#### LAS FALLAS

12-19 MARCH, 2017

VALENCIA, SPAIN

Exuberant and anarchic, Las Fallas is Europe's wildest spring party, which is a pretty big deal for what is essentially a glorified puppet show. It's a time when the city is all but taken over by the fallas, which are huge sculptures of papier-mâché on wood, built by teams of local artists. Each neighbourhood sponsors its own falla, and when the town wakes after the plantà (overnight placement of the fallas) on the morning of 16 March, more than 350 have been erected. Reaching up to 15m in height, with the most expensive costing more than €350,000 to build, these grotesque, colourful effigies satirise celebrities, current affairs and local customs. It's a week long festival so be prepared to pace yourselves.

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

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



The rotation of the Earth is gradually slowing down. The deceleration of the Earth's rotation is very slow, approximately 17 milliseconds per hundred years. Eventually this will lengthen our days but it will take around 140 million years before our day will have increased from 24 to 25 hours.

A year on Earth lasts just over 365 days. It is actually 1/4 of a day over 365 days which is why we have a leap year every four years.



# The people behind Gallery are responsible, so the articles in this earth-themed issue are likely to give the readers a gentle prod in a slightly more sustainable direction. We all know we should recycle more, consume less and generally take better care of our planet - because it's the only one we've got.

Those who disagree regard our planetary home as an infinite well of resources that must be exploited for maximum profit; they shrug off the evidence of our impact on the globe as questionable, biased or just "alternative facts". In an age of melting glaciers and dying forests those people are starting to look very stupid indeed, but they're in control of the world, and even as we battle them a third viewpoint has emerged. It is held by a faction who definitely agree that our species is ruining the planet, but their preferred solution is that we keep burning up resources, industrialise at a faster rate, and work together for a common goal - not to save our planet, but to leave it behind and find a new one.

#### Moonbase Amazon and the Myspace from Mars

Colonising new worlds has been a dream of humanity for centuries, a goal expressed eloquently by utopian thinkers who thought that the human race was capable of coming together as one and making a new home amongst the stars. The likes of Arthur C Clarke gazed upwards to the heavens in hope, but today's proponents of interplanetary travel are less socially idealistic. They are predominately drawn from the ranks of the super-rich, specifically California's high-technology billionaires, and are attracted to space travel because they either can't be bothered or lack the capacity to solve any problem on Earth that can't be addressed with an app. These people certainly aren't short on belief in their own abilities, but the only hitch is that establishing an off-world colony is, to put it mildly, somewhat more challenging than arranging to dodge tax on 24-hour delivery of a Sherlock box set. I too want to live on a planet with breathable air, so on the assumption that they are monitoring my email I've listed some roadblocks that our saviours will need to

## Challenge 1: the massive level of resources required to leave Earth's orbit

There's a reason that nobody has been to the moon recently, which is that the trip is incredibly dangerous, requires a highly-trained crew and expends gigantic quantities of fuel just to push a small rocket into orbit. Even once you're in space the moon is still three days away, through a vacuum dotted with radiation and flying rocks - the AA don't offer breakdown coverage out there. The International Space Station is a wonderful achievement, but in space colony terms it's the planetary equivalent of camping at the

Minquiers and telling people you live in the ocean. Russian technology is currently the only way to ride, and nobody wants to put all our space eggs in the basket called "Offworld Aeroflot". So, the dotcom billionaires are first going to need to work out a safe, cost-effective way of lifting millions of tonnes of stuff into orbit without any of it blowing up or falling back down, and then assembling it into the interplanetary equivalent of Virgin Atlantic, Heathrow Airport and those little buses that carry your suitcase. I assume the inventor of Uber is on the job, but they haven't even worked out how to operate in Jersey, let alone deep space.

## Challenge 2: the immense difficulty of long distance space travel

At currently achievable speeds, a journey to our nearest potentially inhabitable neighbour (Mars) would take between seven months and a year. This trip would already be several orders of magnitude more dangerous than any journey undertaken by a human crew, and would need to be

conducted in a vehicle that could contain all of the necessities for habitation, ship repair and eventual long-term survival on a planet with an average temperature of -55°C. When you consider that the vehicle would also need enough space for a large crew to move around, exercise and interact without killing each other you're going to end up with a space rocket at the very least the size of a nuclear submarine, which drastically increases both the fuel requirement and the danger from space debris. There is a possibility that a colony waypoint could be constructed in Mars orbit by robots, and get everything ready for a much smaller humancrewed vehicle, but if we're being lead by Californian techies we'll be expecting this to be done safely by a community who can't even stop Russian teenagers from hacking your fridge.

# Challenge 3: the unprecedented task of creating a habitable environment

If challenges #1 and #2 are difficult, but ultimately achievable, engineering tasks,

then this one is a whole different ball game. Remember, we are talking about a species that couldn't work out how to safely manage the ecosystem on the one planet perfect to support it, and is nonetheless expecting to develop technology to wholly adapt a hostile foreign environment to its incredibly precise needs. Humans struggle when there's too much pollen in the atmosphere, but colonising space will require us to create a breathable environment and produce food on an entire alien world. What if we get to Mars and discover it's covered in space gluten? We'd be dooming our descendants to bloating, tiredness and bad skin. That's a silly example, but reality holds a million unknown dangers - evolved human germs, unknown Martian bacteria, new toxins. The scientific community can't even agree on whether butter is bad for you, so personally I'm not taking their best guess on whether my descendants can live on Mars without recreating the pyramid scene from Total Recall.

# Challenge 4: recreating human society on a foreign world


Based on our history, the biggest challenge to extra-planetary colonisation won't be space travel or the science required to settle a new planet, it will be the part of our brains that has barely evolved from our vicious monkey ancestors. If it's possible that humanity can somehow scrape together enough resources to escape Earth, the prevailing scientific dream has been that this effort will be

lead by the best and brightest among us, the selfless elite who see through petty squabbles and work in service of our shared humanity. The problem is that these people will need to bring the rest of us with them, and the likelihood is that the colonists to our new home will be chosen by President Donald Trump and some billionaire sociopaths from San Francisco. If we assume that even a barely functioning Mars colony might take 10 to 30 years for them to build, can you imagine what kind of a place will greet new arrivals once those people have finished work? A freezing, potentially poisonous mass of dead rock, adapted for humanity by the handpicked servants of a sweet potato fascist and people who spy on their staff during toilet breaks. The Total Recall comparison was supposed to be a joke, but it might not be too far from the truth. We will have ruined a perfectly good planet, travelled across the solar system at the cost of many lives, and the only thing we'll have to show for it is self-driving cars, psychic mutants and a radioactive hooker with three boobs.

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# TIME TO SWITCH YOUR ENERGY PARADIGM?

Environmentalism creates the unlikeliest of bedfellows. If you put all the environmentalists both living and dead in one sustainably heated room, you'd have the kind of drinks party that wouldn't be out of place in a Coen brothers film. Anyone and everyone would be there: Chico Mendes, Occupy, anti-North Dakota Pipeline activists and, um, Prince Charles. What would they all talk about? Would they manage to not eventually smack each other?

Environmentalism isn't one 'thing' any more than any of the other 'isms' are one thing. As far as I'm concerned it's enough that we stop messing our planet up and actively try and reverse the damage; other environmentalists aren't quite as vague or forgiving though - check out the Voluntary Human Extinction Movement for more details. While these guys aren't exactly a barrel of laughs, at least their movement doesn't have the mendacity of

what Peter Dauvergne dubs the 'environmentalism of the rich' whose basic philosophy is business as usual, just with more wind turbines.

Amid all of the ideological nuances and the terrifying doomsday scenarios (I sometimes can't bring myself to watch David Attenborough shows because I feel I've personally disappointed him), how can we do something positive? Is there something positive that can be done? Should we just crack out the prosecco and try to enjoy life as much as possible while we all go to hell in a handcart?

If I said yes I wouldn't have written this. I mean, we should get the prosecco out by all means, but we must also get to work. While it's easy to become disheartened or to just switch off completely when it comes to our planet and its future, fatalism is lazy and benefits nobody. We should take encouragement from the evidence that humans can be both incredibly destructive but also incredibly clever when we have to be

One example of this ingenuity being played out is in the creation of alternative

living arrangements and sustainability-centred urban planning. We've seen a proliferation of 'off-grid' designs for homes that create their own energy, and now we're even seeing the world's first high-tech eco-villages being created in Holland. Dubbed ReGen Villages, these communities make use of the Internet of Things and biotech to be fully self-sufficient, from energy to food to waste management.

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This is all fantastic for Holland but what about Jersey? Is there a chance here for us to go sustainable too? According to Mark Brandon, founder of local solar energy business Sunworks CI Ltd, the answer is yes, but it's not as simple as just shifting our energy supply; we need to shift the paradigm of how we view energy, by focussing on its value and not just its cost.

We spoke the day before an explosion at the Flamanville nuclear power plant, which is just 30 miles from Jersey. While there was no nuclear leak, it was a reminder that an overly collectivised and centralised view of energy production is risky for our planet and for us as individuals. Currently, Jersey gets 95% of its energy from nuclear power stations in France, putting us at the mercy of energy production we have no say in protecting or maintaining. In this situation, it's a bit weird that Jersey isn't going more sustainable. As Mark says: "putting appropriately placed renewable power plants on buildings and land owned by islanders puts much more weight on

the 'local self-reliance' of our energy supply. It gives people the chance to become their own small energy provider."

Of course not all of us can afford solar panels or wind turbines - I definitely think there is a role for government to play here in subsidising eco-friendly living and working though - but I am interested in this idea of shifting our idea of what has value. Our society is self-destructively acquisitive - we take and take and take from a planet that can't afford to give anymore. Our feverish consumerism is facilitated by

# how to show the planet you care

How wrong I was, with my naive dreams of a windmill outside Pier Road car park.

Almost 15 years have passed since Michael Jackson released Earth Song, and still we refuse to heed its simple message of respecting the planet, earning the trust of elephants and the idea that MJ might be the second coming of Jesus. The problem has got worse, as MJ has seemingly returned to space and the effects of our reckless consumption are being felt from the smog of Beijing to the droughts of California. Perhaps where Michael went wrong is that his message was too global, too universal, and out of reach for people who just need to start by making a difference in their everyday lives. We need to save the earth, but maybe the best place to start is with ourselves - we need to look at the man in the mirror, and ask him to make a change. If that man in the mirror is you, here are some easily achievable ways you can put yourself on the right path with the planet - perhaps eventually to get those elephants to start taking your calls.

#### Recyclopathic tendencies: charity shopper

The biggest way you can make a difference to the environment is in changing your patterns of consumption. In simple terms that means buy less stuff, especially new stuff, and make the stuff that somebody has already bought go a bit further. # **JAMES BARETTE**

JAMES BARETTE IS THE OWNER OF JB GROUNDWORKS, HE STARTED THE BUSINESS IN 2007. THEY OFFER ALL ASPECTS OF GROUND WORKS INCLUDING; DRAINAGE, EXCAVATION, LANDSCAPING, CONCRETE FOUNDATIONS, BRICK PAVING AND CONCRETE WORKS ETC. THEY ALSO OFFER MACHINERY HIRE USING THE MOST UP TO DATE EQUIPMENT.

As the man in charge his busy days consist of meeting clients and obtaining drawings, which depending on the size of the job he will then go to call upon the expertise of his quantity surveyor to discuss, who will then price. If they are smaller jobs he will price them himself.

James takes a hands on approach to the business "I can be dropping diesel to site or making deliveries on the trucks when we are very busy. There is only a certain amount of planning you can do with construction and we also hire out to other companies so orders can be made at the drop of a hat, so you always have to be ready to get involved when needs be." He has two foreman

working for him and they all speak on a daily basis to ensure the smooth running of the business. "I also have a bookeeper/pa that deals with the accounting side of the business and deals with my HR, which is invaluable."

He's always been a driven and enterprising individual, from the age of 11 he persuaded his mother to buy six hens which he kept on their farm, so that he could then box, sell and deliver their eggs to customers every Saturday morning. "I've always had Saturday jobs which allowed me to gain the experience I needed when leaving college, this included driving tractors in fields at a young age. I left Victoria College to go and work in a trust company and I quickly

realised it wasn't for me. I spent the next 12 months driving a dumper truck for Barette Plant Hire up and down the zoo dredging lakes."

He spent the next five years working for three different companies until he reached a point where he spotted a niche in the market for a more specialised service and realised he could do it himself and so JB Groundworks was born. Whilst the sense of achievement of a job well done is his main driver the 24/7 telephone calls are the area of the job James likes the least, we can't say we blame him either!

The company has completed many projects over the years including Vinchelez Farm in St Ouen, which allowed him to expand the business early on. Then there was the opportunity to renovate four

granite cottages which allowed him to start up the construction side of the business. More recently he's built two New England style houses for Skyway Developments on old Beaumont Hill. JB Groundworks also specialise in the construction of sand schools, 16 to date, the main one being the British Showjumping Association ground on Mont Cochon. "We also did the excavation works

at Liberty wharf and the avenue. Demolished Hotel des Pierres in Greve de Lecq for Summit, I took the building down myself with one of my 14 tracked excavators in one day. Very satisfying!"

So you can also hire equipment from JB Groundworks, the largest pieces of which are the 14 ton tracked excavator which features in the picture with James, and also a six wheeler truck which carries 16 ton. And his favourite bit of kit "That'll have to be the 14ton excavator, especially on demolitions!" and he'd love to own "a Piste Basher which they use to groom the slopes for skiers, unfortunately Jersey weather doesn't warrant one of those." Maybe one day James, maybe one day...

If you haven't been down to the commercial and domestic building waste Recycling Centre at La Collette run by AAL, then you should add it to your list of things to do as the work they're doing is quite

incredible. We spent a few very happy hours down there getting a tour of the facility which occupies a large area of reclaimed land, unique in many ways including not having a postcode. At their facility they take commercial and building waste, it is then inspected, graded and, using on-site crushers and other recycling processes, turned into various materials to be used again for both commercial and domestic building and landscaping needs.

AAL Recycling also accept all of the island's glass, we've seen it it's like a mountain. Once on site it is crushed and currently used to line the outer wall of the La Collette Reclamation. It basically becomes a sand filter preventing the egress into the sea. "We're also looking at other ways to use the glass including; new patented thermal floor suitable for any new build, mixing it with aggregates such as pipe bedding and for sand-blasting too. I've used it in my floors at home, it heats up so much faster than concrete does."

From La Collette, and their commercial Plant Hire and Haulage operations based in St Lawrence, Alan and his team offer a high level of personal service to their long-standing and extensive client base. "We have a reputation for excellence and professionalism,

which means that we have become the total solutions contractor in Jersey. We pride ourselves on being reliable and delivering a quality service at a competitive price."

# New tablets for local schools as a reward for recycling

The island's new Household Reuse and Recycling Centre is now open at La Collette. The site replaces the Household Recycling Centre at Bellozanne which is now closed.

If you've not been down to visit the site yet then the first difference you'll notice is the Acorn Reuse Centre. The Department for Infrastructure who run the centre have partnered with local charity Acorn so you can drop off anything and everything that could be reused by someone else.

The site includes all of the household recycling and waste facilities you'll be familiar with, but with far easier drive through access and parking in front of the drop off points. Which means that you'll no longer experience any delays caused by the department collecting recycling banks as there is separate access for customer and operational traffic.

Emma Richardson-Calladine is the Recycling Manager at the Department for Infrastructure she explains how the site has been developed "We have brought the 'reduce, reuse, recycle' message to life to encourage customers to think differently about waste. Customers will notice the cladding created by Ian Rolls that uses

reclaimed materials and colourful items collected from local school children that otherwise would have been thrown away.

Reused and recycled items have also been used in the site's construction, for example the building takes its shape from the steel frame saved from the demolition of the Jersey Potteries building in Gorey and recycled aggregate, glass, tyres and timber have also been included in the build. The site is powered from the nearby Energy from Waste facility and also includes photovoltaic panels and rainwater harvesting to meet the facility's needs."

All of the island's waste management facilities are being relocated to La Collette to create a Recycling Park. This will not only have many operational benefits for the Department but will also enable customers to see how their waste and recycling is being managed. For example, when you're traveling to the new Household Reuse and Recycling Centre you will drive past the commercial composting facility and see

construction waste being reprocessed to create recycled aggregate, it's a real hive of activity down here and definitely worth a visit to see the amazing work being done..

The new Household Reuse and Recycling Centre is open Monday – Saturday 7.30am-4.15pm and Sunday 8am-12.45pm. Customers making their first visit should look for the Recycling Park road signs and then follow the directional banners at La Collette.






Sangria Restaurant Opening


More than 160 Jersey and Guernsey BNP Paribas staff enjoyed a Circus themed celebration for this year's annual party.

# TRAVEL



Between the two great landmasses of North and South America lies Central America with boarders reaching from the Caribbean to the Pacific coast. Made up of countries dominated by beautiful scenery including palm-fringed beaches, volcanic peaks, enormous lakes, colonial towns and a rich Mayan culture.

I updated my CouchSurfing profile, a community of travelers who can connect with each other to meet up or offer a place to stay. Jose from Madrid contacted me before arriving in Jersey; he had visited 188 of the 196 countries in the world and became my personal travel guide, inspiring me to explore further than my destination Nicaragua.

After a plane, taxi, local bus and boat journey I met with my friend Carolina on the island of Ometepe, formed by two volcanoes in the middle of lake Managua. Carolina writes a blog about the impacts of climate change. A meat loving Spaniard she has made a resolution to go vegetarian and is very conscious of the impact tourism has on the places we travel, especially our thoughtless use of plastic bottles. This conversation stayed with me throughout my journey.

Travelling on your own may seem daunting but it provides such great freedom. You cross paths with people who shape your experience. I met Vanessa when we hiked Volcano Maderas together. We spent Christmas recovering in the traditional town of Granada as local people celebrated whilst keeping their front doors open to the street; the sounds of firecrackers and church bells rang throughout the day and night. We enjoyed travelling on local 'Chicken' buses; they are the cheapest method of transport and a window into local life with the opportunity to sample street food.

At New Year, after visiting the surfer's paradises of El Gigante and the very pretty Las Penitas, I spent the evening in the University city of Leon, watching the sky explode with fireworks at midnight. In the hill top town of Matagalpa I found a cheap room with a balcony overlooking the most

spectacular view of a mountain valley. I bought a map for \$1 from a children's disability charity and after a local breakfast of eggs, beans, plantains and tortilla I set off on my own for a seven hour trek into the wilderness. This exhilarating route took me off the beaten track to the highest peak and through mountain villages that produced coffee for the export market. Majestic birds and monkeys inhabited the forests and plantations.

Travelling from Nicaragua to El Salvador, I met a Salvadorian that has worked for 20 years in California as a postman. We discussed the revolution that had shaped the future of his country, forcing him to flee to the US. I arrived in La Tortuga Verde at sunset, a beach resort with yoga, pelican rescue and a turtle sanctuary, popular with locals who enjoy beach life. One bus journey took me in to the capital, San Salvador, one

of the most dangerous cities in Central America, infamous for the highest murder rate in the world. I passed through without a hitch and arrived in the village of Juayua on the Ruta de las Flores, which was experiencing a cool and windy afternoon. Two local guides helped me discover seven spectacular waterfalls, abseiling into the rainbow filled cascades. Santa Ana, a trading town close to the border, stole my heart with its rich markets, textiles and restored theatre. I discovered a hostel named La Casa Verde with spacious dorms, a pool, roof top terrace and beer fridge.

The Copan Temples in Honduras are home to macaws and discovered by very few tourists. The carved temples rise from the green jungle, home to the ancient Mayan civilisation that disappeared in 900AD. The most likely explanation was an increase in population that led to a crippling famine caused by deforestation, decimation of food production, disease and flooding. In the afternoon I hired a horse and guide to meet remaining decedents of the Mayans in their rural community.

I crossed into Guatemala by shuttle bus to get to Antigua, a 17th Century UNESCO world heritage site over looked by a ring of volcanoes and a large cross on the hillside. This tourist must-see provided streets filled with a lively night scene of restaurants and dark bars that by day transformed into yoga studios, vegetarian cafes, smart clothing stalls with local traders.


A two-day trek up Acatenango to witness the active volcano, Fuego, is not to be missed. The advice is to always take a recommended tour and very warm clothing; six people had died from hypothermia the week before when they had attempted the summit without a guide. The climb to base camp took five hours over loose ash, volcanic rocks, cloud forest and plunging cliff paths. Camping on a cliff above the clouds we watched Fuego smoke, the clearing vista across Antigua and Guatemala City lit up as darkness fell and the stars appeared. Each of us was captivated by the sight of red-hot lava spewing from the centre of the earth. Explosions thundered throughout the night and at 4am we climbed the final summit to an altitude of 4,000m. Beyond the shadows of the volcano we were standing on I could see Lake Atitlan glisten.

A boat taxi took us skipping across the bays to San Marcos on Lake Atitlan. A hippy like culture has exploded up the mountainside reminiscent of the Greenfields at Glastonbury Festival. I experienced the famous market in full swing in the town of Chichicastenango, a textile and craft delight for any keen shopper or admirer of artisans.

On my journey I met a group of ladies with protest signs, Trump had become president of the most powerful country in the world and the danger seemed too close to home. Americans from the north to the south were enjoying the freedom of travel and the joys of a global community and on that day women were uniting across the globe.

In El Paradon on the Pacific coast I met friends who had set up La Chuza Chola, a social enterprise providing education and enterprise training to local people as surf tourism increased. With an offer of a lift to the airport in time for my flight to Miami I savored the days before I left the beach. The contents of my bag gifted away and replaced with new memories, souvenirs, woven clothing and my spirit filled with a commitment to not eat meat, to continue to stand up for the beauty and diversity of humanity and the earth we live on.



I have always had a fascination with the orangutan. Maybe it was my childhood love (and still adult love, if I'm honest...) for Disney, with The Jungle Book staple weekend viewing, or being allowed to stay up later than usual on a Sunday to watch David Attenborough's 'Living Planet' series. Their shaggy orange hair and grimacing faces had me daydreaming from a young age about what it would it be like to 'hang out' with them (excuse the pun).

I was fortunate enough last year to turn that dream into a reality. My boyfriend's parents live in Singapore, and after a week of exploring the bustling neighbourhoods and walking in the shadows of skyscrapers, we booked a flight to Borneo to continue our Asian adventure.

Our first stop was Kota Kinabalu, named after Mount Kinabalu and the capital city of Sabah. Being relatively fit, as well as competitive, we decided that we would attempt to climb the mountain. Standing at just over 4,000m and rated as the 20th most prominent mountain in the world, we knew it wouldn't be easy.

The two-day climb saw us start at Timpohon Gate climbing up to our

overnight stay point, Laban Rata. With the help of our experienced mountain goatesque guide John-Wynn (or John Wayne as we called him), we navigated through some of the staggering 5-6,000 plant species found on the mountain, of Himalayan, Australasian and Indomalaya origin, from the lowland fig trees to the shrubs, mosses and ferns, to finally many of the world's richest collection of orchids at the higher slopes. The mountain is also home to some 100 species of mammals mostly living high in the trees, including one of the four great apes and my Durrell favourite, the orangutan (although sightings of these are uncommon, as we found out). Our snackstops provided an opportunity to feed the cheeky mountain squirrels, and to watch in amazement at the mountain Sherpas who would casually breeze past carrying the evening's dinner, planks of wood, and probably the kitchen sink on their backs.

After managing to conquer the mountain at sunrise, aided by ropes, our head torches and stubborn determination, we slowly headed back down to our Timpohon Gate start point to be taken back to Kota Kinabalu. The following day the sense of achievement was overwhelming...as was the pain in my shins!

Our next carefully planned post-mountain stop took us to Gaya Island resort, a short speedboat ride from Kota Kinabalu. Nestled amongst protected mangroves, sheltered coral reefs and curled around the sandy coast of Malohom Bay, Gaya Island commits itself to ecologically-sustainable practices to minimise its carbon footprint. It also forms part of the protected Tunku Abdul Rahman Marine Park. The resort offers guests a weekly programme of free and chargeable activities, with the highlight being the guided nature trail. Walking boots

a good rummage around for something that took their fancy. As well as the proboscis monkeys we were treated to sightings of white cranes, monitor lizards, and bearded pigs within the short time that we stayed on the beach

Our plan to get away from it all and rest our weary legs came to an end after five days at Gaya, and we were eager to get back into action. I was also mindful that I hadn't yet managed to see the one thing we'd come all this way to find...

back on we trekked through the mangroves observing the plant species surrounding us, as well as listening out for any sound in the trees for potential orangutan sightings (...as well as nervously scanning for any snakes). The conclusion of the trail was ending up on a secluded private beach on the other side of the resort. Here you could paddle board and snorkel using kit provided by the resort as well as dine on the beach with one of their pre-packed picnic hampers. The romantic feeling was short lived when a pack of proboscis monkeys (yes, the ones with the unfortunate shaped noses) descended from the trees to come and have

With the rainforest being home to 10 species of primate, and more than 60 species of birds, a trip to the Kinabatangan River (or 'Corridor of life' as it is known to locals) and Gomantong Cave was a must.

Upon arrival at the river jetty we carefully stepped into the narrow boat and donned our life jackets. We had chosen the perfect day for our tour – the water was calm, the air humid and the air so silent you could have heard a pin drop. We were told that a group who had gone out earlier in the day had managed to spot a female orangutan nest building, so our hopes were raised.

Proboscis monkeys jumped from tree to tree, but no orangutans came into sight.

The Gomantong Cave is described by the WWF as the 'best-managed edible birds' nest cave in the world'. It is found in the heartland of the Gomantong Rainforest Reserve, accessible via a boardwalk. We were fortunate enough to visit whilst the nest harvesting was taking place, and see the harvesters at work. Edible birds' nests are among the most expensive animal products consumed by humans, with an average nest retailing for around US\$2,500 per kg in Asia. The smell hit you as soon as you walked in, so we were happy to admire the delicate nests before retreating back into the fresh air.

Then it happened. On our way back to the bus we were alerted by our guide to something in the trees that was too large to be a bird or squirrel. A mad tourist scramble ensued. Silent, with my GoPro poised ready, a female orangutan appeared slowly through the trees. Heart racing, she sat directly above our heads watching us for a good five minutes or so (it felt like forever). Our guide reminded us how lucky we were to have this opportunity, with the numbers of orangutans in the wild rapidly diminishing due to deforestation, land conservation, wildlife trading and mining. Whilst I was elated to have finally seen my Durrell friend in the wild, it was a stark reminder of just how endangered they are, and the race against time for Borneo's biodiversity.

### All that glitters...









There's a great old saying that perfectly sums up local artist lan Rolls latest project "one man's trash, is another man's treasure". Ian was the artist chosen to adorn the walls of the new Household Reuse and Recycling Centre at La Collette which opened in January this year. This facility replaces the household recycling centre at Bellozanne and here lan tells us about the process involved in creating beauty from trash.

"The process started well over a year ago when the Department for Infrastructure launched a submission and selection procedure for ideas from local artists, architects and makers to clad the building at the centre with some sort of artwork or design. And my ideas were chosen as the preferred project, which was fantastic.

Once I knew that I'd secured the project I started to collect objects, mainly small plastic toys and coloured bottle-tops, by going into primary schools to talk about the installation I had planned and asking the children to donate unwanted items. I soon had a mountain of stuff with which to clad the letters I made to spell out the

message which runs the length of one side of the household reuse and recycling centre

On the other side of the building I used old tyres of different sizes to frame circular windows and strips of tyre rubber to wind around pillars supporting the porch roof.

Paint spattered recycled floorboards were used to form a cladding plinth around the whole building, expertly fitted by my working partner on this project Jonny Swift (he's the person in the photograph with me).

A great deal of recycled items were used in the whole project, the building itself takes its shape from the steel frame saved from the demolition of the Jersey Potteries building and was clad with timber salvaged from the site too. There are also thousands of coloured plastic bottle tops which have been fixed in vertical stripes, each one had to be nailed in place by hand.

The whole effect is to make the increasingly important business of waste disposal and recycling in the island a much more pleasant and fun experience. It was great to be involved by helping to change the public perception of "rubbish" through my art."

If you're a fan of multi instrumentalist British born Jazz giant Courtney Pine CBE then you'll be delighted to hear that he's performing his latest project, Black Notes From the Deep featuring special guest vocalist Omar at the Jersey Opera House on Wednesday 26 April at 8pm.

In the 80's he was one of the first black British jazz artists to make a serious mark on the jazz scene when his first album charted the top 40 and since then he's had numerous BBC Jazz Awards, MOBO's, a Mercury Music Prize nomination and remained at the forefront of UK jazz with a contemporary jazz style that integrates modern British sounds like drum n bass and UK garage alongside soul, hip-hop and deep rooted influences from across the Caribbean.

For his latest project, Black Notes From the Deep (Freestyle Records) he returns to the tenor saxophone for the first time in a decade and features the vocal talents of UK soul star Omar, whose 1992 hit single "There's Nothing Like This" established a truly unique and instantly recognisable "signature" sound that has since earned him widespread critical acclaim and seen him collaborate with the likes of Stevie Wonder, Erykah Badu, Carleen Anderson and Angie Stone.

This very special project brings together two of the UK's finest jazz and soul talents composing, recording and performing new original material together for the first time. We caught up with Courtney ahead of his appearance at Jersey Opera House to find out more about his latest project and the collaboration with Omar

### For those who aren't familiar with the different types of saxophone, four I believe, what makes the tenor so special?

The instrument fits into the middle of the saxophone family and sounds the most individual. It is capable of a wider palette of expression than the other instruments due to its

### And why have you chosen it for this concert?

range.

I have not performed on this instrument for a while now and having returned to it with fresh ideas I feel very excited about making music again.

### Do you play any other instruments?

Yes and I am looking at adding the bass flute to my arsenal. There are many

instruments out there that make you feel better when you play them so the list of instruments that I perform on is long.

### Do you still have to practice, if so how often?

Having to run a record company takes time and energy so my answer to that is simple yes I still practice and not enough.

### What can audiences expect from your collaboration with Omar?

We are artists with much in common. For a few decades now we have gone around the world representing who we are as members of the United Kingdom, crafting concerts that unite people for the common good so it

makes sense in this day and age that Omar and I pool our resources, philosophies and musical concepts to strengthen our message that together united human beings are stronger as opposed to those who try to label, divide, subjugate, victimise and exploit. ### The dangers of a normalising environment

So the radio comes on and the track is Blurred Lines by Robin Thicke, featuring T.I. and Pharrell. The beat is infectious and without thinking much about it my hands are tapping away at the steering wheel.

I think I may have begun singing the chorus, the words kind of lost in the beat. Then fast forward a few weeks and I am at Le Rocquier School supporting one of the trainers for Jersey Action Against Rape with their outreach programme. The session is going well; 41 boys fully engaged in thinking about rape, sexual assault and the media environment in which we live. No giggling and some serious, intelligent questions. Then the trainer starts playing Blurred Lines.


I wasn't fully concentrating on this because I'd been talking to one of the break-out groups. Within a few seconds my feet were tapping to the beat. That is until I look at the screen. The slide made the point that the lyrics were mirroring the kind of language that might be used by someone committing a sexual assault.

I know you want it But you're a good girl The way you grab me Must wanna get nasty

The assumptions bound up in these lyrics suddenly hit me in an entirely different way. It occurred to me that this is one part of the normalising environment in which we live. Are lyrics not playing out the whole debate around consent. How society can apparently make assumptions about someone else's sexual intention without actually asking them. It reduces that person to an object of another's unchecked desire.

We can stop this; reject an entertainment culture that normalises an environment of disempowerment. If we don't, and society normalises in this way, we are all in danger of becoming numb to the damage it can inflict.

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# APPETITE

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There's nothing like growing your own food to bring you back down to earth. You feel like a true survivor, living off the land and nurturing the dainty seeds you sowed into bountiful produce. However, the majority of people are more likely to pop down to the co-op to feed their veggie needs.

Last month's supermarket shop will have undoubtedly left you bewildered by the lack of greenery, with the good old British parsnips and potatoes standing their ground and being the only viable vegetable on the shelves. But not everyone would have been hit so hard by the poor Mediterranean weather, with many islanders having access to their own space to grow their own.

It seems what goes around comes around with food trends, and in recent years the good old fashioned 'grow it at home' mantra has taken flight. You no longer

have to live in the countryside or on a farm to grow your own produce, with urban allotment complexes and kitchen gardens taking the lead as the most efficient way for people to provide for themselves.

The Jersey Allotments and Leisure Gardening Association, chaired by Jeff Hathaway, was set up in 2009 as a direct result of a States of Jersey Working Party, who were looking into the setting up of an allotment scheme in Jersey. However, due to a lack of unanimous support concerning the limits of manpower resources, the JALGA was formed and set up as a Purpose

Trust under the sponsorship of local legal firm Le Gallais and Luce. The association's main aim is to facilitate the setting up of allotment sites, allowing islanders to have their own allotment and get the guidance they need when setting it up.

When it comes to why allotments and kitchen gardens are becoming so popular, Jeff believes it's because people are more aware of where their food comes from these days, as well as them having more leisure time. "Allotments fill the need for land to grow things in that most modern houses do not offer" he told me. "It's a healthy past time, providing exercise and being out in the fresh air as well as helping people save money and be healthier." Jeff also believes that the influence of television programmes such as the long standing Gardener's World, to the more recent influence of Jamie and Jimmy's Friday Night Feast are promoting eating good, honest and wholesome food.

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Currently, the JALGA administers three sites and almost 200 allotment plots. Waiting lists for allotments can be quite long depending on your parish, but this is put in place to avoid sites not being used or maintained regularly. The waiting lists just prove how popular and successful the JALGA has been for our island community.

The popularity of growing your own produce is being kept alive by introducing it to the next generation too. Caring Cooks of Jersey founder and chief executive, Melissa Nobrega, has started the Kitchen Garden Project in Jersey's primary schools.

Melissa believes that children are more likely to eat food they have grown themselves, and it's the best way to avoid falling into the trap of convenience food. "We see vegetables washed, sliced and put in a packet on the shelf, and never really know where or how they are grown" she said, "so the gardening element of the project allows the children to grow produce from seed or plant, and nurture it until it's ready." The project also uses the produce they grow to create tasty and appealing dishes that the children can make themselves, which Melissa hopes will give them a positive and healthier attitude towards food.

Like Jeff, Melissa believes the popularity for people growing their own produce comes from the desire to have a better understanding of where their food comes from and people being more health conscious. "Allotments have been popular for years, and are a great way to escape from your busy life and get children interacting with nature. The project is a great way to get kids who may not have their own garden at home involved with gardening and growing their own food."

The Caring Cooks have worked with the Jersey branch of the National Vegetable Society and its chairman, Graeme le Marquand, for a year to plan out, build and develop the first three kitchen gardens set up in Samares, Mont Nicolle and St Luke's Primary Schools. This year, the project plan to install another three gardens at Grand Vaux, La Moye and Janvrin primary schools, with the ambitious aim to have the

project 'From Plant to Plate' in all twenty-two primary schools around the island by 2025.

There is no doubt that growing your own food is the best way to get the best produce, as well as the easiest way to save money in the long run. Starting small with home grown herbs on your windowsill, or going all out and starting your own kitchen garden could be the first step to a healthier, happier kitchen. There's no time like the present to introduce your little ones to the wonders of getting your hands dirty and watching something they have nurtured grow into something they can enjoy.

#### Claire:

#### What triggered the switch to veganism?

Eating meat has never sat well with me, I recall being served pheasant at a young age only to discover some shot remaining in the bird and recoiling in horror that it had been killed just for my dinner. After watching the documentary "Cowspiracy" myself and my husband made the decision to go fully vegan as it opened our eyes to the fact that maintaining a meat supply for the world's growing population just isn't sustainable and how detrimental animal agriculture is to the environment. We wanted to play our part in making a change.

#### Was making the change challenging?

We had to research it well. Cowspiracy offered links to information and how to sign up to a supported 30 day trial which guided you through the changes to make, which was really helpful. It's been important to source all the right food and wherever possible we look to buy local.

#### How has the change made you feel?

Physically there has been little change; I may be slightly lighter and have a little more spring in my step and sleep better now, but the main benefit is that emotionally and morally we feel a lot happier being vegan. Adjusting my cups of coffee was the biggest challenge and I also found my taste has altered in that I don't crave as much sweet produce as I used to.

#### Do you feel veganism is a healthier diet to adopt?

Not necessarily! I've come across sites that tell you what food is "accidentally" vegan including Frazzles crisps, Oreos and chocolate Hobnobs so it's still possible to eat junk food and be vegan. Sugar is still on the menu as it's not an animal by-product.

#### Have there been any downsides of becoming vegan?

Social occasions are still a bit difficult if you are going somewhere that doesn't offer vegan alternatives; be prepared to bring a packed lunch. But it is encouraging that a lot of restaurants are starting to adapt their menus to accommodate vegans. You can find vegan dishes at Flavour, Unawatuna, Cafe Jac and Portelet Bay Cafe. We also decided not to make our two young children adopt a vegan diet since it would be difficult for them through school and they should be free to make their own informed decisions as they grow up, so there is double the shopping!

#### Kit:

#### Why do you think everyone is suddenly talking about Veganism?

It has gained a lot of popularity in sport from elite athletes achieving great results on a vegan diet; five times Iron Man winner Dave Scott and Venus Williams for example. Then there are a lot of celebrities endorsing veganism, some for environmental reasons like Leonardo Di Caprio, but many promoting it as a magical weight loss tool - which it isn't.

## Research tells me the benefits of a vegan diet can include increased energy, improved skin, reduce the risk of heart disease, diabetes, cancer....the list goes on. How can it really help?

There is no conclusive research to support that a vegan diet can produce all these results, more likely it is through adopting a vegan diet, which naturally lends itself to being lower fat and including less processed junk food and more healthy alternatives, that people are seeing these positive results. But this can be achieved with a more balanced diet with the need to cut out meat totally.

#### Would you ever recommend a vegan diet?

I would assist anyone looking to take this path for moral reasons, but it is hard work to achieve a balanced diet being a vegan. You can't just decide to have toast for breakfast everyday! Your diet needs to be varied and encompass all the vitamins that you may be missing out on through cutting out meat, fish and dairy, so supplements like vitamin B12 (which is only found in animal products) would be essential. The western palette can also become very bored with this type of diet, we tend to like high salt and high sugar items so it requires a lot of commitment.

#### What could you do to help the environment if veganism doesn't sit well with you?

Rather than cutting out whole food groups you could start to look at where your produce comes from as there are a lot more processes that go on behind the scenes than you would think. Where possible, buy locally as it will be fresher and nutritionally better for you. You could also look at cutting out just red meat from your diet; which by itself requires 28 times more land to farm than chicken and produces five times more climate warming emissions.


#### Words of advice for those looking to go vegan?

Apply caution. Veganism is not a fad diet and it requires a complete change of lifestyle and prior planning for your meals. If you're looking to make a switch don't do it on a whim with your mate, research thoroughly and get individual guidance from a registered nutritionist.

There are certainly a lot of myths surrounding veganism that need to be dispelled, but they key to making any form of adjustment is most definitely education. Learn about the effects of animal agriculture on the earth and investigate the effects an altered diet could have on your individual body type. Only then will have the tools to make the decision that is right for you.

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

Woodside Farms

Charles Gallichan is the fifth generation to hold the reigns at the family farm in Trinity, since his great-great-grandfather, also Charles, started out in 1887.

Today, Woodside Farms, while remaining a traditional Jersey farm, grows and exports Jersey Royals, vegetables, most recently ginger, and flowers. Woodside Farm daffodils travel a long way, right across the Atlantic ocean to the United States of America. In fact, this ever-popular traditional spring bloom, reaches Boston - via air out of Heathrow - in about the same amount of time it takes to get them on sale in Scotland.

The American market is Woodside Farms' second biggest customer after the large UK retail multiples. Their daffodils are also exported to France - where they are a big hit with consumers, especially for La Fête des Grands-Mères, which falls on the first Sunday of March, and it is customary to give daffodils to grandmothers. And from France they travel farther afield throughout Europe.

In spite of its international appeal, Woodside Farms stays true to its firmly-established roots in supplying the supplying wholesalers and outlets across the island. Jersey may only comprise 45 miles, but even within such a small area, growing conditions vary according to the soil type and seasons, so Woodside Farms has land all around the island to maximise its growing potential.


In the peak growing season, it employs up to 130 workers, with the size of the workforce dropping to 50 to 60 according to the natural growing cycle, indoors and outdoors.

built in wardrobes and a beautiful modern en-suite, with a large bath positioned directly under the large window to best take advantage of that view again, it's hard to escape it.

On the ground level and accessed either from the main house via a spiral staircase or from its own entrance, is a large separate two bedroom unit. There is also a shower room, open plan sitting room/diner/kitchen which could suit either a two generation family or staff but equally, could be brought into the main accommodation if required. It would make an incredible gym facility, a man den on another level or could lend itself to many other uses. Prior to this being a secondary unit, it was an indoor pool with shower and sauna room facilities (the sauna is actually still in situ but isn't currently used), the pool was drained and boarded over but could be reinstated by the future

owners, if required, although don't forget you have the sea right on your doorstep.

Outside the large wrap around patio encircles the property thereby providing all day sunshine and to the east and on the lower level is the garden. Historic planning permission was granted in January 2005 to build a two bedroom cottage on the garden area to the east of Meghdoot. This space could easily be utilised to build a summer house or similar if more space was needed. There is also a double garage and parking for four cars.

Meghdoot is an incredible property that will offer the new owners a huge amount of versatile space with views that are quite simply to die for. This house only came on the market a few weeks ago and viewing is highly recommended.



For those of us with a mortgage, the long reign of low interest rates has been great. However, for those with large cash deposits it has been heart-breaking to see how little return they have been receiving.



# SPORTSPERSON OF THE MONTH ELEANOR LISTER

Eleanor has recently featured in the Visit Jersey as an island ambassador campaign. In her story, The rockclimber girl, she talks about her love for rock climbing and why Jersey makes the perfect backdrop for this incredible sport.

Age: 25

What do you do: I'm a photographer, mostly by passion, but slowly by work. It's a fantastic creative outlet.

**School attended:** Grainville School When did you first start climbing:

I started climbing in 2013, in Melbourne, Australia - I fell in love with the sport immediately!

### What is it about climbing that you

love: Everything! It's social, challenging; each route is a puzzle to work out to reach the top, some routes more difficult than others, but invariably there's always a huge sense of achievement when you accomplish what you set out to do. And naturally, it's a great way to exercise and stay strong, while enjoying the beautiful Jersey outdoors. Equally, though, it's often very stressful and demanding, both mentally and physically; you learn a lot about yourself and how to approach situations under pressure, by default, you grow as a person.

How often do you climb: In the summer, usually about five times a week. We're very lucky here in Jersey to have such wonderful places to climb, usually no more than a 30 minute drive away.

**Is it something you can do all year round:** Unfortunately, rock climbing is fundamentally a weather permitting

sport, so we're very limited in the winter months. But we make up for it in the summertime! There are of course indoor climbing walls which we use to practice on during the winter months.

Where's your favourite place in Jersey to climb: Grosnez has some of the best climbing in the island - hundreds of routes to climb and such beautiful landscape. Sorel also has some wonderful routes!

And what about other places around the world: So far, I've only had the pleasure of climbing in Malibu, California, Fontainebleau, France and a bit in Melbourne, Australia. I'd love to explore other locations worldwide. America's big walls would be an incredible adventure!

You are one of the island ambassadors that form part of the Visit Jersey feature, how did that happen: I used to assist photographer Matt Porteous (who took the photos above) a few years ago, and tell him incessantly about that weekend's climbing endeavors. As a by-product, I was contacted last year and asked if I'd like to participate! The guys at the Observatory did an amazing job with that video, and with all of the other ambassador videos for Visit Jersey.

Favourite ice-cream flavour: Mint Choc Chip

Favourite animal: Cats. Lots of cats!
Favourite food: Probably avocados.
Avocado on sourdough bread. Mmmm!

What would you wear to a fancy dress party: I'm not sure I even know where to start on this one, so many options.

**Favourite climbing expression:** "You can't fall off if you don't let go!"

Favourite song: Hmmm. I'm not sure I have a favourite song, I'm often too fickle. But I'm definitely a huge admirer of the work of both Joni Mitchell and Joanna Newsom, Maybe if I had to choose, the song 'A Case of You' is a consistent favourite.

Is there an easy way for people to learn how to rock climb: Every route worldwide is graded in difficulty, so it's incredibly easy to get started on easier routes. The harder the routes get, the more tenacious and dedicated you need to be, but I'd definitely say getting started and having a go is easy!

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Picture the scene: you've got a coal or iron mine of biblical proportions somewhere in Siberia and you need to extract ore at an unholy rate to make it pay. It's a big gamble that requires big machinery, but the operation has to be incredibly efficient. Heavy work in tough conditions, day in, day out, year round.

If I'm honest, your first priority should be acquiring a Bagger 288 (officially the world's largest vehicle and so iconic that it even has its own meme on YouTube with nearly three million hits). But you're still going to need something to move all of that overburden and coal about once you've dug it up, and that's where the BelAZ 75710 comes in.

You see, it's hard to deny that coal is bad for the environment once you burn it and release plumes of carbon dioxide and particles of soot and all of the other by-products that I paid little attention to during chemistry classes in secondary school. It's the same story for the emissions from the gigantic diesel engines powering the machinery used to extract it from the earth so surely it's about time somebody at least made a token effort to do something about that? Well if it is, I think that Belorussian plant manufacturer BelAZ might've missed the point a little. But then they have managed to build the largest dumper truck on the planet so as a petrolhead I'm willing to ignore that it probably isn't Euro VI compliant.

In a nutshell, the BelAZ 75710 carries a payload 25% bigger than the next largest competitor which, presumably employing the power of all of Belarus' man-mathematicians' man-maths combined gives an efficiency improvement of 25% according to the manufacturer. I've a feeling it's slightly more complicated than that in reality, but you'll be forgiven for forgetting the details when you read what's coming next: it's electrically powered.

Driven by four electric motors, one for each wheel, this behemoth generates a combined 7,200 horsepower, weighs 360 tonnes unladen and can carry a staggering 450 metric tonnes of material in that shallow load bed bolted to it. The reason it's so shallow? Purely so that the operator isn't tempted to overload it. As if 450 tonnes at a time wasn't enough already.

So you're digging up a fossil fuel with the sole intention of burning it (or attempting to extract sufficient quantities of iron-ore with which to make another absurdly sized dumper truck - this is all about efficiency, remember) but using an electrically

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powered dumper truck to transport it so you're practically running a carbon neutral operation. Actually, don't stop buying those carbon credits to offset your emissions just yet because here's the kicker. The 360 tonne unladen weight isn't made up of about 200 tonnes of lithium-ion batteries (roughly equivalent to enough to power the sun, according to those Belorussian man-mathematicians), the electricity comes from two onboard generators. Oh, and those generators are powered by two V16 diesel engines, each displacing a whopping 65 litres and producing a combined 4,600 horsepower. Oh well, the thought was there, at least, and it'd probably take all night and then some to charge it with an extension lead running from the Portakabin where they take their teabreaks. Which is exactly where you'll be whiling away your time whilst you wait for the 5,600 litre diesel tank to be refilled.

Reading about of this got me thinking that if you need around seven thousand horsepower to carry 450 tonnes of ore but you need over four and a half thousand horsepower of diesel generators to create enough electrical energy to propel the fully laden truck to an admittedly impressive top speed of 40mph then why not just stick another 16 cylinder diesel motor in there and be done with it? You're producing something that transports coal, after all.

Could it be that nobody else is likely to bother, meaning you're pretty much guaranteed to hold onto the Guinness World Record for largest diesel-hybrid ultra class haul truck? Or could there be something more to all of this? Could it be that the electrical motors offer a more efficient transmission solution owing to having less moving parts than a conventional gearbox and transfer gearbox used in conventional all-wheel-drive vehicles? Apparently not, as the Siemens system that ties it all together is allegedly quite complex and has lead to concerns that BelAZ's approach isn't a particularly efficient one even if it's able to limp back to your oversized workshop on three motors if one experiences a failure.

The upshot, I suppose, apart from the willy-waving side of things at least, is that electric motors supply instant, smooth and linear torque which has surely got to be a distinct advantage operating in the unforgiving and unrelenting environments that these impressive machines are expected to work in. But does it have a kettle in the cab? That'd surely be the height of operating efficiency.

### **LIEBHERR T-282B**

Another diesel-hybrid creation, this one comes with a choice of 3,650 horsepower 90 litre V20 and 3,500 horsepower 78 litre V18 engines. Final assembly is taken care of on the purchaser's premises so it must be a nightmare flogging one second hand.



### **CATERPILLAR 797F**

American industrial giant Caterpillar's largest offering, the 797F superceded the 797B and can carry an extra 18.1 tonnes. Hopefully Caterpillar staff are better at building trucks than learning the alphabet.



### TEREX/BUCYRUS MT 6300AC

Terex can't take all of the glory for this one as they acquired production of the MT 6300AC when they purchased Bucyrus. You may be surprised to read that this sporty notso-little number is rear wheel drive.



### **KOMATSU 930E-3SE**

Behold! What you see here is the world's best-selling ultra class haul truck with sales reaching over 1000 units. Surprisingly, despite being considered their flagship model it's neither their largest or heaviest hauling creation.



### HITACHI EH5000ACII

The baby of the bunch, carrying just 296 tonnes of whatever you've got 296 tonnes of that you need moving somewhere, this clever machine streams operating data through the internet constantly to help the operator assess and improve its operating productivity remotely.



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

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
