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
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
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


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THE TREE HOUSE



It may seem odd at first thought that while we have been sending objects into space since 1946, catapulting the first man out of orbit on the end of a huge firework an amazing 49 years ago; here at home on our little planet, which is made up of 70.8% water and a measly 29.2% of solid land, over 95% of that underwater world is yet to be explored.

It's not that there is no interest in examining these strange hidden worlds that sit below the great swell of our major oceans, just that the humongous pressure that exists down there makes it impossible at the moment to go right down to the deepest, darkest portions of our own world; a world that from the glimpses we have already had of it, is so different, so weird and strange, and populated by creatures far beyond the reaches of our imaginations, that it could be a completely different planet altogether. So much of what the sea gives is already at our disposal, but we know there is so much more to find there. So far all we have done is dip in our toe into the water; we are yet to take a deep breath, and dive into the wet unknown.

The seas and oceans have been a focus for man since long before the first human civilisations began to emerge. Just about every race has built some kind of vessel for traversing the waters, enabling travel to other lands, and to pull from the world beneath the waves the many different swimming creatures and plants that can be eaten. But what has been caught must also be preserved for times when food is scarce and once again the sea has come to the rescue and provided us with salt to stop our catch from rotting in the sun. Weirdly the human race has never

been so afraid of the deep water that we have stayed on land; it has always been something to be conquered rather than a barrier to pass. And because of the sea we have traded across nations and continents and have met, and become allied with, peoples of other lands, who we have also fallen out with, killed and dominated in battles that have taken place in these great tumultuous arenas of brine. But no matter how many souls have been lost and interred in watery graves, the sea and oceans have always remained our friend; albeit it one that must be respected and acknowledged as dangerous.

Nowadays throughout the world we catch and consume over 90 million tonnes of fish and molluscs each year. And although stocks of certain species have been significantly reduced in recent years due to industrial over-fishing, still we are able to draw from our seas these massive tonnages of fresh food. But fish and salt are just the tip of the proverbial iceberg, and the sea is much, much more than that.

In 1866 the first successful transatlantic cable was laid between Newfoundland and Ireland by the SS Great Eastern, connecting for the first time the North American content with Europe. Until this point communication across the expanse of the great pond was carried by ship and would take almost a fortnight, but now a message could be sent and a reply received within just a matter of minutes. Designated the eighth wonder of the world, this was a technological advancement that changed the shape of the world, squeezing our giant globe into something smaller and manageable, and beginning what has become known as the 'special relationship'.

From there we have jumped forward in great leaps, fantastic dives deep into the ocean, and now we have oil pipelines delivering fuel to our country and the cables that enabled almost instant communication back in the 19th century have been replaced by fibre optic networks spanning the globe and creating superhighways of electronic data. All those images that come up on our computer screens from far off places have travelled not only over land but across thousands of miles of seabed as well.

That's the pretty unseen side of marine technology, but look out to sea from so many locations on the British coastline and you will see giant metallic scaffolds sitting out in there in the distance, ugly and like immense monsters watching us menacingly from just beyond their reach; these are our rigs sitting on oil and gas fields, drawing up from so many fathoms down into the crust of the earth our fuels (In 2005 we drew 1.9 million barrels of oil). These eyesores in the North Sea surrounded by violent and mighty waves, reachable by helicopter, are what keep our lights burning through the night and our societies mobile through the day. So much of what is needed to quell our ravenous hunger for oil and electricity and plastics is provided by these underwater drills and pipelines.

Unfortunately the sea is also our toilet and our tipping ground, for where else would we expel our human sewage and chemical waste. Strange then to think that we use the oceans for recreation as well; whether that be swimming and diving beneath a glowing sun, or relaxing on our giant floating tin cans, enjoying cocktails while we cruise alongside dolphins and flying fish. Not all sea journeys are happy ones though and so many ships and boats from across centuries have found themselves sinking far down to the unexplored depths where their cargoes have been lost forever and their crews and passengers destined to perish as guests of Davy Jones, or Poseidon, or Neptune, or just the sea.

Every day there are new ideas put into development for new technologies that will take advantage of some aspect of the 139 million square miles of water which surrounds the dry land we live on. There are so many things we are just starting to be able to do out there or that we believe we will be able to do before very long. We have already begun underwater mining of the earth's crust for elements like cobalt and manganese. But more than that, the seas and oceans may be our best hope for new sustainable sources of energy as well. Offshore wind farms and wave ducks may replace our oil rigs, and as technologies for use in deep, deep waters are developed, ocean floor geo-thermal electricity generation may be something that can seriously reduce our need for fossil fuel burning, carbon-based electricity generation.


Many of these new technologies are impossible at the moment and will remain so until we have built submersibles that can take us down into those places we haven't been before. And just what will we find down there? Will there be billions in sunken gold, the remains of ancient civilisations like the legendary Atlantis, untilnow undiscovered elements, or maybe the secret answer to all our energy needs? Who knows; who knows what is hiding down there in the dark. And it is dark. It is so untouched by the light of day that the strange alien creatures that live down there have their own bio-luminosity on surface of their bodies to produce what little light there is. It is amazing to think that we know more about the dark side of the moon than we do about the bottom of the oceans, which are only around two and a half miles deep, but which have a pressure of around one ton per square inch, and a temperature of just a few degrees Celsius. Because there is no light, there is no possibility of plants, but there are plenty of animals in the form of sea cucumbers, worms, molluscs and spidery crustaceans, coral,

weird and wonderful fish, gelatinous jelly fish and oddly shaped octopi. From the relatively few examples we have managed to collect through trawling, it is clear that the creatures that live down there beyond our reach are nothing like anything that exists in the depths we utilise, but are something more akin to science fiction. It is a world of illuminating phosphorescent skin pigments; a moving fluorescent dwelling where the lack of ambient light has caused evolution to create creatures that are themselves glowing shapes gliding, crawling and pulsating in the blackness.

It is all around us, all of the time. In some places it is blue and sparkling and at the end of soft pale beaches, and at other places it is a turbulent watery hell of vortexes, tempests and squalls where there are giant tentacle-wielding creatures and colossal fountain-blowing sea mammals. They are the seas and the oceans, the waters that divide the pieces of rock we call our continents and nations and islands. In the main they are undiscovered and unknown, frighteningly alien yet forever taunting us to dare seek out their secrets. They may be new worlds full of possibilities or they may be the death of us. Whatever they are, they are there, and that is reason enough for us to find a way to survey them and to investigate whatever mysteries they cling to.

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




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












"We have a saying in sailing," my instructor Peter Carnegie tells me. "It's like standing under a cold shower while ripping up fifty pound notes."

Yachting's definitely one of the more expensive water sports practised in the island, but for those without a robust bank account, there are the courses run by Jersey Sailing Club.

While not a complete novice, the last time I went sailing I spent the entire time lying in the cabin munching on salt and vinegar crisps to quell my stomach. So I was a little nervous about trying yachting for the first time. Thankfully, Peter immediately puts me at ease. He is a true sea dog: sprightly with tanned, weather-worn skin. He smells of the sea and talks in crisp, captain-like tones which make me think being sick on his boat, the 42-foot, magnificent Caprice, simply wouldn't do. So I take a deep breath, and hop on board. First thing is a quick tour of the boat. It's fascinating to see how every aspect of home living - a kitchen, bathroom, dining room, bedroom, can be compacted so smartly into such a small space. Peter then quickly runs through safety details, hands me a life jacket and hurriedly instructs two other members of the crew (former students Laurie and Beverley) what to do so we can get cracking. You can sense his anticipation to get out to sea and it's infectious.

As we motor towards the traffic lights to get out of Elizabeth Marina, he tells me to untie some of the fenders that are used to protect the outside of the boat. He then runs through various pieces of equipment and what they're used for, and I quickly realise this is going to be an all action experience. Peter tells me this is why he's so passionate about the sport. "You're pitting yourself against the elements as it's all about using the right tools to harness the wind. You never know where you might end up. With power boating, you just point the boat and go. You'll get there come hell or high water. With sailing, you get a real sense of satisfaction once you reach your destination because you've had to work hard to get there."

Once out of the marina, Peter switches off the engine and tells us to let the sails down. He asks me to sort out the front one (the jib), which means frantically turning a handle until the sail unfolds completely and immediately stops the wind in its tracks. And all of a sudden, after the frenzy of getting the boat ready and out to sea, everything becomes incredibly calm. "Holiday trippers always make that comment," Peter tells me. "They talk about how wonderfully peaceful and calm it is."

After ten minutes of letting the wind quietly guide us towards Noirmont Tower, the action picks up again. It's at this point that Peter starts talking in another language: "Gybe! Standby to gybe! Gybe the jib! Gybe ho!" From what I can gather, this all means 'turn left'. The boom then comes swinging around to the other side of the boat. "Watch out!" Peter shouts. "This is when people get hit on the head!" As I duck, he sets off scurrying around the ship again, fixing the sails, while Beverley dashes after him and Laurie expertly steers (the wheel's easily the size of a lorry tyre and needs the strength of both arms to manoeuvre). And it strikes me that this is what it's all about for them: the adrenalin of being kept on their toes, the physical challenge of of it all. It's sailing the hard way. "It's a way of life," Peter explains when things quieten down again. "It's in your blood."

As we head back to the marina, I'm allowed a go at steering. I feel nervous as I know I've got to stay alert to make sure I'm always one step ahead of the wind. When a sharp gust catches me unawares, it tips the boat at what seems like a forty five degree angle. It's petrifying and electrifying in equal measure.

We get back having spent an hour and a half at sea, and I'm exhausted. With all the snazzy, whizz-bang boats that exist today, which can perform what you like at the touch of the button, yachting represents a different kind of challenge. And I definitely got a sense of satisfaction from knowing that I took on the elements and won.

Lions savage Art

An artist's lifelong work ended in shreds when he took his globe-trotting red couch into a lions' den. Photographer Horst Wackerbarth has photographed more than 600 people sitting on his settee in 33 countries. World leaders, including the Dalia Lama, ordinary people and even criminals have posed on the couch over the last 30 years.

But when he took it into the lion enclosure in Duisburg Zoo, the red couch was destroyed in minutes by male Piefke and his female mates. 

The Noisy Familian on the Beach



aving visited Blackpool many times as a child I had certain standards set in my head for this visit: Constant carousel music, flashing lights, queuing for hours to get on one of the Pleasure Beach rollercoasters and a sticky face from obscene amounts of candy floss - I was a little worried it wouldn't seem as magical now I'm an adult, but I was very keen to find out.

There is definitely a stigma surrounding the hotels in Blackpool, having never previously stayed overnight I was expecting a decrepit 70s style hotel with tiny rooms and dusty wine glasses. I was proved wrong on all counts when we arrived at The Carousel Hotel (part of the Sleepwell Group) situated just five minutes from Blackpool Airport.

Located on the South Promenade it is only a 15 minute walk from Blackpool's attractions but far enough away from the crowds and bustle of the famous Golden Mile. The hotel has recently been completely renovated and has a modern but relaxed feel to it. I was provided with a good sized bedroom and ensuite complete with power shower, the only downside being the bed was so comfortable I struggled to get up for breakfast! Having done so I was greeted with a variety of options to fuel me up for the action-packed day ahead.

First stop was the famous Pleasure Beach theme park and the short walk down the promenade was interesting in itself as works of art (including The World's Largest Mirrorball) are situated along the beach front. Arriving at the entrance I received my wristband and after sticking it under the new airport-style scanners I found myself not in a mile long queue but in the park itself, a significant improvement on the entrance experience of old. Initially I strolled around the beautiful new Sculpture Garden, designed by David Harber and Natasha Webb (whose works are featured in the new Terminal Five) the sculptures combine to create a dramatic visual delight and the perfect place to stop and compose yourself before hitting the rides. These include the famous 'Big One' and recent addition 'Infusion' which reaches soaring heights and is suspended over water with five stomach-churning loops for all the adrenalin junkies out there! However for the more relaxed theme park enthusiast there are plenty of rides accommodating all ages and family fun.

A great way to see and get a feel for Blackpool is to hop on one of the famous trams, there are 76 to choose from (including 8 preserved trams) and 7 trailer cars. They are a variety of ages and designs with a mix of double and single-deckers, open and closed-top cars, and special illuminated trams in the winter season. These provide fantastic views of the town and are perfect for tired legs too!

Another must see (and a real hidden gem) is Blackpool's Grand Theatre, an 1,100 seat auditorium designed by Frank Matcham in

le l'alliant manier.

1894. This incredible space is a wonder of restoration and revitalisation, presenting a range of every performing art form to suit all as Blackpool's community theatre, Lancashire's preferred opera house and Britain's National Theatre of Variety! The breathtaking architecture and the sheer grandness of the building itself makes it well worth a visit, even if only to take a look around.

Next stop was the Sealife Centre which is easy to get to as it's right on the front and only £21.00 for a family ticket. One of my favourite features (and sure to be a hit with younger visitors) was the Interactive Rock Pool, where you actually get a chance to touch and hold rockpool dwellers such as starfish and in my case, an over-excited crab! Demonstrations are held throughout the day and watching the stingrays surface in the open pools really got the kids' attention. For me the best part had to be the shark tunnels. I got goosebumps all over as the sharks swam within inches of my head, hopefully the closest I'm ever going to get!

After a quick freshen up back at the hotel I headed out for a much needed dinner at La Fontana, a cosy Italian restaurant on Clifton Street. The food was delicious and the atmosphere relaxed, which is great, but what really sealed the deal and made me promise to eat there again on my next visit was the service which got a 10/10 from me.

Directly opposite La Fontana is the infamous Betty Legs Diamond Cabaret and Burlesque Show. Betty Legs (former Funny Girl) really gets you up on your feet with a mixture of dance along songs, from the 'Time Warp' to 'The Rocky Horror Picture Show' and with a touch of comedy it really is a great laugh all evening. If your appetite for partying isn't sated you're right in the middle of the vibrant nightlife that Blackpool has to offer. Quick hint - the dancefloor in the Syndicate night club actually moves, you're not about to pass out!

After another very comfortable night's sleep the next day started with a trip to Blackpool Zoo. It's a little inland - about a mile, but is





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well sign-posted and pretty easy to get to. It's £44.00 for a family ticket but you can very easily spend the whole day here. The zoo has over 1,500 animals ranging from the smallest creepy-crawlies right up to the pride of lions. The new additions to the zoo include a brand new sea-lion enclosure and the birth of Blackpool's first ever critically endangered Western Lowland gorilla. Although mother and child are on public view, sightings of the baby have so far been rare, but luckily for us we got a glimpse of the newborn for a good couple of minutes! There is also a Dinosaur Safari with more than 30 large and realistic prehistoric creatures, an erupting volcano and sound effects to bring the safari to life. Complete with café and free children's play area there's lots to do for all the familly.

Just up the road from the zoo (10 mins) is the beautiful De Vere Heron's Reach Hotel which is set in 236 acres of picturesque parkland and has a few lakes thrown in for good measure. If thats not enough to draw you in, Heron's Reach comes complete with an 18-hole championship golf course and 17-bay floodlit covered PGA Academy driving range.

For the ultimate indulgence why not treat yourself to one of their pampering spa packages including a relaxing massage and gorgeous ESPA and Jessica treatments? For more energetic visitors there are two state of the art gyms, yoga, spinning classes, squash or one of the 3 tennis courts - not all in the same day of course, we dont want you having a heart attack!

Though I've been to Blackpool many times before, for some reason I had never been to the iconic Blackpool Tower, to be honest apart from the obvious trip to the top I wasn't sure what else there was to offer. However I was pleasantly surprised when Kenny (our Tower Guide for the day) led us up into The Tower Ballroom, again designed by Frank Matchem so it has the same breathtaking architecture as the Grand Theatre, with its sprung floors and majestic atmosphere you can see why Strictly Come Dancing chose this for their venue. We were then taken right underneath the structure into the Tower Circus Arena. Currently showing a circus favourite 'Mookys Eastern Promise' up until the 7th of November



As I set out on my next creative idea, my grand plan. I think to myself, is this really a good idea? And I wonder whether I should change my approach. But it's in my head now, this idea and I have to make it work, no matter the outcome, even if it's another penniless venture. Well here's my ramblings after a few beers. Nothing has really changed I'm really just re-confirming to myself that $f^{**}k$ it I'll do it anyway.

Local In London

Chris Wackrow

Most of you will know Chris Wackrow from his days as one third of the shambolic, yet entertaining Jersey band The Pantalons and later the energetic front man and lead guitarist of Velofax but not a lot of you will know that he's also a very creative gardener here in London. I caught up with Chris to find out what he's been up to musically since the final Velofax gig back in 2008 and whose rosebushes he's been pruning lately.

You're a full time gardener again these days, how did you get involved in that?

When I left d'Hautree School, I phoned Highlands College about three days before my mates were to start their Business/Tourism courses, with the hope of doing a plumbing and heating course - you need a trade according to every Father! Unfortunately, that course had gone and all they had left was horticulture (plus the one where you basically go back to school to brush up on maths in the corner of the canteen). Not even Stephen "Hawkwind" could help me with my arithmetic, so I opted for horticulture - not really knowing what it was at all!

I started the following week in rural Trinity, in a class of unknown and mixed-aged people. I actually listened for the first time in my life and then became an apprentice with Parks and Gardens for four years. Except for spells in record shops and a call centre, I've been involved in Horticulture and its many guises for sixteen dirty fingernailed years and I'm enjoying it more than ever. I have a nice little job with a small team including my boss, his dog and a small sarcastic little fellow from down under who helps out during the summer months. He's actually very affable. Our clients are across the board, from bubbly mothers in Clapham to the £20 million properties of the Bourgeoisie Elite in Kensington and Chelsea. Plus a handful of A-listers and Su Pollard occasionally!

So what kind of A-listers are we talking about here and what are their gardens like?

We maintain the gardens for a model, pop starlet, actor, artist/director and a rock star. Flick through the 'Sun' or one of those other highbrow informative redtops and you'll see a few of them in there for sure. What about your band Velofax? Do you miss that?

As time passes of course I do. That means I must miss The Pantalons more so? I think I do. I miss the times we went down really well and rejoiced with sweaty camaraderie over ice-cold beers. I look back fondly on the early Jersey days and proudly at some of our London slots. We tend to all meet every few months or so at the Groucho Club and fritter several hundred pounds on cocktails and champagne whilst slurring over well-trodden stories of being on the road...or the tube!

Kevin is releasing his brilliant unique melodic creations to the masses. Check out his new stuff at pevinkinel.com. Jim sends me his wonderfully produced sounding cosmic jams and faithfully finger picked acoustic ditties now and then and Alex (who I was in the company of a fortnight ago) is unbelievably quick at completing the Rubik's cube, whilst sometimes making music that I can only describe as otherworldly. Since the band, I've made music at home for myself really, on my 10 year old 12-track which has recently given up the ghost. I might just go back to a 4-track. Sod computer software, I ain't knocking it but I like the limitations and hands on lo-fi aspect of an analogue 4-track. It's simpler and cheaper for a skint techno-tard like me. At the moment I don't have much time for self-indulgent home demos about feeling cheesed off with life, the opposite sex, or people who do yoga or any other 'arse in the air' calming workouts on their lunch break in the middle of the street - I've just being listening to The Smiths instead. What's happened is that I have found myself as a gigging musician again with a band called "The Oscillation." They are a rock band with a droney, dense and throbbing sound that has just left the practice of Doctor Robert.

That's pretty exciting, tell us about The Oscillation!

I play synths/keyboards and second guitar. I became familiar with their stuff on the brilliant 'Death before Distemper' compilations that their label (DC Recordings) at the time put out. I went to see them a couple of times, thought they were excellent, got chatting, the Branchage crew got 'em over in 2008, Velofax supported (our last gig) and we kept in touch (loosely). Their keyboardist left for Spain as a soon-to-be Dad, they put an ad up in Rough Trade, Phil 'the middle man' Adams called to inform me but before acting on it I bumped into Tom, the chilled, lithe bassist and a week later Tom, Demian (the cosmic force) and myself were supping ales whilst discussing rehearsal dates! It was all very sudden.

Have you got any plans to record soon or do you have any gigs coming up?

Nobody other than multi-instrumentalist, Demian records. It's his thing. The rest of us just play the parts, although Tom is chief organiser and spokesperson and Jon the drummer is like a little titan behind the kit! There is also a 5th oscillator called Julian who produces vivid visuals - the 60s/70s way with coloured inks and a hot lamp. Demian is far from autocratic, there's plenty of room for improvisation and for someone who gets hyperactively bored quickly like myself, this is a good thing. Gigs on the horizon look good! Two Paris dates at the beginning of July, London dates later on in that month, a TBC festival in Lithuania in August and a two week European tour to promote the band's second album at the end of September which will be released on All Time Low (an artist-run label). A lot of tired eyes, coffee and continental lager in store I guess...

Director | Writer: Christopher Nolan Starring: Leonardo DiCaprio








That's the question Christopher Nolan has to answer. I imagine he has his pick of comic books, teen vampire romances, toys and board games to adapt. I just don't think he's that kind of director. Between the critically acclaimed and Oscar nominated second and hotly anticipated and reportedly final film of his Batman trilogy he's chosen to go with an original idea. I guess, when it comes down to answering the question, enlisting arguably the biggest star on the planet to headline a high concept heist picture is as good an answer as any.

The premise of the film rests on the cutting edge of modern technology. DiCaprio plays an internationally renowned thief capable of entering people's dreams and stealing an idea. He is the best he is at what he does but still his profession has cost him everything important in his life. The plot revolves around one final job offering the chance at redemption. This time however DiCaprio and his team aren't trying to steal an idea, they're trying to plant one. It's an intriguing proposition which, like all great sci-fi, looks set to pose more questions about today's issues (the control of ideas in our modern iPhone,

Twittering, Facebook culture) than in any imaginary future. Yet, when previewing the film I think it pays more to look at what has come before.

I keep coming back to The Dark Knight but if the Warner Brothers marketing team are so desperate to draw this comparison than who am I to argue. The Dark Knight distinguished itself from other super-hero films by not being a super-hero movie. Structurally it has more in common with cop films like Heat or The Departed than Spider-Man or Superman. Batman, Harvey Dent and The Joker are all used to represent different types of response to criminality in modern society. For Nolan there are no black and whites only really dark greys. In this respect we shouldn't look at this as Nolan does The Matrix as the trailers might have us believe. This is Nolan returning to his roots. The same twisted sense of perception that he built his reputation on with Memento and Insomnia but wrapped in the conventions of a heist film. I like to imagine something akin to Christopher Nolan's Italian Job (It already has Michael Caine).

A great cast, an internationally acclaimed director and an original high concept. If any film is deserving of wider support

Toy Story 3

It's Pixar so I won't bore you with any fake concerns about the seemingly inevitable dip in quality that seems to accompany the third instalment in any successful film franchise. The bar has now been set so high that nothing less than excellence can be expected and again I think that's what we're going to get. The trailer promises plenty of laughs and Great Escape-style hi-jinks with the returning cast of old favourites along with new additions such as Barbie's beau Ken and Lots O'Huggin Bear. However, it's in pulling on the heart strings and reminding us of all that we leave behind in childhood that these films have located their heart. This time with the toys seemingly already abandoned by owner Andy it leaves them with the task of finding their own place in the world. A parable for growing up and leaving the nest if there ever was one.

Predators

After the damage the Alien vs Predator films did to these blood thirsty creatures' once sterling reputations it seems this battling odd couple have gone their separate ways. It's a good thing too. No matter how abysmal those films were, it seemed people (I hold my hands up – me included) were willing to go and see them. To aid in their rehabilitation Robert Rodriguez (El Mariachi Trilogy, Sin City, Planet Terror and, uh, Spy Kids) has come aboard as producer bringing along a surprisingly excellent cast including Adrien Brody and Topher Grace. We're being promised a gritty action film returning to the series' roots. Brody describes the cut he has seen as 'F***ing epic!' Also you can't help notice how the title promises more than one Predator...

The Karate Kid

Wax on, Wax Off. Jaden Smith (of the loins of Will Smith) finds himself living in Japan for some reason. He is at first bullied but soon finds a mentor in the mysterious Mr Han (If you're going to do it you have to get Jackie Chan although shame on them for not calling him Mr Miyagi.) After studying under Han he must then defeat racism and cultural differences WITH KARATE. I have to give the film-makers credit for not going down the exact re-make route and you'd hope that with Mr Chan's involvement we can expect at least a couple of spectacular fighting sequences. 
COMEDY ROCKS present

Adam Buxton

Adam Buxton is one of Britain's best-loved comedians, and arguably the silliest man in the broadcasting game. Best known for his comic partnership with Joe Cornish, who spawned Channel 4's cult hit The Adam and Joe Show in the mid-90s, perhaps most infamous for its irreverent movie reconstructions using stuffed toys and Star Wars figurines. Those unacquainted might want to search 'Toytanic', 'Toytrainspotting' and 'Saving Private Lion.' Seriously, they're amazing. Following shows together including Adam & Joe Go Tokyo and the lesser known (but surprisingly, the most repeated) series Shock Video, the duo moved into radio broadcasting, presenting the hugely popular (and Sony Award-winning) Adam & Joe on BBC 6 Music. They also have some more unexpected strings to their bow – the pair have the dubious honour of nearly prompting Rolf Harris to sever his ties with the BBC after offending him during an interview whilst they were presenting BBC's coverage of Glastonbury Festival. Possibly more positive entries to their CVs are Joe's involvement as a scriptwriter on Steven Spielberg's forthcoming Tintin movie, and Adam's role as director of music videos for Radiohead and Pixies front man Frank Black.

Adam Buxton will be coming to Jersey this month to present Comedy Rocks: An Evening with Adam Buxton, at Jersey Arts Centre. We caught up with him to hear his views on BBC6, Rolf and baboons.



This is my first visit yes. I'm looking forward to seeing the Jersey Opera House, the Telescopic Tower of Jersey, the Jersey Jersey Factory, and Jersey Jungle. I'm also keen to see a game of Jerxerious (the official sport of Jersey) at Jersey Stadium. I'm a big fan of the Jersey Jiants though recently I've found their playing lacklustre. Perhaps they shouldn't play in such big jerseys, though I understand that's part of their appeal.

hat does 'An Evening with Adam Buxton' entail?

Well, usually a couple of beers, some sushi and a lot of very creative lovemaking but I've been told I need to do something more like a show this time. It'll be fairly basic. Just me, my laptop and whatever bits of hopefully entertaining crap I have on there. I tend to decide on the night. There's a high possibility of some of my videos being shown, along with insightful commentary from the You Tube community which I will dramatise with my reading and Photoshop skills, a few songs and other odds and ends depending on whether I'm feeling any hostility from the audience or not. It's pretty loose!

hat are you working on at the moment?

I'm doing a Q&A to promote the gig I'm doing in Jersey. It's going really well I think.

hat's happened to Joe? Will you be reuniting for your radio show again soon? Will we see you working together on screen at any point in the future?

He's been directing a film that he's written called Attack The Block. We should be back on 6 Music towards the end of the year, though for how long I couldn't say. I'm looking forward to it. I think the chances of us ever working on TV again are slim to anorexic.

hat would you have been if not a comedian?

Chief Executive of BP. It might still happen. Fingers crossed!

hat are the best and worst things about your job?

Best: helping people with their humour needs. Worst: the terrible loneliness and the appalling doubt and the unbearable pressure and the excruciating embarrassment.

ow do you write jokes and sketches? Do you have a set writing period?

Set writing period!!?! I wish I was so organised. I don't feel as though I've ever written a 'joke' as such. I've written a couple of sketches. I have a small robot version of Michael McIntyre who does most of my comedy writing but I think he's faulty. I got someone in to fix it the other day but they told me it was working perfectly well. It seems odd though, because he's not coming out with very good stuff. I guess they can't make it too good or there wouldn't be any point having the real Michael McIntyre.

o you have any plans to perform at Edinburgh this year? If so, what do you have planned?

No, thank sweet baby Jesus!

ave you been back to Glastonbury since that infamous Rolf Harris interview? And have you crossed paths with Rolf since? Why do you think he didn't like you in the first place?

Point by point:

Yes.

We've been in the same room but didn't acknowledge each other.

Because we're not young attractive women.

ou've been quite vocal in protesting against the proposed closure of BBC6 Music; why do you think the channel is so important, and do you think the channel can be saved?

Of course it can be saved. They just have to save it. If they don't they will have lost a radio station that is completely unique, with a range of presenters who are without exception passionate about music and keen to share their enthusiasm with an unusually open minded group of listeners. No other BBC station does that to the same degree as 6. That's exactly



what the BBC is supposed to be all about and to shut it down on some vague, probably bogus financial pretext would be short sighted I think. I'm sure money is tight, but I'm also well aware that when it wants to the BBC spends a lot of money on all kinds of other things that no one would miss in the slightest were they to be stopped.

hen all's said and done, how will you be remembered by the British public?

Unfortunately I'm not allowed to tell you how I'll be remembered as it would infringe the futuristic intellectual property rights of the British Public, smacking as it would of self serving determinism. I can tell you that it's going to be pretty amazing and I'm very excited.

In your recorded video message for the Jersey public (search 'Adam Buxton is Coming to Jersey' on Youtube), you suggested some questions for the Comedy Rocks Q&A, including the following. So, what are the answers to these?

hat about Afghanistan? It's bad.

an you tell me about your work with baboons?

It's going well. I've taught them how to street dance which the so called experts (including Sigourney Weaver) said could never be done so I'm pleased about that obviously. The dream now is to teach them how to street dance in 3-D.

ow are you going to turn the economy around?

By saying 'of course it can be turned around. They just have to turn it around.' That's how I deal with most difficult problems and it always works a treat! III informed positivity. It's chemical name is St+P:D

t's started – the annual influx of land-locked friends and family, swapping the city life for a taste of island air. So go on, make them really jealous and take them out to Jersey's top terraces for picture postcard summer dining with stunning sea views. Here are some of our favourites* around the island.

North

For breakfasts and brunches with a healthy dose of sea air, it has to be Plemont Café (tel: 482005. Open 9am-6.30/7pm in the summer) with its cliff-top location and steps down to Plemont beach. And for spicy suppers beside the sea, take the winding roads down to Bonne Nuit café (tel: 861656 open every day) which turns into a top Thai restaurant on Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings, serving spicy Penang curries and Pad Thai all right beside Bonne Nuit harbour.

Gallery also loves The Hungry Man and the Navigator Restaurant at Rozel

East

Choose your restaurants carefully as the sun sets in the west, so Gorey turns shady in the evenings. For sea views (with a castle thrown in for good measure), turn up to Castle Green (tel: 840218, closed Sunday evening and all day Monday) for a spot on the terrace with a glass of wine and some relaxed food. Squeeze on to the sweet terrace at Sumas (tel: 853291) for a swish weekend brunch overlooking Gorey harbour, then watch the tide come in at the Green Island Restaurant (tel: 857787, closed on Sunday evenings and all day Monday) over a plate of one of their tasty Mediterranean specialities.

Gallery also loves harbour views from Ingalill's at Gorey and the beach café at Archirondel.

South

To get the best out of the sweep of St Aubin's bay, book afternoon tea on the terrace at the elegant Somerville Hotel (tel: 741226). The views are spectacular, but if you want the full 180°, try the Hotel Cristina (tel: 758024) which serves lunch and evening cocktails out on their south-facing terrace high above the bay. Afterwards, head to The Dicq Shack (tel: 730273, food served till 9pm) for spicy Thai food on the beach while you dip your toes in the waves.

Gallery also loves The Boat House at St Aubin, Bistro Soleil and the terraces at Grand Jersey and the Radisson Blu.

West

Where to start? The terrace at L'Horizon (tel: 743101 open 9.30-11am for breakfast and 11am-9pm for lunch and dinner) with its sleek décor and sophisticated grill menu makes an elegant stop to admire St Brelade's Bay, or head to the Pizza Express (tel: 499049) with the best views or the relaxed terrace of the Wayside Café (tel: 743915) if you've got sandy kids in tow. El Tico (tel: 482009, open every day) is a perfect 'straight from the airport' stop for contemporary food and envy-inducing surf views. Add a couple of cocktails on the terrace at The Beach House (tel: 498605) at Ouaisne while you watch the sun set, and you'll have done the trick. Your friends will never want to leave.

Gallery also loves The Waterspash and The Lighthouse Restaurant at St Ouen's, and The Crab Shack and The Oyster Box at St Brelade.

Danny's Restaurant at the Harbour View

Danny says: "The best picnics start with good planning the day before. I have all my drinks chilled and my hamper packed up ready to go."

Recipe: Mango, lime and coconut panacotta

Boil together: 200g sugar, 500g mango purée, 1 litre of coconut milk, 3 squeezed limes, then add 4 soaked leaves gelatine. Strain into 6 plastic cups and refrigerate overnight.

Bring: "A summer fruit punch. Blend orange juice, squeezed limes, apple juice, fresh mint, coconut milk, and a handful of frozen berries together and chill. Add a good size blanket, some Jack Johnson and Bob's your uncle"



Peter Brewer

Peter says: "Never rush the building of the barbecue - it's very difficult to put right once it's lit!"

Recipe: Steamed moules à la crème

Tear off an A4-sized square of aluminium foil. Put 100g of mussels (bearded and scrubbed) in the centre and pinch the sides together to make an envelope. Pour in 3 tbs of white wine, 3 tbs double cream and half a clove of chopped garlic. Add salt and pepper before sealing well and placing on the BBQ for around 5 minutes or until steam starts to escape. Serve with crusty bread and Jersey butter.

Bring: "You can't go wrong with good sausages, asparagus, Harissa marinated pork belly, leg of lamb (butterflied and marinated in garlic & rosemary), or king scallops wrapped in pancetta & skewered with

Alan says: "Choose food you can eat with your fingers. I hate plastic plates and sitting on a rug and trying to use a knife and fork on an uneven beach isn't much fun"

Recipe: Herb and mustard rib-eye steak

Rub some Irish rib-eye steaks (Fungi Delecti) with Dijon mustard, garlic cloves and sprinkle with black pepper, fresh thyme and rosemary. Drizzle with olive oil, and chill in a plastic container for a few hours. Get the BBQ hot before cooking and throw a handful of herbs onto the coals as you're cooking the steaks. Serve in flatbread warmed on the BBQ.

Bring: "Jersey strawberries, a pot of caster sugar and some crème fraiche to dip the

Daniel says: "I love a coal barbecue. But you've got to set it right. Put more coal on one side than the other so you have fast and slow cooking sides and remember to cook on hot coals, not flames".

Recipe: Asian-style BBQ fish (whole mackerel, small seabass or steaks of a larger fish)

Crush some lemongrass and garlic with the back of a knife, then put it into a big square of tin foil, with a lime leaf and a drizzle of olive oil. Place your fish on top, season well and add more olive oil and a splash of white wine. Fold the tin foil up like an envelope to keep it as flat as possible and stop anything leaking. Cook on the hottest part of the BBQ for 5 mins each side (more if it's a big fish), then open and enjoy!

Bring: good steaks. An 8oz ribeye is about right. Also some pasta salad and baby plum tomato and mozzarella. Leafy salads are a bit hard to eat on the beach.





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

Is it necessary to have a Will?

Perhaps the best way to answer this question is to look at what will happen to our assets if we do not have a Will in place (to die intestate).

Many people living in the Island are not Jersey born but have chosen to settle and raise their families in this beautiful island and who would blame us? However, we sometimes bring with us preconceived ideas as to how things will be dealt with in the event of our death, which in most cases bear no resemblance to what actually happens under Jersey Law.

Jersey assets are divided into two classes and the manner in which they devolve on intestacy depends on the type of assets involved.

Real Estate - freehold property and leases for more than nine years.

Personal Estate – all personal possessions including bank accounts, share transfer property and leases for nine years or less. Any foreign property you may own, even land, is devolved as personal property.

Below are a few examples of questions which arise if people domiciled in Jersey die intestate, the answers to which might surprise:-

- 1. People with all their assets in joint names may consider a Will to be totally unnecessary, as if one dies then everything will automatically pass to the survivor. This is true as far as it goes, but still raises the question of how assets are divided if both of them die simultaneously or in close proximity of time to each other.
- 2. Those of us with spouses and children are confident our family will inherit our assets which, again, is true but do we know exactly in what proportion our assets will be divided?
- 3. What about single people without children? To whom will their assets pass on death?

The answers to the above questions are as follows:-

- 1. If it cannot be proved beyond reasonable doubt that one survived the other for a reasonable time, on application the court will make a declaration that the two deceased simultaneously, then, their assets will be divided so that half the assets fall into the estates of each of the deceased. Each estate is then administered in accordance with Jersey law. If the deceased leaves children, they will inherit their assets. If there are no children, then their assets will be divided equally amongst all their brothers and sisters (siblings) in the first instance. However, if one of the joint asset holders were to survive the other, even for a short period of time, then all the jointly held assets would pass to the survivor and again assuming there were no children, on their death these would pass to the siblings on their side only.
- 2. Jersey Law is very clear on how assets within a family are divided if someone dies intestate. In respect of Real Estate, life enjoyment of the matrimonial home will pass to the surviving spouse with the remainder being divided equally between them and the children. In respect of Personal Estate, (including share transfer property) the first £30,000 + household effects goes to the surviving spouse with the remainder being divided as to half to the surviving spouse and half to the children.
- 3. The assets of a single person without children will be divided equally amongst all their siblings in the first instance. If they have no siblings then it will pass to their parents; if no parents survive then it will go to their aunts and uncles and so on.

The above is just a brief précis of Jersey Law insofar as it relates to intestate estates and you should take further advice before making a final decision. However, if you want to be the one to decide who will ultimately benefit from your estate then the only way to do so will be by leaving a Will. Even so, a spouse and children have rights under Jersey law over the property left by Will – but that's a question for next time!

If the deceased stayed at home caring for children, the surviving partner will likely face a substantial increase in expenses to replace the deceased's contributions to the family lifestyle.

No matter how many or what kind of financial obligations an individual leaves at death, there's only one thing that will satisfy them - money. For this reason, a person who wants to relieve his or her family of these obligations will plan to leave them with money sufficient to cover all these needs.

Mortgage Payments/Rent Fund

The emotional effects of losing a loved one takes a long time to get over. Coupled with the need to uproot the family, it could make a difficult time even worse. So, when planning on family financial needs, things to look at are either paying off a mortgage or having enough funds available to make mortgage/rent payments for a period of time.

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ICSA Jersey names Award-winning Journalist as Guest Speaker

Award-winning Journalist, Frank Gardner OBE has been named as the Guest Speaker by the Institute of Chartered Secretaries and Administrators (ICSA) for its Annual Dinner to be held in October. Originally an investment banker in New York, London and Bahrain, Frank Gardner switched to journalism in 1995 and later became the BBC's Middle East Correspondent based in Cairo.

He has reported extensively on terrorism and security from Saudi Arabia and the Gulf, as well as Afghanistan, Pakistan, Guantanamo Bay and the Horn of Africa, and is now the UK's first full time Security Correspondent, reporting for the BBC on issues of both domestic and international security. In 2004 he was shot six times in an opportunistic attack by al-Qaeda gunmen while filming in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia. His cameraman was killed but Frank miraculously survived with major spinal-cord injuries. He returned to his job at the BBC following 14 operations.

In 2005 he was awarded the OBE by HM The Queen for services to journalism. Frank's story is a fascinating one and his fast-moving account of professional duties in a challenging environment will provide for an inspiring after-dinner speech. The black tie dinner will be held at the Hotel de France on Friday, 1st October, and is open to the Island's entire business community, including organisations large and small, and individuals from any Industry sector.

What made you choose the company you work for?



What made you choose the company you work for?

After university, I decided to go travelling, which was a welcome break from the studying lifestyle, and I remember thinking I never had to take another exam again. However, after travelling, I was looking into jobs in the Finance industry in Jersey and realised that to get ahead you need to take exams and I knew the chartered accountancy qualification is very highly regarded. What do you do on an average day?

My role at the moment is really diverse. I have been working on a wide range of clients from high street banks to local supermarkets, some of which I work on on my own and some in a large team. This in itself is varied. Sometimes I am performing audit tests at the client, attending audit meetings with the clients or internal meetings. Due to the varied training we receive, I have been to places such as Rome and Frankfurt for my training courses as well as joining up with our colleagues in Guernsey, and have also been responsible for delivering training courses to trainees. It means that no two days are ever the same.

What is your next step?

Now that I am qualified, it means a whole new world has opened up to me both in Jersey and globally. Whilst helping to mentor trainees who are studying for their qualifications, the responsibility and experience I now receive has grown significantly. I am also considering a secondment to KPMG Sydney or New York where I can develop my technical knowledge and skills further.

What advice would you give to yourself as a 2010/2011 graduate considering the experience you have now?





What made you choose the company you work for?

I felt BDO would offer the opportunity to be part of a smaller, personal and more integrated team, where I would not just be a "number" on the payroll listing! My studies have been undertaken via a block intensive route which meant that I attended classroom courses for a period of between 9 and 13 weeks which allowed me to fully concentrate on my studies away from the office environment. Following the ICAS route has also enabled me to complete all the technical knowledge I require to be an accountant within a 12 month time frame. I now have just one final exam to complete my professional examinations. I have also undertaken all of my courses and exams in Jersey, meaning that there has been no added stress of travelling and upheaval whilst studying.

What do you do on an average day?

I am involved in external audit, internal audit and accounts preparation jobs, which allows me to develop a broad range of skills, looking at different stages of the accounting process. The day will usually start at the office to check my emails and prepare for the day ahead, before arrival at the client's premises to start or continue the job. My day can be very varied, for example, I might be attending a client's stock take or working away from the Island on a client job, where the working day may be very different . I have been lucky to travel to the UK, Guernsey, Slovakia and Argentina during my time at BDO . I don't really think there is actually an "average" day that I could describe!

- d) the work/life balance and time commitments required for studying for professional qualifications through the different routes available e.g. intensive or otherwise.



School/job: Physiotherapist. I was born in Scotland (Fife). Been in Jersey for 11 years now (only came down for one or two summers!). Married to Sindy (a nurse) with one son, Sam, who loves skateboarding.

When did you start Volleyball?

I had a go a school but no one knew the rules and it just seemed like 100 kids trying to punch a ball over a huge net. The next time was more successful at college in Edinburgh back in 1989!. The only reason I got involved was that some of the international students were keen and knew the rules.... by the way it still seems as if the net is HUGE!

What is your worst Volleyball

accident? I've been really lucky and managed to avoid accidents. However, I get cramp in my legs.. what a weapon! It's so bad, that I'm sometimes doubled up and can't move. You'd think being a physio I would know how to avoid cramp but no! If I stretch one muscle the other muscles go onto cramp... sounds funny when I say it like that. Cramp is not good on the beach, and isn't good especially when there's only two of you in a team and your partner relies on you. It's also not so good if you're in the middle of St Ouen's Bay trying to surf (another one of my passions), I wish I could just get half decent at surfing before I get too old.

Where do you think is the best place to play Volleyball in the world? Have you done any competitions?

Whenever I go on holiday I look out for a beach volleyball court. My wife and I love to travel and

have

been to some awesome places. However, I most look forward to coming back to Jersey and getting down the beach at the Gunsite. The sand is beautiful and everyone is so friendly... if you don't believe me come down and try it out now while it's summer. I have done loads of comps over the years both in Jersey and in the UK, although beach volleyball isn't huge in the UK there are some good tournaments with players from all over the world. Being only 5'7" I'm already at a disadvantage but I seem to do alright and have the biggest vertical jump of all the guys in the squad - even measured against a 6'7" Polish player called Kristof, he has to be the best player I have ever played volleyball with! On home ground in Jersey I have been very lucky and have won the beach volleyball 2v2 tournament for many years running...maybe 9 years in a row. My luck has been having great partners over the years. I'm hoping to continue the roll and win this year. I'm coming up for retirement soon so I would like to keep winning! We really need to get some new, younger players involved - that's why we run the beach tournaments.

What comp have you done most recently? And how did you do?

Our most recent indoor tournament was the Jersey Open in May. Unfortunately we were plagued with injuries and did not do well (excuses, excuses) but on the up side the final was great between Croatia and St Malo (Croatia won). My most memorable tournament on the beach was in the Island Games in Rhodes in 2007. We didn't know what to expect but it turned out to be incredible playing against some great players. The eventual winner is now my current playing partner Berislav Bobus. he's from Croatia and now lives here... it's a long story!





How can people get into volleyball?

We are running training sessions every Thursday night (6pm at the Gunsite) over the summer where folks can come down and have a go. Everyone is welcome and it's free. Then we have tournaments - the first is the Mixed 4s on 3rd July, and the next is on 24th July, you need at least four people in a team, with at least two girls (could be a good excuse to ask someone you know to come down the beach). The tournaments are sponsored by Airtel Vodafone and there are events throughout the summer for beginners to experienced players. This year, with Airtel Vodafone's help, we are trying to get more groups of friends and work colleagues to give it a go and enter a team. 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those sports that everybody in Jersey wants to learn but finds an excuse not to. It's too expensive, or you don't have the time. Actually, I think a lot of it has to do with feeling intimidated. If you watch the good surfers at St Ouen, they ooze cool and confidence. It's no wonder some people would rather give it a miss than flail around in the water, like a seal with indigestion, making a public spectacle of themselves.

But that's the up side of learning with a group at Jersey Surf School: you're not the only one with zero experience who's going to end the lesson with a bellyful of seawater. The mix of people in my group immediately makes me relax. There are two couples: one young, one middle aged; and a man in his thirties. It's clear everyone feels a little bit sheepish but we share the same attitude, which is to give it a go and see how we get on.

The Surf School supplies the wetsuits and boards and we head onto the beach where Steph and Will, our instructors, run through how to get up on the board once in the sea. And it's surprisingly uncomplicated. You lie down on the board, push yourself up with your arms, bring your legs in

towards your chest and hop up. Not exactly rocket science, but with a sport that looks as fast paced and impressive as surfing does, you think there must be a huge amount of skill involved. But Steph tells me it's more a case of practice makes perfect. "Once you know the basics, it's just about getting out there and doing it again and again and again. You naturally start to sense where your feet should be for you to hold your balance." With our boards placed securely in the sand we practice the move for fifteen minutes before we're beckoned out to sea. Will and Steph tell us to wait until we feel a wave tickling our toes, then give three big paddles and go for it.

They're both brilliant teachers. Very young, very laid back (their calm, friendly approach definitely helps put everyone at ease) and you don't sense any pressure to get it right straightaway. But the guy in his thirties does! He catches a wave and is up on his feet like a natural. Feeling slightly unnerved, I wonder whether I should be able to do the same, but Steph just encourages me to try to get up on my knees first, which I do and it works a treat.

The instructors then work among us, helping us to point the board towards the shore and holding the tip in place while we wait for a wave. The hardest thing seems to be judging which wave to try and catch, and at what point. But I don't have to worry about that - when the time's right, they let go of the board, giving me a big push to help me on my way.

The first few times I only manage to get on my knees, or I nose dive. Will tells me this is when your body weight is too far forward, and it's pretty painful when it happens. It feels like the sea is trying to rip every limb in your body out of its socket, and my head spins as I do a couple of inelegant cartwheels underwater.

But remembering what Steph said about practice making perfect, I get back up and head out again. Will steadies the board for me and helps me relax by chatting about where he's surfed around the world and where the best waves are (Hawaii). He tells me one's approaching, lets go of the board and shouts at me to 'paddle, paddle, paddle!'. I do as I'm told and realize I've got quite a bit of speed behind me, which makes the board somehow feel more solid beneath me. I get up on my knees, then manage to get my right leg up, and realizing I'm about to stand up for the first time I quickly bring my left leg up, throw my arms in the air, scream, and belly flop into the water. I've been told that catching a wave is the best feeling in the world, and I've got to admit it made me feel pretty euphoric. I'd advise anyone to give surfing a try, because you never know: you might just surprise yourself.

With water's continuous forced resistance you engage more muscle fibres through a larger range of motion, you'll firm up from every angle.

An aerobic water exercise of around 30 minutes can help you burn about 300 calories. It is essential to keep yourself well hydrated when indulging in water aerobic exercise. Remember that as you submerge yourself in the water, you are reducing the stress on the lower part of the body but at the same time you are increasing the resistance.

A basic water aerobic exercise people can do is simply jogging in the water. It can help to get your heart rate up and you will begin burning calories. You can jog on the spot or from side to side of the pool. Whenever you jog in the water, make sure that the ball and heel of your foot touch the bottom of the pool.

Another great exercise is water aerobics skiing. Using a back and forth motion just like you were skiing down a hill will get your heart rate up and help you to burn calories. To create more resistance, you can either use water barbells or specialty-webbed gloves.

If you choose to use barbells, you can push them under the water to create a lot of resistance. With the added weight this will help you build muscles. If you choose to use the webbed gloves, you will want to swing your arms back and forth under the water.

You could also challenge yourself working out in the deep water. You can use a special belt to keep you afloat or you can use a noodle. If you choose to work out in the deep, consider using speciality ankle weights. They will help you to improve your balance and make the overall workout more challenging.

To tone arms stand in water at shoulder level and extend your arms on each side below the water level. Make small vigorous circles with your arms forward and backward. Keep doing this until you are slightly tired.

Another exercise you could try are jumping jacks where you jump up and down and extend your arms and legs, repeat this process until you are a little out of breath.

To tone up legs and glutes a very basic exercise would be to hold onto the side of the pool and kick your legs (without too much splash) through the water creating as much resistance as possible.

For an extra workout grab yourself a beach ball and try these exercises! Perform as many reps of each exercise as you can in 30 seconds, rest, then repeat. Swimming and water aerobics is a fantastic way of toning muscle and burning calories, get in the water with friends and family and enjoy your summer!

Gallery's motoring section as if it were your favourite religious cult will know a little about Honda's CR-Z by now, having seen it featured in the top five hybrid & electric concepts that actually managed to make it through to production and as a little teaser in last month's review of Honda's Insight.

For those of you who consider yourself normal, of sane mind and free of motor-based editorial vices however, the CR-Z has been dubbed a 'sport hybrid coupé' and the spiritual successor to Honda's CR-X from way back when it was acceptable to sport a mullet to compliment your all-over denim ensemble as you roller-booted along to your walkman, blasting a bit of Duran Duran down your earholes. Remember those days? Thankfully I was still in short trousers. Or was that a shell suit?

Don't get me wrong – if anybody is an advocate of noisy, thirsty, vehicles that provoke plentiful perspiration at anything but a snail's pace that person would be me, but wasn't 2010 supposed to be the future? I've a feeling HAL-9000 would be seriously unimpressed with our lack of progress. What with everyone saying that climate change is going to force our children's children's children to evolve into something more aquatic the, CR-Z couldn't have arrived in showrooms at a much better time.

So how is it different from the hybrids and electrics already silently and efficiently roaming our streets? Firstly, it's more like driving a car as opposed to a spaceship. There isn't any great emphasis on the CR-Z actually being a hybrid once behind the wheel, and quite importantly it has a manual gearbox. A six speed manual gearbox at that - no CVT monotonic elastic bands here, no sir-ree. The ratios are quite short too which gets you more involved

in the driving experience and gives the impression of making better progress than you might be, because let's face it, a 124PS combination of 1.5 litre petrol engine and electric motors isn't going to set the tarmac on fire, but it is a nippy little thing.

You don't feel as compelled to drive with the utmost of fuel economy blinkered sense at all times which is a bonus. That backlit speedometer display from the Insight makes an appearance though in an almost awe-inspiringly beautiful form (see inset image), ever adjusting from green to blue depending on how many inches of sealevel rise you may or may not be causing. If you're REALLY naughty though, and select the 'sport' mode it'll turn red. Of course, the trees are still there too, but I didn't care about the trees this time, the CR-Z is more about driving than saving the planet - it just happens to be pretty good at multitasking. Needless to say, the fuel economy is still excellent - that's what this car is all about after all. Pushing the (recycled) envelope.



The auto-stop feature is barely noticeable and kicks in to reduce the number of polar bears forced into a vaguely icy but positively watery death whilst you're sitting at the traffic lights, which is a nice, clever touch.

Just ignore the rear seats and consider the area behind you to be a healthily sized storage space. Unless of course your nearest and dearest are unfortunate enough to have misplaced their legs at some point, although if this is the case fitting the requisite mobility equipment into the remainder of the bootspace may prove troublesome with the seats up. Actually, forget I mentioned it and just consider the rear seats in this 2+2 a tiny bonus. Literally.

The model tested was a mid-range version and apparently the top-of-the-range GT is the one to look out for, with leather seats as standard and a few exterior enhancements. This one came with all of

the usual refinements that you'd expect, the obligatory climate control, airbags, CD player with USB & AUX connectivity, electric windows and mirrors, on-board computer, wheel mounted controls and also cruise control, which complements the MPH to KPH readout button as discovered on the Insight last month as well as the nice, big foot rest to the left of the clutch just perfectly if travelling abroad is your bag.

Okay, so visibility out of the rear window is still poor but that's just a hit you have to take for Honda managing to create such a wind-resistance evading slippery shape in their epic struggle for fuel efficiency.

This is a definite step closer to the way we should be buying and driving cars right here, right now, in the future. I wonder how long it will take for other manufacturers to follow suit? Hopefully their are some interesting studies being hidden up their mechanical and creative sleeves...





orn in 1976 into the financially troubled family that was the British Leyland group, the Rover 'Specialist Division 1' is more relevant than ever as this month's forgotten hero. Primarily because it's a bit of a boat.

Bearing more than just a passing resemblance to a Ferrari Daytona at the front, this executive saloon replacement for the ageing Rover P6 and Triumph's 2000 and 2.5Pi was out to fight the likes of BMW's E28 five series and Mercedes' S-class. Unfortunately though, British unreliability meant it was a bit like turning up to a gun fight with a knife. And a moderately blunt one at that.

Sinking into the velour heaven that is the Vanden Plas version is a bit like having your living room on wheels with a widescrren television way in front of you watching, I don't know, say, Bullitt and pretending you're Steve Mc Queen. Okay, so it's not a '68 Mustang GT but it does share a not too dissimilar V8 burble if you're in the 3500 or Vitesse model. And you're not Steve Mc Queen either.

These behemoths were on almost every street in the eighties and nineties but have probably all turned to iron oxide now. A crying shame.

The Apple iPhone 4 is everything that a new piece of technology should be. It's innovative, attractive, and ahead of its competition. In comparison, previous iPhone upgrades seem inconsequential - that's how much iPhone 4 brings to the table.

Okay... so I haven't even held the iPhone 4 yet but it's hard to miss the aesthetic design touches that make the Apple iPhone 4 stand out. Sounds like something out of a futuristic film, however it's fairly simple... the new screen surpasses the number of pixels the human retina can process! So your iPhone's your phone... obviously! It's also your MP3 player... and it's full of Apps to keep you amused during those 'down times'. What more do you need? A camera? A video camera? Will you be entering the Jersey Live Battle of the Bands? How do you fancy your chances?

Yes and we hope to do well! [Jersey elector-rock duo] Brobots have a 10p bet with us. There's some stiff competition from bands like The Mulburys and Bones but we'll just have to see what happens!

Do you have plans to move to the UK together?

All of us have taken a gap year to move to Brighton if we can save up enough money.

What are you working on at the moment?

We're working on a 2-part EP called String Pigeon; our mate Seb Gilmore is recording and mixing it for us. We're also constantly working on new material.

Mhat's your favourite gig you've ever played?

We've got mixed opinions but it's between either last November, the 'Help Haiti' gig at Club 72 – our first gig with Adam – and our most recent gig at Live Lounge for the Britpop night in June.

Is it just us, or has Jersey just got an awful lot cooler in recent times? The amount of 'alternative' entertainment on offer seemingly doubles by the month on the island – just look at the line ups on offer at regular Opera House, Club Kamikaze and Comedy Rocks events, amongst others – and the days when a night out on the town involved a choice between a tribute band or the same commercial house DJ that played last week, and the week before that, appear to be a thing of the past. With Jersey Live Festival, the Channel Islands' biggest live music event, just around the corner, we thought we'd take a glance at some of the hip-and-happening leftfield acts that will be working their magic on the Les Inrocks Magic Stage at the September Festival.

First, an introduction to the stage is in order. The stage is hosted by French culture magazine Les Inrockuptibles, which is basically France's equivalent of the UK's NME magazine. First partnering with Jersey Live in 2009, they have had a helping hand in picking some of France's coolest up-and-coming acts, including Gable, Cocoon, Naïve New Beaters and Curry & Coco last year, giving Jersey Live a much-welcome injection of Gallic flavour. They may be rubbish at football (but then again, so are the English) but boy do they know their music. As well as the crème de la crème de la musique Français, there will also be some much-talked about UK and American acts on the bill. Here's the lowdown:

CABADZI

With an unusual mix of hip-hop, folk, jazz and classical influences, experimental French outfit Cabadzi were spotted by Jersey Live's organisers performing to a packed crowd at French showcase festival Printemps des Bourges. With an oddball approach, they combine brass and string instruments with live beat box to create a unique and eccentric sound that may well turn out to be the highlight of the day.

DJANGO DJANGO

Psych-pop four-piece Django Django have been wowing audiences and defying journalists attempts to categorise them since early 2009. Bursting on to the East London art-rock scene, they've since supported the likes of Young Knives and the Dodos, as well as appearing at festivals including the Great Escape and Latitude. Combining electronics and live instrumentation, their mix of influences is diverse, with folk, rock and electronica coming together for a unique and potent concoction.

FENECH-SOLER

London-based electro-rock four-piece Fenech-Soler are one of the most talked about new acts in the country right now. The Guardian described them as 'electro boy wonders... who are destined for greatness.' With shows at V Festival and Creamfields this summer, their appeal stretches to indie and dance fans alike, and they appear be on the cusp of stardom. Incidentally, one of their biggest breaks came when they were invited to collaborate on Jersey Live headliners Groove Armada's latest LP. Could we see them sharing the stage together over the weekend?

FREELANCE WHALES

Hailing from Queens, New York, this five-piece are signed to the ever-trustworthy Frenchkiss label, home of fellow New Yorkers and former Jersey Live acts Passion Pit and The Antlers. The band sit somewhere snugly between the two in terms of style, combining live electronics with ramshackle instrumentation (using banjos, glockenspiels and synthesizers), with a decidedly twee sensibility. They've been compared to the likes of Arcade Fire, Sufjan Stevens and Mumford and Sons, and are one of the hottest new bands in the indie world right now. HERE WE GO MAGIC

One of three New York acts to be playing at Jersey Live this year, Here We Go Magic are one of the most talked-about 'buzz bands' to come out of the USA in the past year. With their blend of psychedelic rock and folk influences, their woozy, ambient sound has seen them compared to the likes of Deerhunter and Grandaddy. Gigging extensively on this side of the Pond this year, they've been supporting Broken Social Scene and Grizzly Bear on tour, as well as performing at some of the biggest festivals around.

JAMAICA

Formerly known as Poney Poney, French duo Jamaica are set to headline the Les Inrocks Magic Tent on Saturday night. Their debut album has been produced by Xavier de Rosnay of Justice and Daft Punk sound engineer Peter Franco – which officially makes them the coolest thing to come out of France since Eric Cantona. Their particular brand of guitar-pop has certain nods to the likes of Devo and Phoenix; fast, danceable and utterly accessible. If they don't get your feet moving, consult a doctor. For fans of: Phoenix, Devo, Daft Punk

MUCHUU

Brother-sister duo Muchuu will appeal to your cutesy inner self; their oddball electro-pop is more twee than a bluebird rolled in glitter and with lush layers of instrumentation including keyboards, wind instruments and more obscure objects such as bicycle bells and brushes, their sound is perfect for what we all hope will be yet another sunny Jersey Live weekend. With their inspiration coming from sources as diverse and unusual as cream cakes, arcade games and Japanese culture, they're as strange a pop act as you can imagine, and you might just love them.

RUBIN STEINER

Rubin Steiner is producer/musician Frederick Landier. One of France's finest purveyors in discorock, he is already well known to French musos, and we expect his set to be one of the surprise highlights of the festival for many years. With a combo of synths, guitars and live percussion, his live shows are known to be explosive affairs, so expect to get sweaty. You have been warned. For fans of: LCD Soundsystem, Primal Scream, Naïve New Beaters

WE ARE ENFANT TERRIBLE

Paris-based four-piece WAET are one of the most exciting electro-rock bands to come out of France in recent times, and with a mix of disco, punk and 8-bit electronica influences, they've been compared to the likes of Crystal Castles and 2009's Les Inrocks Stage-headliners Kap Bambino. With gigs throughout France, USA and Canada lined up before they head to Jersey, they've certainly got a lot of hard work and partying to do before they hit Jersey Live. Let's hope they leave something in the tank for their Les Inrocks Magic Tent slot.

WE HAVE BAND

Following in the footsteps of previous Jersey Live acts the Subways and Golden Silvers, We Have Band were the winners of the 2009 Glastonbury Emerging Talent competition, winning a slot on the festival's hallowed Pyramid Stage and brining them to the attention of super-cool French dance label Kitsune (home of Jersey Live 2009 favourites Chew Lips) who were won over by their energetic electro-pop stylings. With a debut album released in April, this looks to be their biggest year yet, and a busy touring season awaits them, capped by two performances at Jersey Live, in the Les Inrocks Tent as well as the Main Stage. We can't wait.

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
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
