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

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

Parlez Ponglish?

Britain's million Poles have made up a secret slang that no-one but them can understand.

The mixture of Polish and English - dubbed Ponglish - has developed so quickly it has become a cult language with young immigrants.

UK Poles no longer pay 'podatki' (taxes), but British 'taksy'; they travel by 'tuba' (tube) and they complain about the 'trafik' (traffic).

Ponglish has developed so thoroughly, it already has its own entry in the Polish version of Wikipedia.

The custard cream has finally made it into the Oxford English Dictionary - after 100 years.


Literary experts decided it was time the vanilla-filled snack was included when nine out of 10 people voted it their top biscuit in a survey.

Baur was an organic chemist and food storage technician who specialised in research and development and quality control for Procter & Gamble, who still make Pringles.

With the folks behind him in line laughing hysterically, the man glared at the Virgin attendant, gritted his teeth and said, 'F... You!'






From one island to another







letters from london

Letters from London

After attending three major gigs in one week, visiting The British Library to view an ancient Indian manuscript, and checking out a new exhibition of paintings by Brit Chantal Joffe, our London based insider Nina Hervé still found time to catch up with Jersey born musicians Chris and Jim of Velofax to find out how much they're looking forward to a bit of Turkish Delight at Jersey Live this month.

VELOFAX

Jersey born musicians, James Bell and Chris Wackrow of Velofax moved to London to pursue their dream of making a dent in the music industry. I caught up with these musical alchemists to see how they've progressed and what their plans are for the future.

Firstly, how did you get into making music?

Chris: I was forced into it by my parents. No not really, neither of them are particularly musical, although my dad is a great pub singer and my mum introduced me to some classic albums such as Paul Simon's 'Graceland'. I got into playing guitar through my good friend Ivor when I was aged about 17. My first song was 'Dear Prudence', played on two strings, in an hour and then that night I borrowed a guitar belonging to my dear friend James 'Slow Hand' Brennan. I didn't give it back until I had mastered how to play it. But of course I'm still learning, the guitar is a versatile instrument!

Jim: I actually started playing the guitar before playing drums. I was seven years old when my mum, who happened to be looking in the JEP, generously offered to get me something from the small ads in the back of the paper. The choice was either guitar lessons or a second-hand trampoline! I chose wisely and plumped for music. I later also took up the drums at the ripe old age of ten.

In the three years since moving to london, what have been the highlights?

Chris: We've had some great gigs supporting bands we admire, Menomena being a recent and memorable one. But the greatest highlight for me is when people approach me after playing and they get what we are doing, love it and come back again ... with a friend!

Jim: The main thing has been recording our album last year in East London, getting it released and seeing it on the shelves in the shops. Plus we're continually playing gigs and have had slots at some great venues including a recent event at superclub Fabric. Playing live on air at BBC 6 Music was also a highlight earlier this year.

Has living in london influenced your writing?

Chris: Yes in the sense that the city gives a sense of freedom and sometimes chaos. I think this has an effect on my lyrics, but not as much as say 'I'm not in Love' by 10-CC.

What's inspiring you at the moment?

Chris: New stuff I like includes Studio and Black Affair. As for oldies, I'm digging Neil Young, The The, Japan and in particular Grace Jones. I'm really into the musicians that she used on her Compass Point sessions - it's a brilliant mixture of dub reggae, disco and lovely 80's soft synth sounds. Everyone should own the Grace Jones compilation 'Island Life'.

Jim: My favourite new band of the moment is MGMT. Their music sounds like cosmic 70's rock and synth-tastic 80's pop recorded in the present by a band from the future. As for older stuff, I recently got hold of a bootleg copy of Kraftwerk's third album 'Ralf and Florian', it's a pastoral kraut rock masterpiece and it's a crying shame it's not available on general release. You can find it if you know where to look in London. By the way, we're going to play tracks by some of our influences on a podcast on www.music.je that will be on-line soon.

Have you got any new material coming out soon?

Jim: We are currently working on demos of our new material. We're recording these demos ourselves using a laptop running Pro Tools. I'm fascinated by the black art of recording and producing records. It appeals to the geek in me and I'd like to get a white coat to wear whilst at work like the engineers at Abbey Road in the '6os. By the time you read this, you should be able to hear some of these new songs on our MySpace page and you can hear them when we play at Jersey Live at the end of August.

What are you looking forward to most about playing at jersey live?

Chris: The rider! The Warrens have promised us pistachio Turkish delight, lemon sorbet, and two kegs of Breda. Bless 'em! More importantly I'm looking forward to playing our new material out of a big facckkk off PA. Playing on a large stage is fun and also there is the benefit of being more than six feet away from Kevin 'houmous fingers' Pinel. I'm looking forward to it, it's gonna be soundos and proper quality and that. It's the big time blud innit...

The Ramayana

For the first time ever, more than 120 gorgeous paintings from the British Library's lavishly illustrated 17th-century Indian manuscripts are on display in a dazzling and enchanting exhibition of one of the most important literary works of ancient India, The Ramayana.

This ancient story is about Prince Rama's quest to rescue his beloved wife Sita from the clutches of King Ravana with the help of an army of monkeys headed by Sugriva. The brightly-coloured scenes are packed with incident: battle scenes with 10-headed King Ravana, the monkey kingdom of Kishkindha, white elephants and exotic flora, and finally the moment when Rama and Sita are reunited.

The exhibition explores the story of Ramayana and how it has been represented and retold over the centuries in different countries and cultures, up to and including the present day. It is still regularly performed in dance, drama and shadow puppetry all of which are taking place throughout the exhibition period as the British Library have created an exciting events programme around this timeless story.

Chantal Joffe

British artist, Chantal Joffe is well known for her expressive paintings of predominantly female figures and being drawn to the freakishly beautiful, often taking her inspiration from fashion images. Joffe was recently given privileged access to personally photograph catwalk models backstage at Paris Fashion Week. Tuesday 24th June – Radiohead, Victoria Park, Hackney

Kicking off with an epic 15 steps, the first half of the set focused on their magnificent latest album In Rainbows. Technically "Emo" is a term for a counter culture that has derived from the genre of "Emocore".

"Emocore" is a musical hybrid of the hardcore and punk genres, however "Emocore" incorporates an emotional edge to these particular styles. Pretty complicated...

The genre was recently attacked by the Daily Mail as it was referred to as a "suicide cult" and blamed it for the suicide of a 13 year old girl in Kent, this triggered a protest that saw fans of emo marching from Hyde Park to the papers' offices.




When you have a world-class offering, price sensitivity goes out the sash window. The market is there, trust me. Someone just needs to tap it.



Having brought bold and colourful gemstones back to the West End, 'the ultimate diamond geezer' tells Claire Campbell about his inspiration, extravagance and some fashion faux pas.



Stephen, your jewellery designs have a glamorous rock and roll feel, is there anything else that inspires you?

Over the past few years I feel in a position where my life, my likes and my interests have become so entwined with my work that I can genuinely say a client is buying into a piece of Stephen Webster. A lot of my musical heroes have become clients and friends. My home, much to my family's exasperation is full of stuffed animals, skulls and exotic bugs. I have been lucky enough to be asked to customise a Harley Davidson and a Gibson Les Paul guitar. As well as my day job I am a columnist for Russian Rolling Stone magazine. As you can see I have a few influences.

I believe you have many celebrity fans that you design for, but are you a fan of anyone at the moment?

I like to think that I am open to all kinds of music. As well as all my old favourites Bowie, Roxy music, The Clash etc, I am currently listening to The Kills, The Raconteurs and The Ting Tings.

You have been designing for over 30 years, have you got any fashion disasters you can tell us about?

All my fashion disasters have been about my clothes rather than my designing. I lived in Canada for three years which is where I hit a particular low point. I refuse to talk about it even to this day. But my brother said at the time "how could a young guy with a reasonable sense of style lose it so completely in such a short time"

If you weren't designing jewellery, what would you be doing?

If I wasn't designing jewellery I would spend more time managing my band The Rotten Hill Gang.

If diamonds are your best friends girls, you really should get out more?

What is the most extravagant piece you have ever designed?

The most extravagant piece I have designed is not about the mere price but more about the audacity of it all. An 80 year old Californian who had been advised by her doctor to quit smoking commissioned me to make an exact replica cigarette in 18ct gold and enamel. I used fire opal as the business end and a piece of mammoth bone as the filter. She could always be found on a bike machine at her gym complete with personal trainer and the placebo in a long cigarette holder until the day she passed over to the great ashtray in the sky.

Are diamonds really a girls best friend?

If diamonds are your best friends girls you really should get out more - diamonds are lovely but oranges are not the only fruit.

Having played a part in making jewellery fashionable and wearable for men, where do you see the direction of the jewellery world heading in the near future?

The trend for men's jewellery has acquired so much momentum that the only way forward is for it to get more and more creative and interesting. The stigma now gone, it's about individualising ones self by choosing pieces that will provoke comment and therefore make the wearer feel good about their decisions.

And finally, is all that glitters gold?

All that glitters is not gold. Some of it is fools gold as we well know. Also, not all gold glitters.





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


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been shortchanged We've curry houses. Decades of gloopy oversweetened westernized curries may have sent chicken tikka masala rocketing to the top of the 'favourite British dish' list, but it's come at a price. We've missed out on real Eastern cooking.

Saffrons, the new restaurant at the Hotel de France aims to change all that. Linked closely to the hotel's Ayurvedic spa, the restaurant mixes the Ayurvedic philosophy of balance in all things together with the best local produce, and comes up with a menu that's quite frankly, sublime. The descriptions are mouth watering, the dishes have depth and complexity, and the ingredients are the best. Quality local products like hand-dived scallops, line-caught sea bass and seasonal local vegetables come straight to your plate via the spice route. Chef Bobby Geetha became an expert in spa wellness cuisine at the luxury spa resort Taj Green Cove in Kerala, and brings the same approach to Saffrons, presenting food simply using fresh spices rather than slathering on the cream and butter. The result – lighter and healthier dishes, but still with the intense flavours that make Indian cooking so unique. All the taste but none of the cholesterol.

Ayurvedic philosophy says we're all a different combination of three doshas - or personality types - pitta, kapha and vata. When our doshas are out of balance – our health suffers, so Ayurveda is all about getting us balanced again. Many of the spices traditionally used in Eastern cooking - turmeric, cardamom, and cumin to name just a few - are also medicinal, and according to Ayurveda, blends of these spices can help get our doshas back

to normal. Becoming a better person from the inside out sounds perfect to me – especially if it involves eating plenty of delicious food. I took Scarlett, my Ayurvedic expert friend, with me to Saffrons to try the tasting menu. She's such an expert, she claims to be able to tell by a single handshake what dosha you are - according to her, kaphas feel clammy, pittas' hands are hot and sweaty and vatas are cool to the touch. I'm so glad she told me I was a

We started with a vegetable and paneer kebab – paneer is a South Asian cheese – with a garlic rasam and mint chutney. Properly vegetarian, this beautiful dish pairs the sharp


and salty paneer with soft tomato rasam. 'It's gorgeous - like a Bloody Mary with a kick' quipped Scarlett. After a palate cleansing lemon and lime sherbert, we tried the curry

leaf scallops. Each scallop was perfectly cooked and perched on a soft coconut and rice blini. It's spicy, but with a gentle warming heat and an almost healing feel to it. I loved it. 'Of course you do', explained Scarlett, 'You vatas are all the same, all airy-fairy, you just need a bit of warming up'.

The main courses were the local sea bass and a pepper roasted lamb fillet. Seduced by the starters, we couldn't wait to see what treats we'd get for the main course. The sea bass was delicate and delicious, served with foam topped tomatoes, pickled baby artichokes and gorgeous al dente wild asparagus, and it tasted amazing thanks to the aromatic fennel. But our favourite was the lamb. Absolutely beautifully presented, this was a sumptuous dish - rich and meltin-the-mouth, the lamb came with a deep plummy meat jus and a delicately scented mix of broad beans, chickpeas and crunchy almonds. Alongside was a witty Jersey take on sag aloo with discs of Jersey Royals sandwiched with spinach leaves. It was an incredible mix of tastes and flavours - it's been a long time since I've had a dish that good.

We were lucky enough to try a platter of mini desserts, and I would run out of space - and superlatives if I tried to tell you about them. Divine, decadent and beautifully detailed, every one was imaginative, inventive and absolutely amazing. The pomegranate and saffron espuma left Scarlett speechless for once, and the mini pear and truffle fondant... well, it was just incredible. We finished with a proper masala chai – authentic Indian spiced sweet tea - and a world away from a Starbucks chai latte. Restorative and healing, it was just like Mummy-ji would make.

Saffrons' prices may seem on the high side, but that's only because we've got used to 'bargain-basement' Eastern cooking. Mixing the best local produce with individually blended unique spice flavours isn't a cheap option – and it may not suit everyone. It's not 'meat and two veg' and it's definitely not your bog-standard Indian takeaway fare. But for a modern, fresh approach to real Eastern cooking – perfectly balanced in flavour and presentation, Saffrons is hard to beat.



TWO GLUGS & A SPLASH Danny Moisan

Coffee

Well known in Jersey circles, Danny Moian is a chef who knows his mind. This month we kick off the first of our series of 'Dannys Rants'. Aparantly he doesn't like to take any prisoners so watch out!

The eternal search for a decent cup of coffee on my day off seems to always end in disappointment! So here goes, my attempt to teach you how I make the perfect coffee and why 99% of cafes in Jersey manage to cock

I buy my coffee beans from "Cooper's coffee merchant" why? Well to tell you the truth, I was lucky enough to be invited recently by David Warr to look round his coffee house. I was in awe of his enthusiasm and pure love for coffee.

As much as I love food, David's love for his product shines through and the end product is perfect. I use a Bourbon Dark Roast espresso bean, briefly and without wishing to give too many of David's secrets away, a fine blend of Honduras, Ethiopian, Colombian and Indonesian beans all adding their own distinctive element to the perfect blend (Java Semeru, Excelso and SHB.) They are all roasted for 17 minutes at 224c and then fast chilled and delivered to my café.

It is at this point I believe that most people get it wrong! You have to love coffee to make the perfect cup. I keep my beans refrigerated until I need them, only grinding a small amount at a time. My machine is de-scaled daily and the water supply runs through a purifier system. If you take sugar with your coffee only use dark Moscovado soft rich sugar that enhances the coffee flavour and adds a slight molasses taste. Always serve the coffee in a hot cup and preferably cleanse the pallet with still water just before tasting the

It's as simple as that! So why do I dread my day off so much? Most coffee houses I visit cut corners, either purchasing cheaper coffee beans or not treating the product with the care and attention it deserves or simply not loving coffee enough to treat it right and give their customer the best it can be.

I'm sure that there are a few places serving really good coffee and I hope to find them soon otherwise I may just have to work on my day off.

That ends my little rant for this week; I will be having a go at fish suppliers next week so keep your eye out for my weekly rant on food related issues.

How to cook....

Moules Marinere

The most delicious, classic feast that is fresh, clean, super cheap and easier than you think to prepare.

ingredients

500g mussels per person
1 garlic clove, finely chopped
1 or 2 shallots, finely chopped
Knob of butter
Parsley and thyme leaves, picked and
coarsely chopped
Half a glass of dry white wine
120ml double cream
Crusty bread to serve

directions

1.Wash the mussels under cold, running water. Bin any open ones that won't close when tapped against the sink. Pull out any fibrous beards, protruding from the tightly closed shells.

2.Soften the garlic and shallots in the butter with a handful of picked herbs - parley, thyme - in a pan big enough to take all the mussels and be only be half full.

1. Add the mussels and wine, turn up the heat, then cover and steam them open in

their own juices for 3-4 minutes. Give the pan a good shake every now and then.

2. Remove the cooked mussels into a dish and keep warm. Add the cream to the liquid and boil rapidly for 5 mins to reduce.

3. Spoon the moules into four large warmed bowls, ladle over the sauce, sprinkle with parsley and serve with lots of crusty bread for soaking up the creamy juices.

4. Get stuck in. Enjoy with a nice glass or two of something dry, white and chilled.



Juicy Mussels

Those sweet little gems from the sea just got sweeter. Now is the time that the Jersey Oyster Company are harvesting their Bouchot Mussels. Named after the traditional Brittany method of growing on wooden poles, the mussels are filtered by the clean Jersey tides of Grouville Bay. how do you like them apples?



Is it a cider? Is it a sparkling wine? Close, it's Pompette.

Introduced at the West Show only a few weeks ago and a must for fans of cider and sparkling wines or champagnes alike, La Mare Vineyard have let their latest trick from their innovative sleeves.

Keen to further the breadth of Genuine Jersey products and desperate to do their Jersey apples justice, the geniuses at La Mare have changed

the way that they have produced cider since 1980 and enhanced their range by creating a cider that is fine as a champagne and as such is to be enjoyed in a flute. But it isn't merely the presentation that is resplendent of a champagne.

Truly unexpectedly, the first thing that you notice upon tasting are the bubbles. Hundreds of tiny bubbles that instantly make you think of champagne before leading into much of the cider taste that you'd expect yet so delicate and light. At 7% it's got a bit of a kick to it but as much as the final taste somewhat reminded me of one, this is no French farm cider. The secret is in the production.

Once picked, the apples are fed into a hopper, graded and shredded before passing through a fine mesh and series of rollers and being pumped into variable volume chambers that ensure that only the liquid is stored and allows no unnecessary air into the equation. What remains of the apples is ideal for composting.

As the brewing process continues, the necessary yeasts and other ingredients are

added before the cider is bottled, capped and stored on its side. This allows any sediment to settle before the bottle inverted and left neck down so that the sediment is deposited at the 'top' of the bottle. Much like a champagne, the bottles are turned periodically before, and here's the clever bit, the neck end of each bottle is inserted into a chilling device which freezes the top inch or so of the bottle so that when inserted into a clever machine that 'pops' the bottle, the frozen liquid containing the unwanted sediment shoots out leaving just the best bits.

What remains in the bottle is then topped up and given a 'dosage' of around 10ml sugar and brandy solution before a cork is inserted and the bottles make their way to the shop. The whole process takes months and the final result is well worth all of the care and effort that has gone into creating what is an ideal alternative to sparkling wines and a perfect excuse for an afternoon drink in the sunshine. At only £8.95 a bottle there's no excuse not to either - bottoms up!

A buying guide for 'J cats'

As an essential employee, buying a house is no simple matter as you must form a company specifically to buy the property.

The downsides (let's get them out of the way first):

The company can be jointly owned by the essential employee and their spouse but the spouse cannot live there on their own. If the 'J category' employee dies, the spouse has to move out and sell up. Both will need to leave should the essential employee lose the 'J Category' status. Remember, by jointly owning the company, the spouse is

protected financially but doesn't gain residential rights.

Check your status:

Your employer must check with the Housing Minister that you qualify for 'J category' status. After confirmation, instruct your lawyer to begin

Next, reserve a company name with the Jersey Financial Services Commission (JFSC) and inform the estate agent and mortgage provider that it is to be a 'J Category' purchase, advising them of the

The Housing Minister will need an undertaking that there will be no change in the ownership of the company shares without the Minister's consent (unless it is to sell to another J Category) and that the property will be sold out of the company when necessary or transferred into the name of the essential employee once full housing qualification is achieved.

Don't forget the mortgage:

There are two ways this is normally arranged for 'J cats'. The most popular method is for the lender to loan directly to the essential employee and spouse, whilst the company gives a guarantee which is registered in the Royal Court. The alternative is for the mortgage to be provided to the company with the buyers giving guarantees themselves.

The costs:

Because the transaction is more complicated, the costs are higher than those for a normal property transaction. Shop around mortgage lenders and law firms as some, like Crill Canavan, offer discounted fees as well as advice on how to run the company.

As an essential employee you must seek good advice before buying a house. It is a complicated process and your lawyer will ensure that you are fully protected at all stages.

St Helier at a crossroads

The President of the Association of Jersey Architects (AJA), Mike Waddington, believes St Helier now stands at a major crossroads. Mr Waddington, Director of Naish Waddington and President of the AJA, agreed with the current view expressed in the Island Plan Green Paper that 'demand for homes... can be met by the potential to provide homes from within the existing built-up area and through the development of some existing brownfield sites'

St Helier has to become a place where people both choose and are proud to live

in, rather than their only alternative. By making better use of what we've got, and with seed funding from the Esplanade Quarter Development, there's a tremendous opportunity to regenerate St Helier as a place to live. Great architecture, brave political leadership and the need to embrace 21st century urban living are the key to making this successful. There is a need to be careful to protect St Helier's rich historic character but at the same time said we, as a community, ought not be frightened to invite architectural innovation and sustainability. Many of the ideas in the Island Plan Review are not new, for the Housing Forum in 1998 advocated 'greater density in St Helier' as a means to safeguard our countryside but it is reassuring that these early ideas have re-emerged and become reinforced in the document.

The Association of Jersey Architects have worked jointly with Planning and Environment on many key initiatives including Jersey Architecture Week, Jersey Design Guide and assisting in the processes of the Design Review Group. Accordingly the AJA will be commenting on the Island Plan Review in due course in more detail.

My initial thoughts on the Island Plan Review are that St Helier now stands at a major crossroads and we have several joined-up once in a generation' opportunities including creating Jersey's largest ever development and new central business district at Esplanade Quarter and the longer term and visionary prospect of relocating our commercial port operations to La Collette. This will then lead to regenerating all of Commercial Buildings, providing us with the possibility to seamlessly link the working port with the historic port, and create a wonderful mixture of shops, restaurants and places for people to live. We can create new family homes at the Waterfront and a marvellous re-generated historic port with the sort of quayside architecture al fresco streetlife that will remind islanders of St Peter Port in Guernsey. It also represents a very exciting opportunity for local architects to become involved in the regeneration of St Helier and delivering top quality, locally relevant architecture.

The liberation group completes purchase of channel islands pub portfolio, drink wholesaler and brewery

Next time you go for a pint, it'll be supplied by the chaps above. The Liberation Group is the new Channel Islands parent company of Victor Hugo Ltd in Jersey, Bucktrout & Co Ltd in Guernsey, The Jersey Brewery and 65 pubs and bars across the Channel Islands (42 in Jersey, 21 in Guernsey and two in Alderney). The previous owner, Sandpiper CI, took a strategic decision to sell non-core assets, and The Liberation Group has been founded to buy the portfolio.

The management team behind the buy-out are Mark Crowther, CEO; Declan Hearne, Finance Director; Kenrick Brooks, Operations Director Pubs; Dave Robilliard, MD of Bucktrout & Co Ltd; Martin Flageul, MD of Victor Hugo Ltd; and Ed Daubeney, Non- Executive Director. They are supported by Graham Turner, who has been appointed Non-Executive Chairman of The Liberation Group. Mr Turner is also CEO of Tragus Group, which owns Café Rouge and Bella Italia, among other businesses.

The team have invested their own money and have the financial backing of LGV, a well- established provider of private equity in the UK market and part of the Legal & General Group. LGV has a 20 year history of successfully backing management teams in consumer, leisure, services and healthcare

The deal was largely worked out around the time of Liberation Day (2008), which had an impact on some of the deadlines of the transaction. According to CEO Mark Crowther, It became difficult to even discuss the deal without mentioning Liberation Day, so it seemed natural to name the group after the Channel Islands' most important celebration. They believe the name also reflects 'our values of independence, individuality and optimism, which are at the heart of the Channel Island character'.





TARGET

The Trans-European Automated Real-Time Gross Settlement Express Transfer system that will handle the settlement of cross border payments of the Euro.

TERM STRUCTURE OF INTEREST RATES

The patterns of interest rates on bonds with differing lengths of time to maturity but with the same risk

THE BANK OF ENGLAND

Is the central bank for the UK. It has many functions arising from its stated aim to promote and maintain a stable and efficient monetary and financial framework. One key function is to act as banker to the banking system. Since 1997, it has also set the official interest rate for the UK.

TRUST

An arrangement which empowers one or more people (the trustees) to safeguard and administer the assets such as property and money of another person or people (the beneficiaries).

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What do you think of when you think of 'hot hatches'? The Mk1 Golf Gti, surely? Fiesta XR2? Vauxhall Nova? Something newer? How about the Peugeot 205 Gti or Civic Type-R?

All worthy claimants to the hot hatch mantle but that's too obvious for us here at Gallery. You may have noticed that this month's theme is 'decades' and if there's one type of car that's survived through the decades since the 70's it's the hot hatch and we wanted to see how one manufacturers' take on the hot hatch theme has changed.

A Renault Twingo? Aren't they those ugly things that only French people ever bought? Hardly a hot hatch. Not any more.

With the imminent release of the Twingo Sport 130 we were keen to see what the current range topper, the GT 100 was capable of. So what has this got in common with previous hot Renaults?

When other manufacturers were busy

shoehorning in bigger and bigger engines, Renault thought out of the box and gave us the Renault 5 GT Turbo sporting a mere 1.4 litre motor but with a turbocharger to boost (quite literally) the output of their pocket rocket and they've done just that with the Twingo GT 100 too. This prompted is to test the Twingo as opposed to the latest in a line of hot Clios that began in the 90's with the Clio Williams as it's just, well, a bit different.

We're told it's the performance of a 1.6 litre car but with the insurance premium and economy of a 1.2 litre car and that's no lie. I can honestly say that it feels about as punchy and capable as a 2 litre Golf, which isn't surprising considering the Twingo is only 15hp shy of the Golf and a miles lighter to boot.

You really notice the torque at around 2500rpm when accelerating in all of the gears (up to 40mph, officer) with peak torque at a mere 3000rpm, all 145nm of it which isn't to be sniffed at in a so called

'micro-hatch'. Fascinatingly though there is no lag, noticeable torque steer or any of the other negative aspects usually associated with turbocharged cars and coupled with what seems to be a very capable chassis that isn't hiding any nasty surprises when it comes to somewhat enthusiastic cornering the GT 100 is a hoot and the 130 Sport is sure to be a force to be reckoned with at any traffic light GP.

Despite managing the o-60 sprint in a respectable 9.8 seconds and not running out of puff until a claimed 117 mph the Twingo GT 100 still manages to be environmentally conscious, creating the least CO2 of any 100hp car and returns 47.8mpg on a combined cycle. Thrifty, AND nifty.

On the inside you're greeted with just a rev counter in front of you and a giant digital speedo display in the centre of the dash which not only looks great but is easily visible – so much so that it's a good job that the GT comes with tinted rear and side

windows to stop Mr Plod seeing your giant digital speed readout should you be caught on the wrong side of 40mph whilst enjoying our quiet country lanes.

Air conditioning comes as standard, as does a full length tinted glass roof, the front of which tilts and slides electronically and helps to give the illusion of greater headroom for rear seat passengers - not that it isn't ample mind you, all but the tallest of people will have no problems sitting in the rear of the car thanks to the sliding rear seats which allow you to trade off boot space for legroom and vice versa. Other standard gadgets include electric windows, electric mirrors, ABS and a CD player, with optional Bluetooth and iPod (other digital personal music players are available) connectivity, parking sensors and a range of exterior decals and stripes to name but a few extras available to make the car your very own.

I must admit that the CD player housing seems somewhat odd, as do the two tone dash and door cards but these are tiny gripes and fortunately the interior seems sturdy and hard wearing unlike most other French cars that have preceded it!

The quirky styling continues outside, combining curves with flat surfaces and defining lines in what most will consider to be a 'Marmite' car – at first I loved the slightly bulbous but friendly look of the front but wasn't so sure about the angular rear but it all makes sense when it comes to keeping the car compact. So much so that I almost didn't believe my eyes when I read the tyrewall that stated the car was on 15" rims, the Twingo GT manages to make them look deceivingly small.

All in all, the Twingo GT 100 might not quite win over people looking at buying, say a Fiesta ST, Suzuki Swift or Volkswagen Polo GTi it's definitely worth considering if you're after an affordable, good looking and surprisingly practical small car that's fun to drive AND cheap to run – and let's not forget about cutting down our CO2 emissions either people.

Oh, but if you are thinking of buying that Fiesta, Swift, Polo, Corsa or similar small hot hatch it might be worth waiting for the Twingo Sport 130 to arrive - I've got a feeling it's going to take a few people by surprise.

Time..2.30 am Location...Country road, England Conditions...mild, dry, clear sky

A while ago I was driving my car at 60 miles an hour down a long straight two way road. It was 2.30 in the morning and there was no other traffic. The roads were dry. There was a low wall on my side of the road with bushes behind it and no pavement but a pavement on the other side of the road. No other cars, no pedestrians, straight road, music on, cruise control on, what harm could I do? What could possibly go wrong.

Then, from behind the wall, a cat jumped into the road directly in front of the car.

It landed only feet away, almost in the line of my site down the bonnet. So many things went through my mind at that moment; it was a fluffy cat, very long fine hair – probably a bit of pedigree in there somewhere, and how it ducked its head as it landed, how it crouched, coiled, its intense expression and how its eyes were locked on the car – ah yes, Persian, and in my mind I screamed "Don't run, please don't run"

My own cat had been knocked over and killed two weeks earlier and the tragic irony came to me in that moment as well. That day I had cursed people that drive fast and the fact that cats, or any animals for that matter and roads just don't go together. I thought how unfair it was that I would now be taking some other family's pet away from them; that they would have to feel, and go through, what I had. That single instant going on and on.

And while that was going through my mind I swung the wheel over, hard.

I don't know if you have ever crashed a car before, (I have) but there is an awful moment when you think, "Mayday Mayday we're going in". It's at the moment when you realise crashing is inevitable. It is not a nice feeling. Your brain, in truly enigmatic style, allows you another endless instant to consider all sorts of things; car repair bills, cats, insurance premiums, brick walls, blue lights, police radio chatter, and usually lots of bad words, and then there is usually a very loud and expensive bang.

And sometimes the lights go out.

I've had this car for a while now. I've never taken much notice of the so called safety features but it is my first ar with traction control, and a.b.s. and whatever else it has. I never really appreciated what in reality these mean though. I understood what they are meant to do (sometimes) but only in a fairly vague sort of way They all seem to come from brainy Germans, and I always considered them sort of gimmicks. As the car spun first one way then the other, the noise was switching from corner to corner around me, front left, back right, back left, and way too fast for me to figure it out, until suddenly as the wall and trees were looming, the car just straightened out as if a great hand had steadied it and I was driving straight and level again. All be it on the other side of the road. It was over in a second.

I stopped, badly shaken, trying to figure out what had happened. I could have wept with relief. It had been the ABS - anti lock braking, and possibly something to do with the traction control, but whatever it was it had saved me from something probably very bad. I have never been so impressed. I knew the car had been out of control, and I knew I was going to crash, and to feel it all be pulled back into order was extraordinary. I was in awe. I still am. I feel like I owe that car something.

I looked back down the road, and thankfully couldn't see any little shapes lying there. I gingerly reversed back and parked, got out and sat on the wall and lit, with shaking hands a cigarette. I looked over and the cat appeared on the wall a few feet away, looking at me suspiciously. Perfectly happy by the looks of him, the little bastard. I went over and gave him a stroke, and told him how lucky he was. He was part Persian -I'd been right about that, and quite friendly, and none the worse apart from perhaps being minus one life.

Workout for the beach

Body Balance Situp

The advantage of using your own balance instead of hooking your feet under something, is that it stops your hip flexors coming into play and allows all the work to be focused on your abdominals making them work much harder.





Lower Abdominal Crunch

For this you can hold a swiss ball between your ankles or use nothing but make sure you are managing to lift your pelvis off the floor with each repetition, to gain the full effect of the movement.





Cable Chop (Obliques)

Our obliques are often neglected in exercise, but they are extremely important as they help the trunk of our body to rotate, by using exercises which make us twist we will also help our waist to stay in better shape.





Balanced Back Extension

With the other exercises working more on the front of our trunk, we do also need to maintain balance. Back extensions on a swiss ball are a good way of maintaining some lower back strength and tone, and again by not securing your feet and relying on your balance on the ball, we focus on the lower back muscles and stop the hamstrings coming into play.

Ryan Hervé: Surf Board Maker

How did it all start?

I made my first surfboard when I was 15 and then when I was 19 I set up my own surf board company Nutz.

What have you been up to?

I have been living out in Australia working for Simon Anderson and Darren Handley learning all about designing and creating surfboards. Currently two surfing World Champions, Mick Fanning and Steph Gilmore, are riding Darren's board's (DHD) so I was really lucky to be being trained by arguably the best board makers in the world.

What is next?

When I was down in Hossegor (France) in 2000 I met Robbie Page, who was a top Pro Surfer in the 8o's. I've always kept in touch with him and made boards for him, actually this year he won the Worlds Masters Championships, which is amazing. Robbie has a company called Cream Surfwax and Surfboards and he has asked me to come work for him. The company recently won an Environmentally Friendly Business competition and as a consequence are now backed by VW. They have an amazing new, environmentally friendly and flexible material that they make the boards out of. They also get to use the VW Shaping Machines, which are accurate to 100th of a mm! They've created a surfboard which wont soak up any water if it gets a ding and as, its more flexible, it feels like it has suspension which absorbs all the chops and ripples on a wave. They feel alive under your feet! They are so much faster and last longer than old styles of boards. They are called Hydroflex Technology Boards, and if I get someone's height, weight, shoe size, surfing ability and find out what they want to get out of surfing then we put it into the computer and it'll work out the perfect board for them. Everyone who has had one so far has not wanted to go back to a normal surfboard.

Bike Trials is a form of mountain biking that uses a lightweight seatless bike to get around man made obstacles. You've probably seen these guys flying around every new monument in town. We spoke to Adam Le Cheminant, Ben Girdwood, Alex Johnson & Daniel Jeanne about this new sport.

From start to finish these guys never fail to impress. They are constantly riding over things that most people wouldn't dream of riding on. Trial biking has more freedom than trial motorbiking as it can be done pretty much anywhere. Although this is the most physically and technically demanding of the cycling sports, riders still manage to ride with persistent skill day in and day out. It takes a lot of practice to get as good as some of these guys. However not everyone in Jersey appreciates some of the awesome skills the riders have, and because the sport utilises many man-made obstacles including benches, walls and monuments, many people see it as vandalism rather than a sport. This is the same for many sports these days including skateboarding, bmxing and inline skating.

How did you get into trials?

Most of us heard about the sport through our friends and family and got drawn in by photos that we had seen. We started riding together after seeing each other riding.

Where do you ride?

We tend to ride in and around town but we usually get moved on by the police when we ride in the centre of town. We are also given the opportunity to ride at the West Show every year in front of a large crowd which is a great way to show people this different sport. We can usually be seen at Liberation Square or around the Waterfront.

Who do you ride with?

Because there's so few trial riders in Jersey we know pretty much everyone and we all ride together.

When was your worst slam?

There's none that come to mind now, but we always have cuts and bruises on our shins, from when we miss our pedals.

Do you hope to start riding professionally?

Well it's very hard to get sponsors especially in Jersey as there are so few companies that are willing to sponsor riders, so you have to be amazing to get noticed. Although it is very hard, it would be nice!



Moran makes it two out of two

The Rabeys Commercial Vehicles National Hillclimb welcomed the Nicholson McLaren MSA British Hillclimb Championship once again to the shores or Jersey for rounds 17 and 18 of this hotly contested championship last month on Thursday 17th July.



The morning practice runs were held in seasonal sunshine as competitors got used to the twisty hill which has the greatest elevation change of any of the British Hillclimb Championship rounds.

Defending British Champion and former hill record holder Martin Groves set the initial pace with a 40.52 with his other 2 main rivals only managing 41 second runs. But it was only practice and the 2 important qualifying rounds where to be held after the lunch break in slightly cooler conditions which meant that the chance of any records being broken looked unrealistic.

Fastest in the 1st qualifying round was the current championship leader Scott Moran with a time of 39.48. Having come close in the past, he is on form this year having built up a healthy lead in the championship. Rob Turnbull qualified 2nd and Martin Groves 3rd both in Gould racing cars.

Fastest 4 qualifiers included the big 3 of Scott Moran, Trevor Willis and Martin Groves and where joined by Chris Merrick who was tipped to possibly take a victory back home with him to the U.K.

One record did get broken with a large margin. Gary Hotton who recently gained the crown of fastest man on two wheels at the five mile road sprints took another record to add to his collection. He lowered the unlimited motorbike class record from a 48.83 set by Guernsey competitor Peter Davies in 1999 to a 46.46 on his last official run of the day.


The next local Hillclimb will be held at Bouley Bay which is the Bank Holiday Monday Hillclimb on the 25th August which will see another large entry.
