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



Face of the fiver and famed baby-resembler Winston Churchill is often quoted as describing democracy as "the worst form of government, except for all the others." He wasn't the first to say it, and never said those exact words, but nonetheless the anecdote sticks around because it's so perfect.

The man immortalised as one of the staunchest defenders of the free world was fighting to preserve a system of government that was merely less rubbish than the alternatives. "Democracy: slightly better than a big kick in the balls" - a message that continues to shake tyrannies and strengthen the hearts of oppressed peoples across the globe.

Cynics argue that the British establishment, of which the aristocratic Churchill was a hereditary member, were in a strong position to weigh up different systems of government because they'd spent hundreds of years trying most of them out - either on their own people or on various unfortunate bits of the empire. Even at home Britain has been ruled by kings, queens, parliaments, a dictator, not to mention a few periods of total anarchy where things were either on fire or infested with plague. However, if you wanted safely to experiment with different systems of government, to see which one is best, you'd be far better off trying them out in a contained laboratory. Somewhere with natural borders - a small Island perhaps?

Phase two: Extended democracy (the power of compulsory voting)

22 countries around the world have some form of compulsory voting system, although it's telling that only half of those are democracies, implying our restaurant metaphor exists in some establishments that just have menus that say "Spaghetti or Die". Compulsory voting has penalties for not participating, ranging from mild public shaming to restrictions on future voting rights if you miss too many ballots. It might work here, but the number of issues that need to be voted on would mean that even the initial plans would be subject to a dizzying system of votes, countervotes, votes about votes, referendums and hourly gatherings of angry people holding signs in the Royal Square. We'd have a fully democratic system, eventually, but decisions about school funding or building a hospital might need to wait in line behind lengthy public debates about the colour of road signs in St Mary and whether or not Battle Bee is at risk from pesticides sprayed after the branchage. Everybody in the restaurant gets a menu, and nobody eats

Phase one: Democracy (the power of the majority)

The current default, democracy is the best way to run a society because it gives everybody the right to play an equal part in the decision making process, from wise rational freelance journalists all the way to people who think Princess Diana was murdered by MI5. The downside is that there's no obligation to vote, or to pay attention to what you're voting for, so the process is like trying to order a restaurant meal for a wedding party of 50 in a situation where only three or four people have menus, the waiters don't speak English and several tables are already drunk. In a democracy, if you are too busy arguing about whether cousin Derek has got fat you might end up with spaghetti, whether you like it or not. Jersey gets round this situation by having an unusually high ratio of elected members (menu holders) to hungry guests (the voting public) but our low voter turnout means that a lot of people are still ending up with unwanted spaghetti. It would appear that the answer is some mechanism that encourages, perhaps even forces, people to use their vote.

until we've all ordered - even Auntie Jenny, who's a gluten-free vegan but is also allergic to any vegetable with an A or an E in its name. Maybe it would be better if a small group of experts took charge?

Phase three: technocracy (the power of expert decisions)

Some nations have settled on the principle that society works better if the hard decisions are left to the experts, who will use their great knowledge to act impartially and make benevolent decisions on behalf of the masses, who are then left to devote their time to other matters, such as the drinks order or garlic bread. The downside to that is a tendency towards passionate disagreements about who these experts are, with some people saying that the only experts are scientists and economists, some arguing that successful businesspeople must lead the nation, and others holding fast to the belief that only religious men are capable of making truly impartial decisions. I favour rule by freelance journalists, but regardless, the resulting "disagreements" have a nasty habit of taking the form of wars where millions of people die, entire

countries vanish, and future generations must spend years carefully ensuring that the menace of compulsory spaghetti can never rear its ugly head again. It's tragic, and clearly the way to avoid this happening is for the people to have a strong leader, who keeps those experts in line.

Phase four: Autocracy (absolute power for one individual)

Always subtitled "what could possibly go wrong?", the system of government that puts one person in charge will inevitably be humanity's backup option because it harks back to a simpler time when the only decisions that were required where who got the least burned chunk of mammoth and whether we should worship the morning sun or a giant piece of bark. It also has many problems, particularly the possibility that you'll end up in a situation where economic policy or international diplomacy are dictated by somebody who either inherited the job from their father or who seized it by being more of a psychopath than anybody else. One person gets a menu, orders whatever they want, then anybody who doesn't like spaghetti is taken outside and executed by firing squad. Even people who eat the spaghetti, but look like they fancy a browse through the menu, are shot - just in case.

Phase five: total anarchy (no power beyond the individual)

When your society has tried and failed with every system of organised government, the only thing left to try is no system of government at all, where cooperation is completely voluntary, laws are torn up and the only persuasive arguments are barter or brute force. In this world every leader is toppled and spaghetti is a literal impossibility because humanity is no longer organised enough to make pasta. Regular readers will know I'm obsessed with the idea of society's inevitable descent into a savage post-apocalyptic wasteland, but my dreams of Mad Max on St Clement's coast road aren't the only model of anarchic non-government - hippies would propose the anarcho-syndicalist tribal council of St Ouen's Bay, and people who spend too long online probably think we could do away with government if we all started trading bitcoin and left global planning up to Google. Inevitably these societies wouldn't be coordinated enough to face any external threat, such as climate change or an invasion from the Democratic People's Republic of Sark, and would either learn to band together or be destroyed. When the only thing your children have known is boiled rat and being married off to a club-wielding chieftain from the former St Lawrence, the taste of spaghetti would seem a bold and beautiful dream. Let us never forget those who have died for that sweet red sauce - the sauce of freedom.

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

As I write in mid-September, Hurricane Harvey has blown a damp path of destruction across the Caribbean, and left large parts of the USA's 4th largest city under a chocolate-brown lake of polluted floodwater. Over on the east coast, Hurricanes Irma and/or Jose are about to land on Florida like a wetter, less sexy version of Daenerys Targaryen, even whilst the federal government continues to insist that the climate science that predicted this is fake news.

People with family on the side bits of America are worried for their safety, either because of natural disasters or reports that gun-crazy rednecks are attempting to scare the hurricane off with bullets. There are even rumours that the super volcano under Yellowstone Park is looking unusually busy, which seems like the setup to an IMAX disaster movie where Wesley Snipes punches a giant shark.

Meanwhile, Jersey is experiencing some unusually deep puddles. Tucked away under the Cherbourg Peninsula (a.k.a. 

A consortium of island charities will distribute the free teabags, to be branded with campaign messages and links to independent information, promoting the importance of legacies to all kinds of philanthropic work in Jersey. To raise awareness of Jersey Legacy Week, the AJC invites islanders to attend their event and to join in the conversation to talk about legacies with their loved ones. The campaign will benefit charities of all sizes and areas of work, and legacies of all sizes can facilitate a tremendous amount of good work. As part of Legacy Week, Hawksford is offering £199 for a simple Will if an enquiry is made during Wills week. THE LOLA PROJECT

On Father's day in June 2011 Sasha and Richard Holden experienced the pain no parents should when their beloved daughter Lola was tragically brought into this world stillborn following a fatal condition.

Plummeting her beloved parents into an unknown world of child bereavement, Sasha and Richard went on to navigate through the grief of their loss on a journey of healing and acceptance through the years that followed. Five years on, they take the strength that Lola's short life has taught them and the kindness she ignited, to share their story of love, loss and healing for a community that so desperately seeks it.

Each year between the 8th-15th October, Baby Loss Awareness week is held across to UK to offer a time to unite bereaved parents, their families and friends to commemorate lost babies' lives. The extremely sensitive nature of the subject has become some what taboo, so to provide a chance to raise awareness about the issues surrounding pregnancy and baby loss the #breakthesilence campaign has been launched by the charity. In conjunction with the annual event, Richard and Sasha proudly take the opportunity to publicly launch their own project in sights to reach others inflicted by this tragic situation and bring a beacon of hope in what is the darkest of times.

Following Lola's passing, Sasha knew she had to find ways to try and cope with the impossibilities of their pain, and heal her grieving heart and her post-natal body. What she really wanted in the healing stages was some support and guidance on things she could do to gently ease her body and mind back to some place resembling normality. Finding it hard to navigate this information for grieving mums, with Richard's support and the help of their dedicated friend Mark, they took on the courageous task of creating their own hub providing wellbeing and healing for others who experience baby loss. And so, The LOLA Project was born.

Lossofalovedarrival.com is a dedicated space for mums, partners, family and

friends who suffer following the loss of a baby to find helpful information on well being, exercise and healing therapies. By taking into account what they personally experienced during this time, they have drawn upon their own needs to compile a wide array of online tools for parents in similar unfortunate circumstances.

In particular, Sasha couldn't find post-natal yoga or pilates classes which took account of both the physical and emotional needs of a mum who has given birth but doesn't bring her baby home. So, at the LOLA Project, they have created a series of videos with specially designed, advice, support and demonstrated gentle yoga and pilates demos for bereaved mums, which take account of broken hearts as well as post-natal bodies.

It was deeply traumatic to recite the story of Lola's loss to therapist after therapist to see whether their treatment might be able to help her situation, and Sasha didn't

want want anyone else to go through that. The fact that people can practise this in the privacy of their own home takes into account the privacy of such trauma yet offers a gentle guiding hand toward the first stages of healing.

Sasha and Richard were acutely aware that parents who have suffered baby loss can struggle with sleep, so turned to specialist Guy Meadows who has since, contributed his expertise in a series of online videos giving step by step tips and advice on how to deal with sleep deprivation. The LOLA project also provides short videos to explain the benefits of a range of therapies and treatments including chiropractic and meditation from accredited specialists highlighting specifically how they might help anyone who is suffering following the devastating loss of a baby. As the site continues to grow, they encourage people with something to share to get in touch and offer their skills and advice to a community that so appreciatively accept it.

Without leaving any stone unturned, LOLA is also there for you with the future in mind delving into the depths of future intimacy with your partner, planning another child and how to deal with moving forward. Although aftercare is offered by your the general health care system, those somewhat routine elements of returning to work, anniversaries, pregnant friends and Christmases are often left un-navigated. Sasha and Richard know better than anyone how the sadness can creep up on you, so have opened up a space online for individual people to share their stories of loss. By sharing their own and encouraging others to do so, it is a reminder that although it is a very personal situation that you are not alone, the situation is not hopeless and there is help here for you. This widens the network for this community by also pulling in resources and links to external websites such as Sands.com, Philips Footprints and other sites that are active in raising awareness and support for baby loss.

Six years on, the couple are again blessed to be the loving parents of a rambunctious 5 year old girl India, who understands the legacy her wonderful sister has created through the kindness she catalysed in her short life. And in the time that has passed, not only has The LOLA Project become a living memorial to honour their missing daughter, but has unified Richard and

Sasha along with their family and friends in a healing movement of gratitude, reflection and acceptance. Without this team of incredible helpers, The LOLA Project would not be all it is today and they are incredibly grateful to each and every person who have shared their love skills and passion for Lola and the legacy of kindness her short life kindled.



We wound down a narrow lane, descending further between fishermens' cottages and pretty old flint walls. Just as we were beginning to wonder whether this was a road at all, the trees cleared and we spotted our destination perched above an emerald bay.



COSTA RICA PURA VIDA

What is it that makes a country powerful? Money? Population? Arms? The country I'm talking about this month is way down the league tables in all of these (it doesn't even have its own armed forces) but it is rich in a different type of power. Costa Rica, a tiny slither of land nestling between Nicaragua and Panama in the heart of Central America, is leading the way when it comes to renewable power, with a staggering 98% of its total electricity usage for the past 2 years coming from green sources. Yes, 98%!

Compare this to a little over 20% in the UK and less than 15% in the USA and it's quite something for a country that is still classed as 'developing'. 70% of this power comes from hydroelectric dams, with the remainder coming from wind, solar and geo-thermal energy.

As impressive as it is, this achievement is only a small part of what makes Costa Rica such a holiday-worthy place. Currently occupying the top spot in the Happy Planet Index, for the 3rd time, means that 4.9 million Costa Ricans (or Ticos, as they prefer to be known) officially reside in the happiest place on earth, and this writer would join them in an instant. By far the most astounding and powerful place I've ever had the good fortune to visit, Costa Rica deserves a place on everyone's holiday wish list.

At 51,000 square kilometres the country is just over one fifth the size of the United Kingdom and easy to explore, yet contains 5% of the world's biodiversity. It seems inconceivable that such a wide and varied amount of life can be contained in such a small area.

Short travelling distances, combined with the accolade of safest country in Central America make Costa Rica easy and appealing to explore. Inexpensive buses and transfers criss-cross the country and hire cars are readily available, however the diverse topography and rural roads mean a 4x4 and a high level of concentration are recommended.

The Pacific and Caribbean coasts, just 75 miles apart at the narrowest point, offer picture perfect tropical beaches. Some, like Tamarindo and Nosara on the pacific side, are well developed resorts offering dozens of hotels, an established nightlife scene, surf schools and plenty of like-minded travellers. Further off the beaten track, spots like spectacular Manzanillo on the Caribbean coast offer a more relaxed vibe with markedly less infrastructure.

In the interior of the country, the same plentiful rainy season (April to October) that allows for such a successful production of hydroelectric power, also produces abundant tropical rain forests and misty, magical cloud forests such as Monteverde, both teeming with a mind-boggling amount of flora and fauna. Over 50% of these forests are protected as national parks, and visitors are welcomed with guided tours are available almost everywhere. The more adventurous can trek across vertigo inducing hanging bridges or whizz over waterfalls and fly through the leafy canopy on a zipline. Whilst I can attest that these are both memorable experiences, to really experience the rain forest it must be done at a slower pace.

Hiking through these forests is like falling down a rabbit hole into wonderland. Brilliant butterflies and jewel-hued hummingbirds fill the air, coatis and caterpillars snuffle amongst the undergrowth, whilst monkeys, sloths and countless birds inhabit the verdant branches above. Those with keener eyes may spot tarantulas, snakes, tiny frogs and even wildcats, whilst twitchers can watch out for the illusive but spectacularly colourful Resplendent Quetzal, top of many an ornithologist's bucket list and I'm delighted to say, ticked off mine.

The most dominant feature on this landscape is Arenal Volcano. Mother Nature seems to balance great natural beauty with great natural power, and Costa Rica is no exception, and is peppered by a string of Volcanoes, 6 of which are active. Until recently Arenal was one of these, and visitors flocked to admire its symmetrical cone spout lava and steam.

The area around Arenal Volcano and adjacent Lake Arenal is still one of the most popular visitor destinations in the country, and a number of luxury resorts, many offering geo-thermal hot springs on site, have sprung up in and around the town of La Fortuna.

If all this natural beauty and impressive dedication to renewables inspires a more 'green' stay, eco-lodges are prolific and several are located in and around Tortuguero national park. An enchanting network of canals and lagoons lined by wild jungle and butting up against the Caribbean sea, this is another area that is home to an astounding amount of wildlife, most notably 4 of the world's 8 species of sea turtle, who arrive like clockwork to lay their eggs on these wild beaches. Strictly regulated tours are available to observe this fascinating ritual. "Whether your usual type of travel involves adventure, culture, exploring or just laying back in a hammock with a cocktail, you can find all of these in Costa Rica, and all in the same day if you desire."

Costa Rica takes its wildlife preservation seriously, and visitors to the country have the opportunity to visit and even volunteer at several facilities working hard to protect their native animals and birds. Proyecto Asis near La Fortuna offers volunteer programs, whilst the world's only dedicated sloth sanctuary is close to Cahuita on the south Caribbean coast and well worth a visit.

Whether your usual type of travel involves adventure, culture, exploring or just laying back in a hammock with a cocktail, you can find all of these in Costa Rica, and all in the same day if you desire. I could say so much more about the country than I can fit on these pages, but the locals sum it up in just two words; Pura Vida - Pure Life. And that is certainly what they are living.

Why did you decide to write the film?



Rosemary Crill retired in 2016 as Senior Curator for South Asia at the Victoria & Albert Museum in London, where she is now an Honorary Senior Research Fellow. Over 30 years, she has travelled throughout India and has published widely on Indian textiles and paintings. Her books include Indian Embroidery, Marwar Painting, Indian Ikat Textiles, Chintz: Indian Textiles for the West and most recently The Fabric of India, which accompanied the major exhibition of the same name at the V&A in 2015-16. The V&A's exhibition The Fabric of India was the first to focus solely on India's rich textile traditions. It included many of the most beautiful and historic fabrics ever made, including Tipu Sultan's flowered tent and a unique embroidered coat made for the Mughal Emperor Jahangir. The exhibition explored the raw materials of textiles as well as the techniques and designs that went into creating the astonishing variety of India's textile traditions. The global textile trade was also explored, from 2,000-year-old fragments to the dyed cotton chintzes that changed the way we dress and furnish our houses today. Coming up to the present day, fashion by contemporary Indian designers using traditional techniques show that India's textile traditions are alive and well. This talk, by the exhibition's lead curator, gives an insight into the challenges of mounting a major exhibition, and provides a 'walk-through' of the exhibition itself.

At the beginning of September I took my daughter for her first day at school. It was a strange experience. At nursery she found the separation somewhat challenging. 





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THE POWER OF GIVING AT REVIVE CAFÉ

As a church, Freedom have always celebrated, fundraised and entertained using food as the tradition of having everyone around the table is as old as, well, the Bible in fact!

Tim Bond, Pastor at Freedom Church and all round foodie man, is taking this essence of breaking bread to feed the community with his latest project. And although this kitchen junkie has sharpened his skills at Highlands College and regularly posts meal videos with his kids on his YouTube channel (PastorChef), he has called upon good friend and professional chef, Matthew Gordon, to serve up this latest resourceful incentive.

Five and a half years ago, Freedom Church took on the massive project of renovating the old Odeon Cinema into a space for the community to come together in union and worship. Such a task became quite the labour of love as members of the community donated their time, energy, money and skills to complete what proved to be a lengthy and complicated re-build. As they still move their way onto completion, Tim commented "When we came into this cinema it was old, broken and unloved, but by the efforts of so many people, we have taken discarded items such as old cassette tapes and industrial cable reels and breathed new life into them to create furniture and decoration. And so we thought, why not do this with food, why not take what is perfectly good yet discarded and revive it into something to share with the community? It is very much a Christian belief that even when you feel like you are at the end of the line, your faith in God and a little support can revive you back beyond your normal self."

From the difficulties they have faced with their renovation has come a fantastic message of re-creation and so, 'Revive Café' was born. With Matt by his side, they have teamed up with Olio the food wastage app, Fungi Delecti and Cimandis to take food that would be otherwise wasted, and serve

it up at restaurant standard for the community to share and enjoy. So much produce is discarded because it is misshapen, damaged or coming toward the end of its shelf life which is making a huge contribution to the issue of food wastage. This is something that Matt and Lee from Fungi Delecti especially want to tackle by leading from the front and joining forces to serve up the leftovers as not only a solution to wastage and hunger, but to help address attitudes towards food wastage. The app Olio, which took off with great speed on the Island, always works with this message at its core. This free app connects people of the community with their neighbours and local shops so surplus food and other items can be shared rather than thrown away. If you, like these guys, love food, hate waste and care about the environment then Olio is the one for you!

This principle holds huge appeal for Matt who is also excited about being able to give back to the community with a real passion for the potential menu. As they have decided to work with what would be wasted, the boys must be spontaneous and creative in the kitchen to serve up a meal where you are encouraged to BYOB and share with thy neighbour! With giving as a theme in the Christian faith, the meal is at a suggested charge of around £15 but if you can't pay it all you mustn't worry, and if you can pay a little extra or for a fellow diner, that is what Tim calls "a gift and a pleasure".

'Revive Café' will be running once a month launching on Friday 27th October at 7pm with Friday 24th November to follow. Bookings are open now to secure a place, on a first come first served basis. Tim and Matt aim to get out about 60 covers which they say is going to be a challenge, but they've got the faith! They proudly open these evenings up to those of all walks of life regardless of religion or situation, the only prerequisite being that you come with an appetite!

If you want to know more about Freedom Church you can check out their website freedomchurch.je or go along to their Sunday morning service held weekly at Hautlieu School at 10.30 am. Although the rebuild continues around them, Freedom Centre is already open to young people on a Saturday night as a drop-in centre as well as running meetings and courses for the church and wider community. The labour of love emanates from the walls in this wonderfully resourced centre, and we're excited to see what else they will be serving up in the future!



A cluster of our favourite go-to health food shops across the Island have been rustling up their own, infused with super foods to create a super powered energy bite of deliciousness. So whose packing the biggest and the best amaze-balls? Here's our picks.



Моо

Out of their tasty treasure trove of power balls, we went in for the big daddy of the superfoods and sampled their spirulina and coconut blend. The concentration of protein and vitamins in Spirulina has led many to classify it as the 'most nutrient dense food on the planet' compared to other foods gram for gram. Alongside the delicious and nutritious source of fibre. vitamins, minerals and amino acids offered in coconuts, these balls are super powered! In true MOO fashion, they are also packed full of the best sourced ingredients including almonds, dates, cashews, pumpkin seeds and cinnamon so you can "shine from the inside out" well and truly energised. A good handful for £2.



Flavour

Flavour is the place to go for world wide cuisine, home cooked with love, passion and the most considerately sourced ingredients. And their fusion of flavours doesn't stop at their hot dishes. From their ever growing repertoire of desserts and treats we tried out their date, oats and cocoa energy ball rustically rolled with salted nuts. They are definitely the biggest balls of them all for $\pounds 2$, offering a dense lump of delicious, nutritious energy that tastes a little like Snickers without the caramel comedown. Cocoa has a low sugar content against processed chocolate as well as 40 times the amount of antioxidants than blueberries, more calcium than cows milk and the highest plant-based source of iron.



Wild Health

Its a real meal deal at this healthy food truck favourite as you get 4 balls of 2 different flavours, for just £2.50. We weren't quick enough to sample the apricot, coconut oil, coconut, cinnamon, flaxseeds and sunflower seeded blend of their apricot and orange balls but got ourselves a date & raw cocoa instead which did not disappoint. With goji berries and orange zest they are the fruitiest of the lot with the crunch of chia, flax, pumpkin and sunflower seeds to energise the bite. These gorgeous bites only contain whole foods, are nut free, vegan, organic and fly out of the Wild Health catering trailer every Thursday so hunt them down on King Street and stock up!



Barannes Juice Bar

Rather than making their own, Barannes stock 'Bounce Balls', a big name favourite for £2 in a range of flavours. The nuttiness of the cinnamon and apple was too good to resist containing cashews, whey protein, seeds and blue agave syrup. Although they lack the homemade taste and feel, the beauty of these balls is that you always know what you're going to get; A healthy, high in protein, guilt free snack. Tasting even better when washed down with one of Barannes juice blends and a shot of wheatgrass to power up and get down!



Nude Food

This little trifecta of treats is a real deal at just £3 for 3 different flavours. First up is our good old super food friends spirulina and coconut, blended together to create a creamy melt in the mouth taste sensation, balanced with a crunchy dusting of desiccated coconut. The savoury taste of the spirulina is well balanced out by the second goji and sesame seed ball which tastes entirely decadent without the guilt! Goji berries contain 8 essential amino acids which can help boost the immune system and help with fatigue and although sesame seeds may be small, they pack a major health punch that can help with everything from digestion and circulation to bone strength and inflammation. Finishing off this triple taste tester is cocoa and orange zest which is pretty much like eating dessert so our advice would be to save this one till last, and savour the zesty chocco indulgence.

Next door the Restaurant, housed in the original courthouse, is where you can enjoy a more refined menu that includes their speciality seafood, which is always fresh and whenever possible locally sourced. It's here my friend and I headed for dinner one Friday night. We started in the drawing room style bar adjacent to the dining areas, and enjoyed a splendid G&T before heading in for dinner.

During our visit we were looked after by Becky who was brilliant and expertly guided us through the menu, which contains some superbly done classics. We opted for the Coquilles St Jacques and breaded brie, both of which were beautifully presented and tasted delightful. We then followed with main courses of salmon en croûte; a fillet of salmon wrapped in filo pastry and ginger butter, served on wilted spinach with new potatoes and chive cream sauce and I had a succulent rack of lamb, cooked medium with a herb crust, rosemary and garlic jus, gratin potatoes and buttered spinach. For dessert we followed with the light and creamy panna cotta and banana sticky toffee pudding; heaven!

While Jersey's flowers delight us with their floral displays, they also delight Jersey's honey bees by producing the sweet nectar that they turn into Jersey honey. It is our local beekeepers who bring that honey to our tables.

The Jersey Beekeepers Association was started by nine people meeting in the midst of the First World War on 3 October 1917. It seems a strange time to come together, but the archive tells us that the initial members were hoping that they could apply for rationed sugar to feed their bees. It was not to be and their request was turned down. How much sugar would have got to the bees during the war is a matter for debate!

There are now 100 Jersey beekeepers and 2017 is a landmark year for them, they started this year by becoming a recognised Jersey charity and joining Genuine Jersey. There have held a number of events throughout the year for members and the general public which have helped to raise their profile and help them celebrate this amazing milestone.

There have been times during the last century when honey has been abundant but over the last few years, it has been increasingly difficult for our local apiarists to keep the island supplied with this top quality product.

A spokesman for the Association said that "while we don't struggle to sell our produce, by joining Genuine Jersey we hope that it will assist us in raising the awareness of difficulties facing local honey bees and pollinators. Honey is becoming increasingly difficult to produce due to a number of factors including the Varroa mite, a parasitic mite which infests colonies, loss of habitat and inclement weather. We have recently had local sightings of the Asian Hornet which preys on honey bees and it is a question of time to see what impact this will have locally."

He went on to say that, "For our hundredth year we are working on a number of projects, The association is liaising with the planning department to hopefully move forward with building a training apiary, to assist in teaching new beekeepers, as well as helping to improve and develop the skills of our existing members. We have a number of guest speakers visiting throughout the year who are experts in a range of honeybee topics relating to bees and pollination."

You may have heard about the Asian hornets which have been spotted on the island. Hornets play a crucial role in the ecosystem in controlling other insects and pollinating fruit and flowers, but the Asian hornet is a predator of native insects and is a threat to honey bees and other pollinators. The Department of the Environment is asking the public to notify them if they see any here in Jersey. The Asian hornet is slightly smaller than the native European hornet (Vespa crabro). It is not easily confused with any other species, it is the only hornet or wasp with an entirely dark brown or black velvety body, bordered with a fine yellow band, and yellow legs. 



MORTGAGES IN JERSEY

There has been no change in any of the 180 plus mortgage products that are currently available from Jersey lenders during the past month, which isn't surprising when you look at just how low interest rates have fallen.

Brexit and the falling pound have reopened the debate on when Bank of England Base rate is likely to rise, although there is nothing concrete upon which economists can pin their projections. The latest media comments suggest that economists do not expect UK interest rates to rise until 2019, at which stage there might be a modest increase of 0.25%, which will have an impact on the rates that are currently available.

The last time that interest rates rose was in July 2007, a rise by a quarter of a percent to 5.75%. The following month, the credit crunch struck and so began a series of cuts, down to 0.50% in March 2009 and then the last panic cut to 0.25% in August 2016, following the Brexit referendum outcome.



Africa: a continent of investment opportunity

The economic data is compelling: seven of the ten fastest growing economies in the world are in Africa – yet the continent still presents a challenge to investors, mainly due to concerns about short-term returns and the risk of doing business there.

Thankfully, Africa is shedding both of these long-held perceptions, partly because of significant market reform, infrastructure and governance improvements, and because those who have taken the plunge are reaping the benefits.

Many African countries have made solid progress on reforming policies and introducing strong governance aligned with international best practices to attract greater foreign investment. Almost every major market has a published longterm development vision that includes investment in infrastructure and inclusive growth initiatives. Crucially, more and more, we are seeing peaceful transfers of power becoming the norm on the continent.

As a direct result, confidence and investment have grown in key sectors – including power, resources, agriculture, information communication technology, primary infrastructure, such as housing, and secondary infrastructure, such as healthcare.

The fast-emerging middle class in Africa is creating unprecedented consumer demand and opportunity. As the second most populated continent in the world – an estimated 1.2 billion people now live in Africa with 40% of the continent under the age of 14 - now is the time for consumer brands who are looking for growth to establish a presence there.

With such incredible interest in Africa, some investors have tried to manage their Africa business from Europe or the Middle East but the most successful strategies have involved close collaboration with partners that understand the continent. With over 50 countries, more than 20 languages, multiple cultures, local regulatory, tax and legal environments and differing levels of market development, it's best to work with Africa using on-the-ground expertise. It's why working with Standard silo overlooking the Atlantic Ocean, against a backdrop of docks, the city and Table Mountain, the new museum is one of the most striking buildings to have been constructed in Africa. It is also the continent's first such institution devoted to contemporary art.

A study by Capital Economics, commissioned by Jersey Finance, concluded that Africa has the opportunity to quadruple living standards by 2040, although in order to do so it will need to find US\$11.4 trillion in extra investment over that period.

Bank - Africa's largest bank by assets with a significant presence in 20 sub-Saharan countries – is the right choice.

Investment opportunities in Africa are not only at the consumer end. According to the 2017 Wealth Report, by Knight Frank, the number of ultra-high-net-worth individuals (UHNWI) in Africa will grow by 33 per cent over the next decade, after suffering a decline of two per cent in 2015 and 2016 due to tough market conditions. The growth in ultra-wealthy populations in Africa will outpace that of Europe and North America over the next ten years.

This is leading to a surge in philanthropic investment across the continent, with one recent shining example being Cape Town's new Zeitz Museum of Contemporary Art Africa, which has already been described as 'Africa's Tate Modern'. Housed in a converted grain As economic activity escalates, it will undoubtedly attract further private equity funding and Jersey's fund administration and fiduciary specialists, such as Standard Bank, have an important and influential role to play in that growth.

Carving out international opportunities

Gallery caught up with Brooks Macdonald Investment Manager Adam Greaves to chat about how his role is evolving to help steer the firm into new international territory...



You're an Investment Manager in Brooks Macdonald's Jersey office. What does that job entail?

Essentially, I help private clients manage their money, either directly or in conjunction with other professional advisers such as trust companies. In practice, that means every day I'm looking at making investments on their behalf that are in line with their objectives and deliver a good riskadjusted return, all against the backdrop of whatever the market conditions might be at that moment in time. It's a role that involves a lot of research, an ability to understand the markets, and a personable approach to work constructively with clients.

So how did you get to that position?

I'm from Dorset originally and, having completed my management sciences studies at Southampton University, I knew I wanted to work in financial services in some capacity.

In 2008, I joined accountancy firm EY in Jersey. I already had Channel Islands connections with family in Guernsey, and after a few conversations with EY, they offered me a position in their Jersey office, where I ended up auditing a broad range of financial services firms. Whilst in the role I qualified as a Chartered accountant through the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Scotland ("ICAS"), but I felt after a while that the kind of work I was doing wasn't quite aligned with the financial services sector I found so interesting. As I became immersed in Jersey's financial services landscape, I became more and more interested in the investment world and completed the CFA's investment management certificate ("IMC") in my spare time. Then in 2013 I was lucky enough to get an opportunity to join Brooks Macdonald. Whilst at Brooks, I completed the level 7 CISI Chartered Wealth Manager within the first 18 months to ensure I had the necessary professional qualification to manage money.

Has your role changed over time?

As I look back over the past four years, it's amazing to think what I've done in that time. When I started here, I was a trainee with little hands-on investment experience, but the team at Brooks Macdonald have been so supportive of my professional development. I soon moved on to be part of the firm's research hub, which supports the investment managers by analysing specific markets, before moving into more of a front-office role, and in turn that presented me a chance to join the firm's Africa team. That role entailed cementing existing and building new relationships with financial advisers in key African markets, particularly South Africa, and involved frequent trips to the continent. I also had to undertake a South African regulatory qualification to be able to conduct business there!

Most recently, I've taken on a role that is more focused on making inroads into a new but huge growth market for us, the Middle East. Already this year I've carried out six trips to Dubai to meet advisers in support of their work with clients. As it's a relatively new market for us, I'm also trying to meet new people and build up our profile and visibility in the region, often with the help of Jersey Finance and Channel Island-based trust companies who are also operating in the region.

Brooks Macdonald is a UKwide business, how does the Channel Islands fit into that?

Our offices in Jersey and Guernsey have responsibility within Brooks Macdonald for spearheading the firm's international strategy. That means we act as the firm's expert discretionary investment management hub for trustees, professional advisers, private clients and charities across Europe, South Africa, the Middle East and Far East.

My focus is the Middle East, where we are mainly supporting private clients and expats who are looking for savings and pension solutions. It's an exciting market for us. Last year we signed a strategic alliance agreement with Dubai-based adviser Abacus, which is working really well. Building relationships with other partners in the region is a strategic priority for us and offers massive potential. "The travel and people part of the business is fantastic, but I love being at the coalface of the investment world too, looking at the way the world works and translating that into investment opportunities."

How do you see your role evolving over the coming years?

I'm keen to be part of the firm's international expansion, and I feel privileged to be given an opportunity to be a part of Brooks Macdonald's international journey. The travel and people part of the business is fantastic, but I love being at the coalface of the investment world too, looking at the way the world works and translating that into investment opportunities. My current role blends those two areas perfectly.

We're growing our team around our international strategy to give us real strength in moving into overseas markets, and I hope that looking forward over the coming years I'll be helping to lead the team to continue to make our international aspirations a reality.

So is it all hard graft?

It is hard work, but equally it's important for me to have a place to work that is hugely enjoyable to be in. That's why I'm involved in the social committee and get involved in various initiatives for staff throughout the year. For instance, this year we had around 60 colleagues from across the UK take part in the Jersey Island Walk, raising £30,000 for charity.

Most recently, I also took part in the firm's Waterloo to Waterloo Cycling Challenge, which took us from London to Belgium. We covered 120km on average each day and raised £20,000 for charity. It was a fantastic project, and a great example of the kind of thing the firm supports as part of its community engagement activity.



With a number of European countries recently announcing a future ban on the sale of nonelectric vehicles that's almost making Brexit sound like it might have at least one small plusside, given that British institution BP still have at least 17,810,000,000 barrels of oil they're yet to sell us, and battery technology advancing exponentially by the day, should we be thinking of going electric or rather just keep calm and carry on in the most British way possible?

It's a rubbish expression born of an effective marketing campaign, but electric cars are *a bit Marmite*. On one hand you have the staunch supporters; trendsetters and eco-warriors who'd never drive a dated, fossil fuel incinerating, almost obsolete example of technology ever again as for as long as they live, and on the other you have the die hard petrolheads; those who swear that a car smelling of hot oil and sounding obnoxiously noisy are the key ingredients to any motoring experience. Yet everyone can appreciate the fine lines of a classic, right?

So, car owners of the future, where exactly do you go to get your fix for timeless motoring if you're hell bent on saving the planet? Well, actually there are a few places you can try; Zelectric in the US, Electric Classic Cars in Wales and even Jaguar Land Rover in Coventry (...and Mumbai).

That's right, last month Jaguar Land Rover announced a drop-in package to convert any XK engined Jaguar from petrol to full electric, and in the E-Type Zero car they unveiled not only is the weight distribution virtually unchanged but it's also slightly lighter overall (around 46kg) and therefore faster than the original Mk1.5 Roadster it was built from. I'm not sure it'll do 150mph for very long, but then it's debatable as to whether the original E-Type could achieve that in any case. If this idea takes off, expect any future remake of Inspector Morse to feature a zero-emmissions Jaguar Mark v2.0.

By far the most popular conversion on both sides of the Atlantic though are old Volkswagens. With vastly increased power, double the original output in most cases, yet vastly altered weight distribution by carrying the weighty batteries up front and a much lighter electric motor in the rear, they're not cheap but they are a good way to take an iconic car and futureproof it in the same way that Jaguar plan to do with their E-Type Zero. Zelectric's conversions even boast that the vehicle can be returned to an original state with ease if required, and although Electric Classic Cars in the UK do tend to do a bit of chopping and welding to accommodate the new powertrain whilst they go about their business of otherwsie faithfully restoring the donor car of your choice, the levels of workmanship look incredible. With small touches such as relocating the charging port to underneath the original fuel filler caps, updating the lighting to low energy LEDs and in the





case of their 911E adding electric power steering to prevent you from having to wrestle your seventies Porsche into a parking space. They've even adding storage for the Targa top in the rear above the motor and might've just about thought of everything.

With around 200 miles of range from one charge, the current battery technology used by Electric Classic Cars, utilising technology from Tesla, is probably comparable to a tank of fuel with the original 3.2 litre engine in the 911E in any case and with an overnight charge you're good to go again. Sure, you'll not be taking your classic on the Mille Miglia any time soon but for practical day to day use it's not a bad proposition. Add to that the cost of a decent 911 from that era these days anyway (there's a Turbo for sale locally for £89k) and the cost to buy an all-electric 911 is likely comparable too. Not to mention that, unlike a lot of original manufacturer offerings, these third party conversions tend to keep the clutch and gearbox, and that's what I just couldn't get on with in the original Tesla Roadster: the lack of gears. It just didn't feel like driving an actual car - it just lacked involvement. Of course, with the torque that a modern electric motor puts out you can just pop your electric conversion in fourth, forget about the clutch and just use the accelerator and brake to go and stop, but it's nice to know that the gears are there if you want to remember what driving used to be like in the good old days. Albeit a fair bit quieter.

What does all of this mean for the future of motoring though? Well, for one it means Volkswagen buses that can actually go up hills, and I think that's good news for everyone. Just imagine - tailbacks after Glastonbury 2040 might even become nonexistent! As a fan of many of the cars that are being converted, part of me is in awe of the work being done. But part of me is also pained, because it doesn't seem right to be chopping them up like this. And who wants a fast and efficient Range Rover classic anyway? Part of their charm is that they're sluggish to drive and you have to marvel at how Rover managed to squeeze a mere 115bhp out of their asthmatic 3.5 litre V8 by strangling it with a couple of Strombergs. But then, I'm probably not their target market anyway. I'm not in the market for a £90,000 car and wouldn't find enough to tinker with in the garage of a weekend on an engine with one moving part. Ask me again when BP's reserves are down to a mere million or so barrels though and I might answer differently.

FACTS YOU NEVER KNEW YOU WANTED TO KNOW ABOUT JERSEY'S ENERGY FROM WASTE PLANT

We were fortunate enough to have been given access to the EfW plant at La Colette this month to use as a location for the Gallery fashion photoshoot, but what do you know about the plant itself? This is what we learned...

 \cdot The Jersey EfW is one of the cleanest plants in europe with some of the lowest emissions achievable with the technology installed

• The EfW has a maximum design throughput of 105,000 tonnes of waste per year and can incinerate up to 16 tonnes of waste per hour

• In Jersey we generate almost 70,000 tonnes of burnable waste every year

• The EfW is manned 24hrs a day, 365 days a year by 18 shift operators who work through Bank Holidays including Christmas and the New Year.

 \cdot In total there are 28 people running the facility.

 \cdot The Energy from Waste facility is actually two waste incinerators; two steam boilers; two flue gas treatment plants and a power station.

• The EfW operates for almost 7500 hours per year and has two outages per year in April and November to refurbish and maintain the plant.

• EfW has a maximum design throughput of 105,000 tonnes of waste per year and can incinerate up to 16 tonnes of waste per hour.

• The heat released by incineration is captured by the waste heat boilers which produce up to 47 tonnes of steam per hour.

• We generate electricity at 11,000 volts ac and export this to Jersey Electricity via our main transformer at 33,000 volts ac

• The steam drives a 10,000KW turbine to produce electricity most of which is exported to Jersey Electricity and into our homes and offices

• The EfW is now the largest producer of local electricity in Jersey and can generate enough electricity to power 8000 homes

• Once the incinerators are at operating temperature additional fuel is not needed to keep the boilers operating. So all the electricity produced is "green electricity" and replaces any fossil fuel derived power from the continent.



Having met the Jersey golfer thats the world's best golf baller hitter last month, this month we meet another number one, Lucy O'Sullivan, who is presently ranked number one in the UK for her archery!

What first made you want to shoot arrows at things?

My dad used to run the archery club at De La Salle back in the 50 and 60s (it's their 100 year anniversary now, so it's quite cool for me knowing that a school in Jersey was into archery, even though it was a while ago). He was always into archery and coaching. As a little girl I used to watch him compete and wanted to shoot too. I started with the bows that had sticky arrows that you could shoot at a window. When I moved to Jersey I started shooting properly in 2000 and my invite to Great Britain team was in 2004. I haven't looked back since, it did help that I had a great coach and my mum has always been the best support team!

You're pretty good at it, what was your first competition like?

My first competition was in Jersey against my sister, I was pretty bad with the Olympic discipline, I lost, so I swapped to compound archery. With every loss there is a success.

Would you hunt food with a bow and arrow if you had to?

My coach is an American and he has built up his name and career by doing this. I however will wait for the zombie apocalypse to do so, I can't imagine killing something unless I was going to eat it, and we just don't have the need to do that here!

You're a personal trainer, do you have to mix the disciplines?

My personal training has been awesome for my archery career, it gives me the flexibility to go to a competition every weekend, my clients are great and are so supportive (thank you guys). They know that when I'm back I will work them hard so it is not too much of a concern. I am quite picky about technique with everyone but I think that comes hand in hand with being an archer. It is all about getting your body into that perfect alignment for optimum muscle efficiency and I treat my training in the gym, with myself and my clients the same. There is always a better position the body can be in. language is English and French. So I can get away with talking to different countries and at different competitions with those languages. I'm expecting great things out in Mexico, I'm on for being number 1 in Britain in the rankings, I'm off to the National Series finals (which is the top 8 women in GB) and we came second in the world in Berlin this summer; so whatever happens it's been a great year, I just need

What other sport would you like to have a crack and at why?

For my height I think I should have always been a horse rider (I'm small and strong) we did it a bit when we were kids, but with the archery travel I could never afford it. If I had grown when I was younger, I wished I could have been a tennis player. I think I would have to be 5 inches taller then I am now! I would have loved to have been class at that sport and had the opportunity to mingle with Federer.

You're heading to the world championships in mexico, what do you expect and how's your Spanish? My Spanish is pretty much 'zero' I'm afraid to say, but luckily the world archery to enjoy Mexico and shoot the way that I'm shooting now, thanks to my coach, who I saw in USA in April.

What would be your advice for anyone thinking of picking up a bow?

It's harder than it looks to become "good" at archery, so if you want to get some serious satisfaction from the sport, go to a club and get some coaching. Both archery clubs are looked after by the Archery Association of Jersey so check them out, and join up. The other thing to mention is ENJOY it. This year I have really fallen in love with my sport again. And guess what? That's equalled success!

IT'S CERTAINLY THE TIME FOR COMPETITIVE EVENTS IN JERSEY. WITH THE JERSEY MARATHON AND SUPER LEAGUE TRIATHLON TAKING PLACE JUST AS WE GO TO PRINT, WE WERE WOWED BY THE AMAZING SHOTS SENT THROUGH BY THE TEAM AT BRECA FROM THE BRECA JERSEY 2017 LAST MONTH.

There are no bikes to relax on in this discipline; 47 kilometres of cliff paths and 6.5 kilometres of ocean swimming isn't for the faint of heart! The organisers tell us that 2017 was an exceptionally tough race too. Although the high winds of the preceding days had abated somewhat, there was sufficient swell left in the water to push the teams to their limits.

The course has swimming stages on three sides of the island, and the sea state on each can vary dramatically. And so it was this year, as the benign waters on the first few swims rapidly gave way to swell, currents and churning eddies. This is where the team aspect of swimrun came to the

This is not to belie the challenges also presented by the coastal path. It's no exaggeration to say that the trails on Jersey are world class: they encompass rolling hills, steep climbs, technical descents and fast cliff top stages. I've never really thought about my strength until I found myself into a bit of a sticky situation, where I was trying to push a 6foot-something, very drunk man away from my direction on a night out. He'd got himself in one of those states where he clearly just wanted to talk and talk, and had just decided that I needed to be whispered to, in the smoking area outside the Royal Yacht. Needless to say, he had absolutely no idea about personal space whilst encroaching closer and closer into mine.

I tried to back away but I'd got myself stuck in a corner, trying to duck under his arms. Just as I went in for what I thought would be a very strong hand-on-chestpush, I realised that I may as well be trying to push a house over with a feather. Were my arms really THAT weak? That was the moment I realised; this guy was just an annoying heavy-breather, talking too close to me on a night out. Imagine if the situation was a really bad one? What would I have done? How would I have defended myself? Could I?

After mentioning the story to a gym-friend, he suggested I try Martial arts. Apparently

I would learn to 'use a stronger person's weight and power against them'. As we talked, all I could think about was the music video Kung-Fu Fighting; me in a funny white pyjama-set, kicking and 'haaaaaaayaaaah'ing all over the room. Besides that daydream I was also wondering how martial arts would help, whether a normal 5-foot-2-curvy-26-year-old-non-skilledfemale could pick up what seemed like a really difficult and old 'art' form and thirdly, what 'Martial' meant? Was it was just a name, like Marshall Mathers? I had a moment of self belief and found myself agreeing to go along to a group sesh the following week, and giving it a bash.

I really had no idea what to expect, or even what to wear? I mean I didn't own big white pyjamas and I felt a bit assumptive buying some, so I thought I would just go casualactive-wear and hope for the best. I reached the door, feeling extremely nervous about taking a class with not one person I know. I was also wondering what the HELL I was doing thinking I could learn a new skill like Martial Arts – and thirdly wondering what the HOLY HELL Martial Arts really was, and would we be dancing to Kung-Fu fighting?

My fears quickly abated. No one was in the white pyjamas (turns out that was actually the following day's class) so my leggings

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and tee was perfect. Well done me. As I walked into the steamy room I saw a large 'herd' of athletes, all dressed in black, moving as if in a zone of their own. Each was rotating in a circle whilst looking down, hunched and moving shoulder to shoulder. For the random onlooker, this group of people look like listless, well-built zombies... but, nope, this was the Brazilian Power Team. And in about 5 seconds, I would learn why their middle name is 'Power'.

There were about twenty of us in the humble training room, a big space filled with what I can only describe as crash mats. Soon we were being lead by the shapely coaches, copying their movements, running circuits, leapfrogging over one another and

ducking under legs before sprinting across the mats. It's 'Fight Camp' I'm told by one of the regulars, the time after summer where all the athletes are getting into top shape for their upcoming winter season of competitions. I've never seen stamina like it. Shortly after warm up, while us newbies were getting our breath back and learning how to kick, the regulars began doing the coolest looking jumping spinning kicks I've ever seen, landing each one with deafening power. It is AWESOME! I'm sure I saw the beginners eyes change, and we were all suddenly working our asses off to master the technique and put our all into kicking those pads, each imagining that someday we could be like those guys.

The next hour and a half consists of 'drilling' (basically rehearsing or repeating a series of) various moves and situations. By this time I'd gathered that about half of the group are new kids on the block, like me. Fight Camp has attracted quite a few people who I realised have experienced a similar situation to me; questioning their strength and power and wanting to learn a couple of moves that could help, should they ever need to protect themselves in real life.

My main disappointment is that we did not wear white pyjamas and sing the song in my head but I mean, I did walk away from my very first session knowing at least one way to counter an attack. Which, is pretty damn cool right? In that session, I sweated, I worked my ass-off, and I left feeling serious 'power' knowing that I was more equipped than I was an hour and a half previous.

Over the last three-or-so-years, there's a standard line in 'small talk' that's developed between nighttime customers I meet (I work – perhaps stereotypically – as a doorman, these days).

You see, during this time, along with a few other Islanders, I've devoted myself to something of a niche sport – one that changes you psychically, mentally, neurologically and, in my case philosophically. Said conversation usually goes along the lines of:

Customer: "(Insert expletive), you're a big lad…", usually followed with a confused "(are you a) Rugby player?" The confusion is fair enough, I currently weigh around 140kgs or 22 stone in old money.

Me: "Erm, thanks... I think, and no."

Customer: "You obviously work out though... (confused) are you a bodybuilder?"

Me: "I do lift weights, yeah. Not a bodybuilder though. I compete as a powerlifter."

WE'RE LOOKING TO TAP THAT 'OH FUCK' STRENGTH... YOU KNOW, LIKE IN THOSE STO-RIES WHERE AN 8 STONE MUM PULLS THE CAR OFF HER BABY'S PRAM OUT OF PURE FEAR AND DESPERATION... IT'S LIKE THAT UNDER THE SQUAT BAR SOMETIMES... IF I DON'T STAND UP, I'M PROBABLY GONNA DIE HERE!'

Customer: "Oh, right... like on the Olympics?"

Me: "No, that's weightlifting".

Customer: "Ahh, so like World's Strongest Man, then."

I usually end it there with a "yeah, sort of". See, the truth is that although many World's Strongest Man competitors do or at least have competed as powerlifters, it's a different sport again from the stuff you probably watched at Christmas/New Year featuring mostly Scandinavian giants pushing, carrying and throwing all manner of weird and wonderful (and heavy) implements.

You see, unlike the Olympic sport of weightlifting - which requires the mastery of a huge amount of technique, speed and flexibility - or Strongman which evolved from Highland Games and is equal parts athleticism, strength and the ability to withstand torturous suffering - powerlifting is about just one thing: building and displaying pure brute strength. Sure, you have to learn some technique – mostly so you (hopefully) don't get injured – but simply put, Powerlifting is an all-out attempt to lift as much weight as you can for just one repetition in the squat, bench press and deadlift, respectively.

Competitions take place using calibrated weights loaded onto specific bars and on 'platforms' like the ones you see the Olympic Weightlifters using.

They always begin with the Squat lift. Taking a barbell with a weight of your choosing (your first is known as your opener) across your lower shoulders/upper back, you sit into a squat until the crease of your hip is lower than the top of your thigh, then you stand back up again. Sounds simple, doesn't it?

Trust me, at the kind of weights required to be competitive, it will not only test your leg strength, but your core strength (the bar will 'fold you up' if you don't brace yourself well), balance and even will to live. Hell, it even tests your courage... stepping under 300-plus-kilograms (a weight that could and might injure or even kill you) requires you to absolutely believe that you can do it! If you don't, you won't.

After three progressively heavier attempts (you aren't allowed to go lighter than the weight you choose to open), the competition moves to the Bench Press.

Here, you lay on your back on a bench, the weight is passed out to you, and the referee gives you a 'start' command, whereby you lower the bar to your chest and stop. When the ref gives the 'press' command, you lift the bar straight up over your face and hold it - again, weights can be up to quarter of a ton here, and require some self belief. Lastly, the ref calls 'rack', and you return the bar to the hooks on the bench.

Three (progressively heavier) attempts at 'benching', and you move on to the most primal, beastly lift of all: the deadlift. It's simple, but don't confuse that with 'easy'. You simply grip the barbell from the floor, start to stand up and drag that sucker up your shins and thighs until you can 'lock out', stood up erect and gripping for dear life to the weight that's trying to remind you that gravity always wins in the end.

Romantically, you say "not today, gravity", except you don't... you're too busy praying for the ref to say 'down', so that your lift is over, and was satisfactory.

'IN THAT MOMENT, WHEN THE WEIGHT IS CRUSHING YOU AND VICTORY IS MERE INCHES AWAY, YOU DON'T HAVE TIME TO STRESS ABOUT THE BILLS OR YOUR CHRONIC PROBLEMS, YOU'RE JUST 100% IN TUNE WITH YOUR BODY, FIGHTING TO GET IT DONE. THERE'S NO ROOM FOR ANYTHING BUT THE PRESENT SITUATION.'

At the end, the 'total' of your three biggest attempts on the squat, bench press and deadlift is your score, and the biggest score (total) wins.

Maybe I'm biased, but to me it's the ultimate test of willpower and ability to connect every last muscle fibre to every last nerve that tells said muscle fibre to 'fire'. Some of the biggest lifts look slow – we call them 'grinders' – but they're the result of truly explosive contractions of several major muscle groups simultaneously.

If you really want to test and tap into your true 'inner power', it's the ultimate way to find out what you're made of. That you can continue to improve, growing stronger and becoming more 'anti-fragile' (it's not the same thing as 'robust', which doesn't change for better or worse in response to stressors) seemingly forever is testament to the miracle of evolution and adaptability that is the human body.

You should try it. There's power in you that no-one can take away... and you can build it for as long as you're alive. Isn't that something worth experiencing?

N.B. For the first time in many years, Jersey has a growing powerlifting scene, and flourishing team. Local coaches Dan Reis, Ross Kenwright and Will Hall all compete themselves – and train others in powerlifting – and we take a small (but growing) team to the Southern Qualifiers each year, with more of us making Team GB standards every time. It's open to men and women aged 17 years old upwards, with space for competition in all weight and ability classes.

JSSC supporting medal-winning athletes

Behind even every good athlete is an excellent physiotherapist. One such physio is Verity Simon, who not only works at the Jersey Sports & Spinal Clinic (JSCC), but also has a long involvement with sporting teams in Jersey, including Team Jets Netball and Jersey Reds Athletic Rugby. It's this involvement that led Verity to be invited to be part of the Team Jersey NatWest Island Games Physiotherapy team, alongside Helen Richardson, in Gotland earlier this year.

Physiotherapy plays a vital role at all international multi-sports event and is often the reason many participants are able to compete after injury or setbacks and win medals. 250 athletes from Jersey traveled to Gotland for the Games in June where Verity and hospital physiotherapist Helen ran an open clinic for Team Jersey. They were there to treat injuries and muscular tension and provide advice and exercises to ensure athletes get the most from their bodies during the week-long competition. Verity and Helen were also pitch side at certain sports such as football, basketball and volleyball, which have a high injury rate and frequently demand urgent physic attention.

Verity has been a physiotherapist for 11 years and has worked at JSSC since 2015. Gotland was her first Island Games experience and the first time she'd worked at an event with such a large number of sports (14 in total). She said: "The greatest challenge was getting injured athletes back up and participating in their sport quickly. It differed from my normal role where we look at a more long term recovery."

Lisa Mann, Director at JSSC said: "We are thrilled that Verity has been recognised in this way and was asked to jointly provide sports recovery and rehabilitation for the teams from Jersey. The Island Games provided great exposure to Verity and



allowed her to develop as a well-rounded practitioner. Our goal at JSSC is to help maximise individual's' performance and it is great to see the results of this pay off through athletic achievement at events like the Island Games. She added "physiotherapy can help turn a setback into a great comeback!"
