Last month an HD Ferries captain was suspended from duty after his vessel hit another ferry. The incident caused its St Malo sailing to be cancelled.

It had already been delayed for technical reasons, but as it was manoeuvring into position the ferry hit the larger Commodore Goodwill. Wind and weather conditions were bad enough but the Deputy Harbourmaster said another technical fault on-board might have caused the collision. The Captain in control of the vessel was suspended whilst an investigation was carried out.

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
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Intro




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

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Superyachts _

They are the ultimate indulgence for the uber wealthy. Few use them for more than two months a year, the value drops after three or four years, and running costs can run into millions - a fresh coat of paint alone can cost more than £60,000.

For the super-rich, however, a yacht to entertain family, friends and business contacts brings incalculable social cachet - and possibly lucrative deals.

And super-yachts bring exclusivity, privacy and freedom. Why? Who better to sum it up than Norberto Ferretti, chairman of the Ferretti Group, one of the world's biggest yacht builders. "Rich people can go to a beautiful hotel and pay \$3,000 a night for a suite," he says. "The trouble is when you go down the lift you're in the lobby with people who paid 20 times less. My clients don't like that."

The biggest yacht in the world began to glide into the most fashionable harbours in 2005. The Platinum, built in the Middle East, is the size of a small cruise ship, longer than a Royal Navy destroyer and drips with luxury beyond most people's wildest fantasies. The sleek 525ft vessel, boasts the latest must-have accessory - its own submarine.










There's also a helipad and hangar for small aircraft, and garages for jet-skis and four-wheel-drive vehicles, which can be taken ashore on special landing craft.

The cost of this sumptuous superyacht is estimated at more than £120 million. Its owner is Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid al-Maktoum, the Crown Prince of Dubai. Inside, the Prince and up to 24 guests enjoy a stylish interior design, believed to be the work of Philippe Starck, and gaze at original works of art. They watch television on giant plasma screens, films in the cinema and shows in the yacht's theatre. A fully equipped gym, squash court and swimming pool help guests stay healthy and work off the calories from the haute cuisine meals prepared by world-class chefs. A health spa offering every conceivable health and beauty treatment completes the pampering. Doctors and nurses are on duty, and electronic security and sophisticated weapons are installed to deter any unwanted guests. At 525ft – it is 40ft longer than a Royal Navy destroyer:

Size definitely matters when it comes to super-yachts. The average length has increased by 3ft each year for the past 10 years. As the number of billionaires grows, megayachts have become the new way for the seriously wealthy to set themselves apart from the merely rich.



Roman Abramovich, the Russian billionaire owner of Chelsea Football Club, is reported to have bought a new yacht, Ecstasea, just 282ft long and valued at little more than £72 million. It's a mere baby compared to his two other yachts, Le Grand Bleu at 370ft and the 377ft Pelorus, worth a reported total of £122 million. Philip Green, the Arcadia entrepreneur who revitalised BHS, has a yacht worth a mere £20 million moored in Monaco harbour.

It's all about boys' toys. The super-rich are fuelling the boom and the richer they are, the bigger they want their toys to be. Today's super-yachts are packed with toys and technology. Computer-controlled stabilisers keep the vessel perfectly steady. The market for super-yachts is booming, fuelled by a surge in the Middle East and especially Russia.

Charles Dence, of Nigel Burgess yacht brokers in London, said: "The traditional markets in America, Europe and the Middle East are strong but the Russians are definitely coming." The new Russian billionaires see yachts as the ideal way to flaunt their wealth. Megayachts are a serious business now. More and more people are buying them and each one tries to introduce new refinements."





Generally considered to be the biggest privately-owned super yacht – before the Platinum came along – was the 452 ft Rising Sun, owned by software magnate Larry Ellison. Larry is the ninth richest man in the world and founder and CEO of Oracle. He's worth around £10 billion, so he can afford to have a boat of this magnitude - even if it costs over £7 million each year to just maintain it.


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








Super-yachts have grown from an average 100ft to more than 150ft in the past decade and the market has tripled since 1997. Builders say a yacht has to be getting on for 200ft to make the owner feel special. According to Yachts International, at least 35 yachts are being built on that scale, including five of 290ft or more.



He increased the yacht's size from 387ft during construction to outdo Octopus, a 414ft vessel being built at the same time by Paul Allen, the co-founder of Microsoft, who had wanted his yacht, which cost an estimated £113 million, to be the world's biggest. With a total living space of 8 000 square metres, Larry's home comforts include an indoor swimming pool, extensive wine cellar, a cinema, basketball court that doubles as a helicopter pad, 16 guest suites, 82 rooms on five storeys and space for a private submarine. Cruising at around 28 knots, the vessel's four diesel engines give it an output of 48,000 horsepower.

Paul Allen, the less famous co-founder of Microsoft, is the sixth richest man in the world and owns an array of toys that would make Bill Gates jealous. Allen, a private man with flamboyant interests, left Microsoft in 1983 when he was diagnosed with cancer that was later cured. His personal life is equally offbeat. Still single at 54, he has been linked to actresses and to tennis pro Monica Seles. He continues to live in his hometown in a compound on Mercer Island with his mother and sister. He plays guitar in an amateur rock band and has a recording studio aboard his yacht. His 416-foot yacht Octopus, with its permanent crew of 60, two helicopters, a submarine and a remote-controlled vehicle for crawling the ocean floor, was completed in 2003. The second largest yacht not owned by a head of state, Octopus has played host to EU commissioner for Trade, Peter Mandelson, who enjoyed New Year's Eve 2004/5 on board.

Forget lavish homes, sleek racing cars or even supermodel girlfriends. There's only one must-have accessory for the billionaire who wants to flaunt his wealth – a superyacht.

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
axle spring summer fashion show _

Many were simply blown away by the spectacularness of it all. However most managed to pull themselves together for the after party in Envy where everyone danced and drank into the wee hours.



An exhibition of this calibre does not grace our shores this often so take advantage of it whilst it is here.












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Wet News Flashes

Some Dolphins have a Welsh accent!

Scientists say that dolphins off Wales have their own accent. The 240 living in Cardigan Bay have developed different sounds from others around the British Isles, reports the Sun.

Scientists analysed 1,882 noises from Irish Sea dolphins - and found those nearest Wales had a unique whistle. The experts from University of Wales and the Shannon Dolphin Foundation in Ireland are now building a "dictionary" of meanings. Project leader Dr Simon Berrow said: "We're trying to associate whistle types with different behaviour - like foraging."

World's most embarrassing shark attack

A Folkestone fisherman has told how the world's most embarrassing shark attack left him with a nasty bite on his nose. Tackle-shop owner Phil Tanner was attacked by a lesser-spotted dogfish after he reeled it in off the local pier. He fought for five minutes to wrench the thrashing creature, a member of the shark family, off his nose, reports the Sun.

Phil, 38, was left with a bloody gash and rows of tiny teethmarks round his nostrils after trying to show off his catch to pal Scott Allen.

He said: "I called out, 'Hey mate, look at this whopper'. But somehow Scott nudged my arm and the fish catapulted itself up to my nose with its jaws wide open."

"It clamped around my nostrils and wouldn't let go. It was agony and I was screaming. The fish didn't just hang on, either. I could feel it chomping its teeth as if it wanted me for its last meal."

"Everyone on the pier was watching me jumping up and down with a shark hanging off my nose. People were singing the Jaws theme tune - I've never felt so embarrassed."

Phil finally pulled the fish away and tended to his wound.






Ocean's 13 _ James McLachlan

When gambler Reuben Tishkoff (Elliot Gould) builds a hotel with nasty Vegas business man Willy Banks (Al Pacino) he doesn't bet on being cut out of the deal and winding up in hospital with a cardiac arrest. Luckily for Tishkoff his old friend the uber slick Danny Ocean (George Clooney) is on hand to exact some vigilante justice Vegas-style. With Banks' hotel rapidly becoming the number one hotspot for the Vegas glitterati, Ocean and his boys form an audacious plan to bankrupt the Casino on its opening night.

All the big names are back for what we are assured is the final chapter in the tiresome antics of Clooney, Pitt, and Damon etc. With so many gigantic egos to handle, here's hoping director Steve Soderbergh can keep them from running amok this time around. In Ocean's 12 it felt like Hollywood's latter day rat pack were having a much better time making the film than the audience did watching it. Soderbergh has brought in two new characters to make up the baker's dozen that is Ocean's 13. These are, Ellen Barkin who plays Bank's right-hand woman, Abigail Spooner and Ocean's nemesis from the first film, Terry Benedict (Andy Garcia). The casting of Al Pacino as the villain of the piece could well prove to be the films best addition. Pacino has taken to hamming it up horrendously in the twilight of his career and is sure to have tremendous fun playing the despicable Banks. Clooney has gone on record saying that he would like the series to finish on a high note and all stops are no doubt being pulled out for the final part. Hopefully Ocean's 13 won't drown in its own creative juices.



Water _

Set in colonial India in 1938 Deepa Mehta's Water begins with child bride Chuyia becoming a widow soon after marrying a frail old man. In an India which is dominated by Hindu traditions this leaves her with three choices, either commit suicide at her husbands funeral pyre, wed his youngest brother or live a life

of celibacy with other widows in the holy city of Banaras. Believing that if she remains at the widow's house her mother will come and collect her Chuyia decides to stay. Here she meets the beautiful Kalyani, the quiet, steely Snehalata and the head of the house Madhumati. The film's focus then shifts to Kalyani who falls for a young Gandhian idealist, Narayan. Unfortunately he and his family are several castes above her on the social pecking order and a new law allowing widows

to remarry is deeply unpopular. Also stirring things up is the return of Gandhi from Africa who is openly challenging not only the British rule but the equally oppressive traditions that bind the Hindus.

Water is a film that questions the nature of faith and tradition when pitted against more natural human instincts such as love and a desire for freedom. However Mehta is careful to show, through the various sub plots, the positive aspects of belief and the film is not an out and out attack on the more reactionary elements of Hindu society. Despite this the subject matter upset many in India and due to vociferous protests it was eventually shot in Sri Lanka. Water is the third part of Mehta's elements trilogy and the breathtaking cinematography and visual flair which charaterised the first two films (Earth and Fire) is very much in evidence. Add to this Mehta's ability to draw astonishing performances from her cast and you a film genuinely worthy of its Oscar nomination.

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




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Advocate X _ bizarre cases from the world of law.

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choosing a personal trainer _ Steve Longstaffe

I am constantly asked about the different techniques of personal trainers, such as where we do our qualifications. This month I have therefore decided to look at the criteria the individual should consider before choosing a particular trainer.

More and more people are choosing to work with a personal trainer. This can be for many reasons; they may need the motivational support, or to learn proper training techniques, they may feel self conscious about training by themselves, or they want to enhance a particular part of their body, and want to do it quickly.

As you will spending quite a bit of time in your trainer's company it is definitely worth considering the following:

- Experience
- Education
- Personality
- **Business Practices**

Experience is of key importance, because the trainers themselves will have needed time to fine tune their skills and utilise the techniques that really get results. Poor experience can lead to poor techniques which, in turn, can lead to injuries. Experience in other sports and activities outside the gym is also important. Often the client will want to enhance their abilities in various sporting activities, it is good that your personal trainer can therefore have a breadth of knowledge that can help. A good trainer should also possess critical thinking skills. They shouldn't simply do what all the other trainers are doing or copy workouts and exercises straight from a book or website.

The personal trainer's education is also extremely important and worthy of scrutiny. With such a growth industry there are many training companies out there willing to pass people with basic qualifications, so be aware. As a client it makes much more sense if you have a trainer who has extra qualifications in disciplines such as nutrition or sports injuries as you will then have access to a fuller 'package'. Always check the trainer is covered be the Registrar of Exercise Professionals (Reps) and to what skill level as this will mean you are covered by insurance. Personality is more of a factor and you will discover how much so once you have tried a few sessions, although the more questions you ask at your initial meeting, will help you discover whether you get on with your potential training partner. Personality clashes can arise! Therefore don't feel worried about trying trainers until you find one most comfortable with. Often your chosen personal trainer could end up training you in your own home, or sometimes end up socialising with you, so do consider this before settling for somebody you are not at ease with.

Good Business practices are also extremely important. You may get along but if a trainer is always late, or does not keep a good track of your or seem disorganised it will soon prove tiresome. Remember after all you are the client! You are the one who is paying for a good all round service, and your needs should be met to a standard that surpasses your expectations.

To drink or not to drink: the effects of dehydration

As this is the 'water' issue we asked our resident nutritionalist Mandy Barton about what to do if we don't get enough of it!

Q: So Mandy, give us the gory details: what happens to your body when you don't drink enough water?

To put it bluntly your wee turns a darker shade of yellow and it may have a stronger odour. You may go to the loo less often as your urine output decreases. In extreme cases the kidneys will suffer as they try hard to maintain the correct salt and fluid balance in the body.

Q: So what kind of effect does this have on your performance?

Dehydrating your body is performance suicide. Dehydrate a muscle by only 3% and you cause a 10% loss of strength and an 8% loss of speed. Performance literally dries up! Dehydration, as you can imagine, is one of the biggest drains on your body and can leave you feeling weak and light-headed.

Q: So how much are we supposed to drink each day?

The minimum recommended amount is one litre per day - which can be pure water - but you can also have diluted fruit juices, herbal teas, fresh fruit, vegetables and soups. Tea and coffee can be included but as caffeine is a well-known energy sapper, which can affect mineral absorption, these should be limited. Take it easy on the double caps!

Q:What are your top tips for staying hydrated?

Buy a 1-litre bottle of water to keep on your desk or table at home and sip throughout the day. Stick to water when training. You can also have a good quality sports drink — one that contains the right combination of carbs and electrolyte minerals — great for endurance events to give you that extra edge! Finally remember: Thirst is one of the first signs of dehydration!

sumas

It was a tough call this month to decide on a restaurant to feature in the water issue. A restaurant with stunning sea views? Hmm. We were spoilt for choice. But for incredible views, a castle and yachts bobbing in the harbour, it just has to be Sumas. After all, it's hard to beat a restaurant where you can see the boat that brought in your seafood....





As Longueville's "baby sister" restaurant, Sumas is in a great position to benefit from the hotel's expertise. Sumas' chef Daniel Ward started out in Longueville's kitchens, and the hotel's manager Pedro Benton handpicks the extensive wine list. Unsurprisingly, it's the regular haunt of the Gorey great and good – a restaurant that aims to offer fine dining in a fresh and airy atmosphere.

We started with a couple of glasses of Sumas' own label champagne. Dry and crisp, it was closer to Krug than your average house bubbly, and at $\pounds 7.50$ a glass, probably a touch cheaper too. Our waiter brought us over a generous platter of homemade breads, with a goat's cheese, anchovy and parmesan dip. We'd already checked out Sumas menu online (www.sumasrestaurant.com if you want to make yourself feel hungry) and decided we'd go for the lobster ravioli with shellfish foam and the quail and foie gras platter to start. The lobster ravioli was light and soft – a touch on the soggy side – but still delicious, with a good strong lobstery flavour. The

duo of quail was fabulous – I was expecting to struggle with those fiddly bones, but Sumas solves the problem by giving you just the breast. All the full flavour of the dark gamey meat, served wrapped in bacon, without any of the fuss. The melting foie gras comes with a great sweet accompaniment of pumpkin jam and a brioche 'finger' but be sure to add the optional glass of Sauternes if you want the classic rich and sweet foie gras experience.

Our main courses were the fillet of Scotch beef with a slow roast beef tomato, and the delicious sounding breast of Gressingham duck with sweet potato and plum jam. The charming restaurant manager and "maîtresse d""Susan Rossell was on hand to give wine recommendations. The wine list is an adventurous mix of New World discoveries and exciting new finds, with most of the bottles exclusive to Sumas. It's a great opportunity to try something new – Susan suggested we sample two of their best-selling reds – the elegant Portuguese Conde de Cantanehede (2001) to go with the beef, and a fruity well rounded organic Merlot (Les Grands Arbres 2005) for the duck.

The boyfriend didn't even let me get a fork in edgeways to try his main course; it all disappeared very quickly, as he chuckled about the witty pairing of beef with beef tomatoes. It was beautifully presented, a good size slab of meat topped with a Parma ham parcel of salty mushrooms. Big and bold with a delicate side – bit like him really. My duck breast with sweet potato was a good fit, taste-wise – with a great oriental edge from the spring greens, piquant plum jam and crispy wontons – although the wontons were a little too crispy for my liking.

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And to finish - share if you dare the assiette of not-so-mini desserts, but be prepared to fight over the melting Valhrona chocolate fondant and the gorgeous nougat semifreddo. There's also a classic crème brulée, a fabulously retro brandy snap basket with homemade raspberry icecream and delicious poached pears.

Our verdict? A la carte dining at Sumas doesn't come cheap, and some of the dishes are more memorable than others – but the view is outstanding. Our advice: make the most of the restaurant's surroundings - pick a gorgeous summer's evening when the tide is high, and book a table outside. The terrace is fully kitted out with electric heaters and chic rugs so you can stay outside and keep cozy as you watch the castle light up after sunset. If you're really lucky you might even catch a firework display for free. And if that's not value for money, I don't know what is.

We're spoilt in Jersey. No, we really are. Almost every bay has its own impressive waterfront bistro or cliff top restaurant. We're so blasé about it, we can even choose the restaurant according to the romantic effect. Here are a few suggestions....

Nothing's more flattering than the soft golden light of a summer sunset. Head out west to Elly's and watch the sun set right in front of you – with a cracking curry thrown in.

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Jersey strawberries are well in season now and if you haven't tried them yet, make sure you get your hands on some. Compare them to the imported ones, mainly Dutch, and there's no contest. Picked when they are very hard and unripe for transporting and then exposed to ethylene gas to colour them up, they are watery and tasteless. Really you're better off not bothering. Our homegrown fruit is a different matter. Joe Freire grows I 20 tonnes a season on his farm in St Lawrence and supplies only locally. His plants are grown outside in soil as they should be and he has plans to introduce that childhood treat of Pick Your Own so we can all get involved.

Pour Over It

Once you have your bowl of ripe red fruit, your next dilemma is which cream to choose - single, double or whipping? Blessed with the best from our lovely herd, our creams are homogenised (a process in which the fat globules are evenly distributed) and then packaged with nothing added. The fat content and thickness determine the best uses for different types of cream.

Single It is great for spooning if you want decadent dollops on your fruit and puds. With a fat content of 18 per cent, it's practically a diet option.

Double A fat content of 48 per cent means double cream is really versatile. It can be indulgently dolloped over desserts or used in cooking, (the high fat content means it won't split or curdle when boiled). It can also be whipped up to one-anda-half times its volume, but take care not to over-whip or it will suddenly heave into a solid buttery ball. You are aiming for a fluffy consistency and, if using an electric whisk, turn it off as soon as the cream starts to thicken and finish it off by hand.

Whipping With a 38 per cent fat content, this comes somewhere between the two. A lighter alternative to double cream, it will double in volume when whipped so it's perfect for puds such as strawberry pavlova.

Try these simple additions...

Mint and strawberries

Roughly chop a few fresh mint leaves on top of some crushed strawberries and allow all the flavours to infuse and combine.

Strawberries marinated in balsamic vinegar

At first, this sounds suspect but give it a go. Sprinkle the fruit generously with sugar then three tablespoons of balsamic. Give it a good stir and leave to marinade for a couple of hours.



There are more reasons to tempt you to eat out this summer with the Menu du Terroir now in its fourth year. 







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The original celebrity chef, he is a legend who has been head of the game for four decades. With his brother, Michel, he opened Le Gavroche 40 years ago and introduced London to serious French cooking. He was turning out perfectly risen soufflés when Gordon Ramsey was in nappies and Ramsey went on to train under Roux. Le Gavroche was the first restaurant in the UK to get three Michelin stars. We are talking big boys.

Monsieur Roux is consulting on all the food and its service at the new Grand Hotel. The repositioned brasserie, Victoria's, offers comfort dishes such as fisherman's pie and saddle of lamb and Tassili proposes the finest dining. He firmly believes that every aspect of a restaurant that he puts his name to should be 100%, "I will not suffer from staff any mistake." (One imagines that things might be a little sweaty behind the scenes.) Part of the ongoing training is to whisk staff off to Le Gavroche, now run by Roux's nephew Michel, to see how it should be done.

He says we are "truly blessed" here with the quality of our local produce. The menus have been developed with experienced Head Chef, Adrian Doolan and the focus is seasonal with a commitment to 80% of what is on the plate being local. A glance at the menus shows asparagus, lobster, scallops, rhubarb, strawberries, Classic Herd cheese and clotted cream ice cream.

It all starts with the ingredients but it is the alchemy that goes on in the kitchens that results in such mind-blowing food. The just-pink circle of duck stuffed with foie gras - its smooth richness balanced with the slight sharpness of the apple caviar (tiny red and green apples that look like caviar - something molecular apparently). The lobster tail on a spoon of risotto was sublime and wonderfully light with the pink champagne. Next came four perfect, sweet morsels of pinkish lamb with two soft tortellini and an excellent Pinot Noir. The dishes are perfectly balanced and the right size, so by the end you are replete and groaning only with pleasure. It is an absolute privilege to eat food cooked under the watchful eye of such a genius.

Tassili is intimate and has only 35 covers. It is all in black with high ceilings and good lighting. The tablecloths are black and the glasses with all those wines are beautifully elegant but overall it is still minus a few finishing touches. However, with the current owners everything will be attended to. Jersey's restaurants have upped their game in recent years, with two Michelin stars within our shores. If the opening night is anything to go by, Tassili is without doubt stratospheric and will confirm Jersey as a gastrodestination, which is good for all of us. These guys are unswerving in their vision to put the Great back into the Grand and they've got very deep pockets.

The Wine Regions of France - Bordeaux _ Eric Rombaut

This month we are touring the world's biggest and best wine-producing region. Home of the legendary reds - some of the world's most expensive wines - and also a diverse range of other excellent wines, including sweet whites from the famous Sauternes region, and powerful rosés.





Over a quarter of a million acres make the geographically defined Appellation d'Origine Contrôlée (AOC) of the region. Dominated by the historic and beautiful city of Bordeaux, the region's climate is influenced by its two rivers, the Garonne and Dordogne, which merge to form the Gironde, which then flows out into the Atlantic Ocean. Those vineyards lying to the west of the Garonne and

Gironde are designated wines of the Left Bank, and those to the east, Right Bank. In the Middle Ages it was ruled by the English for more than 200 years and so began the British love affair with reds they called Clarets. Contrary to popular thought, not every bottle of Bordeaux needs to be stored for 15 or 20 years in a cool damp cellar. The vast majority of all Bordeaux wines, red, rosé or white, are meant to be enjoyed young. In 1855 the Bordeaux wine merchants classified the region's vineyards into five top classes or growths, below which sit Cru Bourgeois and, recently also, Cru Artisans. Many consider this classification to be outdated as it was based then on the price of the wines, and many of the vineyards involved have changed hands. But it still carries much weight and classified wines command huge premiums. These exclusive wines can be bought only through the recognised Bordeaux wine merchants and most is allocated en Primeur (before it is bottled) and later traded as the wine takes age and even more premium. Many of these wines are not ready to drink in less than 5-20 years.

Grapes of Bordeaux

The red wines of Bordeaux are a blend of mainly Merlot, Cabernet Sauvignon and Cabernet Franc grape varieties.

Cabernet Sauvignon — has a deep red colour and a strong tannic structure. Its flavours take more time to mature but develop into blackcurrant and black cherry, with hints of cedar wood, cigars and mint.

Merlot – gives colour and richness to the alcohol. It's a softer grape, producing succulent, juicy wines with aromas of ripe, red fruit.

Cabernet Franc — is lighter bodied adding soft gentleness and fresh summer pudding aromas of red fruits. Also used in Chinon (see last issue on the Loire Valley).

The white wines are a blend of Sauvignon Blanc and Sémillon grape varieties.

Sauvignon Blanc — provides good acidity and sugar. It has huge aromatic potential ranging from grassy notes to citrus and exotic fruits. Sémillon – is identifiable by aromas of apricots and peaches. It produces rich, soft and slightly oily wines, ideal for making dessert wines.





Estèphe Cru Bourgeois 1999 This powerful Merlot is beautifully

made being both intensely fruity but balanced with tannins to give it a plenty to fill the mouth. Good now but still improving in the bottle if you can bear to keep your hands off it for a couple of years.

The Vineyards

To understand the region's diversity we can group the vineyards into six types which roughly correspond to geographical areas and styles of wines. (see map)

Médoc and Graves: Left Bank wines with Medoc are predominantly Cabernet Sauvignon grapes whose vines thrive in the gravelly soil. Graves also produce fine white wines as well as reds.

Saint-Émilion: St Emilion, Pomerol and Fronsac, are on the Right Bank near the town of Libourne. This region produces mainly Merlotbased red wines.

Côtes de Bordeaux: Vineyards in this group take their name from the hillsides along the right banks of the Garonne and the Dordogne rivers and are spread across the entire region, producing red and white wines.

Bordeaux and Bordeaux Supérieur: Produced throughout the Bordeaux region in red, rosé and white. This is the largest and most diverse of the types with the wines' character depending on the different soils and growing conditions.

Entre-deux-Mers: Elegant dry whites are produced, literally "between the two tidal seas." This area is also a source of good regional (Bordeaux and Bordeaux Supérieur) reds.

Sauternes and Barsac: Golden sweet white wines, famous throughout the world, are only produced in this small part of Southern Bordeaux.

Thus ends a very quick tour of Bordeaux. I have recently attended the trade tasting of 2006 and am now receiving 2006 en Primeur offers from the Bordeaux merchants. 



Nils' Predator 75 is a fantastic example of a home from home, and he is more than happy to give a tour. A widower from Norway with two grown-up sons, Nils enjoys three or four months of the year aboard his motor yacht, named the Atlantic Eagle. The vessel blends traditional comforts with the latest in marine technology.

Generously equipped for entertaining, the interior is luxuriously finished down to every last detail. It comes highly recommended, having won Motorboat of the Year in the 1999 BT British Nautical Awards.

But at roughly £1.5 million, you would expect every comfort of home to be there – and it certainly is. They come with a lot of kit and then you customise them to whatever you want. Every cabin generally comes with a flat screen TV and DVD, for example. But some customers like a Playstation in every cabin.

With twin 1550hp engines and a fuel capacity of 8,000 litres, the vessel can reach breathtaking top speeds of up to 37 knots (that's about 43 miles per hour), and takes Nils from his home in Norway to Jersey comfortably in around five days." I tend to cruise at about 25 knots – I only take her up to top speed to test the engine." A state-of-the-art control room meets you as you step onboard. This is the area where Nils likes to study his copy of Reeds Nautical Almanac – his sailor's bible which contains navigational details for the whole of Europe.


Descend to the living quarters and you find yourself in a saloon-cum-galley which combines luxurious style with every practical convenience. A flat screen TV and extendable dining table are the focal points of the room.

The kitchen, to the right (or should that be starboard?) has all modern cons including a dishwasher and fridge freezer, which allows Nils to indulge his hobby of fine cuisine. "I like to cook Bacalao – Spanish for codfish – for some friends who I visit every year. "I enjoy dinner parties and the boat is equipped with everything I need to entertain family and friends." As he opens the many cupboards – all of which lock at the push of a button to ensure safety – he reveals a full set of crockery bearing the Sunseeker logo, all held in place on a special stand so nothing can be smashed. "It's got everything a good chef might need." And the vessel itself has everything a good host might need. Pass through the living area and you arrive at the VIP stateroom – a grand name for the guest bedroom, but when you see it for yourself it merits the name.

Nils and his sons selected the navy and gold colourscheme with a cherry gloss wood finish. Sunseeker offers its customers up to 150 different fabrics and a variety of woods. This is just the first of three bedrooms, all with en-suite bathrooms.

The owner's stateroom is on the port side, and comes with a music system set into the wall and surround sound, so Nils can be rocked to sleep by his favourite tunes – and not just the waves.





There are the luxuries you can see, and the cleverly hidden ones that you can't. For example, every cabin is fully air conditioned. But there's no loud unit buzzing away. "We have our own electric generator, which is very quiet," explains Nils. "You can hardly hear it." A third bedroom has two bunk beds, plenty of cupboard space and again it's own en-suite shower room.

Not the largest in the range – there is a Predator 82 (see over) and 108, Nils' yacht is certainly big enough to accommodate him, his sons and their families comfortably whenever they wish to come aboard. "I've been into boating since the mid 1960s," says Nils, who had his own telecoms company which took him all over the world.

And he's kept his hobby in the family – his son Sven owns his own navigational systems company while his other son Jan used to be a powerboat racing champion. In the winter, the Atlantic Eagle berths in Jersey, looked after by Channel Island Marine. Berthing costs in Jersey are around $\pounds 4,000$ a year.

A boat like the Predator 75 also costs around £25,000 to maintain annually. This would include an annual engine and systems service, a thorough annual clean, antifoul and polish. A weekly boat maintenance plan is generally advised, unless the owners plan to spend a lot of time on board and are happy to do the cleaning themselves.









You don't have to be a millionaire to get a taste of a life on the water. Channel Island Marine have vessels starting from £4,000 and going right up to their largest brand new yacht – the Portofino 37m Yacht – which costs a cool £9.2 million.

Once you have spent a season boating then you will have far more definite ideas about what you want and a local yacht broker can then guide you into a more suitable vessel.

You also get total privacy, you can just find a quiet anchorage and chill out.

Nils agrees. And as he sets sail in his Atlantic Eagle, bound for Norway, he's the master of his ship, the king of his castle.... relaxed and totally at home.

Barbies should no longer be about standing in the dark with a charred raw sausage. Warm weather and the longest days demand fun food in the open air. So come outside and get ready for a grilling.

Gas or Charcoal?

Old-school classic or jet engine blaster? You decide. Either way the taste won't vary a lot but the way you cook it will.

Top tips for coals

If you opt for purists' charcoal, you will need at least 45mins before you can start cooking (guys, pay attention and get it lit). You will need to be familiar with the how the air vents warm and cool and how to move the grill over the coals. Spread charcoal in an even 5cm layer. Beware of diving in too soon — the coals will only be ready when the flames have died down and they have turned a light, glowing grey. If you can only hold you hand above the grill for a second, you're hot. If you need to cool it, spread out the coals.

With the lid on, heat rises and reflects evenly around the food so that the natural flavours are sealed in. Keeping the lid on has the added advantage of preventing flare-ups (when the hot fat spits off the meat, hits the hot coals and flames char the food)

Top tips for gas

Not totally foolproof. You do have to check you have enough gas – running out can put a dampener on your evening - and that you know how to connect it.

In for a roasting

Marinated, Butterflied Leg of Lamb with Jersey Royals and Green salad serves 6

For the toppest of barbie nosh, you can't beat this dish for entertaining. You'll need to prepare it a little ahead of time but that makes it all the better for an after work feast.

300ml olive oil 4 large cloves of garlic a couple of sprigs of rosemary zest and juice of a lemon 6 juniper berries (Spice House in the Market sells little bags)

Preparation

Ask your butcher to remove the bone from the leg of lamb, so you have a flattened piece of meat which, opened up, makes a vaguely butterfly shape. A 2.5kg leg will leave you with roughly 2kg joint.

In a bowl combine all the above marinade ingredients. Pour them into a hole-free plastic bag (far better than a bowl to get the meat in contact with the marinade) and add the lamb. Leave in the fridge overnight for all the flavours to infuse and, if it's not too hot get it out of the fridge four hours before cooking to let the oil loosen and warm.

Cooking

Think of this as a big steak. Your cooking time will depend on the thickness rather than weight. If you're cooking over charcoal, make sure you push the white coals to the side so the meat isn't over direct heat, otherwise it will spit and make flames and you'll end up with a charred offering. Cook with the lid on for 10 mins each side. Give the

If you're going to have a charcoal barbie, make sure it's this one and the new season's soft green fits well in the garden. The grill is a huge 57cm across, so room for a large slab of meat. 

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It may look like it has a mind of it's own a la 2001 but this is the first DILA projector specifically designed for the home market. And its brilliant. Think all your mates coming round to play on your game console on a massive projection screen. Think home cinema.

JVCs newly developed Direct Drive Image Light Amplification (D-ILA) technology is far superior to the old Liquid Crystal On Silicon (LCOS) technology. The DLA – HDI is made for domestic use, living-room friendly, sleek & black. It has two HDMIs, a component video input, plus video and composite video options. However it lacks a D-sub PC input. But it's full hi-def 1920x1080 native resolution and astounding contrast ratio of 15,000:1 more than make up for this. Every other projector out there currently boasting contrast ratios of anything like this can only claim such figures because they use Auto Iris Systems – however the DLA-HD1 claims this 15,000:1 ratio without compromising the images brightness in any way!

The key to such a dazzling leap forward in black level is a combination of two innovations to the D-ILA engine. First, the latest 0.7in D-ILA device carries new ultra-smoothing technology that reduces irregularities in the liquid crystal lignment to reduce stray light. Secondly, it introduces new, next-generation liquid crystal materials and improved alignment technology to reduce the gap between liquid crystals so that light loss from the liquid crystal layer is reduced dramatically.

The picture quality of this blows all the others out of the water, more expensive models pale in comparison. It has definitely overcome the teething problems of JVC's past D-ILA projectors.

The fact that the DLA-HDI has been designed for home use means that it is very simple to use. The on screen menus are surprising comprehensive (the people who normally create this high level of technology do not like us mortals to understand any part of it). The remote has actually been criticised for its simplicity!! Where as in fact I see usable technology as an excellent step forward. It looks a lot better being able to show off your new toys without having to resort to banging them against a wall in frustration.

Approx £4,000 may sound a lot, but in the world of projectors it is a fantastic price tag, and all the reviews on this machine rave about it's low price.

Overall this machine is truly unbeatable, the picture quality is stunning. Go along to Future Vision in Voisins and check it out.

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
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Oh. My. God.

You may not have heard of motorcycle manufacturers Moto Morini but they have been around a long time, and whilst they were out of site for a few years, they're back. They are so back.

Quick History (for the sensible reader):

Moto Morini, was started by the Italian Alfonso Morini, a gifted engineer with a great love of motorbikes. Alfonso had spent his earlier years learning his trade repairing bikes until in 1925 he was asked by his employer to design and build a 2 stroke single cylinder 125cc bike for racing, which was an immediate success. By 1927 he was achieving great success, with his bikes setting no less than 6 world records at one event alone, the Grand Prix of Nations at Monza. Records which stood for 20 years, then in 1933 one of his bikes went on to set the world speed record for a 175cc bike at 162kph.

In 1937 Alfonso Morini decided it was time to set out on his own, and created Moto Morini which in pre war Italy found itself manufacturing motorised tricycles. Not exactly what he had in mind, but it paid the wages.

Moto Morini progressed through the decades with a few interruptions, WWII being one of them, which saw his factory converted to war production, and subsequently bombed by the allies. But within a year of the end of the war it was back with a new factory and a new motorbike, the "I25 Competition" which heralded Morinis domination of light motorcycle competition in the late forties and fifties.

That's almost enough history for one day, other than to say that until the mid eighties Morini continued to succeed and innovate with mostly small capacity bikes. But, times change and after a long decline through the eighties the Company finally closed down in 1993. The name was bought by Cagiva-Ducati but the momentum was lost. That seemed the end for Motor Morini.

In 1999 however the fun started again - the brand name was bought by the nephew of Morini who, with his Company Morini Franco Motori, experts in engine manufacture, set about restoring the name and traditions created by his Uncle Alfonso.

It took them 7 years but they did it. 3 models; The Corsaro (140bhp - mad) The Corsaro Veloce (155 bhp - Even mAdDer) and the $9\frac{1}{2}$ (105bhp - quite sensible in comparison).

So we had a TEST RIDE, which went rather like this:

- I.Wheel beautiful yellow Corsaro out of shop
- 2.Start engine (note clever engine management when starting)
- 3.Stand with mouth gaping open at the unbelievable sound.
- 4. Whiz throttle every few seconds to make a mazing sound even more amazing.
- 5.Close mouth, whiz throttle another fifty times
- 6. Wonder what riding a 1200cc and 140bhp bike does to the space time continuum
- 7. Release clutch and accelerate sensibly up the road, whizzing throttle (except when riding past policemen)
- 8. Never want to come back.

The Corsaro, despite having a huge engine is delightfully comfortable and nimble to ride. Seating position is good, with a lovely handlebar position, and the foot pegs quite high, tucking you in nicely. Good, except the footrest has a habit of catching your shin when you put the side stand down. A small price to pay.

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If you, like me are used to riding a big trailie, you will probably find it makes your bike feel like a cross between a combine harvester and a rubber sofa in comparison.

"There should actually be a recording of the sound these exhausts make - the CD would sell!"

The ride is firm and sure and delightfully balanced, not that you really notice much because you are still listening to the exhaust more than anything. The engine, thanks to its locomotive level of power and torque is immensely responsive at low revs, making slow relaxed riding very comfortable and surprisingly easy. It is perfectly in its element riding around Jersey, even with the dratted 40mph speed limit.

However, if you were to be somewhere other than Jersey, where the speed limit was higher, like a race track, or France, or the salt flats in America where they do land speed records, then the rest of what the Corsaro can do, I'm sure, would impress you too.

I don't know what would happen if you really wound this bike up, but using a bit of the low end grunt it performs in an arm pulling out of sockets sort of way. The awesome power matched with the effortless handling, and that sound, all combines to make an incredible riding experience. You will never want to stop. I know I didn't, which is how I managed to get the bike back from the test ride an hour after the bike shop was supposed to close. (Sorry) That, or as I suspected when I first got on it, perhaps it did something to the space time continuum.

The likes of Sasha, Oakenfold, Digweed and many, many more became fans and Quivver became a household name. A shake up at A&M left Quivver free to move onto pastures and Paul Oakenfold was first off the mark in the Quivver chase, Already a huge fan who now saw the extreme talent ripe for the taking, Paul snapped up John and signed him to his own Perfecto label. He was Resident

for 2 Years with Oakenfold at Cream and also took up a U.S. residency (bi-monthly) @Twilo N.Y.C John was placed NO 69 in the top 100 djs in the world this year: be sure to catch him on what is set to be AUDIOS biggest night yet.





interview _ slam/scott nixon

Last month we managed to grab ten mins with SLAM (Stuart McMillan and Orde Meikle) & Local boy done good Scott Nixon when they played Cl!que's night at the Watersplash. Slam synonymous with Glasgow's underground club scene and their soundsearching record label, Soma, The duo have garnered a reputation as international DJs, accomplished recording artists and respected collaborators. Their schedule regularly takes them to clubs worldwide confirming their status as one of a handful of artists that truly shape their genre. Resident at Fabric, London and Pressure, Glasgow, they are about to undergo their 8th annual Slam tent at Scotland's T in the Park festival (15 000 capacity) Here is what they had to say:

Do you prefer playing in clubs or at big festivals? Orde: Ummmm, you know what each different thing is a different experience, the clubs I prefer them they are my comfort zone. In the clubs I can build it up from start to finish, a festival is another deal, no matter how long you have been DJing. Festivals can be a bit daunting sometimes. You have to go on after another DJ. Its a whole different vibe. Festivals are great though - we did SouthFest in Buenos Aires last week and it was f**ing amazing it was the best festival we have ever done. Instead of the crowd cheering & and going crazy it was almost like a (hard for me to tell you but he screwed up his face smiled and waved his arms) there were 20 thousand people doing it.

COTT: Ahhhhh Aahhhhh I don't prefer big clubs or festivals I like the smaller more personal gigs... intimate and grimy...I love it.... Orde: The biggest and best festival for me so far was Exit Festival in Belgrade 250,000 revellers over 4 days, as far as the eye could see it was massive and such a rush getting up in front, I was buzzing so much...

Who are the dj's/producers you most respect?

Stuart: I like Laurent Garnier as my main di because he has a lot of passion for it, another guy and friend Richie Hawtin is a guy I really admire. COTT: At the moment I'm firing off Rouge Element and Soft Focus. Their productions are well up there at the moment for me. Plus of course my own stuff.

What, does music mean to you?

Orde: What it means to me is I have to be selfish and have to put my musical tastes on other people, I love music I grew up with music, for me its paradise, I couldn't imagine a life without it, for me its pleasurable as an experience. Music is my life....

Uart: Christ, it's my f if ing life so ummmm... it's just everything. It was the first thing I took too

Scott: What does it mean to anyone? Is there a meaning to music? If anything it's the vibe if you want to nail it down. When I hear a tune it makes me feel good - it's the rush.

What types of music do you listen to out side of dance music?

Orde: That's a difficult one because I am so engrossed with music whether it be in the studio on a production or remix or music for a video. Or trying to keep up with all the new music that's around. That's a full time job in itself, I do like oldschool, reggae, funk, dub, things like King Tubby, Toasted Pablo and The Clash, The Clash is well up there for me. Stuart: I listen to film soundtracks I really love film music, because there is no preconceptions, things like American Beauty and an artist called Craig Armstrong he does music for films like the Twin Towers and Moulin Rouge and stuff like that. I lhave a couple of albums melanchonic, Massive Attack's sister label, I also like reggae I grew up listening to it my dad was a Rasta. I also got into funk... I have a wide range of things I like to listen to. COLL: Coming from the thrash days and metal there was a lot of riffs, I'm well into my power riffs also break beat drum and bass. I'm always walking around with a little riff in my head and now these days with technology I can get my phone out and I may sound like an idiot afterwards when I listen back but then go into the studio and play it back. A riff may come around for 5 mins and if you don't record it it's gone.

What, from your experience, is the best advice you can give to up and coming di's?

Orde: That's another hard one... Ummmm the best advice I can give is to do your own thing, try take influences, mould your own thing because then you're unique, eventually you'll get there and to be a producer is paramount, you have to make the music to be able to understand it to be able to play it. Not only that people hear it and that's what makes you stand out from the crowd.

Stuart: Live the music go for the limit. The scene comes and goes I mean you have to live it. If you want to make an indentation you have to live it and breathe it...

What's been the most embarrassing moment in your career so

Itde: Ohhhhh ummmmm..... I'll need to think about that one there has been a few, give me a min to think about that one, (M:Answers on a postcard?) Maybe we will do that one by email. Give us another.. Ha hahah. DTULATT: Ummmm switching off sound systems, blowing up sound systems... Ha ha ha ha ummmmm the list goes on, I cant remember; they are all medico. SCOTT: digg deep... Ummmmm dnt know? Prob the most embarrassing moment is going snowboarding and in front of a big crowd with high expectations and just being a punter, going off the jump with arms all over the place not even managing to pull a trick off... Orrr or... Djing and getting a bit of fluff on the needle in the middle of a wicked set, the arm slips across the record and you look up and see a few thousand people looking at you and I'm stood there thinking fluff on my needle there is nothing you can do apart from put your hands up and carry on...

In your opinion who are the next up and coming Dj's people should be looking out for?

Stuart: Ummm I think ummmm Matthew deyer, audiomix (I think that's what he said) are really up there at the moment, ummmm beyond that I would say guys like jamie jones he is going to do really well.


COLL: I hate to say it but I have not heard anyone who are going to take over the big guns on the scene at the moment, I have herd a lot of dj's and your not going to beat the likes of Djqubert, scratch perverts, andy c they have set a very high level and its old boys doing it, young guys have got such a lot to do to get up there...because of the history, most of these guys grew up in the rave days & the old hip hop days its not about putting a cd in a bloody machine and it calculates the beat for you, its about the whole skill of djing its an art form. Kids these day just put it in and they think they can mix its not like that....





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

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Family Nursing & Home Care _

The days when nurses couldn't be married are gone, but not the need for their care, which is as important now as it ever was. Family Nursing & Home Care is celebrating 100 years in Jersey and Director Karen Huchet hopes that Islanders will mark the occasion by becoming members.

Considering that Family Nursing & Home Care (FN&HC) has helped most islanders in one way or another, it's surprising how little people know about this charity which cares for everyone – from soon-to-be mothers and new-born babies to the elderly and infirm.

Family Nursing & Home Care is responsible for the school nurses in Jersey, and these days their role includes testing everything from hearing to sight; providing immunisations; and offering health advice to teachers and pupils. Anyone who has received care after being treated in hospital is also likely to have been cared for by Family Nursing & Home Care's army of district nurses, occupational therapists and physiotherapists.

The child health visitors who run mother and well baby clinics and give advice and support on everything from diet to coping with a new baby are also provided by FN&HC. There is even a paediatric team which provides specialist care for chronically sick children, giving them as normal a life as possible in their own home.

However, the charity is probably best well known for its Home Care Service which enables many of Jersey's elderly to continue to live independently. This not only frees up hospital beds for more urgent cases but it also reduces the stress placed on the person needing care.

The States has outsourced a lot of services to Family Nursing & Home Care, and pays the charity to provide them. However, FN&HC still needs to raise money, which it does through fund raising and – most importantly – by getting people to become members. Current membership stands at 7,000 but this isn't enough to cover all of the costs incurred in providing these services, which is why FN&HC is focusing on recruiting 2,000 new members during 2007, the charity's centenary year.



100 years of caring

Family Nursing & Home Care's roots lie in the parishes, which, 100 years ago, set up nursing associations. In 1907, it was normal for Islanders to be cared for in their homes – they had been for centuries – but new nursing associations, and the district nurses that they employed, set higher standards of care.

The nurses came from the Queen Victoria Jubilee Institute for Nurses, which set high standards for its staff. As well passing rigorous training, and having to wear severe uniforms, Queen's Nurses had to be single and were forced to resign on marriage. Grouville and St Helier were the first parishes to employ them but within 20 years most parishes had their own nursing associations, each one independent and funded by subscriptions, donations and the parish rates. Nurses would cycle around their district, carrying everything they needed on two wheels and only charging those who could afford to pay.

The Jersey District Nursing Association was founded in 1926 to help coordinate the parish associations, but many did not join, and remained totally independent.

At the start of the Second World War the many district nurses working in Jersey felt cut off. However many stayed, rather than returning to their native England, and spent the Occupation in Jersey caring for their patients. The Nazi forces ordered that nurses could not help maternity cases, but many ignored the restriction and helped at births.

The original Siam Cup sits in the Rugby Museum at Twickenham and is one of the three oldest Rugby Union Trophies in the world (along with the Calcutta Cup and the Hospitals Cup). Rumour has it that the islanders served together in Siam as part of the Durham Light Infantry alongside the future King of Siam (which is now Thailand).

When the Prince came to power he ordered the court silversmith to melt down Ticals (Siamese silver dollars) in order to craft the cup - this would explain the name and the decorations of dancing girls and elephant heads which adorn the trophy. Since 1928 the cup has been competed for by the members of Jersey and Guernsey RFC in an event which has now become a highlight of the island's sporting calendar.

This is how we found ourselves, along with several thousand other supporters, at the JRFC ground in St Peter on the 5th May shouting ourselves hoarse! The Guernsey team repelled wave after wave of Jersey attack to record a famous victory.

Throughout 80 minutes of tense excitement even Jersey's professional players could make no headway through the Guernseymen (including a smattering of Australians, New Zealanders and South Africans!). Guernsey won and Jersey took their opponents to the bar to bask in the memories of the day. Despite the absence of the entertaining annual fisticuffs I know that I, for one, will be making the trip to Guernsey to watch Jersey win the trophy back next year!

charity water sports _ le Tournoi 2007



Following the enourmous success of the Le Tournoi offshore yacht racing challenge in October 2006 the organisers have extended the race, adjusted the dates and included even more social and training elements.

The 2007 challenge now offers team development sessions by former professional sailor and leadership trainer Will Carnegie. Will, who was born and educated in Jersey skippered Veritas in the BT Global Challenge in 200. Will gained respect in the yachting community for re motivating his crew to race back across the Southern Ocean to Cape Town following a horrific accident of the coast of Australia which nearly killed two crew members.

Will and his family have recently returned to Jersey where he continues to provides leadership and team development training globally and as sailing is particularly close to his heart is delighted to be involved with the Le Tournoi Challenge.

On offer for Jersey teams is a tailored half day (or two evenings) workshop. This training is included in the cost of the boat and will enable the crews, as individuals and as a team, to prepare themselves for the challenge ahead including modules on Crew Formation - The key principles behind forming and developing teams, First Storm - Preparing for and leading through high pressure

situations, Sustaining High Performance - Sustaining success and effectiveness and Integrating New Team Members - Developing new team players effectively.

Andy Le Seelleur, co-organiser explained "2006 was an outstanding success and for 2007 we have introduced this new training element to continue to develop the race and its competitors. We've also increased the number of races and social events to make the challenge a bit more interactive too, keeping the races fresh for last year's participants. We are also offering places for individuals to take part as we appreciate that smaller businesses may only be able to one or two participants — although you don't need to be sponsored by your company anyone wanting to take part is welcome."

New for 2007 is a date change from October to August. However this does not mean that it will be relaxed cruising, the weather is unpredictable and crews will have to work together to get the most out of their boat to win, be it in light or moderate winds.

The social activities in 2006 were very well received and therefore 2007 will see more of these. In 2007 they are looking at some extra events in Jersey and also an event in Guernsey. Places for the challenge are already filling up with crews from NatWest, Coutts, Mourant, RBSI, Jersey Deaf Children's Society, Ernst & Young, A crew of eight is needed to enter the race, consisting of a qualified Yachtmaster and 2 competent crew, the remainder can be a blend of novice and experienced sailors. Crews can be changed at each stage of the race enabling the maximum number of individuals to experience the challenge.

The cost of each boat entered is £4,950 covering crew development and leadership training, yacht charter, foul weather clothing, corporate banners, corporate forestay flag, corporate hull stickers, corporate photo pack, marina fees, social events in Guernsey, Jersey, Cherbourg and Portsmouth. Crews will be required to raise an additional minimum of £1,000 which will be ringfenced for charitable purposes.






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
