5,000 signatures slam GST people power threatens to rein in the States

More than five thousand people signed a petition agreeing with the Chairman of the Consumer Council, Deputy Alan Breckon, that the introduction of the Goods and Services Tax should be stalled until a full investigation of other revenue-raising options have been considered.

The Consumer Council may turn the thumbscrews on the Treasury still further, with a planned GST rally in the Royal Square this month.

Who knows what may preside over the changing streets beneath its battlements. Maybe a giant orange hotel might be perched to greet people as they arrive at our Port. Perish the thought.




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Intro the bigsmall issue





This new series looks at contemporary American culture through the austere lens of statistics. Each image portrays a specific quantity of something: fifteen million sheets of office paper (five minutes of paper use); 106,000 aluminum cans (thirty seconds of can consumption) and so on. My hope is that images representing these quantities might have a different effect than the raw numbers alone, such as we find daily in articles and books. Statistics can feel abstract and anesthetizing, making it difficult to connect with and make meaning of 3.6 million SUV sales in one year, for example, or 2.3 million Americans in prison, or 426,000 cell phones retired every day. This project visually examines these vast and bizarre measures of our society, in large intricately detailed prints assembled from thousands of smaller photographs.

Graham Taylor It's all about poise

Whilst out at parties and dinners this summer the buzzword on the lips of the glamorous and in-the-know seems to be 'Bowen'. It sounds like a pretty exclusive club, and is normally talked about in hushed whispers which makes it much more difficult to properly eavesdrop.

So when I rocked up for my appointment I was pretty excited (mainly because when I meet Bear and/or Jonny I will be able to chat endlessly about our shared passion for Bowen, and it'll be the beginning of a long and happy relationship and we can look back and laugh and tell our grandchildren the funny story of how we met and hit it off....etc, etc). Obviously I won't have children with Bear AND Jonny, it's one or the other... although, maybe I'll just play it by ear when the time comes.


The treatment lasts 45 minutes and started with me on a Balance Pad (a large squidgy piece of foam). When standing on the pad with my eyes open all was normal, however when instructed to close my eyes it becomes really hard to balance and an inherent line of strain becomes apparent. In my case I kept being pulled forward. This indicated to my therapist where my problems were lying and we proceeded with the main part of the treatment where he manipulated, through gentle rolling of the skin over muscle, the areas on my body that were out of line. 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nanotechnology _ it's going to be huge!

Big may be beautiful, but in

the field of science, tiny is

perfect. And by tiny, try to

imagine one billionth of a

metre, or only 10 atoms wide.

Welcome to the world of

nanotechnology.

Just when you thought things couldn't get much smaller, science begs to differ. At such scales, the ordinary rules of physics and chemistry no longer apply. Materials' characteristics, such as their colour, strength, conductivity and reactivity, can differ substantially. And it is here that tiny carbon nanotubes - 100 times stronger than steel but six times lighter – are beginning to make a difference to every aspect of our lives. 'Nano' is used in the world of science to mean one billionth. A nanometer is a billionth of a metre.

Nanotechnology attempts to achieve something useful through the manipulation of matter at this level. But even if you're a technophobe who can barely tell one end of an iPod from another, don't think your world is unaffected by this small scale onslaught.

From the food we eat, to the clothes we wear, to the tennis we play, these tiny particles are making a huge impact on their effectiveness.

a sporting chance

Scientists are already using nanomaterials to make top-of-the-range sports equipment with enhanced properties. Shock-absorbing shoes give softer landings, balls keep their pressure for longer gameplay, and stronger tennis rackets and golf clubs can deliver more powerful, straighter shots.

In winter 2005, nanotechnology hit the ski slopes. The same silicondioxide crystals that reinforce Federer's tennis rackets added flexibility control to the ski's tip and tail, allowing slicker turns and a smoother ride.

The foam in trainers has been cushioning our feet for over 10 years. But noone knew exactly why it was so good at absorbing shocks. Powerful new microscopes have revealed the answer is in the foam's nanostructure. Chains of molecules are arranged in repeating sequences, and the length of this sequence is crucial. Scientists can now adjust the foam ingredients, making tiny changes to the repeating sequence to control the foam's shock-absorbing performance. Nanotechnology made its Davis Cup debut in 2002, in a tennis ball with longlasting bounce.

Inside the Wilson 'Double Core' ball there's an extra layer - a coating made of one nanometre-thick clay platelets mixed with rubber. The platelets create a maze

that slows down air flowing through it, so the ball stays inflated for longer. Tennis and golf are leading the way in sport, with nano-composite-enhanced rackets and



tailor made

Nano-sized treatments are giving clothing novel and useful properties. Synthetic materials draw moisture away from the wearer's skin, just like cotton. Spills don't soak in, they just roll away. Stains wash out easily. And smells never get stuck in. But while the technology might be new, the scientists who created them looked to nature for inspiration. Spill-resistant fabric works in the same way as the self-cleaning leaves of the lotus lily. The leaves of this plant, and the more familiar nasturtium, are covered with waxy crystals only I nanometre across. They form a coating that roughens the surface, which causes water droplets to form into beads. As the beads run away, they take



dust and dirt with them, leaving the leaves clean and glossy green.

Scientists have used these ideas from nature to add some very clever chemistry to clothing. Using their knowledge of how particular chemical ingredients mix and react together, they can custom-design nano-sized molecules to suit their needs. They've made molecules like sponges to soak up liquid, some like whiskers to fend off spills and others that jiggle around to release stains.

Now nano-particles of silver can be attached to cotton fibres. Nanosilver fabric is already made into socks that claim to cut the cause of smells by killing the bacteria responsible.

Because the treatments are on the nano-scale, they can be attached to fabrics without changing the material's characteristic look and feel. Just as some nanotreatments have been inspired by nature, others take a lesson from history. Silver's antibacterial properties have been known for thousands of years. The ancient Greeks and Romans put silver coins in their water carriers to keep it safe for drinking.

Now nano-particles of silver can be attached to cotton fibres. Nanosilver fabric is already made into socks that claim to cut the cause of smells by killing the bacteria responsible.

Having created new wonders for our wardrobes, scientists are busy thinking about where to apply their nanotechnologies next. In the near future, bespoke nanotreatments could make stain-proof carpet and spill-resistant soft furnishings.Nano-silver's antibacterial properties are being applied in washing machines, air conditioning units and fridges.

right at home

Futurologists have predicted that smart materials will one day surround us. In our homes, paint will change colour on command. Invisible solar cells will supply clean, green power. Video wallpaper will replace the TV. Some of these ideas are already at the prototype stage.

In Australia, Carl Masens from Sydney's University of Technology, is building a NanoHouse to demonstrate new products in action.

Its windows and walls will keep rooms cool with heat reflecting coatings and paint. Glass will shut out light at the flick of a switch and will clean itself in the rain. Kitchen and bathroom surfaces will be antibacterial

An award-winning British invention - selfcleaning glass - will fill the NanoHouse's window frames.lt works using a 15 nanometre coating of titanium dioxide that promotes a reaction between the Sun's UV rays and dirt. The broken-down grime is washed away by rain. By cutting out detergent, these windows are good for the environment too.

In the UK, ramblers and bikers on the Trans Pennine Trail can now see their routes more clearly thanks to the selfcleaning glass that covers map boards along the route.



a matter of taste

Many of the proteins, sugars and fats in food are naturally nano-sized. So does the food industry need nanotechnology?

The world's biggest food producers think so and are investing in research. Nanotechnology can be used right from field to table. For example, nanomaterials could help keep food fresh for longer. Meat and cheese are often packed in protective wrappings that stop them drying out, spoiling or tainting other foods.

Scientists are already manufacturing nano-sized vitamins that are easier for bodies to absorb. In the future they hope to create 'interactive' food - food and drink that could change colour, flavour or nutrients on demand.

The best packaging lets in the least air. Now nanotechnology can make this barrier twice as good. When mixed with plastic, tiny platelets only a few nanometres thick form a maze which air takes a long time to get through. Scientists at the University of Florida have used fluorescent nanoparticles to spot food contamination, pinpointing just one E coli bacterium in a sample of beef. They're developing their ultrasensitive test further and hope to improve food safety: Using a variety of colours, scientists can use fluorescent nanoparticles to check food for many different types of harmful bacteria, including E coli and Salmonella. With a hand-held fluorescence detector, they will be able to spot them all at the same time. And nanotechnology isn't just protecting food - it's in food.

advocate X bizarre cases from the world of law

The way you dress says a lot about you, and people will, for an enormous variety of reasons, go to great lengths to ensure that the right message is being communicated; whether it relates to their orientation, availability, social status or sporting affiliation. Hands up if you're a straight bloke and have ever, when trying something on in a shop, caught a glance at yourself in a mirror and thought, 'Hang on, although this pair of pink trousers/rather nice purple speedos/black latex shirt may look FABULOUS on me, isn't there a small but appreciable chance that I might come across as someone who would rather dine on sausage than kebab?"

Conversely, imagine having to dress and act in a manner which would leave your average bystander in no doubt that you are as gay as a window - but not having anyone believe you. This is what has happened to Alvaro Orozco, who has recently been condemned to deportation from Canada for just not being gay enough.

Apparently, this isn't a result of a new policy from the land of the moose which requires that all new immigrants display a fondness for musical theatre and amyl nitrate. Although, having said that, frankly I'm astonished that Senator Walker and co haven't cottoned on to the possibilities of trying to attract a demographic which tends to consist of professionals with i) a high level of disposable income, ii) low social security requirements and iii) an appreciation of culture which goes beyond ten pints of chemically brewed lager on a Friday night.

In fact, Alvaro's situation arose as a result of his claiming refugee status in Canada on the basis that if they returned him home, he would suffer persecution as a homosexual. His story started at the age of twelve in his home in Nicaragua, a country where, according to his lawyers, homosexuality is illegal and he risked violence as a result of his lifestyle choice. Alvaro's father had allegedly beaten him, saying, 'If one of my sons became gay one day, I will kill him with my hands' (although on the bright side, at least he wasn't going to toast him with a flamethrower or something).

If this had been a Hollywood film, the son would have met an inspirational teacher before finding a way to express his sexuality

through the medium of interpretative dance - the father would then have jumped on stage at the finale and tearfully hugged his son, throwing the nowunwanted flamethrower into an applauding crowd of cool-looking teenagers and men in leather chaps with handlebar moustaches.

However, this is real life and Alvaro spent the next seven years hitchhiking through North America where he was repeatedly arrested as an illegal immigrant, living under the protection of local churches and support groups. before arriving in Canada

in 2005. He then claimed refugee status, but was turned down by Canadian Adjudicator Deborah Lamont - she "found the claimant's many explanations unsatisfactory for why he chose not to pursue same-sex relationships in the U.S. as he alleged it was his intention to do so and he wanted to do so" - in effect, they thought he was merely acting a bit camp and he'd obviously just not found the right girl yet.

This has worrying implications - short of actually performing acts of man-love in front of the panel, how could he have proved that he was gay? The poor chap had been on the run since the age of twelve and hadn't had much time to form meaningful relationships - particularly as he had been hiding out in churches (who would have been less than indulgent had he tried to carry on same-sex relationships under their roofs).

I'm almost tempted to think that the Canadians didn't want to establish a precedent which may result in an awful lot of Nicaraguans suddenly dumping their girlfriends, taking crash courses in personal hygiene and ballet appreciation and moving to Canada claiming that their predilection for pipe was putting them under threat at home. However, it's arguable that as there is no reason for a gay person to live up to any stereotype (including the ones I've shamelessly used above), is there any way of objectively identifying gay people without requiring physical evidence of their activities? And is this requirement tantamount to forcing people into sexual relationships that they may not want or be ready for? Should Alvaro just jump into bed with the nearest man just so he can stay in Canada? Or would this only be evidence of his desperation to stay rather than his overall sexuality? I'd happily answer all of these awkward questions, but unfortunately I seem to have run out of space.


week of which he can best manipulate the contents to put a darkly humorous spin on the week's major political news.

They say a week is a long time in politics, and Brown's prodigious work rate certainly reflects the quick-fire nature of this tumultuous world. He produces no less than six images per week! Five black and white daily cartoons, and a full colour Rogues' Gallery image for every Saturday's edition. To showcase the range of his



INSTRUMENT

Located deep in the Luray Caverns in Virginia's Shenandoah Valley is the Great Stalacpipe Organ, the worlds largest musical instrument.

Stalactites covering 3 1/2 acres of the surrounding caverns produce tones of symphonic quality when electronically tapped by rubbertipped mallets.

This most unique, one-of-a-kind instrument was invented in 1954 by Mr. Leland W. Sprinkle of Springfield, Virginia, a mathematician and electronic scientist at the Pentagon.

However, Americans love their "dumb" comedy and without Wright this could quite easily become too dependant on pratfalls and slapstick to get cheap laughs. Without quality material Pegg's undoubted charm and humour can only carry the film so far and while Run Fatboy Run is sure to have some genuinely funny moments one can't help but sense an opportunity being missed.

Original ideas are scarce in Hollywood. Why struggle to think of a plot when someone else can do it for you seems to be the rationale, which brings us nicely to No Reservations a remake of the German romantic comedy, Mostly Martha.



Catherine Zeta-Iones plays Kate, a highly strung control freak who happens to be a head chef at a top Manhattan restaurant. She is beloved by the critics and her trendy clientele and rules the kitchen with an iron fist. Everything in Kate's life revolves around her work until her sister dies suddenly and she is left to look after her 10 year-old niece, Zoe(Abigail Breslin). As if a grieving child cluttering up her plush Manhattan apartment wasn't enough, Kate also has to contend with Nick(Aaron Eckhart) a new sous chef who inexplicably seems to be able to cook and enjoy life at the same time. Will these two exact opposites thrown together by fate get it together? That's a rhetorical question, of course they will.

There is nothing to suggest that this film will produce any sort of acting master class from any of the protagonists. Nor will it need to as this is sure to be a by-the-numbers affair. Zeta-Jones can do this sort of thing standing on her head and the big chinned Eckhart, capable of much more demanding roles, can turn on the charm when needed. However rom/com is a genre that strikes fear into the male of the species and there are enough sugary sweet moments in this one to induce a diabetic coma.

Released in 1998, Antz was somewhat overshadowed at the time by the more cutesy but inferior, A Bug's Life. Starring Woody Allen as Z, a neurotic self-obsessed worker ant, who yearns to possess more control over his life, Antz was loved by critics and audiences alike for its witty observations on the nature of society. Despite being an animated film it was never really intended for kids. Adult themes such as war, conformity and even genocide were way over the average ten year-old's head. Amusingly, Allen seems most at home acting like himself when voicing a computer generated ant and delivers his lines with exquisite timing. There's also strong support from Sly Stallone, appropriately cast as a lovable meathead and Gene Hackman as the chief villain of the piece. Advances in CGI technology may leave this one looking a little dated now but the strong cast and story more than compensate.

MMP: Time in hospital is usually overnight, and home the following day, although we perform an increasing number as comfortable daycase procedures. We would recommend two weeks off work if possible, and a month before sporting activity or a return to heavy tasks.

Well, thanks, is there any advice you would further give to women seeking breast enhancement?

MMP: I would say to do the research and go to a reputable surgeon. Choose a surgeon who is or has been an NHS consultant.



All you need to know in next month's issue

The Wine Regions of France - Burgundy (the whites)_ Eric Rombaut



There is an understandable fashionable response nowadays when offered a white wine and that is to say "ABC" (Anything But Chardonnay). The forced, mass-market over-oaked versions of Chardonnay grapes have flooded in from the New World and destroyed the reputation of this noble grape.

But be cautious because for hundreds of years before the New World $\,$ began its exploitation of Chardonnay, this delightful grape has given us what have been called the best white wines in the world as well as fabulous champagnes! To say "ABC" is to reject Chablis, Montrachet, Mersault, Pouilly Fuisse and even Corton!

White Burgundies, the royalty of the French (and arguably the world's) white wines are made almost exclusively from Chardonnay. There is a little bit of Aligote grape used in the smaller wines but all the best known and highly prized white burgundies are made from 100% Chardonnay. The Burgundy region begins about 70 miles south from Paris and reaches 225 miles down to Lyon. It is graced with various soils, divided into districts: Chablis, Côte d'Or (divided in Côte de Nuits and Côte de Beaune), Côte Chalonnaise, Mâconnais and Beaujolais.

The top wines will be designated Grand Cru (only 33 vineyards) or Premier Cru (just over 600 vineyards) and Grand Cru ones can be spotted as those which have just the name of the village (eg Corton Charlemagne) while Premiers Cru has the name of the village, followed by the name of the vineyard, in the same lettering.

Chablis

The northern location (48°N) means that Chablis wines have more acidity and less fruit flavours than other Chardonnays, but their pure, minerally style has great elegance. They often have a "flinty" note, sometimes described as "goût de pierre à fusil" (gunflint). Chablis should be a pale yellow in colour, sometimes with even a greenish tinge, but should never look too watery. The bouquet is decidedly flowery, but not heavy. Rather it should smell fresh and clean.

Corton-Charlemagne

These wines are often considered to be one of the finest examples of white Burgundy. They are rich and nutty, full-bodied, and extremely longlived – 10 years or more from the vintage date. A well-aged Corton-Charlemagne should have a rich greenish gold colour. The bouquet and palate of these wines is fruity, but with generous doses of almonds, cinnamon, honey, and oak.

Meursault

These are the typical white Burgundy wines. They are extraordinarily varied, but the good ones share a buttery, nutty, rich characteristic that is unmistakable. They should not be heavy-handed, however, and the finish should be dry and clean. As with Chablis, the Meursault Premier Cru wines are more reliably fine examples of the wine.

Montrachet

Montrachet is the pinnacle of white Burgundy. The soil (particularly high in limestone content) and climate conditions are unmatched and not replicated anywhere in the world. The bouquet is intensely floral. On the mouth it is rich and full of finesse, very fruity, and with honey and almond notes. Yet for all its richness, the finish is clean and dry. Montrachet typically needs about five years in the bottle to reach its best maturity.

Mâcon Blanc (or Pinot-Chardonnay-Mâcon) & Mâcon-Village

These wines are generally lighter, clean, fresh and fruity. Look for green apple and citrus notes with these wines. They should be drunk young, generally within two years of the vintage.

Pouilly-Fuissé


Pouilly-Fuissé is generally considered to be the best white wine from the Mâconnais area. They are extremely popular because of the balance between rich complexity and youthful green freshness.

To conclude, please do not let the 'ABC' prevent you from experiencing what French Chardonnays, as represented by the finest Burgundies, can do for your palate! You will definitely notice the difference in style and with the wide range of prices available, you should be able to find something that fits your budget.

A new wind is blowing through the wonderful world of fine dining with a serious new restaurant that is cooking up a storm.

Inside

The first floor Sirocco restaurant is a sweeping open space with dining for 90 and another 20 on the wide balcony looking out over the Weighbridge. The fabulous new hotel is shaming those buses away and demanding a prettier view. Rock on next year. Inside, the décor is a wealth of browns and heavy textures and the feeling is comfortable, if a touch safe.

Service

The floor is awash with so many staff that you wonder what they could all be doing. Mercifully, they are in no doubt. The service at Sirocco is seamless and unquestioningly professional. These people are the real deal, not just pretending to be so. Pierre Waton is the head sommelier (lightly poached from Bohemia) and he charmingly eased us into choosing from the enticing menu, explaining the details of each dish and recommending the wines. He is what excellent service should be - trusting someone else to remove such tortuous decisions.

Chef

At the far end of the restaurant is a finishing kitchen, presided over by Head Chef Fred Tobin. He has had a glamorous career to date, working as chef to John Major at Chequers and cooking for big cheeses such as George Bush Snr and Jacques Chirac. From there he was Executive Chef at Harrods, overseeing their 23 restaurants. Perhaps most importantly he was part of the key team of chefs that set up the Grove, a five-star country

house hotel with golf and spa on the outskirts of London. They grew to 90 chefs, a significant 15 of whom have joined Fred at the Royal Yacht - and it shows.

Food

I started with seared king scallops with cucumber jelly, pickled oyster, cucumber spaghetti and Sevruga caviar — a sea green circle of summery jelly topped with a lightly poached oyster with the merest hint of sharpness and a spoon of oily black pearls. Served with seared scallops, it was deliciously beautiful and ultimately summery. My guest opted for the richer foie gras brulée, terrine and seared tranche with foie gras biscuit. This was served with tender stalks of softened rhubarb — the acid sweetness of the fruit cutting through with richness of the foie gras - another heavenly combination.

For main course I chose confit of organic salmon with roasted lobster, creamed potatoes and crushed broad beans. The holy trinity: the palest tranche of delicate fish on top of a smooth mash (unrecognisable as any relation to the bright pink fatty farmed horror) with a caviar hollandaise; a perfectly steamed lobster tail with a slice of roasted fennel and a naked pinky claw set against the bright green of the broad beans. It was sublime and sensational.

The trio of local pork "bean crock" is Fred Tobin's masterly take on a local dish and his commitment to sourcing locally. Once again the divine three: belly, topped with a tiny globe of braised red cabbage; loin and trotter, wrapped around a truffle-scented mousse and served with haricot, flageolet and peeled broad beans and a concentrated jus. A delicious reincarnation

Desserts don't disappoint. Opt for the mini selection and you'll find rhubarb and crystallized ginger cheesecake, divine hot raspberry soufflée, fresh mint mousse, shiny like a sea anemone, poached peaches and raspberry sorbet all served on a wide glass slab.

Wine

Sirocco has an excellent wine list with old and new world well represented. The majority of bottles are around the $\pounds 20$ mark or below but there is also plenty for those wanting to push the boat out. Here we were in Pierre's capable hands and he recommended a glass with each of our courses: a fresh glass of Chablis and a Muscat to start and a spicy shiraz to go with the pork. A surprise was a richly sweet, Californian Black Muscat with clean acidity and full ripe fruit which was perfect with pudding. All around the $\pounds 6$ mark.

How fantastic to have another high altitude restaurant in Jersey. Sirocco is without doubt right up there with the growing number of Jersey's big boys. These are excellently conceived and masterly created dishes with a subtle combination of flavours and a balance of tastes and colour - creative genius that would go a long way with the décor. The careful pricing means good accessibility. The Royal Yacht is an enormous project and such a confident investment that is redefining the landscape. Whatever the teething troubles, they have got it spot on where it matters - with the food and the service in Sirocco.

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You've got to feel sorry for our poor restaurant owners. Not only do they have to cope with nightmares about listeria, lost bookings and food critics, there's also another worry stalking their sleepless nights. It's the ghost of restaurants past, the spectre of the old place, lurking over any new restaurant like a terrible curse. When a restaurant has been memorable for all the wrong reasons, the reputation seems to stick. Many years (and several name changes later) you can still hear people say, "didn't this used to be..." and "where have the pole-dancers gone?".

Something similar crossed my mind when I first heard I was going to Bentleys. Wasn't that the old Rudee's Thai Diner? I walked in half-expecting it to be still all Tarantino colours and plastic plants. What a surprise. It must have taken quite a few coats of paint, but the red and green walls have gone and in their place, restful minimalist colours with an oriental feel. Out with the lurid and in with the luxe, the new Bentleys is all chic and zen, with the evening light streaming in from the front picture window. The restaurant's only small - around 50 covers - but there's attention to detail at every turn from the smooth pebbles used as chopstick rests to the co-ordinating contemporary art on the walls.

The maître d' Stuart McMillam is friendly and welcoming, and ready to talk us through the menu. It's branded 'Pacific Rim' foodie shorthand for the sort of thing you'd eat on your dream gap year. Imagine street food in Bangkok, late-night noodle bars in Tokyo, and cardamom and coconut flavours drifting across a

perfect Indian beach. Of course Bentleys isn't alone in trying this sort of fusion stuff, but this is the first place in Jersey where I've seen Japanese food on the menu. The menu's balanced with a few more standard dishes - a great Aberdeen Angus and a tasty-sounding Dover sole, but you really owe it to the chef to try some of his Thai, Indian or Japanese cuisine. And perhaps, without realising it, you already have. Remember Bok Choi the quirky kiosk at First Tower where everyone queued around the corner for Pad Thai? That was Lee Davis, now Bentleys' head chef.

We started with the tom kah gai, the Thai chicken comfort soup, deliciously hot and sour with creamy coconut flavours and heaps of coriander scented jasmine rice. Piquant and spicy this is a soup with a real healing feel to it. Order this when you've got a cold or if you're just feeling down - I guarantee it'll make you feel better. Another must-try is the seafood chowder; this unctuous soup is filled with big pieces of locally caught fish and sprinkled with tangles of black Japanese seaweed. Creamy and delicious, full of warm soft spices, it comes with a perfectly done fruit de mer spring roll on the side.

I've got a thing about udon noodles so I just couldn't resist the Japanese casserole. A big bowl of steaming sake-infused broth with corn fed chicken thighs, shitake mushrooms, spinach, leeks, a poached egg and those udon noodles, it was very authentically Japanese, but slightly on the salty side. Be prepared to stir and slurp your way through this – if you need a break, the casserole comes with deliciously light tempura vegetables ready to dip into sweet chilli sauce.

Jasmine had gone for the belly of pork braised in soy with sautéed bok choi. Aromatic and melt-in-the-mouth, this is one of their most popular dishes, and in a clever fusion of Chinese and French cuisine, it comes with a perfectly sized portion of gratin dauphinois on the side. Deliciously decadent, this is pork at its sweetest with a superbly crisp crackle finish.

Don't miss out on dessert, our assiette of desserts included a cinnamon and vanilla rice pudding, a chocolate mousse spiked with chunks of chocolate honeycomb, and a homemade saffron kulfi with rose syrup. Jasmine had a Proustian moment when she took the first spoonful of her kulfi – apparently it tasted just like her Indian grandmother used to make. Deliciously dense frozen creamy milk, lightly perfumed with cardamom and saffron, kulfi has its own cult following - the homemade kind mind you, not the mass-produced 'straight from the freezer' stuff from your local Indian takeaway. I was only allowed one spoonful, and I thought Jasmine was going to have a panic attack when her



spoon didn't reach the last few drops at the bottom of the glass. Thankfully the vigilant Stuart rushed over with a tiny spoon they keep on hand for exactly these kinds of emergencies. Apparently Bentleys already has one regular customer who comes in just for the kulfi, I think Jasmine is going to be the second.

Bentleys is a real find, a chic little restaurant and an enthusiastic team serving delicious Asian dishes with flair, style and a genuine passion. And as soon as the buses disappear, there'll be a view to match. It looks as if Bentleys has managed to put the ghost of restaurants past firmly to bed.





Wander down any lane or along the coastal paths and you'll find thick

brambles full of purple berries. Like all worthwhile pursuits, picking blackberries is not without an element of danger squeezing among the brambles and reaching in between the thorns to pluck the ripe berries. Make sure you eat plenty as you go but take care to always pick above dog height.

Just as the blackberries are ripening, so are the first of the hundreds of varieties of apples that grow on the Island. Vergées everywhere are thick with windfalls and if you can't pick them off the grass or trees, local farm shops or roadside stalls have them in abundance. What's so great about cooking with, or eating this season's local apples, is that nothing's going to taste better. We're not talking identical mass-produced fruit shipped 12,000 miles from New Zealand, not the tasteless Granny Smith or the godawful Golden Delicious that taste inexplicably of meat balls. This is real, fresh-from-the-tree crispness. How can it not be better?







Blackberry & Apple Crumble

Crumble is that ultimately comforting British dish that soothes and delights everyone from tots to grannies. It's so rewarding to make, delicious to eat and joyfully received, making it right up there in the top puds and fail-safe choice for autumn dinners or Sunday lunches.

Any cook book worth it's shelf space will have a recipe for crumble but the lovely Nigella's always gives the most love back and gets the most groans from around the table (which, let's face it, is what you're after.) Serves 6-8

I 20g plain or self raising flour 90g butter, cold and diced 3 tbsps soft light brown sugar 3 tbsps white sugar pinch of salt

Put the flour in a bowl with a pinch of salt, add the cold butter and rub together between your fingertips and thumbs until you have a mixture that resembles rubbly porridge oats. (The butter absolutely must be cold-fromthe-fridge or you will end up with strange dough.) Stir in all the sugar.

Some recipes tell you to chuck in the raw fruit, top with crumble and get cooking. That's fine with soft fruit but precooking the apples gives softer, less crunchy fruit., leaving the baking really for browning your crumble.


Add a knob of butter to your peeled and cored apples and put them on a low heat with a couple of tablespoons of orange juice. Stir from time to time and allow to cook very gently for 10 mins or so. If you are using cooking apples you will need to add a few tablespoons of sugar, cook and taste.

Remove from the heat. Pick out leafs, stalks and real life from the blackberries and stir them into the cooked apples. Pour into a buttered dish. Don't add the crumble mixture until the last minute. (You can prepare the fruit and the crumble well ahead of time and keep in the fridge.)

The home: A converted farmer's barn

Three bedrooms, a bathroom, living room, kitchen, and around 16 vergees of land

cation: St Peter's Valley £120,000 (to build and makeover)

When Jane Liron moved in with husband-to-be Steve she took on a bachelor pad in need of a woman's touch. With a little of her vision, and Steve's handyman abilities, they've turned the place into a warm and welcoming family home.

Despite having some very small rooms to work with, Jane has created a feeling of space without sticking to bland neutral colours. It's certainly proved comfortable for her daughters Lucy, 14, and Abbie, 13, and a menagerie of pets they've added to the household, including two goats, two rabbits, five guinea pigs, three cats, a Shetland pony, a riding horse and two Falabellas (miniature horses).

Walnut Farm was owned by Steve's parents and still belongs to his mother. The main farmhouse is now rented out, while Steve, 48, a builder and carpenter, has converted the outbuildings into his own home - Le Grenier, and a second unit for his mum just around the corner. Jane, 37, a personal trainer, has always had an eye for decorating and often does up a room around a single piece. "A lot of people go for a minimalist look these days, but I think it makes a home feel really cold and it doesn't work in smaller rooms," she says.

Nor does it work when there's a busy family around. But she has avoided a cluttered atmosphere with clever storage solutions.

















In the kitchen, it was a metal sculpture purchased from Rooms, with copper and mahogany tones, which inspired the warm cottagey theme. Jane found some striking paintings from Beaumont Home Centre in equally earthy colours.

"The kitchen units were made from original oak which Steve got in France," explains lane. "I picked out colourful tiles from the Tile Barn, which were also used to make the worktops." Steve made the kitchen table from reclaimed timber. And a small breakfasting table was crafted from wood that didn't so much fall off the back of a lorry - but the back of a boat. The kitchen is the first of many spaces featuring Jane's favourite decorative touches - voile and fairy lights.

"People have told me I should only use the lights at Christmas. But I love them and I really think they add something to a room." Most of my décor is like my cooking. I just throw what I like together and nine out of ten times I'm pleasantly surprised. I spend more time at my own dinner parties working out the table décor than I do thinking out the menu. Presentation is the most important ingredient for me."

Jane and Steve worked with an average budget of £1,500 a room to transform the house. In the living room, they already had the advantage of exposed beams and a high ceiling. They selected clipboard flooring that looks surprisingly realistic. "We didn't want to have to worry about damaging real wood floors."

A large beige L-shaped sofa got its own makeover by accident. "We were having a party and didn't want it to get dirty,

so I got a selection of throws and just scattered them around. In the end, it seemed to work. So we kept the look."

The magnificent stone fireplace has become home to a rather unusual green crocodile which Jane brought from the garden of her previous home. She bought it on holiday in America. Surrounded by tea lights, candles and decorative spheres, it gives off a warm glow in the evenings. Fairy lights and ivy from St Peter's Garden Centre complete Jane's signature look. When it came to the bedrooms, Jane was lucky to know her daughters' tastes so well that they gave her carte blanche. Lucy's room was already a fetching shade of lilac, selected by one of Steve's former lodgers.

lane took a chance with some eggshell blue bedding that somehow matched up, and built the room around it. Sixties style paintings came from Seedee Jons, including a pop art image of Angelina Jolie above the bed and a camper van that fitted in with both girls' passion for surfing.

The silver furnishings came from Furniture World, and Jane used sparkly voile and mirrored drapes to hide a shoe rack and other bits of clutter in the corner. Next door Abbie's room is more pink and cute. Jane spent most of her budget on the pod-style chair, which came from Rooms at a cost of £500. A cabin bed from the same store makes the most of the limited space.

Steve incorporated disco lights into a purpose-built skirting board up against one wall for a little mood lighting. And lane used her own artistic talents

to paint an image of her daughter on the wall."I wanted to give this room the wow factor and really make the most of it, because Abbie's got the smallest area." In their own room, Jane and Steve went with the warm chocolate and beige that works so well in the living room.

Steve built a huge mirror to fill one wall and create the illusion that the room is twice its true size.

Two striking sculptures from St Peter's Garden Centre, luxury bedding from de Gruchys and – of course – a few well-placed fairy lights have made it into a sanctuary for the couple.

In the two and half years since she moved in, Jane has used her eye for detail to transform the house into a home that has a cosy feel – without appearing small or cluttered. Her secret? When she has a vision of how a room should look, nothing can make her deviate from it. "It might seem harsh, but when you have a theme or design, it's important not to feel obliged to put out gifts from family or friends that aren't to your taste. Honesty - and asking if they kept the receipt - is the quickest way to face the music."






The Great and the Small

The Anglepoise lamp is all about function. It is task lighting in its purest form – a supreme piece of British rational design that, unusually, is still manufactured by the same British company since its creation in, guess when? The Sixties? No, 1927. The beauty of its long, angular body and sweet bonnet shade give it a stooping maternal posture that those clever bods at Pixar were quick to exploit. George Carwardine wanted to develop a frictionless mechanism that could balance and direct light to any position. He created a lamp as versatile as the human arm and based on the tension principles of muscles in limbs. He did this by using springs to keep the arm in position, which, like all perfect design, is so much more complex than it looks. Eighty years on and there has been nothing to improve on it. It has the shiny industrial aesthetic of the 1930's machine age but is also bang up to date. You may have one on your desk but probably not its bigger brother. Providing luxury in tiny spaces, Yotel plan to open in Heathrow at the end of the year and then go global, setting their sites on key international cities.

Japanese pod hotels were invented to stack up over-refreshed commuters for the night before spitting them back out to work, but Yotel is more first class cabin than claustrophobic shelf. Woodroffe used the same designers as BA First Class cabins and the interior is smart and contemporary with stylish Stark-esque showers and oak veneer surround to the flat screen TV.

There are two kinds of cabin. The standard cabin has a single bed with crisp cotton sheets, shower, revitalising all in one body wash, hairdryer, heated mirror and soft towels. The Premium Cabin has a double bed that can flip to a couch at the push of a button, compact desk, clever storage and a rain shower. Yotel have got the formula right when it comes to gadgets: touch screen check in, free WiFi (supplied by Jersey-based Broadscape), good lighting, 23" flat screen with a huge choice of films, TV, radio, internet and an input for your own music and iPod. The great thing is that you can take a 4-hour slot and chill, away from the madness.

At last check, hotels inside the terminal were £255 for a standard bland and meaningless double room. And so many of those airport hotels mean queuing for the shuttle bus to arrive in grim chintzville for a less than pleasant few hours. You just want to get your head down till you can leave and who wants to pay over the odds for that?

Since Airport Director Julian Green was appointed last year, various plans both in the short and long term have been set in motion. I heard on the Jersey grapevine Starbucks is going to be up there soon, so in a midst of excitement I headed up there to see for myself what the fuss is all about.

New security measures have been in place since lune, encompassing most departure facilities after the security gates. In a bid to try and improve the flow through security, travellers now have the option to stay on the landside of the airport or go straight through security after check-in and spend more time in

the cafes, and shops including the recently relocated Duty free shop. The changes so far have been received with controversy, although much of the feedback that has been received has been that it is a vast improvement. Mr Green commented, 'I don't pretend for a minute we are perfect but the main thing is that we are now more operationally efficient than before. There has been local criticism to the landside facilities being somewhat rudimentary, and I'd agree'. At present the landside area of the departure hall only has a small temporary café in terms of facilities. This will however be replaced in

October/ November this year by a Starbucks café (hurrah, it was true!). which is already a popular brand across the globe and the first on our island. Since this will be available on the landside of the departures hall, it is something that anyone at the airport or people passing by can benefit from.

Even more recently Jersey Post have started operating from the Information desk at the airport – and after 4 days of opening, trade has been good. Mr Green felt that a foreign exchange and postal service is something every airport should have. | Post is open 7 days a week from 6am to 8pm, offering the basic Jersey postal services plus travel insurance, foreign exchange and philatelic products, with an intention to expand to other services such as MoneyGrams at some point in the near future. The foreign exchange service offers commission free exchange on 14 currencies including Euros, US, Australian and Canadian Dollars, Thai Baht, Swiss Francs and South African rand. Greg Winch from Jersey Post commented that 'the airport

and lersey Post had the same aspirations, wanting to provide a well operated service for not just travellers but for the local community including staff. We wanted to demonstrate we could do something different, and offer that little bit more, the service is tailored to where it is and in PO terms it has been quite a radical step.'

Improvements of airline routes across the UK and continental Europe, including the re-instated Heathrow link, are high on Julian Green's priority list. There are currently active discussions regarding the Jersey Dublin link, taking place, which is looking towards being one of Julian Green's earliest achievements here in Jersey.

With £58 million worth of changes to come over the next 3 years, and huge potential, there can only be good things to come at Jersey Airport.

You could say that the Seventies were the American car's hey day, but a significant thread of motoring history began long before that, when the original Chrysler C-300 debuted in 1955. The "C" referred to Coupe and 300 to 300BHP. The Chryslers set a new trend for powerful road cars, and were possibly the first "Muscle" Cars. They were powered by what any American muscle car enthusiasts will now immediately recognise; the legendary "Hemi" engines, which were named after their hemispherical combustion chambers which burnt fuel better, thus producing more power.

Thanks to this the 300s were soon winning races in world famous arenas; Nascar, Daytona Beach, and in 1957 the 300 became the fastest American car for the third straight year. This all sounds a bit techy but even now if you watch Boyd Coddington's American Hotrod (which is excellent) or other similar TV Hotrod shows it won't be long before a "Hemi" turns up, brand new, in a crate to go into some, soon to be, awesomely over-powered monster car. I mention them only because (a) until now I didn't know what "Hemi" meant, and (b) they are a big part of the 300C's heritage, and (c) the Chrysler 300C can have one.

It was around the late Seventies and early Eighties that American car design went a bit wrong. The classic and often wonderful massive heavy gas guzzling models were left behind and new modern ideas started to appear. They were no longer all twenty feet long and they now sometimes achieved more than 8 mpg. It was the beginning of at least two decades of mediocre, adventureless car design. Think about it – what is the last American car you can think of which was a star, or even a well known personality in its own right? Mustang? Thunderbird? Corvette? They were all famous in the Seventies.

So now we have a new 300C and Yes! It is available, if you are nuts enough, with a 6.0 litre 425bhp HEMI engine capable of powering the 300C to 168 mph and 0 to 60 in 5 seconds. Two tons of fun, as they say. Thankfully there are also sensible engines in the range including a very very sensible 3.0 litre diesel, which we tested, because we are of course, sensible.



It has often been the view that American cars don't match the build quality of certain European competitors, but the ethos was always cheap and practical. Cheap plastic worked as well as expensive plastic. Times have changed though and now quality and finish is greatly improved. There may be the odd detail to remind you, but it is now more a reminder than something falling off.

And so it is with this 300. Generally, the finish and trim is very good. Lots of leather, nice materials and a nice dash with my favourite, a digital compass (ideal for a country where the common answer to "Where you heading?" is North, South, East or West) plus all the usual electrical appliances. Probably the best bit though, especially if you have children, is the DVD player in the back. With headphones. And a remote control. Bliss.

Driving the 300C is calm and stately, which is just as well with a car over 6 feet wide. The regal driving position does certainly help, and the 3.0 litre diesel is efficient and can be very quick, (top speed 143mph!) but as with most large comfortable cars the true pleasure seems more in the effortless cruising comfort rather than in throwing it into corners, unless you live somewhere with big roads – like Texas.

On the outside the impression this car gives is something quite different though. Like the best cars of old it is instantly recognisable, interesting and exciting to look at, which could probably be why it has starred in numerous movies already. It has a huge front end with a gorgeous grill and the car's size radiates a sense of power as well as adding a slight thrill of menace to its simple and elegant lines.

Whilst I have driven all sorts of cars, all with their own characteristics, it is still often American cars that stand out as being the ones having the personality. They aren't always subtle, and they aren't always perfect, but you don't have to wonder which your car is in the car park. And they're like America itself; Big.

The 300C is available as a saloon or estate and comes with three engine options: 3.0 litre diesel, 3.5 litre petrol, and the aforementioned 6.0 litre HEMI V8 lump.

UK prices start at around £27,000 for the 3.0 litre diesel, and around £40,000 for the 168mph 6.0 litre SRT-8.

Aston Martin unveiled the new DBS at the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance on August 16th. The Type C is now available in the UK for an 'on-the-road' price of £6,800, or to put this in perspective for its target drivers, the equivalent of around 1,360 weeks or 26 years-worth of pocket money at the going rate. The must-have

accessory for the younger Audi aficionado is a half-size replica of the highly successful 520-horsepower, I 6-cylinder mid-engined racer developed by Auto Union, one of the four brands that joined forces to form Audi as we know it today, and winner of a total of 10 Grand Prix victories. Just 999 examples will be produced by Audi high performance engineering subsidiary quattro GmbH, using over 900 individual parts and staying true to the lightweight aluminium construction principles that characterise Audi to this day. From the shade of its silky smooth Avus silver paint, right down to its last painstakingly punched rivet, the Type C will be as faithful as Seat Altea Freetrack 4

Happy 50th Birthday To A Spanish Legend – The Seat 600

SEAT is popping open the cava for the 50th birthday of a car that almost single-handedly put Spain on wheels: the legendary SEAT 600. To Spain, the SEAT 600 is a car of enormous social and cultural importance. Selling almost 800,000 units over the course of its 16-year lifetime, the 600 and its various derivatives became very much part of the Spanish landscape. The car came into life through SEAT's negotiations with Fiat, which were initiated in order to produce a second car in Barcelona to join the 1400 saloon. The original model, designed by engineer Dante Giacosa, used a water-cooled four cylinder in-line engine, installed lengthways behind the rear axle and connected to a four-speed gearbox. With an initial cylinder capacity of 633 cc, the SEAT 600 had a power output of 21.5 hp - not much by the brand's 'Auto Emoción' standards of today, but more than adequate at the time.

10 things you didn't know about the SEAT 600...

- One in every four cars on Spanish roads in 1971 was a SEAT 600
- Thanks to the song Mi seiscientos (My 600) with lyrics by Juan Aguirre and music by Chano Montes, this small car came to form part of Spanish folk tradition
- A 600 was the star of the film entitled Ya tenemos coche (We've got a car) directed by Julio Salvador in 1958; the car also played a major role in the Spanish television (TVE) series Plinio
- Caba, Gàbor, Ínauto, Milton, Nardo, Serra and Siata were just some of the coachbuilders who converted a standard 600 into a coupé or convertible during the 1960s.
- The 'House of the 600' in Barcelona's Rosselló Street was the city's most popular used-car salesroom. Its proprietor once remarked that one particular 600 changed hands there more than 15 times
- José Lacambra, a farmer from Huesca, converted his 600 into a tractor after running it for 100,000 kilometres. Another farmer did things the other way round, using half of a 600's bodywork to make a cabin for his tractor
- In addition to nicknames like Seilla y Pelotilla, the 600 was also popularly known as the Ombligo (Bellybutton), the simple joke being that 'everyone had one'
- In 1970 the Catalan artist Joan Vila Casas converted his 600 into a work of art on wheels which he called Autometria 600 – and continued to drive it for many years
- In 1972 six students from Madrid crossed Africa from north to south in three 600s. With hardly any changes or major modifications to their cars, they took four months to drive 30,000 kilometres through deserts, jungle and mudflats
- SEAT exported about 80,000 units of the 600, almost 10% of total production. Cars destined for export markets with the Fiat badge also bore the legend construzione SEAT
