
lodie's never far from controversy


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Intro

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

Local jewellery designer wins top British award

Local jewellery designer Alexa Blampied has won a prestigious Design Innovation Award (DIA) for two platinum jewellery designs. Alexa, the head designer at Aurum Jewellers, is one of eight winners of the award, who fought off strong competition from 80 other entries from around Britain. It is the first time she has won the award, which is now in its fourth year.

She submitted two designs to the competition, a "Whirlwind" ring and "Tranquillity" pendant. Although it is not customary to select two winning pieces from one individual designer, the standard was so high that the judges could not decide between them and Alexa was given the award for both creations.

Explaining how she created her two winning pieces, Alexa says the "Whirlwind" ring was inspired by the dynamic shape and vortex of a whirlwind. It features platinum wire ovals with diamonds. The "Tranquillity" pendant was inspired by water dropping onto still water in a Japanese garden, creating ripples, circles and a sense of tranquillity. It features plain discs of polished platinum, interspersed with black and white diamonds.

I staggered away drunk into the night with a shoe missing, an extra jacket, and, no, not the surfer dood.





THOSE WITH IMPAIRED IMAGE BY CARRUS

Throughout her life, Carrus has had contact with the blind, her father an eminent eye surgeon, who had a true love of art and her partner who suffered retinitis pigmentosa who had a love of galleries and art. Due to the shock of her partner's death Carrus became ill and was declared disabled. Often housebound, this allowed her increasing love of art to keep her positive and help her raise money for charity. Having visited exhibitions for the blind, which were never around when her partner was alive, Carrus decided that this was the way forward with her art. Carrus was very surprised as to how many people suffer from sight impairment, colour blindness, long/short sightedness, tunnel vision, reduced vision due to retinal damage etc....

To form the realism of the pictures that Carrus portrays she uses gesso, impasto, wall filler, papier maché, sand, gravel, shingle, shells, slate, wood, wire, metal chain, fabric, feather, string and many more. Carrus will be in Jersey for the whole of the exhibition, she will run workshops for adults and children, demonstrate and talk to those who are blind or visually impared, individually or in groups. The Harbour Gallery has a Stannah Chair Lift if needed to get to the exhibition in the studio space next to the café.



C2C: It's pretty easy. At first it was difficult, but as you make a name for your self it gets easier. We have places were we play regularly and that's usually what we stick to, that helps build up an awareness.

GM. So who are you listening to on your iPods right now?

C2C: I love Dispatch, and Ray Montagne is awesome too. Kenny's listening to this wicked band called Fat Freddy's Drop and obviously we all love Sublime. I also really like Paris Hilton's new music! Is that sad?

GM. Have you been recording anything for release?

C2C: Yup.We've got an album coming out in the next few months with 10 songs on all written by us.

GM. Any last word for your fans?

C2C: Look out for us. Come along to one of our gigs because they're always good fun. Oh, and bring your dancing shoes!

GM: What was it like finding out you had the role in THE SENTINEL with Michael Douglas and Kiefer Sutherland?

Michael and Kiefer are such inspiring people as well as actors. They are great people, family men as well as wonderful actors and it's nice to know the business didn't chew them up and spit them out."

GM: I know Michael and Kiefer were surprised by your skills when it came to practicing at the shooting range?

EL: "I think they were a bit surprised that I was so good, yes, much better than them. They kept saying 'You're embarrassing us!' It was funny. We went to the firing range to practice and all my shots were bull's eyes. Kiefer's shots were a little lower and then Michael's weren't even close. He would've killed so many civilians and bystanders if it was real. But I used to go target shooting all the time growing up, so I'm great with a gun, we'd shoot coke cans and anything that exploded really. I can handle a gun, I can skin a deer, I can skin a pig and pluck a quail, you name it I've done it. The training was so easy for me. I am pretty fit too, I work out every day, I do 75 push ups a day"

GM: Why did you choose the role of Jill Marin in THE SENTINEL, I know you've been getting lots of film offers?

EL: "There is no sex at all and she's so different from Gabrielle so it was a new kind of image for me. You forget about me playing Gabrielle because Jill is tough; shooting people and protecting the President. She is a very strong woman and I like her. It was refreshing to for me to do that and I hope the audience will say "Wow, I didn't know she could do that". It was exciting, I'm in a suit the whole time; it's sexy but there are no short skirts. I'm nobody's love interest. I'm not kissing anyone. One of the reasons I picked it was that I got to show the audience that I can do something else."

GM: Can you talk a little more about Jill Marin's character?

EL: "Well she is working in the Secret Service which says a lot about

From Wisteria Lane to The White House

As a star of the critically acclaimed Desperate Housewives Eva Longoria has been making a name for herself on both sides of the Atlantic since the show started in 2004. This September Eva will make the jump from the small screen to big screen, starring alongside movie greats such as Michael Douglas, Kiefer Sutherland and Kim Basinger in action film *The Sentinel*.

We caught up with her to discuss her role as tough secret agent Jill Marin in the film, how it contrasts with the shallow but lovable Gabrielle in the internationally successful Desperate Housewives and the secret to that amazing body of hers.

her determination, because it is such a male dominated world. She looks good but doesn't want to get anywhere using her looks. She wants to be respected for her talent and her skills, and that's why I picked this movie, because it was the exact opposite of Gabrielle. It was a lot of fun."

GM: What was the training like?

EL: "We did firearms and tactical training, but it wasn't that hard for me because I have done a lot of it before for an earlier TV show and I am quite fit."

GM: What is your work out regime?

EL: "I have a trainer. I train every day but I get really bored really easily so we do weight training, balance training, core training, jump rope, everything."

GM: What about diet?

EL: "I have to eat healthily, but I'm lucky that I love eating fish and vegetables, that's my favourite thing to eat and on the set our caterers will make anything I want. So if I feel like meatloaf they'll make it, if I say sea bass they will cook that for me - anything you want they make. But my breakfast is usually scrambled egg white, spinach and turkey bacon I love cottage cheese and pineapple. But I think I am so healthy because I was raised on a ranch and we grew all our own vegetables. Sometimes we couldn't afford meat so we'd just eat veggies."

GM: Do you cook?

EL: "I'm a great cook, Mexican food is my speciality and tortilla soup is probably the best recipe I do, my friends love me to make it."

GM: What are your indulgences?

EL: "I love facials I'm a spa junkie, I love massages and scrubs and I am obsessed with shoes. I do pinch myself when I see how many pairs of shoes I have, Tony can't believe it."

GM: Who is closer to you, Gabrielle or Jill?

EL: "I love Jill Marin because she's a lot closer to me than Gabrielle.

Jill is an ambitious, hard working woman who's trying to climb the career ladder based on her talent. Gabrielle is selfish, she uses her looks to get what she wants, she doesn't want a family and she's very manipulative. I am not at all like that."

GM: Do you have anything in common with your Desperate Housewives character?

EL: "Well we do have some things in common - like ambition. But she hates children I want 10. She married for money, I'd never, never marry for money, she's materialistic and I'm not. She uses her looks to get what she wants and I don't do that really – well just to get my boyfriend, I did use them to get Tony (boyfriend)."

GM: How do you handle the hysteria and fascination with Desperate Housewives?

EL: "It's sometimes hard to deal with when you're out shopping at the supermarket. It's amazing. But I can't complain. I still can't understand why anyone cares about what I do or what I say. I went to a photo shoot the other day and there were paparazzi outside and we pull up and I go, 'Who's here? And they go "you, that's why they're here". I feel like I am part of the Beatles. I feel like it's going to be very easy to stay grounded. You can't believe your own hype. Or you'd be let down if you blow yourself up. I'm not going to stop going to the supermarket just because the paparazzi follow me though, I love to cook and a cook needs her ingredients."

GM: Why do you think Desperate Housewives is so popular?

EL: "People will always be interested in relationships and infidelity and sex and everything connected to things in their own lives. We don't try to shock as much as drawing attention to the pent up frustrations women have to deal with, there's a lot of satire and black humour and we deal with the basic problems facing married women."

GM: You have become a sex symbol and have been voted the sexiest woman in the world in several 'men's magazine' polls. Have you always felt pretty?

EL: "No. I grew up as the ugly duckling, they called me 'la prieta fea', which means ugly dark one, that was my nickname. So when people call me a sex icon, it's flattering but it never goes to my head because I never felt sexy as a teenager. I was a tomboy and any time anyone says something about me being hot, it makes me giggle."

GM: Who's style do you admire?

EL: "I love Jennifer Lopez's style. But I am an individual; I didn't grow up wanting to be like anybody I wanted to be like my mom because she was great. But I do love J Lo because she takes risks and is not afraid to show her curves and she's extremely confident."

A word of warning. If your university years are consigned to distant memory – never ever try to relive them by going out drinking with a student. It takes months – sometimes years of intensive training to get your blood alcohol content up to

the same levels as that of a third-year medical student. I'm only telling you because I wish someone had warned me of the dire consequences of heading out on the lash with Adam - my soonto-be doctor friend, back from the Royal Free for the summer. It was only supposed to be a few drinks, but when I woke up the next morning, head thumping and pillow spinning, I realised it had turned into a full session of tequila shots and poker.

Being an expert on hangovers - they're an essential part of his weekend – Adam knew exactly what to do. "We have to have a fry-up", he groaned from somewhere behind the sofa (he needs to work on his bedside manner). Thankfully Chambers serves a wonderful weekend brunch late into the afternoon, with squashy sofas to sink into, and roaring fires to cure that fragile shivery feeling you get after a night out on the town. Adam knew all about that too. "It's actually a mild type of alcohol-induced hypothermia in which body heat is given off too rapidly due to the increased blood flow to the skin." Wow. It was like being on a date with NHS Direct. And it turns out that a fry-up is actually the medical answer to hangover symptoms. After you've been drinking, your blood sugar levels get very low - hypoglycaemia to those in the know, and the best treatment is to eat something that contains as much protein and carbohydrate as possible. The classic fry-up, greasy though it may be, fits the bill perfectly.

Since it was a medical emergency, Adam prescribed himself the full Chambers English breakfast – two sausages, three rashers of bacon, baked beans, mushrooms and loads of toast. There was a slightly smaller "ladies' breakfast" on the menu, but I just couldn't face it. The scrambled eggs with smoked salmon on toasted ciabatta sounded more manageable. "That's probably the best option for a hangover," added Adam, "eggs contain cysteine which

will help your liver deal with all those vodka tonics you knocked back last night".

Adam the fry-up expert pronounced the Chambers breakfast a very good effort – decent sausages, orange-yolked eggs, plenty of bacon and not-too-greasy mushrooms. My scrambled egg was lovely, very eggy eggs laden with smoked salmon and topped with fresh parsley on a toasted ciabatta. And if you're still suffering with the morning-after feeling, there's always the vitamin C-rich Big Tom spicy tomato juice – with or without a dash of vodka.

You can tell our waiter Albi was used to dealing with people who are, let's say, a tad more fragile than normal. He whisked away our empty cups without a word, returning them refilled with steaming fresh coffee. He suggested I try the banana and blueberry pancakes. Don't miss them. A stack of doughy, banana pancakes studded with blueberries and served with a pot of maple syrup, they're ideal for boosting those flagging blood sugar levels.

Chambers is a bit of an institution in St Helier – it's had a lick of paint recently, but the manager Eleanor Blazey (ex-Chicago and Blue Fish) wants to market the place as more of an eating destination. You can still grab a quick pub lunch through the week, but she's also introduced an after-work pasta and pizza menu for those times you just can't face the queue at Marks & Spencer.

As far as brunch goes though, it seems to be a popular destination. With leather sofas, wood panelling and the broadsheets, there's a bit of a gentleman's club feel to the front of Chambers, and a live Sky Sports feed on the big screen at the back. And if you're stuck hangover babysitting – you can even bring the kids in with you, it's licensed for children in the daytime.

So let's get this straight, Chambers isn't going to get a Michelin star anytime soon, but if you're looking for a decent fry-up, Sky Sports and maybe a hair of the dog – you're not going to go far wrong. Trust me, I'm (out with) a doctor.

male brain :: female brain // donna white examines the way the brain determines gender

The moment you discover you're pregnant, it's a question which preys on your mind and interests everyone around you – whether you have a preference or not.

Without question, parents will testify the experience of raising one is very different from the other. People might say "girls are gentler" or "boys are better at maths". But is the gender gap down to biology – or because society makes us that way? In the past, it was widely considered that parents nurturing girls to play with dolls and boys to use building bricks is what shaped their personalities, their interests and their futures. But new evidence suggests babies start to show signs of male or female behaviour even before they are aware of the sex divide.

And it all comes down to differences in the brain.

For a long time, we divided the brain into the left and right hemispheres, attributing verbal skills and logic to the left, and visual, spatial and creative patterns to the right. We believed girls used more of their left brain, and boys more the right. But the latest research reveals language activity occurs in both sides. However, the large bundle of nerve fibres which connects the two sides of the brain tends to be thicker in girls.

So girls are literally more multi-tasking, using both sides of the brain easily, while boys are more likely to concentrate on one side at a time. In boys, the right side of the brain forms more internal connections and works more independently. Which is why they focus on right-sided activities like maths and taking things apart to see how they work.

Professor John Geake, a member of the Centre for Cognitive Neuroscience at Oxford University, said: "There has been some research in boys who have difficulty reading, which suggested this was down to them having weakening connections between the two sides of the brain. It's certainly the case that the connective tissue is thicker and more robust in females." Another area where there seems to be differences is in the parietal cortex – the back of the brain in the area where you tend to scratch your head. Boys have more brain cells back there than girls. And this is the area which deals with spatial awareness – explaining why the male is more drawn to watching football on television."

These differences explain why girls tend to talk before boys. They process language more easily, and chatter along in their early years, practicing vocabulary and grammar.

They also have more control over their voices, finding it easier to modulate their tone. This leads to little girls who enjoy singing from an early age, unlike their brothers.

But how early is the gender gap apparent? In one experiment in a hospital maternity ward, when babies were presented with images of a smiling human face and a mechanical mobile, girls were more drawn to the face, while boys were fascinated by the object.

Professor Simon Baron-Cohen claims this is because girls focus more on emotions, while boys are simply interested in how things work. According to his theory, every baby is born with a particular brain type – male, female or balanced. This is outlined in his book The Essential Difference: Men, Women and the Extreme Male Brain, published by Penguin.


The empathising brain or E-type

is generally found in baby girls.

They respond more to the distress of others, showing greater concern through sad looks, sympathetic noises and comforting.

The systemising or type S

is more often possessed by boys. They love putting things together, building towers or vehicles. They also react better to toys with clear functions, buttons to press, things that light up, or devices that cause another object to move.



But there is also a "balanced brain", type B, which is a combination of both. One way to detect if your girl has a typical female brain is to watch how she might approach a group of playing children as a newcomer. Or how she accepts a new child into her group of friends.

If she has an E-type brain, she is more likely to stand and watch, to check out what's going on, and then try to fit in with the game or activity. This usually leads to her being readily accepted. A typical boy with an S-type brain is more likely to hijack the game by trying to change it, grabbing everyone's attention. As a host, girls are more attentive to the newcomer. Boys often ignore the child's attempt to join in.

Certainly, by 12 months, girls make more eye contact than boys. The balanced brain is rare, but combines the male and female traits. Therefore, a child may welcome a newcomer into their group of friends, but be aggressive in the way they show the newcomer who's boss. For example, they might select the toy which the newcomer is allowed to play with - and insist on this as a condition of them being accepted into the group. And Professor Baron-Cohen discovered this is determined by a biological factor: prenatal testosterone. With the help of women having amniocentesis, he was able to measure testosterone levels in the foetus.

The greater the presence of this hormone, the less these babies were able to make eye contact and develop language quickly, traits of the female brain. And the more they went on to display a male brain - direct aggression, such as pushing, hitting and punching.

Professor Baron-Cohen said: "There was a time when women were prescribed a synthetic female hormone (diethylstilbestrol), in an attempt to prevent repeated spontaneous miscarriages. "Boys born to those women were likely to show more femaletypical, empathising behaviours, such as caring for dolls." As director of the Autism Research Centre at Cambridge University, Professor Baron-Cohen believes people with autism may have an extreme of the male brain - good at systemising, very bad at empathising.

"Two largest sub-groups of autism are classic autism, and Asperger syndrome," he explained.

"Both share certain features: a difficulty in developing social relationships; a difficulty in communication; the presence of unusually strong, narrow interests; and a strong adherence to routines."



It's important to point out not all girls will have E-type brains, and not all boys type S. This explains why some girls are 'tomboys' and why a few boys may be more sensitive than their rough-andtumble friends. There are those with a balanced brain, who have the best of both worlds.

"In the 1960s and 70s these gender differences were put down to parenting," said Professor Baron-Cohen.

"Today, it is recognised there may be a partly genetic component."

But before you start to panic that little Ethan isn't going to be the next Robbie Williams, or that baby Jessica will never make a NASA scientist, it's important to remember every child is an individual, and may not follow the same patterns of their gender. Nor does it make them any less special if they do. Professor Baron-Cohen said: "The theory is saying that, on average, males and females differ in what they are drawn to and what they find easy, but that both sexes have their strengths and their weaknesses. Neither sex is superior overall."

Like any addict, it was soon time for the next fix. And it was so easy. But the more self-help books I accumulated, the harder it was to achieve the personal fulfilment each one promised. My life goal of being more punctual was scuppered by having to do a couple of positive visualisations ('imagine yourself as a beautiful flower, stretching out to others...'), four positive affirmations and practising my goddess glow in the mirror before I could leave the house. Eating out was a nightmare. Can you imagine trying to catch up on girlie gossip while taking three deep breaths before every mouthful? ('make every meal a fulfilling experience...'). My serial self-obsession was taking over my life. Even Amazon. com had got me sussed – "Zara we have recommendations for you" brought up I'm Gorgeous: 101 Mantras to Celebrate You. But it was only when I found myself going book-shopping in disguise to avoid pitying looks from the shop assistants as I left with yet another cringe-worthy title – that I realised I'd hit rock bottom.

So that's it. I'm going cold turkey. I've hidden my books somewhere the cleaner won't find them, dismantled my shrine and torn up all my positive affirmations. 

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body - compound excercises with dumbells // Steve Longstaffe

This month we will be looking at some more dumbbell exercises for toning up your muscles. There are a number of techniques with dumbbells that I like to use, and coming up are some of my favourites. The main advantages in using compound exercises are that they utilise a lot of different muscle at the same time, causing you to burn a large amount of energy when performing them. Also by using a couple of compound exercises here and there they will help you to eradicate any weak links in your body, as everything is working together giving you greater overall stability. Take for example the one handed squat snatch, your legs back and shoulders are working together, using a large amount of muscle mass. With the dumbbell bent over row so many muscles are working to keep yourself holding the position correctly. The last two exercises are both for the arms. Biceps curls on the preacher bench isolates the biceps making it a more effective exercise, and the standing tricep raise has you using many other muscles to stay in a stable position.

Aloe, also written Aloë, is a genus containing about four hundred species of flowering succulent plants native to Africa - common in South Africa's Cape Province and the mountains of tropical Africa. Aloes is the expressed juice of the leaves of the plant. When the leaves are cut, the juice that flows out is collected and evaporated. Complaining that you don't get off the rock enough? Then why not try a trip to an even smaller island. Jersey will seem positively continent-sized once you get back from a trip across to Les Minquiers. Barren and deserted, this group of small islands nine miles south of Jersey, with its collection of ramshackle granite houses has an eerie, ghostly air about it – helped no doubt by the smuggler tales recounted by our guide Phil. There's plenty of legend and mythology surrounding the rocks – they were first recorded in 933 then squabbled over for centuries by Britain and France until finally being awarded to Jersey in 1953. There was even an attempted 'invasion' recently, by an eccentric French writer who was seen off by a Jersey advocate having lunch on his yacht.

Unfortunately Les Minquiers are a little lacking in cultural sights - take in the view from the island's helipad, or spend a penny in Britain's most southerly WC - there's not much else to do. Nature enthusiasts will enjoy the chance to see Atlantic grey seals, along with the occasional dolphin, although we only saw a few cormorants and a couple of oystercatchers. But the main reason to go is for the trip itself – a thrilling powerboat ride. You'll speed across on a ten-metre rib, its twin 200 horsepower engines giving a top speed of 40 knots. Never the smoothest stretch of water – on a really choppy day, you'll ramp up waves, almost flying through the air, hanging on for dear life to the hand rails. It's a real life roller coaster ride that leaves you breathless, wind-swept and grinning from ear to ear. So take the trip – it's worth it to see a far-flung corner of Grouville – and you get a thrills 'n spills rib trip thrown in. And I guarantee, once you head back into St Helier harbour, Jersey will seem like a much larger place.

Power boating is available through Pure Adventure. A two-hour skippered expedition to Les Minquiers is £35 per person and includes wet weather and safety gear. See the website for more information www.purejersey.com or phone to book on 769165

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Czech it out // Will Austin Vautier test drives Skoda's fastest ever production car.



Throughout the Eighties Skoda was treading water in the car industry. More drivers had a soft spot for the ridiculed Sinclair C5 than for anything four-wheeled chugging out of Czechoslovakia. But having closely observed the notable progress of this car manufacturer in recent years, test-driving their latest offering was a must.

Before shedding light on the credentials of the new Octavia VRS, I feel I must first stray into Skoda's past in order to contextualise just how high this phoenix has risen from the flames of popular opinion.

Though a hit in Eastern Europe, British Skodas acquired an unshakeable reputation for conking out and quickly became an institution in comedy circles. Jokes about the car's 'heated rear window' were as commonplace as quips about the Conservatives or the comedian's monster-in-law. Its Hippo-in-a-pram style handling was only championed by the infamous Lada – which really did have all the auto attributes of a top-heavy kitchen cupboard.

Supposedly, Skodas were like the car world's week day boarders – spending Monday to Friday getting an education with the local mechanic, in time for a frolic with the family on Saturday afternoon.

But 1991 marked a turning point, whereby those who'd made a living whipping hysteria about the brand had little dirt to dig: Skoda became a subsidiary of Volkswagen Group. From this point on the manufacturer never looked back.

So what of the Octavia VRS? As Skoda's fastest-ever production car, with 200bhp and a 2.0-litre turbocharged engine, it is itself a landmark achievement. Though up against the hottest hatches, including the VW Golf and Audi A3, What Car? "Car of the Year" still named it "best hot hatch" for 2006. The only criticism of the VRS would be that Skoda has been a little lazy around the dash area – but so many manufacturers are guilty of this (and for a higher price). For around $\pm 17,000$ you get a lot of car for your money: it comes in at $\pm 3,000$ less than a five door Golf! The boot is so large it has two time zones and the cabin will seat 5 comfortably.

At the end of the day, it's not a dashboard's inventiveness that gets you from A to B. Importantly, it has the brains and brawn of an Audi and VW combined but for, well, Skoda prices. The sporty handling is reminiscent of the Golf GTi test driven earlier in the year – poised, responsive yet controlled. As for the engine, one or two throaty hatchbacks may be pokier but sound like Brian Blessed on vodka Red Bull through the gears. The Octavia VRS was different: I named its first three, Carreras, Domingo and Pavarotti in light of its pitchperfect acceleration.

Yet regardless of Skoda's efforts some would suggest the VRS' price is indicative that the brand has a little way to go in unpicking the tangled web of hyperbole within which industry commentators, and Eighties popular culture at-large, ensnared it. My feeling is different. The generation that constitutes today's spenders, although no doubt of an impressionable age during Skoda's forgettable years, peruse a car market that is more varied, progressive and surprising than ever before. They want value for money, and build quality. They want to invest in a manufacturer on-the-up, not one that is complacent or in the midst of a dodgy takeover. Skoda made its mistakes in the last century: today they are pacing double time in an industry where others are ambling.

Brand addicts will continue to pay through the nose for quality they feel comes at a premium. Discerning buyers will see past a badge and what it used to mean, and buy a car that does the same job as one retailing for thousands more.


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Gallery looks at a property that mixes rural Jersey beauty with American living



The past Meadow View, and from the road, you'd be forgiven for dismissing it as nothing more than a country cottage. It's only when you walk inside that you realise you're stepping into a tardis of a house, an architectural masterpiece, surrounded by trees and standing on a frame out over the lake. For local restaurateur Tony Sargeant it's been his dream house.

"We travelled a lot in the States, and wanted to recreate that sort of easy lifestyle here", explains Tony. The couple instantly saw the potential of the original plot – a tiny one-bedroomed farmworker's cottage, just before their wedding, ten years ago. It was already under offer, but when they got back from their honeymoon, they found out the deal had fallen through, and their offer was accepted. Today just the shell of the original cottage remains, making up the entrance hall, ground floor guest room and part of the kitchen – the rest of the house has been built around it.

"We told an architect friend the ideas we had for the house, and he came up with it. We wanted something that would blend in with the surroundings, something that would grow with us". And as their family expanded, so did their house. Up to the master suite which Tony and Helen are currently sharing with their six-week old twins, Phoebe and Scarlett, and down to a lower ground floor level where four-year old Emelia and three-year old Poppy have their double bedroom.

The result – a generously proportioned New Englandstyle home with a relaxed, informal feel. "This is a family house," explains Helen, "we love entertaining, so we tend to spend most of our time in the kitchen." And they certainly put their restaurant experience to use when designing their Italian stone-floored kitchen diner. Custom-built units, twin Belfast sinks, double Smeg range oven, Fisher & Paykal two-drawer dishwasher and a huge American-style fridge-freezer – everything is geared around entertaining.

There's even a second kitchen with another double oven and dishwasher, as well as a large American top-loader washing machine. Next-door is the living room, with a huge Jersey granite fireplace, solid oak mantel and large windows with a stunning view out into the valley. At the same height as the surrounding trees, you could almost be in a tree house, looking down at the lake below. Also on the ground floor is a double guest room – 'the Chapel room' as the family call it, with vaulted ceiling and ensuite Villeroy & Boch bathroom.

From the entrance hall, it's up a curving staircase to the top floor and the master suite with views out over the treetops. "This is my favourite room," explains Helen, "it's so peaceful up here". A luxuriously large bathroom is ensuite; with an oversized ceramic washbasin, bath and walk-in wet room with a bubble-glass tile wall. Across the hallway is a large walk —in wardrobe and another room the Sargeants currently use as an office, but which could easily be converted into a fifth double bedroom.

On the lower ground floor are two more bedrooms, each with en-suite bathrooms and one with another walk-in wardrobe. Outside the beautifully landscaped garden paths wind their way down towards the lake, but it's the two raised decks standing out over the lake that really catch the eye. The first is the entertaining deck with its own outdoor kitchen complete with fully wired-in barbeque and fridge. Next to it and surrounded by trees, is the second deck with a sunken hot tub. "It feels like you're out in the woods, there's owls nesting nearby and it's completely secluded. We love sitting out here on a warm summer's evening".

After ten years in their beautiful home, the Sargeant family are moving on to another project and Meadow View is for sale through Slomans.

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au vent des iles // Fete du Salad

It's party time here and come September I might be well and truly partied out as I am currently managing at least three a week! Beach parties, curry evenings, 60s nights, wine and cheese (that's bring a cellar not a bottle), folk / rock / classical nights, you name it we are having it. However, the really fun thing about all these 'happenings' is not so much the music or refreshments but the never ending supply of new and interesting people that I meet and who live here in La Manche. The other night I was at a 'salad' party! Sounds mad I know but we all grow acres of the stuff and can't give it away so we may as well invent a reason for eating tons of it. Anyway I met the former wife of Ian McShane, currently making millions from 'Deadwood' having already made millions from 'Lovejoy'. It turns out that Ruth McShane is a neighbour of mine and a lovelier person you could not hope to meet and she really has got an interesting story to tell. It is amazing just how many fascinating people have settled down in this corner of France and there is nothing quite like the Party Season to bring them out of the woodwork.

Talking of 'parties', the other day the big Round the Islands yacht race arrived at Carteret and I stood with all the locals to watch and admire the magnificent sight of so many fine boats making their way into the marina for the night. We then watched the endless stream of Hooray Henrys (and Ooray Onrees) make their way along the harbour wall to the massive marguees set up for their barbeque and all night dancing. I managed to chat to quite a few 'sailors' from both Jersey and Guernsey and was amazed that none that I spoke to had ever visited Carteret before and were consequently surprised by its smallness. It seems the little high speed ferry between St Helier and Carteret is used more for French shopping expeditions than Jersey gastronomic visits the other way. Carteret has some of the best restaurants in La Manche all able to provide a seafood lunch to remember for a very long time! And talking of seafood, there is a very unpretentious little place in St Germain, imaginatively called Bar de la Plage and situated very close to Au Vent des Iles, that only opens for about six weeks during July and August. It specialises in "moules frites" as there is a huge mussel and oyster fishing and distribution centre just down the road. I think they are both owned by the same family so you always get the best. Anyway, if you are in this area and fancy this local delicacy then this is definitely the place to come to.

Another 'attraction' that you will inevitably encounter if you visit during the summer is the weekly markets. These do of course take place all year round and form a vital outlet for vegetable growers and other small traders. However during July and August they increase in size tenfold to accommodate all the usual souvenir and jewellery trinkets that people like to buy when on holiday. But, in addition there always appear a good half dozen stalls selling brassieres (or bras as I am told I must call them). These items are heaped in vast multicoloured piles of loose garments. Of course I don't spend time ferreting through them but they are hard to avoid as you amble through the densely crowded avenues of market stalls. I always thought 'bras' had to come from M&S in small packs with masses of sizing data thereon. How do women shoppers get the right size in the market? Do they surreptitiously try them on? Clearly I need to spend more time in the vicinity (without being arrested) in order to get answers to these important questions. Life is so much more exciting here than pushing that old pen in the office!

anan: 'emotional fusion'

This was followed soon after by a members-only exhibition in the British Club of Bangkok, which saw him being adopted by the expatriate and international community. 

According to NNDB, James Lavelle quotes "I became a DJ because I couldn't breakdance and I was no good at grafitti." If that is the case then I'm glad. Lavelle and his associated UNKLE and mowax personas have been a revolution in

James Lavelle (born 1974 in Oxford, England) is a DJ, electronic recording artist and record label boss. He is best known for producing work in the trip hop, breakbeat and house music genres.

While attending Cherwell Middle School, Lavelle's music career started at 15 when he ran block parties in Oxford. At only 19 he started the Mo' Wax label, taking the name from his club night at the time, Mo' Wax Please. Around the same time he started the That's How It Is night with Gilles Peterson, which went on to become one of London's longest running nights.

In 1996 Mo' Wax released one of electronic music's most celebrated albums, DJ Shadow's seminal Endtroducing..... Soon after this Lavelle started work on an album with DJ Shadow under the name UNKLE. The resulting release Psyence Fiction featured collaborations with Richard Ashcroft, Mike D, Badly Drawn Boy and Thom Yorke. In 2003, he released a follow up to Psyence Fiction, titled Never, Never, Land, though this album saw DJ Shadow replaced by Richard File as the second full time member of UNKLE. It featured collaborations with 3D of Massive Attack and Josh Homme of Queens of the Stone Age among others.

He is a long time resident at Fabric in London, mixing the inaugural Fabric Live mix album. He has also mixed two progressive house albums for Global Underground.

He has produced a number of film soundtracks, including Sexy Beast. Also an in demand remixer, he has reworked tracks by Garbage, The Verve, Beck and Massive Attack.

what is there to drink?

they will have over 140 different real ales varying in style from milds and stouts to bitters, they will also have real lagers, and fruit beers. a large range of ciders and perries (made from pears) and continental beers and lagers.

my better half doesn't like beer or cider (i don't know why I married her) is there anything else she can drink?

yes. there will be a small selection of wines available by the glass and soft drinks will be available at the food counter. or there is plenty of water in the tap.

I have never been to a beer festival before. do I need to grow a beard to be allotheyd entry? no. they'll let anyone in. provided they pay the entrance fee.

you mean I have to pay to get in?

yes. unless you are a child then it is free. adults dressed as children as an attempt to circumvent the entrance charge will be ridiculed and then charge double. They're not falling for that old trick.

I am a camra member - do I have to pay to get in?

no. because you are such nice nice people to part with your money every year they'll let you in for free! Remember to bring your membership card or you'll have to cough up.

ok. so I don't want to join. will I have to mortgage my house to afford the entrance charge?

probably not. if you enter before 5pm it will cost you the princely sum of $\pounds 2.50$ for entrance. this will include your glass and programme which gives details of the beers. After 5pm it will cost you an extra $\pounds 1$ (that's $\pounds 3.50$). if you intend to visit on more than one occasion you can purchase a weekend pass on the door which will entitle you to access on all days

why do you charge an entrance fee?

the costs of setting up the marquee, the toilets, fencing and security is almost $\pounds 20,000!$ if they did not charge an entry fee they would be losing money hand over fist.

now I am in. will the beer cost a fortune?

not really. obviously they do not want to undermine the local hostelries by undercharging for our beer, therefore the price varies bettheyen $\pounds 1.80$ and $\pounds 2.80$ a pint.

is there any entertainment?

a local band "theyt theyt le geyt" will be playing a two hour set from 7 until 9 on saturday night or just laugh at all the drunken fools who think it is cool to try and drink all the beers in one night!

can I buy tickets in advance?

no. They don't do that, they have a capacity of 1,000 and they operate on a first come first serve basis, there can be a queue at times but do not despair this does clear quickly.

last year they ran out of beer - will this happen again? no, because I am a pessimist and I have ordered far too much beer for this year.

can I bring my own flagon?

unfortunately the parish have banned them from serving beverages in glass glasses (long story) so therefore all beer is served in a solid plastic glass (none of your cheap rubbish here). You may, want to bring your own pewter tankard if you dislike the idea of drinking from plastic.

10th september

Black Pudding Throwing Championships Ramsbottom, Lancashire

Several uses spring to mind when wondering what to do with a black pudding. Up in Lancashire there's a fashion for hurling them at a wall - during the Black Pudding Throwing Championships, held at the Royal Oak Public House in Ramsbottom.

As part of the tournament, the "Golden Grid" is transported from Bury town centre by the ELR steam train and carried up to Bridge Street with much pomp and ceremony, to be laid in the road next to the wall on which the Yorkshire puddings are mounted. With one foot on the grid, competitors (young and old) attempt to knock a pile of Yorkshire puddings from a wooden platform 20ft up the pub wall with three throws of the pudding. The winner is simply the person to dislodge the most Yorkshire puddings.

This historic tradition has been on the go for 150 years and attracts spectators and competitors from around the world. It's thought that the contest is a revival of old clashes between the people of Lancashire and those from Yorkshire, during which Lancastrians hurled black puddings at their counterparts from the white pudding county of Yorkshire.

16th september

Henley-on-Todd Regatta

Henley-on-Todd, Australia

Eights, yacht races and a multitude of other nautical pursuits are undertaken here, but with a twist - 1500km (900 miles) separates the ASSA ABLOY Henley-on-Todd Regatta from the nearest large body of water. Nevertheless, the people of Alice Springs, undeterred by geographical trifles, have been battling it out on dry land for decades, providing a unique spectacle amongst world sporting events.

Since 1962, teams of four or eight crazy people have been running up the dried-up Todd river bed inside a variety of bottomless vessels - yachts, bathtubs and rowing boats each have their own races - and indulging spectators with the hilarious spectacle of grown men and women engaging in flour, mortar and water cannon-fuelled boat battles. Don't question it, just enjoy it.

Based (albeit it loosely, or just plain sarcastically) on the Henley-on-Thames Regatta back in Blighty, the ASSA ABLOY Henley-on-Todd Regatta has to be cancelled (as, regrettably it was in 2003) if it rains and the river bed floods!

Why do houses look like they are being built from timber and yellow plastic sheeting now?

Well, traditionally houses in the British Isles are built of two layers of blockwork with a gap of about 50mm between them. But with ever rising standards of energy efficiency being demanded, new building methods are being utilised.

This method, which originated in the USA and Scandinavia, involves the inner layer being made of timber instead of blockwork. The timber layer is preformed off site and has insulation sandwiched between layers of wood and incorporates breathable a membrane. It is more energy efficient, and is much quicker to build, so could mean construction savings. And this also explains why they seem to be not there one day, and there the next.
