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



#### Walking, talking living dolls



YOU'LL TELL THEM THAT SAID ISLAND IS CALLED JERSEY, AND THEY'LL IMMEDIATELY THINK YOU'RE FROM NEW JERSEY IN AMERICA, MARVELLING AT HOW NON AMERICAN SOUNDING YOUR ENGLISH ACCENT IS. AND OF COURSE, EVERYONE ASSUMES WE ALL SLEEP ON BEDS OF MONEY BECAUSE LIVING IN A TAX HAVEN MAKES US FILTHY RICH. I couldn't believe how much I missed living at home when I started university two years ago, and was in disbelief at how many people I met hated the place they came from. I became instantly defensive of Jersey whenever

someone mocked me when I told them where I was from. The inane questions I was asked eventually became white noise, as I chose to ignore anyone ignorant enough to ask me if my traveling to university was the first time I'd flown on an airplane, or if I was confused by English currency.

The painful truth is I couldn't wait to get back home. Even now after two years living away from it sporadically, the excitement that builds up in the run up to my flight home for the holidays is priceless. The first glimpse of St Ouen's bay as the plane hovers above it instantly calms me. Coming home is like relaxing back into myself again. I have routine, I know where everything is, everyone I love and miss is surrounding me again, and I get to sleep in bed knowing that apart from my studies, I am care free.

#### Everyone's relationship with

Jersey has its ups and downs. The ups mainly occur in the summer, when beaches are swarming with people and the 'Splash is the one place everyone wants to be with a cold drink. It's the time where a quiet evening of watching the surf slowly but surely turns into a beautifully unplanned night out with friends. The lows, however, commonly occur when it's dreary and grey in the winter months, and you feel like a goldfish trapped in a murky tank. Nowhere to go, nothing new to see, and everyone stays in because they're unofficially hibernating to reserve energy and funds for the summer antics they have planned. But even then, I still love it here. People used to tell me that Jersey homesickness was far more severe and borderline intolerable than standard homesickness for anyone who moved away from the island. I was told that I'd be craving the smell of Jersey's clean, sea air; that no milk would ever compare to that of our classic herd, and that no sunset no matter how spectacular would make you feel as content as the ones we can all see from our bedroom windows. I can now vouch that every above statement is in fact true, and that it's not just the distance that causes the homesickness, but the genuine need to be in this calm and care free environment that leads me to ticking off the days on the calendar until I get to return.

Not only does the general feel of the island feel calm and relaxed, but the people too. Go off on a cliff path on a Sunday and you will no doubt be greeted by a friendly hello and a smile from anyone who crosses your path. Drink prices may seem mind numbingly

> extortionate to my student pocket, but you'll never find it to be quiet here. Socialising is such a massive part of daily life in Jersey, with day drinking never frowned upon but rather encouraged, with the morning after breakfast being the meal of choice for everyone to gather and catch up. Everyone you come across is laid back, happy, and up for a good time.

Another major factor that I never thought of until a friend mentioned it, was how clearly we can see the skies above us here. Clear blue skies dotted with toy story style clouds take up our days, and every night the lack of light pollution lets us see the night sky's stars in all their glory. You've never felt like more of a cliché teenager until you've gone to the five-mile road on a summer night and lay down to look up at the stars and wonder what's coming next for you.

My point is, after all this rambling, is that you never know how good you have it until you walk away from it. Growing up in such a safe, welcoming environment that allowed me to explore more than a local Weatherspoon's or shopping centre is something I am only now extremely grateful for. No matter where in the world I end up in, I'll always have a soft spot for Jersey. And I don't think I'll ever find anywhere that compares to our little rock.





#### New website to help disabled get their message across

With the launch of a practical website, more people are set to benefit from an initiative aimed at helping people with a condition or disability explain their communication needs subtly and succinctly when going about their everyday lives.

The Connect project is a collaboration between the States of Jersey, disability groups and local businesses and organisations.

The free Connect card is the size of a credit card and includes the cardholder's name, an emergency telephone number and the name of the cardholder's disability or condition, if they choose to include it. Importantly, it also sets out, in bullet points, advice on how the service provider – perhaps a sales assistant, taxi driver or bartender – can help the card holder.

Advocate Caroline Dutot, chair of the Connect card working group, said: "We successfully launched Connect in October 2016 but we always knew that a website would be crucial, not only to spread the word but also to provide an easy way for people to get a card."

The new website, www.connectcard. je, gives important information about the card, answers frequently asked questions and allows potential cardholders to print out their own Connect card with their details.

### THESE BOOTS WERE MADE FOR **WALKING...**

A group of 15 friends at midnight on a Saturday of 1991 decided to walk around Jersey. How did this idea come about?



I moved to Jersey from England in 1976. In England, I lived near the Peak District and Lake District, and walking was one of my main hobbies.

Jersey is a beautiful island with a stunning coastline, but all of the walks are fairly straight forward and in the easy to moderate category. Having walked all of the coastal sections at different times, the idea of trying to do all 48 miles in one day began to develop in my mind and I started planning this personal challenge.

In 1990, my friends and colleagues at work began to get a little tired of me constantly harping on about doing this challenge and my bluff was called to organise it for the next year. So, on the nearest Saturday to mid-summer's day in June of 1991, the very first 'Around the Island Walk' commenced at midnight from the Rozel Pub in the North East corner of the island with 15 people taking part.

The route for the first walk circumnavigated the island in a clockwise direction. Of the 15 starters, seven of us managed to finish the full 48 miles. My personal time was 15 hours.

During the organisation process, somebody suggested that if we were going to do this, then we should also try to raise some money for a charity and this was agreed. So in 1991 the Jersey Cancer Relief charity benefitted from the £1,500 raised by the walkers.

That was it, or so I thought. I had completed my personal challenge successfully.

As we now know, it wasn't the end of the story at all. How did it go from an outing amongst friends to the island's biggest charity event?

After the first event, the local newspaper ran an article and pictures of the day. Then, the phone started ringing and people wanted to know if we were going to do this again.

#### Ever had the feeling that something is following you around?!

In all seriousness, I am truly very pleased that State Street has secured the main sponsor status. It allows our employees a great opportunity to take part as a walker or volunteer and shows State Street's commitment to the local community.

The company that I worked for then, Itex, agreed to cover the direct costs of putting the event on again if we were willing to organise it and so planning for year two got underway.

Shortly after our partnership with the Rotary de la Manche was created, we formed a trust to administer the walk and I was privileged enough to be Chairman until the end of 2015.

This year will be the 26th year of the walk and in that time over 20,000 people have participated, raising over £2.1 million to help local charities in need. I am still amazed and very proud that my little challenge to myself has achieved so much.

Being yourself an employee of State Street, how do you feel about State Street being the new sponsor? It is also important not to lose sight of the fact that we are all out there to raise as much money as possible for deserving causes.

The target is to raise a six figure sum so let's make this year a memorable one. Don't forget that every penny raised goes straight to charities and not to the overhead costs which this year, are covered by State Street

And last but not least; it is fair to say that you are an expert of the Island Walk. Do you have any advice for the 2017 walkers?

Train, Train, Train!

The need for foster care in Jersey is perhaps something not many of us have considered before, but the trained carers in the island are a vital part of our community. Fostering is a way of providing a stable family life for children and young people who are unable to live with their parents for a period of time.

A foster care placement can last for days, months or even years. Many children return home to their families but others may receive long-term support through continued fostering, adoption, residential care or by being helped to live independently. Rather than try and explain how foster care works we spoke to Rena Nelson and her husband Kevan, both in their early thirties, to find out about their experience as foster carers here in Jersey.

"We felt fortunate to have bought our first home, which has three bedrooms. We already had a lodger (a friend of ours who we had brought with us from our previous home). Once we were settled in our house and my nieces and nephews were coming along Kev, my husband, and I had the discussion about our long term plans. We agreed that right now we felt that there were plenty of kids in the world without families and people to care for them. We also agreed that we felt (pretty) capable of looking after a child and could give it out best shot.

Some of the friends that I grew up with were foster children and I felt that they turned out brilliantly. Having been inspired by Mary Child-Villiers and the Taylor-Cox family here in Jersey we agreed that we would give it a go. We completed the tools to foster course together and learnt a lot about ourselves and our relationship together. If nothing more, it was a free sixweek course, one evening a week, where we were able to learn how to be good parents (I wish everyone got to do a course like this before they become parents). After this, we agreed that we would be short term and respite foster carers. This started in September 2015.

Since then we've had two boys in our care so far. One boy (age nine) for 3.5 months who was swiftly followed by a boy aged 11 (now 12) as he has been with us for over a year. We took him on his first holiday at Christmas and he absolutely loved it, his first time on a plane at 11 years old. I would love to say that fostering is easy, but no doubt it is very much like parenting (you take the rough with the smooth, you try to remind yourself of the good times when they are being a terror). It is one of the biggest challenges that we have taken on, but we are both so happy to have been able to provide a safe and nurturing home to two children so far and discuss fostering with so many people and spread the word about the desperate need for more foster carers in Jersey.

The only requirement to begin the journey is a desire to care for and nurture a child. The rest is purely detail. You can be a single woman/man. You can have a flat. You can have ten dogs and 50 rabbits and still be a foster carer. As long as you have a desire to support the child that so desperately wants that care, then you are who they need."

Fostering and Adoption Jersey is trying to recruit ten new foster families this year, to support the needs of local children coming into care. If you'd like to find out more about the role of fostering they're holding two sessions where you can go along and speak to a social worker or experience foster carer to find out about the role of fostering. 





Home is not just where the heart is, worldrenowned beaches and divine culinary offerings are also quite literally, on your doorstep.

700,00 tourists chose Jersey last year to experience the 'Best Beach Holiday for 2017' accredited by AOL alongside exotic destinations such as Mexico, Dubai and the Philippines. Proof that what we lack in size, we most certainly make up for in beauty, charisma and personality. But there's no denying that even the most die hard patriotic local can take this beautiful 9X5 mile rock for granted. How wildly do we truly explore our Island beyond those postcard beaches we bring up on Google when trying to amount the magnificence of our homeland to friends across the pond? So, in celebration of the staycation, try out one of our local tourist guides and take a trip to those places you haven't visited since your year 5 school trip or maybe to a nook you might have to admit never visiting before. For this holiday there's no need to fear being dragged off your flight by the ankles, struggle through your broken foreign tongue and haggle your way home; you can get the holiday tat, tan and crawl back into your own bed at the end of the day with a proper mug of tea. Don't forget to pick up your free 'What's On' official guide for Jersey Tourism to save the embarrassment of having to ask for directions.

### **Eastern Delights**

On this coastline, the extraordinary sites and ancient remnants mark our unique history and heritage in Jersey from prehistoric civilisations to World Wars and mysterious nature.

When it comes to breakfast, the two words 'Hungry Man' on a lazy morning make those with an appetite weak at the knees. If you haven't visited this wonderful establishment dating back to 1947 before (have you been trapped under a rock in Sark?) then go straight in with the double decker health wrecker and the hot chocolate mountain to get the true meaning of the name. The mix of English reserve and French flair is rich in the beautiful little harbour of Rozel Bay, where you can grab yourself a bench on the harbour wall to feast or sit on the sea wall for views of France on a clear day.

Although it's easy to get lost in this little historic bubble and watch the afternoon bob past, there's heritage thicker than your milkshake to be found just a few miles inland. Unknown to many, Jersey proudly owns the 10th oldest building IN THE WORLD, built long before the Egyptian pyramids and aligned with the equinox. The 18.6 metre long passage chamber of La Hougue Bie dates back to 4800 BC! At this fantastic Jersey Heritage site you can go inside Europe's finest example of a Neolithic Passage Grave, watch the Coin Crew working on the Celtic Coin Hoard in our Treasure exhibition, climb the hill to see the Medieval Chapel and visit the archaeology Museum telling the story of Islanders from ¼ million years ago up to the end of the Roman period. Top Tip: The Jersey Heritage Festival this year is celebrating Jerseys Heroes, delving deep into the local Myths and finding out all about our awesome Legends there are free events from talks and a 6 day live music festival to museum tours and special guest speakers at the local library and plenty activities for kids. See their website for all details!

What would a trip to the east be without a visit to mighty Mont Orgueil, the fortress that has protected our shores from French Invasion since 1204! It's easily accessible if you turn right out of La Hougue Bie and follow the B28 towards Gorey, the road will bring you right to the heart of Gorey pier shadowed by the castle. In true

spring picnic style,visit The Works, an extraordinary emporium of hand made delicacies tucked away in the heart of Gorey Harbour. Laden with local sausage rolls, traditional macaroons, homemade pies, pates and cakes alongside an exceptional array of farmhouse cheeses and meats, it's the pedigree of picnic pick-ups in the East. For private dining, seek out the secret beach which basks in the shadows of the castle, colloquially called monkey beach or old man's beach because of the shape of the rock on the right hand side of the pebbly shore.

Finish the day with an extraordinary bioluminescence walk, a spectacle unique to Jersey owing to its huge tidal system and rocky tidal sea bed. As night descends and the ocean recedes, star-like shapes of luminous green begin to twinkle and sparkle in a few special spots at low tide. Experience the uniqueness of bioluminescent creatures and other marine life on this "moonwalk" across the seabed with Jersey Walk Adventures. In just a few hours the ocean will return to cover your footprints by up to 40ft. Expect to get your feet wet!

### Venus, Waterfalls and the Devil

Take a wild walk in the West, plunge in Venus' pools and visit the place where the Devil stands!

Start the day at Plemont Bay, the one with the waterfall, caves and yes, lots of stairs! It seems that in jersey if it's worth visiting, you have to work for it. You'll be pleased to be greeted by Plemont Bay Cafe once you've made it down the stairs or hill from the top car park. This fabulous look out spot serves up smoothies, proper fish and chips and a good wedge of cake to go with their coffees. If there's a place to have Jersey cream tea, like a proper British holiday should feature, you've found the perfect spot. Make sure you visit at low tide to seek out the hidden caves and see the waterfall in the cave under the stairwell. There are so many nooks and crannies to be found on this beach but you're going to want to keep your energy for the cliff path walk on the headland above.

Jersey is a walkers haven littered with well kept coastal paths weaving their way across interchanging headlands of gorse bush, streams, open fields and rocky cliff tops. From Plemont, you can follow the headland 2km all the way around to Greve De Lecq bay passing old German bunkers from WW2, fortifications and sweeping views, undisturbed except by passing gulls. With views across to our neighbours in Guernsey and Sark, as well as views of northern France it can also be a photographers dream. There are also over 1800 Geocaches

There's plenty of choice here to refuel once you've made it down to Greve De Lecq beach. Colleens Cafe perched on the promenade is a locals favorite hosting Devil's Hole is a natural crater in the solid cliff measuring about 100ft across and plunging 200ft down. It has been caused by the sea gradually eroding the roof of what was once a cave, until it collapsed and formed a crater. your favourites for a proper seaside cafe from local seafood to homemade cake. For those looking for a pub meal away from your local with a side order of history, visit the Moulin De Lecq a short stroll from the beach which features the oldest water wheel in Jersey. Once you've got the energy (and the guts!) Greve De Lecq is a fantastic spot for a bit of coasteering and cliff jumping. Pure Adventure offers an experienced, fun and safe guiding service and can even show you the Venus Pools,natural swimming ponds inside huge rocky ravines completely hidden from site from the beach or headland. Worth the plunge! The name 'Devil's Hole' is a dramatic one but sums up this bizarre spot on the North West coastline. The shipwreck of a French boat in 1851 left a figurehead inside this rocky hole and a local sculptor transformed the torso into a wooden devil, complete with horns. Today this devil's metal replica stands in a pool on the way down to the crater, lending a peculiarly supernatural atmosphere to the winding path down to the Devil's Hole itself. Its thought that this is the only statue of the devil in the whole of the UK.

### Culture News



Following fast on the heels of the hugely successful 'Paper Dialogues - the Dragon and our Stories' exhibition at St. Helier Town Hall, the Jersey Arts Trust is keeping the dialogue of 'paper cutting' alive through the Skipton Art Series with their island-wide

initiative 'Paper Talks'.

Last November an exhibition of incredible paper-cut art by Professor Xiaoguang Qiao from China and Norwegian artist Karen Bit Vejle, was toured to the Island by the Arts Trust. The work comprised a 9-meter long paper-cut dragon and seven dragon eggs – a collaboration that told the story of the Artists' quest in search of dragons. The exhibition ran for two weeks, during which time over 5,000 visitors including 600 students came to see the work.

As a legacy to the 'Paper Dialogues' exhibition, the work created by students and the community will contribute to the dialogue in the

form of our very own paper-cut dragon. The Jersey 'Paper Dragon', a 3D sculptural installation, will be flying its way through the Jersey Library between May 15 – June 30 as part of a celebratory showcase entitled 'Paper Talks' across different venues in 2017.

The showcase will also include an exhibition of works created by each of the local artists involved at the Jersey Arts Centre's Berni Gallery between May 8 – June 2, and will tell the story of the process and relations that have formed as well as what has been discovered through the work. Both exhibitions will be free to attend and open to the public to visit during the Library and Arts Centre's regular hours.

'Paper Talks' is part of the Skipton Arts Series 2017, which has been made possible by support from Skipton International, the One Foundation, JEDFAS, and the Association of Jersey Charities.



### **Outlook Uncertain - Graham Tovey**

Well known local artist, Graham Tovey is known for his textured, atmospheric landscapes of Jersey, France and the South of England.

'Outlook Uncertain' is usually used as a meteorological term, but on reflection, I now find it applies to a lot of things in this 'uncertain' world. My work for this exhibition centres on the L'Etacq area of St Ouen's Bay, although the small oils show wider aspects of the island. explains Graham. I call it a 'best of" show - work from the past two years, mainly oil paintings, as well as recent acrylics."

Graham's work is abstract by nature but is always based on the reality of landscape he often returns to the same location over a period of time.

The exhibition continues until 10 May at CCA Galleries International, 10 Hill Street.

### Giant Toad spotted in Waterworks Valley...

Visitors to Waterworks Valley are likely to come face to face with an amphibian of giant proportions this spring as the National Trust for Jersey team up with renowned willow sculpture artist Michelle Caine and local naturalist and pond specialist, Alcindo Pinto to create a very special homage to Jersey's very own Crapaud.



The project plans to install a sculpture trail along the woodland path in Waterworks Valley which depicts the various life stages of our local Crapaud from spawn to adult toad, with the trail leading to a large and exciting interpretation of our humble amphibian hero. The trail will incorporate sustainable, locally grown willow, harvested from Samares Manor.

Recent research has revealed that toads found in Jersey are a distinct and new species, different from toads found in England. The research revealed that Jersey has Bufo spinosus and not Bufo bufo as first thought. The species have physical and behavioural differences.

This discovery means that Jersey's Bufo spinosus population can be considered as a new addition to the list of British native amphibians making Jersey the only place in Britain where they can be found.

Despite this new discovery and the fact toads are already such an iconic species for Jersey folk, toad numbers are thought to be threatened. To monitor their conservation status the 'Toad Watch' initiative was created and after 10 years of receiving data from the public, results show just how important small garden ponds are for our toad populations and how we can encourage connectivity across the island.

Sarah grows plants, vegetables and herbs on an organic smallholding in St Peter. These are sold on a roadside stall and through a vegetable delivery service called Vegiebag. She will also be taking part in the Genuine Jersey markets in St Aubin this year to sell her wares.

Most of her days start early feeding her hens, watering plants and crops and drawing up a plan for the day ahead. Seeds are sown, seedlings potted up and then later planted out in the field or polytunnels. Her roadside stall is checked and restocked and any crops that are ready are harvested.

Sarah enjoys talking to customers at the stall and at markets and finding out how they have enjoyed growing the plants they have bought from her and eating her produce.

The smallholding is managed organically to ensure that the land is managed sustainably and works alongside the local wildlife. Amongst many other species of birds and insects, this mini farm is home to woodpeckers, red squirrels and hedgehogs.

Sarah has planted many fruit trees and plans for the future include providing organically grown top fruit such as apples and pears.



### Therapy: a **big** step

I received an email from a new client, a woman I will call Sarah. The subject line simply read Help needed. The message was not much more enlightening and I read it thinking it felt as though she was holding much back.

I like to confirm details by email but for real contact I always suggest telephone and then an initial session. An opportunity for us both to get to know one another. Psychotherapy might be right for you but the therapists might not. Best to meet and for me to be confident that I can offer real and meaningful support.

I emailed back and suggested that we meet for a first session. Her reply was different to what I might have expected. She talked about how anxiety was ruining her life, dominating her relationships and her contact with the world. She wrote with a rare clarity of self-awareness but underlying all of this detail was a plea for help; an end to the torment of being always alert, always anxious.

"I wasn't irritated but curious. Sarah and I were never to meet. We agreed two more sessions but they never happened. We ended the contact with her letting me know 'life was too busy' and she would contact me again in the future. She didn't."

We agreed a day and time to meet. I sat in my therapy room waiting and re-reading her email. Just before our agreed time my mobile chimed. Sarah had been held up and, apologising profusely, told me she would not be coming. It happens, not often, but occasionally. Over the next two weeks we rearranged sessions and Sarah gave new reasons for her being unable to turn up.

I wasn't irritated but curious. Sarah and I were never to meet. We agreed two more sessions but they never happened. We ended the contact with her letting me know 'life was too busy' and she would contact me again in the future. She didn't.

I was left reminded that therapy can be a big step. Support for mental wellbeing are such easy words to write and hard work to reach out and accept.

### Shakespeare famously mused that "If music be the food of love, play on" but I think the Bard may have been a bit off track. You see, I firmly believe that the real food of love is, in fact, food.

But don't just take my word for it. A recent survey conducted by Brides Magazine asked 1,000 adults how they thought cooking influenced relationships. 87 per cent regarded cooking as one of the top activities to strengthen a relationship while 98 per cent thought that communication is an essential component of a happy relationship, and what's more, they believe that cooking together is a great way to foster that communication.

I'm helpfully going to break down the perfect dishes to prepare for your significant other, for the different stages of a relationship. Now, I am by no means a relationship expert but what I do know, is good food!



Why the third date? Well good luck to anyone who is brave enough to do this before then! By this stage, you have gotten to know your partner a little better, you've moved on from the initial date locations, such as the walk-through St Catherine's Woods, to arrive at this more personal and wanting-to-impress stage.

And as the 'winner winner, chicken dinner' phrase goes, you can't go wrong with an easy to prepare and cook chicken dish: Caprese Stuffed Chicken.

#### Ingredients

Four chicken breasts 140g sundried tomatoes 1½ tbsp. Italian seasoning Freshly ground black pepper 280g baby spinach Four slices of mozzarella Salt

#### Method

Preheat the oven to 200°C. Cut a pocket into each chicken breast and stuff with spinach, sundried tomatoes, and mozzarella. Season with Italian seasoning, salt, and pepper. Secure with toothpicks.

In a large oven-safe pan, sear the chicken until golden, then transfer to the oven and cook until no longer pink for 15 minutes.

Remove the toothpicks and serve with pan juices, Jersey Royal potatoes and green beans.

For extra brownie points, serve with a bottle of 'Macon Fuisse 2014', a delightful light Chardonnay from Southern Burgundy (available from Gorey Wine Cellar, priced at £12.60).



Nothing shows someone you care more than freshly made breakfast in bed. Not just for little ones to help prepare on Mother's Day or Father's Day, but perfect for birthdays or even on a plain old Sunday.

My go-to breakfast? Pancakes. A classic not just for Pancake Day, and so simple.

#### Ingredients 60g plain flour

Pinch of salt 175ml of milk

#### Method

Oil, for frying

One egg

Tip the flour into a bowl and stir in the salt. Lightly beat together the egg and milk. Pour over the flour mixture, a little at a time, whisking it well, to give a smooth pancake batter.

Heat a frying pan and very lightly grease the base of it. Pour a thin layer of batter over the base of the pan. Cook it until the edges start to curl back. Either toss the pancake, or use a palette knife around the edges.

Cook the pancake briefly on this side, then slide it out onto a plate. Keep the pancakes warm if serving hot and get the tray prepped with lots of topping.

Accompany with a freshly brewed cafetiere of coffee or pot of tea and some freshly squeezed orange juice. If you're celebrating a special occasion, pop the cork on a bottle of champagne and combine with the OJ for a naughty start to the day.

#### The unexpected anniversary

It's been so long, that you've forgotten how long. It's not too late, however, to put together a simple yet thoughtful dinner to celebrate another happy year of coupledom and prevent a potential stay in the doghouse.

Jamie Oliver describes his seared scallops and creamy mash dish as the "perfect surf and turf marriage", combining juicy pan-seared scallops and salty, crisp bacon.

#### Ingredients

400g Maris Piper potatoes 60g piece of thick smoked bacon Two knobs of unsalted butter Olive oil ½ a lemon Sea salt and black pepper Six scallops, shelled/trimmed 75ml semi-skimmed milk A few sprigs of fresh sage

#### Method

Quarter the potatoes then place in a large pan and cover with cold salted water. Place over a high heat and bring to the boil, then cook for 15 to 20 minutes, or until tender.

Roughly chop the bacon into lardons. Score the scallops in a crisscross fashion about one cm deep on one side, season with a pinch of salt, then set aside.

#### The Doghouse dinner

Despite the countless unsubtle reminders and hints from your loved one, you've managed to forget the minimum card requirement for Valentine's Day, or maybe you scratched the car, but whatever it is, they're mad. Maybe it's worse than that, they're not mad ... just 'disappointed'.

Now you need to pull out all the stops and come up with something to make it right. Coming home with a bunch of flowers from the garage forecourt or an on-offer bottle of cheap plonk isn't going to cut it. So, you're going to make fresh pasta. It's not going to be easy, but it will be worth it.

#### Ingredients

450g strong plain flour Four eggs, beaten Pinch of salt 1 tbsp. olive oil

#### Method

Sift the flour onto a clean work surface or into a large mixing bowl. Make a well in the centre and add the salt, eggs and oil.

Using your hands, gradually mix the flour into the eggs and oil, until the mixture begins to form a firm dough.

Knead the dough for about ten minutes or until it is smooth and elastic. Add a little extra flour if the dough becomes sticky.

Wrap the dough tightly in a polythene bag or with cling film and set it aside to rest for 30 minutes before rolling and cutting. Do not place in the fridge.

Cut the dough into quarters, as smaller portions are easier to manage. Roll out the dough v thinly on an unfloured surface, turning it over occasionally to prevent it from sticking, then cut it into the chosen shapes such as lasagne or tagliatelle.

The pasta may be cooked immediately or allowed to dry for up to 30 minutes before cooking. It is a good idea to leave pasta to dry if it is slightly sticky.

Serve with your partner's favourite sauce and choice of additional extras, such as prawns or chicken strips, and sprinkle some freshly shaved parmesan on top. For those like me who enjoy a glass or two of red wine, Love Wine sell a lovely bottle of 'Pinot Noir Soli Bulgaria' for £9.95, which is perfect with pasta.

Now, who's hungry for love?

Drain the potatoes, then return to the empty pan with the milk, a knob of butter and a pinch of salt and pepper. Mash until smooth.

Heat a splash of olive oil in a large non-stick frying pan over a medium heat, then add the bacon and fry until golden. Move the bacon to one side of the pan, then put the sage leaves into the space.

Cook until crisp, then move to the side of the pan along with the bacon. Add the remaining butter and the scallops, cut-side down, to the empty space. Cook for around two minutes, or until golden, turning halfway.

Remove from the heat, add a squeeze of lemon juice and toss to coat, allowing the scallops to cook in the hot pan for a further 30 seconds. Divide the creamy mash between plates, then spoon over the scallops, bacon, sage and any juices from the pan.

Pour a couple of glasses of Gorey Wine Cellar's £11.30 bottle of 'Albariño – Igrexario De Saiar 2014', a dry white from North West Spain, and dig in.

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# Scope to develop

This large detached three bedroom house is set on the edge of an exclusive gated private close which was developed in the 1980s. 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# Case Closed. Bennie Burger

Being a lawyer is, by no means, an easy career. It's demanding and stressful, which is why I try to forget that I'm a Lawyer for the couple of hours when I travel. There is something to be said about travel crystallising your perceptions, honing suspiciously naïve sentiments into firm sets of beliefs and keeping life in perspective; and if you concentrate enough, it can help mould you into the person and the lawyer you strive to be and working for Hatstone Lawyers has certainly granted this privilege."

#### What's in his case?

#### **Patience is important**

Pack your patience. Don't worry about the stuff you can't control by remembering that worrying is about as effective as trying to solve an algebra equation by chewing bubble gum.

#### A good suit

Every Lawyer needs a good suit in his or her life. A good suit can act like body armour and make you feel like you can take on the world. Ultimately, the price tag is no real guide to quality, you can pay a fortune for a poorly made suit. The devil is in the detail, make sure it fits, then wear it well and, learn how to fold and pack it properly. It's a skill, like dancing, not everyone's a natural.

#### iPhone & laptop

Almost every piece of technology I own is paired with my iPhone: my laptop, my watch, even the bathroom scale. It tells me where I have to bewhen I have to be there and even gives me turnby-turn directions and an ETA. A backup power supply and data roaming to "off" are essential, or better yet get a sim-card for countries that you visit a lot. Don't carry your laptop in a fancy sleeve, airport security will only make you take it off. The most important use of my iPhone and laptop is a five-to-10-minute Skype call every morning to keep everyone on the same page.

#### "Liquids bag"

You know the drillwhen passing through airport security screening: Each liquid you carry must be in its own container of no more than 100ml. Allliquidsshould be carried in a single, transparent, re-sealable plastic bag of up to 20cm x 20cm (8in x 8in) with a total capacity of up to a litre. Be security friendly and take as little liquids as you possibly can. Toothpaste, deodorant and shampoo are available everywhere, no need to pack the family size extra 200ml antiperspirant you got for Christmas, airport security will only confiscate it.

#### Notebook and a proper pen

Spending time trying to remember things will not help you to stay organised. Just write it down, you'll look vintage and cool, especially if you have a good-looking pen, plus it's a skill fast disappearing. My notebook doubles as a travel journal and to record not only notes but also the context of meetings and my impression of situations.

#### Stash extra cash

Cash is king around the world. Make sure to stash some in a few different places. I recommend at least a hundred pounds worth and perhaps a hundred dollars, depending on your destination. If you lose your wallet, your card stops working or the ATM does not work, you'll be glad you did.

#### Headphones (with noise cancelling)

This should actually be #1 on my list. I love my headphones! Muffle the sounds of the aeroplane, crying babies, drunk passengers, barking dogs, honking horns and more. A traveller's best friend.

#### Scarf (in my case a Shemagh)

A scarf, akin to a towel in The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy, is about the most massively useful thing an interstellar hitchhiker can have. Partly it has great practical value. You can wrap it around you for warmth; you can sleep under it; wet it for use in hand-to-hand-combat; wrap it round your head to ward off the sun; you can wave your scarf in emergencies as a distress signal, and of course dry yourself off with it if it still seems to be clean enough.

If you're not sure about packing something, you don't need it. It's also possible to buy most things at your destination country if you discover you need them



# Advocate X

#### Just when you thought it was safe to go back into the courtroom...

Chris Philpott originally trained as a litigator working on a number of high profile property related disputes in Jersey, which sparked his interest in the non-contentious/ transactional side of property law. This led to him setting up the property law group and becoming a Partner at Carey Olsen in Jersey.

Can you tell us about what is currently happening in the Jersey property market? I think it's fairly buoyant

**market?** I think it's fairly buoyant with high activity levels in both the residential and commercial sectors. I think this will continue throughout 2017 notwithstanding the uncertainties ahead. Commercial property in Jersey continues to be seen as an attractive investment for foreign investors.

#### How in practice do residential property transactions compare with commercial property transactions in Jersey? The

conveyance process for buying or selling a freehold property in Jersey is the same, whether for commercial or residential properties. It can be fairly complicated and involve reviewing a large number of contracts. These contracts were until 2006 drafted in French and so an understanding of the French language is essential to what we do when reporting to our client on title to a particular property. Commercial property transactions are more involved and we advise clients on leases, development agreements, construction documentation and financing arrangements. With commercial property transactions the client is primarily interested in the investment value or opportunity whereas clients purchasing residential property are understandable more emotionally invested in the transaction. You need to manage each client differently.

#### Are there any changes in Jersey property law or practice that you think should be

considered? For the most part I think the system of buying and selling property in Jersey works well and I don't think there are significant changes required. Most transactions reach completion within 4 to 6 weeks - which is efficient when compared to systems in other countries. Only being able to register property contracts and mortgages with the Royal Court on Friday is restrictive and we should consider allowing registration on other days - perhaps Tuesdays and Thursdays as in Guernsey. I would also like to see housing restrictions on rental properties relaxed so that anyone who is working and paying tax in Jersey should be permitted to rent any property without restriction. I would also abolish stamp duty payable on the registration of mortgages (currently 0.5% of the amount of mortgage registered).

How do you relax? I enjoy spending time with my family and friends - which usually involves good food and wine. I like getting out in the fresh air when I can - either walking, running or on my bike. I am partial to an early morning coffee on the beach.

#### If you were not living and working in Jersey, where do you think you would be and what would you be doing? That is a good question. Jersey is difficult to beat for balancing quality of life and quality of work. I would probably be in Australia, in my favorite city of Melbourne. but I

in my favorite city of Melbourne, but I think I would still be practicing law. I have always fancied running a beach café in my retirement and Australia would be the perfect place for this.

#### If you could choose any two guests for your dinner party (one living and one in past history,) who would you choose and why? Amy Schumer for the humour. Winston Churchill for the politics.

What is your favourite sport? All sport is good. I am an avid watcher and love attending live sporting events. I still play hockey when I can and enjoy getting out on the golf course. I have recently taken up cycling and in July will be pedaling from London to Paris to raise money for the Love Hearts Appeal and Great Ormond Street Hospital. There is nothing like a good challenge.

# Don't leave things up in the **heir**

An explanation of Jersey's sometimes misunderstood succession laws including forced heirship (or légitime) and its little cousin, rapport à la masse.

If Jersey is your home, or you advise clients who live here, you may find the following guidelines interesting. Don't give up if you find the opening ones familiar, the sting is in the tail!

#### Who inherits movables by Jersey law?

• What follows applies to movable estate, not land and houses. In Jersey you should leave two thirds of your net movable property to your heirs, i.e. one third to your spouse/civil partner and one third to your children

• A widow(er)'s children may claim two thirds, if you have a spouse/civil partner but no children they may claim two thirds

• Your grandchildren step into their parents' shoes if your children die before you

· You can leave the last third of your net movable estate as you like

 $\cdot$  Wills of movables disregarding these rules can be challenged by the heirs and adjusted

#### What about gifts made during life?

• What happens if a widower's two children each want their one third but during his lifetime he made generous gifts to one, but not the other?

• The lifetime gift must be brought back into account by its recipient when all the sums are done. This is rapport à la masse

 $\cdot$  You apply the value of the gift when made, not when accounted for

• The recipient can decline to account, but only if they renounce their rights to the deceased's estate

• Many contend the recipient cannot decline to account if the value of the lifetime gift exceeds the value of their forced heirship right plus the free third

#### What can be considered as a lifetime gift?

• A lifetime gift can arise if money from the deceased was put into a joint account with an heir, or put into trust for an heir and may consist of chattels or company shares as well as money

 $\cdot$  Some limited exemptions mean why a gift was made matters more than when it was made

• Lifetime gifts to heirs are presumed to be an advance payment on their heirship rights

• The donor must specifically say if they want a gift to come (in full or as far as possible) from the free third of their estate

### Has your succession plan provided for these eventualities?

· Many families include co heirs who are half siblings

• In many families large gifts from the "Bank of Mum & Dad" helped a child onto the housing ladder


 $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$  Many families have moved to Jersey from England where these rules are unheard of


• Many family offices in Jersey look after people with a Jersey domicile, whose estates are subject to Jersey law

• In such families there is often a history of gifts, loans, share transfers, trust creations, and joint accounts set up between the generations

• A disappointed heir applying the rules of rapport to such a history could upset some carefully laid plans!


#### With a new manager comes a new outlook, has much changed at the hotel since you've taken on the role? We've made lots of subtle changes

# SPORTSPERSON OF THE MONTH EMILY COPP

Motorcycle trials, also known as observed trials, is a nonspeed event which uses specialised motorcycles. The bikes are distinctive in that they have evolved to become extremely lightweight, lack seating (they are designed to be ridden standing up) and have suspension travel that is short, relative to a motocross or enduro motorcycle.

Motorcycle trials events are split into sections where a competitor rides through an obstacle course while attempting to avoid touching the ground with their feet. The obstacles in the course may be of natural or constructed elements. In all sections, regardless of content, the designated route is carefully contrived to test the skill of the rider. In many local observed trials events, the sections



are divided into separate courses to accommodate the different skill level of riders, who compete in skill-rated classes.

The sport is popular in the United Kingdom and here on the island too. Local rider Emily Copp is currently leading the 2017 British Girls Trials Championship (C route), an incredible accolade for any rider but even more impressive when you find out she's only 11 years old.

When did you first get onto a Trials bike: I was six years old and my dad was riding and I thought it looked like fun. I currently ride an 80cc Gas Gas but will probably move up to a 125cc bike by the end of the year.

**Is it unusual for someone your age to be riding:** It doesn't seem unusual because I have so many friends in Trials and am around it all the time but I suppose it is.

### Whereabouts do you compete and what's involved in a

**competition:** The season in Jersey runs between September and April and events are held on private land all over the island. In a trial you ride a marked section over logs, through mud, streams and other obstacles whilst trying not to put your foot down or crash, each time you do, you lose points and the lowest score wins. It's all about balance and control on the bike.

**Do you get nervous before you compete:** When I was recently competing in the British Championships I did before the start but as soon as I got going I was fine, I think Mum and Dad get more nervous than me. Before each round I do get nervous though.

Other sports: I also love to surf and play netball too.

Which school do you go to: St Martins Primary.

Favourite ice-cream flavour: Ben & Jerrys Cookie dough.

Favourite animal: Ring tailed Lemurs

Favourite food: Mums homemade Falafels

**Favourite trials expression:** Feet up. When you drop you feet you lose points, so this one's really important to remember!

**Favourite song:** At the moment it's Ed Sheeran's Castle on the Hill and my all time favourite is Adele's Rolling in the Deep.

**How can people get involved in Trials in Jersey:** The Jersey Classic and Modern Trials Club (www.jerseytrials.com) is a great place to start for novice riders and once they become experienced they can also ride with the Jersey Motorcycle and Light Car Club.

What has been your favourite Trials moment: It has to be clearing a section in front of current World Champion Emma Bristow and her telling me I was riding really well.

What's next for you in the Trials calendar: More training for the next round of the British Championship in Devon on the 25 June.

**Do you have a top tip for aspiring sports people:** Work hard, smile and never give up.



There is a great sense of achievement when you walk into Leonis boxing club at South Hill Gym. Not only because clippings of the club's victories line the walls of the gym, but because the club, its coaches and members continue to work so hard to carry the torch passed to them by the grandfather of Jersey boxing, Dave Thompson, who passed away in 2012.

Forever remembered by the boxing community, Dave left some big shoes to fill at Leonis and it's taken several committed coaches to come together to drive the club into the future, paying homage to where they have come from whilst always remembering what is at the heart of the sport they love.

It would be fair to say that the club has struggled to find its feet after the passing of Thompson, who ran the club almost singlehandedly and dedicated his life to helping the boxers that passed through their doors. But at the centre of Jersey's only remaining amateur boxing club are Thompson's originals values; welcoming anyone that wishes to try boxing and offering them the opportunity to better themselves through a love of boxing. These may seem like obvious principles for any boxing club, but with the rise of white collar events and money-spinning boxing boot camps it is easy to lose sight of what the sport has historically meant and that is the chance for troubled youngsters to learn a discipline in order to channel their aggression and commit to achieving goals as part of a team. One thing is for certain, none of the Leonis coaches is in it for the money.

"All the money we make is funnelled back into the boxers" explains Kevin Baudains who jointly took on the running of the club after 13 years boxing and now boasts 42 coaching. "Funding trips away, bringing boxers over and putting on shows in the island." Club membership is deliberately kept low to ensure the sport remains accessible to any and all and with no subsidies the club are heavily dependent on the generosity of their sponsors. With Kevin coaches, Miguel Ferreira, Tony Burt, Gerry Spence and Ian Dunbar volunteer their time to the seniors at the club who meet four times a week. Boxers train to compete in the four shows that the club puts on each year, events that are vitally important to the club as its main source of fundraising.

Supporting the seniors' training are Miles Carden, Tony Grimshaw, Callumn

O'Connor and Ruben Legge who offer a weekly session to the 20 or so junior boxers of both sexes. "I feel a huge responsibility to those coaches past and present who have provided boxing excellence in Jersey for the past 60 years," Miles Carden proudly reflects. "It's a venerable island institution." The club is welcoming to anyone wanting to try boxing, you can walk into a session and enjoy your first stint on the bag on the house. However, to box at a competitive level requires dedication and commitment, the coaches being only too aware of the great responsibility they have to protect whilst developing their members.

Yes, it's a bunch of misfits leading the club into the future, but so far it appears to be working for them! Miguel Ferreira describes the collective as "those with so much enthusiasm they want to conquer the world tomorrow, balanced by the overly cautious and complemented by the very experienced." Over time they've each picked up on elements of running the club that they enjoy and excel at whether it be offering varied training sessions, matching boxers for fights or the administration and paperwork. It's this coaching combination that is ensuring the Jersey club challenges the visiting, more experienced teams at its shows and producing some of the top boxers in the UK.

### "All the money we make is funnelled back into the boxers"

There is no replacing Dave Thompson, but with hard work, grit and a continued love for the sport there is every indication that these coaches and the rising boxers will keep the good name of Dave going, build upon Leonis' legacy and propel the club into the future of boxing.

### IT'S NOT OFTEN THAT YOU GET TO STEP FOOT INTO A CAR ONLY TWO WEEKS OLD, LET ALONE ONE THAT LOOKS LIKE THIS BUT CAN START FROM UNDER £20,000. THE CATCH-LINE IS 'WE'VE CHANGED EVERYTHING. EXCEPT THE NAME – CIVIC.' AND AS I DROVE OUT OF DEREK WARWICK HONDA AND HEADED TOWARDS TOWN, I TOOK A MOMENT TO GET FAMILIAR WITH MY NEW SURROUNDINGS.

Before I contemplated trying out some of the abundant console features in the new 2017 Honda Civic, I reached up and pressed the electric sunroof button. Mid-week, midday, empty roads, roof down and sun beaming, it couldn't get much better. Cruising along Victoria Avenue with the sparkling ocean to my left I looked out the window at the Batman-esque wing mirrors and thought about what the sales manager told me before I left the garage.

"Family car" he told me. I gave him a dubious look, remembering an uncle I had who had a Honda Civic. I say had, I still have an uncle who had a Civic, nothing happened to him, don't worry. It's just that said uncle no longer drives a Civic. I guess he grew up.

And that's my point and a point being made by design teams behind the new Civic it seems too. The new Honda Civic has a

humongous boot. The brochure is clear to confirm that you can fit a bicycle in it (or two), a handful of surfboards, the entire troops family shopping and Milbrook park carboot sale items for the weekend. Whatever you fancy really. And plenty more.

This family orientated design shined through in every one of its many space age angles as I drove down the 5 mile road and headed for L'Etacq. When you have to grow up, you often feel that enjoyment takes a back seat, so to speak. The 2017 Civic tries, and I'm quite happy to say succeeds, to fill the place of growing up but without letting up.

### I hung a sharp right, and throttled the

accelerator of the automatic 1.51 182bhp turbo as L'Etacq whipped past me. I basked in the sun that beamed through the sun roof above as the picturesque view slid past, down and below me into infinity as the competent engine propelled me up the hill. I considered my life propelled a few years forward; I could definitely see it featuring some fun driving round on a Sunday afternoon with my wife and kids in the rearview mirror. One of the awesome functions of the dashboard is a steering wheel controlled check on who has, or hasn't got their seat belt done up in the back. Technology with responsibility!

This new car is bridging the gap for modern, young trendy families who want the fun of an affordable car with a turbo engine reminiscent of the days where an uncle drove them round in his souped-up car, combined with some really quite neat features (Kudos to the product designer) and every technological modernity you can imagine and expect nowadays, all at an affordable price. Quite a challenge. I started to think to myself, "Yeh. Family car". 'I'd like one of these - retain my youth and have safety and modern features at hand.' I just need to get a wife and kids now; I could carry two families in the Civic - with that gigantic boot.

As I peaked over the hill I headed towards the track. Horse track that is, not the Nurburgring. I checked those mirrors again; huge, stable, solid and plenty oversized like something out of a Power Rangers movie. I imagined the product designer sat with his team and the marketing manager devising plans and specs for the new 2017 model with the key criteria being to make these monster mirrors appeal to a young driving audience. Form aside, they give

> a clear and indisputable view of the road. When you're driving round your newborn or have the kids' boisterous friends in the back you can pay attention to everything that's going on around you and feel really confident that the car was built with pride in mind. Pride of family, pride of passion.

As the sunset glazed the fresh spring, stroke summer air I pensively questioned if I would buy this car myself. For the price I don't think there's much left on the market to compete with the ability to own a brand new 2017 model of this nature. The 10th generation 2017 model with its 1.51 turbo has almost the same power as the 2.21 of the 8th gen. The fully loaded test

car is available now at £26,352. An additional pleasure for the busy family man/woman is the 5 year service pack it comes with, parts AND labour included. Financing is available. Full to the brim with features and quite clearly built for the long-term in mind with its family friendly design and functionality there's little more to ask for with a car in this price bracket.



### **Magnetic Dashboard Mount**



It was 38 years ago this July that Ian Dury, along with The Blockheads, first repeatedly chanted that now instantly recognisable intro "Why don't you get back into bed?", a track that would go on to beamingly nestle on the record shelf of any discerning raver, (in the old school sense of the word), over the decades.

And so it seems absolutely right that the Reasons to be Cheerful team would hold off until part 'Part 3' to finally book their heroes The Blockheads to grace the main stage and support headline proceedings on Saturday 29 July at Coronation Park. The idea of that chant rippling across three thousand Jersey revellers, surrounded by flowers and backed by the sparkling ocean, seems almost too good to be true. Add to that a very likely infectious sing-song with Primal Scream playing 'Come Together' live, and then throw a ridiculous dollop of house, techno, drum & bass and roots on top, and it would seem we have one very serious day for Jersey's musical cultural landscape indeed.

Of course, electronic music has always been at the very heart of Reasons to be Cheerful, and the Clique Electronic Stage, hosted by the collective's Pete de Momme and Carl Scott, is bringing it to the metaphorical house and techno church this time around. With Ben Sims, one of the world's leading and most in-demand techno DJs of our time at the helm, his tough funk, hard grooves and impeccable dexterity will prove nothing short of an insane booking for the Reasons team. Bringing up the rear on that line up, the characterful Butch (Desolat, Cocoon, Rekids, Sei Es Drum), Dutch producer / US based Martyn whose sound is deeply inspired by the futuristic and melodic aspects of Detroit and Chicago, Denis Sulta, Pete de Momme, Carl Scott and Bradley Welsh. Reasons' closest and most respected allies taking control of this specially decorated zone. Expect to drink up performances from Berlin's Jagerverb, Brighton's Suze Rosser, London's Mosteph, Jersey's

Strictly Kev (originally conceived by the members of Coldcut on Ninja Tune), forward thinking reggae grooves all the way from Scotland courtesy of Mungos Hifi (labels Scotch Bonnet / Scrub a dub) featuring Charlie P and YT and up and coming Drum & Bass priestess, the delectable Mollie Collins.

Of course, no Reasons would be complete without the option of cheerfully and slightly more luxuriously bouncing around a plush hospitality area. Being well fed alongside exclusive performances is what it's all about this year, with some of Carl McConnell, Bristol's Chris Munky, Manchester's ONYVA and a smattering of Reasons residents, together lending this area one of the most diverse and smiling lineups of the day.

So when the time finally comes for that sun-drenched, beauteous moment, of inane grinning, group chanting and all round dance music glory, the above highlights should hopefully give you an idea of just how unlikely you're going to want to 'get back in to bed' on 29 July 2017. 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


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
