John Liot returned to Jersey in 2015 having completed a degree in photography at Falmouth. As many creatives who return to the island, John found himself a little lost for how to best apply his new skills to the Jersey market. He began researching animal portraiture and proposed the idea of taking shots of the dogs his friend and he were looking after, offering them for sale to the owners.

John began researching whether there was a sustainable standalone business for pet photography. Googling 'dog photographer' presented a company called Hair of the Dog, a company in Texas that cover all facets of dog photography - also teaching dog photographers to take better photos. Doing pet portraits as a project was no longer a dead end. If people were making what John identified as 'hundreds of thousands of dollars', the potential for it to be a commercial venture was definitely there. Although John was gaining great experience in a variety of photographic roles, adding 'dogs' to the list of services on his website seemed a little odd so he decided to create something new; "It became a part of my brand under my name to offer dog photography, so I created a sub brand name and Project Pawtrait was born". The love of taking animal portraits allows John to capture an animal's quirk; "It's difficult as you have less control but it is extremely rewarding". He put the word out locally that he'd like to capture animals (in a photographic sense) and was approached by the JSPCA who introduced him to Kelly, a rescue dog. Kelly had lived an extremely





There's no escaping the fact that we live on an island surrounded by the sea, for some of us this is merely a topographical accuracy, for others it's the very best part about living here and for these three professional skippers it's how they make their living.

Greg Mansell has very much cornered the high-end luxury charter market. His clever approach and brilliant offering see Alfie Buoy, a 73ft Sunseeker Manhattan, working through their third season of charter this year. We've been lucky enough to head out to see Greg and his team at work and can guarantee you won't be disappointed if you choose to book a trip with them. But what about the man behind the helm...

Well, Greg is no stranger to the sea. Having spent his formative years in Florida he grew up around the water. His first memory of getting out on a boat is from as far back as three years old and he started crewing and helping on boats not long after. It's thanks to this time spent learning the ropes that he was able to quickly climb through the ranks and achieve his Yachtmaster Offshore status. Having retired from his life as a professional cyclist in 2015 he decided to embark on the Alfie Buoy journey and he chose power over sail "because for me it's about speed and being able to get to where you want quicker."

Being at sea every day and often visiting the same places isn't as dull as it may sound to some "thanks to our tidal range and how changeable the weather is the landscape and surroundings change every day, it's simply awesome. I love being at sea at dusk, just as the day is heading into the evening everything changes, the sea goes dark and you feel a bit more at the mercy of the sea. It's really special."

Does he have a top tip for those heading out to sea "Don't sink" it's simple but good to know that's at the forefront of the mind of the man who is ultimately responsible for you when you're at sea. Being a charter yacht skipper isn't all plain sailing of course "You're responsible for not only the safety of your guests but also their enjoyment, you want to make sure that everyone loves being on Alfie Buoy as much as we all do. But that can see you juggling navigating, coordinating, babysitting and entertaining everyone whilst also considering if we've got enough drinks behind the bar and being sure there are clean towels in the heads."

There are now four full-time members of the Alfie Buoy crew, including Greg. As a team, they spend 110 days a year at sea, which also means they spend that much time together. "When you spend as much time together as we do you can't help become like a family. This, of course, means that there are times we don't all get on but we'd never let a guest see that we'll just quietly seethe or just get it out in the open and move on."

Whilst Alfie Buoy is a luxury boat once you step on board you'll quickly be made to feel at home, it's one of the things that Greg loves about charters "It doesn't matter who you are boats are a great equaliser, it opens everyone up to being relaxed and enjoying themselves."

The variety of charter options available means that they've made their luxury Sunseeker accessible to most people from short three-hour sunset cruises to the most luxurious, an overnight charter, where you'll be whisked away to a port of your choice and will then spend the night sleeping on Alfie Buoy. But what's Greg's favourite of the trips they offer "It would have to be over to Chausey for a seafood lunch followed by a BBQ on board for dinner and then spending the night in a French port dancing the night away, you can't beat it."

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Joe has always loved living by the sea and had his first experience of being on the water at the age of just eight years old when he was lucky enough to have his first boat. With aspirations to move up the boating ranks he saved the money he earned on his paper round to buy his first boat aged 12. "I was always on the water one way or another. I was often found 'borrowing' peoples dinghies and just rowing them around at La Rocque, I just loved it."

Having completed all manner of courses out at St Aubins Fort and being a member of the Sea Cadets during his younger years he moved on to power boats and decided to take the leap and became professionally qualified five years ago. "I've always remembered being told that if you can get a job you love then you'll never work a day in your life." It's a strong sentiment and one that Joe is lucky enough to have been able to live his life by.

Having qualified as an RYA Yachtmaster Ocean, power and sail Joe came back to Jersey and as there weren't any jobs most immediately available became self employed and set up his business JL Marine. He started working on building himself a solid reputation as a delivery skipper working for various local yacht brokers. It's thanks to his good reputation that he's currently working as the skipper of the newest addition to the Jersey charter boat fleet, The Jersey Duchess. When Paul Talbot, owner of Jersey Bus Tours, was looking for a skipper for the boat he intended to add to his island tour business he was recommended Joe by others in the industry.

The Jersey Duchess picks up where the old Southern Bay Rose left off and offers visitors twice daily tours taking in the sights of St Aubin's Bay, Noirmont Point and the south west coast of Jersey. Seeing the island from the sea is a whole different experience and one that Joe advocates even for those of us who live here. "I love being out on the water, it makes the island feel less small and always clears my head." The Jersey Duchess is also available for private hire and is the perfect option for those looking for an alternative party venue as they can offer refreshments onboard.

Joe's top tip for those that suffer seasickness "Look for the horizon, it really does work. Sea sickness is your brain thinking you're being poisoned. It doesn't understand what's happening to it so responds in the same way, by making you feel sick and

helping you evacuate the poison. By simply looking at the horizon you show your brain what's really happening and it helps to calm your stomach." One lady on the dock as I was interviewing Joe helpfully shouted out "I take Stugeron" which is of course another option, but we think Joe's makes more sense!

You can just make it out in the photo of Joe and we couldn't meet him and not ask, about the significance of the rope and anchor tattoo on his neck "My mum told me I'd never get a job when I got it, but thankfully she was wrong. Honestly though, it's a very old symbol of hope and strength and the rope falls to form an infinity symbol. Having been through some challenging times in life I got it so I could see it every day and be reminded to stay strong and never lose hope!"

Dan's favourite time is "being on the boat when the sun is setting, surrounded by a pod of dolphins and with a belly full of French food, you can't beat it!" If that doesn't make you want to book a trip then we don't know what will...

As someone who's always out at sea we asked Dan if he had a top tip for anyone who needs help finding their sea legs. Rather unusually he's suggests you "Grow a fisherman's beard!" And what about seasickness how would he recommend you deal with that "I've heard that some fizzy drinks can combat nausea. We also have some customers bringing ginger biscuits along, they maybe worth a go!"

It's hard to imagine that Dan would ever do anything other than his current job and if he wasn't at the helm of Seafaris rib he thinks he'd still want to have a job that was maritime based, "I've always thought that working with Jersey Coastguard would be an interesting job.".

I've just returned from a 10 hour cruise of the Channel Islands on the industrial Condor Clipper from Portsmouth. It was a refreshing detachment from the world of the Internet on the day the election results unfolded across hand held smart technology. 'Great' seemed to be drifting quite far from 'Britain'. The night before young people sat in pubs on the 'mainland' cheering the results in, it seemed possible that hope and the shimmer of social justice had ignited the nations interest in politics.

The 'cruise' took us from the white cliffs of England across the channel before the mirage of postcard pretty islands appeared. Just beyond the shores of Sark a huge castle dominates Brecqhou Island. Mythology still exists; reclusive billionaire twin brothers, with an empire in media and hospitality, avoid tax and publicity alongside causing disputes amongst the local inhabitants.

When footage of refugees clinging to overcrowded and unsafe boats emerged in 2015 the news amplified the humanitarian disaster. Many of these are vulnerable families, people ending up in exploitative situations with their only justification being hope that they will find sanctuary.

In the 1980's my parents had sailed from Jersey to the Canary Islands. What many people may consider a foolish journey across the oceans with two young children proved to be life enriching and a prosperous time for our growing family. We each experienced the benefits of year round sunshine, water based activities and a rich amalgamation of Spanish and Arab culture. These islands were our home for six years.

As islanders the sea surrounds our homeland. Our Jersey community and politics is a micro version of global issues. Despite our wealth, both monetary and in natural beauty, we share the struggles to find peace and equality. Our search for a shared healthy, happy and prosperous life continues.

# ALTERNALS ALTERNALS PARTI WORDS & PHOTOGRAPHS Will akeman

It's been a month since Gallery published the first part of my guide to lesser-known walks around the island, and so far I haven't received any reports that people lost their bearings and walked into the incinerator. I suppose once you've gazed upon a sight that beautiful, life is too precious to waste.

In less positive news, my invitation to become a Blue Badge guide appears to have been mislaid in the post. If you didn't catch that article a copy of last month's magazine is available from your local GP surgery, hairdresser or my eBay store (local postage included: £10).

This month I'm broadening my focus to include a countryside walk for those readers who will only enter St Helier in order to earn

money or buy underpants. You're missing out - the countryside is great but when you've seen one field you've seen them all, whereas each of the winding backstreets of our town centre possesses its unique charms, especially at 2AM on a Sunday morning. I've started with a town walk for this reason. I recommend walking at dawn, when the song of the seagull is at its most beautiful, accompanied by the soothing rumble of refuse collection.

#### Ramble #3: relics of St Helier

This walk takes around an hour. I suggest stopping for food and cakes to extend/fuel your journey. It's pretty flat, but as always in Jersey watch out for wheeled traffic of all kinds.

Start this walk at the Millennium Park. The park itself doesn't particularly interest me, but the seating area near the entrance fountain offers an excellent view of the former Odeon. Some say it's an eyesore, but the people from the Freedom Church are gradually restoring the building and have been sensitive to the original features. Sadly this hasn't yet involved the installation of Indiana Jones pinball or a selection of Pick and Mix, but last time I was there they did offer me a hotdog, which was very kind. If you look up, the mouldings around the first floor windows and 1950s glass roof features of this building can evoke Jersey's post-war confidence or, depending on your age, memories of watching Hulk Hogan in Suburban Commando. Then, turn your back on the past and head through the park in the direction of the gas cylinders. Take the left hand side of the park, and wander down Oxford Road just after Lloyd's Pharmacy. Eventually you will come to the Masonic

Temple, which is like the Odeon, but for a slightly older generation who enjoy raising money for charity and wearing symbolic aprons. It's an intimidating presence, especially as like a reverse Tardis it is actually smaller on the inside than it looks. OR IS IT?

Turn round, go back along Oxford Street, and cross the park. You want the passage that cuts through from Tunnel Street into Belmont Road. Consider a detour for a battered sausage from Belmont Road Fish Bar, but ideally take a left, walking until you can cross the road and head down Ann Street on your right. You're here to admire the outside of the old Ann Street brewery, where you can still smell the phantom odour of Mary Anne. Take the passage left through the shell of the building into the car park, where there are still some interesting signs on the walls of what used to be the keg storage area.

Head towards the Le Bas Centre - if you're my age you were probably born there, which is a terrifying thought, because if there was a census (as depicted in primary school nativity plays) we'd all need to squeeze back in there like woodlouse under a damp bench. Don't cross but take St Saviour's Road on your right and walk, until it becomes St James Street, crossing Don Road, into Francis Street, eventually crossing Colomberie into Green Street.

Your final destination is Green Street cemetery. Both the cemetery itself and the adjoining car park are lovely places to relax at dawn or twilight, particularly since the new police station has (mostly) dealt with the problems caused by undead skeleton warriors rising from their graves to wage war upon the living.







## Ramble #4: stinky bunkers of the west

This route is not flat, and if you take it at a jogging pace represents a decent workout. Parts of it are in shadow, so if you're going at night take a head torch and/or bag of carrots. Depending on how fast you move it can take over two hours. Dog poop is an ever-present threat.

Begin at Petit Port. You can either get a bus there, walk down from Corbiere or walk over from La Pulente and turn round. Head north along the pretty sandy path above the beach wall. Your first destination is the deserted bunker on the rocks between La Pulente and Petit Port. It offers great views but don't get pigeon droppings on your shoes or cut yourself on any broken glass. Emerge back into the light, and head along the St Ouen coast route until you can cross the road onto the dunes, well after La Pulente car park, but a little bit before Le Braye car park. You want to hug the higher

land of the dunes, heading vaguely in the direction of the airport, but not go as high as the trees or golf course. If it's night, you could challenge yourself (as I once did) to sleep in the small open bunker halfway across the dunes - the challenge is it's cold, smells like a latrine and there are constant ratty scuttling sounds until you drown them out by crying. Just meander across the sand dunes in whatever fashion you desire, enjoying the abudance of wildflowers at this time of year, ultimately aiming for the really large dunes that are just before the houses next to the road (Chemin des Basses

Mielles). You should be high up, in the border area between dunes and gorse, with a lovely view of the sand quarry looking towards the north west. It's a great place to watch for predatory birds.

Your aim is to cross inland over the big dune, heading in the opposite direction to the sea and into the bottom of "creepy valley", the sandy area where the big pool of water collects in spring. If you're doing the walk for fitness reasons you should do a few laps of the pool area, periodically dropping to do press-ups or whatever. Head through the valley, and follow the path up to your right, away from the Creepy Valley Adventure place and uphill through the woods. After a little while, you will reach the track that runs along the back of the Belle Vue Estate and towards Les Quennevais. From here you are on your own. Perhaps you should reward yourself with some chips.

We traversed it all in two small cars over a week. We rattled along skewing on cinder tracks, driving through a black sand storm the tail-lights disappearing in the gloom, or staring at long limitless roads. Early in the day, deep mist would reveal cloud-capped mountains, dirty looking glaciers and vast stretches of flat, lichen covered, moonscapes. We travelled through an ancient land where vastness hid the trolls and we grew to know why the myths permeated. A shape shifting country.


A massive powerful waterfall left us wet and energised. Everywhere the buckling geology made us feel small and left us wondering how was it possible to make a life here.

On the sunniest, clearest of days Iceland had seen in months, we saw pairs of puffins flitting over the water, a pod of Harbour Porpoise, spouting Minkes, and felt humbled by the quiet majesty of a Humpback Whale as it sluiced tons of Krill from the dark cold waters.









Boston is a proud city with an aloof nature. Spacious, its people seem genuinely relaxed in that odd architectural mix of historical buildings squeezed between soaring skyscrapers. Food ranged from sweet plump oysters in the ancient Union Oyster House to classic cannoli's from Mike's, a Bostonian institution. We sat quietly savouring the sweet ricotta whilst enjoying a local









basketball game. We ate delicious, moist, foil wrapped sandwiches, in the sprawling park as locals practiced Tai Chi, meditated crossed legged on mats and lazed in its cool gardens.

In the dappled shade of an old cemetery, the remains of notable inhabitants quietly rested. Along the Freedom Trail frock coated Bostonian re-enactors regaled us, and in front of his tomb, laid bare the truth behind Paul Revere's ride. No shouts of "the English are coming" apparently.

On our last night in Boston we watched baseball at Fenway Park one of the oldest



parks in America . It felt like a religious experience. Build it and they will come. For over two hours, in the home of Babe Ruth, the stadium slowly filled, peoples faces reflecting the dimming light, anxious with the desire to witness another legendary home run.

We ate franks, drank cold beer, the bases were loaded, we saw a home run, we stood and en masse sang "Sweet Caroline" and suddenly it was all over.

One night in Boston we visited a local bar where former NASA Astronaut Dr Jeffrey Hoffman, an astrophysicist, described his five missions, logging 1,211 hours and covering a distance of 21.5 million miles in a space shuttle. I asked if he'd experienced a transcendental moment "Every astronaut feels the same", he said. Iceland beautiful though it was, the landscapes are stunning, and Reykjavik had its own special charm, proved very expensive. There is no doubt that it's waking up as a tourist destination but has some way to go.

Boston, although a city vacation felt comfortable and proved that with the right weather both welcoming and entertaining. I'd go back.



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# Storytellers

And Jersey's pontoon dwellers, fishermen, visiting sailors and luxury boat owners alike seem to be carrying on such traditions. So what's on offer on island for those docking in hungry bellied from a journey on the high seas to our shoes? If the seafood options at the Liberty Wharf or Liberation Squares alfresco dining is a stride too far for those who haven't quite got their land legs back, you'll be pleased to find a bustling port of food vendors just a ladders climb from the pontoons. On the Albert Pier and New North Quay is a community that ensure visitors docking in and boat owners nipping out, have all their appetite desires on their voyage. And as Elizabeth Terminal no longer has their big eat in cafe, Albert Pier is the closest for those looking for a refuel fresh off the Condor too. We meandered harbour side and checked out the culinary offerings for those with a taste for the high seas so you can dock up, stock up and fill up,

Located on the edge of the new North Quay is Kufras Marina Shop, a little inconspicuous store laden with all the goods (and goodies) a trip on the fair seas requires. Despite being a little camera shy, owner Idalecio has years of experience on the water's edge which have given him a certain expertise in what'll float your boat. He welcomes his regulars, who flock in for his legendary huge breakfast rolls, made to order in his in-shop kitchenette, with a smile and a handshake-. The perfect start to a day battling high winds or meandering on deck in port quite equally. On the menu is your traditional bacon and egg on freshly baked rolls made locally and the hungrier sailor will be pleased to see

because life afloat is best served deliciously.

belly filling steak, onion and cheese served in a crispy baguette with proper builders tea on offer. The benches lining the harbour side make for the perfect alfresco dining location.

Kufras is an all inclusive pit stop if you're planning a trip away or docking in for a visit, along with a hot roll to take away, you'll find all things a dedicated sea-man (or woman) may need, making it a locals favourite go to too. Offering a fair selection of boat supplies, sundries, boating charts and containers, you can get yourself sorted with all the practicalities necessary to make it to your destination, whilst picking up your lunch

supplies you'll need whilst getting prepared for breakfast the following day. This little store, of course, has breakfast covered too with fresh homemade breads, baguettes, croissants, fresh fruit and juices (ward off the scurvy) with all the essentials for a morning cuppa on deck. No worries for your heavy laden arms, Kufras is in easy reach making the corner of St Helier Marina, home to visiting yachtsmen and locals too.

If you're wanting to stop and take in the beautiful views across both harbour ports towards Liberation Square, situated at the end of the pier is The Lifeboat cafe. You'll

to enjoy en route there. Prepare a picnic like a captain with Idalecio's home-made Chorizo and chicken pasta, fresh homemade sandwiches (or they'll make one to order) as well as fruit, sweet muffins, almond cakes and thick wedges of carrot cake to feast on whilst passing Guernsey (from a safe distance). And if you're skilled enough to catch your own, you can purchase your BBQ, coals and utensils for a fish supper and pick up your sides to make a meal of it. And as no picnic aboard is complete without a tipple or two, there is a great selection of wines, chilled cheers and, for those wanting to do it like the pirates do, a selection of reasonably priced spirits. (Note: for those going pirate on this crossing then make sure you get yourself a Jersey flag, plenty to choose from in store)

You won't even need to shop further if you're planning an overnights stay as you can also pick up all the toiletries and cleaning usually be heartily greeted "Our Kid" by owner Jonny who is there serving hot meals and breakfasts all day with coffees, teas, soft drinks and snacks from 6:30am - 2:30pm. Their menu is everything one expects from a harbour side shack; they've got proper breakfast rolls with all the additions your heart desires and it's not a bad lunch time spot either, with refreshing lunches suitable if you're in a rush (and WiFi for work on the run). These guys can organise take away too if you want to eat onboard but the view from their alfresco seating area overlooking the harbour and marina, is even more charming with a bacon, egg and cheese on Portuguese roll in hand. Although little in size, this place always has a buzz about it as it's a tradesmen and harbour workers go to too. Wake up and get your builders tea, port side!

Tucked into a little alcove just a few strides from the Albert Terminal (where the Manche

Iles Express ferries depart from) is Boatfayre Ltd. A duty free store the British Navy would tip their hat to. Fairing similar priorities aboard, during 1677-1740s, amongst a pound of biscuits, three eighths of a 24-inch cod and two pints of peas a sailor was designated 14 pints of wine, 3.5 pints of rum, arrack or brandy and seven gallons of beer PER WEEK! An extortionate amount of liquids (but not quite enough to sink a ship in most cases.) But, before you start planning a cocktail party on the top deck, please note that only those landing in Jersey for the day or locals leaving the island with a valid Manche Iles boarding pass may purchase their loot from this shop. Shelves are laden with all the tipples you may desire; gins, flavoured vodka, fine whiskeys and the French favourite Pernod to Champagnes, wines and most notably 11 different types of rum that would make any pirate weak at their peg leg. And manager Xavier is happy to help you pick the best for your stop over in Jersey or your trip onwards (but in both cases please drink responsibly, too many tipples and you may topple overboard!) Boatfayre is also ideal for sweet treats and souvenir shopping to take a little taste of Jersey home with you, or as a gift when you get to the other side. Find many Genuine Jersey products, Jersey fudge and biscuits, Jersey milk chocolate bars (the sea salt one will be particularly suiting) souvenirs and trinkets. And if you prefer a nice cup of tea alike Bartholomew Roberts, the Welsh pirate who broke the stigma that all pirates were rum pickled hijackers, you can pick up Coopers & Co. tea and coffee, one of the oldest remaining locally owned Jersey companies. And note, this makes you no less of a pirate in our eyes, Captain Roberts was one of the most successful pirates of the Golden Age of Piracy, taking over 400 prize vessels in his career! Although this little shop has no flags to sail high, you can get yourself a Jersey cow tea towel which would of course look most exceptional on a mast in the high winds.

You won't miss the lively Quayside Cafe, as you come into Port. Although the prices are as low as one may expect from a roadside cafe, their menu, standards, service and food alike are not. Dedicated to keeping all harbour dwellers well fed, they are open from 6am-1130pm, 7 days a week, 364 days a year. Perfect if you get a late evening craving! And as one of the later evening food servers on the island, they understandably have a great following of locals too. So if you've pulled in for a full day in the marina you can graze to your heart's content, and the menu certainly caters for it: breakfast baps, freshly made sandwiches, fish and chips, homemade curries, Italian Lasagne and spag bol, burgers and wraps and in the winters, you'll even find a roast dinner and pancakes on the menu! Owner Steve does his utmost to cater to everyones needs and requirements, if it can be wrapped up you can take it away and if it can be altered to fit your dietary requirements consider it done. As is his nature, he see's a lot of regular boat owners returning to him in the summers, he sorts them out with ice for their boats, take away drinks and a picnic lunch to enjoy onboard later. With his visitors in mind, he stocks fresh Lavazza coffee, particularly popular with French visitors who love a proper espresso, and Jersey Ice Cream, popular with American tourists coming in from the cruise ships.

So if you're taking a harbour side stroll in the evening, stop in to catch the wonderful buzz and community atmosphere here on the Pier. And if you want to escape the hustle, wander down to the very edge of the pier where a lonely bench perches overlooking the stretch of Ocean towards Elizabeth Castle and enjoy a proper hot homemade dinner on your lap. The vendors of just the pier alone have been feeding and watering visitors and boat owners for years and certainly know how to serve up a sailor their brunch. Even for a land lubber, there's plenty to feast on, whilst listening to the to the gentle sounds of halyards clinking against the yachts masts.

Presented by the International Association of Commercial Administrators (IACA)\*, the Merit Award recognises the work undertaken by the JFSC to successfully implement a secure channel to exchange

highly sensitive information and intelligence with law enforcement and tax authorities in the UK on request.

The initial phase of this work, which has been assessed by the IACA for the purposes of the award, was carried out from November 2016 to February 2017, following the signing of an agreement between the Island and the UK to improve this interchange of Beneficial Ownership

information. The JFSC's approach has adopted innovative solutions in the areas of interoperability, confidentiality and cyber security.

The JFSC is one of only three jurisdictions to win an award from the IACA this year, alongside Indiana and Ohio. It is the fifth IACA Merit Award that the JFSC has won.

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



The biggest change I've noticed in me is... My mindset. Muay Thai, of course, helps build a strong body and makes you look badass, but it's helped me in my everyday life to be more patient with myself and others, I have a lot more discipline and it's boosted my confidence too. 

The training pushed me to my limits, which I enjoyed so much that if I could do it all again, I would! A huge thank you to my boyfriend, friends and family for their support and especially Ben, Alan and all the trainers at BoxinBusiness who got me through.

### What I would say to anyone thinking about getting involved

**is...** Just believe in yourself and even though it's a tough 10 weeks training where sometimes you feel like you can't do it, it's definitely worth the sweat and the tears (on the odd occasion) and you'll feel great!

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When did you first start surfing: When I was eight years old.

You've achieved a huge amount since we last spoke to you in 2015 can you tell us a bit about that: 2015 was a great year! I won the under 14's at the English Nationals, came 2nd in the under 14's at the British Nationals, jointly won the under 14's UK Pro Surf Tour and came second in the under 16's Tour

In 2016 I only competed in three events getting third in the under 18's at the English Nationals and 2nd in the under 16's of the British Nationals. I missed out on the win by 0.10 of a point and was gutted! I also represented the Channel Islands in September 2016 at the European Surfing Federations Junior Championships in Morocco. I came seventh in the under 14's placing me as the highest under 14 British Surfer.

For 2017 I've taken the next step and have entered on to the World Surf League's European Pro Junior Tour. I managed to secure a top 50 placing at the first event in Caparica, Portugal and currently hold a placing of 60th after the 2nd event in Biscarrosse, France. I was gutted not to have made it further but for my first year on the Tour and with the level of surfing I'm up against, out of 144, I'm pretty pleased so far. For the past few months I've been focused on training and have surfed in two of my favourite places, Ireland and Hawaii. They were both amazing places to travel to and being in the surf in both places taught me so much.

You're mainly self funded which must be really difficult especially now you're involved in the worlds circuit: It's really difficult! Unfortunately the bank of mum and dad only stretches so far and we are unable to get any funding locally! In an ideal world I'd love to find a local corporate sponsor that may have an interest in supporting me. European Groms are so lucky with all the support they have access to. The expense of getting off island alone really makes a difference to what you can compete in and the training you can do but I suppose that's the same for all competitive sports people on the islands. If Ryan (Nutzlife) hadn't supported me with my surfboards I wouldn't have been able to achieve what I have so far.

Do you have any surfing heroes: Mick Fanning for sure, he's such a powerful surfer also Jordy Smith whose been surfing out of his skin on the Championship Tour (CT) so far this year.

Favourite surfing expression: "Stoked", my mates that don't surf think it's hilarious!

Favourite song: That's a hard one I don't have one favourite, if you check out my edits you can see my style.

How often do you train and how do you train out of the water: Every opportunity I get I'm in the water. It doesn't matter what the conditions are I have to train for every type of condition that an event can be held in. My land-based training is with Andy Sellars at Pisces Gym, this reduces in the summer as I try and max out my time in the surf. At the start of the year I did a surf freedive course with Matt Le Clercq before I went to Hawaii. It was a really good course and taught me some great things before I went and surfed in big, heavy waves on the North Shore!! The smooth star surf trainer is also something I use a lot when the waves are flat. Through being on the English Squad I've also had

access to some great ports physiotherapy and psychology lectures.

Where and when has been your favourite moment whilst surfing: Without question Sunset Beach, Hawaii in March this year.

What would be your dream place to surf: North Shore Hawaii again but I'd love to go to Indo

What does the future hold for you, will you always keep surfing: I just want to keep getting better and better and see how far I can go. I've got 2 more events this year. I'm going to Espinho, Portugal for the 3rd round of the WSL and have the fourth this month in Sopelana, Spain. Having been selected for the English Squad I am also trying for a place against 9 other under 16 surfers to represent England at the World Junior Surfing Games in Japan later on in the year. I've got another four years on the WSL Junior Tour and my aim is to reach the finals within that time. I want to take the next step on to the Qualifying Series next year, which is the step below the Championship Tour (CT). Surfing will always be a part of my life. If I don't make it professionally I will definitely go into the business side of the industry as a coach, events coordinator or have my own school or something!

Do you have a top tip for anyone considering taking up surfing: Yes just do it. It's an amazing sport and has taught me so much about people, life, respecting the ocean and those around me and keeps you fit and healthy! I've made so many friends around the world by doing something I love. If you want to learn Jersey is really lucky as we've got some top Surf Schools. Just hook up with one and keep practicing, perseverance is key!

As a petrolhead, I feel as if I've pretty much conquered land, taking on everything from motorbikes to articulated trucks with all manner of cars, trikes, diggers and dumpers and even what I'm certain must be Jersey's fastest heavy goods vehicle in between (although if anyone's got a tank I can drive please get in touch) but I'll be honest, my petrolheaded exploits on both sea and in the air are somewhat lacking.

I'll not lie, during the nigh on ten minute phone call with Joe from Le Mourier Swim/Sea/Save asking whether or not I'd like to come out and see what their powerboat training courses were all about and explaining what they have to offer the only words that he uttered that truly stuck with me were 'four hundred horsepower RIB'. That was all the bait required; I was well and truly hooked.

Thankfully, Joe and Malcolm were patient and accommodating enough to re-explain exactly what it is they have to offer whilst omitting any technical details until later on so as to hold my attention for the bits that you, the reader, need to know about their operation when I met them in person last month.

As well as the swimming lessons that Le Mourier Swim/Sea/Save are well known for, they're also the only company locally who are accredited to teach the entire

RYA Powerboat scheme from beginner all the way up to advanced levels and hold the crown for having run more Intermediate Powerboat courses than any other RYA accredited school in United Kingdom. With two vessels at their disposal, they were brave enough to let me loose on their four month old, almost brand spanking new 8.5 metre twin-engined RIB, an incredibly capable boat that's even coded for night use up to ten miles offshore, which is exactly where and when much of the advanced training (which is essential if you plan to engage in commercial powerboat operations and not available from any other training provider locally) takes place. They also offer charters (their high-speed trips to and from Sark and Herm always fill up fast and it isn't surprising given the usual headaches involved in getting to either island from Jersey), aquatic camps for children during the summer holidays, an informal powerboat cruising club where

boat owners are invited out to enjoy their craft together and their increasingly popular dolphin spotting trips on top of the RYA powerboat, first aid and VHF (radio) courses. So they like to keep busy, and after just a couple of hours at sea at the helm of their new RIB it isn't hard to understand why. Did I mention that it's got a couple of 200 horsepower outboards bolted to the stern?

I have a paradoxical relationship with mechanical sympathy. You see, on one hand I've spent enough time underneath cars getting all kinds of crap in my eyes to understand that the better you look after things the less crap you generally have to endure being in your eyes, yet I'm completely aware that if you're going to invest your time, effort and, crucially, money into toys then you might as well play with them properly, and that's the essence of why anybody with a boat, or anyone interested in having a powerboat, should take one of these courses. Even though I know full well that these modern RIBs are entirely capable of taking a pounding against the water there's a part of me that winces a bit each time I hear the thud. More on why these RYA powerboat courses are almost essential for getting the most out of your boat and in particular how they're delivered by Joe and Malcolm later though, first let's talk about the boat and tackling the unpredictable tides that you'll be faced with.

Or not, actually. Joe assures me that the tides around our coast are actually stunningly easy to accurately predict if

you know a few tricks of the trade, and that key information is part of what makes Le Mourier's courses special. And that's just the tip of the iceberg. Or should that be 'rock'? You'll want to be avoiding those, but these guys can show you how without becoming obsessed by, and relying solely on navigational charts. As well as the fundamentals, unlike other schools an important part of their advanced course is an exercise in which the student is tasked with creating their own navigational plan to either the Minquiers or Les Écréhous that'll enable them to safely negotiate reefs and other hazards before actually running the track in the boat themselves. If that sort of hands-on practical experience to back up the theory doesn't provide you with the confidence to venture further than around to Beauport and back to the marina in St Helier then I'm not sure what would.

It isn't just about the pilot's confidence though, from experience they've been told that it's often the lack of confidence in the pilot's ability from family and friends that can ruin boat ownership for many owners. Let's face it, if you're up for enjoying a nice sunny day out at sea but end up feeling nauseous despite the fresh sea air, end up with a bad back or other injury as a result of being slammed down into a wave or aren't quite sure that anybody knows exactly where they are doing it's probably going to put more of a dampener on your day than the giant wave that crashed over you that time you ended up side on into a swell with only soggy sandwiches to eat for lunch. And the truth of the matter is that people also often buy the wrong boat for their needs. That's another reason to make sure you're competent at sea before splashing the cash - Joe and Malcolm are practically overqualified to advise you on the right boat as well as showing you the ropes. Your family and friends will thank you for it. Trust me.

So what do you do when rolling off of a wave to prevent yourself ending up in a back brace? Power modulation. Just ease off a little then ease it back on as you come back down. Easy! Within minutes I'd picked up plenty of tips and tricks, even about different ways to manipulate the throttles because believe me, when you open the taps on that thing she really flies. And opening the taps was high on my list of priorities.

I'm no boat expert, but this wasn't my first time at sea. It's very different being behind the wheel though, and whilst their new RIB seemed tractable and smooth, especially once it got up to pace and onto the plane, I was shocked to discover that it was mapped to make pretty much all of the power between 4,000 and 5,000rpm with the red line stretching up to around 5,500 rpm on

each of those surprisingly quiet flat four outboards. When I say 'makes all the power' what I mean is it 'accelerates effortlessly quickly'. I mean as in what feels like the nautical equivalent of being on a par with a sports bike quick. Edge-the-throttles-forward-slightly-from-4,000rpm-and-your-instinct-wants-you-to-pull-them-straight-back-fast. It blew my mind. And my hair.

With a bit of gentle persuasion (that's a lie, they were more than happy to show off the capabilities of their flagship vessel) I got to experience a few high speed turns too, and with Malcolm's patient and encouraging tuition got pretty close to nailing it, leaving me hungry for more. The icing on the cake for me was that there was all of the technical knowledge and explanation you could possibly want on hand, if you want it, that is. If you're more into just knowing how to enjoy being the captain than knowing the theory behind why it is you're having so much fun then they can keep it simple too.

Ultimately, whilst I've heard a worryingly large amount of people tell me that the best two days of boat ownership are the day you buy one and the day you sell it, that shouldn't have to be the case. Of course it's not going to be fun if your family are constantly giving you grief because they feel seasick or scared, and of course it isn't going to be much fun if you're not confident that you'd know what to do in an emergency or keep fluffing things up whilst anchoring, leaving the pontoon or coming alongside. But whether you're already a powerboat owner or fancy becoming one you'd be mad not to book vourself onto one of Le Mourier's powerboat courses if for no other reason than it's just good fun. Let's face it, we live in the perfect surroundings for enjoying travel by sea and with summer nearly here why just bob around in the bay when you could enjoy lunch in Carteret or a picnic on the Minquiers' sand bar? After one of these courses you'll know exactly where it is and how to find it when it's there, not to mention what to do if somebody has a little bit too much fizzy pop and ends up tottering overboard on the way back.

# Sailing Magic.

We couldn't have a issue of Gallery themed 'on a boat' without mentioning our annual inter-island yachting event. With fluctuating light force two-to-three 'shifty' winds this year's Carey Olsen Inter-Island Yacht Race proved a technical affair.

The race, the biggest annual CI sailing event, saw 75 boats register this year; from fast sports boats such as JPK's, Pogo's and J122's to cruisers, such as Westerly Centaurs and Contessa 26's. Of these 64 started the race, 21 retired, 43 completed the course and, of the six Fast Cats entered, five started and just one didn't make the finish.

As a result of the conditions, for the first time in the history of the race, a decision was made to relocate the start line from St Aubins's Bay to St Ouen's Bay, approximately a mile and a half north, north west of Corbiere Lighthouse. Race Official, Mike Seguss, got the main race off to a start at 12:10 with a south-westerly five to six knots wind and the Fast Cats started some 45 minutes later by which time the wind had veered around to the north. Although variable (NE to NW) it maintained five to nine knots throughout the remainder of the race albeit

there were a few holes close to the finish line in Little Russel near Castle Cornet. Taking account of the wind and tide, the day's conditions generally favoured boats that kept to the north east side of the rhumb line (i.e. the shortest route) from the start to the finish line and those of a more modern, lighter construction - generally IRC Certified Racing Yachts.

Jersey-registered Abracadabra took the Silver rophy title crossing the line in three hours, 29 mins and 54 seconds some 10 mins ahead of Guernsey's Fandangle. Abracadabra was skippered by Rhys Perkins, who has competed in the race for over 35 years. The decision to move the start to St Ouen's was a good one for Rhys and racing on his A35, with winds forecast to come from the north east and, combined with a better tide, he and his crew decided to take the most easterly course of all the fleet which paid off; "We could have done with a

little more breeze but taking a beat up to windward just before Lower Heads Cardinal Buoy then enabled us to get our spinnaker up." Winning the race was particularly poignant for Perkins as with him were his three children - Henry, Charles and Mary as well as Nick O'Hare, Glyn Mitchell and Katie Bennett-Jones; "I would like to thank the race officer for making the call to move the start line and to all the organisers for a very well run event," he said.

Alex Ohlsson, group managing partner of long-term sponsor Carey Olsen, said: "This was Carey Olsen's eighth year of sponsoring the largest and most eagerly-anticipated race in the Channel Islands sailing calendar. 75 yachts participated with hundreds of crew members including families, novices and one person took part 50 years after first participating. Moving the start to St Ouen's Bay ensured virtually all competitors finished in the allotted time and provided a fabulous spectacle from the beach at St Ouen's Bay."

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# GADGETS AHOY!

I was all at sea this month to learn that there are over 5,000 registered boat owners in Jersey; translating roughly to an impressive one vessel for every 20 of us. Add that to the number of kayak, paddleboard and jet-ski owners and it's a wonder there's space in St Brelade's Bay to dip a toe on a sunny weekend.

With that in mind, this month I've put together a selection of nautical gadgets, with something for everyone from the occasional paddler to the experienced ocean goer. Anchors aweigh!

### **Davis Key Buoys**

Such a clever and simple little gadget that it won an innovation award from the National Marine Manufacturers Association (USA), the key buoy is an unassuming standard sized keyring that on contact with water auto inflates, bobbing your otherwise lost keys, or small tools, back to the surface in next to no time.

Once inflated the tube is 14 inches long and extends above the water, allowing it to be plucked from the waves with ease. Activated by sodium bicarbonate and tartaric acid and capable of carrying 80g, this gizmo is suitable for one use only but it's a small price to pay to prevent that sinking feeling. By and large, it's a sensible purchase for anyone who is regularly on or around the water.



### Reasons to be Cheerful explodes on to Coronation Park this month, 29 July, celebrating 11 hours of straight up music, across four stages to 3,000 heads.

Headlining the Electronic Stage, hosted by Clique, is one of the planet's most indemand Techno heavyweights, the mighty Ben Sims. Here he shares what's influencing him, his latest production news and exactly why he's so excited to be descending on Jersey's shores...

Do you have to arm yourself with a different energy when it comes to playing summer festivals compared with straight up club rooms? (Are there different expectations? Any preferences?) I think a balance of the two is healthy and after doing a run of clubs I get a craving for a festival and vice versa.

For a few years I only did festivals during the summer and that didn't really work as you can get a bit too detached from the audiences. As the sense of occasion plus bigger production at festivals really amps up the atmosphere you can get a bit lazy with track selection as the vibe's generally good anyway and I could be far less likely to try out fresh material or go off on a tangent for a while and drop something unexpected.

So, these days, I mix it up by doing clubs and festivals in the same weekends. I approach them all with the same 'I'm just gonna do my thing' mentality and always have about 1000 tracks on me, so I just do whatever feels right at the time and enjoy it much more as a result.

Once you have achieved a body of a couple of decades work do you continue to be influenced by others, and if so in what way? Yeah that never really stops, I'm constantly influenced and inspired

by others. The new generation of DJs has given us so much talent, many with a different approach to playing than mine and that definitely makes me think about how and what I spin.

It's too easy to get stuck in your ways and think there's only one recipe for a good set. Everyone has a different background and different influences so even if you gave and just play whatever we liked from soul to reggae to hip hop to disco. We all have pretty similar music backgrounds so it made sense and we had a lot of fun.

We did it a few times, some gigs abroad too, and then it became a regular radio show hosted by Tony and me. The podcasts (and the edit labels) were an extension of the show really.

them the same bag of records they'd present them very differently and that's always interesting to me.

I also regularly listen to and collect old DJ sets, master mixes and radio shows of various genres, especially heroes from my teens like Froggy, the Latin Rascals, DJ Cheese, Les Adams, Richie Rich etc and that inspires me too. I've always got one foot in my past and remember where I came from musically, that's very important to me.

There are many different ways to enjoy the talents of Ben Sims these days. Can you tell us more about the Essex Rascals Podcast, and what the story is with your crew there? The project was born at the 'Split' Techno parties I used to co-promote. Initially the Rascals were Paul Mac, Mark Broom and myself (Tony Anderson joined later) and I just wanted to have a completely different vibe in the second room and to give us a chance to dig deep into our collections

It kinda got put on hold for a while due to time constraints but it's back now. There's also a forthcoming hip-hop mastermix from Paul and an early drum n bass mix from me dropping soon. Plus, after a one off Rascals show I did for NTS Live in December, there's a strong possibility the show will come back bi-monthly on a new station, so it's all systems go.

The nature of Jersey's geography means the island isn't exactly a techno mecca, but it has, and you have, a pretty significant crew and following here. Any message for those who are coming along on 29 July with regards what they can expect from you on the day? It's not often I get to play somewhere I've never been before, I'm pretty excited, so I'll be bringing my A game, dropping my kinda Techno and doing my best to smash the arse out of the place;

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




