




And the \$30,000 question is...

I Will Meditate And Then Destroy You:

WHY IS YOUR BOSS TALKING about mindfulness?

If you were permitted to look up from your desk for a few minutes this month you might have noticed an unusual phenomenon - groups of senior managers and their corporate lackeys heading solemnly towards the boardroom, except instead of laptops and coffee they're more likely to be carrying comfy pillows and bottles of water.

They all look calm, happy even; some might have taken their shoes off. If like me your first assumption was "Bad Q2 results. Somebody is about to get dropkicked into the pot plants and then smothered with a cushion" you'd be wrong, because what is happening is in fact the total opposite. Your boss, plus the Head of Offshore, even the mean lady from HR who resembles an iguana in circus makeup, are all getting together a couple of times a week for relaxation. They're meditating, like Steven Seagal or Dhalsim from Street Fighter, and soon they're going to calmly suggest that you start joining them to do it too. It's called "mindfulness" and it's the latest trend in the corporate environment. You'd better learn quick or you won't just be made to work Saturdays, you'll be made to come in at dawn to contemplate the perfect harmony of a single lotus flower whilst Janice from payroll silently prunes a tiny bonsai tree. The question, as the ancient master asked of his student, is why?

What is mindfulness and why has it replaced lunchtime aerobics?

Mindfulness (grossly simplified) is a therapeutic technique which works by calmly and carefully bringing your attention to experiences occurring in the present moment. In essence it's a simple form of meditation derived from Buddhist practice, although it need not have any religious or spiritual dimension, and can be practiced by anybody, at any time, in a wide variety of situations. The most surprising thing about mindfulness is that a habit that involves little more than subtly emptying your mind of active thoughts has been proven to have great psychological benefits for many conditions, from chronic pain to depression. Mindfulness and meditation genuinely work to improve your life by making you more aware of immediate experience and less affected by the kind of background stress which is ever-present yet so harmful to our modern existence. Om! Obviously this is all great, and I endorse it 100%, but it's the kind of thing you expect to learn from somebody who eats quinoa and says "namaste" a lot, not the people who made you walk to the office when it snowed and probably spent the 80s attending talc parties with caged midgets. If you asked most people to identify the largest sources of stress, chronic pain and depression in

their lives, most of them would point the finger towards the midget cagers or the HR iguana, so why are these people suddenly trying to help you chill out? It's no different to being pulled over at the Victoria Avenue speed trap and being offered a hip flask and a couple of horse tranquillisers by the man in the high vis jacket.

What are some great ways to improve employee productivity?

There are two main reasons why your employer might be interested in offering mindfulness sessions to their employees. I'll get number one out of the way first, as it doesn't offer as many opportunities for me to snipe at the managerial class. It requires me to acknowledge the possibility that your bosses really are concerned with your stress levels and have taken pragmatic steps to

cults like "kaizen" or "lean" - they can pretend it's some wholesome fantasy about Japanese efficiency, when the bottom line is solely the attraction of a work culture that expects a deranged, fanatical loyalty to the corporate line from anybody senior enough to be permitted a toilet break. There's a reason those salarymen flip out every now and then, and I'm not going to swap seeing my family on weeknights for half an hour of worksponsored calm in-between sales meetings.

Why can't we relax hard as well as work hard?

The unsurprising conclusion is that corporate mindfulness is only as good or bad as your general working environment. Beyond that there is an inescapable paradox about mindfulness in the corporate workplace, which is that the most beneficial outcome of focussed self-awareness will be the understanding that many of the things in life that cause us anxiety are pointless. We may even come to realise that it is completely within our power to reduce or remove many of these factors by choosing to effect meaningful change in our lives. In English, what this means is that if you meditate enough you'll discover that you

offer you some cost-effective help. I suppose this follows from the evidence that bad, stress-magnifying behaviour in the office is often mirrored in your supposed off time, and so good habits learned at work will extend to your private life. The net result of helping people be mindful appears to indicate lowered staff sickness rates, better performance at work and a marginally more pleasant working environment. If you've got a thoughtful boss, be thankful. Maybe think twice before keying their Bentley at the weekend.

With that out of the way, the second potential reason for throw cushions in the boardroom is that mindfulness is extremely cheap compared to other forms of psychological help, and if your HR stats appear to show that 65 hour weeks are working your client relationship managers to death then it's cheaper to apply the sticking plaster of 35 minutes of pseudo-zen timeout than it is to make any meaningful reductions to their workload. It's the same thing that attracts execs to other vaguely Eastern corporate

can permanently reduce your stress levels simply by refusing to work more than 35 hours a week. If that results in you needing to leave the corporate world and find an employer who doesn't expect you to answer emails on a Sunday morning, then your new mindful self will probably be able to manage life without that second Audi, putting the kids through private school or another skiing trip. On reflection it does seem a bit suspicious that my boss is paying for me to roll my office chair slowly down a path of enlightenment, winding ever closer towards the fateful day I burn my suit and take up work as a wandering cowherd, but I'm sure it's part of a devious longterm plan that will somehow result in me agreeing to do more work. Meanwhile I'm contemplating the realisation that existence is fleeting, aerobics was awful, and that I'm quite happy to go along with any corporate initiative that stops my co-workers from talking and reduces my chances of being smothered with a cushion.

FIND YOUR SPACE

As the world gets busier, our stress levels increase. Our phones can track our location, allow anyone to get hold of us at any time, and like to remind us of plans and schedules we'd rather forget about. Most of the time we crave an escape, so we can forget our technological world and just relax. But we all have different ways of doing so, with some more unusual than others.

Relaxation for the average person could come in the form of a bubble bath, putting your feet up and watching some trashy TV, or just getting to bed early. I, however, find organizing my make up drawer, fridge and wardrobe relaxing. Having a slight case of OCD for nothing but my own possessions makes organizing them relaxing. Having everything neat and tidy makes me feel calm. I know, I think it's sad too. But it comes down to the fact that I like finding order and structure in the mundane things if I start to feel like everything else is completely out of my control.

Others, however, find other ways of taking control relaxing. Cleaning, for instance, is said to be a way that people often calm themselves. Getting rid of the dirt around them is almost a metaphor for getting rid of the things that are acting as a burden and stressing them out. Another is exercising, particularly running or going to the gym. People love the natural high of endorphins and the sense of control and discipline they're maintaining despite the stress in their lives. A form of escapism some say, to find an oasis of calm in their own minds.

The way people relax, of course, depends a lot on their personality. However, I think it's safe to say that some of our perhaps odd habits are ones we choose to keep to ourselves. The kind of things you get up to when nobody else is around, which you will never want anybody else to witness. Like when it's 1am and instead of reading a book to get you off to sleep, you get the jar of Nutella out and sit in bed eating it by the spoonful whilst binge watching obscure YouTube videos. The mentality is, if you carry out this odd behavior alone, there's nobody around to judge you but yourself.

The more traditional ways of relaxation are activities such as reading a book, taking a bath, meeting friends, cooking or meditating. In fact, meditating is something that people around the world have still to rediscover, with the western world using mobile apps to aid their meditation. The one reason your phone is a key to relaxation.

The art of meditation, mindfulness and awareness has recently become a more mainstream way to stay grounded. In fact, these methods have made it further than just apps on your phone. A school in Baltimore

has reportedly turned their detention punishments into mindful meditation sessions, so students could really, truly, think about what they had done and reflect. And many other schools have followed suit, completely changing the traditional methods of dealing with "difficult" children.


Instead of punishing kids by making them sit in silence and seethe, teaching them to meditate gives them a chance to learn how to calm themselves. They practice breathing and meditating techniques, allowing them to become calm enough to discuss the situation at hand and be listened to

Mindful meditation has been around in some form or another for thousands of years. Recently, science has started looking at its affects on our minds and bodies, and is finding some interesting effects. Studies suggest practicing meditation improves a person's ability to focus, attention span, memory, and can help act as a sort of mental armor to help protect the mind against being overtaken by disruptive emotions.

"A school in Baltimore has reportedly turned their detention punishments into mindful meditation sessions, so students could really, truly, think about what they had done and reflect"

We know now that relaxation is paramount to keeping a healthy mind. Overworking ourselves and not prioritising down time for rest and recuperation ultimately leads to us becoming very wound up, angry individuals. Practicing meditation, or perhaps just being more mindful of our actions, thoughts and feelings, could be the key to finding balance in our lives. Or at least a moment of peace and calm, in a world that is, hopefully temporarily, in a state of chaos.

Autism Centre moves a step closer thanks to successful golf day

Autism Jersey aims to raise at least £1.5 million for the centre in a joint effort with the States of Jersey. It is envisaged that the centre will be operational in 2019.

They will work with you to regain the power and control of your situation and most importantly they will believe you and no, it's not or never will have been your fault!

The centre means that the Police don't have to be your first port of call if you've been sexually assaulted or raped as you can access the centre with or without Police involvement and you will be given the same level of care regardless of the choice you make. Dewberry house are able to arrange for a forensic medical examination and the crisis workers will be there to support you throughout and the samples taken during this will be stored in the SARC for two years. These samples can then be used at a later date if you decide to report the incident to the States of Jersey Police.

After the examination is complete you will be able to have a shower in a private bathroom, the crisis worker will give you any toiletries that you might need. Sometimes your clothes might be taken as evidence during an examination. If this happens they can provide you with a brand

new set of clothes such as new underwear, trousers and t-shirts. They stock both male and female clothes in all different sizes, because of course, this isn't just something that happens to women. You also have the choice to bring with you a change of clothes when you attend Dewberry House.

You'll also be offered support from a trained ISVA (Independent Sexual Violence Advisor). An ISVA is trained to look after your needs and to ensure that you receive

at Dewberry House within 30 minutes, day or night. If you feel that you would like to bring a friend or relative to support you we are happy for them to attend with you, you just need to let the Crisis Worker know that they are coming along with you.

care and understanding. They will explain how the criminal justice process works, and what would happen if you do wish to report to the Police. An ISVA is there to provide information only so that you can make the right decision for you.

The crisis worker that will speak to you on the phone will meet you unique experience and with that comes your own specific needs. Many victims who have been sexually assaulted explain that they will never forget, but what they do say is that they CAN recover. Dewberry House will help with your recovery and they have many agencies on the Island that they can refer you into if you choose.



Pre-nuptial agreements:

are they worth considering?

Before you get married or become civil partners you and your partner may want to consider what will happen to your assets if the relationship should break down. Discussing these issues early on can help ensure that solid foundations are in place to build your future together and to provide you both with some security and prevent difficulties arising in the future should the relationship unfortunately deteriorate.

Many couples may take the view that such discussions may highlight a lack of trust in the relationship, although the opposite may actually be more appropriate were such discussions serve to reinforce the couples' legal union is for love and not financial gain.

A pre-nuptial agreement should not be used as a tool to try and unfairly prejudice a partner in the eventuality that the couple divorce. Indeed, the Court will likely give little or any weight to a prenuptial agreement which is inherently unfair. The position remains that on a divorce an agreement between the parties cannot oust the jurisdiction of the Court and it is for the Court to consider what appropriate weight to give any such agreement.

Where a prenuptial agreement has been entered into freely and with a full understanding of the parties' assets and knowledge of the implications of the prenuptial agreement, the Court is likely to give great weight to the prenuptial agreement and hold the parties to the agreed terms. Irrespective, the Court will always want to ensure that its orders are fair and

just and should the prenuptial agreement not achieve that then the Court can and will depart from the pre-nuptial agreement.

Prenuptial agreements are not always appropriate for everyone and it depends on the circumstances of each case as to could be key to avoiding pitfalls later on, not only potentially within the marriage but also should a break down occur. A prenuptial agreement allows the parties to evidence their intentions at the outset and provide for more certainty in what may otherwise be a potentially uncertain and volatile area which

whether there is merit in considering one. Some circumstances where it may be appropriate to consider a prenuptial agreement include if you are getting married but have children from a previous relationship and you wish for your children to inherit certain assets, or you have inherited wealth that you wish not to leave the family should the marriage break down.

Regardless of whether a couple choose to enter into a prenuptial agreement, discussing financial arrangements early on may only be capable of resolution through draining and expensive litigation.

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It is often suggested that it is easy to write your own will if your wishes are simple and your financial situation isn't complicated. Preparing a will by yourself without incurring legal fees may be tempting, however a recent Jersey court case serves as a warning to those who may be tempted to undertake this DIY approach.

The deceased was a widower with two grown up children, a son and daughter, from an earlier marriage. In 2012 he made a handwritten will at a time when he was estranged from his son and his relationship with his daughter was at times strained. He nominated his friend as his executor with his daughter to assist. An executor is the person entrusted with dealing with the assets and liabilities of a deceased person and distributing the remaining assets to the beneficiaries. It is an onerous responsibility and one which carries personal liability should things go wrong.

The deceased died in June 2013 and soon after problems with the will began to surface. For a start, the appointment of the executor was ambiguous. This was "a major bone of contention" between the executor and the daughter, necessitating additional correspondence with the Registrar of Probate and legal advice for both parties. Taking place within just months of the deceased's passing, this resulted in undoubtedly unwelcome stress and cost for all concerned.

Additionally, the will did not deal with all of the deceased's assets but only with certain specific belongings, with an estimated value of £50,000. The remainder of his assets were worth in the region of £138,000 but they were not included in the will, which led to uncertainty as to the extent of the authority of the executor.

Although the Will stated that "I do not wish my son.....to receive any benefit at all from the estate", such statement failed to take account of the portion of the estate to which the son was entitled and it cost the estate more than £4,000 to resolve this issue.

The duties of an executor include being able to produce a true and perfect inventory and account of the estate. In 2016, the executor prepared and sent to the family the estate accounts, however, the daughter did not feel able to approve them and raised concerns as to the executor's handling of the estate. Given the history of the matter, the executor applied to the Royal Court to ask that it

or the estate but could be held personally responsible for the legal fees.

With all of these issues, and strained relations between the family and executor, fees in dealing with the estate amounted to more than £30,000. As a proportion of the value of the estate, such level of fees was considerable, and effectively reduced the beneficiaries' inheritance by nearly a fifth. Preparing a DIY will is clearly a risk, which can have significant financial implications for those who should be benefitting from the estate.

The Court commented that they found the executor to be "a sincere and genuine witness who felt that he owed the deceased a responsibility to deal with the estate". He took no personal benefit under the will

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Marriage vs. cohabitation

– what difference does it
make legally?

More and more couples are deciding to cohabit (live together) rather than get married or enter into a civil partnership. But does this make any difference as far as legal rights are concerned? Simply put, yes. There is a huge difference in the legal rights of married couples and civil partners compared with couples who choose to cohabit. Viberts' family law team is frequently asked the following questions by people cohabiting in Jersey.

Is 'common law marriage' a legal concept?

Contrary to popular belief, no. Unless you have entered into a valid marriage or civil partnership, the best way to deal with the rights and responsibilities relating to your cohabitation is to enter into a cohabitation agreement.

What rights do I have in respect of my children?

If you are an unmarried father and you have a child you will not have parental responsibility (PR) unless your name is on the birth certificate and your child was born on or after the 2nd December 2016. This means that most unmarried fathers will not automatically have PR. Not having PR could have a huge impact on your right to be involved in big decisions about your child. If you are married to the child's mother then you will automatically have PR. This is a key difference.

What happens if we buy a property together without being married or in a civil partnership?

You need to be very careful. If the relationship breaks down, your rights will depend on whether or not you hold the property jointly. If the property is in the sole name of one partner and you do not have a cohabitation agreement then you need to obtain urgent legal advice. Whereas if you are married the property will form part of the matrimonial pot for division whether you are a joint owner or not.

What is the position if one of us pays more towards the deposit and/or the on-going mortgage payments?

If you are cohabiting, your contributions need to be outlined in the cohabitation agreement. If you are married, such payments will form part of the list of considerations for dividing the matrimonial pot.

If I separate from my partner can I claim maintenance for me and/or the children?

If you are married, spousal maintenance and child maintenance will form part of the discussions during divorce or dissolution of the civil partnership. If you are cohabiting you are still able to claim child maintenance but cannot claim maintenance for yourself.

Will inheritance rights differ between married and unmarried partners?

The answer again is yes, your rights will be very different. If you are married or in a civil partnership and your partner dies you will have legal protection, but if you are cohabiting you won't unless death has been covered in a cohabitation agreement. In either case you must get legal advice urgently.

Conclusion

If you are not married to your partner (or in a civil partnership) your rights are very different and more limited. We would strongly advise you to see a family lawyer to draw up a cohabitation agreement. If you are married, you have many more legal rights which may turn into advantages (but sometimes disadvantages) if you separate. Again you should obtain legal advice before taking any steps to end your marriage or civil partnership to find out where you stand.







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Kerala India

Kerala turns this stereotype on it's head. Lonely Planet describes the state as India having passed through the looking glass. Occupying a 600km coastal slither of south India, golden palm fringed beaches butt up against a lush green tea and spice growing landscape, which in is turn crisscrossed by a labyrinth of canals and rivers known as the backwaters.

Six National parks provide picturesque home to wild Elephants, Indian Bison and the majestic yet elusive Bengal Tiger. It never fails to surprise me how many of my friends in Jersey have never so much as set foot on our most laid back neighbouring island. Summer days in Herm are little slice of paradise, and literally right on our doorstep.

With no traffic, crowds or distractions, life is stripped back to basic pleasures - tranquil shaded pathways, wild meadows, white sand beaches and picturesque cliff paths. When the sun is out and the sea just the right shade of blue, you could be forgiven for thinking you've teleported to the Seychelles. Herm is the next best thing to a desert Island, but you don't need to be Bear Grylls to survive here; there's a shop of course, to pick up a bucket & spade or a windbreak, a few beach kiosks and, essentially, The Mermaid Tavern, that just so happens to serve the best fish & chips in the Channel Islands. Probably.

A day trip is enough to start to feel yourself unbend, but for a true Herm experience you need to stay a night, or 3. Once the last Trident boat back to Guernsey departs and the sun starts to sink the atmosphere becomes more intimate. You're all in this together, inhabitants of an unspoilt Island, marooned until morning and ready to explore.

Seagull campsite, a selection of self-catering cottages and the luxurious White House Hotel let you decide just how Robinson Crusoe you want to be.

Get There: Sail via Guernsey with Condor Ferries and The Travel Trident, or splash out and ask Jersey Seafaris for a private charter quote.





With so much of the world to explore, it can be easy to forget the places closer to home. Just a hop and a skip from Jersey, the Lake District is England's largest national park and was awarded UNESCO world heritage status in July. With an arresting landscape that inspired the romantic musings of Wordsworth and Coleridge, a weekend exploring the lakes, pikes and picturesque market towns of Lakeland (as the locals call it) is a perfect antidote to the working week.

With surroundings this spectacular it's no surprise that many of the activities on offer take place in the great outdoors. Hiking, biking, and boating opportunities are abundant, but nobody would blame you for seeking out a comfortable spot and simply feasting your senses, gorging on crisp mountain air and breath-taking views. Bowness-on-Windemere, Ambleside and Kendal are tourist hotspots, for a quieter experience try Ennerdale or Cockermouth.

Should the great British weather not be in your favour then a selection of quirky attractions offer shelter. Laugh your troubles away at the Laurel & Hardy museum in Ulverston, or sharpen your knowledge at the Derwent Pencil Museum in Keswick.

Accommodation options range from campsites to luxury hotels, but a cosy Airbnb with a view would get my vote.

Get There: Fly from Jersey to Liverpool (Easyjet) or Manchester (Flybe) year-round, and pick up a hire car and explore at your leisure.



In the age of Netflix and bittorrent it's pretty easy to enjoy both high quality movies and the latest cinema releases in the comfort of your own home. Once you're done with House of Cards, you can search Netflix or Amazon for classic cinema. However, even if you've got a 50 inch TV, it's not quite the same as watching a film in a cinema on the big screen with an audience who all want to be there, enjoying it with you.

Well, if film is your thing, you're not alone. It turns out there's a society for people just like you. We've long seen the poster in the Arts Centre but often forgotten to highlight the work of the The Jersey Film Society, a non-profit run entirely by volunteers who love film. The society has been around for 70 years and has a manifesto to encourage the interest in and study of films and allied visual techniques as an art form and as a medium of information and education, to encourage an intelligent and discriminating attitude towards films and allied visual techniques and to enable its members to see films of cultural, artistic or technical merit as well as films which, owing to the age, country of origin, lack of appeal to the general public or for any other reason, are not normally shown in commercial cinemas. You don't have to be a member to see a film. You can pay on the door (£5 adults £3 students) but if you love film, it's pretty cheap to join for the year at £29 or £48 for a joint membership (at the same address etc) or £18 for students; working out a about a pound a film. They offer a half year membership deal half way through the season.

As part of their 70th Anniversary Celebrations they're putting on a free outdoor screening of Casablanca at First Tower Park (aka St Andrews Park) as you're picking up this edition (Saturday 2nd Setpember). The film will start at 8pm but they're encouraging picnickers to come along from 6. The Chugging Pig van also be on hand from 6pm for food. A new Art Centre

This month art consultancy CCASM Contemporary present their first display in their offices on Phillips Street in St Helier. As CCASM is a consultancy designed to bring the very best of the international art market to Jersey, the theme of the first display at Sommerville House combines two of the pillars of the era of Modern and Contemporary Art, High Modernism and Abstract Expressionism. The library room houses a small survey of the print work of Henry Matisse, spanning his output from 1900 to 1950 and is given some context by the current survey of the artist's work at the Royal Academy in London. Matisse, along with Picasso, is arguably one of the two greatest artists of the 20th century.

The main viewing room is filled with works inspired by Matisse's late colour cut-outs, made by some of the most famous American artists in history. The Abstract Expressionist group changed art practice for all the subsequent generations of artists, and CCASM are very pleased to show works by 4 artists that span the wider group in age and style, including the three most senior members of the group who still have unique works available on the market. The four artists are headlined by one of the true heavyweights of post war painting, Robert Motherwell, and the exhibition also includes rare and very beautiful works Sam Francis, Helen Frankenthaler and Jon Schueler.

The display will run from September 15th until November 3rd and is open by appointment at CCASM Contemporary, Sommerville House, Philips Street (opposite the Arts Centre).





Artists to be Marooned

Next month, ArtHouse Jersey (formerly Jersey Arts Trust) will be producing its fourth Artist Lock-In at Elizabeth Castle, which will see 12 artists from different disciplines, backgrounds and countries collaborate artistically and create shared work. In association with WildWorks and Jersey Heritage, the Artist Lock-In is a professionally facilitated residency project that provides artists with time and space to consider new ways of working.

The artists will be in residence at the castle from Sunday 1st October until Tuesday 10th October and will be taken through a series of tasks that encourage teamwork and creative thinking. As the residency progresses, the tasks will become more focused until the participants are left to work together to make shared pieces that will be showcased to an audience in the final two days.

The Lock-in will again be facilitated by Sue Hill who is the Associate Director of WildWorks - the renowned international theatre company best known for its 2011 production of 'The Passion' with Michael Sheen in Port Talbot. From 2000 - 2006, Sue was also the Artistic Director for the Eden Project, developing their innovative interpretation strategy, commissioning artists, writers and performers to illuminate Eden's ideas and messages.

Changing of the seasons at Jersey Arts Centre


September sees the start of a brand new season at Jersey Arts Centre and this coming month is a particularly good one for lovers of live music!





Here we go again... My eyes lose focus and I become aware of tension building at the top of my neck where it joins my head. I know that a headache is brewing. When my eyeballs begin to ache, I know I need to think about resting or finding some medication to stave off the inevitable. Because if left too long, the pain will become unbearable, I won't be able to stand the bright lights and the nausea will eventually cripple me.

If this sounds familiar to you as a headache or migraine (think of a migraine as a bigger headache) sufferer, then you are not alone. As a physiotherapist, this is the all too familiar story. Headaches (there are over 300 different types) and, by extension, migraines are surprisingly common. With headache disorders being the third highest cause of days off from work worldwide, it is reassuring to think that that most headaches are treatable with effective physiotherapy. Despite this, few people seek treatment, possibly because we have accepted the common headache as part of everyday life, most medical management uses medication, not physiotherapy, to treat the headache symptoms.

It doesn't need to be this way. In response to this The Jersey Sports & Spinal Clinic (JSSC) is launching a brand new headache clinic. It aims to help people regain control of their headaches and their lives. If you suffer from regular headaches you'll understand what I mean.

Confusingly, people often also complain of pain in the back of the head and neck during a headache. A debate has existed in medicine as to whether the nerves and tissues of the neck and upper cervical spine can actively contribute to headaches. These are known as cervicogenic headaches (i.e. coming from the cervical, or top, region of the spine) and there is a slowly growing body of evidence that is showing that treatment to the neck can reduce headaches and migraines for a significant proportion of sufferers.

Whether the neck is the cause of, or part of, a headache, careful attention to the neck and its relationship to the headache Using a series of gentle techniques (no cracks or manipulations) devised by The Watson Headache Institute, we address the source of the headache and not just calm the symptoms. This treatment is unique to the movements of the upper three spinal joints of the neck. During the course of treatment headaches will lessen in frequency and severity. Once your headache is better controlled or completely disappeared, exercise routines, Pilates classes, running programmes or relaxation/mindfulness techniques can be incorporated to help address the external factors that may be contributing to the symptoms.



Jess Stanier is a girl on the move. Talking to her about her ideas is intoxicating and the energy she's bringing to her new brand Frank & Betties exemplifies this twenty-something's motivation to create with a conscience. Ahead of a range of exciting projects involving socially responsible production and fashion, Jess has established an online store and pop up selling her vision of 50s inspired dresses and unique shirts and denim.

Having always loved pin-up dresses and 1950s style, she had saved some money but kept putting it off. It took a friend to say 'what are you waiting for, make it happen now or you never will' to prompt her to borrow a bit of extra cash and crack on.

After building her website herself with help from YouTube, she met with a lot of suppliers, many of whom were not happy for her to handpick the clothing. She finally found some who were, chose stock, made an order and 'spent about 40 hours ironing everything!'. After meeting some pin-up and 1950s dress brands in UK, she became Channel Islands supplier for Lindybop! It was then full steam ahead; 'I spent six days driving myself nuts trying to choose a name but then collaborated with a local artist on logo and design, booked into Reasons as my first event and decided

to do glitter make up (utilising an NVQ in beauty) to get people to the stand. The results showed through, "My amazing friends and boyfriend worked their butts off for free to help me get the business going and have been my staff for each event!'.

The website was live for a month before the first event and Jess sold an item of clothing every day and is now getting orders from the UK. Groove De Lecq and Gorey Fete followed, putting money earnt back in to the business. She's now being asked to order specific items and is making custom pieces, learning how to embroider and getting advice from people who have made it in the area already, via Instagram.

@Gypsyshrine, for example, a girl who left her job last year to do glitter at festivals and now employs six staff, and a line in Topshop and Superdrug.

The next plan is to craft more locally and collaborate with local artists to set up a Frank & Betties 'marketplace' on the website to encourage those without websites to sell their products and support local talent. Having advertised for an intern and received over 20 applicants, intern Poppy

is now running her first social media campaign and planning an event for the business, perpetuating the

ethos of bringing individual, sustainable fashion to their customers. The objective? To see people 'rocking their clothes and sparkling with a bit of glitter'. Nothing wrong with that!


St John: Bonne Nuit Beach Café 'Thai on the beach'



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St Ouen: Faulkner Fisheries at L'Etacq 'Seafood Saturday'





We met up with the very lovely Katie Dunn founder of Katie's Kitchen to find out about her organic bakery.

So how did this all come about?

When I had my children I became far more aware of what went into food and tried to buy organic wherever possible, however due to the limited options I had to roll up my sleeves and start creating my own treats for them. This escalated and my love for cooking flourished. I began to bake using ancient flours such as khorasan, spelt and rye. A partnership with The Organic Shop soon developed where I baked scones, teacakes, breads and pastries for them, made using specialist flours and organic ingredients. I'm fortunate that my products got a wonderful following and Katie's Kitchen was born.

Do you love it?

Yes, I really do and the feedback from folk who haven't been able to eat bread in years is brilliant. There are a lot of people out there who are unable to eat shop bought breads due to the chemicals they contain or wheat intolerances and yet they can devour a loaf of my organic version no problem! There is a big appetite for these product on the island from thousands of conscientious foodies.

We hear that your raw chocolate truffles are amazing, what are they?

I've become caught up in the raw chocolate revolution! I was determined that I could make my own without the use of refined sugar which a lot of the raw chocolate still contains. Our farm is in Trinity and we produce and sell 100% grass fed beef and lamb direct to customers. We pride ourselves on farming in harmony with nature; our livestock are entirely grass fed, and just relax in the fields, eating as much grass as they choose.

Our beef boxes and lamb boxes are available to buy in the Autumn. Boxes contain a selection of roasting joints, steaks, chops, stewing steak, mince etc. and we deliver them direct to your door. The meat comes individually wrapped and labelled, ready to pop in the freezer (you'll need the same sort of space for about 2-3 loaves of bread), or you can of course cook it straight away. We send an email to our customers when we have meat available - and orders are taken on a first come first served. So we'd always recommend you're quick to reply, as we always sell out fast!

We love what we do, and whilst at the moment it's just a hobby (we both have other day jobs) we are hoping to expand the farm, and our range of Douet Farm produce. We'd love to start producing goat's milk, goat's cheese and kid meat as well as pastured eggs, and have just put in a planning application which will enable us to do this. Watch this space!

Field Farm in St. Lawrence was once a large 23 vergee potato field but is now the farm and home of myself and my husband David. The journey has not been smooth, it took us nearly 20 years to convert a dream into a reality.

Although I grew up on a sheep farm I actually followed a career in Radiography for 35 years. On the grand scale of things the farm is relatively small, but fortunately each individual branch of the business has been successful, as they say... I didn't want to put all my eggs into one basket!

I started by importing Lleyn sheep from Wales and sell half lamb boxes in the autumn. I also offer work experience to veterinary students during lambing season. Alongside this I also sell eggs, hybrid and pure-breed chickens and have just started breeding pygmy goats, you may have seen the first of these get rather a lot of attention on Facebook. In addition, I run short half-day seasonal courses -'Lambing Live' during the spring, smallholding and poultry courses during the summer - appropriately called 'Hen Parties for Beginners'.

My ethos has always been producing top quality products from animals with the highest standard of welfare. I very much hope this is also reflected in our handmade 100% Sparkling, Cloudy Apple juice. With absolutely no water or sugar added - just a little fizz! Although we do have some ingenious kit to help us achieve this, it really is very much a labour of love! We make it from a blend of traditional culinary and dessert English apple varieties and were delighted to be awarded a 'Great Taste' award in 2015. We believe we are the only people producing this in the UK. It can

be purchased from the farm, and our main café outlets -Coopers, Plemont and Café Ubé.



The Chapelle de La Maison in Gorey is a building that many people will be familiar with, certainly those that may have walked past the imposing former Methodist church which sits in the very heart of Gorey village.

I've often wondered what it looks like on the inside whilst driving by. A conversion of this kind is very high up on my property wish list and this example really is something else. The Chapelle was converted in 2009 into a highly insulated eco-friendly high specification home which, whilst retaining its church-like exterior, is a million miles away from any church I've spent my Sundays in. This property is simply stunning.

As you enter through either one of the traditional doors to the front of the property you can't help but appreciate how vast the building is. The front third of the entire building has been converted into a full height atrium, which rises to 14 metres at its apex, it results in a real flip-top head, jaw dropping moment as soon as you enter. The construction and space that greets

you is certainly a surprise. All of the 'walls' connecting the atrium with the living area are made of toughened glass which allow an abundance of light to flood into all areas of the property and you can see the full height of all four of the buildings

The ground floor is very much about open plan living, combining the wow factor of the huge amount of space and period windows throughout. The kitchen is a chef's dream with beautiful granite worktops on the large central island coupled with so much preparation space that you'll feel like inviting your friends around and staging your own version of Saturday Kitchen. There's even room for the film crew. The full complement of Miele appliances take pride of place and if you need more space for storage or appliances then there is plenty of available in the large utility room to the back of the house. This room also offers direct access to the exterior of the property, making it incredibly easy and convenient for entering the house after you've been to shop for those visitors.

The owners have made the most of the original granite structure, retaining all its distinctive window and door openings, but providing a luxurious interior with a high end contemporary style and finish. ground source heat pump system makes the building like a living breathing project, direct from an episode of Grand Designs.

The accommodation on the first floor offers a master bedroom suite, the likes of which I'm not sure I've seen before. It includes not one but two bathrooms; his and hers perhaps, as one has a bath and the other a wet-room. All rooms overlook the atrium but the bedroom has the added bonus of inbuilt electronic blinds, so you can quickly achieve privacy if you need it. There are also dressing areas at each end of the bedroom and plenty of inbuilt wardrobes. On this floor there are a further two smaller bedrooms and a fabulous family bathroom. The second floor offers two further en-suite bedrooms and an office.

On the top floor you'll find the piece de resistance, a Jacuzzi style hot tub suite. No really, it's a suite. There's a wine fridge, television and a sink too. You really wouldn't want to have to go back down to the kitchen once you've come up here, so it's all about practicality. Thanks to the property's full glass ceiling you have views of the whole of Gorey right across to the castle and the sea. This would be the room you'd find me in most evenings.

The house is accessed by driving through the village, offering entry through electronically controlled gates. Inside there is space to park five cars. Outside the house there is an easily maintainable walled garden and both the Common and Long Beach are just a few moments walk away.

Chasing each other's heels throughout their education (and even taking the same role a year after one other at Round House Design) Josh Renouf and Jack Seymour prove their must be some seriously creative juices flowing through the waters at Victoria College and Nottingham Trent University.

The young designers also found themselves side by side atop the polls of the International MADE.com competition who, through TalentLab - a platform for emerging designers with topical briefs, offer the chance to have winnings designs manufactured and sold online. This year the brief was to design a piece of furniture inspired by 'a material of your choice', whether it were the material's appearance, history or manufacture that influences the design. Taking time away from the drawing board, they shared the thoughts of two inventive young minds.

CONGRATULATIONS ON ALL YOUR VOTES IN THE MADE COMPETITION, TELL US ABOUT YOUR FINAL DESIGNS:

Jack- In response to the brief, I designed Tura, a mid-century style cabinet constructed of fibre cement, inspired by the rhythm of architecture. Pioneered by architects such as Walter Gropius in the 1950's, fibre cement is widely used within the construction industry as a cladding material on the exterior shell of a building.

Josh- I designed a contemporary trio of stackable tables in 4 glass colour

ranges inspired by the over-lapping of glass and how it creates different shades of that colour depending on the number of layers. I managed to get over 200 votes and came 2nd after I shamelessly plugged it on social media. However, it turns out that votes alone didn't form the basis of the selection. A design of woven felt took the prize.

JACK, WAS THERE A PIVOTAL MOMENT THAT MADE YOU DECIDE TO PURSUE THIS PATH?

Not so much a pivotal moment but rather lots of experiences have shaped this path. The support and opportunities throughout the years of Victoria College really prepares you for whatever you set out to do thereafter; the diversity that comes from this has always amazed me. My background in furniture design instilled an early appreciation for the

craftsmanship that goes into designed objects. This was emphasised by practical workshop time at university which created an understanding of materials and processes. I then took a year out in London working for a bespoke kitchen design company (Roundhouse Design) which helped develop a deeper understanding of spatial design and user experience within a three-dimensional environment. My focus on furniture design stems from the attributes it shares with architecture and the fashion industry; architecturally, scale and proportion play its part whilst following the trends of fashions style.

JOSH, YOU HAVE ACCOLADES FOR YOUR DESIGN OF THE **BARISIEUR, TELL US ABOUT IT**

It was only really then that I had to make the conscious design that I would give it a go and pursue getting the product to market.

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CRYPTO TRIPLE HEADER

JTC, Carey Olsen and Global Advisors Holdings Limited (Global Advisors), have all collaborate to work on the first regulated, crypto-denominated fund. CoinShares Fund I, which launched this summer, is a self-managed fund and will receive investment exclusively in Ether (which runs the Ethereum platform).

The fund will then trade cryptocurrencies and other tokens (or 'coins'), including participating in selected Initial Coin Offerings (ICOs). ICOs are the crypto-alternative to the Linux or Mozilla Foundations, and represent a form of capital raising increasingly utilised by entrepreneurs in the crypto arena, regularly inviting comparison with traditional venture capital or crowdfunding.

The fund will be regulated under Jersey's recently introduced Private Fund Regime. This regime is designed specifically for funds operating with a small number of very sophisticated investors, with the proportionate regulatory environment offering an impressive speed to market. Look out for ICOs, they'll be getting more common!



LOCAL IOD WINNERS HEAD TO LONDON

Four senior individuals from across Jersev's private and public sectors have been shortlisted in the national finals of the Institute of Directors (IoD) UK Director of the Year Awards, which take place this month. 

IN A STRANGE CASE OF ROLE REVERSAL, IT SEEMS THAT THESE DAYS FORD'S MUSTANG IS GATHERING MORE MOMENTUM IN THE EUROPEAN MARKET AS THEIR FOCUS RS SALES ACCELERATE IN THE UNITED STATES. THAT'S NOT TO SAY THAT THE MUSTANG IS ANY LESS POPULAR OVER THERE OR THE FOCUS SALES HAVE STALLED OVER HERE, MIND, THEY'RE JUST VERY DIFFERENT ANIMALS THAT SEEM TO HAVE EVOLVED TO ADAPT TO DIFFERENT SURROUNDINGS.

This might come as somewhat of a perplexing statement, but the Ford Focus RS is rowdy yet with a distinct amount of comfort and refinement, whereas the mighty five litre Ford Mustang is comfortable and refined with a distinct amount of rowdiness. If you've not managed to get your head around that, I'll explain.

You see, driving along minding your own business in the Focus RS is fairly uneventful. Everything you need is within reach, it's comfortable and there level of cabin noise is almost zero. This is a Ford Focus remember, a bestselling hatchbatch that took over from the British institution that was the Ford Escort, a vehicle perfected as the result of vast consumer research and careful ergonomic consideration, and it shows - the only real reminder that you're in the flagship model are the seat bolsters hugging you at all times. The thing is, as a result of this it just makes sense and if you're struggling to justify owning a 350bhp car the fact that owning a


performance orientated Focus *makes sense* should be all you need to convince yourself. Or your significant other.

Do you know what else makes sense though? Selecting a more exciting driving mode and putting your right foot forward. Crackles, pops and bangs from the exhaust, no discernible turbo lag, stiffened suspension and all-wheel drive will mean you're in for a lot of fun and I don't doubt that these are a hoot around the track. Not to mention that the journey there and back would be peaceful and comfortable and, most importantly, there'd be plenty of room in the boot for a set of spare wheels, because let's be honest with ourselves here, if you start getting to grips with the drift mode and suddenly find yourself channeling your inner Ken Block you might also find yourself getting through a tyre or two on track! Slightly spirited driving on the road over here is still good fun though, with possibly even what feels like a feint hint of torque steer at times adding a bit of drama

and although this might just be an illusion caused by the abysmal state of some of our roads (Infrastructure Minister please take note) it's no bad thing in my eyes and just conjured up a feeling of nostalgia from the days where Ford's Escort RS Turbo was king. Because they were definitely a handful at times. A fitting tribute to its forefather, I'd say. The Nitrous Blue metallic paint on the car we tested is exclusive to this model and really stands out when the light catches it. As if the mean stance, debossed spoiler and black alloys didn't do that already.

Where the RS is nimble, pointy and instant, the Mustang is less so. But that's totally okay. This American steed is a big brute but once she starts galloping you're away, and, whilst keeping you on your toes she's completely manageable if you treat her with respect. And that's what I like about her. I'll not lie, I enjoyed driving both of these cars back to back but was expecting to want to take the Focus RS home given the choice. Not necessarily, however.

This isn't because of the more luxurious interior with a leather-clad dashboard, details with a brushed aluminium effect finish, retro-looking switch gear or quilted stitching on the door cards and it isn't even because of the unmistakable and dare I say unbeatable soundtrack provided by its 435bhp, five litre V8 engine. It isn't because of any of those things, as good as they all are. It's because in comparison it all feels a bit, well, loose. It goes without saying that there's enough grunt to break traction at the rear tyres with ease but it's the combination of softer suspension, plenty of torque on tap and its lazier automatic gearbox that keep you on edge and provide involvement in an entirely different way once you've switched the traction control off. That's just what driving is all about to me; the challenge. The Focus RS is almost too good at doing exactly what you want it to. The Mustang keeps you on your toes.

Despite all of this, when you pop the Mustang into drive, keep the traction control on and burble around the mood is infinitely more relaxing. It's smooth, supremely comfortable and despite not being of insignificant size is entirely manageable. There's no denying that huge bonnet ahead of you as well as the illusion

of width created by the low roof line but at no point did it ever feel too big, a nod to the original Mustang of the sixties that was a much more compact offering than that of its contemporaries. It doesn't end there though, as those muscular rear wheelarches and trio of vertical rear lights are both an unmistakable homage to the Mustang's well established roots.

What you see pictured above are two different cars, two very different animals, yet with one very similar price tag. If you feel like challenging your perception of what a modern hot hatch or muscle car feels like I'd recommend heading down to Trust Ford on Rue de Galet just off Victoria Avenue to see what either or both of these two Fast Fords are capable of because, like me, you might just be surprised. Refinement in rowdiness or rowdiness in refinement? You choose.

SHE SELLS SANCTUARY

WHERE DO YOU FIND SANCTUARY? WHERE DO YOU HEAD FOR SHELTER FROM THE WORLD AND RELAX WHEN YOU NEED IT MOST? I'M FAR FROM RELIGIOUS, BUT WITH MY WORKBENCH AS AN ALTAR AND A PAIR OF WORN OUT GLOVES AND UNTOUCHED SAFETY GOGGLES WATCHING OVER ME OMNISCIENTLY, MY GARAGE IS MY CHURCH. I MUST CONFESS, IT'S EASY TO LAPSE BUT THE MOMENT YOU STEP BACK INSIDE AND TEND TO YOUR SHEEP. THEY TEND TO OFFER FORGIVENESS.

Earlier this month, local artist and motorbike enthusiast Mike Etienne paid a visit to Gallery HQ to let us know about the latest incarnation, or should that be reincarnation of his bike Tronti, which he refers to as a 'Café Köter', a café racer mongrel pieced together from myriad parts over the course of a couple of decades. This struck a chord with me, as I've been working on a similar project of my own for the past eighteen months inspired by the bikes of yesteryear, albeit based on a bike from the 1980s. It's a homage to the bikes that my father couldn't have been seen dead on in his youth whilst growing up in London and sporting a parka, a slightly more modern interpretation of the Triumphs and Nortons that the youth of the 1950s would tear off anything at all superfluous from in an effort to gain membership to the ton-up club, the ability to

exceed one hundred miles per hour. Buy the best bike you can, make it as fast as possible, be quicker than your mates. Racing from one transport café to the next trying to reach that elusive three figure target on their speedometers, it was a culture originally exclusive to the rockers of the fifties and sixties but it's a culture that, whilst diluted, is a lot more inclusive these days. The likes of Instagram as well as savvy bike manufacturers offering retrostyled bikes off the shelf with an almost non-exhaustative list of optional extras to make your bike a little more individual than the next one to be wheeled off of the production line have aided the resurgence of the café racer and, if I'm honest, I think I'm okay with that. For a petrolhead, the joy and satisfaction that you get from hitting the road on a bike that you've had

almost completely in parts and rebuilt yourself with your own artistic vision is indescribable. After the first few rides, that is, where you're constantly questioning whether or not you spanner-checked every nut and bolt. Especially the ones that hold the wheels, brakes and suspension on.

Sure, I could've probably bought a brand new bike by the time you add up the costs of sourcing or fabricating your own parts and poring hour upon hour over the tiniest of details to get the fit and finish just right, but this isn't just a hobby, it's bordering on therapy as well as having a social purpose. My friends build bikes and cars; we all muck in, have a laugh, inspire each other, share ideas and differing perspectives, be it in real life or through social media. And with social media at our fingertips

we can be inspired and compare notes. with strangers that share our passion too. During my own build I've discussed ideas with an artist and industrial designer in Germany building a similar bike as well as had a walkaround of another during an Instagram live feed from a guy based in the Netherlands that I stumbled upon by pure coincidence one night in the garage whilst waiting for the kettle to boil. It was a surreal experience. Someone else doing what I was doing at exactly the same time, hundreds of miles away, being watched by thirty or so people and discussing ideas with me to an audience of voyeurs. It's still a community like it was at the beginning, except we're just physically further apart, yet brought closer together through technology. An almost ironic statement given that the idea was originally to keep everything a pared down and low-tech as possible.

Mike's bike has pushed the boundaries further still and brewed them with art, evolving the revered Triton hybrids of Triumph engine and Manx Norton frame devised at the birth of the café racer subculture by adding Ducati wheels, forks and brakes, hence the name, a contraction of Triumph, Norton and Ducati; Tronti. He describes the bike as a kinetic sculpture. functional art with subtle details that provide an often tongue-in-cheek nod to the bike's roots. Espresso cup mirrors, for example, or actual coffee grounds mixed into the paint for a unique finish. Originally taking three years to build in the late nineties, time and use took its toll and

ultimately led to the bike's reinvention this year where the hard work and vision paid off as Tronti bagged 'Best Motorcycle In Show' at the Jersey International Motoring Festival. Tronti had previously received a number of awards in both show and race categories in France, England and the Isle of Man and it seems that even those big Ducati discs and calipers up front won't be stopping her from picking up further

Café racer culture may have changed significantly over the decades but the idea is still to test your own abilities, be that in the workshop, in the saddle or both if you have the passion, inclination and willingness to develop your mechanical skils.

If that doesn't sound like it's for you, however, that's not to say you shouldn't get involved. After all, you *could* go and



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MAKING WWAVES

Representing team GB at 'The America's Cup Endeavour Junior Hobie Wave Regatta', 15 year olds Finlay Arena and Tom Hunt, were in fact lined up to feature in our 'On a Boat' issue back in June but were (most suitably) busy on a boat at the time. These fine young sailors were competing against some of the stiffest hand picked competition hailing from 12 countries around the world to take home the junior title in this years competition in Bermuda. Now firmly back on dry land with their sea legs at bay, we met up with the boys along with Gordon Burgis, Hobie racing events organiser at the Royal Channel Island Yacht Club, to hear a tale or two from the Hobie high seas.

Gordon firstly, what are Hobie Cats and how did Hobie find its way to Jersey?

Myself and a group of surfing friends introduced Hobie Cats to Jersey back in 1985 having seen them in California. The Hobie Cat is a fast, fun and colourful beach catamaran that literally flies across the waters and I knew with the conditions in Jersey they would be ideal to sail here. The Royal Channel Island Yacht Club has the largest Hobie Cat fleet participants in the UK, you'll be able to see most of the boats lined up on the white sand at Gunsite beach.

Boys, where did you first start taking an interest in Hobie Cats?

Tom- I have always had a love for water sports and started out sailing dinghies in the cadet program which is for 11-16 year olds. Finlay and I then met four years ago when we both started out on the optimists boats which are starter sailing dinghies then you can move up to larger youth training catamarans called dragoons. We help out coaching the younger cadets too which we love!

Finlay- After we did our level 4 qualifications, we went on Hobie Cats crewing about a year ago with other people. It takes serious team work to guide around markers using the sail with the wind on the open waters so we have to work really tightly together. But when we're not competing it is really relaxing to sail on a Hobie Cat in the sun on a calm and clear day.

Congratulations on your 2nd place in Bermuda, tell us about the competition-

Tom- On day 1 we had a practice racing day around the circuit which gave us the chance to adjust to new waters and check out the competition; with other boats from 12 nations navigating around different courses.

At first we were worried because some of the other teams were younger and lighter than us so could move quicker but once we relaxed, we did really well on the practice sessions out of 7 races putting us in a good frame of mind for the next day.

Finlay- Day 2 was where the competition kicked-off and we had our first day of racing with a total of 7 races. We were really pleased to improve our position as the racing went on against some of the International teams, some who were National squad sailors.

What were the main highlights for you both?

Tom- On the last day we were lucky enough to be invited to race at "The America's Cup Village", located in the Royal Naval Dockyard which is a sailing spectators arena for the America's Cup competition with a grand stand and huge screens. We raced in front of 2,000 people and the world's media which was an incredible experience and we placed second in the Showcase exhibition race, which was won by the second team representing GB, so a great result all round.

Finlay- The highlights for me were being invited by Sir Ben Ainslie's Land Rover BAR team GB to visit their compound and view the British America's Cup boat up close and see what goes on behind the scenes, this was an amazing experience for us, but unfortunately we weren't allowed to take any photographs due to boat security!

Has this inspired your sights for the future? Finlay- Totally! The America's Cup juniors program is a legacy from the America's cup, we got to sail alongside the America Cup boats and that was really inspiring for me.

Tom- It's 3 years until the next cup so we're going to start looking at The Hobie Europeans and World Championships in the next 1 and 2 years. At 16 years old you can go onto the full size hobie cats so that's the next step.

Gordon- In the past, there have been 2 Hobie 16 European Championships and a Nationals successfully staged in Jersey. With the Spring, Summer and Winter series competitions plus the Yacht Clubs Regattas and Channel Islands Championships, there are a total of around 52 races throughout the year! So plenty of organising and training to do.

Gordon you've seen many competitions over the years, what did you make of the comp in Bermuda?

This was without doubt an amazing and well organised International Junior Hobie Wave Regatta, set up as an America's Cup sailing legacy for junior and Youth sailing in Bermuda. We are certainly priviledged to have had two RCIYC Cadet sailors representing Jersey and GB, participating in this major sailing event for youngsters from around the world, an experience I'm sure they'll never forget. Appleby were the official legal partner of the America's Cup, the biggest partnership they have ever undertaken! We were so delighted that they sponsored Finlay and Tom's trip enabling them to go to Bermuda to compete which the boys will always be so grateful for.

Finlay & Tom- We really want to say a big thanks to Appleby for their sponsorship, support and the gift bag they gave to us both too. And a big thank you as well to the Royal Channel Islands Yacht Club and Gordon Burgis and David Carter for their guidance, mentorship and support.



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For some, finding the perfect path in life can be as easy as taking a trip to the beach. Ryan Hervé knew instantly watching surfers at the age of nine, that this was what he would do with his life. A decision that has served him well as he is now the owner of an established surfboard business that supplies Jersey, the UK and Europe.

Once a surfing mecca, Jersey is now reclaiming some of its former glory as the sport grows in popularity and the community searches for new waters and the next great ride. For the dreamers amongst us, it's comforting to know that maybe there really is something in the water.

Desperate to leave school, Ryan spent much of his education doodling board designs, waiting for the bell to sound so that he could hit the waves. "Back then surfing wasn't as cool as it is now," Ryan explains, "but for me it was addictive, I was hooked by the surge of adrenalin and that first taste of water in my mouth."

Ryan knew then that his dream was to work in the surf industry, surfing is one of the few times when he could lose himself, relax and become lost in the moment.

At the age of 18, Ryan opened his surfboard factory, making boards for friends and local surfers. Much of his success has been down to impressing people and growing his client base through reputation. "It's a tough industry to break into," Ryan explains, "I had to prove I could pump out good boards at the start and even now I am only just breaking into the French market." Only from frequently travelling to France and embedding himself within their community

has he been able to get a foot in the door, impressing them with his unique designs.

These designs have evolved over time into two distinct brands; the original Hervé hallmark which focuses on retro shapes, resin tints with gloss and polish finishes and Nutz surfboards, which have a more modern feel, using cutting edge materials to produce lightweight high-performance surfboards. Talking about the current popularity of the Hervé brand Ryan remarks that "surfers just seem to want to embrace

Despite globe trotting, surfboard under arm, Jersey has always remained home for the surfer. "The heart of surfing in Europe seems to be moving," explained Ryan. "It used to be Hossegor, but now it is shifting to places like Peniche and Ericeira in Portugal. But I'm thrilled that Jersey is now starting to gain recognition on an international platform." The Channel Islands have become their own governing body and this year attended their first ISA World event in Biarritz.

Surfing is a booming business and after 25 years in the industry, Ryan finally feels on the cusp of achieving great things. "Big

> brands may seduce people with their advertising, but there is no substitute for what I offer, which is a tailor-made, custom service." Ryan works with his customers to create their vision, educating them along the way as to how their boards

work in the water and accommodate each person's height and weight.

For most of his life, Ryan has worked single handed and admits it can be challenging at times to find motivation. But he isn't short of that at the moment with his wife set to give birth to their first child next month. "Right now I'm eager to grow the business as much as will be manageable for me, to provide for my family's future." Be sure to keep an eye on Jersey's beaches, because I have a feeling Ryan Hervé is about to make some big ripples.

A NEW OBSESSION

It takes a certain type of individual to be a DJ. It's pretty high context and the dedication and commitment to their chosen genre is often something only those that do the same thing and feel the same way can truly empathise with. Whether the hunt for new vinyl in days of old, or hours spent poring over Beatport these days - it's a labour of love. Transform that dedication into producing and you've got a whole new level of intricacy and singular attention.

This month we got sent the new album from Stuart King. Those that have been around clubs in Jersey over the last few decades will recognise the name. We were looking at some early Gallery editions recently and we used to take his tune of the month recommendation each month. These days his tunes are his own. It's been a journey

for Stuart, breakdancing as a kid in the 80's led on to getting caught up in the Acid House movement and then setting up bunker parties and raves. As he progressed, his style developed, taking through the notorious Inn on the Park days and on to a meeting of minds with local producer Marc Mitchell. They released several singles such as Paladian Dawn and Healing Dream, which had a major impact on the Progressive trance scene. Their remixes, such as Art of Trance's Kaleidoscope and Visions - Coming Home were "hammered" by Sasha and Digweed and used by the latter as the opening track on his Radio 1 Essential mix, live from Amnesia in Ibiza.

The duo went on to sell over 50,000 singles and remixed the likes of Jean Michel Jarre, Way Out West, Deepsky, Sunscreem, Brothers In Rhythm and Daphne for labels such as Sony, D.M.C, Stress, Spundae, YO and Platipus. Fast forward through a career of DJing around the world with residencies in Ibiza and several stints in the Southern hemisphere including Brazil's Carnival and time in Australia, Melbourne, Stuart has led


a life that's the envy of every aspiring DJ. 2016 saw him hide away in the studio and create his album 'Late Night Obsessions', released last month on Baroque records. It got to No.2 in the iTunes UK Electronic Chart, ahead of the likes of Faithless, Chase and Status, Jamie XX and Bonobo. The album is an engaging and uplifting soundscape that urges you to close your eyes and position yourself anywhere. For me it was overlooking the Lagoa in Florianopolis, where Stuart plays. It just has that little South American influence in my mind, but listen and make your own judgement. Ad you do, Stuart continues to travel the globe to spread his vibe of hypnotic fluid deep melodic house. He has upcoming dates in Ibiza, Southampton, London, Brazil and Asia and isn't stopping any time soon.


