

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

Four legs good, two legs bad, three legs just didn't work.

Having just gone through the annual routine of Valentine's Day - which, in my case, consists of i) contributing a frankly impossible amount to Mark Howe's pension fund and ii) joining a long queue of men at Hallmark trying to find a card that doesn't involve fluffy bears, fluffy monkeys, fluffy dogs or any other nauseating animals which look as if they've never had a carnivorous or rapacious thought in their pointless, aseptic lives - my attention has been drawn to the well-publicised court proceedings involving 'national treasure' Sir Paul McCartney and his 'monopod psycho' soon-to-be ex-wife Heather.

Normally my sympathy would be, to say the least, limited when considering a payout of £80-odd million from someone who has, by all accounts, over £800m in the bank (and I'm not even going to factor in any surcharge which any right-thinking judge would impose for inflicting the Frog Chorus and Mull of Kintyre on the populace) but the idea of Heather walking away with a sum that could equate to over fifty thousand pounds for each day of their marriage fundamentally offends my sense of justice.

I should declare at this point that being male and in a profession which, for better or worse, has a reputation for being both demanding and well-remunerated does mean that my view of the courts' approach to divorce is going to be jaundiced. I'd also point out that in an increasing number of cases where there are significant assets at stake, it is the wife who has accumulated those assets, and the number of cases which the following rant applies to is only a tiny fraction of the total - in most instances, divorce will lead to penury for both sides. Notwithstanding this, I'm going to spend the next six hundred words trying to persuade you that the fundamental principle which has been adopted by the English courts where a non-working spouse deserves a significant proportion of the assets acquired during a marriage (where the assets are in excess of the reasonable needs of the couple) is just plain wrong. Wrong wrong wrong. Wronger than a very wrong thing wearing a t-shirt saying "I'm Wrong".

No-one is saying that spouses who have provided a loving and stable environment

over many years do not deserve some sort of financial recognition on a split, but can anyone really say that both i) a spouse who has enjoyed an enviable lifestyle over many years supported by cleaners, nannies and any number of beauticians/golf coaches and ii) a spouse who has, by dint of large amounts of hard work and a portion of luck, earned the money which made that lifestyle possible, deserve an equal amount?

The courts should treat both parties as adults who are, regardless of inclination, fundamentally capable of providing for themselves and living their own lives. If it's a bit of a shock for an ex-wife or husband to have to go out and find a job after years of not working, it may be fair to include some sort of 'parachute payment' in the settlement, but the fact that you're not used to working or not particularly qualified to do anything shouldn't mean that, like the Queen, you are magically relieved from any requirement to earn a living. Unless you actually are the Queen, in which case i) thanks for reading this humble column, ma'am and ii) anytime you need an offshore lawyer - you know, to legitimately circumvent those pesky taxes which those horrible Labour oiks keep foisting on you - just let me know. I'm very discreet.

Anyway, an obvious difficulty when considering divorce is that no two cases are exactly the same and there will always be mitigating circumstances one way or the other (for instance in relation to the behaviour of a cheating wife or husband), but to me the key principle should always be that once the reasonable needs of both spouses are covered, the party that earned the money should keep it - a sort of modified 'Finders Keepers' approach.


Even scarier, the courts have been known to

accept the argument that by getting married to a wealthy person, a spouse can get a 'legitimate expectation of a higher standard of living' – ie that because you've married someone rich, you deserve to be rich for ever. That's like saying that just because I had a 'legitimate expectation' that as a result of getting married I would get regular sex for the rest of my life, Lady X should continue to ensure that I get laid on a weekly basis even if we divorce. Which is just nuts. Potentially very entertaining, but nuts.

Finally, I'd like to draw your attention (and scorn) to someone who is frankly even more nuts - Jean North, who, having separated from her husband in 1978 - yes, that's right – thirty years ago – went back to the courts a couple of years ago for another cash sum having managed to spend all of the cash her husband had given her in their original settlements. 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





However, the Publisher (showing remarkably good grace in the face of my posturing) allayed my fears by taking out his own bank card, picking up the phone and making the booking himself. £249 of his hard-earned was thus spent in obtaining a Gold room, champagne, chocolate and strawberries, dinner for two at the Sirocco restaurant, and full use of the Royal Yacht's spa and pool facilities. The booking was made for mid-week so as to emphasise the escapism aspect of the deal — hopefully Lady X would appreciate the difference between i) an average Wednesday lounging in front of the TV with a Marks & Sparks ready meal and ii) a leisurely spa, a non-microwaved dinner and a bed with no neighbours in earshot. In fact, I was so taken with the idea that I dug into my own, thrifty-to-the-point-of-waterproof pockets and upgraded us to a Platinum room for another £40.

The day arrived and we checked in straight after work. Our room had views across the Weighbridge to the harbour, a king-size double bed and a decent-sized balcony with table and bench — if the weather had been more generous it would have been an

ideal spot to watch the sun go down with a glass of champagne. I was particularly pleased that the bottle of champagne which was provided as part of the package was i) nicely chilled and ii) a recognizable, decent quality brand — although I'm sure that there are plenty of champagne producers I've never heard of who produce excellent stuff, I can't help but feel that in some hotels they just find the cheapest stuff with the word 'champagne' on it when providing bottles as part of packages.

There were also bowls of strawberries and liqueur chocolates which went down a treat — although as Lady X had given up chocolate for Lent, she was forced to watch me work my way through the latter bowl, thus giving our evening that extra spark of tension at an early stage. We then decided to explore the Royal Yacht's facilities, and as a result I can give you the following Top Tip — if you decide (like us) to get changed in your room before descending to the spa, make sure that you get in the left-hand lift — the one on the right doesn't go to the basement, and will require you to hop between lifts in the main lobby dressed only in your bathrobe and fluffy slippers, to the barely-concealed surprise of any Japanese tourists who may have just arrived.

The spa itself is very nicely put together — there are steam rooms, a sauna, an evil-looking ice bucket thing, footspas, a clever 'rain/ drizzle' shower and a relaxation room arranged around a central pool and Jacuzzi. There was also a surprisingly well-equipped gym which was busy with people having a post-work-work-out (we decided to leave them to it — no point spoiling a pleasant evening with unnecessary exercise). There are also tables and chairs dotted around the pool area with magazines and jugs of iced water to help you relax when you're not otherwise relaxing.

After experimenting with the various treats on offer (and deciding that even though we were on the Hanky Panky package, we were in danger of being thrown out of the steam room), we headed back to the room to get ready for dinner. While Lady X retired to the bathroom (with an exclamation of 'Oooh! Heated floor!'), I turned on the flat-screen TV and settled down with another glass of champagne in front of the football. Having recently been stuck in a hotel in London for a week which had a tiny TV with only five channels, I cannot stress how important it is to have a TV which i) actually lets you watch TV without having to go through five pages of menus each featuring ads for pay-per-view p*rn and ii) has a decent range of channels including premium sports packages, particularly when the Champions League is on.

Once we were both ready, we descended on Sirocco, which is the poshest of the numerous restaurants sprinkled around the hotel. Dinner went very smoothly, with the staff whirling a series of dishes to and from the table in a well co-ordinated manner, and the wine waiters refraining from lurking around the table in order to top up our glasses every five minutes - some places seem to confuse this with good service, and it was nice to be in a restaurant that recognizes that sometimes too much attention is worse than too little. The wine list was of a good length and through a healthy mixture of luck and judgement we ended up with a very nice Portuguese red. Although the table d'hôte menu is included in the package price, we both went off-piste as we were tempted by the delights of the sea bass and the duck, both of which were cooked perfectly, and the assiette of desserts, which left us positively stuffed.

When we returned to the room, some attentive soul had sprinkled golden petals all over the bed, which was a nice touch. As this is a family magazine, I will leave what happened next to your imagination (and as this is my wife you're imagining, you had better be thinking that we immediately put our pyjamas on and went straight to sleep).

Dinner went very smoothly, with the staff whirling a series of dishes to and from the table in a well coordinated manner, and the wine waiters refraining from lurking around the table in order to top up our glasses every five minutes – some places seem to confuse this with good service, and it was nice to be in a restaurant that recognizes that sometimes too much attention is worse than too little.

The next morning, we were brought breakfast in bed and somehow forced ourselves to get up and go to work. The only wrinkle of the whole experience occurred during check-out where I was presented with a bill which involved more food than we could possibly have eaten and a receptionist who insisted that the figure was correct fortunately, I was able to convey in fairly direct terms my views on the matter (which may or may not have included the phrase, 'That's enough food to choke a hippopotamus. Are you accusing my lovely wife of being a hippo?'). A lady was summoned from the restaurant who fixed things in short order - although in the process she announced to the world at large that, 'They are Hanky Panky - that is why this rate applies'. Thanks for that!

Overall, I can honestly say (without having sold my soul) that I would recommend the Hanky Panky package to people who want to feel like they've had a romantic break without leaving St Helier. We enjoyed the experience enough that we intend to repeat it later in the year using our own money. And that's really saying something.

The old abattoir site. The dilapidated building opposite the some point during our time in Jersey. With the opening of the new bus station and tourism office, and completion of the new development project on the horizon, we thought it was quite fitting to have a look back at the old.

During Architecture Week 2004, Janet Meise, a 4-year part time degree student in Art and Design at Highlands College had the opportunity to go on a guided tour of the old abattoir prior to the current building work. With an interest in both old and new architecture, deserted and derelict buildings fascinate Janet the most. This has been

Most of the buildings, which survive today, were built in 1887 following a new law, which meant all slaughtering of cattle needed to be done in a public slaughterhouse. The larger slaughterhouse and adjacent buildings were complete by 1907, which is what we see today. Plans for development on this site had been flying for over 10 years and more recently, with plans for re-development in the pipeline Janet felt it was important to find out more about the construction of the abattoir including its history.

For 23 years the building had been more or less empty and in a very sorry state of disrepair. Much of the roofing had

collapsed leaving the interior at the mercy of nature. With the help of Constable Simon Crowcroft, Janet was given permission to visit the site on several occasions, where she made sketches and took a large number of photographs.

In regards to whether the original use of the slaughterhouse affected Janet, she was "concerned only with its structure and disintegrations. The abattoir building as I knew it was a silent, neglected and decaying place which in some strange way gave it its own form of beauty besides which there also remained a number of very

a number of abstract paintings combining some of as representational paintings of certain areas. Most of her work is black and white because for Janet this best expresses the silence and desolation of the site. Janet, who is sponsored by the Jersey Arts Trust, will be exhibiting her work for the first time as a solo artist on this scale from the triptych piece, it will be hard to miss!





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

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Skatepark rolling in right direction

In light of the recent news that Jersey is to recieve a brand-spanking new skatepark, we caught up with The Channel Island Skateboarding Association (C.I.S.A) to find out a little more about what's going on...

SO CAN YOU TELL US A LITTLE MORE ABOUT WHAT THE C.I.S.A IS ABOUT?

In 2002, the Channel Island Skateboarding Association was formed by a few of the more experienced participants and also includes BMX riders and Inline Skaters, with the aim of having a permanent skatepark built on the island. The association quickly gained support from the general public, and has received a lot of praise for their ideas and proactive approach. When the C.I.S.A presented plans for a skatepark at St Helier Parish Hall, parishioners voted almost unanimously (52:1) in favour of giving the park the go ahead. Various factors have now led to Jersey's young people being offered a permanent facility on the New North Quay.

GIVE US A BRIEF RUN DOWN OF THE HISTORY OF EXTREME SPORTS FACILITIES ON THE ISLAND...

Skateboarding has been alive in Jersey since before the very first skatepark was built in the 1970s at Belle Vue. Since then, we have seen four other skateparks rise and fall. In the 1980s Skate West was built at Les Quennevais. The 1990s saw two facilities both at Fort Regent and most recently the Rendez Vous skatepark which was a temporary facility built on the Waterfront in early 2000.

There have been some smaller amenities at various youth clubs. The half pipe ramp at St Ouen recently underwent a major overhaul, a project managed and partially funded by the C.I.S.A. This is now the only permanent and legal facility for extreme sports enthusiasts.

A NEW SKATEPARK, FANTASTIC! HOW DID IT COME ABOUT? The campaign for a permanent skatepark, which has been ongoing for the last 6 years was a process which required several Parish Hall assembly meetings and negotiations with various States and Parish departments. Off the back of the C.I.S.A campaign, our politicians sat up and listened. Ben Fox put forward Proposition 8 in January this year, to provide the island with a skatepark (an all encompassing name for a facility that caters for many of the closely related disciplines that use them, such as rollerblading, skateboarding and BMXing). W.E.B. took on the project, and coupled with their target of opening by the end of this year, you can see that they really mean it!

The good news is, however, that they are approaching things from the best possible angle, and involving the people who know what they are talking about when it comes to facilities like this: the riders themselves. W.E.B have succeeded so far where previous projects have failed by working in conjunction with the C.I.S.A as end-user consultants. With W.E.B.'s international contacts and established management team showing the responsibility and commitment to involve the C.I.S.A, the project is off to a flying start.

Young people in Jersey have been crying out for more to do. Side effects of the boredom they develop are not only the drugs, alcohol and other anti-social behaviour we read so much about (it was the number one complaint to the police in 2007), but other modern issues like obesity (BUPA reports that 25% of 11-15 year olds are classified as obese). You don't even need to read one of the thousands of reports documenting the link between a lack of amenities and high crime rate; by merely glancing over to less fortunate and affluent communities on the mainland, it is clear. Kids simply need to be given something to do.

WEB HAVE ALREADY PUT IN £100K, THAT IS A HECK OF A LOT OF MONEY ISN'T IT?

The £100K they have put into the budget so far is a very useful and generous donation. However, although £100K sounds like a great deal of money, a large amount will be eaten up in preparation of the site; this includes meeting health and safety guidelines, securing the site, providing drainage etc...In short, to provide the best chance of a successful and permanent concrete installation, another chunk of at least £100K must be added - and soon. If the money cannot be raised in time, the skatepark will most likely be built from pre-fabricated steel ramps. This may sound good enough, but it will doom the skatepark to failure. Composite solutions are out dated, will not make the best use of the allocated area and are prone to running up huge maintenance costs when rivets pop and the units come out of alignment or the surfaces need treating with anti-weather agents. A concrete facility would not suffer from any of these problems and once in place is guaranteed

Once plans are finalised (the project is currently out to tender and quotes are being assembled by several concrete park manufacturers), private sector sponsorship will be sought to top up the balance to make this great plan become a fantastic reality. Ideally, this would include a sum of money to set aside for the long term protection of the arena.

WHAT'S IT GOING TO BE LIKE?

The facility will accommodate for all levels and abilities from beginner to advanced, and will also provide spectators with viewing areas. We are asking for input from riders as to what they would like to see to ensure that everyone has a chance to contribute towards the facility, so get in touch with C.I.S.A and involve yourself if you want. Anyone who has ridden a concrete park knows that the possibilities are endless due to its versatility.

ALL RIGHT, BUT CAN'T KIDS SKATE ANYWHERE THOUGH?

To a point, yes, but to avoid the problems of road safety issues, noise complaints and accidental damage to property, we need to provide the kind of safe, controlled environment which Proposition 8 refers

WHEN'S IT HAPPENING!?

Now! It's all systems go with the plans at the moment, and in order to open by the end of the year, we really need to get our skates on

HOW CAN THE PUBLIC HELP?

a feast of local music **Banquet**

We ran into these guys on a snowboard trip recently and found them all to be jolly nice fellows. They told us all about their Jersey band so we thought we'd tell you!

What's the story behind your band name?

The name of the band was a very hard choice for us, with so many groups jumping on the 'the' bandwagon we were really keen to stay away from being 'the' anything.. After much head scratching we came up with Banquet. There's two obvious references there, but it's more than that - we thought it matched our genre - a feast of different styles. We're not fast food.

What are your songs about?

We tend to write about experiences we have either had or been able to empathize with... Demons, one of the two track we recorded in a few hours in a rented room at La Motte St. Youth Centre, is about not being yourself in presssurised situations, taking an argument too far for example and not staying true to yourself throughout. Ice Age is about making something happen as opposed to waiting for something good to jump into your lap...

I think the songs mean something slightly different to all of us, for Brett who sets the scene for the majority of the the lyrics, it can mean something very specific. We try to write music that is true to ourselves and at the same time our hope is that other people will take to what we have done with our sounds and ideas and relate to them in their own way. We're not in it to take the newest indy fad and create something that everyone likes, it would be boring and predictable, there's no "mystery box" effect. For all we know we could be booed off the stage because of a particular direction we take with a new song whereas an acceptable Arctic Monkeys recital will normally always receive a polite response.

How did the band start?

Chris and Brett were in Coloured Room for a long time together doing covers and playing regularly at places like Chambers, both deciding to leave the covers behind and push on with original material for a fresh break. Paul played in Wilmor for 6 years playing Jersey Live twice and a good few other places over the years until it came to its natural end in '04. We started out as an idea in a bar late 2005.

We were wanting to do something different, something we believed in. We wanted to try and be our own favourite band. They were good times and after Aaron Brown joining up on bass for a while and creating an MDF palace in the world's smallest bandroom we moved on to a farm in St. Lawrence where we found the NEW world's smallest bandroom. It was then we met Tim "Howard Moon" Horsefall, it was cool and brought us closer together as a band... Steve and Sue are legendary for putting up with what they did, nice one guys! Tim really gave us the boost we needed and with such an expansive musical knowledge to hand had a great effect on the band. Getting that bottom end back in place again put the last piece in the puzzle and we felt like we were once again ready to get it together for a stage.

What's your coolest band story?

The one with the Banquet umbrella wire breakin scandal... (hmm... says Gallery)

If you had the chance to interview your fans, what would be the first question you ask

Did you experience any "Brown Noise" during the performance?

If you had a space in your band and the whole world wanted to join, who would you accept and why?

It would be difficult to pick and choose between all of our various heros and mentors of music but i think Thom Yorke would be pretty high up on all of our lists. How about spending one day with every one of the people we admire and draw inspiration from?

You've made it Rolling Stones big and you come back to play a homecoming outdoor concert in Jersey, where would you play?

Who are the Rolling Stones...? - That was a joke for all of the people that might hate us before they hear us! The Airport runway would be cool but any massive expanse of land would do, pick somewhere big, pay all the land owners and have our own Glastonbury weekend with all our favourite bands! Wait... what about the police costs? We could do it in Guernsey!?

What's the plan for 2008?

Top of our list is always to find somewhere more permanent to rehearse where we can leave all of our toys and recording gear set up and ready to go. Currently about 50% of our time together goes into setting our gear up and taking it down again, that's no joke and it can be quite frustrating sometimes! Our big goal is to get a good 12 songs complete and record our progress. We have been playing around with the recording process for a while, recording our demo for the Jersey Live playoffs and experimenting with our sound and what suits us. Keep and ear out for us in '08 we'll be out there soon we promise! Hopefully at Jersey

Banquet would like to thank a few people while we have the chance. Firstly Ivor and the crew at La Motte St. Youth Centre for doing such a fantastic job with the place, it really did bring hope and a smile to our faces when we laid eyes on it. 

Planning a wedding can be one of the most exciting times of your life, but for most it can be incredibly stressful too. We found Sonja, a 24-year-old who has been engaged for 9 months. So far she has booked St Brelade's Church for her July ceremony and Les Ormes for their wedding reception. She has 4 bridesmaids who she wants to be wearing turquoise but that's as far as planning goes. With only four months to go, here at Gallery, we thought we'd give her a helping hand.

he Dress Ellis Bridal Tel: 732465

Undeniably one of the most important elements of the bride's big day. It's a focal point and with all eyes on you, it should be something spectactular but at the same time, it needs to be something practical. You are going to need to walk down the aisle, dance your first dance and move around greeting all your guests in the dress. It may also be the basis for the rest of your wedding colour scheme and style, so it's usually one of the first elements to be chosen.

Sonja was looking for something extravagant, a dress with that 'wow' factor.. After trying on a selection of different styles and colours of

dresses, we found one that Sonja fell in love with straight away. It turned her from girlnext-door into a princess and we knew this was the one.

Handcrafted in Israel, the My Lady dress we chose was made of Italian laces and silks with a moulded bodice encrusted with swarovski crystals. Prices of dresses in Ellis can range from between £200 to around £3,500. It can take anything from 3 months to arrive after ordering and so it is best to choose one well in advance and get any adjustments made nearer the time.

With such a detailed and indulgent dress, we were looking for jewellery that was more subtle and less overpowering. Simple pearl and diamond pieces would be an ideal choice. The dress we chose was cut across the chest and so we had Sonja's beautiful d**écolleté** on show to decorate.

For the shoot we decided upon a vintage style necklace by Hedva Elany with blue cubic zirconia, real pearls and 9ct silver for £224. For earrings we chose some simple 14ct drop pearls, and also a pearl and 9ct diamond bracelet for £472.





The bouquet Mark Howe Tel: 618920

The bouquet is another important element of the bride's ensemble. We went to see Mark Howe who gave us some of his expert advice.

He told us that a good place to start is with the fabrics and colours of the bridesmaids' dresses, creating a theme to be carried all the way through to table decorations.

Because the dress was so ornate and decorative, we didn't want something that would interfere with this, so we decided upon a more rounded bouquet rather than a spiky one which was in keeping with the vintage feel. We also wanted something bright which reflected Sonia's personality, and would pop out in a photo against the colour of the dress.

Mark created the bouquet using a mix of amarylis, cherry brandy roses and protea. Prices range from around £65.

Following a free consultation, Sonja decided to have a real hair piece clipped in for the day, to add length and volume to her hair. It also means there is more hair to play around with. Prices start at £160 for a 24 inch length piece.

Sonja had a full head of foils using Aveda colouring products of 3 different tones, which were colour balanced into her hair to even the blonde out. By using a see through only colour deposit, this seals, protects and gives immense shine to the hair.

After the hair piece was clipped in, the hair was then put up. Finally, two crystal encrusted orchid hairclasps were placed within the hair to finish off the overall bridal hair.

Because the dress is so elaborate, and the flowers were bright, we decided on neutral tones for the make-up including silvers which matched the jewels on her bodice. Her lips have a lovely natural colour, but were dry and so a renewing lip treatment (£9) was used to moisturise and add shine with a swipe of lip pigment in the shade Orellana (£9.45) to

Aveda Inner Light Shimmer Accent Moonstone Cream (£16.20) was rubbed accross her d**écolleté** to create a shimmer in certain lights. This can also be used on eyes, face, lips and cheeks as well.

Whilst trying to remember everything else don't ignore your nails. Your toenails will also be seen in those strappy shoes. Elmina offer a relaxing Island Retreat pedicure and manicure from £40 each. A simple French polish will make your hands look elegant for all those

oh la la restaurant review

A Swiss chef, brasserie-style food and right in the heart of St Helier - Zara thinks we should all be storming La Bastille.

Do you know how much effort goes into organising a wedding? Well I do... thanks to my 'teetering-on-the-edgeof-Bridezilla' friend Jemima. With her wedding only six weeks away, we'd spent the morning sorting out flowers, organising the wedding favours and we were just dithering over confetti colours (rose pink or dusky blush?) when I suddenly flipped. Call it low blood sugar, call it a tantrum – I just knew I needed food and I needed it now. Thank goodness for La Bastille. After the recent revamp, it's lost the dungeon effect and turned into a much cosier, more muted and contemporary place, with the sort of calm feeling you need if you're a stressedout bride to be.

Frank, the Bastille's manager seems to know everyone, and he probably does. The Bastille's been going for 30 years and it's acquired the sort of loyal clientele base any restaurant would be proud of. Head Chef Eddy Cottini is Jersey's answer to Jean-Christophe Novelli with his French accent, training at Michelin-starred restaurants and passionate approach to food. His menu is drawn from all his favourite influences - Provençal cooking, Italian cuisine and Moroccan flavours, and with a career that spans catering for ravenous skiers at mountain restaurants, right through to serving the finest dining to Zurich glitterati, he should know what he's talking about. Just don't get

him started on fusion... "all 'zose tastes - too many - my food you 'ave only one or two flavours, but 'zey are done well". Eddy's philosophy is that food should be simple and people should know what they're going to get. The menu at La Bastille is certainly pared down – there's a choice of four starters and four main courses on the Winter Warmers menu (£12.50 for two courses, £15 for three) but there's a blackboard on every table with the specials of the day, which all sounded gorgeous. I stuck to the Winter Warmers menu, while Jemima (come on, she coordinates her confetti – what did you expect?) ordered from the specials

I have to admit I was a bit nervous when Jemima ordered her king prawn tempura she's fussy about her seafood and after a long morning wedding shopping, the last thing I needed was a fraught bride to be getting het up over not-quite-perfect prawns. Thankfully, the batter was light and crispy, the king prawns were just right and the tomato sauce on the side was delicious - just a hint of chilli without being scorchingly hot. Eddy suggested we try the salmon roulade. It looked like it was going to be very rich, with all that smoked salmon and creamy potato salad, but it was lighter than it looked, and the potato salad was just delicious.

The wine list is aimed at people who know their stuff – and it's good. We counted a rather nice Puligny-Montrachet, Selaks and even Cristal for anyone feeling a bit bling, but whatever you're into, you won't go far wrong; the prices are reasonable and everything's been well chosen.

When it came to the main course, Jemima couldn't wait to try an intriguing dish which combined monkfish and vermicelli with coconut sauce. It's hard to describe – think of a couple of monkfish 'Snowballs' with toasted vermicelli instead of desiccated coconut, and served with a lightly spiced laksa-style sauce. Delicious, but slightly surreal. It certainly got some admiring glances from diners across the room... who then ordered the same. My black bream came steamed in its own banana leaf parcel, tightly secured by a length of banana leaf in a knot even a top Scout would have struggled with. Thankfully, Eddy noticed my feeble fumbling and came to my rescue with a sharp knife. Good thing too, because the bream was excellent steamed with a subtle coriander flavour. Seeing a design fault, the kitchen sent out the rest of their bream unwrapped, with the banana leaf pinned into a sail shape with a cocktail stick. "Innovative and imaginative" said Jemima enviously, cursing the fact she'd already booked the caterers for her wedding.



We didn't have room for dessert, but I hope you do. The passion fruit pannacotta just sounds so delicious, and it even comes with a mini fruit cake. There was apple crumble as well as a sticky toffee pudding on the menu for the more traditional. We finished with a peppermint tea, brought to our table with a saucer on top of the cup (it keeps the oils in and improves the flavour), which impressed Jemima.

I'm starting to realise why La Bastille has so many regulars. The food is excellent, the wine is reasonable and the attention to detail is second to none. I don't think people should be allowed to keep it to themselves anymore. At the moment, it's only serving lunch, so my advice is to book yourself a long lunch break - or better still, call in sick or cancel your afternoon golf and take someone out to La Bastille. With the Winter Warmers menu running until the 29th March, you've really got no excuse.

Local Food Heroes

Bob Milner retired from dentistry and decided to keep a few chickens - 9000 of them. The major producer of free range eggs on the Island, his hens are happier by far, "It's the higher standard of welfare." he says, "My hens are kept in mobile houses, which allow them access to the surrounding fields. As there are no natural predators in Jersey - unlike foxes in the UK - we don't need to shut them up and they can come and go as they please." The Happy Hens roam free in Grouville and are so chuffed, they offer up a staggering 6000 eggs a day.

But it's not just the birds that are loving it, the eggs are going to taste better than those squeezed from a poorer indoor bird. Happy Hens' eggs are super fresh too, usually delivered to supermarkets, shops and farm shops within 24 hours of laying. By contrast, UK eggs are usually collected twice a week for grading and packing and they'll be 7-10 days old before they reach us here.

Buying local and free range also ensures a boost to the local economy as well as a smaller carbon footprint all round. The packaging is reused - far better than recycled - and there are fewer stages in the steps from field to plate. So spare a thought for the chicken as well as the egg when you

Sunny side up

To recognize a fresh egg when you meet one, try the following test. Break the egg onto a flat plate, a very fresh egg will have a high, rounded yolk surrounded by an egg-shaped blob of thick egg white. There should be a very small amount of thin runny white spreading on the plate. Less fresh eggs will spread out all over the plate and will have a flattened yolk and will be no good for scrambling.



Easter 23rd March Joyeuses Pâques!

That chocofest is coming around again, so get set to over-indulge. People in the UK are the biggest chocoholics in Europe, munching through an average 10 kilos per year – or 25% of all the chocolate eaten across Europe. Last year the UK bought 80 million eggs, spending a bellyaching £336 million on chocolate. Enjoy!

Seasonal Food

The outlandishly coloured vegetable that thinks it's a fruit, rhubarb makes deliciously comforting puddings. Forced rhubarb has been in our shops and markets for a few weeks now but make the most of it before it disappears and the tougher, tarter outdoor variety comes through next month. This early rhubarb is grown in the dark, mostly in an area around Leeds, Bradford and Wakefield, known (like something out of Wallace and Grommit) as the "rhubarb triangle". Nimble fingers pick the luscious pink stalks by candlelight, in true Victorian style, to protect the younger stems that are still growing. Choose crisp, firm, plump, vibrant pink stalks with curled, mustard yellow leaves. Wash, trim and chop into two centimetre lengths. Cover with crumble and bake or put in a pan with a couple of tablespoons of water and brown sugar and stew gently. This compote is great with custard, yoghurt, cream or ice cream. Reduce the sugar slightly and it makes an excellent sauce for delicious local mackerel.



Super Love Apples

Pomegranates, pumpkin seeds, green tea and beetroot have all jostled for a position at the top of the superfood tree. But the latest in this list is the pomme d'amour, the pomodoro or, to you and me, the humble tomato. In his new book, "The Red Bodyguard", pharmacist Ron Levin has collated decades of research confirming the health-giving benefits of the gorgeous, ripe tomato. Tomatoes contain loads of betacarotene, an anti-oxidant that supports the immune system and benefits healthy skin. One medium-sized tomato contains half of the recommended daily dose of vitamin C. However, the real punch packed by a tomato is a potent anti-oxidant called lycopene, present in the dark red colour of the flesh. The Mediterranean diet, with its tomatoes and olive oil, has been linked to a long healthy life, and now there is scientific research to show that lycopene can suppress the production of cancer cells.



Until now we have had to make do - or do without - imported Spanish tomatoes. Now the early crop of Jersey tomatoes is ready from Fauvic Nurseries and Holme Grown farm shop. Unlike the Spanish variety, these local lovelies ripen on the vine so you can maximise on flavour and health benefits. Halve the deliciously sweet cherry tomatoes and cook in a nice slug of olive oil over a gentle heat. Tear up some lovely local basil leaves, season and add to cooked pasta for a taste of spring.


QUAY

Shrouded in controversy and accompanied by an on-going battle with Jersey Planning, the £350 million Castle Quay waterfront regeneration project has now most definitely become a reality. With the launch this month, and over 1,1000 people interested in the housing possibilities, the ambitious scheme looks as though finally, nothing can stand in its way.

The site between the Radisson Hotel and Harbour Reach apartments, as originally designed by Eric Kuhne (the man behind Bluewater), was to have a central tower 15 storeys high, built to stand out on the skyline, reminiscent of a ship's sail in its form. This perhaps was one of Dandara's most challenging aspects of this project and with resistance from both the public and the States, it was firmly denied. In regards to Jersey's ever-evolving infrastructure, this eager design was probably just a step too far.








The first phases of the scheme however, were designed as two blocks, Le Capelain and Millais House, providing over 350 new homes with a large shared rooftop garden, new restaurants, leisure, shopping, boutique offices and entertainment facilities. With a maximum of 6 storeys, this is the phase that is realistically going to completely transform the reclaimed land as we know it. It is still a 'big deal' in terms of Jersey though. Even looking at the architect's impressions, it is hard to comprehend such a glamorous project of this International scale on our relatively small island.

Even the marketing suite is somewhat of a striking piece of contemporary design. With a glass covered roof and façade looking out onto the Marina, a ultra-modern life size model of the development revolves in the centre by the control of a touch-screen. With a better idea of where your potential property is located, upstairs in the suite there are two life-size apartments for you to view (1 & 2 bedroom), complete with television and a wardrobe full of clothes. Bearing in mind the average price of a 3 bedroom house in Jersey is now around £470,000, the prices at Castle Quay are affordable. >>>>







The 2 bedrooms offer substantial room, underground parking and a large balcony, whilst the 1 bedroom apartments offer comfortable living, with a smaller balcony, more suited for buy-to-lets or young professionals looking for a foot on the property ladder. A concierge service similar to that in 5* hotels will be available taking the concept of apartment living to a whole New York level.

With the integrated mix, a new concept of living is set to brace the Island. Think continental Europe meets the sea – Monaco if you like. Plenty of alfresco dinning on your doorstep, sipping a cappuccino, looking over the castle and marina promenade whilst you do your shopping. A lively atmosphere in the day and night, even the possibility of food being delivered to your door upstairs - will anyone ever want to leave Castle Quay? >>



>> And with prestigious chef Marco Pierre White being invited to work with the locals in Jersey to develop eating venues within the development, a guaranteed high level of cuisine is due to be set.

It's all well and good providing people with fabulous new apartments in a prime location, job opportunities and an array of entertainment, but will the blend of deeprooted local families, affluent professionals and young guns of Jersey buy into this new style of living? And will it fit in with our unique character? Only time will tell. Completion of Le Capelain is estimated for autumn/winter 2011, with Millais House 6 to 9 months later.

We can already see the huge shift of town moving towards the waterfront, and with the Liberty Wharf bridging the gap, who knows what the future will hold. If you're considering a move, get down to the marketing suite (the entrance is left before the Radisson car park) and experience Castle Quay youself.

One thing Sara felt was important was a mentoring style of teaching, whereby students feel they can approach their tutors to get one

to one help and advice. She feels you can also learn a lot from your students by sharing information, and there is always something new to learn.

All courses take place at The Club Spa Hotel, and with incentive schemes, no pass no pay and introductory one day courses into COFA and Professional level training. The Junior series of 1 day courses are practical starter courses suitable for anyone who has just joined the finance industry, thinking of starting a career in the finance industry or who just wants a practical course explaining the basics. Onestudy is the one to watch out for - they are already looking ahead to next season and hope to launch in Guernsey eventually and also move into other investment and accounting professional institutes.

This month: K-L

Know Your Client (KYC)

A standard form in the investment industry that ensures advisors know detailed information about their clients' risk tolerance, investment knowledge and financial position.

Key Performance Indicators (KPI)

A set of measures that can be used to assess or compare performance. KPIs vary between companies and industries, depending on priorities or performance criteria. Also referred to as 'key success indicators (KSI)'.

Life insurance

Insurance where a policy holder's dependents receive a cash lump sum if he or she dies.

Liability

An obligation that legally binds an individual or company to settle a debt.

LIBOR

The 'London Interbank Offered Rate' is the rate at which banks notionally buy and sell money to each other. Some loans are linked to LIBOR rates.

Liquidity

The ability to convert assets to cash quickly, without significant losses.

Loan

An arrangement in which a lender gives money or property to a borrower, and the borrower agrees to return the property or repay the money, usually along with interest, at some future point(s) in time.

Careers Workshop - Get Your CV Right

The CV is a tool that outlines your skills and experiences so an employer can see at a glance how you can contribute to the business. Your CV is your chance to sell yourself, so you need to get it right.

You may well have all the requirements for a particular position but, if the employer doesn't instantly think that you 'have what it takes', then your CV is a failure. The most effective CV is clearly focused on a specific job title and will address the employer's requirements for the position. Make sure you find out as much as you can about the duties and skills required for a job and organise your CV around these points.

Putting together a good CV isn't about including as much information as you can – the information needs to be relevant. Rather than just including information about jobs you've held in the past, make sure you select the most relevant accomplishments, skills and experience for THIS position.

Always Prepare

- •Research the industry, companies and types of jobs which you are interested in.
- •Talk to as many people as possible try to remember people's names you meet from now onwards and keep in touch with them!
- •Keep up with the market and current events by visiting the Jersey Finance website, keeping in touch with the news.
- Prepare your CV and work out your strengths, weaknesses and ways in which you can add value to the job you want.

Sending Out Your CV

- •Whether you send your CV out by post or by email, send it with a covering letter.
- •Make sure you explain:
- Who you are
- What sort of job you are seeking or applying for
- Why you are the best candidate for the job and
- When you will follow up on your letter.
- •Remember to follow up with a phone call and, if you can't speak to the right person at the time, leave a clear message detailing your name, purpose of call, your phone number and a good time to contact you.

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This month Gallery has invited none other than Arnold Schwarzenegger to take a break from governing California and try out this month's test ride: the Genius Mobiky. Here's what he had to say about it...

I had been forewarned that this bike was 'surprisingly slow' and at first glance I thought I had a pretty good idea why. Stowed away it resembled the kind of tangled metallic mass that emerges from a car crusher, it really was that tiny the wheels worryingly so. When told it was a foldaway bike my mind conjured up romantic images of the folding bikes of yesteryear, the kind of amusing and trendy transport favoured by university students nationwide and as good as normal bikes except for the hinge midway up the frame. This however, is totally different.

Duly concerned, I began my attempt to unpack the Mobiky, which was actually very straightforward. Quick-release fittings allow easy adjustment of the telescopic seatpost and both the handlebars and pedals clonked up with ease. Pull back the bar that holds the frame up in the stowed position and you're ready to ride.

In my eagerness to cruise off along the Californian boardwalks (although I'd imagine it would be just as much at home on the cycle path by the Gunsite) I almost lost my balance completely but it didn't take long to acclimatise to riding the Mobiky, whose steering at first feels like that of a microscooter. However, don't let that put you off! Up into third gear (which I found suitable for, well, everywhere but then I am an internationally acclaimed bodybuilder) and this bike easily kept up to the pace of most others that were about.



Don't be fooled into thinking that this bike is a one trick pony though - it's the little touches like the clever twin chain design to eliminate slack when folded, the nifty little rear mounted kick stand, the frame mounted carrying handle and disc brakes all round that let you know that this is of quality design and construction. It is, however not for people who would rather keep a low profile, catching the eyes of almost all that passed (although this could possibly be my celebrity preceding me, who knows?).

All in all a great little bike but probably not best suited to commuting - far better for a Sunday ride, popping to the shops or just keeping in the boot of the car for whenever it takes your fancy!



weekend snowbreak

What a brilliant way to spend a weekend!

Last month, Gallery tested out our very own short-hop ski operator, weekendskitrips.com. A spur of the moment call saw us turning up at the Elizabeth Terminal after a lost passport fiasco with our dinner in Tupperware. There's nothing like good planning.

We were off to a good start, I was already having a brilliant time and we hadn't even reached the snow. I don't know if we were just lucky, but we were with a fantastic group of people. There were a group of seven lads, some who had never been skiing/snowboarding before, some individuals who were avid skiers, a family, two girl friends and a few couples — all who seemed to have the same idea of heading off for a break 'away from it all' in the mountains. The whole experience has completely changed my view of 'group holidaying' - it is brilliant to travel with a load of like-minded people.

At 11 o'clock I was utterly fascinated watching what appeared to be a normal coach turn into a travelling hotel. It is hard to explain but the seats transformed into totally flat bunk beds. The television was turned off, the lights dimmed and curtains drawn, and everyone happily chatted until sleep tookover.

Waking naturally in the morning I looked out to see high snow-capped mountains either side of us, as our coach drove along a winding mountain path. Shortly we arrived at our destination, Hotel Le Chantilly, in Cauterets. The English-speaking owners Mary and Phil greeted us all and got us into the right rooms. Then we all headed downstairs for a traditional continental breakfast.

After breakfast lift passes were distributed, we popped into the hire shop on the way to the ski-lifts and then we ascended in the gondola directly up into the snow-covered mountain tops. By nam we were off on our first runs. Cauterets is surrounded by the Pyrenees National Park and as I headed down the bright white snow-covered piste it was hard to take in the stunning backdrop. There really is something therapeutic about being in the mountains – it is literally a million miles away from the world of work. My only tasks were to try and cover the 36kms of runs Cauterets has to offer and to improve my parallel skiing style. Bliss.

After an idyllic lunch, watching European skiers jet by in their patchwork/neon/all-in-ones, I headed off to my ski lesson with Mr "ben za neeezz ", and my friends went to practice their jumps in the snow park. At 5 our group met up in the bar at the bottom of the slopes and exchanged stories of the day. One of the lads who had never been boarding before was already racing down reds and another beginner had (purposefully) pulled off his first jump, unlike me, who managed to get quite a lot of 'air' but totally unintentionally.

At 6pm we all headed back down the mountain and through the quaint picturesque, Spanish-influenced town (via a traditional boulangerie which made foot-long chocolate twists!) back to our hotel. After a siesta I headed down to the dining room ready for a big dinner!

On Sunday we had breakfast in the hotel, and spent the day on the mountain. After another delicious dinner we left Cauterets for the overnight trip back to St. Malo. We checked our baggage in at the harbour and i had a lovely day; strolling along the beach and then settling in for a long lunch. Then we hopped on the ferry and arrived in Jersey at 6 o'clock.

As a group we managed to get off relatively injury-free; bar a black toe, several bruised buttocks and sore thighs all round. After repeated goodbyes to our new found friends, we all returned to normality from our fantastic weekend trip.

The cost of the trip was £305 per person which includes: ferries, sleeper coach, hotel accomodation, breakfast and dinner on Saturday and Sunday, 2 days ski lift pass, and winter sports insurance.

The extras are 30 euros for snowboard hire / 40 euros for ski hire. For 5-13 euros you can leave all your boards/skis etc up the mountain ready for you and if you fancy a private lesson with an English-speaking instructor, it's 33 euros per hour. We had a great time, give it a try.
