The Gallery Rally - Barcelona will take competitors through quiet and sleepy French villages, way off the beaten track, following clues of maddening complexity. They will eventually take a perilous drive across the Pyrenees and end up in 5-star splendour in Barcelona on June 29th.

If you ask me, any excuse to go on a treasure hunt rallying around Europe for four days with 60 or 70 people and ending up in a 5- star hotel is a pretty good one. When that excuse is raising money for Jersey Hospice Care, even better.

Last year we took 31 cars from Jersey to Monaco; from taxis and VW Transporters to Ferraris and Aston Martins, a rag tag bunch of adventurers flew around the French countryside, looking for clues, eating good food, going to casinos and having paper aeroplane throwing competitions. We had a fantastic time and (I think I speak for everyone who went when I say) we're excited about the launch of this year's

rally. After the success of Monaco we've decided to push the numbers up a bit to allow even more people to get involved. On June 26th 2009, 40 cars, each filled with a pair of rally stars, will set off from Elizabeth Harbour and put their brains and their driving skills to the test for four days.

The purpose of the rally is to have fun and raise money for one of the Island's best-loved charities, Jersey Hospice Care, which has just celebrated its 25th anniversary. Jersey Hospice Care is a specialist palliative nursing service, providing holistic care for cancer and motor neurone disease patients. Although it costs more than £2 million to run Jersey Hospice Care every year, it receives no funding from the States of Jersey and relies entirely on the generosity of the public.

In addition, this year we are offering reduced rates at a luxury resort 30 miles from Barcelona where contestants can unwind and relax for a couple of days before returning to Jersey.

What will we be doing?

Each day, competitors will be given a sheet of cryptic clues that they must solve to find out where they are going next. They will also need to find some piece of information in each location before they can move on to the next destination. All the cars meet up each evening in a designated hotel for a dinner and chance to swap stories and adventures over good food and wine.

To the victors....?

The rally culminates in Barcelona, when competitors will find out which team has won the rally and the prizes are awarded! There is also a special prize for the team that raises the most sponsorship money.

Paying your entry fees

Your entry fee pays for everything except lunch and drinks. The return ferry ticket is paid for, as are all your hotel, breakfast and evening meals. You will need money for fuel and lunches. Some people just snack, others find fancy restaurants along the way. Some wine is included in the evening meal. The total fee is £1,095 per car for all ferry, hotel and evening meal costs.

Raising your sponsorship

This is a charity event so get fundraising! Each car must raise sponsorship of £2000; (Easy! A good cake sale should do it!) 75% to be collected and forwarded to Hospice by the rally date and any additional collected by 13th July 2009.

What is the accommodation like?

On the way down the hotels are of at least Novotel standard. Rooms are shared with your driving partner so you can debrief on your days drive. The hotel on the last night is a 5-star hotel right in the heart of Barcelona.

Do I need a fast car?

No. You don't need to have an expensive car to take part in the Gallery Rally, but you do need a sense of adventure, a sense of humour and a compass – or sat nav, if you're lucky!

Harriet Good

Senior Keeper in Bird Department Durrell

Harriet Good is a Senior Keeper in the Bird Department at Durrell. She was raised in Edinburgh and went to Glasgow University studying geography, biology and archaeology. She then continued with biology and decided that she liked learning about animals so she took her final course in zoology. After studying, Harriet worked in a tourist information office in Edinburgh for about a year whilst she decided what she wanted to do. She wanted a job which related to her degree so she then undertook an internship in a zoo in America for 4 months, working with all different animals including birds. Harriet then returned to Edinburgh and worked as a taxonomist (identifying worms) which she didn't enjoy so she went back to America to complete an externship for a year. It was after this that she obtained a job at Durrell and it happened to be one that involved working with birds.

Describe yourself using three words?

I can only think of one, loud.

What exactly do you do?

Feed the birds, maintain the aviaries, give the birds any medication they need, hand rear some of the babies and some office work. I am also the stud book keeper for the pink pigeons (a stud book is a book containing data about the breeding of different species in different zoos).

What is the first task of each day?

Taking insect feeds to all the birds which is also a good way of checking on them.

What is the best thing about your job?

The animals. I love working with animals and when I stop doing this and have to work in the office I miss handling and feeding them.

What is the funniest thing that has ever happened to you at work?

I was trying to catch one of the birds and it pooed on my face. I wiped most of it off and was walking with another keeper who said that once a bird pooed in her mouth and she remembered how bitter it tasted, and at that moment, I licked the corner of my mouth which had a bitter taste!

What were your ambitions as a child?

I didn't know what I wanted to do, not even when I went to university. I applied for geography and as my subjects became more specialised I discovered I that I liked biology and the animal stuff, so I graduated in zoology.

What is your favourite animal and why?

I have favourite individuals rather then species. There are three: Homer, the Hornbill, because he is very interactive and entertaining; Sweetpea, the Turaco, because she is interested in what you are doing; and Tinkerbell, the Robinchat, because she is a very friendly bird.

Who do you work most closely with?

The bird department is split into two halves, one half is the 'wetlands' which includes the ducks, flamingos, cranes and parrots, and the other half is the 'softbills', which is the one I work on and includes all the smaller perching birds. In my half there are about 4 or 5 people that I work with.

What is the most difficult part of your job?

When a bird is suffering and you have to ask the vet if it is best to put them down. Sometimes you are really attached to them but it's not about you.

If you could work in any other department which one would it be and why?

The mammal department, not the apes though because I think that they are smarter than me! Perhaps the reptiles as well because they look cool.

What is your greatest achievement?

One I can think of is that when I was working in the Galapagos Islands my ability to speak Spanish improved, I was super happy about this.

What advice would you give to someone wanting to be a keeper?

Be prepared to work for free for a while, at some point you will be a volunteer or a student. You have to gain experience to get this job.

If you won the lottery (big money), would you still be a keeper?

I would probably take my work home with me. I would have a big property and have my own animals and donate lots of money to Durrell.

Has dealing with all these birds ever sent you a little cuckoo?

Yes, I'm mental but you have to be.

What are your aspirations for the future?

I have done a lot of travelling already with this job, I spent 6 months working in the Galapagos Islands and 3 and half months working in Mauritius so I can't aspire to much more than that really.

DOGS HUMP LEGS.... NOW CATS HUMP DOGS.

IT'S GREAT TO GET OFF THE ISLAND. TO GET A GLIMPSE OF THE REAL WORLD, TO SPREAD YOUR WINGS, TO HAVE NEW EXPERIENCES. WHY NOT A WEEKEND IN THE UK, A WEEK IN FRANCE? OH, THAT IS UNLESS YOU HAVE PETS. AS A RECENT NEW ENTRANT TO THE WORLD OF PET OWNERSHIP, THE COST AND COMPLEXITY CAME AS A BIT OF A SHOCK WHEN READYING MY FOUR LEGGED FRIEND FOR HIS FIRST 'VOYAGE'.

As dogs on the continent have the potential to be flea carrying, rabid, infested wild things, our wonderful domesticated 'chiens de manche' need to jump through a few hoops before they're granted the right to get away. He or she will first need to hit their six-month milestone and visit the vet, scrabbling over the lino and dodging cats with limps and poorly ferrets in order to get the rabies injection neccesary for travel. That's going to take you six months. After which, if they pass the test, your hairy companion will be issued with their wonderfully 'EU blue' coloured pet passport. The good thing is you're not going to get stung for a head forward, no smiling, badly taken passport photo; photos for pets are optional, but why not get one taken with comedy glasses and moustaches just for a laugh.

Once you've got a passport you're ready to go... surely? No. There are a few more things to consider. Firstly, due to the aforemetioned rabid nature of your pet's continental cousins, you will need to visit a vet en France (or wherever you go) 24 to 48 hours prior to your return and get your dog checked to ensure he (or she) hasn't been experimenting and picked up any diseases during their stay. On returning to St Malo, we let the dog have a run on the beach, play with French people and even walk around the

slightly dowdy St Malo fair. Churros and crêpes everywhere, along with carnies and vans full of slightly B-grade consumer electronics, the enticement of which had galette-munching children ambitiously firing pellet guns at anything that moved. The dog looked bemused. So did we. We queued for the ferry. Now, bear in mind we'd already come over from Jersey on Condor. We didn't have much choice, as they're the only operator. Being the only operator affords you some advantages, such as being able to set the cost of your services pretty much without oposition. Services like, say.... how much it would cost to leave your dog in the cardeck for a bumpy hour crossing. If you're a dog owner you no doubt already know the hilarious punchline to follow. For those of you that are not dog owners, have a guess. No, more than that. Yes, that's right - €36.

IT BEGAN... IN AFRICA

WHEN I PLANNED TO GO TO SOUTH AFRICA, I HAD NO PRECONCEPTIONS OR HIGH EXPECTATIONS AS IT WAS NEVER TOP OF MY LIST OF COUNTRIES TO VISIT. APARTHEID, SAFARIS AND SHARK ATTACKS WERE ABOUT THE EXTENT OF MY KNOWLEDGE OF THE COUNTRY.


South Africa is a huge country with such diversity. I was overwhelmed by its beauty and unspoilt coastline, and ashamed of my lack of policitcal and cultural history. Despite ongoing problems with racism, which have slowly begun to improve in South Africa, the locals were extremely welcoming and I felt completely safe whilst traveling along the coast. I would still say common sense is important; as a female don't go out at night unless it is in a group, don't travel by car at night and probably avoid trains after a certain time too.

There are so many various types of holidays to choose from but I opted for a coastal adventure. My route was Durban to Cape Town passing through Kwazulu Natal, along the Eastern Cape and Wild Coast, and finally down the Garden Route. A total of 791 miles and just over 3 weeks to do it in.

When I told my South African flatmate I was planning to stay in hostels his reply was 'do you want to get murdered? I have never even heard of a hostel in South Africa'. So to satisfy my inquisitive nature, backpacking and hostels was my method of choice.

You hear of people backpacking around Australia, Europe, Asia and South America but I had only met one person who had done it in South Africa. I felt uneasy, was this because it was so bad no-one wanted to do it or so good they wanted to keep it a secret? We decided to take The Baz Bus, not only for the imaginative name (any bus named Baz deserves to be ridden on), but the hop on hop off option is great for travellers looking for a safe and flexible way to get around. A tip if you choose this option; book each leg several days in advance, it is a small bus and if it is a busy time and you are on a tight schedule you may not always be able to fit on. It also recommends hostels and conveniently drops you from one to another.

After only one night in Durban and re-united with my travel companion, I decided, despite the great curries, it wasn't the place for me and on the Baz Bus we went.



10 MUST 30'S BETWEEN DURBAN AND CAPE TOWN

VISIT A XHOSA VILLAGE ON THE WILD COAST

Our first stop was Coffee Bay, a small community over an hour and a half drive in the hostel taxi away from Umtata. Far removed from the cities of Cape Town and Jo'berg, there is not much more than round huts inhabited by the Xhosa people, a campsite, general store, a pizzeria and several types of accommodation. The coast is stunning, with a must do short hike to the Hole-in-the-Wall - a remarkable piece of rock that's had a huge hole eroded through it. The green hills roll onto the untouched beaches at coffee bay, where the surf is good. We stayed in the Coffee Shack, a hostel well known for its parties, yummy food and probably the cheapest surf lessons in the world (approx £1.50 for a couple of hours). Something you must do whilst on this coast is visit a local village and learn how to click. (the sound they make to speak their language). Joseph our guide took us on a walk through the rolling hills and to the huts where his family lived. We learnt about their day to day life and had lunch with them. He then took us to an intoxicated witch doctor, followed by a trip to the local shebean to drink homemade beer with some equally intoxicated locals. Shebeans were originally an important place for black Africans to meet in black townships to discuss political issues, dance and listen to music during the apartheid. A must if you want to experience the heart of local culture.

STAY AT ADDO ELEPHANT PARK

Situated in the valley near the Sundays River region of the Eastern Cape, Addo Elephant National Park was proclaimed in 1931 when only 11 elephants remained there. Today it is the third largest park in South Africa - a sanctuary to over 450 elephants Cape buffalo and black rhino. There is a huge range of activites

including 4x4 trails, hiking, horse-riding and the highlight of watching the elephants from your lodge who come to drink from the river.

SURFING IN JEFFERIES BAY

J'Bay has been a world renowned surfing spot since the 60s, creating waves up to 800m in length. The coast is scattered with sand dunes, and between June and August surfers from all around the world come in search of the perfect wave, although the swell can reach the coast as early as April. There isn't a lot of surf in December, which is great for beginners. But if you are dying to get on a board then lots of tour operators offer sand boarding as an alternative way to spend a morning or afternoon. Go when it's dry and hot otherwise you'll end up sticking to the sand

EAT SEAFOOD IN KNYSNA

Knysna has possibly the most striking geological head lands on the south African coast, through which the sea pours into a pretty lagoon. It is one of the best known holday destinations offering many attractions incldung the indigenous forest, the Milwood goldmines and Buffalo Bay if you want to hit the beach. One of my highlights of Kynsna was the abundance of seafood restaurants offering a huge variety of fresh dishes. I would highly recommend 34 Degrees South (www.34-south. com); a restaurant / deli / bar, which in my opinion serves some of the most mind blowing seafood and tapas dishes I have ever tasted using combinations of ingredients I had never seen before. With a relaxed café style atmosphere, it's worth a visit.

BUNGEE JUMP IN PLETTENBURG BAY

Not for the faint hearted, BLOUKRANS BRIDGE is set at 216m and is the highest commercially operating bungee in the world. Along the garden route, it is about 40km east of Plettenburg Bay if you want a nice place to stop over at. Bloukrans utilizes pendulum bungee technology ensuring you the smoothest, most comfortable bungee jump possible.

RIDE AN OSTRICH IN OUTSHORN

Hire an old beetle for the day (from approx £10) and drive through the Karoo mountain range to Outshorn. It is famous for its huge ostrich population and there are an abundance of ostrich farms where you interact with and ride an ostrich – how many people can say they've done that? They are the tallest living birds on the planet and the second fastest animal after the cheetah. Ostrichs will peck anything, their claws are sharp, and the only way off is falling off the back into the arms of the jockeys. Riding them is completely at your own risk (we were assured the animals aren't harmed in any way)... but just imagine riding a sprinting chicken. If you're not feeling brave enough – just watch your friends, it will give you a laugh to last a lifetime.

While you're up there, try and visit the Kango caves as well – an underground maze of limestone caves. If you suffer from claustrophobia, avoid the adventure tour though!

WINE-TASTING IN STELLENBOSCH

Have a hearty breakfast before you set off. We did an easyrider day tour of the area. For approximately £30 we visited 5 vineyards in the wine region starting with

Simonsig Wine Farm, then onto Paarl to sample some cheese, Fairview, lunch in Franschhoek, Dieu Donn—a less touristy vineyard with spectacular views and finishing in Boschendal Wine Estate, one of the region's original vineyards. 25 wines later you will get home—well informed and probably drunk.



PICNIC ON TABLE MOUNTAIN AT SUNSET

It's hard to plan anything in CapeTown as many attractions are weather dependant; visiting Table Mountain being one of them. For those of you not hiking inclined, take the revolving cable car up. The time of year also determines opening and closing times. In South African summertime the days are longer and the cable car open later. I can't think of a better time to go up and experience the breathtaking views from the top of Table Mountain other than sunset. Take a picnic and some Savannahs (the local cider) and enjoy the Cape in the day, as the sun goes down and the city starts to light up after dark. It is half the price but remember to take a jumper, once the sun goes down it can get cold all the way up there

TOUR THE CAPE PENNINSULA

Take a day to visit the Cape Penninsula. There are some beautiful bays including Camps and False Bay with Table Mountain as a stunning back drop, Visit the penguin colony at boulder bay and walk along from the Cape of Good Hope (the most Southern East point of the country) to Cape Point. Even if you are not a big walker, this is well worth the effort. If it is the right time of year, you may be lucky enough to spot sharks and whales off the coast.

BE TRENDY

The contrast between Cape Town and the villages on the wild coast is so big. Soaking up the atmosphere is a great way to spend your time in Cape Town. Gardens near the foot of Table Mountain is a trendy area of the city, where fashionable and creative people go to eat breakfast in Arnolds, drink cocktails in chic bars and shop in boutiques. We stayed in Ashanti Lodge; a Spanish villa style hostel complete with swimming pool and a loo with a view. To the bottom end of Gardens, the road meets Long Street; one of the oldest streets in Cape Town. Recognised by Victorian buildings and cast iron railings, Long Street is colourful and lively with people, bars, hostels, clubs, shops and restaurants such the 'must eat at' Mama Africa just make sure you book beforehand. Long Street can get a little seedy at night, so keep your eyes on your money!

ESCAPE TO CAPE VERDE...

In less than six hours' flying time, you could be relaxing on glorious white sand beaches, under the warm skies of Cape Verde.

Situated off the West coast of Africa, with average year round temperatures rarely falling below the high twenties, Cape Verde is perfect for those seeking spectacular beaches and interesting culture.

Thanks to North East trade winds, the islands are an excellent choice to experience exhilarating water sports, including kite and wind surfing. Sal, the main tourist island offers a good selection of restaurants, alongside beautiful beaches.

For a more tranquil beach holiday, the island of Boa Vista is said to be the third most important loggerhead nesting site in the world.

In contrast, Sao Vicente boasts vibrant nightlife and is classed as the 'cultural' centre of the archipelago. Lively nightlife can also be found on Santiago, the most developed of the islands.

Inter-island day trips by aircraft are an excellent way of experiencing a taste of other islands, and island tours are also available.



Nightlife in Cape Verde generally stems from live music with African, Brazilian and Cape Verdean influences. Grogue, an alcoholic beverage made from sugar cane, is a speciality here, with its sweet variation is known as punch. It is distilled on Santa Antao and Santiago, and to soak it up, a well established dish on the menu is tuna with rice and deep-fried potatoes. Langoustines must definitely be given a try: these are to be found in deep waters and weigh up to 5 kg. Whether grilled, eaten raw or 'soado', steamed in a sauce made from tomato puree, garlic and onions, the lobster without pincers remains culinary poetry!

For spectacular mountain scenery and hiking opportunities, choose Santa Antao, or the island of Fogo which is home to an active volcano.

THE JERSEY TEXTILE SHOWCASE 2009

Colours in Nature is an exhibition by Jenny Mahy from Guernsey, last year's competition winner and also an exhibition of Primary School Art Textiles and another of A Level Art Textiles.

The Harbour Gallery will also be welcoming back the Diversity textile group for an exhibition of textiles. If you want to give textiles a go yourself then there will be plenty of opportunity

with the organised workshops running through this period.

There will also be a whole host of works by contemporary textile artists from Jersey including Sarah Jordan, Lisa MacDonald, Christine Witham, Naomi Renouf, Rosemary Blackmore, some who now have work in exhibited in UK galleries and magazines. That's not forgetting the newcomers as well!

There are five workshops taking place in the mornings and afternoons, taken by experienced tutors from the UK including Ruth Issett, Gina Ferrari, Margaret Beal, Jennie Rayment, Cas Holmes, Karen Veck and Paddy Killer.

There will be a St Aubin Farm and Craft Market on the Square from 10 am to 2pm on Saturday14th and concluding the showcase will be the annual gala dinner at The Somerville Hotel on Thursday the 12th. The showcase is definatelty a date for your calendar.


CHAMBERS COMEDY COURTROOM

On the first Monday of each month, Chambers hold their monthly comedy night, inviting guest comedians from the UK. The night includes an MC, warm up and main act. The Monday I was there, snow decided to descend on the UK and only the main act Paul Foot made it to Jersey. Great! A whole show from the main act; that very rarely happens.

The second half of March sees the first exhibition of its kind in Jersey. Under the guidance of art teacher Lucy Blackmore, prisoners at H.M.P La Moye have been working towards an exhibition entitled Inside Out.

With a new education programme, the weekly art classes have given prisoners, some who had no previous art experience, a chance to build their confidence and discover new talents. Using a mixture of mediums, the artists have been working since May 2008 towards open college network certificates.

A recent visit from Lieutenant Andrew Ridgeway and Mrs Valerie Ridgeway to the prison, eventually led to the creation of this exhibition. After seeing some of the work the prisoners were producing, Mrs Ridgeway, a patron of The Harbour Gallery, encouraged them to organise a place for the public to see their work.

Sponsored by the Jersey Arts Trust and Gallery Magazine, Lucy tells me the artists are very excited about this exhibition and having something to work towards has given them all focus. Art classes have been offered to all wings, resulting in

work from different age ranges and varied backgrounds; giving a diverse variety of styles and themes.

Art has been a release for many of these prisoners from their daily routines, with the art room being a relaxed place for them to go. For those that find it difficult to engage in other subjects, it has been a huge confidence builder and something for them to look forward to.

The work will be available to buy with a percentage going towards art materials for the prison and a percentage also going towards the 'Prison? Me? No Way' charity which was set up to educate and dissuade young people from crime.



She wanted a more formal exhibition that would impress and impact on viewers using big and epic pieces with strong themes and key moments behind them. For exmaple one represents the Four Horseman of the Apocalypse, and another Samson destroying the Temple. In a move away from previous work which has been considered beautiful, Clare says, 'I wanted to do something abstract but with a point to it. It's about the individual piece but also about the impact of them as a whole. They have a heart of darkness ... edgy but hopefully still beautiful'.

Her second exhibition will also be at The Arts Centre but downstairs in the Bar Gallery. Perfect placed to check out if you are stopping for a coffee or lunch, 'Joy' represents Clare's aim to get some colours down and have some fun with 'an onslaught of colour . . . some are more peaceful and serene with some hellish ones!'.

Pollock's Toy Museum



The exhibition includes toy theatres, teddy bears, wax and china dolls, board games, optical toys, folk toys, nursery furniture, mechanical toys and doll's houses. The Museum occupies two houses joined together in the heart of Fitzrovia, one 18th century, one 19th; the rooms are small and connected by narrow winding staircases. The whole place exudes the atmosphere and evocations of those special times of childhood where every corner is filled with visual delight.

John Gay

To mark the centenary of John Gay's birth and to celebrate his work, an exhibition of his photographs are on display at Kenwood House, Hampstead until 29th March. A Museum Of Architecture With A Twist

Sir John Soane's Museum houses an intriguing collection of architectural artefacts and other curios. Soane was born in 1753 and was a renowned English architect. 

It begins with a blood stained smiley face and from that moment on it never lets you go. One of Time's top 100 novels of all time, recognised by list after list as the comic book art-form's greatest achievement, I shouldn't need to ask the question 'Who Watches the Watchmen?' because frankly everyone should go and see this film.

Released in the years 1986 and 1987 Watchmen was a 12 part limited series created by writer Alan Moore (Also responsible for 'V for Vendetta', 'The League of Extraordinary Gentlemen' and 'From Hell' amongst other things.), artist Dave Gibbons and colourist John Higgins and published by DC Comics. Set in the real world it places superheroes in more than just a vaguely real world setting. There is no Metropolis, no Gotham and only one of the characters possesses superhuman

abilities. The existence of these beings tips the balance in Vietnam, keeps Reagan in power and pushes the United States ever closer to nuclear war. The story itself involves these heroes being pulled out of retirement or government employ by the death of one of their own. With their personal journeys interwoven with various different narrative strands Moore demonstrates how this society lost faith in their self appointed saviours and poses the question of what must really be sacrificed to be a hero in troubling times. With the current economic and political climate it is as relevant as it was when it was first released. Needless to say the ending doesn't involve any character flying around the world to reverse time.

But as any comic book fan (And Alan Moore) will attest, a great comic book doesn't necessarily make a great film. There have been more hits than misses in previous years but for every Dark Knight there is an Elektra (To be fair to Elektra it does have Jennifer Garner wandering around in skin tight leather for 90 minutes). Watchmen is celebrated because of the way it utilises the comic book format. Moore himself said that he used it to demonstrate the things the comic book medium can do that other media cannot. Its strict nine panel grids allow its creators to control the pacing and give particular emphasis to certain images and motifs. It uses character archetypes inviting the reader to bring a wealth of personal meaning to their own reading. It even has a separate comic within a comic that deconstructs the trappings of the genre and introduces the possibility of a separate past and future for the form. Many fans have questioned why it's taken so long for an adaptation to be made. Many more have questioned whether an adaptation could and should be made at all. The project passed hands from studio to studio and director to director with Darren

Also out this month is the adaptation of David Peace's football novel 'The Damned United'. Michael Sheen looks absolutely spot on as the tortured and charismatic Brian Clough as he walks the thin line between genius and insanity. The novel is an absolute

masterpiece and the success of the film will depend on how well the filmmakers manage to combine the parallel stories of Clough's rise at the helm of Derby County and the fall of his 44 day reign at Leeds. With the writer of Frost / Nixon and The Last King of Scotland involved I think it stands a good chance.

For Gavin & Stacey fans James Corden and Matt Horne take on their first leading film roles going down the Shaun of the Dead route as the stars of Lesbian Vampire Killers. It is unknown whether it is Corden and Horne or the Vampires or even both who will be munching the proverbial rug but it sounds a whole lot



Aronofsky at one point attached. Finally the stars have aligned. The man stepping up to the plate is Zach Snyder director of the hugely successful Frank Miller adaptation 300. In the same manner as his previous film he has used the comic book panels as storyboards and brought aboard Dave Gibbons as a consultant to help him evoke the dark and moody atmosphere of the artwork. Judging by the trailers it appears as if he has managed to replicate the aesthetic and tone of the source material. It is yet to be seen whether Snyder can do the impossible and produce a film that is equal to the book.

Some critics have seen the book as Moore's final word on super-heroes. Ironically it is this and Frank Miller's Dark Knight Returns that actually breathed life back into the genre. Watchmen was a milestone for super-hero comics as an art form. Here's hoping it can be the same thing for their film counterparts.







Photos

Choosing your wedding photographer is a major decision, they'll be the person responsible for turning your big day into treasured memories.

There are many talented photographers in Jersey all offering a unique style, although at the moment there seems to be a huge trend for wedding photojournalism. Of course you still need the classic family photos with aunt Ethel and your third cousin once removed, but photojournalism is a good way to see the moments you perhaps missed on your day.

We asked Christian Keenan of CKP Weddings to give us five reasons why people choose wedding photojournalism.

- 1. Wedding photojournalism focuses on capturing the reality, emotion, and spontaneity of your wedding day. When you look back at your wedding photographs in twenty years time, you should be able to remember what you felt at the time, not just what you looked like.
- 2. Many traditional wedding photographers often have very established views on certain 'must have' shots and often co-ordinate events, asking people to stand in certain positions and working to the routine of how the photographer thinks the wedding day should proceed. You will have spent time planning your wedding to reflect your own personality and your wedding photographs should reflect this. A wedding photojournalist will not stage manage your wedding day but will quietly document events as they happen, recording your day rather than being in charge and directing events.
- 3. Just because wedding photojournalists capture moments, doesn't mean they can't use their creativity to capture a fantastic portrait as well. Portraits have historically always been a skill of a good photojournalist and portraits taken by a wedding photojournalists will often be artistic and natural looking and will fit the way they take the rest of the pictures. They are still portraits; it's just a different style. Good wedding photojournalists should be able to achieve great portraits in minutes rather than hours which will ensure that you do not spend hours in front of the camera and the natural flow of your day is not interrupted.
- 4. Wedding photojournalists tend to have experience working as newspaper and/or editorial photographers and will therefore be skilled at covering large events where there are lots of things happening. Such experience is invaluable when photographing a wedding.

5. Finally, remember that there is more to choosing a photographer than simply picking a style! Each photographer will bring characteristics to the job that will influence the images they take. When considering any wedding photographer, take time to have a thorough look at their website, meet with them to discuss your wedding day and, most importantly, ask to view at least two full weddings on-line so that you can see exactly what you can expect to receive. If you have decided that you would prefer a photojournalistic style, look for a wedding photojournalist who is able to tell the story from start to finish.

Christian is an international award winning photojournalist and has been working professionally as a photographer for over ten years. Having learnt his trade working for the JEP, he moved to China to work as an editorial and documentary photographer where he won a World Press Photo Award for his work, one of the most prestigious accolades in photojournalism. Rings

'Together Forever'

Choosing the right engagement or wedding ring does not mean that you have to spend a fortune or have the same kind of ring as someone else. There is a wide selection available and lots to think about but don't panic, Gallery has made life easier by taking a look at some of the more classic, bespoke and interesting designs.

As we know, everyone's taste and budget is different. One option is to keep it simple and classic with a diamond solitaire ring in yellow gold together with a yellow gold band wedding ring. The diamond can be as understated or as overstated as you wish. The modern version would be something similar, but in white gold, coupled with perhaps a white gold wedding band set with

you want white, yellow, or rose gold, platinum, set with diamonds, engraved, tire tread or flag detail, you too can have a unique wedding ring at a reasonable price. This option comes with a word of warning however, make sure you leave plenty of time for the design and production of your ring and be cautious of using opals and emeralds as they tend to chip easily.

What colour, clarity, cut or shape of diamond should I choose? You are likely to be nervous and excited when walking into the jewellers and the special 'diamond chart' can look daunting upon first glance. Essentially it comes down to the following: 'Colour', the whiter the diamond, the more rare it is. 'Carat',

diamonds in a full eternity design and a satin and polished finish. Those who want a potential investment for the future may want to consider the very vibrant purple/blue tanzanite stone. Tanzanite is only sourced from one mine in the world and is 1000 times more rare than diamonds. If you are searching for an engagement ring that is slightly different, you may like a beautiful white or yellow gold pearl ring that can be set alone, or together with diamonds, rubies or sapphires.

Wedding rings can have a round or flat edge and can be made to complement the engagement ring. It is becoming fashionable to have diamonds set in a wedding ring, either grouped or all the way around the ring. This can maintain the 'wow' factor, particularly if your daily routine requires you to remove your engagement ring. The trend for men is to have white and black diamonds set on either white gold or platinum and you should bear in mind that platinum is more durable.

What about having a wedding ring designed for you? This is not just for the rich and famous. Whether

this is the weight of the stone. 'Clarity', diamonds are mined from the earth and therefore have what are known as inclusions, small natural specks (you're unlikely to find a diamond in which you could not see any inclusions at 10x magnification). The chart measures the rarity of the diamond and the price of the diamond is relative to how rare it is. Therefore you can use the chart to help you to choose a diamond according to your price range and taste. For example, a large diamond with less clarity would be a similar price to a smaller diamond with greater clarity. 'Cut', this is simply the cutting of 57 facets on the diamond and provides the 'sparkle' element to the ring. The shape of the diamond is personal choice, the most popular being 'Round'.

Having said all this, try not to become too obsessed with the quality or type of ring or diamond, and remember that you want a ring that suits you and best symbolizes the love between you and your partner. As a result, you should be able to maintain the enjoyment of the selection process.

Stag

There are so many options of places to go and things to do on your stag night. It is traditionally supposed to be up to the best man to organise, but nowadays the groom either organises it himself or at least gets to pick where he would like it to be and the best man can do all the organising. You can choose from adrenaline pumping activities to relaxation weekends. Shoes

Mont Orgueil Castle

Built in the 13th century to protect the Island against the French, this dramatic castle towers over the harbour at Gorey. The jewel in Jersey's crown, it is one of the best-preserved castles in Britain and one of the most photographed sites in the Island. With spectacular views of the east coast and across the sea to France, it makes the perfect backdrop for a wedding ceremony or reception.

La Hougue Bie

In use approximately 6,000 years ago, La Hougue Bie is one of the largest and best-preserved examples of a Neolithic site in Europe. Set in beautiful and peaceful grounds, it is dominated by a grassed mound, which is topped by the chapel of Notre Dame de la Clarté, built in the 12th century. Small religious ceremonies can be held in the chapel, with wedding receptions taking place in a marquee in the shade of mature trees in the grounds.

Hamptonne

Hamptonne is a collection of fine traditional Jersey farmhouses dating back to the 17th century, which have been restored to their original beauty. Located in the heart of the Island's countryside, it is an idyllic site and a perfect venue for a civil wedding ceremony in the Langlois House, which boasts some of the oldest architectural features in the Island, along with an open fire and original beams. Wedding receptions can be held in a marquee overlooking the meadow.

Tersey Museum

No g Pier Road adjoins the Jersey Museum and is one of the finest examples of a 19th century town house in Jersey. It has been fully restored to how it would have looked in 1861 when it was home to a prosperous family in Victorian St Helier. Civil marriage ceremonies are held in the beautiful gas-lit Victorian drawing room. The Museum Brasserie is an ideal location for wedding receptions. In the summer the walled courtyard, adorned with lavender and vines, is a beautiful and peaceful refuge in the heart of St Helier.

Elizabeth Castle

For 300 years Jersey was defended by this impressive fortress built on an islet in St Aubin's Bay. Civil wedding ceremonies are held in the Governor's House, which was built in the 1590s. Sir Walter Raleigh was its first resident and it was where Charles II lived during his short stay in the 1640s. This beautiful building, with a large terrace, is located near the top of the castle and the views are fantastic. Wedding receptions for up to 200 guests can be held in a marquee on the Castle Green, which has excellent views across the bay to St Helier and St Aubin.





TONI & GUY TRYOUT

My hair was in desperate need of some mid-winter attention and I was lucky enough to book an appointment with Damien, the new Art Director at Toni and Guy. I had heard he had worked for Trevor Sorbie and Toni and Guy London so I knew I would be in good hands.



Before

Looking over my hair, Damien told me that looking at my face shape I wouldn't suit long hair, and because of my slightly square jaw line I would need to put more volume in at the top and not accentuate the sides. It was also in pretty poor condition, which he told me could work in my favour for the type of cut he wanted to do.

The first step was washing my hair using colour stay shampoo and a light surface conditioner, which he matched to my hair type.

"I absolutely love my new haircut and I'm so excited! It's much more on-trend, and manageable. The bonus is I can wear it in several different ways – now I just need to perfect my styling techniques!"

Then Damien set to work on the cut. Starting with an undercut through the hair, Damien left length on the top by cutting long layers, and making it quite textured and choppy. He likened it to Victoria Beckham's hair and assured me it was very fashionable at the moment. As I am always on the go, I need a haircut that is easy to manage and Damien told me that suitability to the client and style is more important that fashion. Once the hair was dry, Damien decided to cut in a sweeping fringe as it suits me, and then using a back cutting method on the crown personalised the hair by creating a backcombing effect. This took weight off the hair without affecting the length. He told me that he believes a haircut doesn't end with the hair being wet.



I have naturally wavy hair and so Damien wanted to show me two different ways to style it. Both were using dry styling products. Using Label M sea salt spray on wet hair gives a dry texture without drying out the hair itself, giving it more texture and movement with a bohemian feel.

Tip: Blast the hair with a hair dryer until it is 80% dry; there is no need to even touch it with a brush until then.

- Straighten sections from the mid length to ends to lengthen the hair.
- Spray a bit of hairspray on fringe for support.
- Using Resurrection Dust, apply to the roots for hold and volume (this comes in a white powder formula)
- Finish with Matt Paste (like a dry wax) to give texture without making the hair greasy.

Rooting for the veg!

Don't get me wrong...by no means am I a vegetarian. I do need my weekly meat fix, whether it's in the form of a bowl full of spicy chili, a piece of succulent chicken or a juicy salmon fillet but I can go without for the rest of the week.

I am here once again, rooting for the simple vegetables and to show that they can stand up and take centre stage in their own right in almost any dish. I'm not talking nut roasts here, oh no, I'm taking it to the next level... I'm talking curries, burgers and stews!

When the question "what's for dinner" pops into your day, why should the answer be based around chicken, red meat and fish. Yes, they are vital to our diets and as a nation, we love them all but there is nothing wrong with replacing a few carnivorous meals with a few veggies one. Not only are we bumping up our vitamin intake but we are also helping our carbon footprint by reducing our food mileage.

For example, meat might make its way to our plates by air or boat, whereby the butternut squash that might be in your curry, or the wild mushrooms in your risotto, may have only come for the farm down the road. As well as being fresh produce, it will not require a valid ID to get through customs! You will also be doing your bit for our local farmers, the only trick is to make sure you buy seasonally.

As our taste buds begin to desire more and more exotic flavours, we do have

to expand what we import to the island but if you know your markets you will be aware that we do grow a large exotic range here on our own turf. Fungi Delecti grow a fantastic range of tempting foods, including wild mushrooms, bean sprouts and herbs and these are all sold in our local markets.

Whist cooking for some friends recently and being a bit pushed for time, I decided to rustle up a curry using butternut squash, green French beans, onions and chick peas. The curry can be cooked in almost the same time as the rice and is really tasty and satisfying. My friends didn't even comment about the lack of meat in the dish, they simply requested more!!

Ok, so maybe I don't expect to convince the whole island straight away and I can hear some people saying, "Forget it, a meal is not a meal without meat" but I beg you to give it a go before criticizing it. The flavours that you can get out of an aubergine in a Thai curry or pumpkin in a stew are delicious ... and it's economical! A pack of chicken breasts cost around £5, where as a butternut squash in a curry will set you back under £2 and will feed a crowd.

So, maybe it's worth a try for a midweek meal, maybe leave the succulent steaks for a Saturday night and the roast lamb for Sunday's family get together? Again, I am not saying cut out the fish and meat all together but just try replacing a few old favorites with some new ones. I'm sure you will be rooting for the vegetables on a regular basis.



Libby's Butternut squash and Chick pea Curry Feeds 4 hungry people...

1 Butternut Squash, I large onion, 1 pack of green French beans, I can of chickpeas, 2 garlic cloves, 3 tbsps of curry paste (either home-made or a good shop bought one) a knob of fresh ginger, chili powder, large bunch of fresh coriander, 2 tins of tomatoes, 1 tsp sugar.

Chop the squash into large cubes and steam in a steamer for 10 minutes, alternatively, roast for 30-40 mins in the oven (steaming is quicker, but roasting is equally as delicious). While this is steaming, in a large pan, fry off the onion and garlic until soft. Add the curry paste and fry for another 2 minutes. Pour in the tomatoes, grate the ginger, add the chili powder with the green beans and chickpeas. Leave to bubble for 10 mins until the squash is ready. Add the squash to the pan, season to taste and add the fresh chopped coriander.

Serve with rice (that has boiled with a few cardamom pods, then drained - not forgetting to remove the pods) and some yummy mango chutney!


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



Constantia

A Versatile Family Home

Imagine having a driveway that takes you on a journey past an idyllic lake, through an abundance of trees and arriving at a secluded house with plenty of charm on many different levels, literally. Built in around 1963, Constantia is one of four quirky and unique houses immersed in the woodland of St. Saviour.

The site used to comprise of one granite cottage with vineyards/greenhouses before the four unusual properties were constructed. Present owners, Trudie and Nigel, have lived in the house since 1997 and have used it to bring up a family, entertain and enjoy the serenity of the valley. The couple have two daughters, Louisa, who is at Imperial College London studying Geology and Sarah, who is an A-Level student at Jersey College for Girls. The household also consists of three cats and a dog.



Once you approach the house, you notice the meadow opposite, the single garage with its red door and US mail box attached, and the trees overhead. A wooden gate provides access to steps that lead up to the front door.

As you enter the house, the initial impression is 'open plan', fresh and light. The interior is decorated in a New England style that "just sort of evolved", explains Trudie. The guest bathroom and stairs to the first floor are to the right and the kitchen, dining area and sitting room are immediately accessible. There is also a functional fireplace in the centre of the room creating a cosy feel.

Double doors lead out onto a fenced and decked area with a tree protruding in the centre of the decking. "We just decked around the tree, in the summer we normally have a table and chairs outside and the tree acts as a natural shade."

For the most part, the house has remained the same as when Trudie and Nigel first moved in. Aside from modernising the house and giving it a New England look, the couple added a slight extension to the property about six years ago that extended the sitting room and provided a roof terrace on the first floor. This was made structurally

sound so that further extensions or rooms could be built upon it at any point in the future. Therefore, "the spare room on the first floor could be extended or perhaps another room or office could be built." Alternatively, the roof terrace could continue to be used for sunbathing during the summer months.

Taking the stairs up to the first floor, on your left is the spacious house bathroom, which is directly outside the master room. So, despite the fact that the master room does not have an en-suite, you do not have to travel far to laze in the large bath. In the master

room, the existing window has been replaced with a large picture window. "We put in a lot of windows because it is so private and we wanted to exploit that". Indeed, the windows and doors are plentiful and allow for a bright and functional house.

The first floor also contains a playroom that leads to the girls' bedrooms, which are positioned either side of another bathroom. One room has access onto a terraced area and the other has access to a garden. "The girls would often go outside with their friends and also climb onto the roof and lie down looking up at the

stars." This part of the house would be ideal for a couple with children or, on the other hand, some cosmetic work could transform it into a guest wing, teenage wing or even provide an income by becoming a rentable self contained section.

The various doors throughout the house enable you to enjoy the outdoors and nature. "The wildlife is abundant; there are lots of ducks, geese, chickens, squirrels and birds." Surrounding the property at different levels are many decked or terraced areas (one of which is linked by a bridge), various gardens and even a vegetable patch. This is due to the way the house is positioned in the valley. Some of the space has potential for further developments to the property (subject to approval), like a swimming pool for example.

The house is not a listed building and all the property owners of the four houses have a share of the small quarry nearby and joint ownership of the private drive. There are also covenants on the adjoining land so it will not be developed. Constantia is a particular taste. It is a house that could remain as it is and be home to an adventurous family, or it could be adapted to suit your requirements. "There is so much you can do, it's ideal for parties because there are so many different levels, you can mingle and move around, and it's great for kids to explore. It's also quiet and safe." The house offers privacy both externally, via its wooded location, and internally, due to its choice of rooms.

"It's quite emotional to say that we are selling, and to think that someone will be living in our house," says Trudie, but the couple want to downsize as the girls begin to leave the nest and are looking for a property with a similar setting and with the scope to be a project.

Winter is the time to think about pruning many plants in the garden. However, never prune for the sake of pruning, prune only the plants that need pruning. Roses are a good example of plants that need pruning to get the best results.

Why Prune Rose?

Encourage new growth and bloom Remove dead wood Improve air circulation Shape the plant

Tools You'll Need:

Sharp Secateurs Long-handled Loppers Thick Gloves (preferably long ones)

Ransoms Guide to the basics of Pruning roses -The "3Ds": remove all damaged, dead or diseased wood.

When starting, use clean, sharp tools and look at the overall plant, begin pruning from the base of the plant. Prune to open the centre of the plant to light and air circulation. You prune or cut, hold your secateurs in such a way that the best bud is left behind. Don't use secateurs that tend to crush the stem as they cut.

The cut angle should be 45 degrees so that it slopes slightly back and away from the bud. In this way any moisture forming on the stem will run away. The bud should also face outward. Be careful not to make your cut too close to the growth bud. It is also wrong to make it too far from the bud. The cut should be 4 to 5 mm above a bud that is facing toward the outside of the plant.

When you remove a complete stem, use sharp secateurs to cut them as close to the main stem as possible. Trim the stem with a sharp knife flush with the main stem. Watch out that you don't damage the main stem when pruning roses. Larger stems may be trimmed with long-handled loppers.

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
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Getting Structured

From next month Gallery will be working with the AJA (that's the Association of Jersey Architects) to add a new string to our property section bow. With this in mind, and thinking all form and structure we thought we'd draw your attention to one of Jersey's lastest civil engineering marvels.



Those of youth at make a priority of observing all that happens at the airport will have probably noticed the latest addition: 10,000 tonnes of concrete that is being fashioned into a rather excellent new control tower.

This concrete will be poured to form the base and then the columns. The walls from the first floor to the roof will then be formed with the steelwork to the roof which is due to arrive this month. Then the roof and cladding works to the main operations building will also take place. The main stem of the tower was formed using the Slipform method, which involved working twenty-four hours a day for five days and nights and finished on time (phew). A structural scaffold was erected and used to help form the concrete walls, slabs and sixteen fins that form the structure that will eventually shape the tower. Once the concrete works are finished, the VCR (Visual Control Unit) will be made and lifted into place, with the rain screen aluminium cladding taking place around the same time. This impressive structure will be the new home to Jersey's air traffic controllers. Give them a wave next time you're on your way back to the island.

Jersey Post beats all of its delivery targets

JERSEY POST HAS RELEASED ITS LAT-EST PERFORMANCE STATISTICS WHICH SHOW THAT OVER THE LAST SIX MONTH PERIOD, MORE THAN 97% OF LOCAL MAIL WAS DELIVERED WITHIN 24HRS. THE COMPANY ALSO BEAT ITS DELIVERY TARGETS FOR MAIL TO/FROM GUERNSEY AND THE UK.

"As an island based postal operator we are clearly dependent on the weather, transport links, and our partner networks to make sure all mail is delivered as quickly as possible", says Jersey Post's General Manager of Postal Services, Andy Jéhan. "Despite all of those factors we have still achieved some excellent results, and I would like to take this opportunity to pay tribute to all our staff who have worked hard to achieve these very high standards".

"If the mail plane is late because of the weather, or if the airport has to close for whatever reason, our performance levels are affected – but despite those factors outside of our control, our staff have still achieved some excellent results, with 99.9% of local mail reaching its destination within three days. We are not complacent though, and are always looking to improve; we will be working to even higher targets for 2009".

Over the course of the whole year, Jersey Post handled 97.7million items of mail, delivering 6 days a week and collecting from 187 post boxes twice a day, with postal workers walking the equivalent of 31 ITEX walks (i.e. walking around the Island twice every month!).



Kerb-side recycling to begin in St Lawrence

This isn't technically a business story is it? OK, you've got us. But we wanted to include this but didn't have a space. We'll mention it again in our natural eco issue next month but this is a starter for 10......As proud St Lawrence residents, Gallery are now proud to have kerb-side recycling and are the first parish in the island to have kerb-side recycling for cardboard.

Every household in St Lawrence will receive four receptacles to be used exclusively for the purpose of separating out their household waste for recycling. They will receive two stacking boxes, the first will be used for newspapers and magazines and the second will be for metal packaging. They will also be given two reinforced plastic bags, one for plastic bottles and one for cardboard.

St Lawrence will now be the second parish in Jersey to have such a scheme. The project follows the successful pilot scheme in St John, which began in 2006.




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Half price sales, pay half now, pay half later, half the fat, half the calories – things that come in halves are generally too good to be true. You have to take the good with the bad.

This new Smart ForTwo CDi may be almost half the size of the average family runaround and thanks to its uber low emissions you now only have to pay half the price to park it over here but it's also manufactured by Mercedes, and we all know they don't do things by halves. It seems the only bad news is that they're not available over here in right hand drive until April, but like I said, you DO have to take the good with the bad.

Recently released in ze-fatherland, the model we tested has been brought over by Jacksons from Germany to give islanders an idea of what to expect from this pint-sized petrol-pump pugilist. It's an all new generation of Smart ForTwo you see, and although the quirky looks remain with the exterior redesign, the differences between this and the previous generation ForTwo are vast.

For starters, the old ForTwo had a bootspace that could only be described as abysmal. The curious raised section that covered the engine has now been made flat, meaning that the Smart is now a realistic urban delivery vehicle. Believe it or not, we've heard from a reliable source that you can now fit a full size washing machine in there (albeit with the passenger seat folded forward). Still available in both glass top coupé and convertible versions, the latter will undoubtedly be a godsend to businesses distributing parasols, fishing rods, flag poles, cabers (it's sure to be a hit in Scotland) or surfboards. You saw it here first.

Despite now packing a choice of massively increased displacement petrol and diesel engines (proportionately I'd say that going

from 600cc to 1 litre is fairly massive) the Smart ForTwo would wipe the floor with pretty much anything else on the market in a kind of emissions limbo competition. The CDi produces a meagre 88g/km of carbon dioxide, and that's the lowest figure for any production diesel engine. I can almost see El Nino's scowl from here.


Aside from saving the environment this now means that owners will be eligible for half price parking in Jersey whilst they're whizzing around taking full advantage of its compact size and squillion miles per gallon fuel consumption (unofficial figures). Speaking of whizzing, that classic whizzing noise that Smart owners have become accustomed to is far, far quieter now.

Out there in the sprawling metropolis of St Helier the ForTwo CDi proved nimble, and as you can see from the photos proved plenty of fun squeezing into the smallest of parking spots, mostly head on, although I'm not convinced of the legality of some of them as its length is slightly more than the width of even a reasonably large car.

They've definitely improved the new generation Smart in all departments bar one, and that's the gearbox. Serial Smart drivers will be used to it but I'd even opt for an automatic only gearbox should the option ever exist if it meant avoiding the 'surge' that you experience when pulling off and changing gears. It's almost as if you're driving a car with a huge single turbocharger, except you aren't. Don't get me wrong, the driving experience is still good, just don't expect instant, smooth gearchanges in either automatic or semi-auto driving modes.

Tiny fuel consumption, cut price parking, relieved environmental guilt - good, gearbox not so good. Oh well, like I said... you have to take the good with the bad.









A BREATH OF FRESH AIR?

It seems that gone are the days when car manufacturers release a new concept or design study at the worlds' motorshows only to rarely put even a vaguely similar vehicle into production.

This is good news, especially in the case of the Saab 9-X Air concept billed to make it into showrooms hopefully later this year.

A breath of fresh air it may be, and what you see is what you get because at the heart of this 200hp roadster is a 1.4 litre Saab BioPower engine that uses petrol,

ethanol, turbocharging and a electric hybrid system featuring regenerative braking, fuel cut-off, automatic engine stop-start and of course, an electric motor. That means sixty in six seconds and 140 miles per hour, officer.

Bucking the trend for hard-topped coupé-cabriolets whose designs are heavily influenced and often ruined by the need for a large bootspace, the 9-X Air's traditional cloth roof cantilevers out from behind the rear seats to cover the pillarless wraparound windows should you be fortunate enough to live in, say, Jersey with its tropical climate -

during the current monsoon season.

Of course, or at least as I've learnt during my lifetime, good news invariably seems to come packaged with bad news and in the case of the 9-X Air those propelleresque wheels will unfortunately not make it into production according to Saab due to both manufacturing costs and safety issues. I can only assume that whilst they probably draw in a good amount of cold air to cool the brakes they'd also be effective in slicing up small children and red squirrels from the pavements. Good news for cyclists then, who can sleep easy for now.

A NECESSARY EVIL

With all this talk of environmentally sound vehicles putting out low CO2 emmissions, fitted with hybrid and stop-start systems I've decided that the most important consideration during these times of environmental and financial peril is most definitely carbon offsetting.

Take either the Smart ForTwo CDi or the Saab 9X-Air seen on the previous pages or even the recently delivered electric Smart cars taken on by Jersey Electricity this month for example; even taking into consideration that a vast amount of the world's electricity is still produced by burning things - their emissions are almost unfeasibly low to the point that something MUST be done to redress the balance.

I've decided that the most important consideration during these times of environmental and financial peril is most definitely carbon offsetting.

Thankfully, Brabus have managed to take care of this whilst also sticking two fingers squarely in the face of tuning house AMG by building this - the Brabus G V12 S BiTurbo.

I'm neither a farmer, militant rebel, international political figure, pope or gangsta rapper but I've still lusted after a Mercedes G-Wagen for as long as I can remember and until now there's been nothing more awe-inspiring than the ridiculous AMG G55, complete with an ozone-annihilating 5.5 litre V8 shoehorned into its 40 year old engine bay. It's disgusting, filthy excess. I love it.

Audi have missed a trick by 'unboxing the box' in my eyes (despite the nice advertising campaign) - why not just spend months working out how to fit a 6.3 litre V12 into what was most likely the box that all of the constituent parts for Panzer tanks were once delivered in. And then add two turbos for good measure.

You must be gagging to know by now - seven hundred horse power. Yes, 700. It only takes 4.3 seconds to get to sixty (so cancel that 911 turbo order - you need something bigger anyway, you know, for the dog...) Unfortunately the laws of physics will create an aerodynamic wall for you at about 163mph though. Oh well.

All of this for a mere £400,000. I wonder if they take Maestro..?










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Top Golfing Advice

Cheer it up by adding some new grips and giving them a clean, and believe me they will reward you for it.

2. Lessons.

Even if it is just a quick session with your local professional to check that your fundamentals are still in place - it's worthwhile making sure that your technique hasn't got rusty.

3. Practice.

With the lighter evenings starting to make a difference, now's the time to tune your game at the range. Make sure you practice with a purpose. Ball-beaters beware, practice makes permanent, not necessarily perfect. Limit your hitting to 50 balls over 30minutes, to be sure you are working effectively.

4. Short Game.

For those of you that have been brave enough to hit balls over the winter now is a good time to sharpen up your short game. Bear in mind that we are still some weeks off good quality putting surfaces so indoor practice is preferable at this time of year. Practicing on carpets at home will definately give you better feedback than bumpy practice greens.

5. Finally, set your goals for '09. Take a look back at last year and try to identify your strengths and weaknesses. Work out an action plan for improvement and stick to it.

What do you do?




