
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

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

Some people build businesses for business' sake, some for money, for success, for notoriety. Other people build their businesses based on a passion, a personal motivation and a desire to provide the best product or service no matter what. This business ethos can usually be seen in the product: the Innocent smoothies, the Howies, the ones who go that extra mile to try and offer us something we love.

That's the feeling I got when we were invited by David Seymour to a presentation on the new designs for the Watersplash. There have been rumours milling around about the future of the Splash ever since Seymour Hotels aquired the site in 2004. Speculation was rife over when the building would be flattened to make way for a big hotel, a fancy venue or something else that would lose the memories we all have associated with the Splash of old. It was a huge challenge therefore, in the face of public opinion, to undertake a plan to create a new Splash that would provide everything St Ouen's regulars want to maintain whilst creating something that extra bit special, something that has the potential to get our new generation of tourists excited.

The Seymour Group investigated other beach front entertainment venues and took inspiration from Quay Four in Cape Town and The Extreme Academy in Watergate Bay, Newquay. They enlisted the help of local architect Tim Skudder at Nigel Biggar and Partners to create a solution what would be in harmony both with the natural landscape of the Five Mile Road and its location beachside. As a surfer, Tim was brought up in his family's beachside inn and is well placed to empathise with the needs of a project like the Watersplash redevelopment.

Keeping it Underground.

All those memories of Mad Mark jumping on you lost forever? No way. We get a subterranean nightclub that will open onto the Wavehouse for some true club and surf events.

'As a surfer this is a dream project. Working with the Seymour Hotel Group on a project that is at the very heart of Jersey's cultural and environmental heritage has been challenging and exciting. The new Watersplash will belong in St Ouen's Bay; the concept has been to use landscaping to minimize its impact and blend it into the bay. Special attention has been given to how the building will look as you approach the Watersplash from land and sea. It really is a 'win win' situation, islanders (especially surfers) and visitors will get a better version of the 'Splash they now enjoy with the same relaxed feel, club etc.. plus the Wavehouse!'

Tim Skuggar Nigel Biggar and Partners

This innocent looking bit is the WaveHouse.

Established in Durban, South Africa in 2001., Wave House and Wave Loch are owned by inventor and entrepreneur Tom Lochtefeld. Tom was co-founder of Raging Waters theme parks, Lochtefeld invented 30 global patents for water rides and attrac-

tions, and built rides and theme parks across the

world.

In 2002, Lochtefeld acquired the lease for Belmont Park in San Diego, a failed beachfront retail specialty center, and proceeded to revitalize the seven-acre facility by blending the original historic family-oriented amusement centre with state-of-the-art boardsport entertainment and beach recreational amenities.

A lifestyle centre for California surf culture, it's on real sand, overlooking the Pacific Ocean with a real boardwalk and shade palm trees. It is an outdoor restaurant with surfboard tables and plenty of bars, one of which was built from plans of the original Windansea Shack. It has live music and a beach volleyball court, and of course, 'the Wave' a.k.a. Bruticus Maximus.

If this all goes to plan the Splash will be the world's fourth Wavehouse after San Diego, Durban and Chile. Plans include a retractable roof. True surfers and boardriders globally can therefore travel to our little island to check out not only

> our waves but also our Wavehouse. Thing protour style events and parties...bring it on!






The development team is further assisted by the appointment of Dominic Cole as land use consultant. Dominic's experience includes being lead designer and planner for The Eden Project and current Chairman of the agardens and Parks Advisory Panel of The National Trust.

You can see therefore, how the new proposed building will morph into the St Ouen's landscape perfectly with sympathetic development and planting, assisted by Sedum roofs, allowing the building to sit comfortably with its surroundings.

This isn't a development for the sake of a development. This is the desire to create a truly world class destination attraction whilst maintaining everything Islanders want from the Splash as we know it and have known it.

All the items marked on the model on the previous spread show how the new proposal not only gives us everything we had but some really great new facilities.







One of the features of the Splash redevelopment will be the creation of a Channel Islands chapter of the **Surfrider Foundation**.

For those of you that have never heard of it, the Surfrider Foundation is a non-profit grassroots organization dedicated to the protection and enjoyment of our world's oceans, waves and beaches.

The organisation was founded in 1984 by a handful of surfers in Malibu, California and now maintains over 50,000 members and 80 chapters worldwide doing good for the surfers' habitat. They have chapters in Australia, Japan, France, and Brazil (and maybe Jersey soon).

The Surfrider Foundation has adopted the following principles to guide and govern the activities of the organization.

- 1. SURFRIDER recognizes the biodiversity and ecological integrity of the planet's coasts are necessary and irreplaceable. SURFRIDER is committed to preserving natural living and non-living diversity and ecological integrity of the coastal environment.
- 2. SURFRIDER promotes the right of low-impact, free and open access to the world's waves and beaches for all people. SURFRIDER acts to preserve this right of access.
- 3. SURFRIDER is dedicated to enhancing waveriding opportunities in ways which will not adversely impact nearshore ecosystems.
- 4. SURFRIDER believes environmental education is essential to the future health and well-being of the planet. SURFRIDER seeks to develop and utilize educational materials that are informative, factual, proactive, synergistic
- 5. SURFRIDER strives to be accurate and nonpartisan in its communications with its members and the general public. In addition, SURFRIDER will express the unique values inherent in wave-riding — individualism, camaraderie, non materialism, and an appreciation for human kind's historic relations with the Ocean.
- 6. SURFRIDER is a grassroots organization, effective through the participation of its members. SURFRIDER activities emphasize the value of an involved membership.

- 7. SURFRIDER encourages all commercial enterprises to adopt the Ceres Principles Their determination to do so will favorably influence SURFRIDER's willingness to provide support. SURFRIDER will not permit sponsors to divert the Foundation from its mission or projects undertaken.
- 8. SURFRIDER does not discriminate on the basis of race, religion, sex, or national origin for any reason. SURFRIDER promotes the healthy enjoyment of the coastal environment for all people.
- 9. SURFRIDER and its representatives, affiliations and chapters agree to abide by these principles and all rules and regulations governing nonprofit organizations.



CISA gets rocked to raise funds



The Channel Islands Skateboard Association (CISA). Little Green Rock and GreenRock Skateboards have teamed up to raise some money for the Jersey skate park.

Little Green Rock have done a limited number of their eco-friendly bamboo t-shirts with a special design and will donate £5 for each shirt purchased to the CISA to put into a fund for the Jersey skate park.

'I thought it was great news when I read that the island would finally be getting a proper skate park' said Buter from GreenRock Skateboards. 'I've been on the island for about six years now and this has been an issue for as long as I've been here. My boy has already started to skate and I really like the idea of there being a place where I know he can go and ride his skateboard all day and not get in trouble for doing it!'.

With a large chunk of change already set aside by the States for the skate park, you might wonder why anyone is trying to raise more money for the project. When talking to Jake Hipwell, the president of the CISA, he simply says that they are looking for outside funding to provide the skateboarders on the island with the best skate park possible. Jake says that the CISA are also trying to ensure that there will be money to maintain the skate park and keep it safe after it is built.

'We printed 300 of these shirts for the skate park campaign', says Debbie from Little Green Rock, 'so we're aiming to raise £1,500 for the park fund. As we are still quite a small company we are trying to find another corporate sponsor to match our donations to bring the total to £3,000. It might not sound like a lot of money to some, but it certainly is to us and it will be put to good use.'



Sue next door called him over to find her lost eternity ring, and it wasn't long before he was heading out to the beach every evening, metal detector in one hand, spade in the other, on the trail of buried treasure. He finds plenty of it as well rings, brooches and coins - but they're more likely to have been dropped by someone from Rochdale rather than ancient Rome.

He targets the beach hotspots; around the ice-cream van, picnic sites, and that strip of soft sand just above the highwater mark where everyone leaves their towels. Ken can't believe how many people tuck their jewellery under the corner of a towel to go swimming, then forget it's there when they return dripping wet. By the time they've wiped the salt water out of their eyes, their precious signet ring has slipped out of sight under the sand. The dunes at St Ouen's normally turn up some interesting finds. He used to wonder why he found so many wedding rings lost in secluded spots, until he put two and two together. An illicit liaison, you slip your wedding ring off, put it in your pocket ... "and it's amazing what falls out of your pockets when, let's just say, your mind's on other things", chuckles Ken.

All those wedding rings add up – and with the price of gold sky-rocketing, Ken's onto a winner. He puts it all on Ebay - anything sold by JerseyBoy42 has normally come from under Jersey's golden sands. Along with all the loose change he finds, Ken's taking home a quite a bounty from his beachcombing. 'Not so daft now, am I' mutters Ken as he slowly sweeps the beach again.

Gallery goes undercover to bring you an insider's look at some of Jersey's social stereotypes. Recognise anyone you know?!



Those of you that have travelled in Australia may have picked this one up en route. Xavier Rudd is a one-man-band/ multi-instrumentalist who plays guitars, Yidaki (didgeridoos), Weissenborn slide guitars, stomp box, harmonica, and percussion, Rudd made his US debut in 2004 with Solace. In the years since, his popularity and reputation have begun to mushroom for a string of conscious, heartfelt songs and an impressive stage show that finds him performing those songs' guitar, didgeridoo and various percussion parts simultaneously - using a unique set-up that finds him literally surrounded by his various instruments and singing from behind a stand holding three didgeridoos (of different keys).

A bona fide star in Australia, Rudd grew up in Bell's Beach in Southern Victoria, notable for its cameo in the memorable surf film Point Break. He was reared in a music-friendly environment, where his parents spun records by the likes of Neil Young and Paul Simon.

In 2002, Rudd released his debut album in Australia, To Let, which was followed by Solace and in 2004 by Food in the Belly, his debut for Anti-. In his own country, he's collected a string of gold and platinum sales awards for his albums and DVDs. Over the past five years, his popularity has ballooned in the US, where he has amassed a burgeoning grass-roots fanbase and the admiration of the likes of Ani DiFranco and Jack Johnson, while hitting many of the country's top festivals, like Bonnaroo, Bumbershoot and Austin City Limits Festival.

The past few years have been a whirlwind for the singer. In between sold-out tours in Europe, Australia and the US, he's supported the likes of the Dave Matthews Band, Jack Johnson and Ben Harper, and has been working on the film score for fellow surfer and Rudd-enthusiast Matthew McConaughey's Surfer Dude, co-starring Woody Harrelson and Willie Nelson. In the meantime, he's earned a reputation as a great Australian activist, advocating for indigenous rights and environmental responsibility.

Apart from the touring and activism, recording proves a challenge. "What I do, musically, is not something that people know much about," he says. "It's kind of its own thing. So every time we go in to record, we learn new ways to approach it, to capture the right sound. There's a lot of spill in the different mics, and a lot of factors to consider. So with each recording, we've learned different ways to approach it. On White Moth, I opened the door for the possibilities in the studio, and got a vibe for what I could do. On Dark Shades of Blue, I think we captured what we do live, the thickness of it, the tone. I think we finally achieved what I've always wanted to hear on my

recordings".

3-6 July 2008, Eurockéennes

Belfort, France

Eurockéennes has been taking place on the peninsula of Malsaucy near Belfort, France since 1989. It's beautiful, surrounded by lakes and hills with one of the stages on the beach. The campsite is located a short walk along a disused rail line from the festival site although shuttles run regularly for those who don't fancy the scenic stroll. Gallery did this one in 2006 and it was excellent. Fake bus stop for Alzheimer's patients

A German nursing home has created a pretend bus stop to prevent Alzheimer's patients from wandering off.

The bus stop, outside the Benrath Senior Centre in Dusseldorf, is an exact replica of a standard stop but no buses call there.

The idea emerged after the centre was forced to rely on police to retrieve patients who wanted to return to their homes and families but had forgotten that in many cases neither existed any longer.

"If we can't find them then we have to alert the police," said Benrath's director Richard Neureither. "It can be particularly dangerous if this happens in winter and they spend the night out in the cold."

Without powers to detain patients, he said, Benrath teamed up with local care association, the Old Lions, and went to the Rheinbahn transport network which was happy to provide the bus stop to nowhere.

"It sounds funny," said Old Lions Chairman Franz-Josef Goebel, "but it helps. On average, our members are 84 years old".

"Their short-term memory hardly works at all, but the longterm memory is still active. They know the green and yellow bus sign and remember that waiting there means they will go home.

"We will approach them and say that the bus is coming later today and invite them in to the home for a coffee," said Mr Neureither. "Five minutes later they have completely forgotten they wanted to leave."

The idea has proved so successful that it has now been adopted by several other old folks' homes across Germany.



Thong-faced robbers

Police are hopeful of catching robbers who were caught on camera using thongs as masks. The skimpy ladies pants left most of the daft duo's faces visible, say police in Colorado. CCTV cameras caught the pair holding up a convenience store in Arvada, reports Sky News. One wore a green thong while the other opted for blue - but their noses, mouths and chins were barely covered. Officers also have a few more clues to work with as one of the men failed to cover up a distinctive tattoo on his arm. The men, believed to be in their 20s, were not armed. They stole cigarettes and cash which they stuffed in a pink backpack.

Boy, 4, in rehab for cigarette addiction in Taiwan

A four year-old boy is in rehab in Taiwan after he became addicted to smoking his father's cigars.

The father, of Gaoxiong city, started taking his sons, aged nine and four, to a rehabilitation centre after catching them stealing his cigarettes and cigars.

The boys admitted stealing and said they did it because they thought their father looked "cool" when he smoked.

The four-year-old admitted he even pleaded with his brother to borrow cigarettes from classmates when they failed to steal any from their father.

Bild mocks Brits on holiday

Germany's tabloid newspaper, Bild, has printed a guide on how to avoid British holidaymakers.

It was inspired by the case of a British man being awarded £750 after suing his travel company over a holiday at a resort filled with Germans.

David Barnish, 47, claimed his holiday in Greece had been spoilt by the number of German tourists, reports the BBC.

Bild quotes a German legal expert saying that Germans holidaying in all-British resorts would not have the same opportunity of suing.

It also ridicules British cuisine, binge-drinking, fashion and sport, says that "athletically they are not up to much, they can't even take penalties".

Bild recommends avoiding the most popular resorts for Brits and lists the top six 'black spots' as Palma, Majorca; San Antonio, Ibiza; Playa de las Americas, Tenerife; Ayia Napa, Cyprus; Faliraki, Rhodes; and Malia in

Katelyn quickly responded, 'He shouldn't have crawled in there in the first place. Smack him again.'



Never work with children or animals

Smart-alec kids can be really annoying. I can say this with complete confidence as I spent about ten years of my life being far too clever for my own good and suffering the consequences in the form of regular clips around the ear and occasional black eyes from my longsuffering parents and school friends.

Eventually (and this did take a while), I realised that the vast majority of people don't appreciate having their mistakes pointed out to them (the remainder being masochists who you probably don't want to hang around in case the conversation turns to leather underpants) and my life became a far less painful place.

Ironically, people now pay significant sums of cash for me to point out their mistakes on the basis that prevention is better than cure when you're about to sign up to a multi-million pound contract. I do however realise that even though I may not have enjoyed the aforementioned chastisements, they were in fact for my own good in that I became a much less unpleasant person to be around as a result.

Thank God, then, that I didn't grow up in Canada. Because in Canada, it turns out there is a law that lets children apply to the court to have their parents' decisions overturned (which can be found in sections 159 and 604 of the Quebec Civil Code, in case you were wondering). Can you imagine how insufferable a kid would be if he could take you to court for grounding him or delivering a wellearned smack to the back of the head? Even worse, can you imagine a lawyer that thinks that it is in any way a good idea to make this sort of application on behalf of a child? And the sort of judge that would rule in the child's favour?

Imagine no more - just a couple of weeks ago, Madam Justice Suzanne Tessier of the Quebec Superior Court ruled that a father's decision to ground his twelve year-old daughter for persistently posting on internet chatrooms after he told her to stop was unreasonable and should be overturned. The father (who was not named) had decided to stop the girl from going on a school trip and when she mentioned this to her lawyer Lucie Fortin (who had been appointed in connection with the divorce of her parents), Ms Fortin decided that the best thing to do would be to publicly undermine the authority of parents everywhere by getting the court to confirm that daddy doesn't know best.

In my eyes, this is a horrible consequence of the nanny state's idea of treating children like little adults by giving them rights and legislating for every possible danger that may befall them. It is very likely that smacking children will soon be made illegal due to the persistent high-pitched whining of lobbyists who say that children must be protected from the horrible adults who they are forced to live with and for whom anything that doesn't result in the child getting their own way amounts to abuse. Obviously, it is preferable to use a reward-based system but unfortunately a Labrador, like many children, will not always respond to reasoned argument or realise that rights are paired with responsibilities and so the odd use of force can be eminently justifiable.

Likewise, it is an owner's responsibility to ensure that passers-by are not bitten or p^*ssed on and so the Labrador must be trained - however it is shocking to see how many parents think that the education of their child is solely the responsibility of the child's school and believe the

mindless mantra of a thousand soap operas and aeons of daytime TV - it doesn't matter how your kids turn out so long as you love them. Loving them apparently makes everything OK, even if they are illiterate thugs who have no hope of contributing anything to society beyond the provision of employment for social workers, probation officers and Jeremy Kyle.

At the other end of the social scale, far too many parents will automatically take their children's side in any argument, undermining the authority of teachers (and in some circumstances the police). The same parents are then as shocked as a nun stumbling into a brothel when their little snowflake tells them to f*ck off and stays out past midnight - however by then they have lost all hope of discipline because the child simply does not respect authority and has become so used to swearing at and ignoring the instructions of teachers that doing the same to their parents is a natural progression.





Anyone familiar with the Jersey Arts World will recognise these unique abstracted, geometric hard-edged paintings depicting Jersey's varied coastline. Peter Knight, the artistic behind these pieces is exhibiting for the second time at The Sir John Cheshire Gallery this month.

His latest collection continues to focus on the Jersey Coastline, but incorporates new techniques and observations as one would expect from any artist developing and experimenting. His main style with strong colour will always be abundant, however alongside this more graphic approach, as an art teacher he encourages the use of varied media and has continued to experiment with materials to produce work with more texture and different

surfaces resulting in a more tactile quality. Using slate, tissue, corregated card and PVA adhesive in varied thicknesses, this has allowed him to make rhythmic trails, patterns, & movement across the canvas. He has been reinfocing this by working with several schools on Environmental and Re-cycling projects using these materials and others gathered from the seashore, culminating in large murals for long term display.

This new exhibition will include a number of canvasses on the theme of sand patterns and pools. Previously, two of his most successful paintings based on low tide were Plemont Surf and Plemont Rock Pools, which are easily recognisable. However, for recent studies on this theme Peter has used St Ouen's at low tide, which tends to focus on detail and does not directly relate to a specific

location. Peter said of his work, "St Ouen's is constant source of inspiration for me, particularly in the vicinity of Rocco Tower. You have to move quickly if you see interesting sand patterns and pools because the beach changes quickly and they can change or disappear in hours rather than days. Gorey beach is another location for intricate patters at low tide and my most recent painting is based on a view there and of course the castle and harbour is an excellent backdrop".


If you're hopping over the pond this July and find yourself in New York, why not visit 'Artists Space' on 38 Greene Street and take a look at the current exhibition of contemporary architecture put together by

Two digits of 7-segment display - formed using industrial fluorescent tubes - are suspended from the ceiling. The installation is light sign, information carrier, and light source at the same time.

As a 'display', the installation is used to show the current time in minutes. At the same time – as light installation – it is the only light source inside the exhibition space and therefore it serves as the necessary pragmatic lighting source. While the displayed information is changing every minute, the overall light intensity is kept on a constant level during all times, thus the appearance of the exhibition space is changed subtly but constantly.

'Outside Looking In' - an exhibition of recent work by Ian Rolls

The Framing Workshop will be hosting the latest collection from local artist Ian Rolls this month, entitled 'Outside Looking In', inspired by recent changes in his life.

Last September, Ian relocated to Devon with his wife Ruth and son Tom, to enable Tom to have an alternative and creative secondary education at the South Devon Steiner School. Having spent the majority of his life in Jersey, the change was both exciting and daunting. For him, it was exciting to have a beautiful new landscape to explore and be inspired by and a very vibrant cultural scene to tap into, but daunting to establish himself as an artist in a new place where he knew no-one and no-one knew of him.

By exploring locations, looking long and hard, drawing on the spot and getting a feel of the place, lan established a new studio, painting, making contacts, painting, setting up exhibitions, painting, putting images into print, and more painting. "At every stage in my new life I was encouraged and motivated by what I had achieved in Jersey as an artist. I saw myself building on my Jersey success rather than trying to create something to replace it", explains Ian.

Showing this new collection of paintings in the island seems entirely appropriate to Ian, even though much of it may be of unfamiliar locations. When painting the Jersey landscape again it was with a renewed fondness and a fresh eye. Anyone who comes to see these new paintings at this exhibition will recognise lan's wrong-handed wayward drawing style, the vivid use of watercolour and the same sense of fun and exhilaration to be living and working in a stunning place.

But less familiar will be the mega thick oil paintings (even thicker than those of the island coastline in the Arts Centre exhibition of a few years ago) and large detailed watercolours of architecture and river activity on the Thames in London. 'Outside Looking In' is essentially about looking, whether from outside or within the island is less important, "The painting is what matters, not necessarily what it is of".





The process of animation can be tedious and time consuming so you have to be patient, but the result at the end is incredible and seeing people's reactions is always good - you need a bit of constructive criticism sometimes.



Letters from London

Meltdown at the Southbank, Fiona Rae in Mayfair, confessions at the V&A and car boot sales with Sir Peter Blake. Our London based insider, Nina Hervé checks it all out and has a chinwag with Jersey born photographer Stacey Yates.

Stacey Yates

Former Beaulieu student and Jersey born photographer Stacey Yates moved to London after completing her degree in Wales in 2004. I caught up with Stacey and talked about her forthcoming exhibition and her hopes for the future.

How did you get into photography?

When I was bored at home as a kid I'd always drag out my parents old photo albums with the cheesy 70's sunset on the cover and pour over them for hours imagining their lives before they had children. They are still my favourite photographs. My Dad was a photographer in Jersey's vibrant days when tourism was huge and I spent a lot of time as a child with my mum while she sold photos to tourists doing the rounds at hotels and riding donkeys at Pontins! My Dad always said, "Stacey - a good picture is a sold picture" I never understood what he meant until I got older. I think it's boll**ks to be honest.

Why the move to London?

After studying for my BA in Documentary Photography in Wales there was really no reason for me to stay. The course in Wales was great. It really gave me the space to consider what I was looking at, and why and how I wanted to capture things. Moving to London seemed like the natural step after Wales. It was a good time to move to the city and get to grips with the art/photography scene. It's a pretty important and explosive time for photography as art right now.

Are you still interested in pursuing documentary based photography?

Yes but I think the term 'documentary photography' is pretty ambiguous. Documentary photography is generally associated with suffering and hardship. After college I watched lots of my classmates come back from assignments in third world countries covering AIDS, homelessness, war... you get the picture (excuse the pun). I learnt that I didn't feel comfortable photographing something that I didn't understand and know enough about emotionally or culturally. I didn't want to be responsible for telling a story I understood little about. I'd need a long time in those places before I could comfortably photograph and find a voice. Making pictures in the UK was something I could relate to more, and I wanted time to consider things not just rush, in a snap way – I think this led to my decision to make pictures around Disaster Recovery (my last exhibition in Jersey which took place at Hometime). I suppose this shift in feeling has led me to step out on to the art route but to me it's still documentary. I just want to talk about simple things sometimes. There is a lot of beauty in the simple things.

Can you tell me about your new forthcoming exhibition 'the seduction of place'?

The Seduction of Place is a collaboration with three other artists Sarah Finn, Dominic Hawgood, Louise Taylor - curated by Hannah Schlotter. It's an exhibition funded by the British Council and is very much about responding to space. The space we are focusing on is green belt land, which is basically the back door to London city and the beginning of the Essex countryside, which is marked by Aldborough Hatch farm. It's a space that has changed considerably over time and with the Olympics around the corner is very likely to disappear altogether. I'm interested in the ownership of the land and how the space feels in direct relationship to that ownership. The space between the city and the countryside wherever it may be is pretty blurry and hard to pin down. I want my pictures to reflect that.





What's next?

I have a few personal projects on the go that will pick up pace after this exhibition is complete. One of them is exploring the notion of unidentified people and how we imagine who they were and how they lived their lives. It's easy to go missing in the city and lots of people do, only leaving behind possessions that help us imagine who they might have been. I'd like to make photos around that portraits without people. I'd also like to return to Jersey at some stage and do a photo project about the island in some capacity. Having distance from Jersey (i.e. living in London) makes you understand the island in a different way and I'd like to explore that. Long term, I'd like to study a masters in photography, teach part time and keep making and showing work.

Stacey's work can be seen as part of 'The Seduction of Place' from 31st July until 10th August at Studio 1.1 Gallery, Redchurch Street, London. It will then move to Aldborough Hall Farm, Essex as part of the Real Ale Festival from 28th August. For more information visit: www.staceyyates.com



It's all happening at London's South Bank...

The iconic riverside façade of the Tate Modern building has recently been taken over by an impressive line-up of acclaimed street artists. The external walls of the gallery are being used to display huge street art pieces by Brazilian graffiti artists Nunca and Os Gemeos, Sixeart from Barcelona, the Faile collective from New York, Parisian JR and Blu from Bologna.

Just a short stroll away at the Hayward Gallery, a boating pond on the gallery's roof and a giant plastic bubble observatory are installations that are part of the 'Psycho Buildings' exhibition (which is on show until 25th August 2008). As a centrepiece to the Hayward's 40th anniversary, ten international artists have created architecture-inspired works to fit inside, outside and around the gallery's famous brutalist concrete structure. As well as the skyline boating pond by Austrian artists Gelitin and the giant observatory with its floating ceiling by Argentinian Tomas Saraceno, the exhibition also includes a room frozen in a moment of explosive disaster by Cuban artists Los Carpinteros and an eerie village of over 200 dollhouses by Brit Rachel Whiteread.

Meanwhile at the Southbank Centre, legendary musicians Massive Attack, in their role as the Artistic Directors of this year's Meltdown Festival, recently took over the Royal Festival Hall and Queen Elizabeth Hall for nine days of concerts, DJ sets, talks, films and visual art. Guests included MC5, Grace Jones, Stiff Little Fingers and Tom Tom Club. Massive Attack also invited United Visual Artists to exhibit an installation outside on the riverside terrace. This outdoor piece, titled 'Volume', is an award winning sculpture consisting of a luminous array of light and sound emitting interactive columns that people could stroll around and enjoy.

In the kitchen, sweet and sour are not always compatible.


Q Who would be your ideal man/ woman?



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Catherine Jenkins, Hayley Westenra and more recently legendary pianist and band leader Jools Holland are just a few of the talented musicians that we have been lucky enough to see perform in Jersey. Jools Holland blew the audience away last month with his rhythm and blues orchestra and guests including Marc Almond from 80's pop group Soft Cell, and next month it will be the turn of KT Tunstall.

The last 3 years has seen KT receive great success with her debut album Eye To The Telescope, which sold four million copies worldwide and she has been awarded numerous accolades including a Brit Award for Best British Female Solo Artist, the Ivor Novello Best Song award for writing Suddenly I See, a Q award for Track of the Year for Black Horse and the Cherry Tree, a Grammy nomination for Best Female Pop Vocal Performance and she also secured a Mercury Music Prize nomination. Outselling

every other female artist in the UK in 2005, KT's music has led her to becoming a huge festival favourite and now she is headed for us, thanks to Dick Ray and Jersey International.

KT's modern folk and acoustic style of music has been inspired hugely by her life experiences growing up in Fife, Scotland. After Fife, her musical journey took her to Edinburgh, where she busked and hosted her own acoustic nights, Acoustic Extravaganza, which gave the Skye album its name and is still put on by friends under the name Acoustic Edinburgh. Finally, with the promise of a publishing deal, she begrudgingly moved to London, where her career eventually began to take off. Her most recent album Drastic Fantastic - a title that popped into her head as she was writing her journal on an aeroplane, is full of powerful lyrics, bold, colourful melodies and reflects her increased adventurous side. When talking of Drastic Fantastic, she says 'I wanted to be braver. I also wanted to push the musicality on the album ... I really enjoyed playing lead guitar for the first time, as

well as piano, rhodes, and ukelele. But also I felt my vocals were a little safe at times on the first album. I didn't mean that to happen but I was so inexperienced singing in a studio that I couldn't quite get my live voice into the booth. After three years of touring you get so good at just flipping yourself into gig mode; finding whatever underground stream it is inside that provides you with that magical lucidity. I've found that now I can tap into that really quickly. And for the first time, being in the studio was another stage.' This time round, she was listening to the radio, mainly the new pop-indie output that has been booming with The White Stripes, Arcade Fire, The Killers, Bloc Party, as well as all those months on the festival.

Brenda Edwards, best known for her stint on the second series of X-Factor, appeared at Club 72 for 3 performances last month and Gallery had the chance to find out what she has been up to.

C: So we've seen your fellow competitors Shayne, Chico, Maria and Andy go on to achieve success since the show, but what have you been doing since X-Factor?

It's nice to touch base every so often. On the show we were friends first and foremost and keeping the relationship is a testament to our unit.

C: What did you think of Andy's shot at Eurovision? Is it something you would ever consider doing?

B: I was so upset, he should have been in the top three if not the winner. The song was really good, and he worked really hard on it, it's a shame they don't appreciate the quality in the contest. I would never enter, it's too political and they don't respect good music.

C: How has X-Factor changed your life?

B: I'm still the same person, I just can't go shopping as easily as I used to. I get paid lots of money now to do something I love. I have also been very fortunate to work with some fantastic artists and lovely people who I have grown from. I was also very proud when I was voted Favourite Reality Show Person at Screen Nation's Black BAFTAS. I was glad people voted for me and now I can give something back, because without the people you are nothing.

C: So what are your plans for the future now?

B: I've been working on an album, which I will be testing out tonight to see what you think. It's got a funky sound and a bit of soul. Gospel is my background but I love soul music. I have worked with various producers but the main thing is my band, I really feed off them. It should be out this year if not the next. I really wanted to create a good album and not release one too early just for the sake of it.

C:Where do you see yourself in 5 years time?

B: Maybe doing West End shows overseas like Vegas, and with at least one album, go on tour. As Arnie says; "I'll be back!"

Since resolving to spend the winter of 2006/07 in the studio working exclusively on new material, Musicroom have come up with an abundance of ideas and over the past year have sifted out the gems, developed and road-tested them before hitting record. The end result is 1000 Things, the band's debut EP, a record which showcases this emerging Jersey band as a songwriting team, yet captures the energy and spirit of their live performances.

Roaring in with a thumping tom-tom rhythm, opener The Gap charges along with a punchy guitar and keyboard riff. Rock ballad Make Amends follows, before The Circle's arresting guitar motif and simple but memorable melody. Finally, the title track returns to an up-tempo swing, closing the record with intricate piano and searing guitar lead.

The four well-written tracks are diverse in their scope, as befits a band whose members bring to the table hugely different backgrounds and influences. Founder member Simon Larbalestier found success in Jersey and beyond with progressive and electronic bands like Heaven Can Wait, Pressure Point and Pagan Daughters in the 8os and 9os. Simon now handles both keyboard and bass duties with aplomb, linking well with the powerhouse drumming of Craig Armstrong, who draws inspiration from everywhere from metal to jazz and fusion. Up front, Matt McManus's raw, bluesy Gibson guitar proves the perfect foil for Lesina Davies, the band's Samoan diva, whose voice carries over riffs and frantic beats alike while retaining its darkly

This line-up has now been settled for long enough to really gel as a live band. Musicroom love to play live and will follow a busy 2007 which saw well-received sets at Gorey Fete, Battle of Flowers, Live Lounge (to name but a few) with more of the same in 2008. The band's live show is thoroughly compelling and well worth witnessing; all four members attack the songs with passion and feed off each others' play, bringing the mix of originals and eclectic covers alive on stage.

Since coming into being in 2002 as a vehicle for Simon's own material, Musicroom has evolved through various guises including a spell playing almost exclusively covers. However, with its best ever line-up and a renewed commitment to new material, this Jersey band is ready to step up to the next level in 2008. 1000 Things represents the first fruits of this, but there is more to come. Behind the scenes, new tracks (Honey Honey, Cessez, Long Way) continue to emerge and seem destined to appear on the Musicroom setlist this summer, and the band are already talking about EP number 2.





All this healthy eating is playing havoc with my social life. Suddenly nobody wants to come out to lunch with me anymore unless there's mung beans on the menu. Thankfully, Nadia, my gym bunny friend had a suggestion. "Cheffins – great food, great atmosphere – and plenty of sunshine".

Cheffins has been open only for the last 18 months or so, and in that time it's built up an incredibly loyal following, with its legendary Sunday lunch menu booked solid every weekend. Perfectly-cooked local food, generous portions and friendly service - it's a combination that would work well even if Cheffins didn't have a gorgeous courtyard location in the heart of St Aubin. During the day, it's light, cool and airy thanks to the large canopy, and during the evening, it's atmospheric and lively, with color-changing lights and a fun clientele - perfect for sizzling summer suppers.

There's a new à la carte menu full of local food that sounded delicious, and as Nadia and I couldn't make up our minds which starter we wanted, Peter the charming Swedish manager brought us a whole platter of tapas-style tastes from the starter menu. We loved the griddled calamari with lime, ginger, sugar and chilli – it's a real Cheffins classic – tender but tasty all at the same time. Also on our plate were delicious discs of spicy grilled Spanish chorizo, fresh anchovies, olives, and tiger prawns soused in garlic butter. And to mop up all the juices – bread with a homemade tomato and olive dip.

After catching up with all the spinning-class gossip, and some Swedish jokes from Peter, we started on our main courses. Nadia had gone for the Moroccan-spiced lamb kebab which came with tzatziki, a rustic salad, home-made houmous and still-warm-from-the-oven flat bread. Forget those hazily-remembered 'on the way home from the Splash' kebabs - this was two skewers of marinated spiced lamb, chargrilled to perfection and served on a bed of crisp lettuce. She loved it – 'spicy and so tasty, but still healthy' – it's a definite favourite for next time. I'd let Peter talk me into the restaurant's famous Fisherman's Pie - he told me I wouldn't be disappointed – and I wasn't. Full of cod, smoked haddock, peas, scallops and king prawns and topped with creamy mashed potato and sunblush tomatoes, and served on a huge plate - this is a pie fit for one very hungry fisherman. It's absolutely delicious, full of buttery, creamy, moreish flavours – certainly one to reward yourself with after a stint at the gym. If you have space, there's a dish of lightly steamed local vegetables on the side.

You certainly won't go away from Cheffins hungry – they serve generous portions, and at £13.60 each, our main courses weren't overpriced. And if you want to snap yourself up a real bargain, go for the lunch menu which includes two courses for an incrediblyreasonable £8.99. We didn't have room for desserts, although I've heard they're great and spent the rest of our lazy lunch chilling out in the flower-filled courtyard, swapping stories and sipping coffee.

Cheffins has got the St Aubin's vibe down to a tee-relaxed, friendly, serving good local food in a beautiful setting. With its large seating areas and spot-on service, it's perfect for parties and picturesque enough for a romantic supper a deux in the courtyard. What's the catch? Only that I don't live close enough to wander in for supper every weekend....

Kate's boules tournament may have been rained off, but every cloud has a silver lining - or golden in this case - as she makes a fabulous family restaurant find on St Brelade's Bay.

Don't you just love our great British summer? Record-breaking temperatures one day, then it pours the next. And sometimes – when the weather's in a particularly awkward mood you get everything all in one day... usually the day you've organized a beach party.

We were halfway through the annual Summers family beach boules tournament when we spotted the storm clouds rolling in over St Brelade's Bay. Sweeping up the blankets, boules and Max and Lucy, we made a dash for the nearest shelter. And right at the top of the steps from the beach was the new entrance to the Golden Sands café bar, doors wide open. I couldn't resist it - epecially as the kids were halfway inside already, leaving a trail of wet Crocs-sized footprints behind them.

I must admit that Golden Sands had faded into the St Brelade's Blur – what I call all those places you walk past on your way from Pizza Express to the Wayside, but never register. Go on, see how many you can name - there's L'Horizon, Tam's Bar, a Chinese takeaway, a beach shop, a café and ... the Golden Sands Hotel. The hotel's recently had a makeover, turning it into the sort of 3-star you'd expect on Jersey's most beautiful beach - contemporary in a classic sort of way, but still comfortable.

The Café Bar runs along the front of the hotel, with tables set up beside picture windows that slide open, so you get all the benefits of the sea air without having to get sand between your toes. As for the menu, well it's nice and dependable, serving everything from brunchytype breakfasts and sandwiches to steaks and sea bass, with a children's menu offering mini versions of some of the main courses. The staff didn't seem to notice the trail of sand we'd


walked in – and were incredibly friendly, full of recommendations for food and wine. We ordered steak with pepper sauce for frazzled Husband, the seared scallops for me and for Max and Lucy the fish goujons. We were expecting pretty standard fare - after all we'd just dashed into the first place we found - but our lunch turned out to be absolutely delicious. The steak was tasty and tender with a delicious creamy peppercorn sauce served on the side – just what the Husband had asked for. The scallops were plump and juicy, and came on a long plate with spicy grilled chorizo and a piquant finely-chopped salsa. The flavours were fresh and clean and the whole dish was beautifully presented. There was even a bowl of buttery Jersey Royals on the side to soak up the spicy chorizo oil. And surprise, surprise, the childrens' fish goujons were homemade. No Captain Birds Eye for the Golden Sands chef, he'd used lovely portions of unseasoned fresh fish and a light - almost beery - batter to make the most delicious mini fish n' chips I'd ever tasted. I have to admit this was one time I was hoping the children wouldn't finish their food... Thankfully the children's portions were very generous – leaving plenty of chip-stealing chances.

I shouldn't have been surprised by the attention to detail — the Golden Sands is part of the Dolan Hotel Group, which also includes Hotel Cristina and the gorgeous Somerville Hotel with its award-winning Tides restaurant. I found out later that the head chef at the Golden Sands, Chris, had learned his skills at the Somerville before moving on to create his own brasserie-style menu for the Golden Sands. It's obvious he cares a lot about taste — highly-spiced dishes like his Moroccan lamb tagine and smoked haddock and clam chowder sit alongside light and fresh fish dishes like the salmon with asparagus and the pan-fried sea bass.

The attention to detail continued into the dessert selection, with our Movenpick ice-creams arriving in black glass sundae dishes with fresh strawberries, berry coulis and homemade shortbread. They were absolutely delicious – Husband and I even had a tussle over who got the last spoon of Mint Choc Chip.

It made me wonder why I'd always walked past the Golden Sands when the views were stunning and I could sit beside sliding windows with the sea air streaming in, enjoy great service and delicious food. I can't wait to try the platter of calamari with a glass of sparkling Taltarni next time—like the couple on the next table, hotel residents who couldn't believe their luck at finding such a great hotel. So don't let the tourists get all the best views—make the most of this still relatively undiscovered corner of St Brelade's, and try lunch at the Golden Sands for yourself.

It made me wonder why I'd always walked past the Golden Sands when the views were stunning and I could sit beside sliding windows with the sea air streaming in, enjoy great service and delicious food.



Cheesed off

Local cheese producers cleaned up at the first World Jersey Cheese Festival - the first ever taste-off to pay homage to cheese made completely from Jersey milk. An impressive seven out of the seventeen categories went to local cheese makers. The judges, including a UK queso-expert as well and homegrown chefs and foodies, did blind tastings of ninety entries from ten countries across the globe: from the USA, Denmark, Sweden, UK, Australia, Holland and Rwanda. That's a lot of cheese.

Classic Herd from Manor Farm in St Peter won four golds - two for their Camembert, one for their peppered brie and one for their new semihard cheese, Jersey Cache. The Dairy's new Le Fronmage mature cheddar got lucky and unknown home producer, Julie Vétier, got two prizes. All excellent going for an Island that, until recently, had no history of cheese production. If you are wondering who got to go home with the big one, it went to the aptly named Jan Dirk Van Der Voort to the soundtrack of Spandau Ballet.

creating a relaxed and comfortably civilised restaurant that is perfect for a light lunch and a glass of rosé or somewhere to get seriously tucked in while watching it all going on on the beach. Heaven.

Pareddownsimplicity is to be recommended. Take a trip to Vom Fass in Voisin's to sharpen up your taste buds. Found in the hallowed halls of Selfridges and Harrods, they specialise in excellent ranges of oils - nut and olive (some so virginal they have never looked upon a man) and delicious balsamic vinegars. Taste everything, but strongly recommended is the delicious olive oil flavoured with lemon, basil and rosemary. Clean, concentrated and utterly delicious, mix it with aged balsamic vinegar. Or try pistachio oil with raspberry balsamic or chilli oil with mango balsamic vinegar the possibilities are endless. The staff are charming and helpful and will let you taste away and advise on mixing.

Whilst the barbie season is upon us, try Soy Vay Cha Cha Chinese Chicken Salad Dressing for its name if nothing else. An allnatural salad dressing with the nutty taste of sesame oil, it combines pressed soy and sesame oils, vinegar, sugar, toasted sesame seeds, oriental hot mustard and ginger.



property profile: two up, two down.



property profile two up, two down.

Situated in a country lane on the outskirts of St John, it's difficult to believe that this beautiful, stylish and spacious home was once a run-down, derelict "two-up-two-down". The owners of No. 1 Oak Villas, Barry and Cindy Wilby, have spent seven long years rebuilding and renovating this 1930's property into their ideal family home.

The project started in 2001, when the property suddenly came up for sale whilst Barry, who is a partner and contracts manager of building company, R.J. Le Sueur, was working on the restoration of No. 3 Oak Villas. "When the house came onto the market, I saw it as the perfect opportunity to take on a challenge of my own. Despite first impressions, I knew the property had really great potential to become a lovely home for me, Cindy and our three daughters. However, when I first approached Cindy with the idea she was very reluctant!".

Due to the extreme state of disrepair, Cindy wasn't convinced that the plans would be a success. After much deliberation, and a promise to the family that he would transform the house beyond all recognition, Barry finally decided to make an offer, which was accepted straight away. The building work began the very next day after the deal went through court. The Wilbys were determined to move into the new house as soon as possible!

Over the next 5 months Barry spent every single minute of his spare time completing the first stage of the development, with the help of his colleagues. Sometimes working up to 100 hours a week, including his daytime job, Barry was permanently exhausted and various setbacks made him almost want to give it all up.

"We experienced a period of extremely bad weather. After digging all of the foundations out by hand, torrential rain and high winds forced all the ground to collapse back in, meaning I had to start all over again. It poured down relentlessly for two straight months, making it a long, uphill struggle. From laying the foundations to placing the final tile on the roof, we were constantly battling against the elements. However, our perseverance and hard work paid off when our new home was ready to move into."

Less than two years after the family settled in, Barry and Cindy decided to begin stage two of the development - building a ga-



rage on the side of the house and extending one of the existing upstairs bedrooms. Cindy was concerned about additional building work but this time, it was more straightforward.

"Although we were very content with the house, we felt that we were ready to make further improvements by creating more living space. We knew we really needed a garage for extra storage space and that gave us the opportunity to extend above the new garage. Although Barry was again working through high winds and cold weather, the process as a whole was far less stressful and undemanding. And our youngest daughter loved her new big bedroom!"

The family had a break from major building work for the next couple of years, but that didn't mean a complete rest! "Barry isn't happy unless he has at least one project on the go at any time – he is definitely a perfectionist! However, from 2004 to 2006, we only had cosmetic work done, such as redecorating the bathroom, kitchen and

bedrooms. The front and back gardens aren't left alone for long either!"

Stage three began in April 2006, taking approximately 6 months to complete, when the ground floor of the property was given an extensive refurbishment. The wall between the existing dining room and living room was demolished to form a large family room. The old kitchen became the new dining room and yet another extension was added to accommodate a generous kitchen, utility room and shower room.

"This development was the most challenging, because simple everyday tasks became a mission! We were living off microwave meals cooked in the makeshift kitchen/diner and Barry was again working day and night under halogen lamps in the freezing cold. But the end result was absolutely more than worth the wait!"

Impressively, Barry crafted the large country-style kitchen entirely by hand, a seemingly endless but undeniably rewarding feat. The stunning, intricate designs of the cabinets are complimented by French terracotta floor tiles and an Aga-style Rangemaster. The vast window that runs the length of the garden side wall and a great roof window allows for ample sunlight during the day, making the room even more light and airy than it already is.

When it came to the décor scheme, Barry and Cindy were definitely in agreement. "The whole house is decorated and furnished with neutral, pastel shades. We love oak furniture, huge mirrors, pictures and lamps, so you will find plenty of these throughout the house! We like old fashioned, retrostyle accessories and these also feature through the home, especially in the kitchen and family room. We really enjoy furniture shopping, even now that our home is 'complete', and are always eager to discover one-off pieces."

Though saying that the property is now finally finished isn't entirely true. Barry's itchy feet don't give him much peace, and this year he has been working on stage 4 – the installation of an attractive brick porch at the front of the house and a charming makeover of the back garden, which already features a gazebo and fish pond with a foun-

"Living on a building site can be trying at times, but the reward at the end of it far outweighs the cons. Barry has well and truly exceeded his promise to us – he gave us his word that he would transform the house beyond recognition, but he has gone above and beyond this. I had no idea such a run-down, empty shell could ever turn into the lovely home we have today."





they then use to "sign" for payments and many other financial transactions. It seamlessly links to VoicePay, the consumerfacing voice-payments system that was announced in May 2007 by Voice Commerce Group.

Voice Transact will aparently enable financial institutions to lower risk, communicate far more securely and efficiently with their customers while providing increased confidence and reductions in fraudulent transactions. Significantly, it also transfers the signing responsibility back to the consumer, in exactly the same way that cheques are signed. Free legal advice from Voisin

Local law firm, Voisin, has partnered with the Citizens Advice Bureau to offer Jersey residents free legal advice. The free clinics, which launch on 3rd July at the offices of Voisin in Don Road, will be held twice a month at Voisin's offices and at the Citizens Advice in St Paul's Community Centre.

The clinics are aimed at people who may have personal injury claims to pursue as a result of accidents at work or injuries from a car accident, for example. Advice can also be offered to those who are concerned that any medical treatment they have received has been negligent. Voisin are giving all potential claimants the opportunity to explore the avenues open to them and offering guidance with regards the next steps. The clinics will operate on an appointment basis.

Francis Le Gresley, Citizens Advice Bureau, commented: "Nearly all the work of the Citizens Advice Bureau is about helping people to safeguard their legal rights, either through the Bureau's own work or by directing clients elsewhere. Over the last few years the legal profession in Jersey has developed a greater degree of specialisation so it is important that, when we refer clients for legal advice, we adopt a selective approach, choosing lawyers by reference to their particular expertise.

Green post

Jersey Post goes green with its air con Jersey Post is leading the way in the Island by replacing all its air conditioning with an environmentally friendly system. Many air conditioning systems currently use CFCs and other ozone depleting gases known as HCFCs (hydrochlorofluorocarbons) which cause global warming. New legislation is phasing out the use of these refrigerant gases, in particular R22 gas, by 2015.

Jersey Post will be removing all HCFCs from the Rue des Pres office air conditioning systems in June. Head of Facilities, Matt Bougourd said: "Although there is still a while to go before this new legislation begins, we felt it was important to change these systems now to minimise our environmental impact Jersey Post is committed to protecting the environment and reducing global warming and this is just one of many measures we plan to take in the coming months."

Jargon Busting

We're here to help. The world of finance is full of words, acronyms and other jargon which often need explaining. To help you along we have put together this 'Jargon Buster' section to help unravel the words of finance.

This month Q-R:

Qualification - Requirements for certification established by a recognised standard setting

Resources - Materials, people or equipment and machinery needed to produce goods and services.

Restructuring - When an organisation, business or process is reorganised.

Revenue - Income, particularly for a company.

Salary - A fixed regular payment for work made on a fortnightly or monthly basis by an employer to an employee.

Sector - A distinct part of an economy, society or sphere of activity.

Self-employed - Workers who work for themselves at their main job.

Shareholder - An owner of shares in a company.

Shares - The equal parts into which a company's capital is divided.

Skill - Something you learn and are good at; the ability to do something consistently well. Skills can be developed and improved. Skills can be gained through education, work or life experience. Being skilled at something can also depend on personal qualities; for example, being a practical person as opposed to a creative person.

Skill shortage - A term used to describe a range of different situations where an employer finds it difficult to find an appropriately skilled person. Skill shortage may be used to describe a genuine skill shortage: When employers find it very hard to fill vacancies because there are not enough job seekers with the required skills, or skill gaps: When employers are able to find people but they have only some, not all, of the skills required.

The Importance of Professional Qualifications

Kerri McMurray, who currently works as a Fee and Billing Executive at Barclays Wealth in Jersey, has discovered how important taking professional qualifications can be in building a successful career in the Finance Industry.

Having left Hautlieu at the age of 16, Kerri did temporary work for a while before joining Barclays Wealth as a Trainee Executive. Not having undertaken A-levels, and without having attained a degree at university, Kerri decided to strengthen her CV by pursuing a professional qualification. She explored the various qualifications open to her and discussed her options with her manager, who recommended that she take the 'Certificate of Offshore Administration' (COA).

"I thought that the COA would prove beneficial to me as I hadn't attained A-levels or a degree," explains Kerri. "There were a number of courses I considered but it was obvious that this one was right for me. It's a really well recognised qualification within the local offshore environment and it was obvious that it would open up many more opportunities for me in Trust work that wouldn't have been available before."

So far, Kerri has completed two modules of the course – 'Trust & Company Accounts' and 'Regulatory Environment' – and she is currently awaiting her results from those exams. She plans to start the next one, 'Introduction to Trust and Company Administration', later this year.

Before she gains the full qualification, she has to complete all five modules. Whilst two of those must be compulsory courses, three of them are optional, meaning that there is a certain amount of flexibility within the qualification as a whole.

Offered through Highlands College, the course has been taught in a three hour session one evening per week. Each module lasts ten weeks, with a weekend available for revision at the end

of each. Whilst Kerri has found this reasonably demanding, she has still been able to fit it in easily with work and social commitments.

"Although it's certainly been a lot of hard work, I've been given plenty of support along the way," adds Kerri. "As well as financing my studies, Barclays Wealth have provided me with sufficient study leave to revise. Also, my colleagues who had already completed the course have helped me out by explaining parts that I was unsure of!"

Committing to undertaking a professional qualification has undoubtedly put Kerri in good stead. Despite the hard work and long weekends of revision, doing the COA has not only helped her in her current role, it has proved to be a real boost in progressing her career in Trusts. "I've really enjoyed the modules that I've studied up to now," enthuses Kerri. "I would definitely recommend this to anyone wanting to pursue a career in Trusts."

This was a great opportunity for Claire to extend her skills as part of the treasury team but in a different and exciting location – something that, with her passion for travel, was a really attractive proposition.



THE GENERATION Y'ERS, DIGITAL NATIVES BORN BETWEEN 1979 & 2001, A.K.A. MILLENIALS, THE GOOGLE GENERATION AND THE MARTINI GENERATION ARE SET TO INHERIT THE BUSINESSES OF TODAY. WHAT MAKES THESE BOSSES OF TOMORROW TICK? WHO ARE THEY AND HOW DO EMPLOYERS ATTRACT THEM?

They are young, university-educated, IT literate, assertive, passionate about new experiences, anti-commitment, and consider themselves to be in great demand on the job market. In summary they work to fit their lifestyles. Employers, however, see them as massively over-estimating their own abilities, high maintenance, thinking in the short term, fickle and greedy - in short, they are "graduate divas". This melting pot of intergenerational tensions poses significant recruitment and management issues. It's likely that the over 40's leaders need to understand this apparent "me, now!" focus, and that the Y'ers need to understand that the X'ers insights and depth of work experiences are priceless, and up for sharing.

Surveys found that those employers that present themselves as professional, caring and fun have a much higher chance of attracting Gen Y. Have you asked yourself recently whether you are using the right channels for recruiting Gen Y? Did you know that of the Y-ers 75% have a Facebook account, 76% use instant messaging, and 44% read blogs? With such a techno-savvy audience, no prizes for guessing that your company website


has the greatest influence in their decisions to apply for employment, and their peer group's opinion counts; you've struck gold if you can get your employees to refer their friends.


Once you have them in the workplace, they may be demanding, they may also battle with the concept of "hard work" but if your company really means what it says about the "war for talent" and being an "employer of choice" what are they doing to retain and engage their new recruits? As far as this phenomenon of Work 2.0, (work in the 21 Century) experts suggest that it's employers who need to catch up. There is a new social contract being drawn up, based on short-term commitment, portfolio careers, flexibility, and ambition.

And it's the future that companies should be concerned about. IBM's study of 400 companies worldwide revealed a deep concern over the current and projected shortage of future leaders, a shocking 75% citing this as a critical issue in their organizations. Given the explosive growth in up-and-coming markets, and the retirement of key people in more mature economies, are companies placing their futures at risk?



It's clear that organisations will need to seek out new and innovative ways to manage talent by broadening their focus to include the entire employee lifecycle from recruitment to resignation. This will involve much greater emphasis on flexible working and technology with remote working, social networking tools, employee generated content websites, and a presence in virtual worlds. It's likely that there will be greater emphasis on targeting talent and reaching out to alternative labour pools, such as older workers, corporate alumni, and home workers.

My name is Matt Michel and I am a researcher for Altis, a hedge fund based in Jersey. I finished university and went travelling coming back to the island in 2005 and started working for a blue chip bank as an analyst. I quickly realised the job wasn't for me, I wanted more freedom in my work and was lucky to find Altis, who had just relocated to the island from London. That was over two years ago now and thanks to the close-knit atmosphere and vitality of the company, I still enjoy each day as much as my first.

A hedge fund is a special type of fund that buys (makes profit from buying a contract when it is cheap and selling when it has increased in value) stocks/commodities etc. but can also sell too, e.g. a hedge fund may believe that oil will drop in value over the coming months and may profit from this by borrowing barrels of oil (e.g. from a large holder like a refinery) and then selling them immediately at current market value. If the hedge fund was right and the oil does drop in value he can buy it back at a cheaper price (giving it back to the refinery) and profit from the price differential. Altis have taken this approach one step further and built a mathematical model that predicts future price movements and programmatically trades markets 24 hours a day. Hedge funds are a dynamic area to work in and Altis is no exception, if like me you want to work in an exhilarating and stimulating environment then apply to a hedge fund, there is no humdrum here!

As a research analyst my work is split into two areas. Firstly, I develop our in-house research software: by programming in C# I build custom analytical tools that are used to analyse patterns in the markets. I had little programming experience before joining Altis but found that I greatly enjoy it and have now become a keen programmer. The second part of my job is using these tools to develop new indicators or improve on existing ones - we may wish to develop certain aspects of our trading or just want to try out a new idea. Testing starts on a small subset of markets and if successful escalates, until eventually it is ready to be included in our trading strategy. It is very rewarding to develop an indicator and know that it makes a positive difference to the company's profits and, ultimately, the money in my pocket at the end of the month!

I am involved with the audit of clients' financial statements, typically within the funds, private equity and trust & company arenas.

Working in an office was not my original plan having worked in the marine industry before starting at PwC. However, as audits are typically undertaken at client/administrator premises throughout the Island, I am not in the same place for more than a couple of weeks before moving on. This means I experience a variety of different environments, with each client bringing new challenges on a daily basis.

A typical day starts with the 10 minute walk to work (passing the bakery for breakfast if need be!), arriving with enough time to check e-mails and a quick review of the tasks for the day ahead before meeting up with the other members of the team (normally 2 or 3) to head out of the office. The teams I work in change on a regular basis with each new audit engagement, this means I am constantly working with new people from a variety of interest backgrounds and places.

Each day varies and I can honestly say that I am constantly learning new skills. Tasks undertaken in one day involve anything from understanding complex transactions to discussing client procedures around expense claims. I meet with all levels of client/administrator staff. Jersey has proved a great place to get a good insight into how some of the leading offshore financial entities are going about their daily business.

At the end of the day there's time for a quick team catch up then we reply to any e-mails that have arrived throughout the day.

Although I work in a team, there's a lot of scope for taking individual responsibility for key areas of the audit and constantly expanding your experience. At busier times, this can involve working some long hours, but the short distance to/from home and being just five minutes from the sea does help!...Providing the tide is right, I usually have enough time to head down to my boat for a quick trip around the bay, stopping off at St.Aubins for a drink or dinner before heading back into town.



The tax department is a close, tight-knit team, and I can honestly say that whenever I have a query, or need some help, another member of the team will always go out of their way to assist in showing or guiding me to the answer.

Lunch tends to depend on what the weather is doing, and how rich we feel! So we either hit a café or restaurant for lunch, or try to find a bench in the sun. If it's raining, I'll usually run out to grab some soup and then sit at my desk with the newspaper. As the firm has grown (we've just welcomed our 100th employee), it has been great to make a group of close friends within the office (and not just in tax) to go for lunch and socialise with.

The afternoon is spent continuing through the to do list, and anything else that comes up, until 5:15, when (much to the jealousy of my audit counterparts, who tend to stay later) I finish for the day.

Whether I hit the gym, go to the cinema, out for a drink or head out for some fun at sea, I tend to have a hectic post-work schedule – which is the way I like to be – until it's time for bed, and the cycle starts again!



No one day is ever the same at BDO, from being out on audits in Jersey, stock taking in Guernsey to flying over to the Mainland visiting clients - it's always varied. 



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The Alfa Romeo 147 has been around a while now, and it has always been a pretty car, but in the Collezione edition the designers have made it beautiful.

They've added leather seats, big 17" alloys. dropped and firmed up the suspension, and added a couple of other little touches that make it stunning inside and out.

When you are choosing a new car it really is so often about the character, and the new interior styling of this edition gives the 147 a plush luxurious feel that exceeds most similar cars. It reminds me of something much more expensive, and it makes a big difference. It makes you feel special. No, really! It does! It isn't like just getting into the car – you look forward to being in your little piece of luxury.

Driving the 147 Collezione is fun, with firm sporty suspension, and excellent handling through the corners. The model tested was the 1.6 petrol 5 door, with another delightful design feature – the rear door handles are mounted high up on the door pillars. A small detail but a really nice touch. And in the rear the leather continues, maintaining the comfort and quality feel.

The instrumentation and controls are all pretty straight forward and in the right places. All models have what I think is the one essential - air conditioning, and nice audio controls on the steering wheel for the very good sound system.

A long time ago Alfa had a reputation for unreliability and poor quality, but that is long gone. Over recent years Alfa has undergone a similar quality transformation to Fiat, where they literally stopped production, tore up the rule book, and started again. This shows not only in the build quality, but the design too. It will be really tough to find a better looking car in this category.

Also and unlike most, if not all, manufacturers all Alfas now arrive pre-checked and ready for the customer. They don't need the usual pdi – (pre delivery inspection) that traditionally is required before new cars are handed over to the customer, where they are cleaned up, checked that everything is working. That is all done after leaving the factory at a purpose built centre. Just another element in the whole quality control process.

So, if you want something gorgeous, luxurious, and well priced, take a look, you may well be surprised.

Ace Café Racer Triumph Thruxton

I was just too young, or just not quite old enough, depending how you look at it to fully appreciate the era of café racer motorcycles, but the imagery sticks in my head, and I do remember hearing with awe the "ton up" boasts of those reaching 100mph on a bike, the Sixties' equivalent of warp speed and at that time of rebel and rebellion a pretty amazing feat.

And Café racers were the bikes and riders, often leather-clad Rockers, who used to congregate and ride between transport cafes – with the main aim to reach the ton as quickly as possible. The bikes were modified for speed rather than comfort, with slim tanks, low handlebars and footrests mounted further back than usual, giving a prone 🚜 streamlined riding position.

There was even a game – they'd play a record on a café's jukebox and the challenge was to start when the record started, get to 100mph, turn round and get back before the record ended. Doesn't sound that hard except it seems to have originated at the Ace Café, a popular transport café of the time on the old north circular road in London (it's still there) and involved a 3 mile round trip to the Hangar Lane roundabout and back, and in those days you were lucky if a song lasted more than two minutes. But they'd do it.

And now, with Triumph's regained prominence within the motorcycle industry, the café racer is back. Thankfully not with the oily, leaky, machines of the Sixties, but with a new twenty first century version; The Triumph Bonneville Thruxton.

Superficially almost identical to the café racers of old, the new Triumph Thruxton is everything that café racers were, and modern bikes now are.

In fact, it is easy to wonder at first glance if you are looking at a new bike or a restoration. The styling is perfect, the engine seemingly (but not) the

same parallel twin of the originals, the seat, the tank, all just right. Even the fuel injection is concealed in fake carburettor housings. But like so many things you compare to a memory they are in fact not the same, just very similar, and in this case, much, much

It's everything that café racers were, and modern bikes now are ,,

The Thruxton is modern and sophisticated but it retains perfectly the character of the Sixties. With the low handlebars and swept back footrests the riding position is low and very comfortable. The beautifully balanced 885cc engine pulls extraordinarily well, is smooth and almost totally vibration free. The Triumph gearbox as usual is superb, as is the steering and suspension.

Riding the Thruxton brings back what motorbikes used to feel like. It feels effortless with a delightful connection with the road that feels composed and confident. Sweeping corners want to go on for ever. You feel like you should be wearing goggles and appearing in an old black & white photograph mounted on the mantle piece.

The Sixties were a time of huge change, after the hardships of the post war years, the casting off of the old conformist ways. And to some, with that bloom of change came the need, regardless of whether there was a cause, to be a rebel.

fitness

Workout for outdoor fitness

Steve Longstaffe



One of the great advantages of the spring/summer season is the ability to do some outdoor training, and utilise the higher quality air. It is possible with very little equipment, to give your body a very rigorous workout by using the natural terrain. This month I will be showing you a number of outdoor leg exercises I do with my clients, as well as a good plyometric upper body exercise. Do however be careful outside as some obstacles are made of hard surfaces.



Plyometric Hurdles

(Press-up, Squat Thrust and Jump)

With this exercise you can either use mini hurdles such as shown here, or any other marker to jump over. Begin with two press-ups, then two squat thrusts, and finally jump sideways into the next section you have marked out. Repeat as many times as necessary in a row until you require a breather.

Hops

An exercise which requires balance as well as power. Standing on one leg use a hurdle to hop over, once again landing on one leg. Once you improve you can try side hops, as well as back hops.

Squat Jumps

You can use any reasonably large step or kerb for this. Simply from the squat position, use the power of your legs to jump up onto the step and land in the squat position. Then jump backwards and land in the same position ready to begin again.

Slope Sprint

If you can find a good slope somewhere, these are great for sprinting up, to both test the legs, and the heart and lungs. Use the way back down to the bottom for your recovery. A slow jog will do, then you can really push yourself on the way back up again.

Steps Sprint

Finally for the fairly fit amongst us is the step sprint, the same rules apply as in the slope sprint, but be extra careful when coming down. As you get fitter and your stamina increases just add in an extra set now and again to really test yourself.

Enjoy the good weather and I will be back soon with more training tips!



Ever a fan of good, clean fun, Arnie took a ride down to Les Mielles this month to try and master their Segway Rally. Can somebody so top-heavy overcome the Segway's ability to stay balanced? Read on to find out more...

You know, if I can give you one bit of advice, it's to always be wary of robots. But that said, these Segways aren't really even robots. But if they WERE robots, I think they'd be quite friendly. So don't worry.

If you've not heard of Segways by now then you've probably been living in Saddam's old holiday home, but just in case you have been hiding from humanity here's a quick run down as to what they're all about: Put simply, it's a electronically powered two-wheeled vehicle that uses some kind of clever computer technology connected to a gyroscope that keeps it upright at all times by regulating the speed and direction of the motors attached to each wheel over 100 times each second. it propells you forward, if you lean backward it slows you to a halt and then makes you travel backward and if you lean the steering left or right... you guessed it, you turn in that direction.
