Jurisdictional independence...when it suits

Jersey has been at the table of European politics (albeit from outside of the EU membership) for decades. In that time, various directives and regulations have been served, to which Jersey has peered over and either prodded, picked at, chewed and spat out, or removed from its plate entirely.

As it is not part of the EU, noone at the table has the means to threaten the Island that it will withhold dessert unless Jersey eats its greens. Whilst Europe's elders ingest unpalatable directives emanating from Brussels ("whatever Brussels sprouts" you could say) Jersey continues to scoff those sweet and fluffy regulations - the ones that make its finance industry feel whiter than white, transparent and incredibly attractive to those with money. Of course, the ability to pick and choose in this way has placed Jersey in a strong position politically and economically. Local international relations experts would be correct in saving that our relationship with the rest of Europe provides the best of both worlds. In recent times it can't be ignored that outsiders have questioned

In November the UK Government accepted the Ministry of Justice's recommendations on how the UK administers its relationship with Crown Dependencies (including Jersey). Although not suggesting complete autonomy, Jersey's Chief Minister was quoted as saying that Jersey should be "self governing...[and] responsible for determining [its] own future".

Despite this, when it comes to the wedding between William Windsor and Kate Middleton, the Jersey crest will be stuffed under the proverbial bed, dusty Union Jacks will be brought down from the loft and we'll all be militant if we don't get our 'national' holiday.

Stray flares and new chairs

Jersey Harbours had much to say in November

On the 5th of November, it seems not all event-holders opted for conventional fireworks. For whatever reason (cost-cutting. last-minute organisation, blatant juvenile delinquency or typical Jersey tightness) some bright spark(ler)s joined the island-wide celebrations by firing distress

Unfortunately the crew aboard the Commodore Goodwill, which was anchored in St Aubin's Bay at the time, were well positioned to pick out signals amid the genuine pyrotechnics illuminating the night

Assuming that the flare was genuine, the Jersey Coastguard responded to each alert (15 in all). Shots fired from boats moored in the bay were fairly easy to deal with. Building for Bin Laden

Banahan takes (outside) centre stage

Jerseyman kicks critics into touch at Twickenham

Last month England Rugby's Martin Johnson picked Jerseyman, Matt Banahan, to face Samoa in the outside centre position. Banahan had been selected on the back of try-scoring displays against the likes of Argentina at Old Trafford in 2009, a growing presence at Bath RFC (where he has assumed the captaincy on occasion) and impressive performances in the No.13 shirt in the Aviva Premiership.

In a bone-crunching encounter Banahan's physical presence was evident. His strength took him through a thick South Pacific defence and over the gain line. His height and speed were all important in scoring one try, setting up a second and crossing for a third (unfortunately disallowed). Not too shabby given that the milk you put on your cornflakes has seen more days in your fridge door than Banahan has at outside centre.

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

The rink will be open to the public from 1600 hours Friday, 10th December 2010 and close on Sunday, 9th January 2011. Opening hours will be from 10am through to 10pm daily. The rink will be closed on Christmas Day and there will be reduced opening hours on Christmas Eve, Boxing Day, New Year's Eve and New Year's Day.

Record breaking marathon for fittest firm in Jersey

Twenty charities will share £11,289, the largest amount ever raised by RBC Wealth Management's Jersey marathon team. The company is also claiming the title of 'fittest firm in Jersey' after entering over 230 people who completed the course in teams of five or as individuals running the whole course. Altogether, RBC staff ran nearly 1500 miles during the event.

The wildest hotel in Jersey....



HSBC staff go mad for rubber

More than 400 staff from HSBC embarked on a month-long project to help construct a unique enclosure at Durrell Wildlife Conservation Trust last month. The project required a team of twenty HSBC volunteers each weekday until the enclosure was finished. More than 2,500 man-hours were donated to the project over the course of the month. The new 'tyre tunnel' will be the first sustainable building of its kind in Jersey and will provide the perfect environmental conditions for the tropical Livingstone's fruit bat. As well as being a sustainable and energy efficient enclosure, the new tunnel will also provide as near a natural habitat as possible for the bats, vastly improving their living environment.

In addition to providing volunteers to build the new bat tunnel, HSBC is also funding a new efficient and sustainable heating and lighting system that will create the right environmental conditions for the enclosure. The installation of these systems will greatly improve the building's energy efficiency and help Durrell potentially save around $\mathfrak{L}5,000$ per year in energy costs.

First Class Idioms

I don't like the cut of your jib young sir

Oh we peoples of the British Isles, how we love our language with its myriad of words that nobody but us can pronounce, its overflowing catalogue of adjectives, and all those odd little phrases made up of just two or three words that we can set down all shining and fluorescing in our sentences; minimetaphors that can be absolutely nothing at all to do with our subject, but which can, with just a single sentence, describe with all its many flavours and aromas, exactly what it is we are talking about.

We describe our world in these perfect, compact little stories, and we instinctively know what each of these phrases means; which must be immensely annoying for a person coming to our lingo from abroad, for there is not just one tongue for them to learn, but two.

What is more obscure, and often not given even the slightest thought, is where they came from, what their derivation is, and what it was in the evolution of our beautiful verbal and written expression that gave first breath to these creatures. So here I have taken on the task to bring enlightenment and describe the birth of some of our favourite and most used English idioms.

Many are class related, be it of domestic or military and naval extraction, and with almost all of them comes the often unintentional but seemingly always present spectre of English snobbery.

Let's look at the first of our idioms to be placed under the microscope, and the one that has inspired this little piece about them; 'First Class'. And here's the thing, it is the idiom I don't seem to be able to find an explanation of, even though it is a term used on the railways, in education, and in the postal services. I am unable to find a reason for it ever coming into being.

From this I will conclude, rightly or wrongly, that it has emerged from the hierarchy within the British system of social class. After all, what self-respecting gentleman would want to sully himself in the presence of a man who must by necessity of his existence toil for a living with his own hands, vigour and sweat? No, no, there must be some way of making distinction, of dividing, of creating levels between the two. There is, and it is class; the first class carriage on a train, the more expensive, prioritised, first class post.

Another in the same vein is 'Top Drawer'. It is obvious to anyone who imagines a set of drawers what this idiom stands for. But it's an odd sounding thing to say, so just where does it come from? It is first known to appear as a quote in a novel from 1905 by Horace Vachell. The term makes a simile out of the idea that the best kind of people, those from the higher echelons of British society, are to be found in the highest compartment of a bedroom chest of drawers; which is the place where Victorian gentry kept their jewellery and most valuable possessions.

Associated with that oh so English of character traits, Englishness itself even, is a phrase that rings the bells of memories of empire and greatness, the thing we are both admired and ridiculed for in equal portion; a 'stiff upper lip' is something said to always be inherent in the greatest of our clan. It is what is meant to mark us out; that desire to do one's duty, no matter what the cost, never complaining and never alluding to any negative feeling about it whatsoever. What a coup then by those comical Americans that it should be one of their number that originally penned the phrase.


It was in a publication called the 'Massachusetts Spy' in 1815, that a stiff upper lip was first notated in context describing this noble stoicism. How about a naval one for us now. "I

don't like the cut of your jib young sir" is something that any one of us might say on any given day. "I don't like the look of you" might be a more frank way of expressing the same feeling. A jib is the triangular sail which is strung between the head of the foretopmast at the bow of the ship and the jib boom which protrudes from it. In naval tradition every country had a different style of jib sail, and so the nationality of the sailors aboard could be read by the shape. The triangular shape also has the appearance of a nose, which is the most prominent feature of the face and one of the visual markers we humans use to make an instant opinion about another of our race.

I shall end our little foray into the idiosyncrasies of the English metaphor with what I suppose is actually a proverb, and one that I hope one day can be said of the system of inequality which exists in our society, and which has given rise to so many of the idioms used in our speech and our literature; 'the writing is on the wall'. This warning of impending doom and demise is taken unequivocally and literally from the Bible: Daniel 5:5, in a story where a king finds words of an unknown language scrawled upon his wall. Daniel, a slave with unearthly powers, is summoned to translate and finds it is a foretelling of the downfall of the kingdom. That night the king is killed, and the kingdom is sacked.


With that parting shot, my colours nailed to the mast, I grit my teeth, batten down the hatches, cross my fingers and hope to keep the wolves from the door.

But please remember, never look a gift horse in the mouth or wait with baited breath killing time while others chew the cud; instead seize the day, keep your nose clean, keep your pecker up, but always mind your p's and q's my old china, and walk tall through your salad days.









Fancy a first-class lifestyle like a celebrity or royalty?

Camilla Parker Bowles' nephew Ben Elliot spoke to Gallery about Quintessentially, the concierge service he co-founded a decade ago.

What that means is that for a fee, members are able to call their account manager twenty four hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year with any request and expect to have it fixed. Ben says this can range from the mundane - such as wanting a table at a fully booked restaurant - to the truly mind blowing. "We've received some amazingly elaborate requests, such as closing the Sydney Harbour Bridge for a private climb so a member could propose to his partner, or hosting a private and romantic dinner on an iceberg. We've organized trips to the North Pole and even arranged a private party in one of the Angkor Wat Temples in Cambodia."

He insists they're rarely unable to come up with the goods. "The main reason some requests are tougher than others are short deadlines. We'd only definitely say no if it's illegal or immoral. Apart from that, we'd hope to be able to fulfill anything that was physically possible – or at least give it a good go!"

Ben – who's cultivated one of the most enviable contacts books in London – is also prepared to pull in favours for charity. Darcy Bussell, the UK's most famous prima ballerina, recently performed a private dance at a gala organized by Quintessentially in aid of Unicef. Champagne sponsors provided the drink, there was an eight course dinner by Michelinstarred chef Tom Aitken and a vocal performance by Katherine Jenkins. And he says London isn't the only place where they can fix favours. "We offer exceptional access on an international scale. We currently have offices in 56 different countries around the world with more opening soon. We believe this provides an unrivalled global reach that really sets us apart from the rest."

He adds: "When we created the business ten years ago, the small team of founding partners were the ones sleeping with their mobiles by their ears in order to make sure their clients had uninterrupted support."

He believes it's this attention to detail that remains the most important factor. "Within the luxury industry, service is paramount. It has to be proactive, attentive and efficient. Every client has their own idea of what luxury is, whether it's blanketing a ball room of a 16th century country estate with fresh yellow roses, or having Dire Straits perform at your wedding. Knowing your member is crucial, and attention to detail is vital, especially when creating something bespoke that will be one of a kind. The

level of perfectionism should flow through the entire production, down to even the tableware with unique glasses and striking decoration."

The problem, surely, with consistently coming up with such spectacular events, must be how to keep surprising clients? Ben says they're working on a project - ready in 2013 - which should trump even the most demanding and decadent customer's expectations. "We've created a deluxe floating private members' club on board a 700 foot yacht. which will travel the globe. It's called Q one and will have 12 private residences on board, a first class hotel, restaurants, bars, nightclubs and a casino. There'll also be a recording studio, cigar lounge, luxury spa, a gym with the latest equipment, a luxury shopping emporium, a state-of-the-art business centre and a beach club on the top deck of the ship." And if that wasn't audacious enough, there'll also be a retractable marina at the stern of the ship which can be extended to provide berths for large private vachts who want to come and visit.

It will cost an eye watering ten thousand euros to become a member, but islanders without that kind of money could still see the floating first class palace from Jersey's shores. Ben insists there's no reason the yacht wouldn't be able to pay the island a visit.

He adds: "Quintessentially is a service for all. It's hugely important for getting to grips with the exploding global luxury market and helping clients who want to lead a certain lifestyle, but who don't always have the time or contacts to organise it. Islanders can definitely benefit from the large number of services on offer".

Language expert Susie Dent confirmed to presenter Jeff Stelling that the word, describing a "rude or obnoxious person", was acceptable but Channel 4 ruled the round would have to be filmed again, with new letters. Countdown contestants are given a mixture of nine consonants and vowels, and have thirty seconds in which to rearrange them to make the longest possible word. Earlier this year, Stelling and co-presenter Rachel Riley visibly squirmed when the letter A was followed by U, D, F, C, K and E, potentially creating a six-letter profanity. But on that occasion both contestants tactfully ducked the obvious by opting for shorter words.

Jim Hopley, chief executive of Channel Islands Co-operative, said the assistant's seat had been too low at the Jersey supermarket, reports the BBC. Mr Hopley said this had caused the shopper to be accidentally charged an extra £5, which had now been refunded. "It was an unfortunate incident. The poor lady involved was totally mortified, but the customer rightly was concerned about it," he said.



Sunbeds for inmates.

A Russian prison is to install sunbeds and mud baths to improve the health of its inmates.

Sergei Telyatnikov, head of Moscow's Butyrka remand prison, said inmates would also be allowed to use Skype to make voice and video calls to relatives. Russia's prisons have been criticised as being overcrowded and badly managed with poor medical facilities. Mr Telyatnikov was quoted as telling the Vesti FM radio station: "We are developing additional medical services... and even sunbeds will be put in place." He said the sunbeds would be installed by the end of the year, but that prisoners would have to apply for permission before using them, and would be charged for doing so.



Arr 'Mate'

An Australian man has been jailed for addressing a magistrate as "mate". Thomas John Collins

was locked up after twice calling Magistrate Matthew McLaughlin "mate" during a hearing in Ipswich, Queensland. When Magistrate McLaughlin objected and ordered Collins to address him as "sir" or "your honour", he replied: "OK mate", reports the Courier Mail. That was the final straw which resulted in Collins being sent for a stint in the cells. He later returned to the courtroom to apologise. The incident outraged one local politician who is calling for all Queensland magistrates to attend anger management classes. Ipswich councillor Paul Tully said there was nothing "more Australian than calling someone 'mate" and it was hard to believe someone could be locked up for using the word. "It is getting out of control....I say to every magistrate - 'Come on mate, get off your high horse and show some tolerance'."

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Bergerac's **back**

Meeting up with John
Nettles on a rainy afternoon
in Jersey seems perfectly
normal. After all, as Bergerac,
he's such an iconic Jersey
character you almost expect
to see him out and about
around the island, speeding
down the Avenue or in a
corner of the Old Court
House, taking a break from
tracking down criminals.

The truth is, he's still piecing together convoluted stories and uncovering the truth, but this time it's not about glamorous jewel thieves or corrupt millionaires, it's the real story behind the island's five years of Nazi occupation. 'The Channel Islands at War' a series about the occupation, written and presented by John Nettles, is now available on DVD.

A history graduate himself, Nettles explains the desire to produce the documentary, which ran on the Yesterday channel and was seen by 2 million viewers, grew after writers like Madeleine Bunting and David Fraser had presented their own takes on the islands' occupation. "They blew the whole world of the occupation wide open. There seemed to be a need for a reappraisal of the whole period here. That was the academic reason, the other reason was that I wanted to find out exactly what it was like during those seminal years and talk to the survivors and find out what actually happened."

The occupation is still a controversial subject with plenty of questions surrounding the years between 1940 and 1945 with a particular focus on whether the island collaborated with the occupying forces. But for Nettles, the real discovery was that conditions in the islands were far worse than the picture painted by official reports immediately after the occupation. "Much, much worse. It was the suffering that appalled me, the sheer bloodiness of it, the casual savagery and the extraordinary fear." By including eyewitness accounts, archive footage and recently discovered

documentation, Nettles hopes the series will bring an accurate insight into the events of the time. "A relation of what happened during the war through the eyes of the people who were actually there at the time, that's the main thing."

He talks with great warmth and feeling about the survivors he interviewed, and you get the impression he feels a certain responsibility to ensure their story was told and get out of the "cocoon of unreality which is TV" as he describes it, "and talk to real people in the real world". He pauses for a moment as he relates how when he found himself on the Honours List recently, he was

saddened by the media reaction. "Her Majesty by some oversight gave me an OBE and I was delighted to receive it, although I found it rather depressing that the only person the media wanted to talk to was me. I was there with brave men and women who'd done extremely brave things, but they wouldn't talk to them. It's a great sadness."

A fair point, although in the public's imagination, John Nettles will forever be the super sleuth DCI Barnaby, catching criminals and battling Midsomer's alarmingly high murder rate. But it's the character of Bergerac he has a soft spot for. "In my head, old as I am, I identify with Bergerac, because inside I'm really still driving silly cars, rescuing beautiful maidens on cliff tops. You see, you don't want to let go of that dream do you!"

Filming Bergerac in Jersey was memorable because as he says, "I was relatively young, I was in Jersey and it was glorious. It was like one endless summer". Fast cars, plenty of on-screen love interests, and stunning

island locations, you can see why John Nettles might have fond memories of his time as Bergerac. "There's one scene I particularly remember of an E-type Jaguar taking off up the Esplanade, and Bergerac in the red 1947 Triumph - falling to bits - but overtaking the Jaguar and running it off the road - it's wonderful stuff! But in the real world of course, Tom Barnaby's much more like me, he's kind of getting on a bit." Despite 'getting on a bit' as he says, there are plenty of Bergerac and Barnaby fans, and some have been known to take their obsession a bit far. "Ah yes, there are quite a few stalkers. There's a Norwegian one who sends me diet sheets because she thinks I'm too fat. She's a karate expert too and she wrote me a long list of what she'd like to do with me. And... no. It wasn't fun at all. But most of my admirers are old and withered, rather like me and that's a bit depressing."

Nettles is a frequent visitor back to the island he's had so much to do with his daughter and grandchildren live here. After having filmed island-wide for so many years, I wonder where his favourite spot is. He answers straight away. "Beauport. I like it because it's utterly unspoilt - apart from the steps of course. I remember once when we were filming with Richard Griffiths (Pie in the Sky and Uncle Vernon in the Harry Potter films), he thought he'd treat us all to some champagne down on the beach. He buried it in the sand at Beauport in the morning, but of course while we were filming the tide came in and when we got back down there - did he have any idea of where he'd buried it? None at all. They are probably still a couple of bottles of champagne, under the sand somewhere down there..."





'Our animal lounge provides individual care, professional expertise and an environment designed to ensure ultimate comfort for 14,000 household pets and 1,500 horses and wild animals annually, said Lufthansa general manager Kai Peters.

If a transfer or layover exceeds more than two to three hours, animals will be sent to the animal lounge where they can await their flight. Vets will be on hand to ensure animals are healthy enough to continue their journey and deal with any problems.

They have already helped make the journey of one pet more comfortable - a pregnant dog. 'About thirty minutes before the plane landed, the dog started giving birth to several puppies, said Mr Peters. ut, if you're seeking the truest sense of South India, there's none other than Kerala! This State doesn't even keep to the peripheries of normality. She's a diva. A dalliance with her and she's embedded under your skin. Kerala strikes like a heart palpitation, less of a spasm, more of a seizure. The red-hot sunsets are as scorchingly intense as the fiery cuisine; the landscapes are epic and of exasperating extremes and the curious culture cuts into your veins becoming your lifeblood.

You may detect an undertone of resentment. I describe it so because I didn't want to become a statistic to India. I didn't want to fall victim to its teasing wiles, its flirtatious nature, its alluring charms. Kerala's explosive. Scorching sunsets streak the skies with passionate pinks and raven reds, the sizzling cuisine of the land's birthed spices arouse new taste buds and the immensity of eccentric culture amazes as much as it amuses.

Named one of "ten paradises of the world" and "50 places of a lifetime" in the National Geographic Traveller and boasting discreet and exclusive hotels with lists of accolades, Kerala's been given the tagline, 'God's own country.' And Keralites aren't afraid to use it. Located at the extreme southern tip of the Indian subcontinent, it established itself as a major spice trade centre from as early as 3000 BC. The south of India is as rich in colour as the redolent spices it's renowned for.

Cochin

My journey begins in Cochin; a bustling State with the most picturesque of districts, Fort Cochin, an ancient port that was the centre of Indian spice trade for centuries. The historical town has a unique air of serenity, thick with the smell of the past and with more goats than rickshaws navigating the streets. Cochin's diverse past is mirrored in its steep-roofed bungalows and Portuguese residences, cathedral, palaces, historical mosque and 16th century synagogue, all surrounded by the crumbling residues of the British Raj.

The Brunton Boatyard is 'among the finest heritage accommodation in India; an elite 22-room hotel door-stepping a working harbour, set among street traders' stalls, with a sprightly bus terminal on one side and the dynamic Arabian sea on the other. The infinity pool virtually spills into the sea, a unique pocket of solitude amidst the mayhem. Stepping into the converted boatyard is like stepping into the distillery of time. Every element tells a story, of which you instantly become a part with traditional giant 'punkhas' (fans) in the lobby, once operated by labourers' feet. You belong to a bygone era, which is so captivating; it eradicates all sense of real time.

A two-minute walk takes you to Cochin's raison d'être; an impressive shoreline of giant Chinese fishing nets.

Indian fishermen, whose faces scream a telling history of labour and graft, toil tirelessly from the crack of dawn until late, manually operating the oversize nets. A highlight is waking up early to watch them, against a backdrop of breaking silver skies, scaling the striking wooden planks barefoot, tens of metres above dark swirling waters, to gather their catch. A brief stroll further along the harbour leads to the Fish Market, an incredible sight of fishermen in Mundu (men's sarongs) yelling bids to sell catch of Tilapia, King Prawns and Crabs. Within the organised chaos, an elderly man sits on a plastic chair, notepad and pencil in hand, playing auctioneer. Everyone abides.

Even with its colonial history, Cochin exudes the essence of Indian culture. Inside Greenix village, a dedicated playhouse, the setting is dark and cool by night. The hallway is paved with imposing cold marble statues of goddesses, the only warmth reflecting off spot-lit paintings of men in contorting Yoga positions, in a strangely erotic fashion. It's a haunting and enchanting introduction to theatre.

I head there early to catch glimpse of the dancers applying make-up. The stark face paints used by Kathakali - katha ("story") kali ("performance") and Mohiniaattam ("dance of the enchantress") dancers makes stage make-up look natural. I'm treated to a heady melange of classical, traditional and religious dances, concluding in Theyyam, a trance-induced ritual. The whole experience is mystifying yet mesmerising.



Munnar

A four-hour drive uphill leads to the crowning glory of Kerala, Munnar. A world apart from Cochin; at an elevation of 8,000 feet you get a sense of how remote and grandiose the Western Ghats are. The drive up is treacherously steep, through vast winding mountain ranges, where surging waterfalls cascade onto the roadside. I take comfort in knowing the road was improved by the British in 1942 as an evacuation route for a possible Japanese invasion. The Ghats are blanketed in a thick carpet of tea plantations. There's an odd calm in miles of organised rows of lush green. Exotic wildlife and biodiversity thrive in the protected Ghats. Munnar is dramatic. With a Sound-of-Music-in-India backdrop, it's a breathtaking, surreal landscape of rickety peaks, rugged gorges, manicured tea estates and crisp mountain air.

The temperature drops as the drive breaks through the mist barrier.

I arrive at the colonial Windermere Estate. A sense of panic sets in. With only mountains the familiar faces, at altitude and in thick white cloud, the dense mist coats me. I remind myself I am still in Kerala.

The next morning, as the sun rises, the mountains of the Western Ghats appear in a milky mist. Below, glimmers 60 acres of undulating Cardamom plantation, all belonging to the Windermere Estate. I leap out of bed at the faintest glimmer of dawn to photograph sunrise.



The finer details are the luxury at Windermere, where lavish furnishings aren't the order of the day. As I throw open the large French windows, overhanging rolling hills, I reach straight for the blanket, thoughtfully placed to keep at bay the fresh morning air. There's raucous birdsong and a faint smell of burning wood, as the mist majestically rises over the Ghats. A horizontal hill of green makes a cameo appearance, before the creepy mist pours erratically back over the mountains, changing direction at a whim and enveloping the aloof peaks.

Dining is a tree-house escape with an old-world charm. Above it, I while away the hours in the expansive wooden library littered in literature on nature, yoga and travel. My highlight is dashing through the showers from my massive, rustic

and cosy 'Planter's Villa' to The Hut, built native style under a tribal thatched roof; for freshly brewed cardamom, ginger and masala afternoon tea with freshly cooked Indian snacks, hot and steaming against the dewy mountain air. This redefines natural living.

A stroll through the surrounding wooded wonderland is awe-inspiring. Alone, it makes for a daunting experience, through a densely-shaded canopy. The ancient tree roots swallow the steep stone steps leading into the 60-acre forest.

One final deep breath lets me fill my lungs with pure air, in a blissful state of nirvana; isolated, remote and with a newfound respect for nature. Then it's off on a 5-hour drive to Thekkady in anticipation of the largest tiger reserve in South India.



Kumarakom

> I feel a pang of relief at the next destination. Lake Kumarakom is on firm flat ground, at sea level and hot. The tall imposing fortress gates open as if by secret exchange with the chauffeur; very James Bond-esque. The ubergrand entrance provides an indicative clue as to its exclusivity. On the banks of the beautiful backwaters, the resort's renowned for boasting a 1 km sparkling green pool waterway and is no stranger to awards. It's listed in Asia's Top 25 resorts, has won 'India's Leading Resort' for 3 successive years, is a member of the Small Luxury Hotels of the World and attracts celebrity clientele.

The scenes are artful masterpieces. A scratch and sniff retreat, it depicts a tale of faded roses and pencil etchings where simple beauty meets documented history. I stay in a Heritage Villa with private pool and Jacuzzi, echoing the grandeur of yesteryear; the deep mahogany wood reminiscent of bygone eras. Light filters through soft chiffon draws which glimmer flirtatiously in the breeze. Amidst the village hustle and bustle, where cows, villagers and tuc-tucs battle for space, this is a Palace of tranquil. The entire bathroom's outdoors; interesting concept at night, answering to nature's call, when hungry mosquitoes swarm around my ears, lizards dance on the wall and insects crawl past my foot. Seclusion is the seduction. The sun rises over the backwaters like a glowing ball of molten flames, as if borne of the infinity pool; streams of liquid light flood through the trees creating a dreamy picture postcard. Sunsets are the stuff of dreams as rainbow colours fill the dusk skies like an abstract painting.

The Chef willingly introduces himself and offers individual catering. I eat my way around the globe seduced by desserts of fresh saffron, ginger and chocolate.





Thekkady

Upon stepping foot in Spice Village, I'm an Indian goddess; blessed with a garland of fresh flowers and cleansed with fresh and fragrant herbal tea. The healing scent of eucalyptus is strong and soothing, making a walk through the grounds its own Ayurvedic treatment. My expansive cottage blends nature and comfort harmoniously. I learn that the entire eco-resort is built on the legacy of an Anglo-Indian man's passion for nature. That strikes a chord. Every fruit imaginable grows on the surrounding trees, each described with zeal by the in-house Naturalist. Freshly-grown spices are used in fifty percent of the guest's meals. I'm impressed dining in the historic Tiffin Room, where the rosewood tables are restored antiques, as are the poster bed, wardrobe and chest in the villas; from the era of the Raj and used by Princes.

Locally, talk of Kalarippayatu gets me intrigued. The choreographed martial art uses blades and swords. As the lights dim in the stadium, four men appear in the pit below through the dust

unsettled off the mud floor, focussed to an almost meditative state. The performance is heart-stopping.

Breakfast is a mouth-watering feast of Indian delicacies; Dosas (crepes), Uttapam (pancakes) and Idli (steamed savoury cakes), with exotic fruit platters of figs, dates, Sitafal (Custard Apple) and Chico (Sapodilla), all washed down with freshly squeezed pomegranate and pink grapefruit juice. A 4-hour trek through South India's most popular wildlife sanctuary, the Periyar Reserve, begins early. The 777 sq km setting is spectacular, with dense woods, rugged ravines and a lake created by the British in 1895. Where else can you spot bison, sambar, wild boar, elephants and tigers? Wear socks as the reserve basin has leeches.

My Thekkady high comes at the elephant sanctuary. As I trek on an elephant, I notice spiders the size of my hand in large spun cobwebs in the forest. I feel myself fall in love with the gentlest of giants as he playfully brushes me through the shoots of tall Spice trees. >



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Kovalam

The Taj Vivanta at Kovalam is the final destination. Here, seclusion, privacy and the utmost discretion are key. It's where the rich and famous come to holiday. Designed with a Balinese theme, stone statues emerge through fountains carved into the hilly beachside retreat. My Suite is fit for a Princess, overlooking the exquisite Arabian Sea and 58 villas hidden within the 10-acre grounds. Boating is beautiful on the 'infinity lake', now there's a first!

Evenings are spent indulging in moonlit private dinners by the water's edge, as inky waves crash ashore. I'm served fresh lobster, suffused in chilli, coconut and mango.

The hotel's Jiva Spa, is my second home. A sanctuary of tranquillity, it retains an Indian mysticism with a sprinkling of Himalayan accents. Within minutes of unwinding to meditational karmic sounds and with the scent of massage oils and incense, I drift off and re-awake having discovered my inner Indian soul.

Next morning, I wander onto the beach early and stumble across a large collective of fishermen, hauling in a boat full of catch. The bulk is sold to locals; the remainder divided between the fishermen. The amount is contested and a fight almost breaks out. The weary fishermen wrap their portions in a mesh of weaved coconut leaves and commence the long walk back to their village. The camaraderie is surreal. Ten or more men form a perfect line along the Keralan coast carrying a huge fishing net. To think that one net feeds twenty families and provides livelihoods is a sobering dose of reality.

Sunsets are a lovely blur of honeycoloured light pouring on the indigo ocean, trailing to my feet, my toes embedded in the flour-coloured sand, as I dreamily gaze out. The coconutmilk beach is private and protected. The epitome of barefoot luxury, I relish dressing down for dinner; shoes optional.

Kerala forces you to open your mind and heart and seeps into your soul like oxygen into the arteries. It leaves the everlasting stamp of awe. A piece of my heart remains in India.



Backwaters

Ranked above the Taj Mahal as the preferred destination in India, in the National Geographic Traveller magazine, Kerala's backwaters are synonymous with the State. The placid and intricate lattice of waterways is a lifeline to villagers living on its fringes. Spindly waterways nourish bordering rice paddies and coconut groves. Cruise aboard a private Kettuvalam, or 'Houseboat' with a team of staff catering to your every whim. The backwaters are the real topaz jewel in South India's crown. I'm transferred onto a smaller canoe boat into the pulse of a village. People wash their hair and clothes, catch fish, cook and play in the backwaters. I watch in amazement.

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Kuala Lumpur International

While you may not be able to see the Eiffel Tower from its windows, you will be able to relax in seats that fold out into real two-meter-long beds. enjoy delectable French cuisine prepared by famous Parisian chef Guy Martin and indulge in as much wine and champagne as your gut can take. There's also a work area, but who needs work when Clarins massages are offered on-site?

8: Lufthansa First Class Lounge. Lufthansa, Frankfurt Airport

Helping to keep the riff-raff out and the noise levels down, the Lufthansa First Class Lounge at Frankfurt Airport is located in a gleaming freestanding building outside of the main airport terminal. Ah! The Christmas holidays are here... a time for nestling back in the bosom of your family and spending long, dark evenings in the company of friends. Christmas is about returning from your new home at college in the UK and realising that the second home dream is no dream at all.

Looking for your hair straighteners?

Don't bother you left them at college. A quick game on your PS3? No problem but you'll just have to wait until term starts because you left the disk on your desk in halls. Living between two homes can be frustrating, particularly because the things you take to uni are the everyday items that you just can't do without. Travel by air and you've really got to be strict on what you carry but take the car on the ferry and suddenly the kitchen sink is genuinely an option. As long as there's room in the car, your clothes, gadgets, books and gifts can happily travel with you.

Of course, one of the great things about being back at home this Christmas is having the chance to get hold of the items you couldn't take in the first term. So, when you're looking around the house wondering which things your family won't miss, what should be top of vour list?

Electric blanket or a second duvet:

ask yourself, would your loved ones really be happy knowing that you're shivering through the nights in your draughty, cold, damp room? Of course not, and you wouldn't want them to worry about you either, so pop the bedclothes in the boot.

X-Box, PS3 or Wii. Do you really think your parents will miss the games console? Okay, so your siblings might but who's all alone and stuck hundreds of miles from home? That's right, in the car

Food. Make sure you raid your parents' cupboards before you leave, cans of tuna, baked beans, tinned tomatoes and maybe a jar of marmite - what you can save on shopping you can put towards a night out!

Travel Health - DVT

Travelling by air is now a way of life, especially for those living on an island, but there is increasing awareness that some passengers develop a deep vein thrombosis (DVT) where a clot forms in the leg following long-haul travel ("economy-class syndrome").

Research suggests that the risk of DVT is doubled by flying for more than 4 hours, but statistically a fit individual would have to fly long-haul every day for 15 years to get a DVT. The risk of this is increased by being overweight, being very tall or short, taking hormonal medication or being pregnant, or taking multiple or very long flights. However, the most important cause of DVT is being immobile for long periods which can lead to pooling and clotting of blood in the leg veins, regardless of whether travel is by air, rail or car.

Deep vein thrombosis may not cause any symptoms at all, but one-sided calf tenderness, swelling or discolouration within a fortnight of flying should alert the traveller. Nowadays a quick blood test and simple ultrasound scan will indicate if there is a DVT or not. Most patients with DVT are treated with warfarin, a blood-thinner, for at least 3 months, and usually make a full recovery.

Many airlines now give general health advice which may include prevention of travel-induced DVT. Moving and stretching arms and legs at regular intervals, not being cramped by luggage placed in front of you, and avoiding dehydration by alcohol or caffeine are often suggested. Walking up and down the aisle may seem like a good idea too, but carries a small risk of injury from unexpected turbulence!

Other recommendations include taking an aisle seat and wearing compression stockings (flight-socks) if a passenger is at higher risk, but these are probably not needed if one is fit and well. Although many travellers "pop" an aspirin before long-haul flights there is no evidence that it protects against DVT, and it may cause stomach irritation in an unlucky few. Finally, purchasing a business-class ticket will please the airline but probably not reduce your very small risk of DVT. For the vast majority of jet-passengers, then, it should be enough to follow the three Ws: Water yourself, Wiggle your toes and feet, and Walk down the aisle carefully!





Latest passenger figures give rise to cautious optimism

October 2010 saw, for the fifth consecutive month, an increase in the number of commercial passengers travelling through Jersey Airport. Figures show that 130,726 people travelled during last month compared to 125,116 on the same period last year, an increase of 4.48%.

In particular the start of the October Half Term holiday period showed that 8,180 passengers travelled over the first three days between Friday 22 and Sunday 24 October 2010 compared to the 7,592 who travelled at the same holiday period the previous year, an increase of 7%.

Overall, up to the end of October 2010, year to date passengers show a 1.49% decrease on the same period in 2009 but the gap does appear to be closing on what initially looked like a disappointing year. As well as the economic uncertainty that continues to affect the global aviation industry, passenger numbers were not helped by the volcanic ash disruption, which is estimated to have lost the Island up to 25,000 passengers.





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

Jacque's collection of work was greatly influenced by a visit to Normandy to see the Bayeux tapestry, landing beaches and cemeteries which moved her to tears and confusion over the good and evil of war. Jacque saw the Bayeux Tapestry as a historical document, a textile visually showing a war and it made her think about how textiles could tell a story.

Jacque also visited German concentration camps where she saw photographs of children - innocents who were tortured and slaughtered, treated like animals. In her textile pieces the figures developed animal heads which linked to notions of play and the imaginary world of children. An escapism into a fantasy world, which played with ideas of good and evil.

Jacque's research continued into looking at fairy stories and the hidden meanings encoded into each tale which reflect back at us human qualities and lessons to be learned. Her textiles combine animals, and humans, the individual story with myth and fairy tale where good and bad begin to blur.

Jacque spoke of the tale Babes in the Wood. "The original tells a tale of a mother wanting to kill her own children, this has a root of truth. In mediaeval times, abandoning children in woods to die because of famine or plague was not unknown. Fairy stories or archetypal imagery talk about the human experience, they help us understand history and reinvent it in our own image. In postmodern contemporary art the story plays an important role."

It is important to her work that that the medium for these stories is stitch, as it links to the traditional domestic place of women who were excluded from mainstream art for centuries. Jacque explains, "Stitch is a part of women's stories and histories. The domestic scale of my work reflects this tradition. The childlike imagery represents innocence, naivety, fearlessness, redemption and hope, as if we are seeing the world through the eyes of a child, it is a magical world poetically charged with imagination, symbolism and meaning."

Local In London

LAURA FORREST

Jersey born make-up artist Laura Forrest moved to London in 2007 to pursue a career in lipstick, powder and paint. I caught up with Laura and had a girly chat about fake eyelashes, suitcases full of foundation and The X-Factor.





HOW DID YOU GET INTO MAKE-UP?

I've always had a passion for anything cosmetic. Hair products, skincare, and nails - it was something I've always been excited by and still am. I think I know everything about a cult product or brand that's been out since I was about 14. I also suffered from really bad skin when I was a teenager so I had to learn quickly how to cover it up, and I really think the fascination with make-up probably stems from this. I have a degree in something completely unrelated; Sport and Exercise Science, but I knew towards the end of my studies that it really wasn't my passion. After graduating and to the horror of my parents, I started to manage a make-up counter in a department store in Bath. It was quite strange because at the age of 18, when filling out my UCAS form, I applied to do both Sports Science at Bath University and also Specialist Hair & Make-up at the London College of Fashion, but after my career adviser saw this she said I could not apply for two such different things on the form so I chose to do Sports Science for some reason. After three years of working for different retail cosmetic brands and building up basic skills, I decided I wanted to take things further but wasn't really sure how to, so I came back home to Jersey to work and save some money.

Within a year, I had set my mind on becoming a freelance make-up artist. After a lot of research and talking to friends I decided to apply to the Jemma Kidd Make-up School in West London to do an intensive make-up artistry course. I wanted and needed a proper qualification in this field.

WHY THE MOVE TO LONDON?

The only place to be for this kind of work is London or New York. Each time I'd visited London in the past, I absolutely loved it and knew it was a place I could easily settle in, and it also wasn't too far from home. Pretty much all major magazine companies, agencies, fashion houses and famous studios are based in or near to London. It just made complete sense to be here. Luckily for me, I also had a good base of friends living in London, which made things a lot easier. Jemma Kidd School was a great place to learn, it took you to a level of make-up application that I didn't know existed - so

it took you to a level of make-up application that I didn't know existed - so much precision and technique that I didn't have before. The director of education was the best in the UK. It wasn't just about technique and application either; we did history of make-up (did you know women used to use mice tails stuck to their face as eyebrows during the bubonic plague as they had to shave off their bodily hair?!). Physiology of the skin, bone structure, airbrushing, colour wheels and then on top of that it was the technique and application. It was also good to learn from someone so experienced in the industry. We learnt from celebrity artists who also let us in on some of their tips and tricks (something along the lines of a tape that you can temporarily use to give you an eye-lift - like boob tape for the face!). On a daily basis, we would have an area we would be focusing on, probably a lecture or a demonstration in the morning and in the afternoon would be hands-on application and practicing technique - for example 'brow blocking'. This is used to remove a person's eyebrows completely via the use of makeup, so they can be 'faked' back on by make-up, i.e. put on higher, at a different angle etc. It's quite a lengthy process but has been useful, especially at fashion shows where the looks are often avant-garde. Some top models will actually have half their brow shaved off so when they go to shoots, the artist can just draw the rest on at the angle or shape needed, rather than having to block them or bleach them off. Sounds strange, but brows are so important!

A year after you graduated you could also have the team at the school still mentoring you, so if you ever needed any questions answered, you could just drop in or send an email. They would also pass jobs onto you and if Jemma herself was doing any shows or anything, you had the opportunity to assist her.

WHAT WAS THE FIRST JOB YOU LANDED?

After I graduated from the Jemma Kidd School, I went and worked alongside their pro team backstage at the Clothes Show Live for four days. It still is one of the most memorable jobs I've ever done, probably because it was all so new and exciting. It gave me a great insight about how the industry would be. The backstage buzz was fantastic and the huge team of models, dancers, hair-stylists, make-up artists and production had amazing camaraderie. Even though I hardly ate or slept, I came away feeling so happy about the career I had chosen and knew it was exactly where I wanted to be.

From there I had some jobs working on magazines, bridals and shows whilst I started to build up my portfolio. A portfolio is necessary to showcase your work to potential clients and agencies, so it took me around six months, and around 40 test shoots to get enough images together of my work. Sometimes you get shots back from the photographer that aren't good enough to use, aren't retouched (Yes, you have to use digital enhancing), and sometimes you frustratingly don't get anything back at all. As my money started to deplete (test shoots you work for free, simply to get the images for your portfolio) I took up a part time job as a make-up artist within a Space NK boutique. This allowed me to get some form of income, still practicing my skills, whilst building up my freelance profile at the same time.

I am now part of a make-up artist agency and I also assist top make-up artists in their work. I have worked alongside people such as Claudia Schiffer, Rankin, Erin O'Connor, The Saturdays, Kelly Osborne and The Prodigy. It can be really fun but not always as glamorous as everyone thinks. I think back to fashion shows when myself and other make-up artists are on our hands and knees prepping the models legs, covering bruises or marks, with seconds to go before they hit the catwalk. I've worked six seasons of LFW now, which is extremely hard work but definitely good for experience. You need to be quite a strong person to work in that type of environment though and most of the things you imagine going on, do go on... temper tantrums, crying models, fainting, anorexia. I even heard mention of a size minus two at a recent shoot I did. There are many stories and gossip you hear on this scene, and it's unprofessional to start talking about celebrities and their behavior...it could affect your reputation. At the last show I did, the first model tripped up a step and fell face first onto the catwalk, so the audience could just see her head on the floor... ever the professional, she just got back up and went down the runway, smirk-free. Very fashion. We may have had a little smirk about it backstage.

HAVE YOU GOT ANY MAKE-UP TIPS THAT GIRLS CAN'T LIVE WITHOUT AND ANY SUGGESTIONS FOR THIS SEASON'S CHRISTMAS PARTIES?

Parties = false lashes. They are a must and no brand beats Shu Uemura, not even nearly. The best glamour lashes are either 'Smoky Layers' (Cheryl Cole wears these) or my personal favourites are 'Luxe Black'. Tips for applying lashes - don't be afraid to see how they fit on the lid before you apply glue, and if they are sitting all the way across your lash line, cut the ends off. They should sit along 3/4 of the lash line so they don't poke into the corners of your eyes which make them uncomfortable and make you start playing with them and then end up falling off. Corner lashes may be a safer bet if you aren't used to wearing full lashes. Another good tip, especially if you are wearing heavy smoky eyes is to do your eye make-up first, then when/if it drops all under your eyes, you can wipe this away and then do your base so it stays really clean and fresh. If you are the type of girl who prefers a bold lip and less on the eye, then a good trick is to apply your lip liner and lipstick as normal, and then after this get a flat synthetic brush and tidy up the edges with a flesh-coloured concealer. The contrast of the bright colour and clean skin will really make the colour pop.

WHAT ARE YOUR PLANS FOR THE FUTURE?

I definitely prefer the more commercial side of things, so maybe not so much fashion. I have done a few music videos, things for MTV but not a lot of TV or film work. TV is something I am going to try and get into more next year. With the whole HD revolution now, the make-up up has changed quite dramatically as you can see every detail. It may sound strange but I would love to do a season on X Factor next year, there is a huge make-up team on set, but hopefully through my contacts I can worm my way on the team. It's a good way to start TV work I think, as the work is regular and can get very creative. Film work is slightly different. You need to do special effects, prosthetics and wig making and that is something I would have to train in. It's a long old struggle to get to the top of this game, and I know I am going to have to put a lot of work in over the next few years to really succeed. Hopefully, in 5 years time I will doing some travelling around the world with the job, touring with a band would be really good, so hopefully something like that would be nice in the future.

TRON LEGACY

mongst its Oscar haul Avatar scooped the 2010 Academy Award for Best Special Effects. In 1983 the original Tron was left out of nominations for this award as its use of computers to create special effects was deemed cheating. How the times have changed.

It's strange to think that it was only a year ago Avatar came along and completely changed the landscape of filmmaking. Since then we've had some truly inspired efforts, fun 3D revamps of old classics and some deeply unsatisfying 3D conversions hoping to cash in on the new trend. Even Sky have been getting in on the act with their recent push for 3D football and 3D boxing coming just in time for Christmas. This year we have Tron: Legacy rolling out in the same slot as Avatar with the hope of having a similar impact. Still, it will have some job in outdoing the legacy of the original Tron. Despite being released 28 years ago it helped define the modern cinematic landscape in a profound way.

Disney's Tron has what could basically be described as a cult following. Given the length between original and sequel you could hardly consider it in the terms of the modern franchise. I only ended up watching it after a joke in a Treehouse of Horror Simpson Episode. Yet, the look and distinctive visual style of the film isn't just incredible for its time but even stands up to many of today's offerings. I guess this will happen when the preproduction team includes Jean Giraud

(Moebius) and Syd Mead (Blade Runner). The film also deserves recognition for the manner in which it represented the advances in computer games and technology. The concept of the total immersion video game is only now fully catching up to the ideas proposed in the original film. To put things in perspective the computer used to put Tron together had 2MB of memory (less than the size of an average MP3) and a disc size of no more than 330 MB (just about enough for an album of songs). It truly defines the term ahead of its time.

What particularly excites me about this release is the manner in which the filmmakers have used the 28 year gap to their advantage. The look of the world of Tron has evolved along with advances in computer technology. Everything is sleeker, sharper, faster and more dangerous. Performance capture technology has allowed Jeff Bridges' human character to age but his in world avatar to look as young and fresh faced as it did in 1982. Plot details are quite sparse but what we know is that the film has Sam (Garrett Hedlund) entering the world built by his father Kevin (Jeff Bridges reprising his role from the original) and embarking on a journey across this land and discovering his father's legacy. This will of course involve light cycles, disc battles and Olivia Wilde. The original Tron was one of the very first studio films to use the computer

graphics that are now part of every film from low budget indies to big budget releases. Expect the film to provoke debate over the pros and cons of our society's move toward the digital age. Ultimately, what is the legacy of Tron to the modern movie landscape?

Yes digital technology gave us Lord of the Rings, Spider-Man and Benjamin Button. It also allowed Eddie Murphy to become The Klumps. It's almost too wide ranging a subject to consider. I guess the only fair way to judge Tron is on specific examples. Take Daft Punk - they have over the years made numerous references to the film's influence on not only their future pop sound but also their distinctive robot look. I guess it's only fitting (and totally awesome) that they're providing the soundtrack to this sequel with the backing of a 100-piece orchestra. I haven't mentioned Tron's position as a Disney film. Apparently the original filmmakers received a frosty reception from Disney's animation department. Maybe these legendary animators recognised the threat this new technology offered to their livelihood. Still, there was at least one young animator who was more receptive to their ideas. He'd only recently started in Disney's animation department and jumped at the chance to watch a test of Tron's light cycle sequence. His name was John Lasseter and he took these ideas on board and went on to co-found Pixar. He is of course the current Chief Creative Officer at Pixar and Disney Animation as well as Creative Advisor for Walt Disney Imagineering. I think it's no coincidence that the release of this sequel came along around the same time as his rise to prominence. Maybe this film can inspire a new generation of John Lasseters. I'd like to think so.



The locations may look familiar, you may even know some of the people on screen but what you won't have seen before is such an in depth documentary about the Jersey surfing scene. With his Highlands National Diploma, experience on a couple of shorts and promotional films and an unrelenting passion for the sport Mark Errington has spent the last two and a half years collecting material for his documentary. Completely self-funded Mark has aimed to leave no stone unturned in his 40 minute investigation of the Jersey surf scene.

I can tell you this certainly isn't a case of style over substance (Though there certainly is style). Every facet of Jersey surf is covered ranging from experienced competing in international competitions such as Ben Skinner and James Hicks all the way down to the grommets learning their trade. Mark tells me of the great support he had from the entire surf community only too happy to see themselves on film. Location wise it's an odyssey too, giving the viewer access to the tight knit crews at Secrets, The Splash and even inside the Nutz workshop where Ryan Hervé produces the boards that allow people to actually

get out there and catch the waves. Maybe most interesting is the look at the history of surfing in Jersey. It's difficult to imagine a better guide than Gordon Burgess who has experienced the scene develop from boards without fins to the international phenomenon it currently is. There's all this and a soundtrack of top local bands

Mark is completely focused on his career as a surf filmmaker even if it means he is stuck holding the camera instead of getting out in the water and getting on the waves. Though it has reduced his time on the board he admits that it has given him a new perspective when it comes to watching surfing. Although he might not be out there as much he's also keen to point out that sitting in the edit watching endless repeats of some of the island's best surfers can't help but improve your technique.

The film is being premiered at the Secret's Book Launch party at The Splash on the 27th of November and should be available from the island's many fine surf shops as well as direct from Mark at markerrington@jerseymail.co.uk.

If you see him next time you're down the beach why not try out that totally radical 360° aerial cutback you've been working on. You never know, you might make it into the sequel.

Megamind

The focus is on the super villain in this month's new animated offering from DreamWorks. The story centres on the titular Megamind (voiced by Will Ferrell) who finally defeats his nemesis Metro Man only to find that life without an arch nemesis is more difficult than he could have imagined. The voice cast is basically a list of my favourite actors on the planet and features Brad Pitt, Tina Fey, Jonah Hill and David Cross as sidekick Minion. Hopefully with this quality of cast the material will be able to parody super-heroes with a level of intelligence rather than resort to lazy clichés. The trailer is promising with nods to Richard Donner's Superman as Megamind being sent to Earth by a dying civilisation only to end up landing in a prison rather than a farm. I've got big expectations for the film but it'll have to at least match them to avoid comparison to The Incredibles.

Little Fockers

I'm a big fan of Ben Stiller but for some reason the seemingly well loved Focker series has never struck a chord with me. Still, there isn't exactly a dearth of Christmas movies this year and this at least provides a festive choice for the family. The cast is undeniably great with support from the usual suspects - De Niro, Wilson, Danner, Polo, Hoffman, Streisand as well as Jessica Alba. It's just a case of giving each character enough to do without bloating the story and taking away from Stiller's story. The plot seems to fit in as the end of a trilogy with Gaylord dealing with what it means to be a father and growing old (erectile dysfunction jokes) and a seeming passing of the torch from De Niro's patriarch to Stiller. Worryingly Hoffman only agreed to a cameo having become unhappy with the script. Hopefully Paul Weitz (American Pie) taking over from Jay Roach as director should provide a steady hand.

Gulliver's Travels

Despite having a short trailer provided by Orange this new Jack Black vehicle has kind of flown under the radar for me. Assuming it isn't just one long phone advert this could potentially be a fun take on Jonathan Swift's book. Black is always charismatic and here he has Jason Segel, Emily Blunt and Amanda Peet supporting him. The team behind the film have a decent record too with involvement in Monsters vs Aliens, Shrek and Get Him to the Greek. Also the film features James Corden which based on past performances should mean it's either going to be really good or really bad.

I am a local artist who will be returning to Jersey for the winter and will be a featured artist at the British Craft Trade Fair (BCTF) in the Spring, which is a showcase for designer makers; an opportunity for UK-based artists to showcase their artwork for European gallery owners and high-street retailers.

My inspiration comes from Mother Nature. I have a love for metals, in particular silver and I love taking natural art, such as leaves, and capturing their essence in a solid but life-like form. I studied silver-smithing in India but am otherwise self-taught.

Every piece that I make is unique and 99.9% pure silver. Each Beleaf Jewelry pendant begins as a leaf picked from a tree by me and it is a long but beautiful hand-sculptured process to transform the leaf into silver, layer by layer. I then create a bespoke reverse-side embellishment. Pure alchemy."

No known species of reindeer can fly. BUT there are 300,000 species of living organisms yet to be classified, and while most of these are insects and germs, this does not COMPLETELY rule out flying reindeer which only Santa has ever seen.

There are two billion children (persons under 18) in the world. BUT since Santa doesn't appear to handle the Muslim, Hindu, Jewish and Buddhist children, that reduces the workload to 15% of the total — 378 million according to Population Reference Bureau. At an average (census) rate of 3.5 children per household, that's 91.8 million homes. One presumes there's at least one good child in each.

Santa has 31 hours of Christmas to work with, thanks to the different time zones and the rotation of the earth, assuming he travels east to west (which seems logical). This works out to 822.6 visits per second.

This is to say that for each Christian household with good children, Santa has 1/1000th of a second to park, hop out of the sleigh, jump down the chimney, fill the stockings, distribute the remaining presents under the tree, eat whatever snacks have been left, get back up the chimney, get back into the sleigh and move on to the next house. Assuming that each of these 91.8 million stops are evenly distributed around the earth (which, of course, we know to be false but for the purposes of our calculations we will accept), we are now

talking about .78 miles per household, a total trip of 75½ million miles, not counting stops to do what most of us must do at least once every 31 hours, plus feeding and etc.

This means that Santa's sleigh is moving at 650 miles per second, 3,000 times the speed of sound. For purposes of comparison, the fastest man-made vehicle on earth, the Ulysses space probe, moves at a poky 27.4 miles per second — a conventional reindeer can run, tops, 15 miles per hour.

If every one of the 91.8 million homes with good children were to put out a single chocolate chip cookie and an 8 ounce glass of 2% milk, the total calories (needless to say other vitamins and minerals) would be approximately 225 calories (100 for the cookie, give or take, and 125 for the milk, give or take). Multiplying the number of calories per house by the number of homes (225 x 91.8 x 1000000), we get the total number of calories Santa consumes that night, which is 20,655,000,000 calories. To break it down further, 1 pound is equal to 3500 calories. Dividing our total number of calories by the number of calories in a pound (20655000000/3500) and we get the number of pounds Santa gains, 5901428.6, which is 2950.7 tons.

The payload on the sleigh adds another interesting element. Assuming that each child gets nothing more than a medium-

sized lego set (two pounds), the sleigh is carrying 321,300 tons, not counting Santa, who is invariably described as overweight. On land, conventional reindeer can pull no more than 300 pounds. Even granting that "flying reindeer" (see above) could pull TEN TIMES the normal amount, we cannot do the job with eight, or even nine. We need 214,200 reindeer. This increases the payload (not even counting the weight of the sleigh) to 353,430 tons. Again, for comparison, this is four times the weight of the Queen Elizabeth. 353,000 tons traveling at 650 miles per second creates enormous air resistance — this will heat the reindeer up in the same fashion as spacecraft re-entering the earth's atmosphere. The lead pair of reindeer will absorb 14.3 QUINTILLION joules of energy. Per second. Each.

In short, they will burst into flame almost instantaneously, exposing the reindeer behind them, and create deafening sonic booms in their wake. The entire reindeer team will be vaporized within 4.26 thousandths of a second. Santa, meanwhile, will be subjected to centrifugal forces 17,500.06 times greater than gravity. A 250-pound Santa (which seems ludicrously slim) would be pinned to the back of his sleigh by 4,315,015 pounds of force.

In conclusion: If Santa does deliver presents on Christmas Eve, he's very fast.

The mission: To fight frizz and to send my curls into a spin, with the straightening Brazilian blow dry process. I wanted to beat the use of straighteners to see if this treatment could trick my hair into 'straightening itself'. I headed down to Planet Hair in La Motte Street to meet Nicola who was going to apply the treatment, which is only to be applied by professionals. The actual process consists of various special shampoos, straightening serums (which just so happened to smell like chocolate - the most irresistible smell ever) and spray-in conditioner. The hair is washed and then roughly blow dried, which then means it's time for the product to be applied onto the hair. It's applied in the same way as highlighting or hair dye just brushed on and left for around half an hour so that the strands can soak up all of the keratin (the substance which naturally exists in nails, skin and hair). It's then left to dry naturally and blow dried into your desired style - I opted for straight with some volume at the roots, this part of the process allows the heat to inject the product into the follicles, it's then followed by straightening all of the hair to 'cook' the keratin directly

into your hair strands. It leaves hair kink-free and visibly smoother, making it easier to manage for up to 4 months (this time span may vary due to the aftercare products you use). You are advised to not use products with sodium chloride in as this will break down the keratin and shorten the lifespan of the treatment. The straightening serum contains a variety of amino acids, proteins and UV protection, and it is completely formaldehyde, urea and aldehyde-free making it perfectly safe for pregnant woman and clients who have undergone chemotherapy. You're not allowed to tie your hair up, wash it, put glasses on your head, and you are advised to watch out for kinks for 3 days to fully allow the treatment to work. This step was a tough one for me and my hair is tied up more often than not, but I managed. After washing my hair for the first time my hair sat straight and it looked the healthiest and glossiest I'd ever seen it. I completely recommend this treatment as it has cut my wash-to-dry-to-straight time down by over an hour! Also Kristin Cavallari is a big fan; so if it's good enough for her, it's good enough for me!

It's time for a change as The Bar & Canteen opens its doors to families with a special early dining 'kids eat free' offer between 5 and 7pm Monday to Saturday. We sent Kate Summers and family to investigate.

The Thursday after-school swimming lessons at the Aquasplash can't really be described as a highlight of my week. For a start, the steamy hot swimming pool air always makes my hair frizz, and trying to wave cheerily at the children as they splash and splutter up and down the pool whilst not losing my place in The Girl who Kicked the Hornets' Nest is guite a juggling act. And then walking out into the cold air, the first thing the kids say is "Mum - can we go to Pizza Hut?" The answer's normally no - I'm a bit snobby about chain restaurants - and so there's sulks and stony silences all the way home.

Thankfully, I've discovered a solution. The previously child-free The Bar & Canteen has turned family friendly with a meal deal that'll feed your kids for free. Turn up for supper with the kids between 5pm and 7pm, Monday to Saturday and the children's meals are free when the adults order a main course*. It's a winner - The Bar is stylish and swish, it gives the children a proper restaurant experience, the food's great, and I can order myself a large glass of Pinot Grigio.

It was great to walk straight out of the Aquasplash and into The Bar, and get out of the cold and settle into their comfortable sofas. The kids got a chance to wind down after their five lengths of front crawl while I emailed James (there's wi-fi) and told him to meet us at The Bar for supper after he finished work.

Ever since The Bar opened back in 2003, it's brought a touch of city cool to St Helier. Sleek and sophisticated, its big airy bar and restaurant area is a welcome change from most of town's small restaurants. And as for the food, well it's 'upmarket bar' style - think a bit Slug and Lettuce, All Bar One-ish - with a contemporary spin on traditional dishes. There's seafood chowder, stilton rarebit, beef chilli with a hint of chocolate, steaks, seabass, Malaysian coconut local mussels and some delicious-sounding brown sugar, chilli and bourbon barbecue pork ribs.

Five o'clock is a good time to go to The Bar with the children; the restaurant's quiet and you can take your time relaxing on the sofa and reading through the menu while the waiter brings your drinks over to you. If it's a weekday, there's the option to take advantage of the fixed price menu - two courses for £13.50, three courses for 17.50 - or you can just go à la carte. James chose the 10oz rump steak with green peppercorn sauce - he could also have had BBQ sauce or marmite butter, and I went for the piri piri king prawns. Kids get a choice of smaller versions of some of the adult meals - Cumberland sausage and mash, a steak burger, jerk spiced chicken breast burger, beer-battered cod or scampi tails with chips. We were taken over to the restaurant area when our food was ready - that's a nice touch for families and avoided the kids getting too fidgety at the table. The restaurant space is at the far end of the bar, and feels very contemporary, with large wooden tables, chic lighting and statement artwork on the walls. The children loved being taken somewhere 'really posh' as they described it - and it was certainly worlds away from KFC! Our food arrived



swiftly - a huge plate of steak for James with grilled baby tomatoes still on the vine, beer battered onion rings, sautéed mushrooms and a generous portion of chunky chips with a whole jug of pepper sauce to pour over the steak. My piri piri king prawns came on two skewers, along with a pot of spicy salsa, jasmine rice and a crunchy Asian slaw-style cooling salad. They were delicious - and super-spicy - definitely one to pick if you like it hot. The kids' meals went down well too, with plenty of sausages and mash for the youngest, and a steak burger (which the chef turned into a cheeseburger for us without any fuss), chips and salad for the oldest.

44 perfect for a post-swimming supper or dinner after the cinema ??

And if you've got a sweet tooth, save space for the desserts. The vanilla cheesecake came highly recommended by our waiter - and rightly so. It's served with white chocolate and red berries and it's absolutely delicious. Be prepared to fight for it though, everyone seems to want a spoonful. There's also hot chocolate brownie on the menu, and Jersey icecream, and for the youngest (who was starting to doze off at the table), the chef sorted out a mini serving of orange

With its soft music, buzzy atmosphere and swish surroundings, The Bar is a great way of taking your children out to a smart restaurant that'll cater for them with easy, kidfriendly favourites that are a step up from chicken nuggets and chips. And it's perfect for a post-swimming supper or dinner after the cinema, just steps away from the Aquasplash and Cineworld, with early family dining. It's going to be an amazing place to head in the summer, when you can eat out on the huge al fresco terrace with its views right out over St Aubin's bay. And I can't wait until the children are just a bit older, and I can send them off to the cinema with their friends while I stay chilling out with a few post-dinner cocktails at The Bar...

Have your cake and eat it

nere's something about the delicious smell of a cake baking in the oven that's so wonderfully warming and comforting. It's no wonder we start dusting off the cake tins and that forgotten Nigella cookbook as soon as the clocks go back. We're not alone. Most countries have a winter baking tradition, designed to keep hungry families fed with wholesome high-carb goodness for when the weather turned colder, or to provide stickily sweet feasting fare through the festive months.

Anita Meyer is originally from Norway where families would prepare between seven and fourteen cakes in the run up to Christmas. "I remember literally weeks of baking to prepare all the

different cakes. My mother would never dream of buying a cake, so everything was homemade." Brought up with a love of baking, she's turned her cake know how into a business run from home, creating homemade cakes and bakes for cafes and sandwich shops. "I really enjoy spending time in my kitchen, working on recipes and taking time over the cakes. It fits in with my life as a mum as well, I can spend the morning mixing and baking, and then be finished in time to pick up the children from school." She's come up with a winter recipe that'll fill the kitchen with a gorgeous gingerbread smell, and gives us her baking tips.



If you're addicted to those tins of Ikea ginger biscuits, then you'll love this recipe. You can use it to make gingerbread men, ginger biscuits or even create your own gingerbread house...

Ingredients:

small knob of butter for greasing 175 gr (6 oz) plain flour, plus a little extra for rolling out

- 1 1/2 level tsp bicarb of soda
- 1 level tsp ground ginger
- 1/2 level tsp ground cinnamon
- 1/2 level tsp ground cloves
- 50 gr (1 3/4 oz) butter
- 1 large egg

85 gr (3 oz) light brown soft sugar

- 1 1/2 tablespoon golden syrup
- 1/2 tablespoon treacle

very finely grated rind of 1/2 orange

To decorate:

100 gr (3 1/2 oz) icing sugar lemon juice or warm water currants / Smarties etc

Turn oven to 190 degrees celsius, 160 fan oven. Rub 3 baking sheets lightly with butter

Sieve the flour, bicarb and spices into a large bowl. Cut the butter into small pieces and add to the bowl. Rub into flour until it looks like breadcrumbs.

Crack the egg into a jug, add the sugar, syrup, treacle and orange rind. Mix well with a small whisk. Use a metal spoon to stir mixture into the flour. As it starts to come together, use your hands to knead it into a ball of dough.

Sprinkle flour onto your work surface then tip the dough out and knead through for a couple of minutes until smooth. Wrap in clingfilm and leave to rest in the fridge for 10 minutes.

Sprinkle more flour onto work surface and using a rolling pin, roll the dough out about 5mm (1/2 inch) thick. Dip your biscuit cutters into flour and then cut out as many shapes as you can. Use a palette knife or cheese slicer to pick up the biscuits and place onto the baking sheet. Gather up any spare dough and knead again into a ball. Roll out and cut out more shapes.

Cook the biscuits for 6-10 minutes, or until golden brown. When cooked, let them cool for a few minutes on the tray, then lift them onto a wire rack to cool completely.

Icing: Sieve the icing sugar into a bowl. Gradually add a little lemon juice or water and mix until you have a thick smooth paste. Add tiny drops of food colouring if you want different colours. Use currants for buttons and eyes, or Smarties etc. Leave the icing to set.

TIP: Make holes with a straw at the top of the shape/in the head of the gingerbread before they are cooked and then thread some ribbon through when cooked and hang on your Christmas tree after they are decorated.




And if you want to try some cake-making for yourself, here are Anita's top baking tips...

Read the recipe. Baking is a science, so make sure you've measured out the proper quantities.

If your sponges tend to sink in the middle – try cooling them upside down.

Don't rush your cooking, make it a relaxing experience and enjoy it. Put some nice music on, your apron, get all your utensils out ready and make sure you've got all your ingredients to hand. If you haven't got time or you're in a rush – save it for another time.

Talking Turkey

is the season for turkey, and if you want to ensure your fowl is fabulous (and not foul at all) then why not follow Gallery's alternative guide to perfect turkey and deep-fry it. Yes, you heard us. It's a concept that began in the southern states of the USA, where people will deep-fry just about anything - but it's getting more and more popular as an easy way to end up with crispy on the outside, moist on the inside, perfectly cooked turkey in a fraction of the time. And it's not at all greasy.

Marcus Calvani from La Cantina Restaurant took a break from serving wonderful pizza and pasta and turned redneck for the day especially for Gallery Magazine to show us how to deep-fry ourselves a turkey. Yee-haw!

Before you start

Try your turkey out for size in the turkey fryer, and fill up with water until it's completely submerged. Take the turkey out and the amount of water left is your oil level. Mark it with a felt-tip pen and when you pour in the oil, fill to just below that level (as oil expands when it gets hot). Make a note of the weight of your turkey, and allow 3.5 minutes of frying time per 1b. (a 15lb bird would take around 53 minutes).

Prepare your turkey – brine it in salt water, you can also add flavour to your brine with ingredients such as: garlic, bay leaves, peppercorns, cloves, rum etc. for a day. Take it out of the salt water an hour before you're going to cook, and allow it to rest and dry it thoroughly. Water and hot oil don't mix! For extra flavour you can inject your bird with marinades (there's an injector in the Bayou kit). Marcus: "I used Jack Daniels today for a bit of extra redneck flavour, but you could also try a mix of orange juice (the acid tenderizes the meat) rum and stock."



You will need...

One super-duper turkey fryer (Ours was a Bayou Classic, converted for UK propane use and we got it from www.gardengiftshop.co.uk where the whole kit sells for £89)

BBQ propane gas tank
A catering-size container of vegetable oil
Heavy duty oven mitts / construction gloves or
proper heat-resistant mitts (Marcus uses silicone
gloves).

Apron and safety goggles Your turkey Redneck – optional!



Ready to start cooking?

Pour in the oil and fire up your turkey fryer outside, somewhere nobody will trip over it and where you have plenty of space to stand clear while you're frying. It takes 20-30 minutes to get up to 350° which is the temperature you'll be frying at. Place the bird on the turkey stand that's included with the kit, drumsticks up and neck down and put on your heavy duty oven mitts. When the oil has reached 350°, turn the burner down for a minute and use the hook to lower the bird slowly into the oil. Really slowly. Oil will probably spill over the top of the fryer, so stand back. When the turkey's in, turn the burner up again and get the oil back and stable at 350°. Now grab a Bud and watch your turkey fry!*

When the cooking time's up, put your oven mitts back on and using the hook, carefully lift your super-bronzed turkey out of the pot. Hold it over the oil to drip for a while (puncturing a few holes in the skin under the thighs before frying helps this), and get someone to test the temperature with a meat thermometer. It should be 160°. If it's not – put it back in for a few more minutes.

Place the turkey on a chopping board and cover it with aluminium foil for around 20 minutes or so. The turkey will carry on cooking on your sideboard and get up to 170°. Try to resist breaking off some of the delicious crackling-style skin – it's very hot...

Don't forget to turn the turkey fryer and gas off, and keep people away from it until it's cooled. You can put the vegetable oil through a sieve when it's cool, pour it back

into the container, seal it up and reuse it for your next turkey frying session.

When you're ready to serve, carve the turkey, giving everyone some of the delicious skin, and serve with a couple of redneck classic sides like sweet potato with marshmallow topping, green bean and cream of mushroom soup casserole (yes really!) and plenty of cranberry sauce.

flavours into the meat before cooking is also a great way to create your own delicious experience, play with different mixes, you really can't go wrong. I love taking all these exciting different ways of cooking and then creating a more gourmet experience with them, can't wait to show you some other classics like beach clam baking and smoking!"

The verdict

The best turkey we've ever tasted. Perfectly cooked, mouth-wateringly moist and bursting with flavour. It was a world away from the flabby, flaccid birds we've all been faced with on those disaster-style Christmas dinners. And forget having to interrupt your lie-in to put the turkey in the oven, our bird (17lbs) cooked in exactly an hour while we kicked back with a couple of beers. It's definitely one of redneck America's better exports!

Marcus says: "This is how we did our Thanksgiving turkeys back in the States for the past nine years, it started with us trying it for fun along with barbecued turkey and traditional roasted turkey and unquestionably, fried turkey is the favourite. Even in the middle of a Wisconsin winter, I'd be outside with the family, in the snow frying turkey and drinking chilled beers. I love this way of cooking turkey because it instantly seals the skin, locks in the natural juices, crisps the skin and cooks the turkey evenly, you never get dry breasts and semi-cooked thighs this way. Injecting

What to do next

Put your name down for the Bayou Classic Outdoor Turkey Fryer, converted for use with UK propane tanks and available from www.gardengiftshop. co.uk at £89 + delivery to the Channel Islands. Marcus pointed out "It's not just a fryer – you can use it for boiling and steaming too, so you can cook yourself lobsters, crabs, fry whole fish or other poultry, and make proper feed-a-crowd curries, chillies and soups!"

*Word of warning. This is potentially a highly dangerous procedure involving a vat of boiling oil (never a good thing), so read the safety instructions which accompany your turkey fryer very carefully. Never attempt to do this without using the proper equipment and keep pets, children and smokers well away from the fryer.



The lead roof will turn silver as well, complementing the natural stone tones of the cliff, so within a year the property will really blend in with the environment".

Once you get inside the secure intercom gate that separates the house from its private parking, you realize that although Furze Close might blend in with its environment, there's absolutely nothing rustic about the cutting edge technology and sleek design details that elevate the house to a new level of luxury. The latest in smart home technology - a 'Control 4' system runs through the house, designed to make controlling everything from the music to the heating possible at the touch of a button. There's a super modern top of the range dark Rationale kitchen with double oven, Bosch appliances and a statement Smeg fridge and in the living area a contemporary multi-fuel stove that can be positioned to direct heat inside or outside onto the balcony area. materials and fittings. It's unusual to see a development of this size finished to this level".

It's certainly been designed to appeal to savvy purchasers who'd like to benefit from the natural beach-side lifestyle without compromising on luxury. The large master bedroom has been designed to give you perfect ocean views from your bed – you can turn over, check the surf and go from catching some Zzzs to catching the perfect wave in a couple of minutes. low-maintenance pad for someone looking for a luxury surfside life, whether a high-flyer or a down-sizer. With the surf a few steps away and the dunes on your doorstep, it gives you all the advantages of an outdoor lifestyle, right next to your contemporary, cutting-edge home.



Better Safe than Sorry – Health & Safety in Jersey

This year saw new provisions in Jersey's Health and Safety Law come into force, strengthening the island's health and safety regulations for the benefit of both employers and employees. People often make fun of ''elf and safety' and it's true that requirements in the workplace have steadily grown over the past 30 years. The underlying principle of health and safety legislation is ensuring a safe working environment – and surely no-one would argue with that.

Far from being onerous, the duties of everyone at work – be they an employer, employee or an individual just visiting a workplace, is to meet targets, "so far as is reasonably practicable". That means a degree of judgment or assessment of the risks associated with a work activity is needed.

Earlier this year an amendment to the law was brought in, which means that now employers of five or more people must produce a Health and Safety policy statement, which encompasses their own responsibilities, the risks they have identified and what arrangements they have made to address them

The employer must ensure all employees are made aware of the Health and Safety policy statement, and any subsequent revisions, and it must be in a language that the employees can fully understand, which may not necessarily be English.

Of course what defines a 'safe working environment' will be different in different organisations; the regulations address particular hazards, such as electrical dangers, or address concerns in specific sectors such as the construction industry. There may be specialised guidance on the use of display equipment at work or the transport of pressurised containers. A complete list of current regulations and approved codes of practice are available at the States of Jersey website: www.gov.je/hsi.

Failure to comply with an approved code of practice does not automatically mean a person is liable to criminal or civil prosecution, but approved codes of practice are admissible in court as evidence of best practice. The States of Jersey's Health and Safety Inspectorate may attend a workplace to investigate a potential breach of the Health and Safety Law, which could involve the employer being interviewed where it may be appropriate to have a legal representative present.

Depending on the seriousness of the situation, the Inspectorate can make an informal recommendation, issue administrative notices, issue improvement or prohibition notices which requires action to be taken or work to be stopped. The Inspectorate may report to the Attorney General for a decision as to whether prosecution is appropriate, which could result in an unlimited fine and/or up to 2 years' imprisonment for certain offences.

There is no legal requirement to keep a record of accidents at work, but it is strongly recommended that one is kept. Recording accidents in detail can help provide important evidence when dealing with a potential civil claim, which can be brought up to three years from the date of the accident. Copies of an Accident Record Book are available free from the Health and Safety Inspectorate, the Jersey Safety Council or the States Greffe Bookshop.

New Year - New Solution

Christmas may have left you with a financial hangover that could last long after the headache has gone, but it can be fixed. This is a step-by-step guide to debt, and how to manage it.

- 1. The first step is to accept that you have debt and to look at it honestly. You're not going to manage it if you don't.
- 2. Put your debts to one side for a minute and focus on your monthly budget. Work out how much you REALLY need to cover your rent/mortgage, heating bills, taxes, food, clothing, entertaining, travel and every other outgoing that you have.
- 3. Subtract your monthly budget from your monthly income. That will show you how much you have left over each month to pay back the money that you owe.
- 4. Now look at your debts. What is the total minimum monthly repayment on all your cards, loans and other debts? If it is more than the money that is left over, you need to consider a consolidation loan, which will reduce the amount that you pay out each month.
- 5. Basically, a debt consolidation loan involves using one new loan to pay off all your outstanding loans, credit cards and store cards. It means that you are left with one creditor instead of lots of them. That can reduce the debt worry, make repayments more manageable and make it easier to handle your monthly budget.
- 6. If you are already able to make all your monthly minimum repayments from the money that you have, it may still be worth taking out a debt consolidation loan because you could pay a lower rate of interest.
- 7. A debt consolidation loan only works if you manage to control your spending and don't add any more debt. That means setting a realistic monthly budget at the start and then sticking to it. If you do, you'll soon be free of your financial headache.





ing the winning goal. My stage win in the Tour de France was special and I will always cherish it but Paris-Roubaix was the one for me.

How can people get into cycling in Jersey? It's a great time to start cycling in Jersey, I've been lucky enough to work with the new Moore sponsored Youth Academy this year and since the Tour de Bretagne, the Academy has gone from strength to strength, already producing a National Champion in young George Milner. Just show up at one of the road or MTB sessions organised by the Jersey Cycling Association's Youth Academy - details at www.jcaya.org

What competition have you done most recently - and how did you do? Well I last raced around the UK raising money for UK Youth on the Nigel Mansell Challenge. We raised over £100,000 in 13 days. I love competing still though and you never know, there may be a few more races left in me! It never leaves your system as a professional athlete.

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

James' 10 top winter tips.

- * Wear suitable clothing. Fabrics that keep moisture away from your skin will prevent you becoming wet and chilled. Walkers and joggers should wear bright fluorescent clothing and even take bike lights or a head torch with you.
- * Wear a hat. When going out in the cold, it is advisable to wear a hat. About one-third of your body's heat loss occurs through the head.
- * Dress in layers. Wear plenty of light layers so you can gradually peel them off as you become warm. You should be a little cool starting out. Avoid sweating, as you may become chilled.
- *Go to sleep and wake up at about the same time every day, and don't eat heavy food or drink alcohol within a few hours of bedtime. Maintaining a consistent sleep/ wake cycle and avoiding lots of food or alcohol before bed are key to preventing insomnia. It will also keep you refreshed and much better able to fight winter colds.
- * Sweat before you stretch. A good warmup is critical in all four seasons - it is never a good idea to stretch cold muscles, but even more so in winter, so make sure you have a light warm up jog before doing any stretching as cold temperatures tighten your muscles which can cause injuries.
- * Exercise caution. Beware of slippery surfaces when running, and exercise in daylight wherever possible. Anticipate that drivers may not be able to see you or stop

- * Keep your fluid levels up. Drinking water regularly is just as important during winter as it is in summer. Cold weather stimulates urine production, and every breath you can see is water droplets being exhaled from vour body.
- *Train with a friend or partner. Finding a training partner with similar goals to you can add enjoyment to your exercise routine, and serve as an additional source of motivation. Having someone else depending on you can make the difference between a pre-breakfast workout and a morning on the couch.
- * Communicate any concerns with your doctor. Some medical conditions make winter exercise dangerous. Exercising in cold weather can bring on angina (heartrelated chest pain), and may trigger asthma in asthmatics. Check first with your doctor if you have any concerns, especially if you are older or have been sedentary for more than two months.
- *Just do it. Don't ponder your workout; just get started. The more you think about it, the more likely you will talk yourself out of it. Once you're in motion, you'll find it easier to continue. While it is admirable to think, talk and read about exercise, there is no substitute for actually doing. Once completed the "feel good" hormones will kick in and give you a boost for the rest of the day.

Best gig you attended in 2010? I saw HTRK at The Freebutt in Brighton in February and they blew me away. I really recommend their album 'Marry Me Tonight' which has the most beautiful, darkest melodies.

Favourite album of 2010? Interpol's new album hasn't left my ears since I bought it the other week -so well produced.

Plans for 2011?

We want to do the UK festival circuit next year and try and get on SXSW in Texas. Our booking agent is going to get a kick if we're still only doing the clubs come summer time.

Why should people come and see you play?

They should only come if they like the music and the attitude that comes with it. If you can't interact with your audience, you might as well interact with half a wet fish.

When is your next gig in Jersey?

We're trying to get on the Kidnapped bill on Boxing Day but they haven't got back to us yet! Kidnapped, if you're out there, we're coming to rescue you with our dirty disco beats. If you can hear us, please respond! If not we're playing Chaos Festival in Guernsey in July so will be sure to book a Jersey gig around the same time. Until then: sayonara sausages.

Probably Deathwish Disco at a club called 93 Feet in London. We were supporting The Freestylers and it was such a friendly crowd, the sound system was wicked, the promoters were great and our set

You can't really argue with a man who started his DJing career in '84 can you? (Don't do the maths). Italian electronic musician Mauro Picotto has always been a force to be reckoned with. For such a friendly and sociable soul he has always managed to stand somewhat alone, carrying his brand of personal sound to multiple countries across the globe, being one of the few big names who have made that all-risky style transition successfully.

What you might not know of Mauro Picotto is that he is somewhat of an undercover Jersey boy. He met his future wife Laura in Ibiza and is now the proud father of true blue Jersey babies and likes nothing more than being with and spending time with his island family.

This year he will be joining the Clique clan for an exclusive NYE special at Platinum. I caught up with him while he was enjoying some downtime in the Island. We begin by reflecting on the year gone by.

It's been very good for me and my family also. We are very pleased with the parties we did in Ibiza last summer and the release of my new album has been successful. I couldn't ask for any more. I'm happy.

What sort of feedback did you get from the album?

There was feedback from a more mature crowd. The people appreciate the experimental club music more which was exactly what I was looking for. I wasn't sure there was a market for that sound, as everything seems pretty commercial at the moment, but after this result I'm already working on the next one.

Do you feel like you are still attracting a younger crowd or are your fans simply getting older with you?

During my nights I still see my fans following me but what I am finding is that the brother of the original fan will turn up and say "hey my brother has always been

listening to you and now it's me!". This is a very good feeling, a very good connection with the people, but it's nice to see that clubs have a better age range. Before we had 20 to 25 year olds. Now we are seeing crowds from 20 right up to 40 all having a great time and this is super for me.

The name Mauro Picotto is a strong brand. I sometimes get the feeling that your following are somewhat superfans. Is that fair?

To be honest I always keep my feet on the floor. I never wanted to be a star because for me the music was the 'place to be'. To be a star you need to build up a strong fan base and keep giving them the music that they love. It's difficult when an artist changes their style completely, as I always do, but I don't want to be a star, I want to be a DJ. That's why it's always more important what we create in the club, the atmosphere, the connection with the people, the energy and good music without being cheesy or too commercial.

Last time we spoke we talked about that long transition from years and years ago when there was a trancey sound to sounding more techy as time went on. Where are you now?

I'm always on the path of electronic music because I am fascinated by technology. Now? It's still very housey with more vocals and some melody but without being commercial. You know, we are not the radio, the clubs are for the people who want to dance to something different that they don't have to hear all week. Otherwise you may as well just put a radio on inside a club and the job

How different is it writing album tracks compared with writing music for DJs to play?

It's very different. I remember when I was producing my old label Media Records, we would have artists where we would create the music for them with singers, rappers etc, it was the whole show. You know people think writing commercial music is easy, it really isn't. To catch the right mood of 'everybody' is not easy at all. However to write music I play in a club is different because it's what I want to feel, me, myself, in the club. When I'm in the studio, sometimes from a mistake, or searching for something different, or sampling something very old comes something new, a complete transformation, manipulation. Some call it noise making, finding that noise within sound. For me that's the difference between commerciality and quality club music, a different step of quality.

But with an album you're still looking for a start, middle and end, and certain punctuation points are expected along the way...

Yeah you have to be kind of travelling. It could be around the world or different times of the night. You need a bit of energy, a bit of emotion, a good cocktail. All ingredients are needed to enjoy the journey, that's my philosophy.

Is the Ibiza season still the most important time of the year for you?

I love Ibiza because it's a kinda paradise. It's where I met Laura, my future wife from Jersey. It's all just about having a good time and the location, the place it's beautiful and magical. I fell in love the first time I went there. I'm getting old but I am always young when I am there...

And what about the winter time?

I enjoy my lifestyle I don't spend enough time here. I spend time here (Jersey) at the moment and babysit my babies, it's a really nice place to stay but at the same time I always like to move, I can't stay in one place. For me I live my life in hotels for so long so I never felt like I had a proper home. Now with babies it's easier. They travel often with me, we feel at home wherever we are. It's just important we are together.

Tell me about the album you're working (coming out on your label Alchemy in the Spring). Do you know how it's going to sound at this stage?

Yes, I'm half way already, I'm going to do mixes with tracks from my label and remixes from others. Then another disc with my singles only, with remixes to follow obviously. it will be similar to the last album as I have developed this fanbase for a new generation of music. There's a bit of techno and house, some vocals again. Some of it will have an Ibiza sound as I started producing some of it in the summer. Parties at the villa with the atmosphere, you create music that could be described as more of a sunshine sound. One track is finished that I feel is amazing. It would be the wrong time of year to release now, winter is for darkness. At the moment I am super happy, I have four tracks finished. I could say 'New Era', it has a melody but is very emotional. Think William Orbit, but not in a trancey popular way.

Final message to the good heads of Jersey for New Year?

I'm sure they are thinking about joining us at the mega party at Platinum. It's not just me, I'm excited to spend it with a lot of friends here in Jersey, and Pete and everyone. Having a great time and playing really great music. It's that simple.
