# CAREER TRAJECTORY // TOM CRUISE



Believe it or not, Tom Cruise films have grossed a frankly ridiculous \$2,358,062,667. Born Thomas Cruise Mapother IV, he had originally planned to become a priest until acting caught his attention. His first major role was in the 1983 film The Outsiders alongside Patrick Swayze. From there he dominated the 80's and 90's starring in Top Gun (1986), Cocktail (1988), A Few Good Men (1992), Mission Impossible (1996), and Eyes Wide Shut (1999) and in the new millennium has seen repeated success with War of the Worlds, Collateral and Mission Impossible II. Lately however he's been behaving a bit erratically. 2001 saw the end of his relationship with Nicole Kidman, a brush with South Park, and a rather overemphatic celebration of his love for new beau Katie Holmes on Oprah. Some said he was losing it, but with another impossible mission coming up this year he's probably going to be at the top for some time yet.

# ORIGIN OF THE WORD // ASSASSIN

Think of assassins, and images of black-clad ninjas with samurai swords will probably come to mind. The name assassin is commonly believed to be a mutation of the Arabic word "haššašin" (hashish-eaters) but there are a few theories as to how this name may have come about. It is suggested by some writers that assassin simply means 'followers of Al-Hassan' (or Hasan-i Sabbah, the Sheikh of Alamut). Others suggest that since hashish-eaters were generally ostracized in the middle ages the word "Hashshashin" had become a common synonym for "outlaws" and was therefore used in a pejorative sense of 'enemies' or 'disreputable people'. As such the attribution of Hassan's Ismaili sect with this term is not necessarily a clue for drug usage. Some common accounts of their connection with hashish are that these "assassins" would take hashish before missions in order to calm themselves; others say that it helped to boost their strength, and turned them into madmen in battle. Yet other accounts state it was used in their initiation rites in order to show the neophyte the sensual pleasures awaiting him in the afterlife. The connection between their mysticism and that drug is not something subject to reliable or consistent historical accounts; this is not surprising given their secrecy and infamy.



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
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
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Imagine being able to send a command over your mobile phone so your cooker heats up a meal and has it ready when you arrive home. Or what about a fridge which electronically scans all of your groceries, and re-orders the milk over the internet when you run out? Then there's the intelligent dustbin, which not only sorts your rubbish into recyclable waste, but notes what you're throwing away and draws up an instant shopping list of the things you need to replace. Welcome to the smart kitchen, the future technology which in the late 90s was predicted as the answer to juggling a hectic home life with a busy career.

### THE FUTURE NOW?

That future is now here. But many of these items - although they are available on the market - have become the Sinclair C5 of the 21st century. So what happened? Don't we want our lives to be easier and our kitchens to take the stress out of feeding the family?

lan Pearson is a futurologist with BT, and his life's work is to predict what will make it into our homes in the next 5-10 years. He says: "Basically, they turned out to be silly ideas - things people didn't want. We just don't accept computers running our lives for us. And the technology would be out of date so quickly. I mean, you buy a fridge to last for about 10 years. But any computer technology inside it would need upgrading within six months. It just wasn't practical."

lan also foretold of a phenomenon called 'kitchen rage' which could occur if we all embraced these appliances. "Imagine going to your fridge to get breakfast, but finding it wouldn't open because of a computer security problem. Or what if you networked all your You'd be more likely to take a sledgehammer to it in sheer hunger

either heat or cool, it had embedded web technology developed by Nasa, and could be controlled over the internet or by mobile phone, allowing you to delay the cooking time, change the cooking temperature or cancel the cooking order altogether. TMIO planned to build the ovens itself and sell them over the web by the end of 2003, costing around \$2,000. Frigidaire, Bosch, Siemens and Whirlpool all developed networked fridges, some of which used a bar code scanner to record items which had run out, and send a message directly to a supermarket's website, re-ordering groceries. NCR's Knowledge Lab in London invented the Intelligent Dustbin. This recognised packages that were thrown away, through an embedded chip, to enable automatic replenishment. The dustbin can then place an order electronically for delivery direct to the home. Even those wanting to shed a few pounds were offered electronic help, when Sunbeam came up with a set of bathroom scales to record your weight gains and losses and send the information to your kitchen network, to work out suitable recipes for you and even order the food. It was even possible to get the fridge to rap your knuckles verbally when you reach in for that last cream cake.



### SO WHERE IS ALL THIS TECHNOLOGY?

So where are all these super cool devices? And why don't we have them by now? Ian explains: "People just don't want computers running their lives. If you throw something away, that doesn't always mean you want to replace it. Nor do you want an appliance ordering the same food, week in, week out. You want to be able to shop around for yourself and eat a varied diet. And while we all say 'Don't let me eat that cream cake' how many of us would appreciate being lectured to by a fridge when we give into our cravings?" It would seem there is a line to be drawn when it comes to allowing computers to run our lives. And companies have learned to their cost that the intelligent kitchen was just a step too far over that line. But technology is a fastmoving business, and Ian is swamped with prototypes that he believes will become a reality in the next five years.

# PRACTICAL APPLICATIONS

For instance, the electronic photo frame — an ordinary-looking wooden frame which has an inbuilt computer screen, allowing you to programme in your favourite pictures which will change over every now and again. These, he thinks, will evolve into small computer screens which can be used as a digital recipe book for the

kitchen, allowing you to watch a Delia Smith cookery programme and pause the action while you carry out her instructions. And there will be a market for diagnostic devices on washing machines or dishwashers which can communicate faults to manufacturers, so you can be pre-warned when they are about to breakdown and the supplier will know when to send a repairman, as well as the parts he will need to repair the appliance.

### TECHNOLOGY FOR THE BRIDGET IONES GENERATION

But perhaps most interesting is what is about to happen to our social lives, thanks to a helping hand from a device called the 'ego badge'. Neil explains: "These will be like ordinary lapel badges on which you store a mini website with all your details — whether you're male or female, looking for love or friendship, and all your likes and dislikes. "When you pass other people in the street, their lapel badges will be communicating with yours and the badge will alert you when there's a compatible friend or lover nearby."

So technology may not be making great waves in the kitchen, but for the Bridget Jones generation, it could well be about to make things a lot more interesting in the bedroom.



# ART&CULTURE// Dr ROB GREENE esq







Since the 1970's Robert Greene has been producing drawings, doodles, paintings, prints and other questionable gubbins that he passes off as art. So there was no doubt that this would be the subject he chose to in life. He was trained at Highlands College, Jersey, then after finishing a BA Hons in Illustration in Bristol, he moved to London to further his artistic studying by completing his MA in Communication, Art & Design last year at The Royal College of Art.

During Robert's time at the RCA, the birth of Le Gun took place. Le Gun is a magazine that brings budding artists together in an extraordinary display of illustrative and narrative talent. The magazine has been a huge success within the industry and with established and highly respected artists such as Peter Blake and George Melly (whom both have submitted artwork to the magazine). It has now also received worldwide distribution with the third edition hitting shops in May. As a co-founder and editor of Le Gun along with Neal Fox and Billy Bragg, the trio always intended the magazine to attract all the dreamers, the misfits and the storytellers. The eccentrics rather than the fashionable, plus people who appreciate a rare, collectable and unusual publication.

Throughout Mr Greene's studying he has also displayed a number of successful solo and group exhibitions in both Jersey and London. In 2004 he was awarded second prize in both the JJ Fox International Art Competition and the Oberon Book Illustration Awards. When looking at Robert's previous work we see lots of characters engaged in the pursuits of social enjoyment, such as partaking in the elixir of a fine drop, or wandering in solitude through barren desert landscapes. The lives of gypsies, circus performers and the exotic, whatever Rob is most passionate about is what he explores in his work.

Other characters we meet in these pictures are often seen playing or listening to music, which is an influence in both the subject matter and the artist. At the moment Rob is working on a new musical project with his partner in crime Lord Bath, named 'The Rubbish Men'. Look out for a podcast hitting the radio waves soon. In the meantime you can view Mr Greene's current solo exhibition entitled 'The Inner Noodlings Of My Mind' at the Hometime Gallery (Harbour View Bar & Eatery, St Aubins), which is on display until 31st May. # SALTY DOG

Why am I always the last to know? Apparently Jersey's brought in some sort of new, terribly complicated tax arrangement. I can't make head or tail of my trust income, and that's before I start tackling the modelling payslips, Italian court bills, and the cash for those German TV appearances. Rob seemed

like the perfect solution — a charming accountant who came highly recommended by my chiropodist. I could see why. Tall, tanned, open necked shirt and jeans, he didn't look much like a number cruncher — but I'd been assured he could make tax bills disappear. Knowing how hard he'd have to work on my tangled accounts, I tried to soften the blow by taking him out to lunch at the Salty Dog.

If you haven't ventured out west recently, you might not recognise the newly revamped Salty Dog Bistro. It's turned far more muted less sea shanty and more crisp Chianti. Inside it's a fusion of different finds from the travels of the globetrotting owners — Natalie and Damon Duffy. There are Mexican blankets draped over the chairs, real fishhooks holding up the canopies, and braided twine and seashells curled around the wine glasses. There's nothing salty or doggish about it. And the clientele seem to agree - well-heeled St Aubin locals, relaxed families and informal girlie lunches — at both ends of the generation spectrum. Looking around the restaurant,

almost everyone had ordered fish. They must know a thing or two, because the fish dishes are what make the Salty Dog special. The dynamic Natalie and Damon are passionate about fresh fish – they refuse to use anything farmed. In fact, apart from the more exotic dishes, most of the menu is the local catch of the day.

We began with a couple of starters from the specials menu; hand-dived scallops (local of course) with ginger, spring onion and black cracked pepper and the Thai beef salad with nam jim dressing. The scallops were large and fleshy, served with a couple of strips of streaky bacon and a tangle of salad leaves. The sauce was light and ever so slightly gingery, leaving the delicate shellfish flavours untouched. But the Thai salad was our favourite, liberally sprinkled with the ingredient du jour, Vietnamese red nam jim. The buttery melting fillet steak was the perfect backdrop for the flavours - and what flavours. For those of you who haven't yet tried nam jim, it's surprisingly complex; sweetly perfumed, and hot, but with a tantalisingly easy-on-the-tongue sort of heat. Talking about easy; it could have been the chardonnay, but I was starting to find my accountant more attractive by the minute. We even discovered we shared a childhood trauma - tap dancing classes. Imagine that, everyone else wearing their Fame legwarmers while we clattered off to class in our black tap shoes. It's enough to send anyone into therapy. Thankfully the main courses arrived before we could compare our shim sham shimmies. We'd gone for the fresh fillet of marlin with warm Cajun salsa - another special, and the Thai

# BODY - OUTDOOR TRAINING - BY STEVE LONGSTAFFE

With the weather now starting to improve rapidly, a lot of people enjoy doing some training outside. It is of course important to keep up the weights side of any fitness program, but depending on how your gym is situated you may be then be able to do a lot of your cardiovascular regime outside. Remember that different terrain or obstacles can be very beneficial, so learn to use the environment around you, bearing in mind that training outside will not be as safe as training inside the gym. Be aware of various surfaces you may train on.

Steps are a great way of pushing your legs hard, accelerating rapidly on the way up, and taking it nice and slowly on the way down.

Useful tool's, include a decent pair of trainers and a heart rate monitor.



Benches or concrete kerbs can be utilised for doing on the spot step up's to really work the leg muscles.

On the beach, once the water heats up to a comfortable temperature, running in it just above knee depth is a great way of intensifying a cardio session.

If there are two of you, you can easily bring a set of gloves and pads with you to work a bit of boxing into your routine, as it is such an effective way to burn calories fast. Various routines that involve jabs hooks and uppercuts can be a great way of using different muscle groups.

Any suitable grass area can be used for various different exercises on the spot such a press ups, squat thrusts and crunches, or just picking two spots to run between them, getting yourself face down at each end for a number of repetitions.





# NUTRITION, HYDRATION

Keeping yourself well hydrated in the sunshine is extremely important, as well as having adequate carbohydrates in your system to perform your exercises. So often it is worth bringing a sports drink with you that will last the duration. A lot of runners now also tend to use cod liver oil and glucosamine. The Cod liver oil acts as a good anti- inflammatory on your joints, and the glucosamine can help to keep your connective tissues healthy, especially if you tend to run on harder surfaces.

Phil Sharp is into sailing. He started sailing competitively at university, where he captained the Imperial College team to victory in Cowes Week 2003. He then qualified for the famous Mini Transat solo race, which, despite some life-challenging conditions, saw him overcome seemingly insurmountable odds. Hopes of a good result seemed dashed when he took incorrect weather advice and ended up in 58th position after the first few days at sea. He turned it around though by making one of the biggest recoveries in the race's history and ended in fourth place overall, the second best British result in the 30 year history of the race. Following this, he's decided to compete in this year's Route du Rhum, the Grand Prix of all single-handed transatlantic races running from St Malo (where a staggering one million people are expected at the start) to Guadeloupe this October. Gallery caught up with him as he prepares for the big race.

# SPORT // OFFSHORE RACING

#### Is offshore racing a sport anyone can take part in?

Yes, totally. It's a hugely diverse sport with something there for all: be it cruising or racing, in dinghies or yachts, inshore or offshore. Offshore Racing is something that really tests your mental and physical endurance, which stems ultimately from competitiveness. If you badly want to win, you're likely to be successful in the sport.

#### What's the hardest thing about the Route Du Rhum event?

Sleep deprivation. This is the hardest part of solo sailing since skippers must push the boat as hard as possible for as long as possible to give them the best chance of success. In my last race I averaged one hour sleep per night for a week and started hallucinating heavily. I once had a mermaid appear on the foredeck who convinced me I was sailing the wrong way and made me turn the boat round and start sailing north instead of south — quite scary in retrospect.

#### Do you think you can win it and is it safe?

Yes, definitely. Well, as long as I'm not distracted by too many mermaids. It's not exactly safe. Probably one in every 100 sailors in the race are lost. The big danger is falling over the side whilst the boat's on autopilot as all you can do is watch it sail away from you. A few years ago this happened to a guy, but incredibly he was spotted and picked up by a competitor who sailed past him hours later.

# How can you afford to take part in this event? How much does it all cost?

Corporate sponsorship is the key to getting to the startline. Currently I am searching hard for the right sponsor to come on board. The total campaign budget is around £150K, which sounds a lot but is in fact quite modest compared to sixty-foot round the world campaigns, which can require up to £5 million.

Bank holidays. Bit of a waste of time in my opinion. By the time you've had a lie-in, realised all the shops are shut, watched rubbish TV and thought about going out on a walk, the day's almost gone. But with an enthusiastic instructor like Mick Cullinane from Pure Adventure, no one can stay apathetic for long. He was waiting down at Greve de Lecq with all our equipment, kayaks, first aid kit, flares and wetsuits - despite my determination that I wasn't getting my hair wet. A quick kayaking tutorial on the slipway and it was off into the water. The sun was shining, the sea was as smooth as a millpond, and thanks to Mick's tuition, paddling was a breeze. It was postcard Jersey, the early evening sun streaming over the cliffs, our kayaks gliding through the water and the clear blue sea stretching away to the Pater Nosters. We stayed close

to the cliffs, catching glimpses of nesting fulmar and then suddenly there it was. My first puffin. Smaller and stubbier than you imagine, it circled us twice before disappearing further up the cliffs. Mick wanted to show us a cave - one of several he explores on his coasteering trips. The water turned the most amazing emerald green as we neared the entrance to the cave. Inside it opened out into a huge chamber with a natural oval 'window' letting in a shaft of light. We sat in our kayaks for a moment, gazing at the eerie darkness of the tunnel disappearing deeper into the cliff, and wondering how many smugglers had used these caves. Heading back towards the slipway, we took our last looks at the towering cliffs of the north coast. "Breathtaking" said Mick. Gliding through the sun-dappled water with gulls flying over our heads, I couldn't agree more. 

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# DO ITYOURSELE?

Not all of us are lucky enough to have a garden yet, but whether you have one already, or are planning on having a green space in the near future you're going to want to make your garden your own... welcome to the world of garden design.

Television programmes featuring unattractive ginger ladies and butch young builders convinced you that redesigning your garden was entirely feasible. Then you remembered the time your dad tried to 'do the garden' and what it ended up looking like. Suddenly it wasn't such a good idea.

A well designed garden can add significantly to the value of your home, but as well as benefiting your bank balance, the therapeutic benefits of having a nice green space to relax in cannot be underestimated. Firstly, you want to think of your garden as another room, an extension of the house, and as with any room you need to create boundaries, decide on accessories and place furniture to convey your own ideas and sense of style. Also, always keep in mind that you're aiming to create an attractive and comfortable space that has to look inviting and be enjoyable. Consider things such as seating arrangements and making the most of whatever views your garden enjoys and you'll add virtual square footage to your home. The overall effect should be to produce the illusion that you are moving to another part of an improved, larger living environment.

Overall, planning will give you far more confidence than you'd ever have making it up as you go along. You may even want to draft in help from a professional at this stage to perfect your ideas, especially in relation to building regulations and structural changes. 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



#### PLANTS

#### WATER FEATURES

A fountain or water feature, unlike other statues or pieces of garden furniture, works with two senses at once: sight and sound. The pleasing sound of flowing water goes a long way to providing a calming atmosphere, indoors or out. And in urban environments, flowing water screens out the city's noise pollution. These days, what you think are stone fountains are often made of durable, light-weight, easy-to-maintain fibreglass, and need little or no care after installation.

The garden fountain is a time-honoured tradition in Japan, and finding a Japanese fountain will give your garden a completely modern look as opposed to the traditional feel of the carved stone or stone-look fountain. Garden fountains are fairly easy to install, requiring only a pump, and room enough to install it. # HAIRDRESSERS NEED NOT APPLY // AUDI TT

It is hard to believe that this seminal creation of automotive design has been cruising our dual carriageway and green lanes for nearly eight years now. And, until recently, that is exactly what the TT had been doing - just cruising.

Following its arrival into the car industry's consciousness as a design concept at the Frankfurt Motor Show in 1995, the TT spent its early life living by its looks: the object of everyone's interest; rocking up to industry events; drinking all the champagne; and exiting before the speeches - leaving no head unturned.

A thing of sheer beauty, the TT did for the automotive industry what, say, Kelly Brook did for The Big Breakfast. Against the backdrop of a tired cast, complacency for the competition, and mundane re-hashes of seen-before styles, Brook and the Audi TT had glamour in spades and caused umpteen young professionals to dream into their Cornflakes. Yet also, they both gave the impetus to beat the alarm clock to the breakfast table: 'If I pull my finger out, one day I may find myself with one of those". So what if the heady heights reached in those eight years led to little or no discernable tampering to the TT's formula? Remember, the inception of this car in 1998 redefined the term "waiting list". If it ain't broke...

But, enter, the new millennium. Whether simply that civilisation had reached Y2K - and 'the future' - or that the East had begun churning out its own smart car concepts, the automotive world upped the ante. Regardless of reputation, car manufacturers have, for the last five years or so, been vying for position in every class, through every market, to all demographics. The credentials of the Audi TT Sport - its styling, its handling and its performance - are a direct result of the intensified competition. In devising the TT Sport, Audi have laid to rest some of the shortcomings that early models were criticised for. Any car claiming sport-like kudos can have underwear-dissolving

appeal and 1000 horses under the bonnet, but without good handling - a chassis, engine and suspension set-up to match - the vehicle is only good for garden parties or coast-road car parks on a Friday night.

The TT Sport, however, has furthered the formula of previous models. A once beautiful but superficial car is now 50kg lighter – and therefore nimbler. It has a tinkered quattro four-wheel-drive system and a more rigid chassis. This firmness has been achieved by replacing the spare wheel with a tyre mobility system, and the parcel shelf and rear seat with a stability bar to improve torsional rigidity for optimum handling. Formerly an Achilles heel, the latest TT handles like no other.

The performance of this TT Sport vindicates the pretender reputation that its forebears harshly weathered, finally awarding the original design true meaning: with a V5 turbo-charged engine, which produces 240 bhp and can reach 62mph in 5.9 seconds, the cockpit-style interior - typified by the shape of the windscreen, ride height and brushed metal interior - no longer feels unwarranted. Many engines holler like an attention deficient redhead, but this latest attempt by Audi is both smooth and potentially ruthless. Reaching a restricted top speed of 155, whilst boasting breaks and a gear box that The Stig would hide under his pillow at night for safe keeping, the Audi TT Sport is by far the most driver-focused TT to date.

With one of the greatest figures ever designed; an engine bearing a voice that sings pitch-perfect; a huge set of lungs; and a look that oozes cool, the Audi TT Sport, were it human, would be the lovechild that Monroe and Sinatra never had. And one thing is clear, during a weekend test drive, the deposit you had considered putting down for that back alley basement flat in 'sunny' Bucharest would seem nothing short of madness.



# ON SE FAIT LA BISE? // AUVENT DES ISLES

Having, all too briefly, attended French classes at Highlands College, I was able to manage most shopping situations as soon as I arrived in France. Even more importantly, I was equipped to handle the very polite but unremitting ritual of 'greetings'. You may not be aware, for instance, that it is in order for a man to say to a woman, on being introduced to her for the first time, "on se fait la bise?" Or, "shall we kiss?" As good an ice breaker as you could wish for and perfectly acceptable!

But, after twelve months of two classes a week, one for conversation and one for the dreaded grammar, I often feel as if my linguistic skills have not progressed much from when I first stepped of the ferry! It is surprising how many mispronunciations English speakers make that seem to sound like 'rude' words (double entendres are rife!) to the locals. Of course we rarely get to know what's going on, just met with blank or bemused faces. One (printable) example occurred the other day at my local garage (adorned with 'trophy' Jersey number plates!). Something had broken on my car and, unable to think of the appropriate words, I said it was "kaput". A much used expression incidentally by worried Brits in France! It transpires that it means "condom"! Spelt "capote" but the pronunciation is remarkably similar! Why they should think I wish to say "my car is a condom" I don't know, but that is what the grinning mechanics chose to think!

This brings me on to another matter to look out for, 'les toilettes'. Whilst Jersey may be well endowed with wonderful clean conveniences (generally), this is not always the case in France. The evil 'hole in ground' lives on, indeed is still being installed in new public loos. We recently travelled the modern A29 motorway east from Le Harve. A wonderful example of civil engineering with massive bridges, viaducts and a silky smooth road surface, complete with nice new Services every 20 kms. During the journey I needed to 'pay a visit' and worryingly discovered only holes in the ground. I have never fully understood these things, and they send my wife into an anti France rage, but when desperate they certainly look OK (to me)! However, these new ones have a trick up their sleeve that can cause considerable 'inconvenience' to the unwary user. There are ground level sensors that identify when your feet have moved from the immediate 'hole' zone. If you shuffle a few inches away to sort ones clothes out, 'it' assumes you have gone away and activates four 'massive' jets of water directed across the whole cubicle floor before swirling down the hole. If you are not lightning fast you can emerge more than a bit damp!

There is another, less embarrassing perhaps, but still irritating for unsuspecting visitors from Jersey and the UK, the absence of 'le sac plastique', (carrier bag to you and me), at supermarkets. Many is the time that I have noticed shoppers arrive at the checkout with a week's holiday groceries, only to find there are no bags! It is over a year now since French supermarkets virtually ceased providing plastic bags; you must bring your own reusable ones! The statistics that are produced by the Conseil Général indicating the huge reduction in non bio degradable plastics to be disposed of each year as a consequence of this action are amazing. It is surprising perhaps that given the size of Jersey, and all the problems that exist regarding waste disposal on the island, that a similar step has not yet been taken!

On one hand the causes are many and varied – from habitat loss, to pollution, to the introduction of siten species to the habitate of threatened species, or, as The New Scientist refers to it, the McDonaldisation of Earth's blots. There is one common. denominator in all of these factors though Man.Well, woman as well if you want to be all PC about it.

redist.org) there are some 15,589 species now known to be in a

pertious position.

We really are ruining everything. There was a time when the media. were saying that the next generation would have to deal with mass extinctions, global warming and holey ozone layers — but it's happening right now. Most estimates show that an eighth of all birds and a quarter of all mammals are in jeopardy, while a third of amphibians and almost two thirds of turtles and tortoises could be gone by 2025. In the last 500 years, 844 species are known to have died out, great apec have recently declined by over 50% in parts of Africa, half of marsuptals are in Jeopardy, and a staggering 40% of Asia's plants and animals could soon be lost. The Amezonian rainforest is today being cleared at rate of 24,000 km2 per year (equivalent to New York City's Central Park being destroyed every hour), Singapore has lost 95% of its tropical forests, South East Asis. may lose 74% by 2100, and in 54 countries across the world 90% of forests have been felled.

To top off this bout of suicidal planet butchening there were 580,000 tonnes of all split into the sea in 470 separate accidents between 1993 and 2002. Impressive. Scartest of all though is the fact that the 1.5 million species we know may only be a fraction of the true number facing extinction. Although acteniate have catalogued 1.5 million species, there could be between 5 to 100 million in total according to some scientists. Of these, some experts predict that 27,000 could be falling extinct every year - that's one every 20 minuted it's not all bad news

that human actions alone can prevent many species from becoming extinct."There are many examples of species being brought back from the brink. Good things are achievable."

Gosento home, the Durnell Wildlife Conservation Trust tast the forefront of protecting some of the world's most endangered species. According to Quentin Bloom, the Director of Conservation Management, thanks to work at Durrell Wildlife the Mallorcan midwife toad has been reclassified from Critically Endangered to Vulnerable through the re-introduction of several hundred tadpoles to the wild. They've made the future of this little toad, once thought eatinct, much brighter.

On the world scale, global colossus China has recently had it's own success story. This absolutely immense country faces one of the world's feature deteriorating environments with a rapidly encroaching desert comprising one fifth of the land-mass (that's seven times the area of Britain) expanding rapidly due to dimate change, rapid industrial sistion, over-logging and over-grazing. Beijing has invested more than 50bn yuan (£3.5bn) since 1978 in constructing a "Great Green Wall" to combat it's advance, but for most of that time it has been losing budly. Until now According to a new report, the deserts have shrunk at a rate of 1,283 ag km a. year since 200 l, with forest cover by contrast increasing by 66m. hectares each year. Although the gains are small compared with the environmental losses that preceded them, they do show how through the mobilization of resources the tide can be turned.

Of course, if all this conservation business falls we could just collect. a few bones and reincamate them as clones in 2050. In fact, that's not a bad idea...

The ANIIO goes where no front projector has gone before: the wall. The projector uses what LG calls a 'Total Internal Reflection' lens setup to make the projector as flat as possible, allowing it to be mounted on a wall without sticking out more than a few inches. Truly a thing of beauty.

To achieve its 3.7-inch-thick form, engineers at LG developed an L-shaped lens that shoots the picture across itself. The resulting projector can display an image of between 30 and 300 inches with a 2,500:1 contrast ratio. It's HDTV ready and has WXGA resolution. In other words, it's going to wipe the floor with the projectors of yester year.


