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
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




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

Yes, I'm sure the folks who fled New Orleans feel like they've overcome everything, Nashville, Feb. 1, 2006.



CHILEAN GLACIER DESTRUCTION

Chain mails are getting more and more common and are increasingly powerful tools in today's web-connected world. They can whip up a ground-swell of popular opinion within weeks and force change incredibly quickly - whereas in the past the media had to be involved if you wanted to publicise a situation to the world, it's now possible to do so with access to an internet connection. The Pascua Lama chain mail is one such example. Currently doing the rounds, this draws attention to the San Felix valley in Chile where a struggle is taking place between Barrick Gold, a mining company who want to get at huge deposits of gold and silver, and the indigenous people. According to the mail, they want to destroy two glaciers, which apparently supply the country's purest water, and make two huge holes, each as big as a whole mountain, one for extraction and one for the mine's rubbish tip. However Barrick Gold have offically refuted these claims and on their website (www. barrick.com) publish a rebuttal to many of the accusations made in the chain letter. ORIGIN OF THE WORD // DOLLAR

The almighty dollar originated in, what is now, the Czech Republic. In 1519, a silver mine near the town of Joachimstal began minting a silver coin called the Joachimstaler. The coin, which was circulated widely, became better known by its clipped form, the taler, which in Dutch and Low German becomes daler as the initial consonant is softened. English adopted this form, eventually changing its spelling to the modern dollar. In the American colonies, there was no standard currency with the coin in widest usage being the Spanish Peso also known as "Pieces of Eight." The English colonists informally assigned the name dollar to this coin. In 1785, when the Continental Congress established U.S. currency, they adopted dollar as the name for the standard unit of currency because the term was widely known and was not associated with any form of official English currency. Also at this time the term disme, from the French dixieme, for a tenth of a dollar pronounced deem, eventually became dime. The United States was the first nation to adopt an official currency named the dollar. In 1797, the Bank of England began minting 'dollar' coins as bank-issued currency. Other nations that have adopted the name dollar for their currency have done so in emulation of either the U.S. or this short-lived Bank of England practice.





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




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

THIS MONTH'S EXHIBITION //

BEKKI MOURANT RESISTANCE IS FUTILE

"I can't help but wonder about how many people, families and lifestyles gather as memories in the bricks that secure us. Years of change, colour and moods; now become exposed for all to see, through the continuous renewal of redevelopment. The inside walls now visible, displaying through elemental decay, rooms of different blocks of colour, revealing the stains and traces of the life that has been left. Past appliances, fat stains from cookers, hidden drips of tones behind radiators, exposed plaster inside sockets. These are the details that interest me and have influenced my work, as I observe the layering of out of date patterns, that stripped away, reveal the solid wall."

"I find myself drawing inspiration from this constant renewal of buildings. Reflecting not only with the decay of matter due to nature, but also with decay of our memories and past. Influenced by American artist, Robert Rauschenberg and the Spanish artist Antonio Tapies, I am inspired by their use of colour and texture. And this is where my work centres, using the same household materials, that I observe within these decaying buildings, I stimulate this aging process. Reacting brightly coloured oil based with water based paints, layering my work with varnish and cement. It's enjoyable watching the resistance between the materials, as they peel and crack, offering a speedy and organic aging process. A reminder of our past and all the differing layers we achieve."

Although it sounds like an extravagant claim, Serles really does seem to have the ability to make you feel as though you're there (or at least as he must have felt), as he gets into dodgy situation after dodgy situation. A well recommended South American adventure crammed with hilarious and true travel tales. Well recommended.



Doran's

I've never had a good experience yet with ebay. First there was that "100% GENUINE!!" Fendi Spy bag that turned out to be a fake with all the zips the wrong way round. Then that signed copy of the Da Vinci Code, bought for what I thought was a bargain bid of £15, until I saw the

hastily rubbed out £1.75 pencilled on the flyleaf. "You've been doing it all wrong," said my ebay entrepreneur friend Olivia, as we settled down in the courtyard of Doran's, "don't buy all that worthless tat - just sell it instead". Armed with just a digital camera and a good business nose, Olivia is now one of the top ten earners on ebay.co.uk and has her jet set lifestyle funded by people with names like bill69 and fluffykitkat. Terribly jealous, I hoped she'd spill her moneymaking secrets over supper.

Doran's - so dependable you can order before you've even seen the menu; "some potted bread, one of those Moroccan things, something with duck and a side order of the garlic mange-tout". Easy. Which is why most of us have been there – at least once. The menu makes interesting reading, with Moroccan-inspired dishes and local seafood all vying for first place. Don't expect a huge array of vegetarian options, but the meat-free dishes did sound more appetising than the usual wild mushroom risotto. Of course, both being carnivores, we had the full menu to choose from, and Liv started with the hand-dived scallops glazed with golden syrup and lime on a bed of pea and mint purée and mango salad. A rather wordy description for such a delicate dish, butter-soft scallops with bright orange coral clashing beautifully with the deep green pea purée. "Lovely!" pronounced Olivia. I went for the honey-roasted pears, glazed figs and Parma ham with a mango coulis. It was a great combination of flavour and texture, the sweet top notes of pear contrasting with the salty, almost smoky Parma ham, and caramelised oozing figs adding another dimension.

I stayed on the Moroccan side of the menu for the main course; the lamb and date tagine with toasted almond buttery couscous. A warming hug of a dish, this is definitely comfort food – but halfway through I decided I was all couscous-ed out and couldn't manage another mouthful. Olivia chose the Surf n'Turf on the specials menu - a steaming plate of beef medallions, half a lobster, and a handful of baby Jersey royals, all doused with sizzling garlic butter. While Livvy was wrestling with her lobster, she told me how she'd got into the ebay world. It all started when she bought a pair of cheap gladiator sandals that turned out to be a size too small. She posted them on Ebay, and typed in "as seen on Kate Moss", and within minutes a bidding frenzy started, with the £7.50 sandals eventually selling for nearly a hundred quid. Of course, she went back to the shop, bought their entire stock, and flogged the lot. Now she's a regular in the Romford Primark, the latest copy of Heat! in hand, picking up bargain versions of whatever Kate/Sienna/Coleen's wearing, and selling them for big bucks.

So simple, yet so effective. I was trying to interest her in a Jersey franchise, when restaurant manager, Mark Oldham arrived with the dessert menu. Olivia chose the palate-cleansing lemon sorbet, which tasted authentically homemade. Mark recommended a special coffee for me but, ever discreet, couldn't bring himself to name it. Be brave and ask for "pure sex" and you'll get a terribly alcoholic mix of Amaretto, Cointreau and Baileys in your post-prandial coffee. It's worth it just to see him blush. Our verdict on Dorans? Well it's reassuringly dependable, (but that could read "dull" in some people's food-speak!)

And it looks like I'm not about to turn into the next Ebay high flyer. Olivia did offer me a job... but not as her partner, as her packer. Such a shame I'm allergic to sellotape...

For our latest escapade with Pure Adventure, Mick Cullinane our guide/action man, suggested we try out something called coasteering. I'd never heard of it before, and thought it would probably be a bit like co-piloting, but when he started to pull out wetsuits and helmets from the van, I realised I'd signed up for something more serious. Coasteering involves squeezing into a wetsuit, helmet, buoyancy aid and old trainers and then working your way around the coast at sea level. Sounds simple? It's not. You have to scramble, climb, swim and best of all, cliff jump to complete the route. Imagine a Famous Five adventure, but with full protective gear, and a guide who knows the coastline like the back of his hand to make sure you don't get into difficulties. Fully kitted out in our coasteering gear, the intrepid Gallery team set off from Grève de Lecq beach to explore one of the most fascinating stretches of coastline Jersey has to offer. Crossing the rocks, Mick pointed out green and purple-tinged sea anemones and told us about the different rock formations we could see in the strata above us. We swam into dark caves, slithering and scrambling our way to hidden chambers deep within the cliff. And then for a real adrenaline rush, the cliff jumps, plunging 15 feet into the churning water below, then clambering out onto slippery green rocks. The buoyancy aid helps you float, so you don't need to be an especially strong swimmer, but you will need to be confident in the water. Mick can point out easier routes and lower jumps for the slightly more wary. Basically all that's required is a sense of adventure and fun – oh, and a pair of old trainers.

BODY - muscles and upper body workout - by steve longstaffe

This month we will be looking at techniques for toning up your muscles. There are a number of techniques with dumbbells that I like to use, and here are some of my favourites.

The main advantages in using dumbbells are that they tend to be more difficult to hold stable, so you use your synergist muscles a lot more - these are your smaller muscles around joints that help promote stability. Also using a higher number of repetitions when exercising with them will help create a more toned effect as you will be stimulating your slow twitch muscle fibres, muscle fibres more suited to endurance activities.

A body built from more of these type of fibres tends to look leaner and more slender than one with larger fast twitch fibres. Take for example the endurance runner and the 100 metre sprinter. Other great exercises involve using your own body weight to exercise, for example pull ups.

The Gallery Tri-Annual Careers feature is proving very popular. This time we take a look at some of the personalities working in Jersey. Taken from a selection of the Island's best known and most influential companies, they represent a cross-section of our St Helier based working population and cover many of the major industries.

Having looked at the international aspects of working in Jersey in December of last year, and having analysed how we're placed to face the future last April, we thought that it was about time to focus on the most important part of any organisation - the staff. The idea with this piece was to give you the reader an insight into the lives of the people responding. In the following pages you'll learn about where they come from, find out how they ended up where they are today and discover what their motivations are at work.

As well as all of the things you'd expect to hear though, they've also talked about interviewing Lauren Hill, taking over the world, hot armpits in London, how amazing skiing is, Stoke-On-Trent, the Trans Siberian Railway, Liberation Square martial arts demonstrations, bingo calling, capoeira and great white sharks. Most bizarre of all though are the answers at the end of each interview to the question, "what kind of ice-cream would you be and why?". Although, as one respondent rightly pointed out, on first glance this question has absolutely nothing to do with a careers piece, it does seem to have drawn some of the most illuminating answers. Somehow.

As well as this, we decided that rather than have a shot taken of each of them at work, we'd ask them to supply us with one from their personal collection. Most commonly careers features focus on people dressed in their work clothes, normally a suit. It's good to remember though that work is more than just the act of working these days. Businesses want rounded individuals who are more than a human calculator and nowadays terms such as 'personality' and 'emotional intelligence' are strongly considered by HR managers when selecting employees. The respondents choice of photo is as varied as the answers themselves with some of the shots are of them as children, one doing capoeira and another cycling down a sand dune.

It's more of a fun feature than usual but that doesn't mean it's not serving a purpose. We all spend about a third of our lives at work and as well as doing a job and making a living, you're also making friends, learning and developing. You're around your colleagues all of the time and, like it or not, when you take on a job they become part of your life. It all means that if you're thinking of changing jobs, or are looking to take on your first role, there are more factors to consider than the amount of money that'll arrive in your account at the end of the month.

This feature demonstrates the range of personalities at work in Jersey, all of them very successful, all of them very individual. We hope you enjoy meeting them...

From age twelve I was intent on becoming a journalist. I'd always had an interest in news and current affairs as a youngster and used to drive my folks nuts by asking endless questions about anything and everything. It seemed the perfect job for me - traveling around interviewing people, using my writing skills and creating articles from scratch.

What made you decide to live and work in Jersey?

Impending marriage! I met my Jersey-born wife, Rebecca, when working together at Kiss 102 Radio. We subsequently spent a year together in Ireland which cemented our relationship but we both felt itchy-footed so decided to give Jersey a whirl. That was six-and-a-half years ago.

How did you come to work in your industry?

My journey to the world of accountancy with Deloitte is a little unorthodox... I began my working life as a radio journalist in Manchester, presenting and producing a daily entertainment news show. I was rapidly fulfilling my journalistic ambitions and got to interview hundreds of people including Robbie Williams, Lauryn Hill, Chemical Brothers, Kylie Minogue, Eddie Izzard and Steve Coogan. Radio then took me to Ireland, where I worked as Deputy Programme Director with Atlantic 252 for a year before heading to Jersey. On arrival in the Island there were limited opportunities in the media so I took stock of the skills I had and decided to apply them at an advertising agency, where I was exposed to a range of different industries. I worked there until deciding it wasn't for me in the long run, so joined Deloitte two years ago to retrain as a Chartered Accountant.

What hopes do you have for your career?

I'm two-thirds of the way through my training contract and have the final set of ACA exams to surmount before I qualify; so much of my focus is on getting my head down and grinding through those before making longer term decisions. My choice to switch careers to

accountancy was influenced by the wide range of options which it gives you in the long run, which is comforting when you're married with children and have commitments. So for stability as well as scope I don't think you could choose a better career path in Jersey.

Why did you choose to work at Deloitte?

I spoke to a number of the Big Four accountancy firms, plus a few of the smaller ones and Deloitte quite simply impressed me the most. It's fair to say that all of the big firms offer a similar training package in terms of support for study but what separated Deloitte was the atmosphere. It's very professional yet relaxed and there is a general sense of momentum about the firm, which is positive to be around and exciting to be part of.

What is the most enjoyable aspect of working in Jersey for you?

We work with a wide range of clients cutting across pretty much all industry sectors and this mix makes the job varied. Jersey's finance industry is constantly evolving and working at Deloitte gives you great exposure to all sections of it. Finally, apart from the natural environment around us in Jersey (having a sea view from the office helps), the shortness of commuting time is a big plus - especially if you travel by Vespa as I do. Getting to and from work is a breeze.

For the moment it's the amount of study required and much of this is done, by choice, off-island so I have to spend a fair bit of time away from my wife and two young daughters. Working away in London is also sometimes necessary which is fine as long as you don't get fog-bound and stuck at Gatwick for the weekend, as happened to me recently!

Finally, if you were an ice-cream what kind would you be and why? Funny Feet. Ask my wife the reason why...







What made you decide to live and work in Jersey?

Well I was born here, so that was a bit of a deciding factor. Finally, if you were an ice-cream what kind would you be and why? I think a 99 because I'm a bit of a softie.



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
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STOCKBROKING

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
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
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At about the age of seven I thought being a bingo caller would be quite good fun. After that I decided I wanted a career in journalism or television. HR was never on the radar at that stage.


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What did you want to be when you were younger? An actress!

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Location, Location.

As countless estate agents will tell you it's the most important factor in buying a property. So when an opportunity came up to buy a run down property on an idyllic site at Plemont, Matt Cosgrove and Jane Williams jumped at the chance. Although buying the property and the land involved a huge renovation project, they saw the potential, made an offer and got the home of the dreams.

They had dreamt of buying a three or four bedroom home, but the huge demand for such properties, combined with the fact that there just aren't that many on the market, meant that they weren't having much luck. All that changed when they were the first to hear about a truly unique Plemont property which had just come on the market. As one of the first to show interest, they eventually managed to successfully buy the site.

In short, it's breathtaking. With extensive views of Sark, the sea and the surrounding countryside, there can't be many better views anywhere on the Island. For such a unique site Matt and Jane always wanted to build a unique house that would maximise the views, whilst complementing and blending into the natural surrounding environment. As there was a cottage on the site already, the plan was to renovate. However, because of the extensive work needed, the costs would have been equal to building a brand new ecofriendly house. So guess what they did? Built their own stunning home from scratch of course.

With Matt being a builder he had a good idea of how they would go about building their own dream home, although at first the only thing the couple were sure of was the fact that they wanted a timber-framed house. Whilst researching on the internet, they came across an American company called Deck House who build wooden frame houses. They instantly felt that Deck House had the look and atmosphere they wanted to create and found themselves completely in-tune with the company ethos of creating individual houses to suit a particular life style. After Matt visited a Deck House home in the UK, they were sure that this was an avenue they wanted to pursue. Their idea was to combine the work of Deck House with that of a local architect, mixing the American style to fit into the local landscape. They found the very person in George De-Sousa of Page Architects who evolved Matt and Jane's initial concepts to create a beach house by the sea. Crucially, although the house was the first of its kind in Jersey, they received planning permission and the design was passed onto Deck House for creation. Once Deck House had completed construction of the timber frame in the US, it took only six weeks to ship it over to Jersey and have it delivered to the property where Matt and a specialist team from the UK erected the structure.

Matt soon found that the building techniques utilised by the American firm far outweighed anything that he had seen before. For example, using Deck House's plan there are five inches of continuous solid insulation over the roof structure ensuring there are no cold spots whatsoever causing a local building inspector to comment that it was one of the most insulated roofs he'd ever seen in Jersey. Chunky cedar timbers were used on all sun decks and stairways, with powder coated aluminium on timber windows making them maintenance free and perfect for the coastal location. Importantly, the house is also a Post and Beam construction, allowing the interior rooms to be moved around with out weakening the structure. Great if you feel like a change! A full heat recovery system was also installed, which continuously removes the air from the house and replaces it with fresh air from outside. In the winter months the system has the added bonus of heating the air up as it comes in. Maybe it is due this canny innovation, in conjunction with the heavyweight insulation, the under floor heating, that was installed throughout has hardly been used at all.

The exterior of the house has large areas of exposed timber cladding. This has been coated with American bleaching oil to give it a more weathered look and combined with the dry stone facing imported from Brittany and the paintwork, it all serves to complement the surrounding countryside.







The interior on the other hand is all about elegant beach living. Upstairs is the living area with one large open-plan room overlooking the sea where the main feature is the dramatic exposed vaulted ceiling - another beautiful feature of a Deck House. The kitchen is central to the room, with handcrafted cupboards, again built by Matt, which have been painted in a milky blue oil paint and topped with beech work surfaces. This is surrounded by the eating and relaxing areas, which are sectioned off using tongue and groove style dividing with the whole house complemented by soft white walls, pale old and new wooden furniture, and bleached oak doors and stairway. Variations of soft blues and stripes have been used in fabrics, rugs and seating and cream Italian stone flooring flows throughout the house, including into the bathrooms, showers and up and around the bathroom sinks and bath. All the elements add to the sense of continuity and calm. The three bedrooms and two bathrooms are downstairs, giving seclusion and privacy and all bedrooms feature plantation shutters and sea grass flooring adding to the relaxed feel. The master bedroom has sliding glass doors, which will open up on to what will be a lower sun deck, and the bath has been raised to be level with the window, so whilst soaking in the bath the views can be taken in. Jane goes onto explain that the house really comes into it's own in the summer, "the large areas of sliding glass and the wrap around sun deck really bring inside and outside living together while making the most of the views. Because it's really warm in winter and cool in summer, the property really is an ideal environment to live in year round".

Although their home seems so perfect already, the couple are keen to stress that this is an ongoing project with many finishing touches to be added, along with work starting on the garden and lower sundeck. In line with work already completed, they're planning on using natural materials, starting with huge granite boulders that were excavated at the beginning of the build, to fit in with the surrounding environment. As Matt and Jane say; "it is just a lovely place to be, we couldn't be happier in our new home".

In fact, they're so delighted that Matt is going to start constructing them himself. So, if this article has whet your appetite and you're interested in finding out more, get in touch with Matt who'll be able to help. You certainly won't have any doubts after a visit to Plemont!



Two years ago, as we packed our possessions into endless cardboard boxes ready for the removal men, we were frequently asked by well meaning friends "what ever would we find to do with our time?" I can confess, I was secretly nervous about it myself at that time, but always responded with great lists of all the projects that I had previously never managed to get started. I was going to paint, write, learn French, grow flowers, create an organic vegetable plot, cycle daily and cook from the many books that we have collected over the years. And now, with the exception of painting, which my wife has made her new vocation, I do them all! Without any of the bars, clubs, multi screen cinemas, theatre, ethnic restaurants etc that we enjoyed in Jersey, we seem to be entertaining ourselves far more comprehensively than ever before, without any hint of boredom setting in!

It has, however, taken the full two years to see the first positive signs of our acceptance into our village community, and invited to join in with the 'natives' periodic "entertainment!" Cards or dominoes in the village hall on every third Thursday, monthly "rambles" led by the Mayor, periodic bike rides at a very gentle pace, to include everyone from grannies to small children. But the favourite activity is "Belote". A card game for four using a thirty-two card pack (the cards run from Ace down to seven), which is extremely popular across all France, although there are, as ever, the usual regional variations.

Paris, of course, has to have its own sophisticated (and very complicated) version and when discussing the game with some English speaking Parisians recently, they disparagingly referred to our version as "peasant!" But in this land of (supposed) equality, to be "peasant" is no bad thing, and so we frequently play Belote moving each time to a different house in the village, including the landmark day when the card school arrived at chez Beaumont!

You might think, as we did, whilst playing cards for a couple of hours we might enjoy some bottles of wine and a few nibbles during the game. But not a bit of it! Like everything here, there is a strict way of doing things. Nothing to eat or drink during games, and then coffee and a cake (or small pudding) afterwards, when we all discuss local affairs for a few minutes before hurrying off to do other things. Following our last Belote session we were invited to come and see the "little pigs!" After being ceremoniously handed an assortment of Wellington boots (unsurprisingly they don't call them that here!) we headed off through their back garden towards a huge fenced enclosure full of dense and prickly shrubs. After hurling handfuls of corn into the bushes and loudly calling out (it sounded like "cacooch!") half a dozen wild boar, or "sanglier", came running out! They are very big when you are that close to them! And some have some heavy duty tusks to be avoided at all costs! It appears that our neighbours, André and Simone, breed these animals for release into the forest prior to the start of the autumn hunting season.

We have probably yet to discover all the local events that take place throughout the year, but perhaps the most important one is the Mayor's Midsummer Banquet. This is the sort of event that only occurs in Britain following a coronation or winning the World Cup! But here, once a year, everyone in the community sits down for lunch at some very long, heavily laden tables, and this time the bottles very definitely do come out. How everybody eventually gets home I can't imagine, but as the local gendarmes are present and tucking in with the rest of us, (their guns stacked in the corner of the room!), I don't think anyone cares! These events don't just provide great entertainment, but help to build a very tight knit community. Vive la différence.

ROAD WARRIOR // BYWILL AUSTIN-VAUTIER

The running joke with all old Pickups is that they're the backbone of most third world militias. Any organisation wielding AK's from a Cold War car-boot sale will probably be riding on the back of some 4x4 that used to run Cornish hay bales to the lower field for Old MacDonald. Although it may seem mystifying, the reason why these vehicles end up in the Heart of Darkness is simple.

Farmer Giles abused his 4x4 with the daily grind until it served no further purpose. Its seats were shredded; it was rustier than the Titanic and had a death knell "clunk" that echoed from the bonnet with every turn of the engine. In his mind, a wrecking ball and breakers yard would be just the send off for the coffin nail of all cars. However, after it blunted their tools and blew up the metal crusher, the yard sold it to a shadowy creature that knew of a place "designed with the retiring Pickup in mind". Two weeks later it had brought down a helicopter gunship outside Mogadishu with its newly mounted "liddle friend".

The image you see here, however, is not that of a pawned relic of rural living sold into Somalia by some weird twist of fate: this happens to be a generation or three down the line. Its forefathers had flaws that led them to a gladiatorial end: for all their spirit they were not aesthetically durable, and consequently, desirable. Beyond the role of workhorse they offered little to their master. This one-dimensionality was their undoing.

The saloon-like interior and softened body shape, with brushed metal trims, typify its aptitude for higher class commuting. The new Warrior is like an Army officer in best dress. Underneath you know it's built for the toughest situations and its contract says it won't back out, but when placed in a more formal setting it is sophisticated and stands tall with its back straight: toned, polished and alluring.

This car can be the best workhorse; its very dimensions hint that it was born to do the dirty jobs. But the array of luxuries that accompany it, its comfort and sleek aesthetics, give it purpose beyond that of lifter and shifter - making it even more endearing and suitable for all eventualities.

6 - 14TH JULY

PAMPLONA BULL RUN

The Pamplona Bull Run (encierro), part of the spectacular Fiesta de San Fermín, is considered by some to be the definitive rite of manhood. Every morning of the fiesta, hundreds of intrepid locals and visitors risk their lives to outpace galloping, frenzied bulls as they hurtle along an 800-metre stretch of the town's streets towards the bullring. The event was brought to international renown by a man whose name has become a synonym for machismo - Ernest Hemingway - in his 1927 novel Fiesta: The Sun Also Rises. Its roots, however, are deeply embedded in Spanish cultural history, with the first recorded instances of runners in the 1600s. Only the most intrepid diehards choose to run in front of the bulls, and it is far from a wise tactic. This bull run in particular is now fiercely opposed by animal rights campaigners. One even ended up severely injured a few years ago after being gored in an attempt to halt cruelty to the bulls. Both bulls and humans can end up injured.

JULY 13TH

BASTILLE DAY

Bastille Day is France's most important national holiday, commemorating the storming of the former high-security prison and the uprising that marked the beginning of the French Revolution. There's a huge military parade on the Champs-Elysées, and further celebrations take place all over the city. The evening before the big day is spent dancing in the Bastille square and at numerous balls that are organised around the city. Worth a look-in are the many parties held by the fire service in their stations, at which the fire-fighters themselves are usually the star attraction (their uniforms providing a lure for the ladies). There is also a big outdoor Gay Ball if you fancy something more boisterous. If that doesn't take your fancy, try sitting down to the Incredible Picnic, one of the largest in the world, taking place in some 20 of France's départments on Bastille Day. On the big day itself, the crowds come out and line the Champs-Elysées to watch the military parade which, led by the President and accompanied overhead by jets in formation, marches from the Arc de Triomphe to the Place de la Concorde. Bringing up the rear and receiving the loudest applause are the fire brigade, perhaps suffering from a hangover or two. It's wise to arrive early if you want to get a good view. The partying continues all day and later thousands of people come together again at the Champ-de-Mars to watch the fireworks at the Trocadéro. On top of all that, most bars and clubs stage their own celebrations, so take your pick. If you're not in Paris, don't worry: every single village in France has their own dance, with champagne, fireworks, street fun and lots more Everyone should take in at least one Bastille Day in their lives. Although nothing now remains of the Bastille fortress itself, the place where it once stood remains an enduring symbol of the ideals of liberté, egalité and fraternité.

JULY 15TH

LOVEPARADE

Berlin's Loveparade is back. After two years' break due to lack of funding, the massive street parade returns to the city's Straße des 17 Juni boulevard. Millions of revellers, DJs and clubs from all over the world make sure the event lives up to its reputation as the world's biggest street party. Thanks to new sponsors, who share the 2.5-million Euro costs of the parade, the event remains free to visit. For the first time this year, it's also free to register a truck for the parade, so smaller clubs are expected to feature much more prominently in the decidedly international line-up. The Loveparade was originally the brainchild of a German DJ called Dr Motte, who hit upon the idea of holding a free, mobile acidhouse party in the street. The first Loveparade was held in 1989 and attracted just 150 revellers, who followed two cars with cassette recorders along the Kurfurstendamm. In the 1999 Loveparade, 1.4 million people followed 51 floats along the Strasse des 17 Juni and past some of Germany's most important monuments and landmarks, all in celebration of Love, Freedom and Techno! The Loveparade is hugely popular, attracting some of the biggest DJs and crowds from around the world and spanning all facets of electronic music. Fifty-one different floats create a cacophony of beats for the people who dance alongside, blowing whistles and often wearing very little bar body paint. The traditional route of the parade snakes past the Angel of Peace monument in the middle of the Tiergarden and down to the Brandenburg Gate, a potent symbol of German reunification. Here the focus shifts to one massive arena. Two DJ booths surrounded by hundreds of cameras are raised on scaffolding high above the cheering crowd, giving the headlining DJs their moment of glory. Giant video screens light up the sky as the likes of Westbam, Sven Vath and Paul Van Dyk play to the crowd, cameras broadcast live around the world and two million people go absolutely
