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

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Outside is a concept album first released September 26, 1995 by David Bowie on Virgin Records. Outside introduced the characters of one of Bowie's short stories; a mon-linear gothic drama hyper cycle" called the "Diaries of Nathan Adler". The album pamphlet outlined the story of a somewhat cyberpunk version of the year 1999, in which the government had created a new bureau to investigate the phenomenon of Art Crime. In this future, murder and mutilation of bodies had become a new underground art craze. The main character, Nathan Adler, was in the business of deciding what of this was legally acceptable as art and what was, in a word, trash. The album is filled with references to characters and their lives as he investigates the complicated events leading up to the murder of a fourteen-year-old girl. So there....

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Sometimes I don't know why we do it to ourselves. TELL US A BIT ABOUT YOURSELF...

Born in Jersey, from school I was a dairy farmer by trade but following that took on a host of other jobs - cheffing, delivering booze, working at Fort Regent in the gym and pool before deciding to do something with my life instead of just having a job. I wanted to focus on enjoying life to the max and doing all the sports I can, especially skateboarding, windsurfing, snowboarding and waterskiing. I'm probably the oldest active skateboarder in Jersey!

WE'VE HEARD YOU'VE PICKED UP A FEW ACCOLADES...

I've competed for Jersey as a mountain-biker, I was a competitive runner in my twenties, and I'm a Jersey waterskiing champion.

Also, on a recent trip to Zagreb I decided to try and find the oldest skateboarder in Croatia and not only found him, but managed to be a year older than him too! They kindly let me spray my name on one of their ramps to leave my mark...

TELL US ALL ABOUT ACTIVE ISLAND SPORTS...

It was originally called St Brelade's Windsurfing School but taking a gamble in 1997 I decided to take it over. It was great to be a single man having fun, doing something I enjoy working for the season then going away in the winter to snowboard, cycle through the Himalayas, windsurf in Barbados and things like that.

Since taking the school on it's grown considerably and we now offer dinghy sailing, kayaking, surfing, bodyboarding, blo-karting, stand-up paddle boarding for adults and kids alike as well as summer beach camps aimed at 8-12 year olds to introduce them to the sports we offer whilst also teaching them about safety at sea.

WHO ARE YOUR GREATEST INFLUENCES AND IDOLS?

Definitely my friends, and Jersey skaters like Steve Harben. Other influences include skater Lance Mountain and surfer and windsurfer Laird Hamilton who's pretty big in stand-up paddling.

I also idolise my dad for being so sensible and my girlfriend for putting up with me!

WHAT WOULD YOU SAY IS YOUR GREATEST ACHEIVEMENT?

Managing to survive jumping from Bonne Nuit pier into about 3 foot of water was quite an acheivement, as well as taking out a personal loan for £30k to fund a Porsche as a charity raffle prize when I had no money! All tickets were sold and the loan repaid, thankfully...

WHAT DO YOUR PLANS FOR THE FUTURE INVOLVE?

There are always plenty of places to go to but few that haven't been taken over by McDonalds - you can't even go to China or South America without seeing one now!

I plan to move more into teaching and am looking at developing a classroom facility at Ouaisne as part of the summer beach camps which will be great for teaching beach safety to both youths and adults as well as providing shelter from the rain on bad days!

Vicki Lucas

Describe yourself using three words? Easy going, friendly and dedicated.

What exactly do you do?

I train 9 racehorses every day, seven days a week. I ride three horses a day including during the evenings and at weekends. It's a 24-hour job. I come in in the morning and muck out the stables and groom the horses. It's only the three of us working, myself, Lydia and Phillipa and my other half, Gordon Shenkin, who also rides out with us. Gordon does all the paperwork and deals with the racing and jockeys.

What is the first task of each day? Feeding the horses, I give them their breakfast at 7am and then muck them out. I then ride out all morning and usually finish at about 12.3opm, going back again at about 4pm.

What is the best thing about your job? It's lovely on a sunny, bright morning. It's not a job, it's a way of life and its nice to do something that you actually enjoy and we have fun together. If you have happy staff you have happy horses

What is the funniest thing that has ever happened to you whilst training or looking after the horses?

There was an incident up on the gale (Paul Green's training centre St Markin where one of the sprinklers was on and the horses spooked and we both landed up in the sand next to each other! It's usually funny when someoifalls off, providing we don't get hurt.



How did it all start?

I have been in racing for about 20 years in England and then moved to Jersey about 4 years ago. Gordon's dad owned some racehorses and then we got some more. Now we have 9 horses and have done well in the last couple of seasons. We have raced the horses in England and hopefully will have two going to St Brieuc. We have never had a winner in France but have had a few placings. The horses are mostly raced here in Jersey.

What were your ambitions as a child? I always wanted to do something with horses. I came from a horsey family and grew up around horses.

How many horses do you have and do you have any favourites? Nine horses and no favourites, they are all different and all have their

different ways and characteristics.

Do you break the horses in yourself? No, we just train them for horse racing.

You also work with Gordon Shenkin, how do you feel you work as a team? Ever since we met we have always worked together in racing and we get on very well.

What is the most difficult part of your job?
There is no time off, no Sunday lie-ins.

If you could do any other job what would it be?
Be a lady of leisure.

What is your greatest achievement? When you have a horse and think that it's not going to be good and then get it to win the race. When one of our horses wins we are jumping around like loony bins.

What advice would you give to someone wanting to be a trainer? There is never a day off, it's hard work, spending evenings on the phone to owners and sorting jockeys out and you just don't get a break from it so you have to be 100% committed to want to do it.

What is the training routine and how long does it take?

All the horses are different and at different levels. It can take a good couple of months to get them up and running. They are like athletes and have to be built up until they are galloping and fit and ready to go. Like people, some take longer than others. I take them to different places to train, like the beach, but mostly up the gallop.

Do you train anybody else's horses? Yes, there are syndicates and partnerships and space for some more.

Where is your favourite place to go horse riding?

Up the gallop which is particularly nice on a sunny day. It's next door to the stables and looks right out over Rozel and there are fantastic views of the coast.

Where did you learn to be a trainer?

I've just been in racing a long time, since I was 18 years old and worked with lots of different people and trainers. Then I came over here and because Gordon's dad had the horses we just did it ourselves and it started from there really.

What are your aspirations for the future?

To get the Trainers Title.

Vicki Lucas was born in Devon and grew up on her parents' farm. She was about two or three years old when she started horse riding. Vicki also enjoys running when she is not horse riding and completed a half marathon in May. She lives just outside St Helier and has a son called Jacob who is 8 years old and has his own pony.



PUDSEY BEAR REFUSED PASSPORT

A Welsh woman who changed her name to Pudsey Bear for a charity appeal has been refused a new passport.

Receptionist Eileen De Bont, 37, from Prestatyn, Denbighshire, raised £4,000 for Children in Need when she changed her name by deed poll.

Bank and credit cards say the divorced mother-of-two is 'Mrs P Bear' and that name is also on her driving licence. She is taxed as Pudsey Bear.

But Identity and Passport Service officials said the name change was "frivolous" and would bring them "into disrepute", reports the Daily Mirror.

Ms Bear said: "My passport expired and they told me they would issue me one only as Eileen De Bont.

"But that's not my name. I'm going to have trouble checking into hotels, hiring cars and changing money."

She asked locals in Prestatyn to suggest a new name to adopt as a fundraiser. Pudsey Bear came top, beating Vauxhall Frontera and Scunthorpe Travelodge.

DIMWIT DETECTIVE 'BUNGLES BANK RAID



A detective was arrested for robbing a bank without a mask using his police issue pistol - and making his getaway in an unmarked patrol car.

CCTV of the raid led police straight to Juergen Richter, 55, who allegedly stole £8,000 from the bank in Baden-Wurttemberg, Germany.

Police spokesman Norbert Schaetzle said: "He said he had severe financial problems and wanted to solve them quickly.

"But there are other ways of dealing with financial problems

and he, of all people, should have known that crime really does not pay."

Another colleague said: "He may as well have just walked into the bank, told them his name and where the police could find him afterwards."

"It is hard to imagine a more inept robbery. When you think how many failed criminal plans he has dealt with over the years you would think he might have known better."

Richter faces charges of armed robbery.



"I know traffic wardens have a reputation for being miserable and hard-hearted. It looks like it's true."









Hooker #2:


Deal. By the way, you're under arrest. *Produces police badge*



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

Medical cover

Medical travel insurance has become a big issue since the end of March when the UK Reciprocal Health Agreement ceased, meaning islanders are no longer covered for non-emergency medical treatment in the UK.

Jersey residents will still be treated at A&E without being charged, as well as immediate treatment given by a GP. However, the treatment on a hospital ward, operations, out-patient appointments and any other services will all be charged.

It is therefore important to ensure you have adequate medical insurance cover or can afford to pay for any treatment that might be needed when visiting the UK – just as you would for a visit to France or other countries with which Jersey has no reciprocal health agreement.

Travel insurance

There are an abundance of insurance policies on the market from single to annual multi-trip cover. What's important is to make sure you read the small print as some will not cover you if there are any problems or delays with your flight back to the islands for example.

When travelling inter-island, make sure you check for any policy restrictions as these can apply depending on how long your stay is on that particular island. Also it is important to check that your policy covers you from your starting point destination e.g. Jersey back to Jersey, as a lot of policies will only cover you when you reach mainland U.K.

Free insurance is offered on some bank accounts as a matter of course, although, the breadth of cover may vary. For example, winter sports cover may be an additional premium, so make sure you check the finer detail. Many policies include an age restriction only covering you up to the age of 75.

Sometimes when a booking is made with a credit card the customer receives automatic insurance, but be careful as this rarely replaces comprehensive travel insurance and it may be necessary to take out additional cover.

Money matters

It is certainly safer to use a debit or credit card for transactions and cash withdrawals when overseas. Many cards also come with services and incentives such as AirMiles and card protections.

Before you leave it is wise to make copies of all the documents you are taking with you such as your credit cards and your passport. A 24 hour cover service can be set up with your bank should these vital items be stolen and plans can also be put into place for their cancellation and/or replacement.

Travellers Cheques are still one of the safest ways to carry money. If lost or stolen they can normally be replaced within 24 hours.

Finally there are some good ways of planning for your holiday in advance with the help of regular savings – "Save the Change" for instance. By putting a little money aside on a monthly or even weekly basis rather than absorbing this into your everyday spend, it can soon mount up enough to go towards, or even pay for a large part of your holiday.


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Situated at the heart of the Irish Sea, approximately 70 miles off the Cumbrian coast, the Isle of Man is one of the best kept secrets in the British Isles. Stunningly beautiful, with a wide variety of wildlife and scenery, the island is a haven for visitors looking for a relaxing break which makes it the perfect location for travellers.

The island offers something for everyone and with locals welcoming everyone as a visitor and not a tourist you are sure to experience excellent Manx hospitality.

For those interested in the past there's 10,000 years of history to explore including two medieval castles - Peel and Castle Rushen. Both castles enable visitors to witness the craft and heritage of the era. Due to its location at the geographical centre of the British Isles, the Isle of Man has been invaded throughout the centuries and has

played host to plenty of invaders all of whom have left their marks on the island

Rushen Abbey is one of the most important medieval religious sites in the Isle of Man. Dating from 1134, it was acquired by Manx National Heritage and re-opened to the public in 2000, complete with chanting monks and live links to archaeologists working on site, vividly evoking a sense of history. It's one of many heritage sites and centres operated by Manx National Heritage which also boasts the awardwinning Manx Museum in Douglas and the House of Manannan interactive heritage centre in Peel.

Visitors should also take time to explore the island's charming villages and picturesque harbours - the ancient capital of Castletown, the capital Douglas with its high street shops or the simpler charms of Tynwald Mills Craft Centre, at St John's, the cathedral city Peel on the west coast and Ramsey in the north. The Island has 227 square miles to explore either on foot or

aboard the Victorian steam and electric railways and transport has always been important in the Island since the early pioneers established the TT - Tourist Trophy - which celebrated its centenary in 2007. The festival still attracts around 40,000 motorcycle fans early in June but it's just one event in a hectic calendar of motorsport which makes the Isle of Man the Road Racing capital of the world.

In addition to the TT races, the Manx Grand Prix and car rallies are held annually; there's a host of sporting, music and arts festivals filling up the calendar. Alternatively, various other interests are catered for including cycling, pony trekking, angling, and golf - nine courses - while the island has endless possibilities for walking and wildlife-watching across undulating hills, craggy coastlines or through a myriad of Manx national glens. Or if you are a foodie, experiencing the island's culinary specialities is a must - Manx cheese, kippers, queenies (succulent queen scallops) and home-brewed beer are widely available.

Must visit venues:



The House of Manannan

An award winning heritage centre at Peel on the Island's west coast. This £6 million centre operated by Manx National Heritage presents the Isle of Man's Celtic, Viking and maritime history using interactive technology. Allow at least 2 hours to see it all - excellent entertainment for a rainy day.

Cregneash Village Folk Museum*

300 year old cottages nestling in a village in the scenic south of the island - the village was used as a location in the hit comedy Waking Ned. Operated as a folk museum since the 1930s, Cregneash is farmed according to traditional methods with horse ploughs as well as free range hens, pigs and sheep to be seen. There are also wood turners, a blacksmith, spinners and weavers at work on different days of the week. And the highlight of a visit is to sample the scrumptious cakes and cooking at the Cregneash tea rooms.

Laxey Wheel*

the 'Lady Isabella' is the largest working water wheel in the world with a diameter of 72 feet. It was built in 1854 to pump water from the village lead mines and visitors have been climbing to the viewing platform above the majestic red wheel ever since to take in views of the mountain and the sea.

The Sound Visitor Centre*

International artist Elisabeth Barbier will be having her first exhibition in Jersey at Fort Regent from June 24th to June 27th. The works will be mainly oil on canvas using the traditional brush techniques, with one or two chalk and pastel works. The categories are; nudes, dancers, birds and nature. The exhibition does not obey the traditional logic of a specific theme or type of display (either by genre of size). It is an overview of an artist who, after years of undisclosed and strained emotions, expresses newfound joy and happiness.

Where did your art work start?

I don't want it to sound like a Charles Dickens' story but my grandmother raised me in a strained environment, where communication, love and tenderness were scarce. So as a teen, I started to paint to escape my grey and depressing surroundings. I used bright and joyful colours in my work to created a world of light and happiness of my own.

Who has helped you form your work?

The Moroccan artist Lourak guided me until one morning he told me 'there is nothing left I can teach you'.

What triggers your creativity?

Emotions. Without any particular preconceived idea or objective. I love the quiet sound of the breeze ruffling the leaves of the trees in the morning and to watch the sun rise over the lake and mountains while the city below awakens.

Where is your favourite place?

My favourite place in the world is to be in the woods when the sunlight shines through the trees and no other sound but that of the forest may be heard.

Where do you paint?

I like to work alone so I lock myself up in my atelier where nobody except my cats are welcome! I generally start three to four paintings at once, often with totally unrelated topics, sometimes inspired by a magazine cover, by a picture, a story, or occasionally by my sole imagination.

Jersey's First BA Hons Degree Show


Seven artists bound together by their participation in the University of Plymouth BA Hons Fine Art program, facilitated through Highlands College, will present their final work to the public.







Critics have scoffed at the 1984 Transformers: The Movie animated film. It has been referred to as nothing more than an hour and a half long advert, a cynical attempt to sell a new line of toys to naïve children. Even its soundtrack has been mocked for its overly sincere 80s power ballads from the likes of Stan Bush and Van Halen.

Of course these so called critics are idiots. For young men of a certain age this film is a sacred text. I don't know about you but I can say for sure that it taught me much more about morals and responsibility than my parents and teachers ever did. I'll still argue that the Death of Optimus Prime (Even if he was to return just a couple of months later) and the subsequent passing of the leadership of the Autobots is one of the most moving scenes in cinema history. As you might imagine my expectations for the 2007 live action film were pretty high.

With Michael Bay (Bad Boys, Armageddon, The Rock) at the helm I never had any doubts that the film would deliver both the action and eye popping visuals that movie goers would expect from a film about cars that transform into giant robots and beat the crap out of each other. What I feared was that this would be the entire thrust of the movie. Though Bay never fails to bring the explosions, it's fair to say that his characters are often secondary to the stunts and special effects. Still, the studio had an ace up their sleeve; an ace with 3 Oscars and a reputation as the director of some of cinema's most beloved motion pictures. Steven Spielberg may only be Executive Producer but the film has his fingerprints all over it. The theme of an alien culture coming into contact with a very American humanity is one peppered throughout Spielberg's work from Close Encounters to Jurassic Park to War of the Worlds. More than a couple of parallels can be drawn between Transformers' Bumblebee with his stunted method of communication and close friendship with a human 'child' and E.T. Whether he is responsible or not, the film mirrors the best of Spielberg's cannon by keeping the relationships between the characters central to the narrative. The end

battle might be the most visually arresting section of the film but my personal favourite scene is the one in which the robots creep around outside Sam's house. Rarely will you see a scene choreographed to milk so much drama and comedy out of a situation.

My expectations for the first film were high. If anything they're even higher for this second instalment. Introductions are out the way and from the look of the trailers, things have been

amped up considerably. Storytelling conventions demanded that the Transformers remain off screen for large portions of the first film. Second time around this won't be the case. Both Autobots and Decepticons have picked up reinforcements including some designs moving on beyond the cars and into heavier forms of artillery. The film is subtitled 'Revenge of The Fallen' and can only refer to Megatron returning to continue his personal war with Optimus Prime. However, it seems at first glance that human characters haven't been sacrificed to give the robots in disguise more screen time. Shia La Beouf's Sam, his scene stealing parents and the smoking hot Megan Fox feature prominently in trailers indicating that they remain in place to anchor the plot and give the audience someone to relate to.

There are more than a few different plates for Bay to keep spinning. He has to deliver a film that trumps the almost surprising success of the first outing whilst leaving somewhere to go for the already announced third film. He also has to balance a demand for more robots whilst keeping the human characters at the heart of the story. It is a matter of showing he can produce a film with both style and substance in equal measure. Michael Bay has to show that as a director there is more to him than meets the eye.

TERMINATOR: SALVATION



things to make & do...

Jersey Silver Studio, at the Harbour Gallery in St Aubin, is a specialist Art Clay studio where courses of all types are held and people fly in from all over the world to learn how to use this magical product.

Believe it or not, you can even get a ACWUK qualification which is recognised worldwide enabling you to make all the jewellery you want at home.

I spent a morning at Jersey Silver Studio at the Harbour Gallery making a pair of earrings and this is how easy it was. I found a plastic starfish (it can be whatever you want) and took it to the Jersey Silver Studio with a design in mind. I then made a mould of my starfish out of a moulding material, similar to a dentist's moulding material which I pushed my starfish into while the material was still soft. I had to be quick here because the material sets within 5 minutes.

Using the mould I had made with the plastic starfish taken out, the Art Clay was pushed into the shape, making sure it filled all the space.






The Art Clay then needs drying, either with a hair dryer or hot plate until it's hard enough to get out.

Carefully removing the clay shape from the mould, it then has to be sanded down taking away all the rough edges and excess but without removing any important detail.





I then attached the earring fixings with Art Clay paste and smoothed them down with a water pen to make them invisible.









Hey presto - a beautiful pair of silver earrings!

The spa is excellent, I expected no less. I was welcomed, completed a short registration card and given a guided tour of the facilities. The spa is a true oasis. The subterranean pool is cavernous, but in a good way, giving the impression of having escaped from the real world rather than being underground. The pool is a good size and is surrounded by a variety of

facilities to soothe and calm; a sauna, steam room, aromatherapy steam room, heated stone loungers in a relaxation room and ergonomic jacuzzi. There's also a cold bucket shower if you're getting too hot.

My beauty therapist, Bex, showed me to the changing room so I could change into my robe and slippers. There's a certain amount of decadence to wandering around in hotel or spa robes. It was a little tricky in the one-size-for-everyone slippers. I felt a little bit like a geisha as I shuffled to my treatment room. Bex outlined my treatment, amusingly titled 'Play it Cool', and left me to get settled in the serenity of the spa (cheesy I know, but it really is the right way to describe it).

The treatment started with a back massage and application of thermal sea mud to the spine. It's a strange sensation as you lie down and it almost effervesces away underneath you, warming and soothing. Bex then turned to my face, applying a detox cleansing gel. I always thought that having someone massage your face was a bit of a weird concept but it really is incredible, other worldly even. I could definitely feel the stresses of my life waning as I relaxed and my breathing slowed. I defy anyone to be stressed in this environment.

Following the cleanse, Bex applied an oxygenating mask, designed to exfoliate (tricky with my considerable facial hair) and revitalise the skin. I think if I were to go again I'd shave beforehand to maximise the effect

of the treatment. At several stages throughout the treatment I definitely drifted off. By the time Bex had finished I felt as if I was under some sort of relaxation spell. Bex removed the thermal sea mud, and I was left to get myself together ready for my 'Come on in' Seawater bath.

I was led to a private room, which had an enormous Jacuzzi style seawater bath. It's big enough for two, three even, but it felt pretty damn decadent on my own. Of course a hardcore of foodies have been trying to get us to eat this way for years – steering us away from pretentiousness and towards pristine ingredients, perfectly cooked.

For a sophisticated take on delicious local food, try the Royal Yacht's restaurant Sirocco. It aims to take the formality out of fine dining by giving customers the chance to mix and match dishes from two different menus. Its 'Simply Sirocco' menu is a pared down version of classic tastes, focusing heavily on local produce and simple cooking techniques. It's nostalgic, welcoming, and most importantly, uncomplicated. And if you're feeling more high-maintenance, there's the 'Signature Sirocco' menu, which takes local ingredients and whips them up into intricate taste sensations, like the cider braised belly of local pork, and the Jersey lobster with smoked potato ravioli. Perfect for the fickle among us - try simple for your starter and get more complex for your main course or the other way around, none of the staff at Restaurant Sirocco will bat an eyelid. Aas executive chef Fred Tobin explains, "we cater for every mood, as the 'Simply Sirocco' and 'Signature Sirocco' menus work perfectly side

by side so you can have a mix of both, whatever your pleasure".

I took the decidedly high-maintenance Liza, just back from LA where she was working on a fly on the wall documentary about a well known celeb and his struggles with rehab—I'd love to tell you who, but it's very hush hush and embargoed until September. Sorry. She turned up with a gorgeous tan, a size zero figure and a new-found intolerance to dairy and eggs, thanks to too much reading of 'Skinny Bitch'. This'll put

Sirocco's kitchen to the test, I thought to myself, but the 'Simply Sirocco' menu is all about simplifying recipes to focus on the fresh local produce, so she found it easy to find a dish to suit her. The smoked salmon starter couldn't have been more perfect, carved tableside, it's served Scandinavian-style with a whole choice of different accompaniments; salted capers, chopped red onion, anchovies, finely diced hard-boiled egg, sea salt and a generous sprinkling of parsley. Think tapas, Nordic-style. It was a beautiful starter, made into an event by the whole ritual of carving, and choosing the accompaniments. I was torn between the avocado, peaches and pancetta salad on the Simply Sirocco menu, and the Jersey crab beignet with soft quail eggs and a caper and shallot dressing on the Signature menu. The salad won out in the end – with its delicious hit of sweet and salty from the peach and pancetta pairing, but I still want to try the crab beignet. Guess I'll have to come back...





On the Simply Sirocco main course menu, there's a mouthwatering mix of classic dishes - from local beef and oyster pie to Jersey lobster served with a whole choice of butters and sauces. Our choices were the local turbot with Jersey royals and salad, and the honey glazed rack of lamb. Liza's turbot was beautifully presented -the tasty firm fish with its fresh meaty flavours set off by tart capers and Jersey royals. It was simple, but perfectly cooked. My rack of lamb was absolutely delicious, sweet and juicy with a rich gravy, creamy potatoes, al-dente beans and some burst-in-the-mouth oven roasted cherry tomatoes. Definitely my favourite of the night.

The sommelier suggested Liza try a glass of their Chablis (the Albert Bichot, 2007) instead of her usual Pinot Grigio. She was glad she did – honeyed and rich, this was a classic dry Chablis and worth a try for yourself, a bottle comes in at £25.50. Then a delicious predessert of tempura strawberries and onto our desserts, a selection of four delicious sorbets for Liza and a trio of raspberry-themed mini desserts for me, a raspberry macaroon, white chocolate delice and a raspberry sorbet.

The restaurant changes character as the sun sets, going from a contemporary light dining room in the day to a sophisticated space full of low-lit chocolate tones and rich textures after dark, all set off by the sparkling harbour lights. It's chic, but not too formal the tables are far enough apart to not worry about eavesdroppers, and there's a steady buzz of conversation. And with the new informal approach to eating out, you get all the best bits of fine dining: the choice of breads, those clever little amuse-bouches, beautiful table settings and five-star service, along with a relaxed choice of menus uncomplicated or something a bit more special. All you have to do is sit back on their comfortable chairs and enjoy.

The menu mirrors the location and delivers lovely seafood alongside side other offerings such as venison, beef and duck. They have a lunch and early supper menu which sun-seekers can take advantage of and even the early risers can enjoy breakfast here. It is a brilliant location, offering local and seasonal produce alfresco style.

Or even try...

Village Bistro, the Atlantique or the Salty Dog in search of some more outdoor dining!

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TONGS AT THE READY..!

Summer is finally here and we want to spend as much time as we can outdoors. We move from the bar stool to the beer garden, from dining table to the garden furniture, and we swap the cooker for the BBQ.

What more of an excuse do we need to rally the troops up for a good summer feast outdoors? No TV to get distracted by, the summer sun is out and there are plenty of outdoor games to entertain the kids - as a whole there is every reason to get the tongs out and get the grill smoking.

We need to get past the carcinogenic chicken lumps that dad used to burn to a crisp back in the day, and rejuvenate the barbecue to a stylish and delicious meal time. It doesn't need to be completely focused on the meat as there is so much more to cooking on the coals, think in season mackerel, think aubergines and corn on the cobs, monkfish kebabs and delicious king prawns, there is an abundance of choice and it doesn't need to break the bank.

Mackerel is inexpensive, and is brilliant grilled on the barbecue, fish kebabs always get gobbled up quickly, and monkfish is a brilliant sweet and juicy fish that is transformed by being chargrilled. Bring a piece of Oz to the British outdoor cooking, by 'chucking another shrimp on the barbie' and pouring yourself a beer, as apparently we're in for a sun-packed summer.

Even the meat can move up a whole new level. Forget picking up readymade burgers from the supermarket, create some flavoursome ones of your own - blitz up some minced beef with onions, garlic, Tabasco, Worcestershire sauce and mustard, or swap the mustard for sweet chilli. Try lamb with some Indian spices or chicken with ginger, lemongrass and Thai red curry paste, even pork mince can be transformed with some crushed peanuts and honey. Mince is cheap and goes a long way to feed a crowd.

Take the focus away from the heat and dish up some light and tasty salads. No need for stress as these can be prepared hours ahead and can be dished up in a cool fashion. Simple and cost effective ingredients such as cannellini beans can be mixed with tuna, capers and spring onion as a substantial salad. Traditional tomato, mozzarella and basil salad makes good use of seasonal ingredients, and a crisp green salad with exotic leaves matches the tasty burgers.

Us Brits are always so tempted to stick to the norm when it comes to outdoor cooking. Sales of burgers and sausages shoot up a mile in the summer. But what's wrong with a nice piece of lamb steak, flatted slightly with meat cleaver or rolling pin, seasoned with some toasted and crushed cumin and coriander and grilled over the coals? Complement the meat with a lovely Moroccan chickpea cous cous salad mixed with some chopped

apricots or sultanas - bring the Middle East to a very British garden event!

Good old tomato ketchup is never far from the garden dining table (or the sausages for that fact!) – but for some new flavours, take a trip to one of our local farm shops and choose from their selection of rich, tasty and moorish chutneys and relishes, they are perfect for any barbeque occasion and can add exciting and new flavours to any dish...but chances are the traditional ketchup won't make it far away!

Instead of white baps, pick up some ciabatta, bake until crisp and serve your burgers in these for added crunch - also perfect dipped in balsamic vinegar and oil. For nibbles prior to the main event, grab some tasty olives or whip up some dips to go with some homemade tortilla crisps. Mash up some avocado and make your own guacamole with lime and coriander, or even chop up some tomatoes, mix again with coriander, red onion and tobasco and create a fresh and spicy salsa. Sometimes the nibbles can be just as exciting as what follows!

So with the temperature hotting up, the white pasty legs coming out and the late summer evenings, now is the time to get the fridge stocked up and ready for the barbeque season. Forget the unhealthy label that has attached itself to cooking outdoors, as it can be a light, tasty and very seasonal meal. Even with the credit crunch upon us, get each person to bring a dish and before you know it, you have a banquet at no cost at all. But be prepared, if the man of the house is behind the grill, get the fire extinguishers out as you never know what could happen!

Blaggers' Banquet goes to Jersey Live

If you haven't caught 'Blaggers' Banquet', showing on Mondays at 8pm on ITV1, then set your Sky+ to catch the last two episodes of the series, which shows you what was really going on behind the scenes at last year's Jersey Live.

The series, a Channel Islands-based amalgam of 'Faking It' and 'Hell's Kitchen', pairs maverick Guernsey chef, Dean Hodkinson with a team of kitchen novices and teaches them how to blag it as top chefs in just three days. Not only do they have to cook a top-quality meal for 12 VIP guests, but they have to source the ingredients themselves, all for a budget of £1.50 a head...

The final two episodes follows Dean training up a team of 'chefs' from Jersey's Salvation Army hall to cook a intimate rock star-themed banquet for twelve music industry bigwigs, backstage at Jersey Live. With most of them over fifty, the closest these four have come to heavy metal is marching with their Salvation Army tubas, and Dean's worried about how his God-fearing team will cope at Jersey Live. "There's going to be lots of drinking, lots of smoking, lots of screaming and lots of swearing, and these are men of the cloth, so I'm a bit concerned".

Dean should be more concerned about whether they can cook or not, after all on the big day, his team of blaggers have to do all of the cooking themselves. Dean soon finds out exactly what he's up against when he sets the team twenty minutes to create and cook a dish using five ingredients. It's a disaster – inedible, and in some cases, still raw – and most of the attempts end up in the bin. 'I thought working with children was hard, but the elderly are even harder', groans

Used to collecting for charity, they're slightly better when it comes to blagging free produce. A tour of Jersey's market and farm shops yields meat, fish and orange peel for free, and the non-smoking and teetotal Sally Army chaps even manage to find a cigar and some rum for Dean's rock star feast. They gamely spend an evening partying at Jersey Live, on lemonade of course, then a full day in the kitchens, under Dean's watchful eye, preparing the Baccanalian banquet while Dean's wife Armelle, manages to set up a kitchen and decadent Moroccan-style dining room backstage at the

Of course, it's all going too smoothly, the sun comes out, the white-haired Salvation Army chefs soldier on and finish all of the preparation without throwing any tantrums, and for once Dean can't complain. It looks like it's going to be a breeze. The director must have had a headache, wondering how to introduce some 'mild peril' before the ad break maybe an exploding blender, or Dean suddenly losing his voice, but then a real disaster strikes just hours before the banquet and for the first time in the series, it looks like the whole thing will have to be called off.

No spoilers from us, you'll have to watch it to find out what happens, and of course to see if you can spot yourself in the Jersey Live crowd shots.

Last month saw the opening of the latest phase of De Gruchy's re-development, in the form of a brand spanking new cafe.

Appropriately named 'Upstairs at De Gruchy', the coffee shop is located on the first floor near the stairs to the hair and beauty salon. Many will remember the café that used to sit where the lingerie department is currently, so this is a welcome return for those that have missed having a coffee shop on the first floor.

Taking a completely opposite style to the downstairs counterpart brasserie, the café is modern, spacious, light and fresh just like the menu. One of the things that makes the café stand out is the outstanding bakery. Everything is baked fresh that day by chef Kate Whatuira who has come from Spriggs at the Lavender Farm. Many of the recipes are her own and manager Paul tells me 'you won't find a better chocolate brownie anywhere else'. There is also plenty of lunchtime snacks available including soup made using Jersey vegetables, wraps, sandwiches, foccacias, panninis and not forgetting the salad bar with a selection of cold meats.

And no coffee shop would be complete without the best coffee. Manager Paul spent a lot of time at Cooper's researching coffee until they found a blend that was right for the café. Bruzzi from Brazil became the coffee of choice, freshly roasted regularly in Jersey, Paul told me this is the type of the coffee that needs someone good on the machine to get the your coffee tasting just right.

A lot of thought and attention to detail has gone into Upstairs at De Gruchy, which is already a huge success, taking bookings and is full at lunchtimes. Adding another element to your shopping experience, it's the perfect place to come and relax whilst shopping or leave your partner with the bags whist you have a look around.

SEASONAL RECIPE

Seasonal summer salad

4 pre-roasted beetroots
1 summer squash - diced
A dozen asparagus spears
A handful purple headed broccoli shoots
A handful of pine nuts
12 cherry tomatoes
Balsamic vinegar
Spinach and/or rocket leaves

Pre heat oven to a high heat – approx 200 degrees.

The beetroot should have been preroasted in an oven for 2-3 hours, or boiled for an hour. Beetroot can occasionally be bought pre-roasted from supermarkets when in season.

Place the squash, diced into small cubes onto a pre-heated oven dish, toss with some oil, season and roast until soft (roughly 30 minutes). Whilst the squash is roasting, place the cherry tomatoes in a small oven dish and drizzle over some balsamic vinegar, and season. Place in the oven for 15 – 20 minutes.

Whilst the squash and tomatoes are roasting, blanch the asparagus for 2 minutes and then add the broccoli for an additional minute, drain and run under cool water to cool. Put to one side

Once the squash and tomatoes are cooked, remove from the oven and leave to cool slightly. Heat a grill pan, and place the asparagus on until lightly charred

On a plate scatter some spinach and /or rocket leaves, chop the beetroot into cubes and scatter on top. Place the cooled broccoli, asparagus, warm squash and tomatoes on top and scatted some pine nuts on top (these can be lightly toasted if desired). Drizzle some additional balsamic vinegar and some olive oil over the salad and enjoy. Alternatively this salad can be enjoyed alongside some char-grilled chicken, or an accompaniment to a bean salad. Also good on the table at a BBQ.

IN SEASON

Peaches

Sweet, juicy and fragrant, they are the perfect fruit. They match savoury flavours, great to suppress a sugar craving, and lovely roasted as a dessert – a perfect all-rounder! When ripe, they should have a subtle aroma and should yield slightly when pressed, but should not be eaten when hard. Match as a starter with some tasty Parma ham, add to salads with some warm chicken, or roast on the BBQ and drizzle with some sweet marsala wine for a light pudding. Kids will love them chopped up as they are deliciously sweet and juicy. Low in calories and high in iron and potassium.

Beetroot

Forget the sugar-packed, vinegary jarred type and pick yourself up some fresh beets from the market - wash them, but don't peel, wrap in foil and roast for 2-3 hours, or alternatively prepare and boil for an hour. Lovely chopped up with some summer squash in a salad (see Recipe alongside). They have a lovely earthy flavour, and are great for picnics, as they add a juicy subtle flavour - try jazzing up some cous cous with beets and some sultanas. A great detoxifier and packed full of good nutrients. Careful when handling as you could end up with pink finger tips!

Fennel

Holds a strong sweet aniseed flavour when eaten raw, and a more subtle, mellow flavour when cooked. Brilliant sliced into salad raw to add that additional flavour. It complements fish very well - try baking sea bass and roasting some fennel and baby shallots with it. It is very versatile as it can be roasted, poached, boiled or braised, all producing a lovely aromatic flavour. The bulbs should be white with no blemishes, and the feathery green tops shouldn't show any yellowing. Apparently, it aides digestion and can help to ease stomach cramps – Fennel tea is good for any tummy problems

Mackerel

A rich and flavour packed fish and full of goodness. A lovely fish to roast on the BBQ, but it has to be complimented with the right flavours as it doesn't lend itself to the simple lemon and herb treatment or rich cream sauces. Try cumin and other strong spices as well as citrus flavours -it's delicious with a Moroccan cous cous salad and some simple green veg. Good for the credit crunch as it is a inexpensive fish, in great abundance and very healthy. Use it smoked and flaked into salads. When buying look for shiny bodies, bright eyes and a rigid body.


Kiwi Fruits

They don't get much press in the summer, as the spotlight tends to shine on the berries in season, but kiwi fruits are in a league of their own. With more vitamin C than an orange and as much potassium as a banana, they are a perfect fruit and brilliant to have before your breakfast for a 'get up and go' start to the day. Adds colour to a fruit salad and lovely in a summer smoothie. Make sure they are slightly soft and ripe as it may become a slight battle to scoop out the lovely lime green flesh – hard unripe kiwis can be very tart on the palette.


Aubergines

Part of a huge family and available in all sorts of colours and shapes. Mediterranean flavours lend themselves well to aubergines. They figure strongly in Spanish, Italian and middle-eastern cooking. Baba ganoush is a lovely dip made out of pureeing roasted aubergine with garlic. They're delicious roasted with other vegetables, in a Greek moussaka, or cold on a meze. Aubergines work very well in both Thai and Indian curries as they are a good meaty veg. For a new trick on the BBQ try slicing and chargrilling for a smoky flavour. They should be firm with glossy and smooth skins.

HOME & INTERIORS







The large property (4,000 sq. feet) was built around 30 years ago and is home to John and Linda, their daughter Kirstie, who is currently at university and their dog, Pickle.

The family moved into the house around four years ago and have since refurbished and adapted it into a luxurious family home, perfect for parties. "When we moved in there was no working shower, the door leading into the entrance hall had horrible orange glass around it, the garden had a picket fence and vegetable patch, and there was dark brickwork on parts of the outside of the property", said Linda.

The driveway to the house is set off the lane and the couple have added electric wooden gates and replaced the tarmac drive with paving and pretty gardens either side. There is plenty of space in front of the house for parking and also a double garage with a new electric door. The front door leads into the porch where you can take a seat on the bench to take your shoes off and hang your coat up before going into the entrance hall. "I replaced the horrible orange glass around the door to the entrance hall with new glass which has a floral pattern and that was made by someone

who works on church windows."

The entrance hall is very spacious, with a high ceiling and balcony on the first floor. Immediately to your left is the study, with fitted units and a sliding door cloaks cupboard. "This room would be ideal as another bedroom for an older person who couldn't make the stairs because the bedroom directly above is exactly the same size and has an ensuite, so all the plumbing is already there to make this room another ensuite."

As you leave the study and walk ahead, you approach the open plan lounge and dining room. The lounge has a functional granite fireplace, although there is a gas fire at present, and both the lounge and dining room are a generous size and have double doors leading to the back of the house where large hedges and shrubbery enclose an inviting garden, pool and decked area. Once outside you can take a swim in the deep and unusually shaped pool, relax on the decked area whilst enjoying the surrounding manicured garden (which includes wisteria, roses, a palm tree, a pear tree and charming umbrella tree), or you can unwind in the enclosed Arctic six seat spa complete with music system.


A feature of this house that is particularly interesting and fun is the attached outhouse. The outhouse has a seating area (TV fittings already in place) which could also be a gym, there is a shower, WC, dishwasher and sink, and another smaller room with a fridge freezer and separate entrance to avoid going through the main part of the house. It is ideal as a changing room when having parties. "We had lots of parties here and the house we are moving to is also a party house."

All the carpets in the house were replaced and are a light mocha colour and the walls have been decorated in magnolia and pecan. There is also travertine flooring which runs from the porch through the entrance hall, kitchen and into the utility rooms and this is consistent with the natural flow of the house. "We knew we wouldn't always live here so we decorated the house in muted colours so that it could be suitable for anyone."

The first floor contains a large study (which could be another bedroom); Kirstie's bedroom, an airy and fresh space with fitted wardrobes; a house bathroom outside Kirstie's room which has a sauna for one, heated towel rack and Pastella flooring; the master bedroom with walk in wardrobes

and an ensuite (includes an all in one Jacuzzi bath/steam room/foot spa and shower and twin sink); a spare bedroom (ensuite and fitted wardrobes); and an airing cupboard. All the rooms have views of the garden and pool area except the spare room, which looks out onto the front of the property. It is also possible to see the sea from the master bedroom. The bathrooms have under floor heating and there is a huge loft that runs the length of the house.

All the windows and doors in the house were changed (the windows

are now large double glazed tilt and turn). "The old windows and doors were aluminium and were sent to Romania which meant they could be recycled." The radiators in the house were also replaced and the electrics upgraded. The dark brickwork on the outside of the house was substituted with cladding and the whole house repainted. "It took about 18 months in total to do the refurbishment and now it's a lovely light house."

"We are only moving because our daughter is at university and it's too large

for just the two of us. We have found a place in St Peter which is a smaller version of this house. We will miss it as we have been here for four years and have spent a lot of time, energy and thought in re-vamping it. It's definitely a party house but it is also light and bright and one of the few houses where all the rooms are a good size."

Over the past few years 'going green' has become fashionable particularly in terms of bolting eco-bling accessories such as solar panels, wind turbines and rainwater harvestors onto new buildings. But now even the politicians, who once championed green design, have gone quiet. Green design should not be about fashion but should be about our responsibility for sustaining the future of the environment. Sustainable architecture is more than just slapping solar panels on a roof, it's about good design principles that make the most of what we have, often not costing any extra.

Good sustainable design extends beyond just the building; it starts with the people who are involved in the design and construction and finishes with the people that will use it. Local designers and builders together with locally sourced materials reduce the carbon footprint of the building and financially sustain our local economy. When the building is finished it should be able to sustain itself passively and influence our lifestyle so that subconsciously, we use less natural

resources.

Architects now more than ever have a social responsibility to deliver sustainable lifestyles.

lives in such a way that encourages sustainability as a natural routine. Much like the inevitable gift shop at the end of a guided tour, 'Eco-banks' could be positioned at the entrance of small housing estates that include recycling bins, communal post-boxes, bus shelter and secure electric-bicycle racks which will encourage people to think and be sustainable as part of their daily life.

However, new buildings and

developments are only the tip of the iceberg compared to the existing housing stock of 11.5 million in the UK that is more than 50 years old. If we are ever to tackle the overall carbon emissions in the built environment then it's these existing houses that need to be addressed. But the idea of adding loft insulation or draught sealing windows isn't very exciting and unlikely to turn any heads in the street, even though this is probably the most cost-effective method of reducing carbon emissions. So if looks aren't an incentive, then money is always set to draw attention. 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HARDWARE





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Okay, so at the time of writing this it is only the beginning of May and so not exactly the most opportune time of year to crack out the sunglasses and roll around in a drop top but I've managed to justify having done exactly that in not one, but two ways; this month's theme is 'The Outdoors' and Audi are preparing to launch this, the brand spanking new, hot off the panel-press Audi A5 cabriolet.

The A5 seems to have arrived under the cover of darkness a bit like a company of moles. You have absolutely no idea they're on their way until one morning then bam! you suddenly start noticing them around all the time. Unlike a mole though there's no denying it's very good looking with its boldly creased side panels, lengthy rear wings and those lights. If you've not noticed what the Audi design team have been doing with their exterior lighting recently then you should ask your minders to have your curfew lifted because LEDs have never looked so beautifully awe-inspiring.

The A5 we tested is the launch model with S-line interior trim and comfortably figure-hugging all electrically adjusted and inflatable lumbar supporting leather seats as well as the 2 litre TFSI 4 cylinder engine featuring a stop-start system for all of you style driven eco-warriors. When launched it will also be available with a choice of Audi's 3 litre V6 TDI engine for those of you who enjoy a mountain of torque with your fuel efficiency or their 3.2 litre V6 FSI coupled to either a 'multitronic' or 'S tronic' gearbox (that's twin-clutch to you or I) If you're a bit of a hooligan. Two hundred and forty versus two hundred and sixty-five standardised German horsepower respectively, no less.

Don't be fooled into thinking that this car is as big as it looks – once behind the wheel it feels no larger to manoeuvre than an A3, yet there's still plenty of space both front and rear as well as surprisingly for a cabriolet - in the boot. It doesn't look overly large on first inspection but it seems to go forward into the cabin for about three and a half light years. Well, 3 and a half feet at least. This will be partly down to the fabric roof taking up less space when down and whilst it may seem strange that they haven't opted to install a retractable hard top, Audi have their reasons – their heritage and prettier lines with the roof up being two of them but I'm sure weight comes into it too. Well if it's good enough for uncle Bentley...

I'm told that the colour of the particular car we tested doesn't do it complete justice but I'd be inclined to disagree – it's good to see car manufacturers getting a bit adventurous with their colour palettes of late by including high gloss pastel colours as well as greys and with Lamborghini offering matt black as an option it may only be a matter of time before this filters down into the brochures of other Volkswagen-Audi Group manufacturers. If nothing else it could serve to make the 'old favourites' like fire-engine red and gloss black stand out even more and that can't be a bad thing. What is a bad thing though (granted, it is a matter of personal taste) are the chrome mirrors that have been creeping onto Audi 'S' models for a while now so I was surprised to find the chrome windscreen surround such an attractive part of this car – it just, works.

Inside there were plenty of toys to play with if you wanted to, like the electronic parking brake which is great once you get the hang of it (don't forget to put your foot on the brake pedal if you're on a downward slope or it won't disengage, as I discovered! The onboard computer was telling me this all along though, but being male I must have subconsciously wanted to figure it out myself even if it did take a while) and the HDD Satellite Navigation system controlled by an iDrive-esque turning knob but with illuminated mode buttons that let you know what you're about to alter with no messing about.

One of the most novel things about the Sat Nav is the topographic view of the road ahead, showing the contours of the land ahead as well as prominent features, such as the Eiffel Tower if you're in Paris, for example. Unfortunately I didn't manage to see any giant toad sculptures, squillion-pound incinerator plant visualisations or long-forgotten expensive steam clocks which I'd say is a bit short-sighted on Audi's behalf. I did, however manage to see a fair few petrol stations marked out but red and yellow shells - maybe someone should tell Audi about the multi-million euro French bulk liquid distribution company Rubis so they can make special little graphics for Channel Islanders. If that wasn't good enough there's also 10GB of space for you to upload your own music and save a multitude of scratched CDs sliding around in the glovebox, although there is a CD & DVD player to complement the very clear 7" colour TFT display too.

As with any car, it's the little details that are often the most important and one of my favourites was the knurled 'barrel' that controls the ICE with the roll of your thumb over the steering wheel as opposed to a conventional button – it's just feels far more natural to me.

Another is the button just behind the one that lowers and raises the roof (in an impressive 17 seconds and with the push of only the one button and up to speeds of 31mph) that raises and lowers all of the windows at once so you don't have to jar your hand trying to press four buttons at the same time because let's face it, when the roof is down it's going to be all or nothing.

Of course, I need not really mention the build quality as being German you can be assured that it'll be more than solid and the A5 is no exception. What I will mention though is the admiring gaze the A5 attracted from a gentleman proudly driving in the opposite direction in his nearly-new A4 cabriolet. I'm sure he'll get a good trade in once this one is released....

NEW GERMAN TUPPERWARE ANNOUNCED FOR BOTH LAND &

German tuning company PPI Automotive Design GmbH have decided that Audi's R8 is nice, but just not quite crazy enough for them.

As a result, they've come up with this - the PPI RAZOR GTR. It's probably not great for shaving anyone's face, legs or any other body part for that matter but what it does seem good at is driving really, really fast.

The back kind of reminds me of a Lotus Exige and the front a bit of the new Nissan Skyline but bear with me... They've managed to not only make it quicker by adding more oomph thanks to a 'specially engineered supercharger' but have also made it handle better by wide-tracking it and disguising this fact using 'extremely light and high strength formula 1 and aerospace-proven carbon fibre' as opposed to the stuff you can buy at Halfords or Lucas House, presumably. This also happens to make it 250kg lighter than your average, two a penny run-of-the-mill R8.

It does do 206mph though, which isn't to be sniffed at. Price? The press release we received doesn't say, but I'd estimate that it will definitely cost more than a Vauxhall Corsa VXR. Probably not as good for nipping down the shops in though, unless you live somewhere along the Nordschleife and are desperate to get another pint of milk before the next Overhaulin' starts...



AHOY!

If you've got a bit of a thing for the Audi R8 but haven't the space in your garage, why not put one on your mooring instead?

Probably because that kind of crackpot idea could only possibly come from within the cranium of an Arab petrochemical squillionaire and there probably aren't any in Jersey.

If you do fit the bill though, Swedish company Vizualtech are proposing production of a V10-powered, 320hp boat based on the design of the R8. Unfortunately it'll top out at a mere 110mph. Scoff.



BIG BOYS' TOYS

I can't claim to have an extensive knowledge of tractors and farm equipment aside from that they invariably use oil-burning engines and are pretty good at negotiating tracks, muddy fields and possibly even small streams.

What I do know, however, is that they seem to be getting bigger, almost too big at times and as a child trapped in an adult's body that can no longer successfully manoeuvre my blue 'Big John' pedal tractor (complete with front loader, no less) around the garden due to the affliction of my actual physical age I find myself naturally curious. The investigation began...

If you feel the same way then you'll probably share the sense of relief that I felt when reading that Will Carter, a farmer from Berkshire likes the 'spacious cab and the well laid-out controls' of the Massey Ferguson MF6499 as well as noting that it is 'surprisingly quiet'.

So here's my top three, completely unbiased all-terrain agricultural pulling and shunting machines based mostly on power output (where else could you possibly start?), their similarly large, but not overly gargantuan size and after that loosely on features noted in their brochure.

In the blue corner we've got the New Holland T7060, packing a 6.7 litre 6 cylinder powerplant. The inspiration behind that choice of term was that it probably weighs as much as a fossilfuel burining powerstation and creates 213 horse power. 'Is that it?' you might cry. Then clean your eyes out in anticipation of the colossal torque figure of 984Nm - at only 1600RPM, although it is redlined at a whopping 2200.

The most intriguing feature of the T7060 is the '5 electronic remotes with armrest joystick control'. Presumably that's so you can further help relive your childhood under the guise of work. We all know there ain't no substitute for cubic inches though,



and the Massey MF6499 is hiding (not too conspicuously, mind you) a 7.4 litre lump under its nose and those extra 700 cubic centimetres get you a staggering power increase of 2HP. If that's not enough for you, Massey Ferguson describe their Dyna-6 Eco transmission 'simply the best mechanical transmission' and with 24 speeds in both forward and reverse I'd say that's a fair boast, engineering wise.

But the local farmers' favourite according to a recent survey I had the time to carry out whilst trundling along behind a number of decidedly green tractors on the roads recently, desperately looking for opportunities to overtake without upsetting anyone, is up there in the green corner (it's a triangular shaped 'farming ring' we're dealing with here). Behold, the mighty John Deere 7930.

John Deere say that when it comes to tyres, 'bigger are better' and with bold statements like that it's no wonder the 7930 turns out 1025Nm of torque at 1600RPM. Add to that the techno-tastic 'JDLink' system that lets you manage your fleet remotely from the comfort of your office and I think we've got a winner.

Now then, which button do you press to make it go forward?




