

We can stroll across golden sands, take shelter in beautiful woodlands and feed ourselves from an ocean teeming with fine fish, succulent sea vegetables and the giant radioactive lobsters from Cap De La Hague. Mother Nature loves us all, and I write today to show you how to love her back.

t might seem unnecessary to advise people to respect our natural world, but it saddens me to learn that we have wandered far so from our earthy roots. We have lost touch with the planet, like a caged panda who eats nothing but Dairylea Lunchables and can't remember how to get an erection any more. The headland at Noirmont has several habitats, including woodland, heathland and cliffs and is well worth a visit. Park in the car park halfway between the farm and the end of the road.

round the car park look out for the tall spikes of figwort with its curious small red-brown flowers. Take the path on the left and follow it until you reach a chain link fence – if you use the chimney at La Collette as your guide you can't go wrong. You will notice large bare areas where the invasive holm oak trees have been cut down to encourage the area to return to heathland.

At the fence you can turn left to go through the woodland or right to walk across the heath. Both ways can be walked in a loop to lead back to the car

There are several tree species including oak, sycamore, pine, silver birch, sweet chestnut and cherry. You may see jays in the trees. They are beautifully coloured mainly cream with blue patches on their wings - but they are as cruel as magpies and other members of the crow family, stealing baby birds and eggs from their nests. They love acorns and will bury them to keep for later. Red squirrels live in the trees too. If you don't spot them climbing and leaping you will certainly find the chewed pine cones they leave on the ground.

As you walk through the woods you will notice the fence is festooned with ivy and honeysuckle. The honeysuckle flowers later here in the cool shade than on the heath. Speckled wood butterflies often flit along the paths, perfectly camouflaged in the dappled shade and sunlight.

Foxgloves grow beside the path – they are biennial which means they only produce leaves the first year and then the purple flowering spike a year later. They are very poisonous as they contain the drug digitalin which is used medicinally to treat heart disease.

The yellow flowers of gorse are present all year round. Legend has it that kissing is out of fashion when the gorse is not in bloom - but of course it always has at least a few flowers! Smell the flowers - they smell of coconut. On a hot dry day you can hear the pods popping open to scatter the seeds. Some of the gorse bushes are covered in weak red stems of a parasitic plant, dodder, which feeds on the sap of the gorse. Our word doddery comes from this plant.

Walking across the heath you will see that the main plants are heather – both ling and bell heather - and bracken. The bracken is quite invasive and attempts to control it with pigs have been tried. There are also stands of blackberry and gorse which provide cover for green lizards and small mammals. Gorse is also an essential plant for one of our rare birds, the

Dartford warbler. In spring and summer, swifts fly over the heath catching insects to feed their young. They spend nearly their whole life in the air, even drinking on the wing, only touching down when nesting. Come Autumn they will be gone on the long journey to Africa.

Bluebells grow on the open ground as the growing bracken provides shade and keeps their bulbs cool in summer just as trees do in woodland. Red campion is also common - look for the pale pink flowers which are hybrids with white campion.

Look out for elder trees - their large saucer-shaped heads of creamy-white flowers are unmistakable in early summer. They have a very strong scent and are used to make elderflower cordial or wine. Elder trees like nitrogen - rich soil and so often grow where humans lived in the past and can be a sign of an ancient habitation. In autumn the purple-black berries are much appreciated by the birds.

Other plants to look out for are briar rose, common centaury and the rare spotted rock rose. Blue and copper butterflies are commonly seen, feeding on the nectar of the abundant plants.

Before you head back to the car, take time to appreciate the stunning views across to St Helier.




A Chinese farmer has given his chickens specially made glasses to stop them fighting.



## Your baby looks like a monkey\*

There was some great Durrell news a few months ago, as keepers at the wildlife park announced the birth of a healthy male black lion tamarin. The baby, born on 22nd March, represents a great achievement for the conservation charity as this is the first black lion tamarin baby to have been successfully bred outside of Brazil in the last eight years.

Commenting on this exciting news Mark Brayshaw, Head of Durrell's animal collection said "This birth is great news; monitoring and successfully delivering the baby has been a very tricky event to manage. Predicting when the infant would be sufficiently developed yet intervening prior to natural parturition has been key and has involved dedicated input from the mammal team with lots of early mornings and late nights to monitor progress."

There are currently nine critically endangered black lion tamarins, including the new baby, at Durrell's headquarters in Jersey. In 1999 the Durrell team reached a crucial stage in the species' recovery programme, when a group of black lion tamarins trained in woods at the Trinity wildlife park were returned to Brazil for reintroduction to the wild.

This baby has been named Francisco after the Head of Durrell's Veterinary Department who delivered him. He is the first healthy baby born to new mum Roxanne, who has previously lost two babies and suffered several miscarriages. Due to her previous problems the decision was made to monitor her four and a half month pregnancy carefully and to deliver the baby by caesarean

section at the appropriate time.

At the park, all of Durrell's tamarins have been trained to sit on scales so that they can be weighed remotely. Roxanne had also been trained to allow keepers to monitor her by ultra-sound through the enclosure mesh. This was done almost every day for a few months with a fake ultrasound device, meaning that when she did fall pregnant the team could check the development of the foetus without her being anesthetised

So far both mother and baby are doing well. The infant is being hand-reared and syringe fed every two hours throughout the day and night and over the next few weeks they will slowly teach him to lap milk from a dish and when he is able to do this successfully he can be returned to his family.

Fed up with finance? Are you tired of looking after other people's money? Do you find you're colleagues can be real sharks? Then why not try swimming with them instead?...



This might not be exactly what I asked myself five years ago before leaving my illustrious career as a senior trust officer to once again become a good for nothing drain on the tax payer's pocket and study marine biology at Aberystwyth University, but I'm sure it went something like that.

Now being a student at the age of 30 may have raised a few eyebrows at the time but those same eyebrows raise even higher when they find out what it led to; 'Hi, my name is Gareth and I bother sharks for a living', as my friends like to put it.

I am in fact a science researcher with the Marine Conservation Society Seychelles (MCSS) whale shark programme, about to embark on a PhD employing a laser photogrammetric system I made to accurately measure free swimming sharks with the hope of developing the first achieved size growth model based on a wild population... In other words, I get to fire freakin' laser

beams at freakin' sharks! Dr Evil, eat your heart out.

As an organisation, the MCSS has been collating much needed information about the largest yet one of the least understood fish in the sea for over 10 years now and has one of the biggest databases anywhere in the world. Yet we still have very little idea where they come from, where they go, how fast they grow, how they breed, how often and as a result how well can they recover from the overfishing caused by the fairly recently created (although now largely prohibited) trade in tofu shark (fried whale shark meat).

Whale sharks are currently listed as 'threatened' on the IUCN red list and could really do with your help. If you are interested in getting involved you can visit the MCSS website and BlogSpot below for information about donating, adopting or even applying for a position as an intern in the programme itself... That's how I got started.

Hold back your gasps ladies (and 1 guy in 10), the RNLI lifeguards are due to start safety patrols on Jersey's beaches this month. Thankfully they were put through their paces last month with three weeks of intensive training.

The charity's specific training includes; advanced casualty care, a bespoke RNLI first aid course recognised by the Royal College of Surgeons, rescue theory and practice, radio procedures and a variety of equipment specific training and qualifications.

All lifeguards applying to work for the Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI) apply with an internationally recognised lifeguard qualification, and must pass a rigorous fitness test before they are formally accepted onto the RNLI's training programme which ensures all RNLI lifeguards start the season with the same standard of training.

They new beachboys also did some training with the volunteer lifeboat crews at the two RNLI lifeboat stations on the Island at St Helier and St Catherine, enhancing safety around Jersey's coastline.

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#### THE NATURE OF **S**RI **L**anka

As I write this, I am sat in the high mountains of Sri Lanka. I'm looking out of the bedroom window watching the mist settle within the crevices of the mountain tops; upon the white temples and houses surrounded by greenery beyond my tea-leaf filled garden. The window I peer through isn't one of an ordinary hotel, though; I've been given the opportunity to not only come on holiday to Sri Lanka but stay with a Sinhalese family in the beautiful, small town of Haputale.



If that isn't fantastic enough, throughout the time I'm spending here (just under a month) I will be visiting various parts of the island country, such as Trincomalee, Kandy, Sigiriya and Pollonarruwa. So, what better to talk of when it comes to nature? This is what I've perceived of beautiful Sri Lanka so far...

#### **T**HE **N**ATURE OF THE **P**EOPLE

I could summarise this in three short words: kind, gentle and calm. It took some locals a while to overcome the shock of the blonde hair and blue eyes walking through the villages but, as a whole, the people are warm and welcoming. In the mountains there are locals walking up and down the hills all day, tending to their every day work or just walking with their children - perhaps even walking the cattle that so casually stroll across the roads (calm, like the people). The colourful saris and dresses worn by the Sri Lankan women put my floral jumpsuits to shame. Having also visited Galle on the south coast of Sri Lanka, I see that the only difference between the people here and towards the edge of the land is that there are far more of them, bustling down the streets, greeting friends or family or simply selling their fish or spices. If busy streets full of shops and markets are your thing, Galle is a good place for you to visit. Yet, in saying this, it's also a lovely place to go in order to relax in a hotel or guest house on the beach and spend your days sunbathing and swimming in the warm sea. It was quite surreal to know I was traveling across the exact land that the Boxing Day tsunami had so devastated but uplifting to see how much had been rebuilt and turned back into a beautiful holiday spot, sustaining its cultural atmosphere.

#### NATURE. ITSELF

Where do I begin? Traveling down the mountain presents a huge array of tall green trees and grassy land framing the small towns perched on its edges. The weather is unpredictable (and when I say unpredictable, I don't mean cloudy to sunny like Jersey). Being high up on the mountain means that the sun isn't always scorching (which isn't a problem and quite refreshing) but it is often warm and strong. Some days I might wake up and see that the lowering mist shows only the close mountains ahead of me but other days the risen clouds allow me to see mountains far away and 'the sleeping giant' that lies in the distance. The weather can change in seconds from bright sunshine to monsoon rain and a tropical thunder storm but to me, it's all part of the experience; the sunbathing can be saved for the touristic places, like the hotel I'll be staying in in Trincomalee. Down in Galle (more than 6 hours drive away from Haputale) the sun is amazingly hot and the palm trees rarely sway in any wind other than the refreshing breezes that sometimes come by. Galle is certainly the place for a suntan.

There are so many special things about Sri Lanka that I've discovered; the people, the climate, the landscape. Also, I think it's an extra special experience to be staying in Haputale while still being able to explore Sri Lanka and travel across its vast land. I am lucky enough to see so many of the 19.9 million people that live here.

PS. You won't taste tea like this anywhere else! Also, if you're tall, like me, avoid the low doorways...

# David Priddis... Another Day in Paradise




If you draw a straight line across the vast expanse of the Indian Ocean, from Zanzibar on the far left, to the Maldives on the extreme right, somewhere in the middle rests the only land for thousands of miles around: the Seychelles.

emote and inconspicuous, the Seychelles archipelago appears as a mere speck on Google Earth. It's only when you zoom in closer that a few of the 115 islands and atolls that constitute the Republic become visible. And here, in this tropical paradise famed for honeymoons and idyllic beachy backdrops, a lucky Jerseyman has been based for the past year.

David Priddis, 31, is experiencing the daily challenges of living and working abroad in a place that would make most city dwellers (and presumably his alumni from Hull University) rather jealous. No stranger to travel, he has immersed himself into the local culture and made many friends along the way. David once overlanded from Jersey to Cape Town in his Land Rover (blogging and uploading photos on www.walkabout2408.com), and now that his overseas contract is almost over, David plans yet another overland adventure; driving with friends crossing Russia, Mongolia, China, SE Asia and Malaysia, Indonesia, East Timor and down to Australia. But that's another story...

Back on Mahé, the main island of the Seychelles, David's feet have been planted firmly on the ground for a while - not least because the island is four hours' flying time from the nearest hub (generally Dubai or Jo'burg as connections to Kenya are infrequent) but also because the cost of travel between islands is prohibitive. Anyway, he is here primarily to work ... and as Mobile Engineering Manager, the responsibility of rolling out a new 3G network while improving the existing 2G telephony service, has resulted in some rather lengthy days. As manager, David is in charge of the mobile team and his projects often involve travel to the other islands and arranging the helicopter airlifts to get equipment to the more remote regions. Add the logistical problems of conducting business where the pace of life is slower than St Ouen's, and you can imagine his occasional bouts of frustration.

So far, he has visited all the main islands including Praslin, (home of the double coconut that resembles a woman's buttocks - the "Coco de Mer") and the peaceful island of La Digue, where the there is no motorised transport – a tropical version of Sark perhaps? The terrain in the Seychelles is made up of granite mountains and hills, sandy beaches, coral reefs, and verdant flora. The year-round warm weather ensures the sea temperature hovers between 26 - 29C and there are no cyclones, so David has been able to maintain his passion for sports whenever spare time has permitted. On land, he has kept up his penchant for running and hiking and has climbed some adventurous trails up into the lush terrain of the mountains. Having scaled Mount Kilimanjaro and trekked up to Mount Everest Base Camp a few years ago, David is always eager to reach another summit. In the sea, he has kayaked and scuba dived in some fantastic locations over the past few months. He lists canoeing among his interests and has even kayaked down the Yukon River (460 miles). As a PADI member, David raves about diving in the Seychelles; its underwater mountain range and unspoilt reefs teeming with colourful and prolific marine life rank high on the list of the world's most exciting dive spots.

After a hard day's work, an ice-cold beer is always welcome. He says the local beer 'SeyBrew' is an excellent drop. It's actually a lager brewed with imported malt and hops and has won international acclaim, good enough to top some 500 competitors. Another coup for the Seychelles, then! As sociable as folk go, the locals here are renowned for their hospitality, and David says he will have many fond memories of the incredible places he has been shown by the Seychellois when the time comes for him to leave.

For the first time since we have been away, our three musketeers were forced to separate due to Jo's susceptibility to getting gigantic mosquitoes bites that were already becoming infected.


You see, Laos's main attraction for travelers is the renowned 'tubing' which goes on in VangVieng. The VangVieng river is pretty damn scummy, and if you go tubing, you are guaranteed that any cut you have WILL get infected. Jo decided she would give it a miss to prevent further infection and/ or amputation, and move on ahead of us. So, myself and Niema had a little Laotian honeymoon on our hands instead.

After leaving our home in Sihanoukville, we travelled to Laos by bus from Siam Reap, where the famous and beautiful Angkor Wat resides: and if you're not a temple person it's still amazing as it's where our good friend Angelina ran around adorned in her Ms. Croft gear - yes, it was the set for Tomb Raider. The temples have huge trees sprouting from inside them like the infamous Kraken from Pirates of the Caribbean, the roots look exactly like its huge tentacles, forcing their way with brute strength through the hundreds of years old rock. The heat when we were in Ankgor Wat was stifling, by 9am it was already hitting 35 degrees so you can imagine how hot it was at midday. After yet another bus journey, we arrived in Laos, and were glad to have a little bit of rain and a few degrees cooler which meant that we could actually venture out in the daytime without fainting. We made the long journey to the 'four thousand islands' the south-most point of Laos. These islands are not surrounded by sea. but instead by the Mekong River. Long tail boats are the only transport there from or to the mainland, most of them being carved by out of trees by families so they are literally hollowed out trunks with a motor attached and steered with a bamboo pole. The lifestyle here is extremely lazy, and there are no ATMs or hospitals on the island, the only transport is pedal bikes or the odd motor if you are lucky enough to locate one. All the questhouses have outside toilets. and an abundance of hammocks hung on every available branch (for times when tiredness overtakes you and you're not at home). The accommodation is around £1 a night in the Islands, which is something we hadn't experienced since India, so it was a welcome treat! The four thousand islands were very beautiful and perfect for a bit of rehab, but there is very little to do there.

We soon realized that we actually wanted to get back on the travel wagon and stop sleeping in their oh-so-appealing hammocks, so we caught a twenty-four hour bus trip, (that's right, 24 hours) up to VangVieng.

As we looked out of the steamy bus windows we saw four year old kids riding bikes three times their size, barely able to touch the pedals, with their mates balancing on any free bit of metal they could, grandparents sharing motorbikes whilst clutching umbrellas to shelter themselves from either the sun or the rain, and jeeps with cages welded to the back with sardine-packed travelers hanging onto the bars (vaguely resembling the child catcher from Chitty Chitty Bang Bang). Arriving in VangVieng we immediately realized what we had gotten ourselves into. There was nobody over the age of 30, everyone dressed in various coloured wife-beaters imprinted with the tubing emblem, carrying buckets, and strung with neon-coloured waterproof bags to protect all prized possessions from the treacherous Mekong River. In our first day in VangVieng two people had already died. Team rocks, zip wires and a lack of knowledge of the river with alcohol and it is inevitable, lots of travellers get badly hurt in the VangVieng. We were pretty scared when we heard that, but you've just got to make sure you don't go too crazy, and most of all listen to the locals. If you imagine a festival, with freshwater showers, spray paint, zip wires and rope swings, great music and sunshine, then that's VangVieng. It is incredible. Everyone takes out huge rubber donuts and floats down the river, stopping at whichever bar they choose (everyone will help to pull you in), covers themselves in spray paint, partakes in copious amounts of beer bongs, and then by 8pm everything is closed and everyone is tucked up in bed. After enjoying the Oreo shakes, and bars which play endless episodes of Family Guy and Friends, munching on the Chicken, Bacon and Cheese baguettes, we had to prize ourselves away from the M50 (the local Red Bull substitute they put in the buckets) and go do some travelling. 'Out of the bucket and back on the track' like my Dad told me, so we took his advice, and journeyed up to the beautiful and breathtaking Luang Probang.

Luang Probang is a sleepy French-style village that would be perfect for a holiday destination; it is quaint and small with tons



As a whole Laos is not as touristy as Thailand, but not as backpacker-filled as Vietnam, yet when we went to VangVieng we did see a glimpse of what it would turn into in a few years. It is funny how much places can change in such a short amount of time, how built up they can get. For example, we have just come back to Thailand to get our open water qualifications, and already the prices have gone up since we were here just three months ago! So now that we are all qualified Scuba divers, off we go to Indonesia to explore the dive sites, the jungle and hopefully catch ourselves a few orangutans!

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
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# Port Out, Starboard Home Via Jersey Nine cruise ships, including a personal favourite of Her Majesty the Queen, will be visiting the Island this summer.



ebridean Princess will be making a two-day visit on Thursday 4 and Friday 5 August, as part of her annual UK, French and Channel Islands cruise programme. Boasting 30 luxury cabins and carrying just 50 guests, the ship has a reputation for exceptional service, fine food and wine. She has previously been chartered by Her Majesty the Queen for several private family cruises, including celebrations to mark the 60th birthday of HRH Princess Anne, the 50th birthday of HRH Prince Andrew and her own 80th birthday in 2006.

The visit by this Royal favourite is just one of a growing list of cruise activity Jersey can look forward to in 2011. This year's programme includes a return two-day visit by the World cruise ship in August as well as the inaugural visit of Regent Cruises luxury vessel Seven Seas Voyager. Often billed as one of the best in the world, she is an all-suite, all-balcony ship with a capacity for 700 guests and offers luxurious voyages to more than 300 ports on all seven Continents. As part of a ten-night 'Celtic Charms' cruise around the British Isles, Jersey will be her last port of call on Thursday 18 August 2011.

P&O's latest premium cruise ship, *Adonia*, with a capacity for 710 guests, will arrive in Jersey on Monday 25 July as part of its inaugural cruise season, while the small liner, *Ocean Nova* will launch Jersey's 2011 cruise season with a return visit to the Island this Friday 13 May.

Later this summer, Jersey will welcome two German-owned cruise ships. The five-star *Hanseatie* will be moored in Island waters on Thursday 8 September as part of its 'Ancient Europe' Cruise, which sees Jersey as its first port of call. Its sister ship, *Breman* will conclude Jersey's 2011 cruise programme with a half-day visit on Tuesday 4 October 2011.

Port of Jersey believes the increase in the number of cruise ships visiting our waters comes as a direct result of the work it has undertaken in recent years to promote the Island as a cruise destination at many of the large cruise travel trade events in the UK.

Furthermore, Commercial Director for Port of Jersey, Myra Shacklady is an active member of 'Cruise Britain', a group of ports and destinations, which works collectively to encourage and promote cruising around the UK. She has represented the Island at a number of key industry events, including the ACE UK Cruise Convention in Southampton last June.

Myra Shacklady said, 'Cruise vessels of these types, while not particularly large in size, do attract high calibre and high spending passengers, many of who will take advantage of Jersey's attractions, shops and restaurants when they come ashore, bringing in noticeable additional business. With the possibility of welcoming up to 2,700 cruise passengers this summer it looks a very promising cruise programme for 2011. 

#### JERSEY SOCIETY OF ARTISTS **50TH ANNIVERSARY**

An exhibition of work that celebrates the 50th Anniversary of the Jersey Society of Artists that was founded in 1961 by Mrs Nancy McCarthy, a prolific and versatile painter who had taught Art at the Jersey College for Girls during the German Occupation.

An important feature of the Society has always been its mix of amateur and professional artists, among the most notable being Sir Francis Cook R.I. in whose Gallery the Society now has its permanent studio space. Initially there were 15 members in the Society, but it has since developed and grown and now has a membership of 170 local artists

The exhibition is held at the Sir Francis Cook Gallery and will display the work of different members from over the past 50 years up to and including the present day, with eminent painters such as Edmund Blampied, Sir Fred Sands, David Henly and Gerald Palmer.

The aim of the exhibition is to demonstrate the depth and breadth of the Society's activities over the past 50 years as well as provide an opportunity for the public to view the permanent display of Sir Francis Cook's paintings housed at the Gallery.

### Green Lantern

hen Iron Man took \$102 million on its opening weekend, DC Comics (Home of Batman and Superman) must have cast an envious look across at their biggest competitors. Launching Marvel Studios was a gigantic risk for a company that didn't have the backing of a mega conglomerate and found its biggest names (Spider-Man and The X-Men) tied up in deals with other studios. Yet, the risk paid off when Tony Stark brought in the same kind of receipts as his better-known rivals.

Things have changed since then. Marvel now have the backing of Disney's money and since Iron Man have worked hard to build a cohesive movie universe with The Incredible Hulk, Iron Man 2, Thor and next month's Captain America. The studio has had a master plan all building to these heroes joining forces in 2012's The Avengers. Since then DC have of course given us Christopher Nolan's The Dark Knight and Watchmen but their only other offering was the truly abysmal Jonah Hex. They have the backing of Warner Brothers – how have they failed to exploit the rest of their back catalogue? Why have they continued to watch as Marvel Studios dominates the superhero film landscape?

Hal Jordan is the Green Lantern of sector 2814. He is part of a larger corps assembled by The Guardians of the Universe to act as an intergalactic police force. Their weapon is an incredibly powerful ring that can only be worn and controlled by those with great willpower and the ability to overcome fear. The film will tell the story of how test pilot Jordan came to receive his ring from the dying alien Abin Sur and his induction into the corps and training with the greatest of the lanterns Sinestro. It also promises epic Earth action as the battle comes to us as Jordan fights the deranged super villain Hector Hammond. Basically there's going to be plenty of action as well as set-up for further tales exploiting the rich myths of the Green Lanterns. The galaxy wide scale of Star Wars combined with elements of the super-hero and the police film. The components are in place for something special.

A film combining so many elements needs a true blockbuster director to balance them out. Martin Campbell certainly has the experience for this kind of job. Not only was he behind the camera for two of my favourite Bond films (Casino Royale, Goldeneye) but he also helmed The Mask of Zorro. Much like Zorro, Hal Jordan is a swashbuckler not averse to dropping one-liners or doing a bit of flirting mid battle. Like Tony Stark he's a hero you'd actually want to hang out with and for this they've gone to the ultimate actor you'd want to hang out with - Ryan Reynolds. I've made clear my love for Reynolds in print, song and poetry before. He's proved himself capable of comedy, action and drama and this marks his third comic book film. In my mind there's no one more suited to the role. Rounding out the cast are Blake Lively, Peter Sarsgaard and Mark Strong. Again cast and crew look like they have the mix of experience and ability to make something special.

With current Green Lantern writer Geoff Johns on as producer and a team of screenwriters who've worked in comics there's even the key ingredient of fidelity to the source material. With the ability to put together such a product it becomes even more of a wonder that DC has failed to keep track with Marvel over these last couple of years. Maybe the worry is that outside the world of fandom people won't know their Green Lantern from their Blue Beetle. People will question if there is the level of awareness needed for a summer tent-pole. In this case maybe DC need to look to their rivals at Marvel Studios. Iron Man is somewhat of a modern day icon but before his film he was around the same level as Green Lantern. They took the risk and gained the reward. The question is can the same feat be achieved here?

The corps are all about overcoming fear and by bringing this story to the screen it seems like DC's film division have finally done that. Now if Lantern can deliver and those holding the purse strings can do the same we might see a truly epic battle. The Avengers vs. The Justice League... at the Box Office.

#### Also Show...



DreamWorks presents Kung Fu Panda 2 chopping its way into theatres this month. The original was a genuine treat with the level of both humour and heart that has pretty much become Pixar's trademark. The great thing about the original is not just that it does these things so well but that it really nails the action side. The makers of this film clearly

have a deep love of the kung fu genre and as a result Po (Jack Black) and his Furious Five don't pull any punches. The trailer suggests that everything here has been multiplied and scaled up - more action, bigger scope and 3D. There have been many 3D disappointments since Avatar but this is one film that makes lots of sense. Just don't try and wax the panda.



Brazilian born Spanish defensive midfielder and European Cup winner Senna is finally getting the documentary made about him that he so richly deserves. Senna will detail his journey from journeyman to star of the... that's not him? Who? Apparently this documentary is actually about the Brazilian racecar driver of the same name who many

consider to be the greatest racer of all time as he won three world titles before his tragic death at the age of 34. Bafta winner Asif Kapadia is behind the camera so expect a little more depth than Fast & The Furious (OH GOD WHY!?) 5.

First is Bridesmaids produced by Judd Apatow, directed by Paul Feig and starring my new favourite actress Kristen Wiig. this story of a hen party gone wrong (or right depending on how you look at it). The female hangover?



### Success from every Angle

Tri-Angle Records is on one hell of a roll. Like a majestic football team that effortlessly strings together a run of victories, each one stunning in its own right, the label's output so far has been a jaw-dropping collection of blissed out pop to triumphant hip-hop instrumentals. Founded by Robin Carolan in 2010, the thread that is seen to link all the Tri-Angle artists, is a desire to emulate commercial hip-hop and pop in their bedrooms with their own, much more rudimentary gear. In an interview with Wire magazine, Carolan described some of the tracks released on Tri-Angle as "ghosts of pop songs."

The first official release on the label was the debut "See Birds" EP from 19 year-old producer Alec Koone, who records under the moniker Balam Acab. Looking back through Koone's earlier work this idea of spectral hip-hop and pop becomes clearer. Under the name Etherea, Koone transformed Snoop Dogg's "Drop it Like It's Hot" into a eerie, expansive soundscape, where Snoop's vocals float over as if performing from some parallel universe. On "Love Remains" the debut LP from How To Dress Well, the same process appears to have been applied. this time producing ambient reincarnations of lush R&B. It's a beautifully, slow burning record that swallows you up in amongst the dark twists and turns.

The work of new Tri-Angle signing, Clams Casino aka Michael Volpe, will be familiar to fans of the likes of Lil B or Soulja Boi. Clams Casino is the man behind the controls for some of the best new hip-hop instrumentals and like his fellow Tri-Angle artists; his production is shrouded in a shadowy haze, with vocals samples breathlessly flowing between the beats. There's also an uplifting radiance about the tracks best showcased by the sundrenched swagger of "Motivation". Knowing that some of the best new rappers like Lil B and Main Attraktionz

are using these instrumentals makes the future of hip-hop look ever brighter. Volpe has said that he loses track of the artists he sends his work to, often only hearing the final version months later. But with his own "Rainforest" EP dropping on June 27th, courtesy of Tri-Angle, Clams Casino is killing it.

Since the release of Kode9's last album, 2006's "Memories of the Future", dubstep has been given such an extensive makeover that it's barely recognizable from the expansive sound that once donned the moniker. Founding the esteemed Hyperdub label in 2004, Kode9 has been at the forefront of UK bass music, with the label responsible for releasing the seminal Burial records as well as spectacular albums from the likes of The Bug, Zomby and King Midas Sound. With "Memories of the Future", Kode9 and vocalist Spaceape forged vast, dystopian soundscapes with a potent doses of sub-bass, yet on new album "Black Sun" the steady evolution in the sound of Kode9 and Hyperdub as a label is clear to see. Taking aspects from his more recent singles, "Black Sun" is instantly less dark, more dance. From the shifting synths on "Love is The Drug" to the high-tempo stabs of "Bullet Against the Bone", much of this record is more suited for the dance floor rather than dystopia. Yet the intensity felt on "Memories of the Future" still remains, in the large part thanks to the commanding vocals of the Spaceape resonating through the tracks, adding a sinister edge to "Neon Red Sign" or grabbing "Am I" by the scruff of the neck and hurling it down its frenetic path. While maybe not the magnum opus that some expected from Kode9, "Black Sun" is a shining example of one of the UK's best producers at work.

As the typical hallmarks of the approaching summer have already arrived (longer days, higher temperatures, Pitbull somehow being allowed back on the radio), it seems appropriate to cast a look towards the line-up news for Jersey Live 2011. It's a tough job booking Jersey Live, especially when the festival has become such a massive date on the Jersey calendar that if you were brought up on the island, you're more than likely to see half the people you grew up with in the crowd. It's probably too early to pass full judgement on the bands booked

to play the main stage (although I'm sure the kids are hyped for Madness and The Beat), though some comment can be passed with regards to the Dance Tent. Credit where credit's due, Mr Oizo and Toddla T are brilliant bookings, but you've got to wonder about the others. Why Zane Lowe has been booked to play the Dance Tent beggars belief while Nero and Danny Byrd ensure representation for the creatively stagnant. Sasha has also been booked to play, though one of the top progressive house DJs in the world, it's a sub-genre that's become all the more irrelevant, highlighted by the fact that he hasn't released anything since 2008. It seems that there a much greater tendency to look back rather than forward when it comes to booking artists, this has also been the cases with bands at the festivals. Last year both The View and The Magic Numbers were booked, much to no one's surprise they were still distinctly average. It's most disappointing when looking at the Dance Tent when you consider how the UK scene is currently the envy of the world. Maybe the remaining slots for the Dance Tent will prove me wrong, but when you've got phenomenal DJs like the Hessle Audio, Night Slugs and Numbers crews making names for themselves around the world, it's confusing to see them left out.
















# It's Oh So

kay, I'll admit it – I'm a man, and as any man watching television adverts involving Kylie shooshing the camera whilst suggestively pouting her lips, I pretty much instantaneously manage to lose track of what is being advertised altogether, and as such was quite surprised at how Lexus' new CT200h looks away from the screen.

It's surprisingly squat and low, yet seated inside you get the feeling of sitting up pleasantly high with a commanding view of the road ahead, even if you lower the seat as much as physically possible. It's as if they've employed some kind of voodoo magic, because it doesn't make sense, but is definitely a good thing. Even the passengers in the back will be happy with the again surprising amount of headroom from a car that looks as if it's about two feet tall. The rear seats also fold entirely flat to provide the extra space when required, and as much as the boot seems shallow, the boot floor hinges to allow large suitcases to be stacked inside with ease and without having to sacrifice the rear seating.

Lexus have dubbed this the 'world's first full hybrid luxury sports compact', which strikes me as saying that you're the world's first jazz dubstep indie rock & roll violinist, a genre so obscure that nobody is really talking about it yet. But then Toyota, who own Lexus, have been championing and pioneering hybrid technology from the start so maybe I should afford them some glory after all.

Inside, you are cocooned in an almost space-aged and yet contemporary cockpit and encased in the comfort of leather which manages to avoid looking kitsch despite its futuristic edge. Heated, of course - this is a luxury car after all. Positioned behind the chunky yet soft leather steering wheel you

can take control of pretty much anything the car has to offer using voice commands which, as twee as it sounds, actually proved incredibly useful on the test drive - much like how you may think you don't need an iPhone in your life yet once you get one, living without it would be a struggle. Add to that a tilting video screen to allow all manner of features including navigation, climate control, audio settings and a lovely visual showing you just what's happening with the engine, batteries and electric motor if that's your bag. It's all controlled by a surprisingly easy to use and very Nineties-revival joystick mouse in the centre console that can easily be operated by either driver or passenger, but don't let this put you off if you're a technophobe as there are still the knobs and buttons you're used to for altering the air conditioning or radio station as well. Phew!


Peering through the rear windows you couldn't be blamed for feeling an air of almost overwhelming panic as you attempt to parallel park as they're quite small. Lexus have this covered though, thanks to parking sensors and a reversing camera, not to mention the nothing short of phenomenal turning circle. Parking has never been easier.

I wouldn't be at all surprised if this car is just as quick as a certain other Japanese manufacturer's sporty hybrid model, but with the added benefit of a bit of luxurious opulence. Could this be having your cake and eating it too? Power delivery between the engine and electric powerplants is as seamless as it is effortless and if you're feeling naughty, a twist of the centre console mounted knob sees you in sport mode, transforming the accelerator from a sponge into a crisp and responsive tool as well as changing the power reserve gauge into a tachometer. You needn't fret about the tropical rainforests too much though, as you can relax safe in the knowledge that even when in sport mode the KERS regenerative braking system will be recharging the

batteries when you come to slow down. Of course, twist it the other way and you can select 'Electric Vehicle' mode, forcing it to use only electronic power up until around 30mph. Polar bears are now your best friends.

Crucially, the CT200h just feels like a perfectly normal car to drive despite being crammed full of technology, which is an area in which Lexus have really cracked. They don't want you to drive it differently, to think that the hybrid technology is a gimmick or allow it to become invasive - come 2015 all Lexus models will be hybrids, and although the ecological debate rages on it surely can't be long before every new vehicle is a hybrid. It's all about striking the correct balance.

Restaurant Review: Merchant House Brasserie

Ah, summer food. It's a fact food tastes better outdoors\*, and if you're dreaming about long romantic suppers on a vine-covered terrazza somewhere, you don't have to book those lastminute. com flights to Sicily... chic courtyard dining right in the centre of town is the order of the day at the Merchant House Brasserie.

You've probably noticed the outside bar in Jersey Museum's pretty courtyard, where you can sit under leafy vines and sip a glass of wine or two or settle back with an ice-cold Magners or Peroni next to the trickling fountains. Al fresco but still secluded – it's the perfect summer evening town drinking spot. But make your way past the chic lounge furniture and lavender-lined paths though, and you'll discover there's more to the Museum than meets the eye.

The old Museum Brasserie cafe has been given a complete overhaul - new look, new team, new menus and a new name, the Merchant House Brasserie. Bringing in expertise from the Dolan group, who own the Somerville Hotel, the Golden Sands and the Cristina, the restaurant's been rebranded to look, well, more like a restaurant. With its claret and cappuccino-coloured walls, comfortable chairs and contemporary wood tables, it's got an urban continental sort of feel. It's a popular look - the restaurant team know the paint colour names off by heart after being asked about them so many times (Dulux's Rich



Burgundy and Leather Satchel in case you were wondering). There's an open kitchen, so you can watch your meal being plated up, and if you pick table 14, you get such a good view, you feel like you're in the middle of Masterchef. Without the tears and the tantrums of course, because the chef responsible for the Merchant House, Somerville's number two Steve Drummond, is a calm, softly-spoken Scot who brings a touch of serenity to the kitchen and saves all the punch for the flavours. His menu's a tasty collection of full-flavoured retro British classics with a modern twist; potted duck, pork belly, scallops, steak pudding and a hotpot or two. It's liplicking food, 'unpretentious' as the menu says, served with style but no snobbery. The prices are on the casual side as well with starters around £7 and most mains coming in at between £12 and £14. There are some good fish options, and an innovative vegetarian menu with choices that aren't just your normal risotto or ratatouille. Starter-

wise, you get a choice of some rather

tasty dishes, like the asparagus with soft poached egg, streaky bacon, wild mushrooms and hollandaise sauce. A delicious combination of flavours - soft, earthy and rich all at the same time, it's like a classier, carb-free version of eggs benedict. Another starter features local scallops, topped with a cheese mash, baked in their shell like a mini fish pie, and served with smoked bacon and wild mushrooms. Tasty? You bet. And thanks to their brand new 'pod bars' which keep opened bottles of wine absolutely fresh, the restaurant has a giant by-the-glass wine list with some excellent choices. No more squabbling over Merlot or Malbec, at the Merchant House Brasserie everyone can have a glass of exactly what they like. Which in our case was a rather rich gooseberryish New Zealand Sauvignon Blanc from Merchant House's wine suppliers, the award-winning Berry Bros. & Rudd. Haven't heard of them? Tut tut. Thankfully the wine menu has a helpful bit of blurb so you can find out all about Britain's oldest wine merchants, who also keep HRH's wine cellar topped up, don't you know....

Priced at over £10.00 per bottle they are not cheap but do represent excellent value.

Cabernet-Sauvignon is well structured with some cranberry notes on the nose followed by crunchy berries and a hint of oak on the palate.

Merlot is soft & rounded with some blackberry and plummy aromas and packed with berry flavours - pure varietal character.

The **Chardonnay**'s nose has pear and citrus which follow through to the soft creamy texture in the taste.

Snoqualmie Riesling has a spicy pear and apple aroma with some really ripe grapey flavours and hints of mineral; its off-dry style is elegant and captivating.

With an amazing variety of styles to choose from, there is an organic wine to please all tastes, so in the words of Joy Andersen "let nature take her course and then try to capture the natural essence of the vineyard in the bottle".



and a whole choice of mustards brought to your table. To wash it down, a glass of Berry's Good Claret - at £4.75 for 175ml, a bargain price for a very grown-up wine. My sea bass was pan-fried to perfection and came with a tangy tomato 'marmalade' and spinach and on the side, crispy salt-and-pepper scampi and a

Best picnic memory? Last year when all our family came over and we had a Latvian feast in Howard Davis park







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

The answer is probably 'no', as I stopped going to Glastonbury because I couldn't handle the mud, and more than 24 hours without my Tempur-foam space pillow makes me very upset. One man who would survive is Kazz Padidar, chief instructor for Jersev Adventures. An expert on foraging for wild food, building shelter and natural navigation - he's probably the closest thing Jersey has to Ray Mears. Kazz can help you navigate your way home from the Splash just by looking at the stars and, failing that, teach you how to build an overnight shelter inside a nearby bush.

With skills like these, Kazz is likely to be the overlord of any kind of tribal, Mad Max-style future for the Channel Islands. so I'm fortunate that he agreed to give me a crash course in bushcraft amidst the untamed wilderness of my home parish. Read on to discover how you too can survive on a bank holiday Monday when M&S has run out of Percy Pigs.

#### The wisdom of the Earth

As we were meandering through Les Mielles, alert for the sounds of prowling velociraptors, I asked Kazz to explain to me what bushcraft means to him. Pausing momentarily to lasso a bear, he

"I would describe bushcraft as our basic relationship with nature, and the ability to survive quite comfortably within it. Craft is not just foraging for food, the ability to identify plants and trees, but making things to survive - everything from string and snares to building your own shelter." I can't say I've ever had to fashion a home from twigs and leaves, but when you consider planning permission, high rents and the extortionate cost of groceries, there's a certain appeal to the idea of a woody one-bed and a diet of stewed bark with mushrooms. I asked Kazz why he thinks bushcraft skills are useful to modern people:

"With cities and towns getting bigger, people are too used to living with all these mod cons around them. We're getting further away from what's really natural: away from the fundamental relationship between man and nature. It's really important that people are able to reconnect with this, to know a little about their natural environment and everything that grows around them.

Just one example: I was taking kids out on a trip, and I pulled out a wild carrot, passed it to this kid and said 'try this' he said 'I'm not eating that, it comes from the ground!' Supermarket culture has taken over our diet. When people actually learn bushcraft, they can use it any time they want. You'll start seeing things everywhere - food might be growing out of the side of a wall, even growing at the side of the road."

#### Shelter built of leaves: J cat, no onward chain

In a departure from local traditions of home building, Kazz clearly prefers to work with nature, rather than obliterate it and end up on the front page of the JEP.

"I've built everything from one-man shelters to massive group shelters. At the moment I'm showing groups how to build an opentopped teepee with lean-tos made from long wooden poles. There's a fire in the central formation, and then everyone sleeps at the outside of the inner circle. The shelter is packed with up to a metre of leaf litter and branches, which ends up making it waterproof."

As a man clearly at home in the dense jungles of St Ouen, I asked Kazz how he would survive on the closest thing Jersey has to a storm-blasted, inhospitable wilderness, by which I mean the Ecrehous:

"Until someone comes to get you it's all about making traps and snares for sea creatures, trying to get as much fishing material as possible. You're going to have bits of line hanging around, I'd probably be able to make some kind of cord out of the local seaweed. Edible seaweeds around there would be amazing, shellfish would be amazing - on that diet alone you'd be fine for a while. Obviously fresh water would be a big issue - you'll be trying to get vessels to capture rainwater and condensation, even by simply laying a waterproof jacket in a cool crevice."

#### Bushcraft heroes: not Gillian McKeith

As his heroes, Kazz identifies Ray Mears and Kurt Hahn, a German refugee who fled the Nazis and helped establish the Outward Bound school. He also has a huge respect for Native American foragers and hunters, and points out how successfully tribal people around the world have lived off the land for thousands of years without harming it - unlike some locals I could mention.

As we emerged slowly back into what passes for civilisation in the west, I asked Kazz what he considers to be his essential bushcraft tools. Much like Crocodile Dundee, he recommends a good, sharp knife, as well as a fire steel for making sparks. You can easily buy these in town, but Kazz stresses that it is knowledge that's your most essential tool, especially knowledge of your local environment. Wise words indeed, I reflected, whilst contemplating a dinner of leaves, berries and a side order of curly fries from the Splash.

Just as we'd got used to the idea of Genuine Jersey pasta, made using local eggs, the clever folks at La Cantina have come up with Genuine Jersey rhea egg pasta. Yes, you heard us right. The rheas (similar to ostriches) are St John locals, and their eggs-ceptionally huge eggs are being used to create Genuine Jersey egg pasta. Equivalent to about 12 hens' eggs, one of these grapefruit-sized giants makes an awful lot of ravioli. But the La Cantina chefs have to work for your supper; they told us the super hard shell that can take the weight of a 70lb bird takes a lot of cracking... they have been known to take a drill to it. Eggs-troadinary.



#### Where the wild things are

Foraging's the latest foodie fashion, and here in Jersey it couldn't be easier to stuff your pockets full of really 'locally-sourced' food, from seafood to wild herbs. Some of the island's top chefs and foodies who love nothing more than a good old rummage in a hedgerow tell us how it's done.

#### Danny Moisan, Danny's Restaurant

Barbecued Razors with White Wine & Coriander

- · Razor fish still in the shell
- White wine (enough to splash)
- Chopped coriander
- · Juice of a couple of limes

Light a bbq and wait till it's very hot and the wood and coals have stopped smoking. Place the razors on the bbq and as they open, splash with white wine, the coriander and loads of lime juice. They'll only take four or five minutes to cook.

#### First catch your razor fish...

Wait for a very low tide, and head to the sandbanks on the right hand side of Seymour Tower. Walk over the sand and when you see a squirt of water pop up, dig down with a fork 6 inches behind it to find big fat succulent razor fish. Keep your catch in a bucket of seawater covered with fresh seaweed to keep the sun off them.





#### Marcus Calvani, La Cantina

Barbecued Local Scallops in the shell with Foraged Wild Garlic and Jersey Butter

- A hot BBQ (portable with a lid works fine too, or place an other disposable foil tray upside down to create a lid and trap in some of those delicious smoky flavours)
- Local fresh scallop in shell (cleaned but with roe attached)
- · Wild garlic leaf chopped into 5mm pieces
- · Generous knob of Jersey butter
- Splash of white wine or local cider, drink the rest of the bottle!
- · Pinch of breadcrumbs
- · Pinch of sea salt
- · Grind of black pepper

Place all the ingredients in the shell with the scallop, top the scallop with the breadcrumbs and place directly onto the BBQ rack. Wait until all the butter is bubbling and the scallop is cooked (about 5 mins / scallop meat will firm up slightly, become whiter & lose its translucent colour). Be careful not to lose the juices when picking up the shell for serving. Grab yourself some bread, dunk in the delicious juice and enjoy! Make as many as you like, about three for a starter and five for a main per person. You can also cook these under the grill.

#### Richard Allen, Tassili at Grand Jersey

Caramelised apples with vanilla cream, lavender honey and wood sorrel

- Double cream
- · Icing sugar
- Vanilla pod
- · One apple
- · Lavender honey
- Wood sorrel leaves

"Wood sorrel can be found around the banks and grasses approaching Bouley Bay and the best way to distinguish them from other small plants around is the three clover like leaves that are heart shaped and form a tiny umbrella that point towards the ground. The stems are tinted pink and the white flowers have a yellowish centre. Wood sorrel has a sharp lemon flavour and can be used in salads, is great with fish and even works really well with lamb."

Season the double cream with icing sugar until it is as sweet as you require then add the seeds from one vanilla pod, semi whip and place in the fridge. Peel and chop the apple roughly and cook in a frying pan on a moderate heat with no sugar or butter until the pieces start to caramelise in their natural juices. Add one tablespoon of lavender honey and cook for a further 20 seconds. Remove to a serving dish, leave to stand until just warm and pile on the vanilla cream. Drizzle with lavender honey and place a few of your freshly foraged wood sorrel leaves on top and dig in.



#### Tony Dorris, Chef / Director at Jersey Pottery

Clam Chowder with Crisp Chorizo and Parsley Dressing

- One medium white onion (peeled and chopped)
- Four rashers of smoked pancetta (cut into strips)
- · 500g peeled and finely diced potatoes
- 1kg clams (well ranged)
- 100ml white wine
- 200ml vegetable stock
- 100ml milk
- 50ml Jersey Dairy double cream
- Two garlic cloves
- Approx 15 finely chopped rosemary sprigs
- · 100g of chorizo sausage
- 50g of honey
- 1 cup of flat leaf parsley
- · The juice of half a lemon
- 75ml olive oil
- · salt and pepper

Heat a saucepan and add the pancetta. Cook until crispy and remove from the pan. Add the onions and garlic and cook without too much colour for a few minutes, then add the rosemary, white wine, potatoes and heat through. Meanwhile in another saucepan heat the vegetable stock and add the clams. When they've opened, remove from the heat and allow to cool. Add the stock to the white wine and potatoes mixture. Add the milk and cook until the potatoes are tender. Add the crispy pancetta, cream and season with salt and pepper and a touch of lemon juice. Slice the chorizo into slivers and brush with honey. Grill until they are caramelised.

For the parsley dressing place the parsley, olive oil and remainder of the lemon juice in the food processor and blitz. Season with salt and pepper.

Add the clams, sprinkle over the chorizo and drizzle the parsley dressing.



#### Foraged food what to find right now

#### Wild garlic

Try in... potato salad Use like parsley to add colour and flavour.

#### Mint

Great for... jelly Simmer leaves down to make jelly or infuse for wild mint tea.

#### **Dandelion**

Try in... scrambled eggs Eat the young tender leaves (before the dandelion flowers) in salads or chop into an omelette.

#### Watercress

Good for... soup Cook up the tender young leaves and it'll make a fortifying, vitamin-rich soup.

#### **Nettles**

Great in... lasagne Strip young top leaves from their stalks and boil up. The flavour and texture is similar to spinach.

#### Horseradish

Try in... sauce Scrub the roots, scrape, remove the woody inner core and grate the outer layer.





#### Food feast-ival





Food Festival

It was a case of 'food, fabulous food' last month for the launch of Jersey Tourism's first Food Festival, a week-long celebration of Jersey produce.

From clam-digging expeditions to charcuterie-making courses, sustainable fish suppers to sunset picnics of homemade sausages and local cider, the range of events on offer during Food Festival week was as varied as the island's produce itself

(see 'Cream of the Crop' below for a taster). The finale was the two-day food fair at Weighbridge Square; a 'feast-ival' of local produce along with cooking demonstrations, live music and plenty of local cider and ale.

Genuine Jersey's John Garton said 'It's a real celebration of Jersey food and hopefully a good foundation for an annual event that will be as popular with locals as it will be with visitors'.

And just to whet your appetite for next year's Food Festival, here's a taster of one of the behind the scenes tours – sampling local cheese at Manor Farm followed by a chef masterclass and a Michelin-starred lunch at The Atlantic Hotel.

#### Cream of the crop

#### The Atlantic Hotel Producer **Tour: Manor Farm**

Darren Quenault was up milking his herd of doe-eyed Jerseys first thing so by the time we arrived - still blinking after earlymorning coffee at The Atlantic Hotel, his day was almost halfway through.

The Quenaults run the island's only independent dairy, turning their herd's gloriously creamy organic milk into a range of dairy products from cream, ice-cream and yoghurt to award-winning soft cheeses. 'Jersey milk's high in butterfat so it's great for soft cheeses. but you can't make hard cheese out of it' explains Darren.

We sampled the cheeses and heard the tale of how a small dairy farm broke the island's milk monopoly with their hand-made range of products which have ended up on supermarket shelves and Michelin-starred menus. And from milk to meat, the farm's now breeding a Jersey Angus cross to provide local meat as well as rose veal, and pork from the farm's pigs. Manor Farm's products are second to none; their beef has the rich flavour of an Angus with all the tenderness of a grass-fed Jersey, and their milk tastes like milk used to. Try

some for yourself - their products are all on the shelves of their farm shop.

Then it was back to The Atlantic Hotel and a masterclass in preparing Classic Herd beef - from rib eve to fillet - with Chef Mark Jordan. Once we'd grasped the tricks of the trade, and watched Mark dismantle a lobster in record time, we settled down to a stunning locallysourced lunch of Jersey lobster and the beef we'd watched Mark prepare as well as a dessert of local strawberries with Jersey lavender and Classic Herd cream. And if that wasn't enough, each course was matched with a different organic wine, specially selected by Sommelier Sergio dos Santos. Learning about your island's food heritage never tasted so good.

area. The patio is decked with Brazilian ipe, a no-maintenance hardwood that will silver down to the same grey as the interior flooring, creating a seamless indoor and outdoor space. The terrace planting has been designed to create maximum impact with the minimum of maintenance, and with the exterior frames and pipework all in maintenance-free powdercoated aluminium, the property takes very little upkeep. For high-tech families, the home's been fitted with the latest smart technology all seamlessly wired in; a multi-room 'magic eye' Sky system and Lutron computerized lighting with a selection of different modes, and remote access to turn lights on and off while you're away. Next to the open plan living room is a modern sunroom with glass walls allowing you to soak up the sunshine and watch the landscape change through the day. There's also a large study on the ground floor, with an ensuite shower room so it could double up as an extra bedroom, and underfloor heating throughout the house to keep things warm when the weather turns cooler.



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
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# **nature** inspired exhibition



llocating space for allotments, installing owl boxes, and commissioning a Ian Rolls painting of the finished site wouldn't be common requests from developers, but then husband and wife team Jolyon and Annie Baker aren't your ordinary developers. With a background in film and theatre (you might have seen Jolyon in Bergerac, Morse and Wire in the Blood, amongst other things) and a passion for the rugged St Ouen's landscape, restoring Vinchelez Farm has been a chance to give a historic landmark building a new lease of life.

The structure of the farm was in place when the Bakers arrived, but turning it into liveable space took time and careful restoration with the help of their builders, Charles Le Quesne. Originally a cattle breeding centre, the central building that housed the milking parlour has been turned into apartments with a penthouse on the top floor, and the large barns have been converted into spacious family homes. There are just two left for sale, and with 2,000 square feet of living space and four bedrooms - two of them ensuite, these are certainly homes which give families room to breathe. Everything's generously proportioned, from the wide granite doorway - the original cattle barn entrance, to the expansive open plan living area and New England Shaker style kitchen with its family-size Aga Rangemaster. Nothing's been skimped on, the wood flooring is all solid oak, the joinery throughout the house is bespoke and the details are perfect. In the kitchen, the tiles are from Fired Earth, the butler sink is Villeroy & Boch and the worktops are all granite. There's a study on the ground floor, a cloakroom and a utility room, because as Jolyon explains "when you have open plan living space, it's always good to keep the noisy washing machines out of the way". A solid oak staircase leads upstairs, where there are four bedrooms - two ensuite, along with a house bathroom. The same attention to detail continues



upstairs with handbuilt wardrobes with sleek wooden hanging rails, reclaimed pewter handles, oversized showers and specially sourced designer bathroom furniture. Light floods in from the roof windows on either side - you can see the French coast from one side, and across to St Ouen's from the other. The property's covered with a zinc roof, insulated to an extremely high standard to ensure the home is cool in the summer and warm in the winter. And the granite walls are incredibly thick, with a triple skin and double cavities between houses, so although you have neighbours, you never have to hear them.

Outside, there's plenty of green space, with a front lawn and large private back garden – west-facing so it catches the evening sunset, along with a double garage, store and plenty of parking. "We feel it's important to give people amenity space" explains Jolyon. "And with the option for every resident to have their own allotment, you can really reconnect with the landscape and even grow your own vegetables if you want".

Staying true to the local environment has been a central theme in the redevelopment of Vinchelez Farm. When the Bakers discovered the original bell from the clock tower, they used it as the centrepiece for a unique fountain – strike it and it chimes gently through the shimmering water. The development's 'Percentage for Art' was an outdoor ampitheatre for nearby Les Landes School. "We built it out of earth, oak and stone donated by La Saline quarry and planted trees around it. It seats all the kids for sports day, and outdoor drama performances. It's a lovely organic thing".

But the real jewel in Vinchelez Farm's crown is the stunning penthouse. It's hard to believe that it was once the farm's water tank, only the slightly lower-than-normal windows give any hint that this building once had another identity. They've added to the character of the building, perfectly framing sea views from your sofa, and meaning you can watch the sun set over St Ouen's bay from the bed in the master bedroom... or from

the freestanding bath set right under the window in the ensuite bathroom. The property's styling turns country life chic; the open plan living area features a sleek cappuccino-coloured kitchen which comes complete with wine cooler fridge and high-tech Siemens appliances.

There's a second bedroom, and house bathroom with utility space for a washing machine, and a staircase that leads up to an incredible 1,000 square foot of roof terrace with breathtaking 360 degree views. On a clear day you can see all the way to the Ecrehous, and pick out Alderney, Sark, Guernsey and the French coast in the distance. And then of course there's St Ouen's bay. All of it. It gives new meaning to the description 'panoramic views'. And if you tire of tractor-spotting, you can always check out the birds... "there's a Marsh Harrier that flies past here every day," says Jolyon "and this is exactly the height they like to hunt at, so you can often see a hawk hovering right beside you". The floor's been reinforced to take a hot tub or small pool, and it would make the most incredible spot for roof-top parties.

It's also the best place to look down on the whole Vinchelez Farm development with its green spaces and patchwork strip of allotments. It's the aerial view that artist Ian Rolls has recreated with his painting of the development. "Vinchelez Farm has its own character," explains Ian, "Jolyon and Annie have carefully preserved that character and created a friendly rural community within the different units. The fact that they've commis-

sioned me to paint this picture shows it's a rather different development, and it's this sort of attention to detail that sets this place apart from others".

In the heart of the green lanes, yet just twenty minutes from town and with the St Ouen surf and an El Tico supper just a couple of minutes away, Vinchelez Farm is the perfect blend of country life and contemporary style. "I wanted to prove that it was possible to create a tasteful development that would have international architectural recognition but that would still stay true to the soul of Jersey" says Jolyon, and we think he's definitely succeeded.

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

# Jersey house prices continue flat trend in 2011

he average price of houses and flats sold in Jersey between January and March 2011 was broadly similar to the average for the whole of 2010, according to data released this month by the States of Jersey. This pattern continues a trend which set in during 2008, meaning that property values have on average remained remarkably stable for nearly three years now.

Going forward, the methodology applied to the production of the data has been changed to include an element of seasonal adjustment and the inclusion of Share Transfer purchases within the data.

Whilst including share transfer properties has reduced the level of the mix-adjusted mean property prices by around 8%, there are no significant differences in the annual or quarterly percentage price changes resulting from the inclusion of seasonality as a factor, according to the States of Jersey Statistics Unit.

Reviewing the data, Nigel Pascoe, Director of Lending for Skipton International, the Jersey mortgage specialists who reported buoyant lending during 2010 said, "This latest data continues a trend we can trace back to early 2008, meaning the Jersey market has ridden out the financial turbulence of the past few years remarkably well. Overall, the Jersey property market has delivered a level performance for around three years now, meaning homeowners have not seen the value of one of their major capital investments fall."

Within the data, the value of one and two bed houses and flats has barely changed for over thirty six months. Price volatility has, however, been a feature of the four bed house sector, where prices have ranged from £625,000 to £775,000.

Compared to Guernsey and the UK, average values in Jersey standing at  $\pounds 443,000$  are now well above twice the national average for the UK at  $\pounds 205,000$  and indeed some 30% higher than Greater London, the most expensive region in the UK, where the average price of a home is  $\pounds 339,000$ . On average, Jersey house prices are some 5% higher than those in Guernsey which stand at  $\pounds 425,000$ .

Activity levels in the market rose by around 10% compared to the position at the close of 2010, but as much of this was in the one and two bed flat sector, the activity is likely to have been driven by the inclusion of the Share Transfer data. Overall, therefore, volumes have remained steady over the past three months.

In the UK as a whole, according to the UK Land Registry, over the 12 months to March 2011, prices fell back 2.3% and 1.1% in March 2011 alone. Over the year, the London region was the only one to show any gain, with a modest 0.8% recorded, whilst all other regions fell back in value, the worst hit being the North East where values fell by 9.3% during the 12 month period.

Nigel Pascoe ends, "At Skipton International, we are seeing firm demand and increasing levels of enquiries for our Base rate Tracker and Buy to Let mortgages. Overall, we feel the market is likely to continue its current trend, but the absolute level of demand will be influenced by wider questions of confidence both here and in the UK. As inflation in the UK rises, so we can expect to see some volatility in the market, but overall, Jersey property continues to represent a good long term investment."

# **Changing** habits

Jersey Water are working hard to increase the supply of water in the Island for everyone to use. They are also asking you to do your bit by making small changes to help preserve the Island's water supply:

Did you know? The average family uses 71 litres of water a day just on laundry.

- $\cdot$  'A' Rated energy efficient dishwashers and washing machines save both water and electricity.
- · Wait until you have a full load before using the washing machine or dishwasher half-load programmes still use around three quarters of the water and energy of a full load.
- · Scrape the dishes before you put them in the dishwasher, instead of rinsing them under a running tap.

Did you know? Leaving the tap running when you clean your teeth wastes six litres of water a minute.

- Take a shower instead of a bath. A shower uses 2-3 times less water than a bath. This can save up to 400 litres of water per week. But remember power showers can use more water than a bath in less than 5 minutes.
- $\cdot$   $\;$  If you do have a bath, you can save water and energy by ensuring it's not too full.
- · When you are installing a new bathroom, choose water efficient taps and dual flush cisterns. If you have a dual flush cistern already, use the shorter flush whenever possible.

Did you know? A sprinkler can use as much water in an hour as a family of four will use in a day.

- Avoid watering in the midday sun or when it's windy as a lot of the water will evaporate. The best time to water your garden is in the evening when the weather is cooler and use a watering can not a hose it saves water and is kinder to your plants.
- · Set your mower blades higher when you're mowing in dry conditions this lessens the likelihood of the freshly cut grass scorching from direct sunlight.
- 85,000 litres of rain water falls on house, garage, shed or greenhouse roofs every year - save it for the garden or car by using a water butt - rainwater is also good for your plants!

# Handling the redundancy hot potato

The threat of redundancy still looms in the background for many employees in Jersey, despite the economic climate appearing to stabilise.

In the wake of the economic downturn, the Employment (Jersey) Law 2003 was amended on 1 January 2011 to cater for the provision of statutory redundancy payments to protect employees and bring us closer to the position in the United Kingdom. Prior to this, Jersey's employment law only protected employees from being unfairly dismissed by reason of redundancy, without specific compensation for the redundancy itself.

In general terms, the employment law now enables an employee who has been continuously employed for more than two years by an employer the right to receive a statutory redundancy payment if they are made redundant. This payment equates to one week's pay for every year worked for the employer, and is currently calculated using the most recent figure for the average weekly earnings published by the States of Jersey Statistics Unit.

It is important to note that a six-month time limit is in place to claim a redundancy payment either from the employer or by way of complaint to the Employment Tribunal. The Tribunal can extend this time period. but any unnecessary delay after six months will weaken the claim.

The law now also provides that an employee who is given notice of dismissal by reason of redundancy is entitled to take time off during working hours before the end of their notice period in order to look for work or arrange training. This time off should be paid up to 40% of the employee's normal hourly rate. If an employer refuses to grant this time off, an employee may lodge a claim in the Employment Tribunal within eight weeks of the date on which paid time off should have been permitted.

From an employer's perspective, some redundancies will unfortunately be inevitable. However, an employer must always take reasonable steps to ensure making an employee redundant is fair. Employers must remember that redundancy should not be used as a way to dismiss an employee for a reason other than a genuine redundancy situation. Making someone redundant unfairly can result in defending a potentially time consuming and expensive unfair dismissal claim.

It is paramount that employers and employees alike ensure they are up to speed with current employment legislation. Making an employee redundant is not always a straightforward process, and the law requires the employer to address a number of issues; consultation with the employee is one of the key ingredients, for example.

For a definitive position, we suggest that employers take specific legal advice to discuss how best to protect their position before starting the redundancy process.



The business world we have all created is the ultimate illusion. It amounts to a sleight of hand on a planetary scale and we are all willing and ignorant participants.







# Paddling for beginners


I spoke with Derek Hairon, director of Jersey Kayak Adventures, a local with over 40 years of sea kayaking experience and author of "Sit-on-top kayak: a beginner's manual." He's circumnavigated Ireland, paddled Alaska and enjoyed white-water kayaking in Nepal, but you'll mostly find him guiding people around the hidden beauties of his native Island. Even after 40 years, he has an infectious enthusiasm for the parts of Jersey you can only experience from sea level:

change in front of your eyes as the ocean rises or falls. Huge sea caves on the north coast; birdlife, sea arches and beaches that few ever get to see. The gullies and gutters off the south-east coast are full of lagoons and remarkable sights, and you can explore the Ecrehous or the Minquiers by kayak - or simply drift a few hundred metres offshore, beyond the point where man-made sounds are heard."

It's also an activity that can be enjoyed all year round, with the right kit. Derek just advises clients to wrap up more, and enjoy sharp winter days and the ultra-blue skies and seas they often provide. You don't even need to be an expert swimmer: "If you are water confident that's enough. You'll be wearing a buoyancy aid, and probably a wetsuit too: it will need a few heavy weights attached to you before you sink. So, unless you have some enemies in the mafia, non-swimmers should be fine. A good water confidence guide is how you feel if you get water on your face; are you OK putting your head in the water."

I asked him to explain the difference between a kayak and a canoe, as well as the distinction between sit-in and siton-top kayaks:

"A canoe is paddled with a single paddle. Think of the 'Indian style'

open canoe. A kayak is any craft paddled with a double paddle. Sit-in kayaks are perhaps best thought of as ones you sit inside - with a spray skirt around you to keep the water out. A sit-on-top is a kayak you sit on. No need to sit inside, no spray skirt so no worries about what to do if you need to bail out. Of course how to get back on board is certainly a skill to learn - it's not as easy as all the videos on YouTube suggest, and solo paddling is not a good idea for this reason!"

# Safety at sea

Whilst many people enjoy kayaking to relax, there are just as many for whom the challenge of navigating the rougher water round Jersey is part of the appeal. It certainly burns plenty of calories, and the Island offers plenty of opportunities for seabound adrenalin seekers - one reason why Jersey is considered one of the region's premier kayaking locations.

Although there are parts of the Island where total beginners will feel completely comfortable, it's important to remember that coastal waters are always dangerous. Whilst some people simply head out and purchase their own equipment, the advantages of a professional guide are clear. Jersey Kayak Adventures supply all the necessary equipment, and the difficulties of tide and weather planning will be left to an expert. All you need to do is turn up to the right beach with a bottle of water, some sun cream and your swimming trunks. I asked Derek to offer some advice for beginners:

"Get lessons from qualified instructors so you'll know your limits. They'll take you afloat in different locations around the Island to see the coast and give you an idea of what is round the next headland. That way you'll know what you might be letting yourself into. Learn from specialists and perhaps save from buying the wrong kit and kayak."

Even once you've got some experience, sea safety should never be taken for granted:

"Get training, and always dress for immersion. Learn a bit about tides, currents and weather so you can select the best spots to paddle from. Always have some way of summoning help if it all goes pear shaped, such as flares and a VHF radio. Don't go alone, and tell someone where you are going, when you're due back and what to do if they don't hear from you."

# Sights and sounds of the sea

Most of all, kayaking is a relaxing activity that really allows you to see a different side of the Island. Even within our coastal waters, I've seen a pod of dolphins, seals on the Ecrehous and the stunning sea caves and hidden beaches that are dotted around our north coast. I've even been to Sark, and managed to avoid any "squeal piggie" with the creepy locals. I asked Derek what were the most unusual sights he'd ever seen on local waters: "Sunfish. At first the group thought it was a shark fin coming at them. One paddler had to be stopped from trying to hit the 'shark' with her paddle! On another occasion, having just talked about how remote and deserted Les Minquiers reef is, we came round a sand bar to find a marquee erected, and a load of French people having a big barbecue. A friend was once paddling her kayak observing a dolphin. The next thing she was being propelled past us as the dolphin pushed her along, and further afield I once found myself sharing a beach in Alaska with a bear - a good lesson in realising that humans aren't always the top of the food chain!"

Well, I'm yet to see a bear, and my eskimo roll is still rubbish, but I can't wait to get back out on the sea. Who knows, I might even go back to Sark, just not alone or at night.

# EfficientR18 TDi to make Le Mans debut

Now that the regulations stipulate that less mechanics are permitted to work on a car at one time during pit-stops at the famous 24 Heures du Mans race, the swift driver changes that roadsters allowed for are no longer an advantage. This year, Audi has concentrated on aerodynamic efficiency to gain the edge, switching to a closed roof design allowing them to ultimately translate the extra efficiency into either greater downforce or greater top speed. I for one cannot wait to see it in action this month.



# Plug-in (with room for the) baby

As part of the annual 'Michelin Challenge Bibendum' which gauges the progress being made within the motoring industry, Volvo have just unveiled one of their latest offerings in green motoring; the Volvo V60 plug-in hybrid.

According to Volvo's Senior Vice President of Research & Development Peter Mertens;

In order to get true car enthusiasts to think green, you have to offer them the opportunity to drive with low carbon dioxide emissions without taking away the adrenaline rush that promotes genuine driving pleasure.'


Working alongside Vattenfall, a Swedish energy supplier, Volvo have chosen to utilise a five-cylinder 2.4 litre turbodiesel to supply

a maximum of 215bhp to the front wheels in conjunction with a 70bhp electric motor powering the rear wheels, coupled a choice of three switchable driving modes; Pure, Hybrid and Power.

The former uses only the electric motor to powert the vehicle and supplies a range of around 32 miles. Hybrid mode will see the V60 using a combination of the diesel and electric powerplants, as you might expect, providing fuel consumption as low as an absurd 150mpg, whereas in Power mode you get to unleash the full 285bhp available from both motors as well as an almost earth-shattering 640Nm of torque. Whoever thinks Volvos are boring might have to eat their words, I'm afraid.

Expect to see it in showrooms during 2012.





Well, not quite. But in conjunction with The Ohio State University, Ford have been researching dandelions as a source of sustainable rubber which could be used to supplement synthetic rubber in vehicle interiors.

By extracting a milky-white substance from the roots of a certain breed of dandelion, researchers have managed to turn the scourge of most green-fingered individuals into a potentially invaluable player in producing stronger, more durable and far more ecologically sound plastics that could be used throughout the vehicle production process, but particularly in cup-holders, floor mats and interior trim items.

Apparently, if you want to derive rubber from dandelions it's best to start with the now pride of all Russian weeds, the Taraxacum kok-saghyz (or TKS to its friends) and Ford have already begun large scale cultivation.

"It's strange to see weeds being grown in perfectly manicured rows in a greenhouse, but these dandelions could be the next sustainable material in our vehicles" according to Angela Harris, a research engineer for Ford, and although I've not seen such a spectacle, by using the power of my often wild imagination I'm inclined to agree!

This isn't the first time that Ford have made cars out of plants either, having already used straw-filled plastics in interior panels and recycled jeans as sound deadening material.

What next? A Lotus Elise with bodywork made entirely out of hemp?

Oh, wait, they've already done that...

# Mean, green, emissions reducing driving machine

Continuing to develop further 'e-tron' concepts, despite being ridiculed by the global motoring press over the name, which looks rather similar to a somewhat distasteful French word, étron. Which is along the same lines as 'merde', if you catch my drift.

Nonetheless, you cannot deny that this, the A3 e-tron, is anything less than breathtakingly stunning, even when painted in what can only be described as an Oyster Gold revival. It does manage to wear it a little better than a Mk5 Cortina though, I'm sure you'll agree.

It's a 'notchback' (think Fiat 124, Mk3 Escort, Ford Anglia - but much, much more beautiful) that has been based on the RS3

Sportback and is somewhere between a coupé, saloon and a hatchback. I think I'd like to try some of what they've been spiking the design team coffee with. Maybe they've just employed Charlie Sheen as R&D supervisor, who knows? Inside, they've even given the car its very own wi-fi hotspot and specially designed iPad holders in the seatbacks. What next? GPS location blogging with a live feed to Twitter?

Combining a 211PS 1.4 litre TFSI 'how-dothey-manage-to-get-so-much-power-fromsuch-a-small-displacement-engine-withoutinciting-self-destruction-on-a-weekly-basis' direct injection petrol engine with a 27PS electric motor lighting up the tyres to sixty in 6.8 seconds and then onto 144mph if you

so wish through a 7 speed S-tronic gearbox. Actually, the launch control will ensure no lighting of tyres takes place but it still provides a fair dollop of turbocharger punch, so Audi say.

If hooliganism isn't your thing but emissionfree city driving is, you'll be pleased to know that the lithium-ion batteries hidden under the rear seats can provide 34 miles of purely electric driving with the potential for more thanks to the obligatory KERS regenerative braking system fitted.

You might want to hold off buying that extra long outdoor extension lead just yet though, as this vehicle is unfortunately currently a mere design study.

Following previous blockbuster headline acts including Jaguar Skills, Chase & Status, Benga and Annie Mac, Jersey's biggest dance music promoters Theology return to the Watersplash on Saturday July 2nd for a huge night headlined by DMC Championship-winning turntablist collective Scratch Perverts.

# Port Isaac's Fisherman's

Genre: Folk / Sea Shanties (Recently won a BBC Folk Award, currently appearing on a Young's Fish TV advert and appearing at Glastonbury this year).

Line Up: 10 male vocals 1 musician

The Sunset Concerts are enjoyed annually by more than 2,000 music lovers, in the fabulous natural amphitheatre setting of Grantez in St Ouen. This year the concerts will celebrate the musical excellence of both local and UK talent. Free to attend, the Sunset Concerts provide the perfect excuse to pack a picnic and a bottle of wine, head to the beautiful Grantez headland and soak up the excellent music whilst the sun sets.

Two open air, early evening concerts are being held at Grantez, Le Chemin du Monts, St Ouen this year. The site opens at 6pm, music starts around 7.15pm and finishes at around 9.15pm (when the sun sets). There is parking on site for in the region of 250 cars. Concert-goers bring picnics to enjoy whilst listening to the music and watching the sun go down over the sea.

Two bands will perform this year; Friday evening will be Kevin Pallot and the Pinnacles, aimed at a family audience, and the Saturday night band is UK folk sensation, Port Isaac's Fisherman's Friends, an 11-piece male vocal group who perform 'sea shanties'. The Fisherman's Friends are shanty singers from Port Isaac who have delighted visitors and locals there for more than 15 years. Down on the harbour front of the tiny fishing village of Port Isaac





on the north Cornwall coast, the authentic sound of the shanty can be heard loud and clear via the mighty, brawny chorale of The Fisherman's Friends. At around eight in the evening during the summer months, tourists and locals gather to hear this ten-man group mesh their voices in an incredibly rousing and joyful set of shanties and Cornish folk songs.

There's no gang leader, no choir master and no holds barred in the singing of The Fisherman's Friends.

And fisherman's friends they truly are – each and every member of this unique group are or have been fishermen, lifeboatmen and coastguards (as well as builders, artisans, hoteliers, and shop keepers) in Port Isaac.

Between them, Fisherman's Friends are five baritones, two top tenors, two second tenors, and one bass. "We have a very full sound," says Jon Cleave (bass). "You've got the different grades of baritone in the middle, which all blend, and then there are the tenor harmonies at the top and I do the bass underneath — so it makes a fat sound, a full sound, a solid wall of sound. Like Phil Spector."

Unusually for a singing group, each member will take the lead. At their regular Port Isaac summer sessions, they stand in a line and each leads a song, from one end of the line and back again, giving them a huge variety of sound and song, and drawing from a repertoire reaching back 200 years, and embracing songs and shanties not only from Cornwall but Liverpool, Ireland, Africa, the West Indian, and America.

English folk music has enjoyed a renaissance in the last decade, especially in the Westcountry, with the likes of Seth Lakeman, Jackie Oates, Show of Hands, and Jim Causley achieving widespread acclaim. Now, with Port Isaac's Fisherman's Friends, the Shanty Man is back in business. Be prepared to have your ears blown clean off...

# Le Rocquier Big Band

Le Rocquier Band was started in 1976 and gave its first performance at the official opening of Le Rocquier School by her Royal Highness the Duchess of Kent, on 24th May 1977.

Although it started as a school concert band, over the years it has developed into a community Jazz Big Band. However, as it maintains strong links with the school and still retains a core of ex-Le Rocquier pupils among its membership, not surprisingly, some people still mistakenly refer to it as a school band but having travelled the world and been refused entrance to talent shows due to their significant TV exposure, they've certainly moved on since the classroom.

The Big Band consists of a standard line up of 5 saxophones (2 altos, 2 tenors and 1 baritone), 4 trumpets, 4 trombones, vocalist and a rhythm section (piano, electric bass, rhythm guitar and drums/percussion). Well, they're not called the Le Rocquier Small Band after all. They rehearse weekly, on Thursday evenings, and perform concerts for dinner dances, receptions and various charity functions throughout the year. Travel has played a large part in their activities, with tours to countries including, England: Dunstable, France: Norway: Switzerland: USA: Canada.

This summer their major event will be a Concert at the Opera House on Saturday 11th June. Entitled 'Sing Sing Swing', it is a very special evening for the Big Band, as it is a 'Concert for Shaun', a member of the Band for over 30 years, who continues his long recovery after a very serious illness. The concert is a must for all lovers of Big Band music, from Glenn Miller in the '40s, through the decades to the present day.
