather that is aniline dyed and coated with a matching pigment and/or other topical finishes to even out the color and add protection. This leather also maintains its original grain thus allowing the natural character of the leather to show through.

Corrected (Protected) Aniline

Usually less expensive and more common than the pure and semi- aniline leathers. The coloration is more consistent and the grain is an embossed, manmade grain. Corrected leathers are easier to clean, repel water and stains, and are ideal for heavy family use.

Nubuck

A top grain leather that is buffed to create a soft nap. Often has a light finish and is especially vulnerable to stains. Nubuck leathers will fade when placed in sunlight. Do not place in windows, under skylights or in places that will put them in sunlight.

Antiqued/Distressed

Artificially created signs of wear and natural aging.

Full Grain

A top grain leather with no corrections or alterations to the natural grain pattern.

Split

The bottom layers of the hide that have been split off from the top grain. Much stiffer and less durable than the top grain leather. May be used on promotional furniture or on the sides and backs of other pieces to help contain costs.

Hand

The softness or "feel" of leather.

Suede

Leather finished by buffing with an emery wheel to produce a napped surface. Suede is made from the split layer of the cowhide.

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

LIVING IN COLOUR

READY TO GET ON THE PROPERTY LADDER? WE TAKE A LOOK AROUND THE NEW SPECTRUM APARTMENTS AS THE FIRST STAGES WERE REVEALED LAST MONTH,



In an environment where the majority of traditional housing consists of large, detached properties - with an average price some three times that of the UK mainland - the need for quality affordable housing is greater than ever. The concept of 'modern apartment living' is still relatively new to Jersey, with innovative developers challenging preconceptions and bringing the best of chic, urban accommodation to the Island. Although they've had something of a bashing from the (predominantly older we suspect) public about the waterfront development, Dandara have been flying the flag for the development of starter homes with it's new spectrum development.

More and more individuals are finding themselves, having obtained the mandatory housing qualifications required, in a position to buy their first home - only to discover the majority of properties are not within budget. That's the fate for a lot of us, scouring the JEP, Gallery and the web for that elusive apartment that's within financial reach.

THE DEVELOPMENT

Dandara tell us that Spectrum is designed to offer its residents more than just affordable accommodation. It has been carefully planned to offer a whole new lifestyle to it's residents. The layout provides high density accommodation without over-crowding. A series of interlinking landscaped walkways invite visitors further into the development, where they can discover a wealth of diverse environments - from chic cafés with al fresco seating to stylish boutiques and restaurants. We've had a look around this month and it looks like there's going to be a good al fresco area for yuppie types (and there certainly are still many Young Urban Professionals) in St Helier.

This mixed-use environment combines aspirational qualities of urban chic with the traditional relaxed atmosphere of Jersey, resulting in an eclectic, vibrant community. The ground level of the scheme brings a mixture of amenities and leisure opportunities to residents' doorsteps, with residential accommodation occupying the upper levels whilst parking is contained in a secure basement level.

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IN GOOD COMPANY

Spectrum comprises a total of 235 apartments arranged across seven blocks ranging from four to six storeys in height. The one and two bedroom apartments range in size from $343ft_2$ to $808ft_2$, with the average apartment size being $347ft_2$. Yet, within each apartment, space has been optimised at every opportunity. Prices at Spectrum start from £109,000.

SO.... WHAT DO YOU GET?

Living spaces have been designed to offer flexible, practical accommodation - with open plan designs ensuring each unit benefits from as much space and light as possible. Full height windows, with either terraces, balconies or Juliette balconies, feature within the main living areas. If you've been living in an apartment without a balcony for the past few years you'll fully appreciate the ability to open the door, get some air, and open up the room.

Interior decoration utilises pale, reflective surfaces such as gloss cabinets in the kitchen areas and laminate wood flooring throughout, further maximising the feeling of space within the relatively small footprint. The show flats have been well dressed and give a good idea of how you can use this canvas to get your own particular brand of interior design into practice.

The concept of open-plan living has been wholeheartedly embraced at Spectrum. All of the apartments feature contemporary kitchen/ dining/lounge areas. Functional kitchens adorn a single 'wall' of the apartment, providing a sociable solution for those wishing to entertain, whilst the living area benefits from full height windows, often providing a dual aspect, that flood the internal space with natural light. Nothing worse than a dark flat!



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RENOVATE // starting out

ABODE A LITTLE TOO HUMBLE? REVITALISE YOUR RESIDENCE AS RICHARD HALSEY BEGINS GALLERY'S SIX-PART, MONTHLY GUIDE TO PROPERTY RENOVATION.



I'd always thought that in a DIY showdown with Handy Andy I could strip the paint off his cockney face and nail-gun him to the floor. Llewellyn Bowen? – I'd easily MDF his hair to one of his frivolous gothic 'designs'. That was until one irksome afternoon I thought my house would benefit from a touch up.

Tired of slowly sealing off rooms due to damp, lack of flooring and weirdly, a mushroom field in the spare room, I was resolute I would live no longer in such a squalid milieu. The sprucing would commence forthwith and it did: badly and expensively.

I don't mean to deter anyone from embarking on such a project. On the contrary, but a word of warning to anyone intent on a little home improvement – it'll cost more and take longer – fact.

To prevent an appearance on DIY SOS, do take heed from this guide, but bear in mind this central detail – it all happens at once. Knowing where I wanted my cooker mattered to the gas man. Equally, having an idea of which corner my TV would sit was paramount to the electricians' work. Most crucially though, they both needed to know when the other was working.

So, store these guides to your memory – or magazine rack - and piece together the tangled, jigsaw-like web of property renovation at your leisure, all the while remembering that the Kitchen layout (December issue) is something the electrician (Next month) will need to know.

Those TV make-over monkeys may appear to transform shacks into castles in a matter of hours, but I must have missed the show on the importance of a surveyor. Though I had arranged a survey of my house to secure the mortgage, this was a valuation as opposed the full structural survey I paid a princely, but worthwhile, sum for later. The survey found damp and rot in the floorboards and roof space, the latter partially due to shoddy guttering. This would all cost money; however I was happier to part with a few hundred pounds initially, than face the prospect of my new bathroom suite landing on top of me during the news. With the major problems highlighted, time for no-brainers like me to call the roofing specialist, then a week later to contact the timber treatment company then.... I found project managing whilst working full time almost impossible; I spent lunch breaks waiting in for tradesmen, when all along I had to employ someone who offers that service anyway.

The architect or even surveyor can manage the whole renovation, from fixing the budget to employing the workmen, not just the builders, but electricians too.

An architect is fairly essential for the drawing of proficient plans, though if employing a builder or an individual who project manages for a living, they will have an idea from more basic sketches. But planning is critical, by knowing what I wanted the finished article to look like, the architect was able to pencil more a more detailed plan and project manage my house much more easily. The real benefit of professionals in this area is that they have an inside knowledge of the laws surrounding any build or renovation project.

My house is free of restrictions such as being a Building of Local Interest, or a Site of Special Interest (though I disagreed the mushroom field didn't qualify for the latter). However, internal alterations such as taking out supporting walls or moving the kitchen can contravene Jersey's Building By-Laws and these apply to all properties, so if not involving professionals check this out. Other rules apply too, as I found out after a slap on the wrists from the Health Protection Unit for excessive building noise; well it was 6am.

Regardless of whether employing someone to manage the project, or supervising the job yourself, it is advisable to employ those who are members of a Trade Association, such as The Jersey Construction Council. There is no guarantee the work will meet your standards, but there is increased protection if it doesn't and it is unlikely they would remain a member of their Trade Association if their work was frequently questionable.

The project manager will usually rely on a network of contractors they use regularly. My architect did and then collated the individual estimates of the gas company, plasterer etc. If cost-cutting and project managing yourself, this is an area with a certain degree of safety attached. Everyone will want your trade, so the free estimate reigns supreme and when coupled with the architects plan, a clearer picture of cost and timescale will emerge.

Estimates and consultation with contractors allows an approximate budget to be set. The architect or project manager will of course do this, and it may end up a little more than expected, but perhaps some details could be tailored to suit a smaller budget, or there's always the option of the home improvement loan.

However far the budget stretches, by planning and ensuring decisions are made early, renovating a home is enjoyable and just a little more rewarding than watching someone else do it. RH

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IN THE FACE OF VOTER APATHY, WILL AUSTIN VAUTIER EXAMINES WHY YOUR VOTE COUNTS



Island politics has been suffering the same bad press that Christianity weathered throughout Rock n' Roll and the Hippy movement. It was only when Sir Cliff crept in at number one with Mistletoe and Wine that the purple rinses and G-squad began reforging their mark on popular culture.

Let's face facts, if you are reading this as a teenager, you have already put your ear phones back in because you know I am about to discuss the perceived sleep-inducing topic of politics. Why should you care? You're a few years shy of eligibility to vote anyhow, right? But even if you're eighteen, we've lost you already. In those interim years in which you began to answer back to your parents, realise your own beliefs and share your opinions, the talking heads filmed in the Royal Square went a long way to sterilising your interest in local politics. Essentially, for however many young persons you may count on one hand that have the foresight to appreciate the field of politics, politics remains deeply unfashionable here in Jersey.

Tell me, what comes to mind when you reflect on the world of local government? Is it small-minded legislative decisions? Shortsighted policies? Grey hair? Personal agendas? Petty squabbles? Are these largely the sentiments of a little nation towards its' current political framework?

But what if I reminded you that the political framework is about to change significantly, and that Jersey rests upon a cusp of governmental re-organisation, un-paralleled in its' long history. I'd like to regard the upcoming move into ministerial governance - and the elections that precede it - with a 'wheat and chaff', 'old and new' mentality. But I won't. Why? Because I am aware that there is only one way to realise such ambition for local politics; the increased involvement of those demographic sections of our society who raise the greatest questions yet fail, year on year, to voice them on the hustings floor. Such negative perceptions grow on the back of lack of understanding, and fester among groups that have no interest because they found it hard to demystify the wranglings of politics and those who represented it. The task is to bring the average age of the parish hall debate right down, make politics fashionable through inclusion and fill every seat on every night with a deep cross-section of our Island's industries and interests. It can be done, people just have to start talking in the right manner about something so critical to the direction of society.

The British Isles have always voiced their opinion, whether through a peasants' revolt or miners' strike. Rebellions, for example, are as much a facet of our national character as any other country, but some countries make politics their bread and butter. Look at our French neighbours. They started a revolution that deposed a monarchy; they refused to go to war with Iraq; and recently, gave a no-confidence vote towards the EU, all reiterating France's reputation as a politically involved nation. Britain tries, but our stiff upper lip and lack of Mediterranean passion refers us back to our 'its just not cricket' way of trusting our government. That is why, culturally, British people are the best at queuing but also the best at moaning. We queue and wait patiently in line because we accept the conditions presented before us. If the queue is representative of political change this reflects our passive relationship with government. However, we then moan profusely on finally realising the discomfort and injustice of queuing. By this time, however, Henry VIII has burnt down the monastic houses, or Maggie's Poll Tax has been in full swing for twelve months, or ninety of our soldiers have died in Camp Dogwood and the surrounding towns.

I'm not suggesting we get aggressive with our government. I am merely suggesting that if you find yourself wasting more energy through moaning about the way the state is run, than by taking every opportunity that democracy offers to influence it, you need to reconsider who's responsible for the conditions of the status quo. If we were - heaven forbid - in a dictatorship, by all means pass the buck to the enraged, blood-shot eyed iatola waving his clenched fist at you.

But we are blessed with a democracy, and if the masses were to operate their side of the societal machine, members of a sound government would merely be a series of cogs in an engine of maintained savvy legislation or agents of beneficial change. "But what if the agents are not sound or savvy", I here you say. >>>

PROBLEM COLLEAGUES //

WILL AUSTIN VAUTIER LOOKS AT HOW TO DIFFUSE CONFLICT IN THE OFFICE ENVIRONMENT

If Elton John, a temp and Adolf Hitler were to meet in a police line-up, who would be the odd one out? I'll let you think about that one while I digress.

If ever we locked horns with siblings, had our lunch box dropped into class by our mothers, or watched Dad attempting the moonwalk at cousin Sally's wedding, we are reminded of one important fact of life; as much as we'd love to do something about our lives, you just can't choose your family. We spend our most energetic years attempting to avoid, deny and redirect their impulses. Who didn't drag their feet when shopping for school uniform or cross a finger that Nan would put her teeth back in before she kissed you? Backed by the sound of Cobain and Dylan, many wishes are made on the bedroom floor; primarily to grow up, get out and prove your worth.

However, there arrives a moment of realisation, achieved through a fatiguing process of rude working life awakenings, in which you understand that 'the family' is not the coffee stain on your bright suit of self-definition you thought it was; relations in our working environments can prove to be far, far more hazardous. So then we return to Elton, the temp and recent history's most hated figure.

The temp is the odd one out.Why? Because unlike Hitler and Elton John, he or she has no choice over whom they work with. Yes, they can drift from job to job, but like you and I, they can never call the shots once they get there. Elton won't make a record with just anyone, and Hitler impulsively 'silenced' all those whom he felt stood in his way.

It is only through experience that we realise the potentially destructive effects that relationships within the workplace can have on the condition of our lives. Problematic colleagues are worse than jealous siblings; they have the ability to be just as spiteful and condescending, but unlike the former they operate within the professional environment. It is not as simple as throwing some crockery their way, shouting till you're hoarse and then making up; the workplace allows problem colleagues to get under skin, safe in the knowledge that their prey is forced to act in the manner their job title dictates, not as their impulses as humans would suggest.

We all have the potential to be difficult, but there are three well-known stereotypes that can be identified within the workplace: the abrasive personality, the Type-A stress-prone personality and the aggressive personality.

The Abrasive Personality Is characterised by traits such as stubbornness, tactlessness and the ability to be condescending. They are often critical of your efforts and dismissive of your ideas. Also, they very much treat you as a rival with debate and discussion often turning into argument. They like to attack when challenged and are preoccupied by symbols of power and status.

The Type-A Stress-Prone Personality Is characterised by a devotion to work. They have a chronic sense of time urgency – always rushed and operating to impossible deadline conditions. They also have the habit of finishing sentences for other people and often attempt two or more activities at the same time, such as wanting to read and eat or continue to type whilst on the phone. This is known as 'polyphasic activity'.

The Aggressive Personality Is characterised by the need to find fault in your work. They display a lack of interest in opinions, take you for granted, can often be sarcastic and will often poke fun and try to devalue your ideas. Furthermore, they often make decisions that affect you without your consultation, are swift to jump to conclusions and make their displeasure clearly evident.



ANGER AND CONFLICT MANAGEMENT

Fighting back is not socially acceptable in organisational life, but neither can we run away from the situation, as we must fulfil our job role and commitments. This 'fight or flight' mechanism is the normal psychological response to such stress-provoking situations.

When provoked, one should attempt to diagnose why the person arousing your anger is behaving this way, and is the situation exacerbating the problem? Fundamentally, although it may sound very hippy, you must do your best to acknowledge your feelings. Don't deny the fact you are riled, it will only heighten your discomfort. Ask yourself why you feel angry, are your feelings justified, and are you being realistic about the situation? In order to manage anger effectively some people find the best way to dilute ill feeling is to use silent 'self talk'. Recognising, at that moment in time, that many people provoke you to anger because they find it rewarding, often allows you to stay in control.

Think about what you want to do next. If someone insults us, it is important to remember that we do not have to either defend or prove ourselves. Decide what you want to get out of the situation and make sure you do not need any further information before you make an appropriate response. Importantly for those that choose to respond is the avoidance of the 'yes, but' approach; it usually results in the other person digging in their heels and defending their position. Also, use emphatic assertion techniques; this is active listening towards the aggressor, to show that you have heard what they are saying, respect them, and take them seriously. If the other person is angry it is often good to let them run out of steam before beginning a discussion.

In essence, managing difficult people requires the sensitive process of careful confrontation. But before you communicate with the person involved you must first confront yourself. Admit that you are stressed, recognise the signs and ask yourself what you want to do to correct it; preparing your own thoughts will allow you to vocalise your feelings more clearly. Furthermore, if you are not in this type of situation, but are close to one that is ongoing, what constuctive advice or actions could you instill to diffuse the situation? And finally, if you are puzzled as to why the whole office is against you and people don't treat you the way they should, be careful; it may not be them who are the problem, it might be you.



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GLOBAL UPDATE.

IN OUR NEW FEATURE WE HIGHLIGHT SOME KEY FACTS AND WORLD EVENTS THAT YOU SHOULD ALL BE AWARE OF

It sounds implausible, but according to UNESCO, 10 languages really do die out each year. Currently there are roughly 6,000 living languages in the world and it is estimated that half of them are at threat of extinction.

Jersey French has to be one of those. In the past you would occasionally hear somebody, and let's be honest here, somebody old, speaking Jersey French. But as these people naturally grow old and die there are very few (if any) young people learning the language to a standard where they could hold a serious conversation. Soon it will have gone the way of the dodo. In fact, the good old dodo would have actually stood a better chance of survival as languages are one of the most endangered quantities on the planet.

The University of East Anglia calculated that in the past 500 years, 4.5 percent of languages have died out, compared with 1.3 percent of birds and 1.9 percent of mammals. Is that really a great surprise though? It's surely easier to get a couple of pandas to mate than to spend years learning a new language that you're probably never going to use. And that's where the problem lies.

English, Mandarin Chinese and Spanish are the most widely spoken on the planet and just 10 major languages constitute the native tongue for half of the world's population. So naturally it seems pointless to learn minor dialects like Jersey French, because there's very little use for them. Statistically, you're better off learning Klingon as there are around 1,000 fluent speakers of the Star Trek alien language in the world. At least then if you ever find yourself trapped at a Star Trek convention you'll be able to impress the nerds and get them to help you remove those persistent pop-up adverts that keep appearing on your laptop. In fact, if you already speak English then you'd be better off learning Spanish or even Mandarin - especially as the Chinese will be the dominant superpower in the world during our lifetime.

Already, thousands of languages have been created and died out and relatively few have survived more than 2,000 years – Greek, Hebrew, Latin, Basque, Sanskrit and Tamil being a few that have endured. But as we fast become the Global Village, it seems that languages spoken by traditional villages are dying out in favour of more practical terms of communication. Over 400 languages are already in the final stages of extinction and with a quarter of all languages being spoken by less than 1,000 people that figure could well rise as time goes on. Some are predicting that 50 to 90 percent of today's spoken languages will disappear during this century.


As people have increased contact with the rest of the world, speaking a common language is the best way to embrace the opportunities that globalisation and an increasingly homogenised society offer. In the same way that independent burger bars and coffee shops are being forced out of business by the likes of Starbucks and McDonalds, so languages are being threatened as we increasingly think, and buy, globally. Why learn a language you can only speak in your own country? This is one of the reasons that every Dutch person you meet speaks perfect English. But there are other causes too. According to Ethnologue – the database of spoken languages - all but 50 speakers of the Paulohi language in Indonesia were killed in an earthquake and tidal wave.A language can die out as easily as that.

But while it would be nice if we all spoke the same language for practical purposes – they already enforce English for pilots worldwide – there is something about the very culture of people in the words they speak. As each language dies, a chapter of human history closes. The Maori people of New Zealand are starting to increase their speaking numbers, in one of the rare successes, after years of having the language banned by the European settlers. One of their teachers said: "If you grow up not speaking you language, you won't know who you are."

The same has happened with Hebrew, which had ceased to be a spoken language by AD 200 but continued to be used by Jews as a sacred tongue. In the late 19th century there was a revival movement to resurrect it as a common language for the Jewish people and came to be a key factor in the Zionist movement as they searched for a homeland. Now Hebrew is spoken by over five million people and 81 percent of Israel's population.

But with few notable exceptions, languages will continue to vanish as the homogenization of the planet continues.




