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
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# Absolute power dressing:

#### The African dictator look



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



# Animal Magic: Rabbits words | Deidre Shirreffs

During the Occupation, many islanders must have been grateful for the local rabbits which supplemented their sparse diets. Rabbits are not native to Jersey but were introduced here over 700 years ago, perhaps by the Normans, as they provided a good source of winter meat and their skins were also useful.

Initially the king owned all the rabbit warrens and they were closely guarded against thieves. Gradually other noblemen started keeping rabbits and then escapes allowed all residents, whether rich or poor to enjoy rabbit meat.

Rabbits are sociable animals and live together in colonies, sharing a burrow system, usually with several entrances. There is always one dominant animal, which can be either male or female, and it will claim and mark a territory in the best part of the warren and will be better at breeding. Rabbits are famous for their fertility and a single female can produce more than 20 young or kittens per year in several litters of 3-7 young per litter. The babies mature quickly, leaving the nest at three weeks and able to reproduce at 4 months. Many do not survive to maturity as they fall prey to dogs, cats or cars.

Most activity is nocturnal so the best time to watch rabbits is at dawn or dusk. They tend to stay close to their burrows so the grass around them is closely grazed. This helps maintain a grassland habitat by preventing trees from colonizing and many areas of Jersey owe their appearance to the local rabbit population.

Initially the king owned all the rabbit warrens and they were closely guarded against thieves.

After Liberation, the rabbit population exploded and they became a severe nuisance to agriculture and it is likely that myxomatosis was deliberately introduced to reduce the numbers. This disease is spread by fleas and causes blindness and a horrible lingering death. It still regulates the rabbit population today.


#### Maaarrrttynnn!

The artwork and photography produced is displayed on the Beech Ward at Clinique Pinel, St Saviour's Hospital and at Rosewood House.



## Row the distance with Macmillan Jersey for people affected by cancer

Macmillan Cancer Support (Jersey) and RBS International are calling on the people of Jersey to pull together and enter the Macmillan Indoor Rowathon on 7 May 2011. The Royal Jersey Showground in Trinity will host the 30,000 metre race for participants willing to make waves for Macmillan Jersey. Equivalent to rowing from Sark to Jersey, this challenge is set to put people through their paces aiming to raise £20,000 to help people affected by cancer. People can enter in teams of six for a £300 minimum sponsorship. Macmillan Jersey hopes to race past last year's fundraising success of £13,665 and double the number of teams who enter from 30 to 60, making this its biggest race yet.



# Radisson Blu Waterfront Hotel: ECO-ACTIVE Marine Champions







According to research undertaken by the University of Sydney watching too much TV can be harmful to youngsters. Declared as world-first research, 6 to 7 year olds who spent the most time on the sofa had narrower arteries in the back of their eyes, putting them at risk of heart disease, high blood pressure and diabetes. Out of 1,500 children examined, those who participated in over an hour of physical activity had significantly wider retinal arteries than those who spent less than half an hour a day being active. "This suggests unhealthy lifestyle factors may influence microcirculation early in life and increase the risk of heart disease and high blood pressure later in life. Replacing one hour a day of screen time with being physically active could be effective in buffering the effects of sedentary lifestyles on the retinal microvasulature in children," Dr Gopinath explained.

(B) Hi Tom. One of your most popular walks is about the Occupation, and includes locations that were featured on Channel Four's Time Team programme. Why was Hitler so interested in Jersey?

TB - Hitler was obsessed with the place. I think he took it strategically for its position in the Channel, but also because it was a British island, and such a coup to occupy it. He thought the British would try and take it back again.

# B And have there been any revolutionaries in Jersey?

TB – Maybe not too many at the moment, but we did have Karl Marx who visited Jersey at least three times, staying in the Trafalgar at St Aubin and the Hotel de l'Europe in St Helier (now Chambers) and wrote about his visits in letters back to Frederick Engels.

#### **B** What did he make of the island?

TB - Not much! He complained about the rising prices, the 'philistines' he was forced to share a carriage tour with, the weather and the monotonous lamb and mutton diet, which he said turned him into a 'reluctant vegetarian' and the respectability of the visitors which he claimed declined every year.

#### B Plus ça change... Anyone else?

TB - Interestingly enough we are linked slightly to the Russian Revolution, the man behind the assassination of Rasputin, Prince Felix Youssoupoff, a flamboyant character who was gay and an occasional transvestite, came to visit Trinity Manor for four days in the early 1920s.

There's a name to try and say with a straight face... What about revolutionary thinkers?

TB - Well Victor Hugo was exiled here for a while before he got kicked out and went to Guernsey, and then we had Claude Cahun of course, who was here during the Occupation – an anti-German activist as well as a surrealist.

### And any revolutionary ideas started in Jersey?

TB - The Jersey Royal potato was more of a discovery than a revolution, but around the same time a Jerseyman, Robert Le Rossignol developed a new method of making fertilizer that revolutionized agriculture and his process is still used today.

### Weren't we the first to get postboxes as well?

TB - I think the French had them before us but yes, we were the first in the British Isles. Apparently the Jersey people were moaning about having to walk all the way to the post office, so in 1852, they put four of them around St Helier to see what would happen.

# And the rest is history as they say... How do you remember all the dates?

TB - Ah you were lucky on that 1852 one. I was sure about that. Normally I'm a bit vaguer and say mid-19th century so there's plenty of margin for error!

#### B Do you ever get any hecklers?

TB - Not really. People pay to go on the walks so they're willing participants. Occasionally in town during the 'Murder, Muck and Mayhem' walks you get people staggering out of pubs who give you a bit of a barracking, but nothing really.

#### B Ever lost anyone?

TB - A couple of years back, I took a group of six up to the dolmen at La Couperon.

When I turned around, halfway up the path there were only five. We looked for the missing woman, and found her unconscious, lying halfway down a cliff! We got her up and when she came round, she told me she was epileptic and had probably blacked out.

### That must have given you all quite a fright...

TB - Luckily we had a small group and it was immediately obvious someone was missing. But now I count people obsessively!

## What period in history would you like to go back to?

TB - I think I'm happy in the present, we're certainly better off nowadays. Although, from time to time I'd like to go back to my younger days perhaps — who wouldn't!

# 19 degrees? Are you kidding? It's bloody FREEZING!

As soon as we touched down in Vietnam out came the hoodies, socks, trousers and long sleeve tops. Turns out your body really does get used to the heat, even twenty degrees felt Baltic.

We jumped into a taxi and drove into the busy city in the north of Vietnam, Hanoi. Everywhere we turned were tiny little ladies walking around in socks, heels and pyjamas with sun hats or crouching at the sides of the road on miniature stalls, slurping Pho (noodle soup). One thing we quickly noticed about Vietnam aside from the strange fashion sense, is that there are no set meal times, there are constantly people eating. Even at three in the morning, (sober) people are crouched on the pavements in huddles and cooking on their home made stoves, playing cards and eating chicken feet.

So our Vietnam story begins when we had lost our sleeper bus ticket and each of us girls were having minor panic attacks when we bumped into Mr Chu, Kam and Quentin. Unfortunately, due to the stress of the situation, conversations were not polite, but hey, I guess that they were so astounded by our beauty that they chose to follow us to our next destination. Mr Chu is an American-born half Chinese, half German guy, who is possibly the most consistently entertaining person I have ever met. I guess falling head over heels with him was not part of my plan, but hey, what can you do. Kam, aka 'Mr Smooth' (also American) and the constantly drunk yet brilliant gentleman that is Quentin quickly became part of our travel arrangements, and so we created 'The Roadkillaz'. Hell yeah, we had decided to cruise Vietnam on motorbikes!

As The Roadkillaz were ripping up the dirt roads of Vietnam, there were a few times when we had to stop to appreciate the miraculous things that we were witnessing. Have you ever seen someone driving onehanded along a busy motorway, carrying an industrial fridge on the back of a tiny miniature moped? Or seen a dozen ducks strapped onto the back of a bike with string, and the family's prize-pig grinning at you out of a rear-facing wicker basket? Or have you seen a moped so completely consumed by hay bales that you can't even see the bike, let alone the driver, and who knows how he can see the road. You see the thing is, no-one in Vietnam owns a car. The tax on them is so high that everyone just sticks to motorbikes, and by everyone I mean everyone. Little kids drive them to school, pyjama-clad women in heels drive them to work with five of their friends hanging on, and grandparents who look too old to even walk, drive them around like crazed yobbos. So there are all kinds of crazy people on the roads.

When we skidded up on our bikes at each tourist site, we would have been the coolest looking Westerners around, had it not been for the tour groups. Each tour group we saw normally consisted of around 30 middle-aged men and women dressed up to the nines in their khaki safari shorts and shirts, complete with local-tourist hats. These are the Vietnamese triangle-shaped hats which you rarely see on anyone except the sellers, and in stereotypical postcards or paintings, which is why it is so hilarious for the tour groups to all be modelling them. It is kind of like me going to France with a stripy shirt and a beret on, saying 'hohehohehoooo'.

Bia Saigon (local beer) drove us through Vietnam, from North to South as we drank copious amounts of the beer and munched on chicken feet. Each town we travelled through had a different forte; our favorite was Hoi An, a fashionista's paradise where all clothes can be made from scratch. You can draw a design and the locals will create it for you, tailoring it to fit your body perfectly, and have it ready for you within 24 hours. In all honesty the best part of Vietnam for me was riding through the scenery on the bikes, but I didn't fall in love with the people or the food as hard as I did in India, which is still my front-runner.

We bussed it to Cambodia, and after being reunited with the other Jersey folk who we originally met in India, we decided to unpack our rucksacks and settle down in Sihanoukville. Mine and Jodi's money situation wasn't looking too healthy, so we got ourselves jobs at a bar called the Dolphin. We quickly realized that our main responsibilities were to distribute a few flyers (whilst drinking) and get people into the bar (whilst drinking). We were being paid in booze and food, so obviously the majority of the time we would be, yes, drinking. We managed to hold down this job for about 5 days, re-enacting Coyote Ugly (dancing on the bar whilst pouring drinks with our Aussie lovelies), before we accepted that our bodies were going to collapse if we didn't stop intoxicating ourselves. Our job at The Dolphin Shack had helped us to make friends with the locals who ran the bar, with the Westerners behind it and also the punters, so after a few weeks we had a little community. We came to know the local beach kids (very annoying yet they grow on you) and actually have some fun with them, rather than just receiving the usual bunch of swear words that they string together and throw at you if you don't buy from them. 'Buuyyy my fruiiit' was the daily dreaded line we heard from a young boy seller known as 'Beyonce'. Each evening we spent on the beach, eating stunning BBQ food and watching the local guys spin fire. The locals here are unreal at fire poi, you can just sit and watch them for hours, or you can do a 'Jodi Fallen' and get up there and do it yourself.

That's what Bacardi courage does to you! Every night, even after we stopped working, we would end up at The Dolphin, winning games of pool with the local kids in exchange for bracelets, drinking a few casual buckets whilst they started the bonfire and generally having a ball. Our time in Sihanoukville got even better as it neared the Khmer New Year, the kids celebrate this by launching talcum powder and water bombs at all tourists and it turned into a constant warfare. The New Year lasts for four days and each of those four days was hell for all of us. Paints were brought out on the final day, an evening when we wore just swimwear and scummy vest tops in order to prevent anything we cared about getting ruined!

After a couple of weeks in S-Ville the itchy feet started nagging at me again. We decided to calm them by going to pirate an island called 'Koh Rong'. Crystal blue seas, paperwhite sand, no jellyfish, no sellers, no hassle and most importantly, hardly any people. We shrugged on our rucksacks and attempted to trek through the jungle onto the other side of the island; unfortunately we were unable to locate the tourist path and so explored bare foot and Mowgli-style before we managed to emerge from the bush. When we got out of the greenery we found ourselves surrounded by tree-high huts on stilts, with a shower room on the second floor so you could bathe whilst watching the sun rise. I never knew that algae could glow until we went swimming at night time and the plankton in the sea shone on us like a torch through the black water. The men of the group grafted and made a communal bonfire, whilst the women played barmaids and kept the drinks flowing. We sat around our fire long after the sun went to bed, and eventually passed out in hammocks on the beach, proper beach bum style. Eventually, we accepted (begrudgingly) that we couldn't stay in this magical paradise forever, and acknowledged that yes, all good things have to come to an end, and we all dragged our feet back to Sihanouvkille. The New Year was over. The sand began to change under our feet. Familiar faces left, and new footprints appeared. We soon decided that it was time for us to pack up our two rucksacks, attach our trainers, and begin a new adventure in a new place, once more. To Laos we go!

I can seldom think of a good reason to leave my sofa in St Ouen, let alone visit town, so it was with great interest that I accepted the novel assignation to spend the night at the glorious peach-coloured palace on St Helier's Waterfront. I am a reclusive nerd with a wardrobe full of heavy metal t-shirts and crumbs in his beard, so I was curious to find out if squeezing into a suit and staying at the Radisson Blu could make me feel like the kind of high-powered tycoon who parks his yacht in the marina and paddles ashore to conduct business deals in luxury.

Knowing that they'd put us up in one of the suites, I abandoned my rusty chariot in the front car park and jogged round to the classy marina side to make my entrance in style. With my glamorous lady wife in tow, this enabled me to feel like some aristocratic captain of a floating gin-palace, and I was able to stroll confidently into the hotel whilst appreciating the way in which its south-facing walls of glass reflect an extravagant view of gleaming pleasure boats, freewheeling seagulls and Elizabeth Castle. Whilst checking all of this out, I was lucky not to have stumbled straight into the enormous fish tank in the lobby, a

mass of water which would only need to be slightly larger to be the subject of an unreliable ferry service and night raids by illegal French fishermen.

Like many Island residents, my usual view of the Radisson Blu is of an apricot wedge that passes slowly by as I make my daily crawl towards St Helier, and like any new building higher than a sandcastle there's been some grumbling about its appearance. This is a shame, because the minute you step inside the building

you're struck by how airy and spacious it is, projecting a sleek, modern appearance that made me imagine I was in the VIP lounge at some voquish European airport. Grumblers should also be aware that the view from the business class rooms is fantastic. with the suites and meeting

rooms boasting a vast, blue-tinged panorama that stretches from the marina, past Elizabeth Castle to incorporate the twinkling lights of St Aubin's harbour. Truly, St Helier is more beautiful if you look at it from the right angle - in this case outwards towards the open sea.

There's a lot to be said for a newlyconstructed hotel, especially when it's tailored to the demanding business clientele that visit our offshore piggy-bank. Needless to say we got free internet and the enjoyment of a lovely pool, sauna and gym on the ground floor, but the massive corporate meeting rooms at the top of the hotel made me wish I'd brought a PowerPoint presentation, a laser pointer and some platinum cufflinks. A Hollywood-style futuristic boardroom that can transform into a swish banqueting area, the glass-walled Le Hocg space is so imposing that you half expect to find Michael Douglas in there, or perhaps some of the X Men, planning to free St Aubin's Fort from Magneto and Juggernaut.

The modern approach was also evident in the comfy furnishings and chic decor of our room, where it was surprisingly easy to ignore the flatscreen television in favour of wall-to-ceiling windows that were perfect for keeping tabs on my imaginary superyacht and looking suave for the benefit of any onlookers. Thankfully, the suite

area is easily shut off from the huge bedroom proper, either for business purposes or for my wife to block out my snoring whilst she enjoyed the free espresso machine and library of

on-demand movies. There's a second TV opposite the bed too, although I was momentarily disappointed that it wasn't visible, Partridge-style, from the bathtub. Not that this mattered, as the bed was gigantic and extremely comfortable, so I spent many hours lounging around in my hotel bathrobe like a cross between Yoko Ono and Patrick Bateman.

Lounging around was very much a necessity, as I felt that true luxury could not be experienced without an extensive sampling of the Waterfront Brasserie on the ground floor. Despite me forgetting to book a table on a busy Saturday night, the staff were friendly and fast, and so delicious food arrived as fast as I could shovel it down.

As a vegetarian gourmand, the food at even high-end hotel restaurants can be a little boring, but after a starter of creamy mozzarella salad I enjoyed a hearty mushroom, braised onion and stilton pie so much that I considered ordering a second one and smuggling it home in a paper bag. Purely in the interests of research, I then ignored the diet I'm allegedly following and guzzled a wonderfully nutty semifreddo dessert. My wife was equally delighted with fresh local crab salad, a perfectly tender steak and a pudding of rich, gooey chocolate brownie, enhanced with the unexpected inclusion of pine nuts. They're surprisingly tasty in chocolate cake; I know this because I slyly finished her plate whilst she was distracted by the view.

A proper businessman probably would have spent a few hours in the lounge bar, sipping on a fine cognac and listening to the gentle sounds of the sea outside. However, I'm just a pretend businessman, so I went back upstairs to soak in the bathtub and watch Jackass 3 in bed. After sampling the kitchen I wished I'd had space for their extensive room service menu, but I needed to preserve my powers for a morning visit to the swimming pool and then at least an hour grazing the hotel's vast smorgasbord of breakfast foodstuffs.

The waterfront location is perfect for business and leisure visitors alike, as anybody without my yokel's inbuilt horror of 'the town' is just a short stroll from our capital's many charming attractions. Luckily for me, I found the relaxed, modern interior of the Radisson Blu so soothing that I had no desire to do anything other than enjoy the hotel itself. I was sad to leave, not only because our suite was perfectly air-conditioned, extremely comfortable and more spacious than most people's houses, but because that incredible view is even better when the sun comes out. Standing in the massive window, with the boats and people down below, you really feel like this Island is your oyster. At least until you realise that people are only staring up at you because you've forgotten to put on any pants on under your bathrobe.

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





# Amy'Rhian'Butler

After spending an afternoon knitting and contemplating life whilst living on a canal boat in Bristol, former Hautlieu student and Jersey born illustrator Amy Rhian Butler thought she'd make the life-changing decision and move to live in London before it was too late. With a degree in illustration from the University of the West of England under her belt, Amy packed her bags and made her way to the nation's capital and hasn't looked back since. I caught up with Amy to find out exactly what she's been up to...

### SO WHY THE SUDDEN MOVE TO LONDON?

A lot of my friends from university had moved to London and were doing lots of exciting art things there that I found myself becoming quite jealous of. I knew I wanted to do those things too, I just hadn't found the confidence to go for it yet but it finally came from somewhere (probably the fear of becoming 25 and still not having done it was the main incentive!) so off I went. You don't have to live in London to be successful with illustration or art in general but I've found that it makes it much quicker and easier to be there. There are endless opportunities and everyone has been so much more helpful that I expected.

### WHAT HAVE YOU BEEN WORKING ON SINCE YOU MOVED?

I have been working with my good friend from university Hattie Newman for the last year. She is a successful paper engineer/set designer/illustrator and her workload became so big that I now have the best job in London of being her assistant. We make everything and anything (mainly out of paper and card) ranging from tiny sweetcorn to giant pop-ups of New York. I have worked with Hattie on various jobs including a stop motion animation for Sony, party props for photography agent Germaine Walker, a huge Christmas window display for ad agency AMV BBDO and most recently a big window display for Gap in Milan. I am excited to say that I have recently had my first solo job. I had to make props for a fashion photo-shoot for Huxley. I made a set of huge colouring pencils, pencil sharpenings and paint pots, all out of paper and card. I would never have had the confidence or skill to do this job when I first moved to London but I have learnt so much from working with Hattie



that I feel like I am now ready and happy to do jobs on my own. Pretty exciting!

# AND WHAT'S THIS I SEE ON YOUR BLOG ABOUT A DOLL'S HOUSE RESTORATION?

I live in a big warehouse with 13 other people who all do interesting things and lucky for me one of them is Trevor Cain – he is a dolls house restorer. I have loved dolls houses since me and my Nan made one from an old Hoover box when I was little, so I was really interested to see Trevor transform these beautiful old houses back to their original states. I started helping Trevor over the Christmas period when he had a lot of work on and now I help him when he needs me. He has taught me loads including how to wire up all the lights and lay tiny floorboards. Trevor has recently been commissioned to recreate a Scottish Castle in the form of a dolls house. He has asked me to make a cardboard mock-up of the castle for him to work from when making the final wooden one.

# IS THERE ANYTHING YOU'D REALLY LIKE TO DO ARTISTICALLY IN THE FUTURE?

I would like to carry on with the 3D work, but also get back into my 2D illustration more and begin to get some more jobs through this. I love working with other people so I really want to do some more collaborations and hopefully get some great jobs – the bigger the better!

uperman, Batman, Spider-Man. Like Hercules and the Greek Gods or King Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table; super-heroes are our modern myths. Just like these classic fables they take human traits and enhance them to an epic scale. At their best they are large-scale metaphors for the very things that make us human. This universal appeal might go some way to explaining the continued dominance of the super-hero at the box office. But how do the curators of these icons keep things fresh? As characters grow, actors move on and time passes, how can you keep audiences interested without losing the resonance of the very myths that define these characters?

The first cycle of comic book adaptations have a tendency to bring everything into the modern age. The X-Men wear leather, Iron Man hangs out with DJ AM and for some reason The Joker listens to Prince (I love Tim Burton's Batman but there are ways it's hugely dated). After the commercial if not critical success of X3 there was an initial push to stay in the present and push the X-Men in an even more youthful direction. Josh Schwartz (The OC and Gossip Girl) was even hired to write a draft of a teencentric script. Then Bryan Singer (X-Men 1 & 2) was brought aboard first as director and then producer and things took a turn. Modernisation was out and Matthew Vaughn and Jane Goldman (the director/writer team behind Stardust and Kick Ass) were in.

It's weird how things work out. Matt Vaughn was originally set to direct X3: The Last Stand and was on board well into pre-production. He dropped out due to family commitments and a feeling that production was being rushed. He has since indicated he didn't feel he was quite ready for a production of such size and needed to work on Kick Ass and Stardust (both adaptations) to hone his craft further. In the end Bret Ratner took the reigns and although his film had its moments it suffered from a tendency to introduce too many storylines

and characters leaving little room for coherence or emotion. I'm sure Vaughn will tell you that things have worked out for the better. His last films have effortlessly combined commercial appeal with a quirky visual flair. He now not only has the experience but also the credibility to try something different with this film.

The plot ostensibly revolves around Charles Xavier and Erik Lehnsherr and their journey from best friends and trusted colleagues to arch enemies as Professor X and Magneto. They are not the leaders of Bryan Singer's X-Men films. Instead Charles is looser and more reckless and Erik is an angry young holocaust survivor looking for the means and methods of venting this rage. The trailer also shows the involvement of comic book favourites Beast, Emma Frost, Banshee and Havok as well as some James Bond-like spy action. It's all very Sixties glamorous and that's the thing that could set this film apart from the other big budget blockbusters. Instead of moving towards our time the film looks to immerse itself in its Sixties setting. All the tensions that informed the creation of what we recognize as the Marvel universe are there: nuclear fear, the civil rights movement and even the Cuban missile crisis as a big action set piece. The X-Men are all about what it means to be a persecuted minority and the Sixties provide the real life parallel to the mythic struggle.

X-Men 3: The Last Stand suffered from a sacrifice of ideas for action, spectacle and Oscar-winning actresses in bad wigs demanding additional screen time. It strayed away from what makes the X-Men myth resonate and by grounding this effort against real history Vaughn is looking to avoid that. The producers have stated explicitly that this isn't intended to be a reboot but rather a prequel to the films that have come before. If it's good enough though why shouldn't it be? I applaud the producers for taking this unique approach to the characters but they shouldn't restrict themselves with what has come before. This could be a myth that could be part of our culture rather than just a reference to it.

# Revolution

ith First Class's revolutionary approach to the reboot / comic book movie and our theme this month being 'revolution' I thought I'd drop you five more ideas for other revolutionary approaches to this most maligned of Hollywood practices.

### Holy Shark Repellent Spray Batman!

After the success of The Dark Knight there has been a tendency to go gritty and realistic with these kind of adaptations. But why not go the other way? How will Warner Brothers

trilogy? There's always the chance of going to a different extreme with a new version of the Adam West Batman. Sound Effects, The Bat Dance and George Clooney's rock hard nipples (Hang on I might be thinking of something else there.)

### Twists without the twist

follow the conclusion of Nolan's Batman

There are a number of films that are absolutely defined by their shocking twist endings. The Sixth Sense, Fight Club, Planet of the Apes all fall into this category. Twister surprisingly does not. But how do you repeat the visceral

impact of these twists in a reboot or remake? You don't put them in. Bruce Willis is just some creepy guy who hangs out with kids, Seven has a happy but mathematically incorrect ending. Tim Burton kind of tried this approach with his Planet of the Apes. That didn't work out so well.

### **Jarring Genre Shifts**

You might have seen the mash up trailers online (If you haven't – check them out) but what if studios went about releasing the same films but in new genres. The Shining as a family comedy, Cheaper By The Dozen as a harrowing drama about a family whose resources are stretched to breaking point by the parents' fertility, Sex & The City 2 as a watchable film.

### Mamma Meow

The Internet used to be little more than an efficient pornography delivery service. Now we use it for social networking and looking at funny cat videos too. There must be a way of taking these hilarious feline friends and turning them into cold hard movie dollar. The Fast & The Furriest, Garfield of Dreams, The Cat in the Hat. The possibilities are endless!

### Originality

How about taking a pre existing title and remaking it with new ideas, new characters and new story? Give writers, directors and actors the opportunity and backing to craft an original tale and express themselves. When you've gone that far you might as well give it a new title too. The reboot that isn't a reboot, it could be a thing.







# Also Show...

By the time you read this Thor will have already thundered onto your screens as the first big summer blockbuster out of the blocks. So far I've heard hugely positive things from those who've seen the film with comparisons being made to the first Iron Man. With Kenneth Branagh at the helm it's probably no surprise that the high drama, conflict and majesty of the Gods of Asgard are present and correct but there is also a kind of fish out of water comedy with Thor's arrival on Earth. With the release of The Avengers only just over a year away expect even more of the cohesive Marvel universe to play a part with appearances from Nick Fury and Hawkeye confirmed already.

Jack is back for Pirates of the Caribbean 4 and unshackled by a trilogy's worth of plot and Orlando Bloom he's ready to cut loose. The plot sees Jack on the search for the Fountain of Youth. Only mermaids, zombies, Blackbeard and a new love interest played by Penelope Cruz stand in his way. Hopefully, this being a stand-alone film the creators will be able to get back to what made the original so much fun and that instead of being an anti-hero Depp will be able to do what he did in the first and actually act like a real pirate.

'I can't believe this happened again.' I really can't. A couple of summers ago Todd Phillips' Las Vegas bachelor comedy came from nowhere and grossed \$467 million on a budget of \$35 million. Inevitably there's a sequel but this time expectation is high. Much of what was so enjoyable about the first film was its ability to surprise and defy the conventions of the comedy genre. Making a sequel goes counter to this. The trailer promises bigger thrills and danger as the boys go to Thailand but it'll take some going to capture the easy camaraderie of the original. At least the majority of the original cast return including a beefed up role for the scene-stealing Mr. Chow (Ken Jeong) and cameos from Liam Neeson and Mike Tyson.

Making his feature debut is late night TV and alternative radio mainstay Joe Cornish as both writer and director of Attack The Block. The high concept is genius in its simplicity - hoodies against aliens, inner city v outer space. The trailer alone has plenty of laugh out loud moments but Cornish promises this isn't just played for laughs. In a similar vein to Shaun of the Dead the action looks set to equal the quality of the films it references. This shouldn't be too much of a surprise with Edgar Wright (Director of Shaun & Fuzz) exec producing and Nick Frost starring. Early press reviews have been good and on the strength of this script Cornish has picked up work for Steven Spielberg and Marvel Studios. Could this be the new Hangover?

# bad taste.

Last month a journalist from the Guardian was invited over by Genuine Jersey to experience the food of our fair Isle. It turns out there was little but prior critical media coverage of Jersey that impressed Oliver Thring. Here was our response;

Before I cast judgement on this antagonistic, poorly researched and altogether naive article I thought it only fair to read back and familiarise myself with Mr Thring's previous work.

It appears that grasping at disparaging whisps of popular culture in order to beef up a hollow and empty supposed editorial on food seems to be a new foray for the strong jawed young author. The lion's share of Oliver's body of work for the Guardian seems to be the 'consider' series of features that entice us to 'consider the egg', 'consider baked beans', 'consider lard' and, most recently 'consider the hot cross bun'. I mean, what DO you make of the chocolate chip variety?!

It comes as no surprise that when Oli was invited to Jersey, a contentious hot Jersey Royal potato of economic, political and tabloid unrest he felt the need to vent his thesaurus. In doing so he seems to have overlooked what is, in fact, a fantastic foodie Island with a great deal to offer.

I consider myself amongst the most cynical and critical of island residents. I've not been here long but besides it's nepotistic shortcomings, the standard to which most things are done in Jersey is far superior to any comparatively sized town or tourist destination in the UK or beyond. The variety and standard of food offerings, both through the farm shop network that Oliver seems to overlooked or missed during the taxi ride around Haut de la Garenne and through it's throng of varied and generally pleasing restaurants. It's ironic that his food review got so distracted by the press field day that resulted in the discovery of a coconut shard.

Yes, the seafood is largely shellfish based but I would happily do the Pepsi challenge with a Northern French Fruit de Mer. We're not on the Cape or watching the fishermen in Natal provide straight to plate catches but, as far as British seafood goes, Jersey fairs well. With a declining tourism industry I can't see Jamie opening a restaurant and Rick Stein doesn't live here but, to be honest, the property is expensive enough already.

I hope that the critical tastebuds with which Oliver degraded the local offering were honed in his wide experience of seafood. It is a shame then that despite cutting his teeth 'considering' the culinary masterpieces; mustard, scotch eggs, the biscuit, the 99 flake, ice lollies (the list goes on) that the only seafood related subject matter Oliver has covered in his whole visible

Guardian editorial career was the seminal 'consider the anchovy' back in January. We all know that L'andoners love their cockles and mussels. With such a scathing review of what is essentially fresh seafood from the English Channel you would hope that his backcatalogue would in some way reassure. Sampling Lobster as a child is simply not enough.

Oliver's obviously a bright chap but I can't help feeling he got lost with this one. All those adjectives, all that prose, all that negativity. Perhaps the 'consider' series is coming to an end and he hopes for a move to a more incisive editorial arena. That would explain basing a food review on a veiled, bigoted bambasting of an Island constructed largely on hearsay during a fleeting PR freebee. A political poet lost in food reviewer's brogues, an Oxford Liberal lost scrabbling to the left at the Guardian, casting out with a Gill-esque critique he hopes will be noticed and guffawed

There are many bad things about the Island of Jersey, thankfully outweighed by the good. Sure, you wont find as many wood burning ovens per capita as a South West London Suburb or pubs selling ironic British menus full of corn fed jellied eels. You can't go out at midnight for baklava either. However, if you judge either the food or the Island on Oliver's review you're missing something.

Jersey has a disproportionately good variety of eateries, whether sublime seafood at the Oysterbox or Sumas, homemade pasta at La Cantina, characterful Pacific rim inspired dishes at Danny's, Amuse bouches that entertain and impress at one of the excellent Michelin starred restaurants, Bohemia or Ocean. If you heed Oliver's warnings and stay clear of the seafood then you could try the great Portuguese restaurants that caters to Jersey's 10% Portuguese population, not to mention the bizarre trend for beachside thai BYOs that somehow befit many a relaxing Jersey sunset, just 45 minutes from London.

If only Oliver had gone beyond the petty Jersey bashing and dedicated more of his time sampling the local offering and more of his column inches to the subject at hand then maybe both he and the reader would have enjoyed more than his hilarious homecoming jam on toast finale.

# Cuts above the rest

Jersey

The first beef from Jersey-Angus cattle has gone on sale to begin a new chapter in the Island's rural history.

Four members of Genuine Jersey, cattle farmers Richard Lee, Paul Houzé, Rickie Leith and Darren Quénault, are producing the crossbreeds - but it is one of Mr Lee's steers from La Caroline Farm in St Peter that is the first to reach the local market.

The Chief Executive of Genuine Jersey, John Garton, said: 'The early indication is that Jersey-Angus beef will be sought after by local chefs and Islanders because of the quality of the meat. While it is unlikely that the producers will be able to satisfy entirely the local demand for fresh beef, it will widen the choice available to Jersey consumers who want to support the local economy by buying local produce.'

This new rural industry has come about because of changes in legislation relating to the Island Herd which now allows for the importation of semen to strengthen the breed and its dairy production. In addition, it has enabled dairy farmers to develop a new niche meat product.

Mr Lee said he expected the market in Jersey-Angus beef would be slow at first, until the flow of animals increased. Having eaten some of the prime steak from his first animal, he added the meat had 'melted in the mouth and was of superb quality.'

He said: 'The production of beef from calves born from Jersey cows and Angus bulls is an exciting new venture, producing a quality product for the local consumer which should have a positive effect on the profitability of the dairy industry.'

Mr Lee's beef is now available from the Country Butcher at Rondel's Farm Shop.

This latest diversification to the rural economy poses no threat to the world-renowned status of the Island herd. The Jersey-Angus animals are produced from the dairy cows not used to breed dairy herd replacements.

In addition to producing Jersey-Angus beef, Darren and Julia Quénault of Manor Farm, are producers of Jersey-Angus rose veal which is available from the Classic Herd farm shop in St Peter.

# Rising chefs get a taste of the restaurant business

If you've ever wanted to say 'they cooked for me before they were famous', then keep an eye on the rising stars at Highlands' top-rated catering school. Gallery Magazine was lucky enough to be invited along to last month's sell-out Production Kitchen event when the College's catering students teamed up with the Atlantic Hotel's Michelin-starred chef Mark Jordan and sommelier Sergio dos Santos to turn out a wine-tasting gourmet dinner to a packed restaurant of discerning diners.

Think of it as a bit like Jersey's answer to 'Fifteen', giving the catering students a taste of not only how to produce a winning fine dining menu, but also how to keep front of house service swift, slick and professional enough for a top class restaurant. The eighteen first and second year students worked along with their tutor Dominic Farrell and the Atlantic team to prepare and serve dishes such as lobster cappuccino, seared langoustine tails with maple-baked pork belly, and honey and five spice roasted Gressingham duck. It was a menu fit for a Michelin-starred restaurant and a great way of giving the students practical experience of producing high quality food under the watchful eyes of the Atlantic Hotel team. Patrick Burke, Owner and Managing Director of the Atlantic Hotel said, "All of us at the Atlantic are great believers in supporting local talent. The Atlantic enjoys a great working relationship with Highlands College and we are constantly looking at ways in which we can further develop this mutually beneficial partnership".

And you don't have to wait for the next Production Kitchen to get a taste of the island's rising culinary talent; the College's recently refurbished Academy Restaurant is open during term time for lunch every Tuesday and dinner on Thursdays, with food cooked and served by the students.

### And ... one to watch

17 year-old catering student Glen Noel has been getting plenty of experience in the fine dining world with weekly work placements at the Atlantic Hotel since September 2010. He was in the

running for last month's CI Chef of the Year competition and also created the winning menu for the last visit of the Lieutenant-Governor to Highlands College. Glen says he's aiming to be the first Jersey-born chef to win a Michelin star, and based on the Production Kitchen cooking, we think he's in with a pretty good chance.

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

aute-cuisine just a bit too 'haute' for you? You're not alone, these days, fine dining's shaking off its fussy image and taking a more laidback approach to good food. It's the fine dining revolution - gone are the starchy white tablecloths and the hushed dining rooms, and in their place, relaxed simplicity.

Sirocco is a prime example of how fine dining doesn't have to be too formal. With its alfresco balcony tables in the evening sun and the infectious buzz of conversation drifting up from Café Zephyr, this is a restaurant with an easy, laidback atmosphere. Add the extra touches that turn a meal out into a fine dining experience; inventive dishes, amuse-bouches and a sommelier who knows his

stuff, and you've got a recipe for a perfect night out.

If the weather's warm, the tables out on Sirocco's balcony terrace are a definite hotspot. We were ushered to ours by our waiter, who brought us a platter of warm breads that came with butter and sea salt, and our amuse-bouche - a rich soupy shot glass of beetroot, watercress and balsamic velouté that tasted delicious.

Starters soon arrived, and we loved the scallops and slow-braised pork belly with vanilla cider. With its balanced flavours, it's a real winner of a dish. Victor the sommelier

matched it with a glass of crisp Chilean chardonnay. The melting ballotine foie gras with golden raisin purée and cashew nut brittle and sour plum jelly was delicious – an explosion of flavours and set off perfectly by a blackcurranty glass of velvety black Muscat.

For our main course, we had to try the flambé. Steak cooked in front of you and set alight – it's pure food theatre and the ultimate way of ensuring that your medium rare really is. Rui the Maître D' chatted to us as he cooked the steak at a trolley right next to the table, and when the flames had died down, stirring buttery herbs and sizzling garlic into the sauce and tipping in mushrooms and cream to melt down into a rich sauce. It's like watching your very own

Masterchef, except that you get to eat the result. And what a result - rich, melt in the mouth and full of flavour, this is definitely an experience to try. Chef Steve Walker is a whizz at whipping up adventurous flavour combinations and another must-try is his



venison with chocolate. One of those pairings that look startling but taste amazing, Sirocco's version comes with blackberries that add a deep fruity edge to an already rich and indulgent dish. It was incredible, try it with a glass of the Chateau Caronne Bordeaux, another of the sommelier's wine picks.

Sirocco turns even more romantic at night, as the sky turns inky blue, lanterns twinkle on every table and Claudio the restaurant manager arrives with blankets to keep alfresco diners cosy. We couldn't resist testing Rui's flambé skills again on the crêpes suzette, which are prepared next to your table, soused with Grand Marnier and flambé-ed. It's delicious, and a great way of honing your crêpe-making skills, with Rui passing on tips on everything from melting sugar to flambéing without losing your eyebrows.

Chocoholics won't want to miss the tasting of chocolate, it's chocolate every way you can imagine and topped off with a Royal Yacht sail made out of...

chocolate. Gold-dusted raspberries and pistachio brittle finish off the dish, and Victor teamed it with a rich, sweet Orange Muscat designed to pick up the fruit tones. Finish off your evening with a coffee and some petits-fours, or even an after-dinner drink - the back up of a good hotel bar means that Sirocco has a wide choice of some of the best whiskies and cognacs around.

So if you're looking for somewhere you can fine dine without feeling on edge, or having to talk in whispers, head to Sirocco. A relaxed modern atmosphere, sunset views and amazing food. What could be better?

# The Secrets of Planet Earth

The largest island in the Mediterranean is Sicily and has been producing excellent wines for many years using local grape varieties of white Grecanico and black Nero D'Avola. But in 1985 extensive experimentation introducing other Italian varietals and also international ones saw the results captured in two amazing wines under the name of Planeta La Segreta.

The white wine is produced using 60% Grecanico, 20% Chardonnay and then varying proportions of Fiano, Viognier and sometimes Sauvignon Blanc. The result is a vibrant aromatic wine with exotic fruit tastes. Whilst it can be enjoyed whilst young it also ages well for a number of years and accompanies lightly fried dishes, seafood, mixed salads and white cheeses very well.

The red wine is made with Nero D'Avola, Syrah and Merlot which gives it a real mouthful of ripe berry fruits including mulberry and redcurrant with hints of spice. Ageing is only for 3 months in 2 year old oak barrels to preserve the freshness but just add some complexity in the long finish. Planeta La Segreta Rosso goes well with a large range of dishes including pasta, grilled meats and also is excellent with fish soup.

Both the red and white wines from Planeta La Segreta come with screw-cap closures ensuring that the wines retain their fruit driven characteristics. The wines are available in 75cl bottles and priced at around £7.95 per bottle inclusive of GST.

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

It's a house built for entertaining, with a bay-windowed formal dining room next to the kitchen for dinner parties, and a huge recently renovated billiard room and relaxed lounge area to retire to after supper. 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


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When property developer Ben Richardson took on La Retraite, it was a long way away from the elegant family house it had been back in the late nineteenth century. Over almost a year, Ben and his team have turned this period property with its bay views into a stunning home fit for a twenty-first century family.

From the outside, La Retraite has kept its charming vintage features. Classic black railings, granite walls and the original Victorian tiles on the pathway have been carefully restored and replaced. The front door's been spruced up, and the original house name sparkles over the door. And in a nod to modern living, the parking has been extended, making room for around half a dozen cars along with a custom designed wooden carport. But it's when you walk inside the house that you get the full impact of this amazing renovation. With wide windows, rich walnut flooring and high white walls, this house certainly puts pay to the idea that period houses are dark and cramped. On the right is the contemporary kitchen from Hacker Kitchens of Germany with its gleaming brand new curved range of cupboards in a satin finish. It features fully-integrated appliances from Siemens and the worktops in the kitchen and adjoining utility room are all corian. The sweeping lines of the kitchen share the space with some of the property's carefully restored period features, Victorian coving and a working fireplace.

The large living room is flooded with natural light from the original sash windows and features a fireplace the developers discovered during the renovation, complete with historic granite mantel. Walk through the living room, and you step straight into the light-filled conservatory. Built to a bespoke design, the conservatory echoes the









Victorian lines of the house and lets natural light stream into the ground floor. With perfect proportions for a dining area, the windows can be folded right back to turn the conservatory into an outdoor room for 'alfresco' suppers with stunning views across the bay.

Outside the conservatory and overlooking the bay is a decked area with a sheltered lawn. It's a secluded south-facing suntrap by day, and by night, lights set into the decking turn it into an ideal space for evening entertaining.

The property's central staircase with original balustrade leads up to the first floor and two large ensuite double bedrooms. The colour palette changes from the bright white of the ground floor, to a softer pale grey on the bedroom walls and carpet, and deepens to a darker grey in the ensuite bathrooms, with accents of walnut. 'The grey is one of the original colours of the house' explains Ben, 'we've returned the windows to their original grey and we liked the fact we could feature it through the house'. Each bedroom has a built-in bank of wardrobes, and the bathrooms are beautifully finished, featuring contemporary wetroom-style showers. Period features also make an appearance with each of the first

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floor bedrooms featuring an original restored fireplace.

The top floor has been converted from two small rooms into an incredible master suite, with dormer windows looking out to sea. Glass partition windows link the space seamlessly, with views from the bedroom through the walk through wardrobe to the bathroom. There's been careful attention to detail - a bedroom window has been placed so you can see the beach from your bed, and the stunning egg-shaped bath overlooks the meadow. It's certainly a bathroom fit for a master suite with its designer limestone bath and handcut Corian sink, and you can change the mood at the touch of a switch with an array of different lighting options.

But that's not all. In a surprising twist, La Retraite has a whole extra floor waiting to be discovered. A door from the ground floor hallway leads down to a basement cinema room and fourth bedroom with ensuite bathroom. Tucked away from the rest of the house with its own separate entrance, this would make an exceptional guest suite, home office,

teenager's den, or just a place to escape away from it all. The media room is completely wired up for any combination of home theatre entertainment, and features lights that slowly dim for a cinema effect.

# **Enforcement of Jersey Employment Tribunal Awards is clarified**

Islanders who have been awarded compensation by the Jersey Employment Tribunal now have the assurance that they can personally pursue recovery of their awards in the courts.

An ambiguous provision in the Employment Law meant that until a recent judgment by the Royal Court, people could find that despite winning their case in the Tribunal, the law was unclear as to how the successful party should seek to enforce the Tribunal's decision in the event the losing party failed or refused to pay.

The clarification was given by the Bailiff, Michael Birt, in a judgment handed down recently in the case of Luxicabs Limited v Baal. Mr Birt confirmed that, in making an award, the Tribunal creates a debt between the two parties that can then be enforced by the successful party in the appropriate court.

Collas Crill represented Mary Baal in the Royal Court. We believe it is important that the Court has confirmed that a successful party is entitled to pursue enforcement of their award and has made the process clearer for those who embark on the Tribunal process and for their legal representatives.

In 2010 Mrs Baal brought proceedings in the Employment Tribunal for unfair dismissal from Luxicabs for alleged gross misconduct. Her claim was successful and she was awarded compensation which Luxicabs then failed to pay. Mrs Baal sued them on the award in the Petty Debts Court which again gave judgment in her favour. Luxicabs then appealed against the judgment to the Royal Court.

In the Royal Court, Luxicabs argued that the Tribunal's decision had been erroneous and unreasonable and that they should have been entitled to re-open its findings before the Petty Debts Court. They also argued that because they had not had a fair trial before the Tribunal they were entitled to a full hearing on the merits before the Petty Debts Court. The Bailiff ruled that these arguments were untenable and dismissed the appeal, meaning that the Petty Debts Court judgment stands. The Bailiff said that the court had no

ability to revisit or review the Tribunal's decision.

There was one issue that concerned the Court, which was one of statutory interpretation. One interpretation of the relevant provision of the Employment Law was that proceedings to enforce an award of the Employment Tribunal have to be brought by the Tribunal itself. However, the Court was of the view that this result would be "absurd" and confirmed that the position is that the party with the benefit of a Tribunal award (in practice usually the employee) is entitled to bring a court action to recover the amount due. As a postscript, the Bailiff urged that provision be made at future tribunal hearings for the proceedings to be recorded to ensure that parties who may have an arguable appeal are able to advance that appeal with the benefit of a record of the proceedings.

The judgment also represents a word of caution to a losing party taking a similar approach to an award made against it by the Tribunal because the Bailiff also ordered Luxicabs to pay the costs of the appeal that had been incurred by Mrs Baal.

#### **Cash or Continuity:**

Research Reveals Why Businesses Break Fixed-Term Investments

New research has revealed why some organisations choose to withdraw money that is invested in a fixed-term deposit before it reaches maturity.

Lloyds TSB investigated the reasons why some business customers who had invested in fixed term investments broke the agreement by withdrawing early, and so lost part of their anticipated return. Even though they were only a small proportion of the total number of business investors, the bank wanted to discover their reasons.

The bank found that corporate investors typically either withdrew 100% of their money, because they had major problems that affected their business continuity, or around 10% of the total investment because they had miscalculated the short-term working capital they need.

John Ramage, Lloyds TSB's Head of Retail Sales for the UK Corporate Market, said: "The break requests that we received divided into two types: Some wanted their entire investment back because, for example, the business owner had died. The second group had made a bit of calculation error in the amount of general working capital that they needed, or an unexpected bill, and so wanted some cash to tide themselves over.

"We found that almost no one asked for half, three quarters, or any other amount of their money – it was either about 10% or all of it."

In response to the research Lloyds TSB, which has a significant share of the corporate market in Jersey, Guernsey and the Isle of Man, has launched a new product. The Partial Withdrawal Fixed Term Deposit has already proved popular in the UK, and an offshore version is now available. The PWFTD is a 12-month deposit account with fixed interest rates, but depositors can make one withdrawal of up to 20% of their investment before maturity without losing interest.

Simon Prescott, Head of Offshore Corporate Banking said: "Partial withdrawal has proved popular in the UK with certain sectors and we expect to find the same here, and for the same reasons. Trust companies in particular want to earn a good rate of return, and are willing to tie up their money for a year, but they also like having access to some capital because they are often in receipt of unexpected demands for cash from their clients. This new account is ideal for them".

# Increase In Channel Islands Mergers And Acquisitions

'Mergers and Aquisitions' always prompts images for me of Patrick Bateman in Bret Easton Ellis' 'American Psycho' and the darker 'murders and executions' he conducted in his mind. Thankfully for the police, and Jersey as a whole, in this instance we're talking in the real sense.

As the economy continues to grow, KPMG tells us that acquisition activity is increasing among Channel Island companies. The high-profile acquisition of Close Brothers Offshore Group by Kleinwort Benson in early March was a sign of the times. They have seen a significant uplift in merger and acquisition activity in the past 12 months, following a small increase in business in the previous year. There has also been a trend to reduce the amount of debt used to finance transactions. Many deals are going through with a relatively low cash payments up front, followed by performance-driven deferred payments.

'We are seeing more activity in the islands as the economy continues to come out of recession,' said Robert Kirkby, Advisory Director at KPMG in the Channel Islands.

'There was still some uncertainty last year, with the Alternative Investment Funds Directive and the future of Zero-10, but now business is picking up, and some of the significant deals we are seeing act as a barometer for businesses confidence in this area. The Channel Islands remain an attractive market for mergers and acquisitions, both for deals within the island and for companies entering the islands, either from the UK or other offshore jurisdictions. Our finance sector businesses are well-regulated, operating in a stable regime, with good cash flows, steady clients and a well-educated workforce.'

Mark Ashburn, Senior Manager in Advisory Services at KPMG in the Channel Islands, said that research carried out by KPMG had revealed that nearly half of companies who had gone through a sales process in recent years felt that they had failed to maximise the company's value at the time of sale. Even a quarter of private equity firms had not managed to realise full sales value. Mr Ashburn said that businesses had to be prepared to accept that deals would take time to complete, commonly between six months and a year and sometimes longer. In the current climate too, sellers would need to be realistic around their expectations over the sale price.

'Preparation before the transaction process starts is key for any sale or purchase to successfully maximise value and minimise risk,' he added. The seminar also considered the early stages of buying or selling a business, including identifying potential purchase targets and interested purchasers, and some of the pertinent tax issues around mergers and acquisitions.





Inspired by the 'Bobbers' created by American Gls returning home and stripping all the weighty and unnecessary parts from their steeds in search of speed, simplicity and reliability Laurence set to the Harley even with an angle grinder at times to get it just how he wanted it. Most probably to the disgust of most Harley Davidson owners, the rust has been lacquered into the handlebars to retain some history and preserve the bike's soul; as Laurence proudly told me 'rust isn't a crime'.

So when the Parker family grew once more with the birth of their son Indy, Laurence was

faced with a conundrum when his wife Katy pointed out that the Harley would soon have to make way for a car to facilitate the nursery run. Ever the industrious and creative thinker, a visit to eBay secured a British built Watsonian Squire 'Mother & Child' sidecar and negated the requirement to part with the bike. As much as Katy wasn't overjoyed with the prospect at the time and still maintains that it's 'not [her] favourite mode of transport but if the weather's nice it's quite fun to get out in'. Indy, however, seems more than happy in his top of the range child seat tucked away in the back. What about if the family grows further? 'There's

the potential for one more seat in the future' exclaims Laurence, proudly. 'If that happens we'll get rid of it and buy a car', insists Katy.

Further inspired by the explosion of biker build-off type television shows and the search for The American Dream imaginative triggers clicked and parts began to pile up in waiting for their new home – the 'Bean Chopper'. For the past five years, their shed has slowly been filling with period parts waiting to fulfil their fate taking up home on an entirely bespoke and homebuilt from the ground up Chopper.

Born out of endless sketches and scribbles amassed during office meetings, simplicity is the key with this new bike, which is currently being worked on by Martin Roberts Motorcycles in Gloucester Street because as much as starting from scratch to fulfil his ultimate dream to create a machine that would be one hundred percent of its builder's vision is a wonderful thought, having the time to complete such a gargantuan project isn't always viable in practice. Kick-start only with a magneto in place of a battery and the overall look of a 1950s machine, Laurence is hoping to have the bike finished later this

year. Although any self-respecting petrolhead will know that a project like this is never truly complete, instead insisting on existing within an eternal

state of evolution.

So what of the future and life after the Bean Chopper is fully commissioned? Laurence hankers after building a hot-rod or another bike with son Indy, whose name was inspired by New York bike builder 'Indian Larry', although Katy likes to think it's more down to her love of Harrison Ford. I put it down to a couple that know how to strike the perfect balance when it comes to compromise!

The relaxed riding position doesn't see you almost doing a hand-stand, hunched over the tank and with your arms tucked firmly into your chest like on a ballsout sportsbike, rather a slightly more upright position ideal for riding at those unfortunately all too common lower speeds which also lends to the comfort, stability and ease of manoeuvring that you get with this bike. It's just as at home being ridden at low speeds and low revs as it is being ridden with the throttle wide open and your head tucked in behind the screen.

The nicely padded pillion seat is the perfect ammunition with which to arm yourself with before attempting to convince your better half that one of

these would make an ideal purchase so you can use it to commute, thus allowing you extra time in the morning for, er, whatever takes your fancy before you filter past the myriad frustrated faces facing yet another twenty minutes of snail's pace morning motoring. Then, of course, come the weekend you can *really* enjoy riding it.

The note from that stubby, chrome exhaust is throaty at idle yet unobtrusive and sounds positively awe-inspiring when you're holding it wide open and changing up at the last possible moment passing silly speeds in the first two gears alone, let alone the other four, so a trip away would be advisable. Just don't forget to stuff a healthy wad of cash in your jacket pocket if your chosen destination is France.

Smooth, elegant and yet aggressive looking lines provide an understated glimpse at the potential of this machine, these looks only let down slightly by the clunky, plastic numberplate holder but that's nothing a tail tidy wouldn't fix in about 10 minutes. Available in three colour schemes; the red and white seen here, blue and white or the stealthy grey and black option, just take your pick.

I'm by no means a hardcore biker, and so can honestly say that this bike could inspire confidence in both the brand new and out of touch rider alike thanks to its ease of handling, comfortable riding position and smooth power delivery, which begs just one final question: what are you waiting for?

#### CONCEPT CORNER: BIKES

In the absence of physical, working versions of those nothing short of staggering lightcycles from Tron (no filling up with petrol, zaps down into a conveniently small handle for easy parking and storage) I've found the next best things; two concepts from BMW and a machine of dubious taste from those crazy Germans at Mansory.

#### **BMW CONCEPT 6**



Looking like the kind of steed Judge Dredd would use to nip down to a 7/11 when he runs out of Corn Flakes, the engine in this futuristic cafe-racer style steed is pegged for production and, as the name suggests, is a six cylinder unit. Six? That's right, and it'll rev to around 9,000rpm too.

The riding dynamic of the touring machines the engine will eventually grace won't be affected according to BMW as it'll be both lighter and slimmer than any previous six cylinder bike motors they've produced. Let's just hope that somebody in Munich pushes the button on this beautiful concept one day.

#### MANSORY ZAPICO



Dare I say not quite extending themselves to their usual excessively distasteful grandeur, this is the latest offering from those bonkers Bavarians at Mansory, a one-off custom bike built from the ground up. Although having said that, it is fabricated almost solely from carbon fibre.

Built in conjunction with custom bike builder Thomas M. George, who I'm sure is extremely well revered in certain circles, and thanks to a 2 litre V2 powerplant has managed to accelerate from a standstill to sixty in 3.3 seconds with its 160hp whirring through the belt to that nigh on one foot wide rear tyre.

Just in case you were wondering, Mansory quote the top speed as 'adequate'. I've a feeling you'd meet with a similar response should you wish to know the price, with it undoubtedly being a question of 'if you have to ask...'.



# Digital image sensors




Probably one of the most taken-for-granted technologies of modern times, suddenly putting film into your camera and suffering its inherent drawbacks seems positively archaic.

### **Electronic Paper**





# THE TESTIVAL Ryozuaro:

Many years ago, a young farmer named Michael Eavis was so awe-struck by an openair Led Zepellin gig that he was compelled to start his own outdoor event at the nowworld-famous Worthy Farm.

In 1970 the very first Pilton Pop, Blues & Folk Festival took place, attended by a 1,500-strong crowd largely made up of hippies and travellers, and headlined by Marc Bolan's T-Rex. That festival would later be renamed Glastonbury Festival of Arts & Music, then simply known as 'Glastonbury', and now just the name 'Glasto' wil suffice. The young farmer can't have known that he had just sown the seeds for the festival revolution.

Fast forward to 2011, and festivals are big business. There are upwards of 500 music festivals taking place in the UK in 2011, from massive-scale events featuring megastars like U2 and Muse, to boutique events like Hop Farm or Kent's Secret Garden Party. Every genre imaginable will be on offer to those willing to pay the price and rough it in a tent for three nights or so, and music fans' appetite for festival season shows no signs of letting up; it was estimated that festivals last year brought £130m to the UK economy.

As many will be aware, the Channel Islands hasn't escaped the trend; Jersey, Guernsey and Sark boast a massive eight annual music festivals between them. Jersev Live Festival. Grassroots and the newly-established Guernsey Festival are the ones with perhaps the most easily-recognisable mainstream names, while Vale Earth, Sark Folk Festival and biker bash Chaos Festival offer a more boutique experience. For those with more specific tastes, the classical & jazz-orientated Liberation Festival and cross-arts showpiece Branchage Film Festival are simply a feast for the ears and eyes, not to put too fine a point on it.

With such a diverse range of styles on offer, and each festival boasting its own personality and unique quirks, it's reasonable to believe that there's enough room for them all. Jersey Live co-founder Warren Holt certainly feels that the competition is good for everyone, saying "It keeps us on our toes and makes us stronger", while Guernsey Festival's Jon Stephen says, "We don't see other Channel Island festivals as competition, and have done all we can to bring a new experience to Guernsey, and on a scale that is not currently available."

The festival format certainly seems to make sense for island locations such as our own. The geographical isolation makes it hard to envisage Jersey or Guernsey ever becoming a regular stopoff point for the UK or European live music circuit, due to the logistics and costs involved for both promoters and bands. The answer: get all the bands over at once, and everyone's a winner. Events are (in most-cases) self-financing, and local music fans don't have to pay through the ear to travel by air to see top quality live music. Just look at the range of acts that have performed at Channel Islands festivals in the past decade: The Prodigy, Kasabian, Paul Weller, British Sea Power, Alabama 3, Bedouin Soundclash, Newton Faulkner and Dizzee Rascal, to name a few. Without the festival format, would we have had the privilege of seeing such big names on home soil? Would any promoter risk his neck putting any one of those acts on in a one-off gig? The answer, methinks, is probably not.

This year, the CI festival season gets underway with Liberation Festival on 6th-9th May featuring classical acts such as Nicola Benedetti and Harriet MacKenzie, and ends with Branchage Film Festival on September 22nd - 25th. In between, Jersey Live continues to raise the bar with a bill headlined by Madness, Plan B, Mr Oizo and Zane Lowe; the inaugural Guernsey Festival boasts indie and pop icons such as Primal Scream, Ocean Colour Scene and Chipmunk; Grassroots have recently announced that legendary bluesman Seasick Steve will ocupy the top slot on their Main Stage. For those looking for an off-island weekend, Sark Folk Festival, Vale Earth or Chaos Festival are definitely worth exploring (although the latter perhaps isn't one for the faint hearted). It's certainly a summer to look forward to. All hail the festival revolution!

Jaquar Skills I Splash I 29th May

Jersey's biggest dance music promoters Theology return to the Watersplash on Sunday May 29th for a Bank Holiday special headlined by Radio One's 'King of the Turntables' JAGUAR SKILLS.

One of the standout acts in last year's Jersey Live Dance Arena, the hip-hop/mashup turntablist - whose true identity is known only by a close inner circle - finally makes his return to Jersey once again, after his scheduled December show unfortunately had to be postponed as a result of the chaos caused at UK airports due to heavy snow. 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

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
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
