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
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What are the differences between the idea of adrenaline to the world of medicine and the idea of adrenaline to an adrenaline junkie? I wanted to find out, so I spoke to medical student, **Tom**, in his fifth year of studying medicine, as well as doing some research about what adrenaline means to those with a thrill-seeking personality and a keenness for dangerous sports.

What is adrenaline?

Adrenaline, AKA Epinephrine in the US, is a hormone that is produced in two glands situated just above the kidneys known as the adrenal glands.

The adrenaline rush is all part of the high level of risk or drama. A typical adrenaline junkie is usually associated with extreme sports, for example, auto racing, skydiving and bungee jumping. These adrenaline junkies often face a real possibility of serious injury or even death but these activities also provoke that adrenaline rush that the junkies are so famous for loving. You need courage and a risk-taking personality.

What does it do?

Adrenaline plays a number of different roles in the body but I'll focus on it as an integral part of something called the 'fight or flight' response. This is an adaptation in humans whereby, in the presence of threat, the body prepares itself to react: to fight or to flee. In the past, when man was regularly subject to life or death situations, the response was essential for our survival. Using a good old fashioned example, we can highlight the response at work:

It's a lovely Sunday afternoon and you're taking a casual stroll through the woods (in Canada) when you happen to come across a grizzly bear. This situation requires a response, and quick. The body needs to be primed to act; it is vital that your muscles are ready to work with the upmost power and efficiency. By the action of adrenaline, and other hormones, this can occur. Your heart beats faster, your lungs inhale more oxygen, stored energy is released and more blood is delivered to your muscles. All of this is so that you're as ready as you can be to kick the hell out of the bear or run for your life!

It's a sensation of feeling fully alive; adrenaline junkies are 'thriving' and 'striving' and have a craving for thrilling adventures. While this is true, an adrenaline rush can wear off after a time and is addictive. Some adrenaline junkies don't necessarily risk their lives in extreme sports but, instead, fill their lives with drama and conflict. For example, an adrenaline junkie can feel an adrenaline rush from manufactured stress instead of jumping out of a plane!

Tom concluded by stating, "Life isn't so tough these days; we don't depend on our old friend, 'fight or flight', any more. Because of this, we miss out on our regular hit of adrenaline, making some people desperately search for the elusive adrenaline rush by partaking in dangerous activities and much more."

So, ultimately, the medical side of things shows that adrenaline rushes can be explained in more ways than just a thrill but rather the technical explanation of exactly what happens in our body. Adrenaline can be our friend, triggering our instincts for survival, while it can also be the enemy when it comes to those who seek its rush, putting their lives in danger or just causing unnecessary drama.

Ear she goes

When you're coming up to a milestone birthday, running 10K might be the last thing on your mind. But for Sam Watts, director of Orchid PR, it was an ideal opportunity to set herself a challenge and raise money for a charity that has a special meaning for her family. Sam explains:

"Five years ago my gorgeous niece Heather was born into a silent world. As profoundly deaf, she didn't have the joy of hearing birdsong, beautiful music or the sound of people's chatter. Blissfully unaware that her world was different from ours, it was her parents that had to deal with the bombshell and take the massive decision for Heather to have bilateral cochlear implants when she was eighteen months old – the first child in Jersey to have them. Heather now has 85% 'fake' hearing, but has had to slowly learn how to integrate into school and build her confidence, one step at a time. The day she realised she was wearing 'noisies' (her name for her hearing aids) and no other child in her class was, nearly broke our hearts. She finally understood she was different and her confidence was battered. Recently, Heather and her family were invited to take part in a weekend away for families and children with cochlear implants. Co-ordinated by The Ear Foundation, they came face to face with many other children just like Heather. For the first time in her five years, she really felt like she belonged and her confidence shot through the roof.

The Ear Foundation (see www.earfoundation.org.uk for more info) is a unique charity providing support for children across the UK with cochlear implants and hearing aids. In the UK around 800 children per year are born profoundly deaf and a number of others become deaf through accident or illness. The Ear Foundation provides education and support for all those children living with hearing aids or implants to ensure they can join fully into family and school life. The Ear Foundation receives no statutory support and relies greatly on donations and grants.

Seeing first hand the impact the work they do has had on Heather and her family. I didn't think twice about making them my chosen charity for my 40th birthday challenge - running the Asics London 10K this month. I've been training since the beginning of the year, and despite my body's natural resistance to anything faster than walking pace, hope to be able to make the 10K and raise £2,500 for the Ear Foundation."

The proposed control of housing and work law

The purpose of the Law, as its preamble puts it, is "to establish a registration process for residents of Jersey and to make provision for the control of work and housing". Essentially, the Law is to provide a single statute, replacing the Housing (Jersey) Law 1949 and the Regulation of Undertakings and Development (Jersey) Law 1973, to regulate the two issues which most directly impact upon the population of the Island, namely who can work here and who can live here

The Law is a complex piece of legislation and the purpose of this article is just to highlight some of its key aspects insofar as the control of housing is concerned.

Categories of Jersey Residents: All Jersey residents will be categorised as one of the following:

Entitled. This equates to the "(a) to (h)" qualification under the current Housing Regulations. Entitled status will be able to be obtained after 10 years' continuous ordinary residence. In contrast to the current system, a person who has obtained Entitled status on this basis will be able to leave the Island for aggregate periods not exceeding 5 years without losing entitled status. Furthermore, 20 years' continuous ordinary residence will confer permanent entitled status which cannot be lost however long one's absences from the Island thereafter.

Licensed. This equates to the '(j) category' (essentially employed) qualification under the Housing Regulations.

Entitled for Work. This status will be acquired after 5 years' continuous residence, reflecting current policy in regard to 'locally qualified' persons under the Regulation of Undertakings legislation.

Registered. This will cover all Jersey residents who do not qualify under any of the other categories set out above.

Registration: A person's categorisation will be recorded on a registration card issued to him or her. A Jersey resident will be required to register as soon as any of the following triggers first applies to him or her:

Completion of 3 months' continuous ordinary residence in the Island:

Entering into a property transaction; Starting new work.



Categories of Properties: All units of residential accommodation will be recorded on a publicly-accessible register maintained by the Minister under one of the following categorisations:

Qualified. Essentially, this will cover all units which are currently subject to occupation control under the Housing legislation as well as units created after the Law comes into force.

Registered. This will cover all other units.

The Law makes provision for the maintenance of particular conditions and concessions which attach to a unit before the Law comes into force. It also enables the Minister to change of categorisation of a particular unit or the conditions/concessions which apply to it, either on the application of the owner of the unit concerned or of the Minister's own volition (subject to a right of appeal for the owner).

Control of Occupation and Property Transactions:

Subject to limited exceptions, qualified residential units will only be able to be occupied by entitled or licensed persons.

Acquiring property by way of freehold or on any kind of lease will require the production by the acquirer to the other party or parties to the transaction of his or her registration card, it will need to be shown that any conditions to the status set out on the card are fulfilled at that time. Since all parties to the transaction will commit a criminal offence if the acquirer does not have the requisite status at the time, the Law makes provision for the Minister to verify that a person continues to meet the conditions for maintenance of his or her status. Apart from this verification mechanism, there will be no equivalent of housing consents for individuals (as opposed to companies and other 'legal persons') acquiring property.

Unlike the current position in regard to (j) category persons, Licensed persons will be able to purchase and lease properties in their own names.

Licensed for work and registered persons will be able to take 'paper' leases (i.e. leases for terms not exceeding 9 years) of registered properties.

Commercial Property Transactions: No form of consent will be required for leases (whether 'paper' leases or 'contract' leases) of purely commercial property. However, a company or other 'legal person' taking a lease of residential property, or acquiring the freehold of commercial or residential property, will require the consent of the Minister.

Inherited wealth when the marriage breaks down

Watch out... on making insurance claims

Of all the assets that need to be divided on divorce the treatment of inherited assets tends to give rise to the greatest emotion and feeling of injustice if the husband, the wife, or indeed the extended family feel that this has not been done fairly. All of this gives rise to a potent cocktail of emotions.

Inheritance is relevant in family proceedings both where it may be received in the future and where it has actually already been received by one of the parties to the marriage. The first circumstance is easier to deal with, as ordinarily the future inheritance has to be what is called 'reasonably foreseeable' in order for it to be taken account by the court in dividing the assets. More difficult is how to deal with a situation where the inheritance has already been received by either the husband or the wife.

It has now generally been accepted that the starting point for the division of assets should be an equal division and that 'good reasons' are required to depart from this. One of the major 'good reasons' to depart is where the assets have been inherited by, or gifted to, one of the spouses but this does not necessarily mean that inherited assets can be ring-fenced and not considered to be part of the matrimonial pot.

In the case of Robson v Robson where assets were calculated to be in the region of $\mathfrak{L}22$ million, the most valuable assets had been inherited by the husband including the fact that part of an estate in the Cotswolds had actually been lived in by the parties during their marriage of 22 years.

In the course of the judgment it was found that the husband and the wife "were living off wealth inherited by the husband and in a manner and at a level that focused on their own enjoyment and sporting passions rather than on preserving the inheritance for their children". In addition it found that in the later years of the marriage this expenditure "became excessive, reckless and perhaps obsessive or compulsive".

Lifestyle during the marriage is always one of the crucial factors that the court considers in dividing assets, as the level of the division will be guided by the standard of living during the marriage and the choices made by the parties during their life together. In Robson the parties had enjoyed a lifestyle that they could only afford due to the fact that they were failing to preserve the inherited assets for future generations. The fact that the wife had been complicit in the profligate expenditure of the inherited wealth had an impact on the award that she obtained from the court.

As far as the division of the inherited wealth was concerned, the court concurred with earlier decisions that such wealth can be treated differently from that earned jointly during the marriage but that the longer the wealth has been enjoyed, the less fair it is that it should be ring-fenced and excluded from the distribution. Every matrimonial case is different and the court must always attempt to find the right answer to suit the individual circumstances of the case before it.

When is a Hublot Big Bang Watch not a Hublot Big Bang Watch? The question was raised recently in Jersey's Royal Court when it refused a claim to force an insurer to pay out after such a watch was lost while its owner was walking his dog. For the uninitiated, a Hublot Big Bang Watch retails for more than most people earn in a year!

The insurers had refused to pay out on the claim for the following reasons:

(i) that the watch insured was not a genuine Hublot Big Bang watch; and/or (ii) that the "owner" had not acquired lawful title to it (iii) whether it had a genuine value at £46,000 (iv) whether it had been genuinely lost.

In making its decision the Royal Court clarified a number of legal points of vital concern to cases concerning insurable interests and matters of Jersey contract law in general. For people insuring their belongings and making claims when those items are stolen, the case raises some interesting points too.

Firstly, the Court confirmed that the duty of 'utmost good faith' exists in insurance contracts in Jersey law. It said that this was "the established market understanding of such contracts and because, as a practical matter, insurance contracts, of all contracts, require that the parties act with good faith towards each other."

The Court stated that this means the person taking out insurance must be very careful not to deceive the insurer in any way, no matter how slight a "concealment or deception" might be. "Any material misrepresentation made by the insured to the insurer at the time of entering into the contract will entitle the insurer to avoid liability under the contract."

Secondly, the Court considered whether, under Jersey law, it was possible to deny an assumption implied when making a contract. The plaintiff argued that as the insurer had accepted a valuation of the watch and his premium, it was assumed by both parties that he owned the watch and that it was genuine. The Court said that this principle would not necessarily apply in the island, because it wasn't part of Jersey law.

So where does all this leave the reader with a jewellery box full of baubles to insure?

It may sound like common sense, but do buy expensive items from reputable dealers. The internet is a tempting place but buyers are advised to use caution when a Rolex Oyster at \$24.99 seems too good to be true.

Keep receipts. Binning those annoying curly pieces of small ribbon could be the difference between a successful claim and a costly rejection letter. Take the item for regular updated valuations from reputable sources, preferably with photographs of the item from various angles attached. Keep notes of all serial numbers and where they are located (this proved to be the undoing of the Plaintiff's expert in the case).

If you do lose an item, report it to the police immediately. You never know, it may be handed in and even if it isn't, although it doesn't prove that you lost the item, it is more often than not a requirement under your policy of insurance.

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
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

Don't think about it. Book a ticket, buy a visa, pack a bag and it just happens

This has been our philosophy since we waved goodbye to Jersey-town. We have never used the world-renowned 'Lonely Planet', mainly for that reason.... It is world renowned. Why would you want to leave a western culture, fly halfway across the world and then use a western guide book that every other westerner is using, and therefore follow the western tourist trail around South East Asia? It makes no sense to me. We travelled for a few days with some Yanks who wouldn't even go for dinner without consulting their precious 'LP'. Needless to say, our sightseeing partnership didn't last long. Explore for God's sake, we said. Losers plan it.

Each time we set foot on foreign soil, we follow one golden rule: just ask the locals. There are countless experiences that were only possible because we followed the advice of the indigenous. Arriving in Sumatra we had the name of a guest house, and that was it. But soon we were happily sauntering off to Bukit Lawang to explore jungle territory on the advice of a lovely Indonesian at 'Angel' Guest House in Medan. Sumatra is very similar to India as it has a huge Muslim population, areas that are very poor, and it is considered courtesy for women to cover up. Now that is fine, but the 37 degree heat just makes you want to get naked. Regardless, we conformed to culture, kitted up in our only long-sleeved and legged attire and sweated our way into the rainforest.

I think that the people of Sumatra are the friendliest that I have yet encountered on this trip. They truly look after you. Of course, you need to be careful not to become too friendly with the locals or they will somehow come to believe that you wish to spend the rest of your years with them in holy matrimony (the men I mean). Still, very friendly.


Anyway, we had spent our first week in Sumatra trekking through the jungle looking like two sun-starved Mowglis. Our first sighting of the gigantic orange-furred beings called orangutans was unreal. A mother and a baby spotted us, and swung over to investigate who was in their jungle. They came about two metres from us, and then vanished back into the trees as quick as they had arrived. It was amazing. On our trek, we saw a total of twelve Orangutans, three Black Gibbons and a dozen Komodo Dragons, all wild in the forest. Trekking through the beautiful jungle, we sang along with the locals, drinking beer and playing cards underneath a canopy of stars as we set up camp for the night. It really was one of the best things I have ever done. Sleeping on the jungle floor, learning herbal remedies, watching swinging Orangs follow us through the jungle, and finally rafting down the Bukit Lawang rapids. 'RUBBER DINGHY RAPIDS, BRO'. Ahh, yeah.

After a long bus ride, a short flight and a lot of sleep, I was floating around the underwater world like some kind of technofied mermaid. Stunning. My rubbish ear canals had prevailed and therefore I

had proved my doctor wrong (which felt like I defied science), and I gained my Open Water certificate. If you have any kind of fear of the big blue, I urge you to go scuba diving. As soon as you see what lies below that creepy, mystical, dark layer of liquid, you suddenly feel safe. It's only Nemo and his mates, after all. I've housed a horrible. yet clearly rational, fear of deep water ever since childhood (thanks to 'Jaws'). Even deep pools scared me (courtesy of James Bond). But since taking a tank down there, swimming around for a bit, floating and examining just how big them fishies actually are, I'm alright now. It's kind of like when you learn that you can pick up jellyfish up with the palm of your hand. You're not scared of them anymore because you know them. It's the same with the sea, once you know it, you're not afraid.

It was strange arriving in Bali and actually having a mirror again. I remember actually jumping back when I saw myself, 'who the HELL is that?' I thought. It's amusing how the image of yourself you have in your head, and the actual reality of what you look like can be completely, COMPLETELY opposite sometimes.

Bali is swarming with Aussies. Literally. It is an honest pleasure to hear an English accent here. An unexpected surprise. A rare beauty. Not that I have a problem with Aussies, I don't at all. In fact I've only actually encountered three Australians this whole trip. Well, until now. Bali has become very touristy and very Aussie, equivalent of our 'Costa del...' holiday package deals, if you get what I mean. Of course there are the places you can visit where rice fields stretch for miles, and kids are all racing around trying to get their kites to fly in the limited Bali breeze (it's a daily ritual). I swear none of these kids go to school. Look up, and you will see the aqua sky littered with kites of all different shapes and sizes. It makes them closer to God, they say. Anyway, we quickly left Kuta, home of the Bogins (look it up), and travelled up to a lovely little town called Ubud to visit the monkey reserve. This is essentially a beautiful place where you buy a bunch of bananas and monkeys suddenly sprout from every direction, pouncing at you, and climbing on



We floated across to the Gili Islands and embarked on a series of beach bum days which passed lazily, occasionally donning a mask to go and see some of the magnificent and humongous sea turtles which were sunbathing in the shallows. Chilling out with the locals, we soon realized that the Indonesians really do enjoy a group jamming session, and will whack out a guitar at any given point of the day expecting you to hold a tune to their plucking. 


North Korea: Jewel of the Orient

Three separate travel agents did their best to deter me, emphasising 'little to see but sand and oil refineries.' Literally translated, I aspired to the challenge. But, looking back, I wonder if I took it too far. Now, at the end of a gruelling journey the high, of being unwittingly wired on surging adrenaline, surviving solely on nervous energy, becomes a fading light. I start to come down, fast. Drawing my first breath

anticipating a return to familiarity and safety, my shoulder muscles begin to loosen. My legs bow under the pressure. Energy's bleeding out of me like a cut vein; more like dusk dawning than a mist unveiling. Every ounce of trauma, tension and shock that have become my companions, and only familiar constants of the journey, now sets in and takes grip. An intoxicating cocktail of messy emotions blur my head; disappointment that it's over, panic, even. How to return to 'normality'? Yet I'm relieved and humbled by such incredible memories that many would never comprehend, let alone experience. Drained and emotional, I struggle to understand how a seven hour flight can transport me 'home', so near but light years apart. Nowhere remains sacred and untouched, it seems everywhere is just a flight away. I'm suddenly reminded of an interview with a soldier, returned from war and at counselling. I begin to understand his struggle to integrate into a 'normal' life, craving a return to the front-line. I wonder if danger can be an addiction, as any other. 'The trip was real,' I pinch myself. Sheer exhaustion snaps me out of thought. Unable to process any of it in this state, pained to even think back to events, I take my purchases and am resigned to the flight home, paralysed and disconnected.

Thing is, I'm a journalist by nature, the profession just followed. I'm intrigued, to a fault, and find myself drawn to trouble; as much in my personal life as professionally. Those that know me will only agree, so I'm being very frank. That, coupled with a fierce desire to

explore largely unknown territory, forms an instinct so powerful, I simply can't not act. What I learned on this trip was just how far I was willing to go and who else I'd drag into the firing line. I now see how the delicately fine line between extreme curiosity and unsurpassable risk gets blurred. I wonder if it's a quandary every journalist experiences, or every human, even. I explore that dilemma on this distinctive journey...

Qatar, my first destination, is underlined by simmering anticipation of Bahrain. Violence breaks out again as I've two days to go. The forces open fire on mourners commemorating their loved ones killed in earlier shootings. Sensitivity is heightened and tensions peak. I try to focus on the country at hand.

The Ritz-Carlton is my kind of hotel; classic, ornate and traditionally opulent. A little large, but I retain the exclusivity, in the way most things are done in the Arab world, by paying for it. Club level is pure whimsy: separate floor accessible only by Club card, private top-floor members' lounge with sweeping views of the Ritz's own marina out to sea, an exclusive (and complimentary) bar and table service with gourmet food on demand and an exclusive level of service where nothing is too much effort. Small touches in my sumptuous suite are enamouring, as I arrive, fatigued, to a rose-filled bubble-bath, heart-shaped petals strewn on the bed and a bottle of champagne with platter of exotic dates. Heaven begins here.

winding ways. Riotous bursts of sequinned sarees shimmer in the night lights, hanging outside tatty haberdasheries. I come face-to-face with an Arab laboriously stirring a giant steel vat of Arabic sweet, unphased by thick plumes of white smoke and the alluring smell of ghee. From the plethora of Sheesha cafes, more common here than pubs at home. I head to a roof terrace and people-watch while sipping a smooth rich Arabic coffee. Sienna, ochre and rust hues flirt in the spotlights below. Intermittently, the rumble of Arabic chatter is disturbed by a distant minaret bellowing a melodic call to prayer, floating over the city. Like a giant chess board, women in a sea of long black 'Abbaiyas' hover around men in princely white gowns and head-dresses. Ladies expose their wealth only through glimpses of diamante designer heels and chunky diamonds. On the final day I head straight to the spa for a rejuvenating deep tissue massage and oxygenating facial. Luckily, I don't have to venture further than the club floor for the best seafood restaurant in Doha, Ritz-Carlton's 'La Mer,' boasting full-length views over the city lights. 'Porcini' is a slice of Milano on a plate; an authentic favourite, with delectable desserts of steeped tiramisu, rich panacotta and gooey chocolate fondant.

ing, relishing a good quality of life. Crime is minimal and tax-free salaries average £70k per annum; all the trappings of a 'good' life. Five days is enough for me.

It takes me back to Dubai ten years ago, pre-stampede, when I could relax there. Qatar, now, has that air of elite sophistication that I almost cherish, but it seems desperate to shatter this image.

The view is stark yet honest; modern skyscrapers, sand dunes

and construction, all shrouded in a sandy mist. Qatar is Dubai's silent rival. Development is evolving at a frighteningly rapid pace,

despite entire new neighbourhoods being uninhabited; the oil rev-

olution continues. Doha marina boasts walking advertisements. Picture-perfect British families stroll peacefully in the sunshine,

beaming a hassle-free lifestyle, young children laughing and play-

Finding true local life in Qatar is like soul-mining, an epic feat, and I get annoyed constantly being directed to 'The Pearl,' Qatar's direct equivalent of Dubai's 'Palm'. 400 hectares of reclaimed land, dubbed 'the Middle East's most glamorous location'. It's a gleaming new waterfront development of designer boutiques, upscale bars, Michelin restaurants, five star hotels, three marinas

and pricey luxury apartments, with more shops than people.

Doha offers ease of life, yet ironically feels uncomfortable. Think

Qatar is emerging as defiantly permissive in contrast to its strict neighbouring countries. It's thoroughly modern and I'll be fascinated to see it in bloom. But it must discover it's unique character and stop wagging its tail behind Dubai.

expensive new shoes; shiny and polished but not yet a second skin. There's a constant anticipation. The city's a debutante; prepped, preened and ready for the social season.

It takes me back to Dubai ten years ago, pre-stampede, when I could relax there. Qatar, now, has that air of elite sophistication that I almost cherish, but it seems desperate to shatter this image.

Evesdropping (I know it's rude!) on a conversation whilst dining in the ultra-prestigious Club Lounge, a fascinating discussion ensues with an American businessman. With a child-like enthusiasm and excitability, much like myself, and links to the Emir of Qatar, H.H Sheikh Hamad bin Khalifa Al Thani, he discloses the country's avant-garde aims of being the next sporting, financial and cultural crown of the Middle East. I had heard all the World Cup 2022 stadia might be temperature-controlled, a fact that's duly confirmed, as I overhear two English businessmen perfecting their presentation to bid for the contract to build all twelve stadia. The Club Lounge is pulsating with business energy. Perhaps not so incongruous, as one guest lets slip that the palatial mansion hotel is actually owned by the ruler. He even recalls an urgent meeting being called on international security when guests were removed from rooms and banned from the club suite. With a little persuasion, a member of staff quietly confirms this, saying it happens more than ten times a year. He describes the difficulty appeasing angered guests without exposing the reason.

Sport is a big opportunity for Qatar, one it'll exploit ruthlessly and at any cost; having recently hosted the Asian Games, World Indoor Athletics Championships last year, Asian Football Cup in January and whilst I'm there, the Tennis Ladies Open, with players staying at my hotel. Getting into the lift with international female tennis stars is awkwardly amusing, particularly as I've no idea who most are.

So where do locals socialise in Qatar? Isn't it apt, I think, as I wander 'Souq Waqif', that people really do spend evenings eating 'Shawarma' (kebabs) and smoking 'Sheesha' (Arabic waterpipe). The cleanest, safest and most hassle-free market I've ever visited; I'm not even offered to be traded in for camels. Turns out, it's an old souq knocked down and replaced with an old-looking new one. It shows. Still, the heady aroma of spices and herbs waft down the labyrinth of alleyways as men with creased faces in

Penny Whiley: The teacher with the 2,000 km classroom

Penny Whiley's day starts at first light when she wakes to the warbling of bush birds in the gum trees. It's 30C outside and set to rise to the mid-40s by lunchtime. The land is dry and dusty for hundreds of kilometres around, broken only by clusters of ancient rocks which change colour throughout the day. She says this landscape 'just cries out to be painted'. It hardly ever rains, but when it does the dormant landscape sprouts a dramatic carpet of verdant shrubs and the dried up riverbeds temporarily gush water once again.

This is the environment that has been Jerseywoman Penny's home for the past 18 years; the place she describes as the beating heart of Australia: Alice Springs. It throbs with activity compared to the previous ten years she spent in Tennant Creek, a mining town of the same desert, which is, as she points out, in the middle of nowhere. But it's all a very long way from the parish of Trinity where she grew up.

By 7.30 am Penny has arrived at the Centralian Senior College, which shares a campus with Charles Darwin University. Here she teaches English classes to the 15 – 18 year olds. Sometimes she is called upon to teach French at night classes and she laments the fact that most Australians don't realise the importance of learning other languages. Penny also happens to be the only Philosophy teacher in the entire Northern Territory and those students she is unable to teach face to face are linked via the use of interactive computer technology. She calls this her '2,000 km classroom' and her more remote pupils are spaced hundreds of kilometres apart in the vast area that spans Alice Springs in the centre of Australia to Darwin on the far north coast, and as far wide on either side. In earlier times, these pupils were taught via CB radio, but now Penny has availed herself of modern technology to transmit data over the desert and to interact with her protégées. She says that her role as a virtual teacher is never over and she often

meets with her students online during the evenings and at weekends. She recalls a wonderful moment last year chatting online with her pupils late one night - everyone dressed in pyjamas and discussing the meaning of life - and quips, 'This is education, Jim, but not as we know it!'.

Surprisingly, Penny confesses to being a Luddite (something of an irony when both her car's registration plate and her Avatar bear this moniker!). She admits to struggling with her mobile phone's technology, for instance. Yet in the past couple of years, not only did she familiarise herself with the computer technology encompassing many of Microsoft's products such as PowerPoint, Photo Story, Movie Maker, MSN Messenger, Excel and Word, but she also adapted and used this very technology to create a virtual classroom community allowing her 'to bring an older-style subject into the modern age'. As a result, she was nominated for Microsoft's Innovative Teacher Award and the computer giant flew her and other nominees as special guests to their Asia Pacific Conference in Phuket earlier this year. Despite her protestations that she's no IT whiz kid, she eclipsed fellow nominees much younger then herself and took home the award for the Northern Territory.

Coincidentally for Penny, the keynote speaker at the Phuket conference was Dr Willie Smits, the Dutch animal rights activist, microbiologist and forester who founded the Orangutan Outreach Center in Borneo. This subject has actually been close to Penny's heart for some years now and meeting Dr Smits was the catalyst for her visit to Borneo later this year to see for herself the damage caused by the pillage of palm trees for their oil, used extensively in food products, and the sterling work pioneered by Dr Smits in rescuing orphaned orangutans whose food source is consequently being decimated. So passionate is she about avoiding food containing palm oil that Penny is setting up a worldwide interactive project called 'Stop Eating the Rainforest' with recipes that are all palm oil-free. Proceeds from this project will go towards buying back the rainforest

and for the rescue and rehabilitation of abandoned orangutans.

Did I mention that she has also written a book of poems and short stories? She says she started 'fiddling around with poetry about ten years ago' and entered a few short story competitions in the interim. One of these stories won a prize and is incorporated in her book of poetry and short stories, 'Green Umbrellas' which has recently been published by Seaviewpress. The idea for the anthology stemmed from a story that her father, David Phillips, used to read to her many years ago at bedtime. It was he who designed the front cover of her book - a black and white sketch of an old French house with adjacent terrace, sporting the eponymous green (sun) umbrella. Penny has dedicated the book to him with the wry quote: 'For Dad, who used to read to me until you fell asleep'. Semi-autobiographical, comical and ironic, it is also a vehicle in which she explores thought-provoking issues, her memories of Jersey and the family left behind.

What does she miss the most from the Island? Apart from family, of course, she really misses our seasons. Although Alice Springs gets cold during winter (often dropping below zero degrees), snowdrops and daffodils don't grow there (the latter being an exotic luxury, flown in from the coastal cities!). Being something of a seafood aficionada, Penny fondly recalls our fish market with its displays of chancre crabs and fresh mackerel. Her nostalgia is best summed up though in the final lines from her poem 'Inland Sea', the last one to appear in her book and where she describes the dust bowl of the Northern Territory being transformed by rain :-

"For it has not rained in this Inland Sea For many months.
But now the red earth opens
To swallow and swill the nourishing rain, Leaving a newly cleansed land Which smells of vraic
From my childhood home.
I can almost taste the fresh crab..."

Andy Brunskill who has a first class degree in Drama and Physical Theatre. He was also a Trainee Director at the Orange Tree Theatre.





ast of this summer's big budget comic book adaptations is Marvel's Captain America:
The First Avenger. Last of this summer's big budget comic book adaptations is Marvel's Captain America: The First Avenger.

In these countries the title has been truncated to simply The First Avenger so as to avoid the connection with the place of Cap's birth. It's an interesting one really. Could people's perceptions and prejudices toward America damage the film's international box office? In some respects are the God of Thunder and an alcoholic billionaire genius easier for people to associate with America's greatest hero?

Steve Rogers is a sickly young man who wants nothing more than to serve his country in battle against the Nazis. Rejected by the army he's given a second chance when he is selected for an experimental trial of the super soldier serum - a drug designed to take the user to the peak of physical perfection. But America isn't the only country willing to experiment to gain an

advantage in war. The Germans believe they have discovered a power force capable of annihilating the Allied Forces and are ready to use it. With his sidekick Bucky Barnes, Cap must go to war not only against Hitler but also his ruthless power obsessed lieutenant The Red Skull.

Tonally this could be the hardest to nail down of Marvel's films so far. It's a war film, a super-hero film and a big summer blockbuster all at the same time. In the trailer Cap uses a gun, he is a soldier fighting in a very real war. Still, with the confirmation of appearances by Howard Stark (Tony's dad) and Nick Fury, Marvel certainly have an eye on next year's The Avengers. In light of this challenge Marvel have selected an experienced hand in Joe Johnston to pull this all together. He hasn't had a big hit on his hands for a number of years but it could be an astute move with his proven ability at combining genre with blockbuster shown

Captain America and Jersey

Interestingly the Channel Islands have an important part to play in Captain America comic book lore. SPOILER ALERT. In the final days of World War 2 Cap and Bucky were sent on a mission to an unspecified Channel Island (let's just say Jersey) in order to stop Baron Zemo launching an experimental drone plane. They succeed in reaching the plane but fail to defuse the explosive device on board. This leads to Cap being frozen in the waters of the Atlantic and Bucky being killed (it's comics so of course he isn't really dead but whatever).

most recently in The Wolfman. In casting Cap they've also gone for someone with not only blockbuster experience but also super-hero experience with Chris Evans. I think he has the toughest job of all here. Captain America has to be simultaneously the ultimate hero and an everyman we can relate to. In Evans I think they've made a good choice.

Captain America predates the Marvel universe of his future Avengers teammates. Yet, in the comic books he is the lynchpin that held Marvel's shared universe together and in a way I'm sure he'll do the same for the movie version. There's an important reason for this. More than any other Marvel hero; Steve Rogers is not defined by the exterior of his Captain America identity. He isn't some kind of flag waving jingoistic symbol for a nation. He is a man willing and capable to make any sacrifice to help his fellow man (unless they're a Nazi). Forget what you feel about America - Captain America is a hero for everyone.









Also Showing...

This might surprise you but I am not infallible. From time to time I recommend an absolute stinker. There are films like The Invention of Lying that are genuine attempts to make something original that just seem to fall out of the grasp of the filmmakers. These I can forgive as noble failures. Then there are those like Transformers: Revenge of the Fallen. Trading on childhood nostalgia and a genuine affection for the first film I told you, the fine readers of Gallery, to head out and see this incoherent mess of sassy quipping robots, constant running around and Constructicon testicles. 

SolomiaZoumaras

Former Jersey College for Girls student and Jersey born ceramicist Solomia Zoumaras left the island and moved to the UK to study art ϑ design. After a change of heart in her first year of a furniture and product design degree, Solomia decided to move to Bath where she completed a BA in Ceramics. In 2006, Solomia won first prize in the Jersey Telecoms Student Art Prize and gained a commission by Coopers ϑ Co in association with Jersey Pottery and since then hasn't looked back. Now living in London, the 'Master of Plaster' is now in the middle of further studies in Ceramics at the Royal College Of Art.



Yes I moved after I graduated and because of winning the student award I was receiving interest with my work and I knew I was capable of pursuing this as a career. I was given the opportunity to run a ceramic studio in the heart of Hackney. Over the last three years of setting up the business, Solomia, I have been exhibiting in trade shows such as Pulse and Top Drawer and retail shows such as Origin and Ceramic Art, London. London is a great place for pushing your work mainstream, it just offers a wider social network of people and opportunities arise from it.

What kind of clients would buy from you?




Must Eat

o this year I am committed to losing a few pounds. I'm not sure what's gone wrong every other year I've tried to lose a bit of weight for the summer; I'm sure I was committed to those diets too; but they always seemed to just peter out after an unsuccessful few weeks (or sometimes days).

However this time I am enlisting the help of professionals. After finding out about the Thalgo iPULSE 5.1 Slimming machine at Les Roches Spa I thought it could be my final hope. Over the years, like everyone else, I've tried numerous faddy diets. I've souped myself up, I've eaten Special K like it's going out of fashion, I've joined gym after gym, I've signed up for marathons, I've power walked/fought/danced, I've even eaten like a cavewoman for a month - and yet I'm still not reaching my goal. So I decided to really invest in this treatment - and it's quite expensive - however that made me all the more determined to stick to it and get results.

Thursday 26th May

It's with a feeling of intrepidation that I turn up at Les Roches Spa for my first iPULSE treatment. I discuss with the therapist where my problem areas are; muffin top, thighs and the tops of my arms and she took down all my measurements so that over the next 3 weeks we can track my progress. The therapist attached the pads to my problem areas and the treatment was tailored especially for my body type and to help me reach my goals (which are quite simply to get slimmer!). The iPULSE machine combines 5 slimming technologies; for my first one the session focuses on breaking down fatty acids using ultrasound to reduce cellulite and also micro-currents which pulse through the pads to help with expelling fat and to tone the skin.

When the machine first came on we went through all the different intensity levels until we got to one which I felt was really doing a good job. So the brave ones can have the machine turned right up, blasting their pesky fat cells, whilst the more timid can opt for a lower level and go for the 'slow and steady wins the race' approach.

I chose to have it as high as I could tolerate; but because it goes in gentle waves, building up each time, I found that I could have it higher half way through the treatment which made me feel I was doing well (despite the fact the machine is actually doing all the work for me!)

Monday 30th May

Time for my second treatment. I get hooked up to the machine and put on a 30-minute session (I brought a book so I can relax whilst it works its magic). After my session I head to Bootcamp on the front near the hamburger stand, because combining the machine with exercise will boost its results and help with burning more fat cells, so I plan to go twice a week whilst I'm doing the treatments.

Wednesday 1st June

I'm really looking forward to my third session as my tummy is looking noticeably flatter. I have the pads turned up higher than usual as I'm building up a tolerance to them, which is exciting. My lovely therapist gave me a wonderful foot massage as I had the treatment which completely takes my mind off the new higher levels I have opted for.

Thursday 2nd June

My arms are actually tired and sore as if I have been to the gym. I feel like I'm beating the system!

Monday 6th June

I managed to stay away from alcohol all weekend. I'm halfway through my sessions and I really want to see results so I was designated driver over the weekend. Thankfully I was right next to the brand new COOK shop and in a couple of minutes, I'd picked up Cheese Soufflés with Red Onion Marmalade for everyone, a huge tray of Moroccan Spiced Lamb Tagine, Minted Couscous and a couple of Monkfish Wellingtons for the vegetarian, as well as plenty of vegetable sides that I would never have had time to chop, roast and sprinkle with caraway seeds. There was even dessert – a gorgeous Raspberry Pavlova that I just had to leave alone while it defrosted. Now, that's my sort of dinner party preparation.

All I had to do when I got home was make a list of the timings so I knew when to slip away and slide the COOK meals straight from the freezer into the oven, and then it was onto the important business of Getting Ready. By the time my guests arrived, I was checking my manicure, putting the final touches to my artistic table decorations, and cracking open the Chablis. Everyone was so busy tucking

into the olives I'd picked up from COOK, they didn't notice me unwrapping the cheese soufflés and decanting the frozen lamb tagine out of its plastic tray and into a COOK oven dish so it would look as if I'd spent hours slaving over a hot stove, instead of... Robert Stevens. Those kind COOK people print the name of the chef who cooked your meal on the pack, so you can raise a glass to them – when nobody's looking of course, you wouldn't want to give the game away.

You can imagine the look on everyone's faces when I took six perfect cheese soufflés out of the oven. 'Oh do you like them?' I said nonchalantly, 'filo pastry, mature cheddar, feta, some caramelised red onions and voila! It's simple really...' Which of course it was. For me, anyway. Thankfully, when it was time for the main course, everyone had got into a wine-fuelled controversial debate about the waterfront, and didn't notice me disappearing to microwave the vegetables. The minted couscous, oven-roasted vegetables and cabbage, bacon and pinenuts all cook straight from the freezer and are ready in five minutes flat. Of course, I had to introduce some impromptu karaoke to cover the microwave 'ping', but really, it was a small price to pay. The lamb tagine with apricots and dates was divine - aromatic, sweet and melt-in-the-mouth. I wasn't surprised. After all, it had been marinated and then slowcooked for hours... just not by me! The monkfish wellingtons were a huge hit with my fussy, sorry meat-intolerant friend Rosie, who was convinced I'd personally wrapped the perfectly-cooked fish parcel in lattice-cut puff pastry just for her. The piece de resistance though had to be the Raspberry Pavlova - an incredible 'swish' roll of melting meringue and golden cream studded with jewel-pink raspberries. 'How did you make that?' gasped the guests. 'It's easy when you know how...' I said, doing my best Nigella eyelash flutter. You know, I rather think I'm getting the hang of this domestic goddess business.



Chile:

Once the thrill of white water rafting on the River Maipo was over — it was time to settle down with a huge chorizo steak and share a bottle of Carmenere, Block 27, Terryuno, Concha y Toro from Rapel Valley. Dark and deep red colour; intense hints of berries; cigar box pepper and chocolate; tasty and full-bodied, elegant yet powerful with a deliciously complex lingering aftertaste.

Spain:

Cantering through the forest of the National Park of Barbate near Los Canos de Meca in Andalucía can be quite exhilarating — so settling down to a plate of Cerdo al Horno — Pork roasted in an outside oven served with Marques de Caceres Reserva 2004 is a great way to revive. This Reserva has a bright, vivid dark ruby colour; intense bouquet of forest fruits and sweet spice. Good concentration in the mouth with deliciously soft tannins that highlight the wines rich fruit; an elegant and unctuous wine with a pleasant fullness that lingers on the palate. £13.25 per bottle

New Zealand:

Probably the most challenging thing I have done is to climb part of the Franz Josef Glacier on the West of New Zealand's South Island when it was pouring with rain; thank goodness a welcome glass of Villa Maria Wairau Valley Reserve Sauvignon Blanc was awaiting me after my 8 hour trek - served with some green lipped mussels it was a real treat. This Sauvignon Blanc is classic Wairau style showcasing the ripe fruit characters found in the Valley. The nose overflows with pungent passion-fruit, grapefruit and ripe gooseberry characters. The palate is powerful with an explosive array of ripe gooseberry and tropical flavours complemented by crisp acidity and a long finish. £11.95 per bottle

Australia:

A fast cat to the Great Barrier Reef in very choppy seas did not make the best conditions for snorkelling but I was still able to see some amazing and breathtaking colours with coral and fish. Getting back to a cool glass of Brightview Chardonnay produced by Simon Hackett in McLaren Vale with some grilled Barramundi made the somewhat rough return journey completely worthwhile. This Chardonnay is fermented in French and American oak; it has honeydew melon aromas with white peach. Creamy, toasty oak in the background give way to a big, rich wine with ripe melons and stone fruits integrated with spicy oak as well as delicious butterscotch and crisp citrus finish.



Buying on Instinct

Recent research concurs with our own view that most buyers buy on instinct, typically viewing their eventual home no more than twice before making a decision to buy.

Buying a property certainly appears to be a decision of the heart over the head. In other words, the 'I'll know it when I see it' approach turns out to be quite reliable.


Despite the detail offered about their property by sellers when they instruct us to market their home, buyers actually register their preferences with a very broad brush indeed. They seldom, if ever, ask what type of boiler is at the property, or if there is a double wash basin in the bathroom or an aerial point in the sitting room before viewing it. These are small details which have little bearing on whether the buyer will find the property to be a suitable home.

Once certain non-negotiables, such as price, minimum amount of accommodation, and the general location of the property have been satisfied, buyers are primarily influenced by 'How does it feel?' and 'Could we be happy here?'. These elements are intangible, but if the right button has been pushed, virtually nothing will stop the buyer from wanting to buy the property.

Of course, the brain then tries to over-rule the heart, forcing the buyer to revisit the property, just to make sure. During this second viewing the buyer will take a more detailed look at the property, and may take more notice of the type of fittings and the structural condition.

The brain will usually decide whether to support the heart solely on the strength of this second visit and the buyer will either make an offer there and then, or decide against.

So sellers, remember you are selling a home, not just a building, and work with your agent to promote the lifestyle benefits of your property – not just the features.



Re:awarded

We thought we'd learn a liittle bit more about the awards so we caught up with David Cox, Department Architect and Advisor to the Minister for Planning & Environment.

What does the Jersey Architecture Commission (JAC) do, and why did they have these awards?

The JAC was set up by the Planning and Environment Minister as a design council, to oversee design quality on significant, and sometimes sensitive, development applications. A combination of views and advice from both the Planning and Environment Minister the JAC panel, and myself, are all considered to ensure that a balanced and comprehensive approach is taken. Essentially, the JAC provides independent, non statutory, expert advice and guidance, working with agents and developers to promote and support the highest possible standards of design in the built environment. The Jersey Architecture Design Awards used to be run by the Association of Jersey Architects (AJA), but when the JAC was formed, it was felt that their independent perspective would add value to the assessment process. I chair the judging panel, which is made up of a mixture of local and non-local experts,

which is important as it combines local knowledge with external perspectives and expertise. This year, the awards were judged by Jersey residents Margaret Thompson, Director of Thompson Estates, Peter Thorne RTPI, the former Director of Planning, Ian Rolls, local artist, and Rod McLoughlin, the Cultural Development Officer. Additionally, George Ferguson CBE, Professor David Watkins of Cambridge. Andy Theobald of Fielden Clegg Bradley (2008 Stirling Prize Winners), and Marcus Binney CBE, our Chairman, provided expert

How many entries did you receive?

This year we received 104 entries and the quality was exceptional.

What qualities did you look for in the winning entries?

We have a lot of different categories, all requiring different things, but overall we are looking for design excellence, which can be subjective, but which for the JAC generally includes attention to detail, appropriate application in the built environment, and consideration of the strategic development aims for the Island.

What are your views on the current state

of Jersey Architecture?

I think local architecture is of a good standard, and is improving, but we can't be complacent. What is interesting, is that at the moment there are so many great applications around that are not being progressed because of the current economic climate - over the next 10 years as these come back online, I'm expecting areat thinas.

Why do you think it is important to recognise good design in Jersey?

Because we live on an island and space is limited, every building counts. People here care passionately about where they live, and we have a high level of engagement from the local community, so we need to do everything we can to get it right. Also, in the past there have been some buildings that are generally considered poor, and would not have been consented to under current guidelines and standards. By recognising good design, we maintain these standards.

What is your favourite building in the world?

Frank Gehry's Guggenheim Museum in Bilbao.



What made you choose the company you work for?

I chose Altis because I've had ambitions to work in trading since college. This is why I chose to study engineering. I felt the quantitative and analytical skills you learn from a science-based course would be more beneficial to my career goal than an economics degree. I followed up with a PhD to really stand out from the crowd in a very competitive field.

What sort of professional training do vou take?

In my role, learning is a continuous process. I am expected to be knowledgeable about all the latest fund management research in academic journals. Much of my time is devoted to learning new strategy, forecasting, risk and cost models. This is the most challenging part of my job because published strategies can be very complex.

What do you do on the average day?

I'm normally working on my research. This involves the simulation and development of novel trading strategies. The results may be used to reduce the fund's risk or increase expected profits. I am often required to perform analysis on the fund's existing strategy. Recently I have addressed questions such as 'can we use inter-market relationships to forecast prices?' and 'how can we benchmark our trading costs?'

What is your next step?

Hedge funds have a very flat structure, so there is not a conventional 'career ladder' for promotion within the firm. You don't start at an 'E' grade and hope to reach 'C' by the end of your career, so it is not the kind of environment for you if you aspire to grand job titles. In a hedge fund, you grow with the firm: promotion means doing the same type of job for much more money, because your knowledge and experience grows and you're good at what you do.

What advice would you give to yourself as a 2010/11 graduate considering the experience you have now?

Apply for as many jobs as possible and attend as many interviews as possible. Every interview builds your confidence and makes it more likely you'll get the job you really want. Practice aptitude tests online. They are used by many companies to screen candidates, and you want to be sure of getting a face-to-face interview. Before an interview, do as much research about the company as possible. This will allow you to ask sensible questions, which shows enthusiasm and interest. In the interview, never moan or complain about past work places.





So, tell us what inspired you to get this off the ground?

James: Since I came to Jersey 9 years ago people have been complaining about how hard it is to find a job and for companies about how hard it is to find people - it just seems crazy it's so hard in such a small place. So I've held a long-standing burning desire to improve the recruitment industry in Jersey, to stop it being so frustrating for users, slow, expensive and inefficient. 70% of jobs over here are filled by personal networking; with the increase in popularity of social networking globally it became obvious to me that technology and networking held the key to solving the recruitment issues found in the small niche financial services markets like Jersey and Guernsey.

Brendan: Well James and I got talking about his idea one day over a pint as these things often do. Generally I have to say that I was very happy with what I was doing at the time but I really fancied a new challenge and had always wanted to set up a successful business. I had pondered over a number of business ideas in the past but felt that this one could really work as something really struck a chord with me. My own personal experiences of finding jobs in Jersey through traditional methods had been pretty bad so I felt that a new alternative approach could really work.

What did you do prior to starting this business?

James: I've had a number of careers over the years, managing some pretty cool bars in London, a recruitment head-hunter in Technology/Financial Services and lastly in sales at Jersey Telecom

Brendan: I worked as a Service Delivery Manager for Jersey Telecom, which involved running a team of technical consultants and project managers delivering services to JT's corporate clients.

Did that teach you any lessons that helped you succeed?

NicheHunters is really a culmination of all of those experiences, but nothing compared to the things you learn by starting your own business. During the development of NicheHunters, we have used companies and individuals from around the world and in particular India and South Africa and my experiences have proved that the cultural differences are massive, especially in the business world. We are all motivated by different things and you really need to understand this in order for you to get what you want. We have learned the hard way that what you think might be understood and assumed may not always be the case.

What's the hardest lesson you've learnt since starting the business?

Leaving the small tasks until tomorrow, it's amazing how quickly they can grow and become major, expensive problems. Most of the development of NicheHunters has involved using companies and individuals from around the world such as India and South Africa and our experiences have proved that the cultural differences are massive which also translates into the business world. We are all motivated by different things and you really need to understand this in order for you to get what you want. We have learned the hard way that what you think might be understood and assumed may not always be the case.

Any funny stories that you have about the business starting

After a week in India of 16-hour days, curry morning, noon and night, a case of Delhi belly and driving down motorways the wrong way we did ask ourselves 'What have we done to get here!'



What are your plans for the future?

More features to make recruitment easier and effective, 15 other offshore locations in 5 years and a lot of spin off ideas we are trying to ignore right now.

We hope fully to expand the NicheHunters concept into as many Offshore locations as we can over the next three years.

What advice would you give to would-be entrepreneurs?

Double your budget, it will take twice as long as you expect and be prepared for the time you wish you hadn't even started! It's your dream, follow it and pick advisors that support your dream not want to change it. Don't look back on your life in 20 years' time and say 'I wish that I had tried that'. Someone also once said to me that perceived risk is always worse than actual risk.



Ten other young people took part in the course, which gives unemployed youngsters the skills and confidence to find work.

The course was supported by Mourant & Co Trustees as Trustee of The Amazon Trust to help unemployed young people from Jersey into work or training.

Ian James, director of Mourant and Co. Trustees Limited, presented the young people with their certificates at a presentation evening in St Helier on Wednesday (18th May).

As part of the course, Lisa and the other young people took part in a community project building a woodcraft school for the Jersey Youth Service. They also went away on a residential week in the New Forest, which helped them to improve their confidence and teamwork skills.

Lisa said: "I gained so much from the Team programme. It gave me something to get up for, something to look forward to every day. It made me really determined to get back into work and make something of my life."

Like all young people on the Team programme, Lisa took part in a two-week work placement. She said: "I love being outdoors so I was really happy to get a placement with a local tree surgeon. After only a few hours, I was offered an apprenticeship there and will start training to become a qualified tree surgeon on Monday."

I consider myself the ideal person to write a feature for Gallery's adrenaline issue. I can't claim to skydive, rock climb or race motorcycles instead my qualification for this task proceeds from the ability to produce adrenaline in situations that wouldn't faze most small children. I'm like one of the X Men, but my superpower is anxiety. Crowds, enclosed spaces and clowns all horrify me, but most of all I hate heights - I get dizzy when I have to stand on a chair.

So, in the interests of journalism, I thought I'd have a go at "curing" my fear of heights. I've heard of people parachuting and bungee jumping to get over their phobias, but I had visions of myself refusing to leave the aeroplane, eventually jettisoned like an icicle of frozen urine. I wanted to start a bit closer to ground level, and luckily the staff at Creepy Valley Activity Centre were confident they could handle me and as many wusses as I could round up. After a few days of cajoling people on Facebook, my party mysteriously shrunk from an 'interested' twenty to a 'committed' five, but I was able to look on the bright side - it just meant fewer witnesses in the event that I peed myself.

I chose Creepy Valley because the site is well-tailored to a variety of abilities -I'd assumed that any location that can cater to kids as young as seven would be manageable by most adults, even nervous ones. I didn't count on the fearless spirit of youth, spurring children half my height to throw themselves into experiences that I get queasy merely writing about.

The helpful, endlessly tolerant instructors recommended three challenges of varying altitude and terror, all of which can be combined with activities such as climbing, abseiling and aerial trekking, a vertiginous jungle gym which has different heights depending on how brave you're feeling. Sadly, this was closed for maintenance the day of our visit, so our first challenge was the King Swing - the traditional playground favourite redesigned for the stars of Jackass. Strapped safely into a harness, you will watch as your sniggering companions slowly hoist you backwards into the air, before you pull a release cord and shoot downwards at speeds of up to 50 mph. Contrary to appearances, this is a great first step to dry underwear - you're lifted up quite gradually and the sturdiness of the harness means that any danger

feelings remain acceptably outside brown trouser town.

One of my victims, sorry, volunteers managed to locate the confidence to be lifted all the way to the top, and by the time my wife was unstrapped she was beaming like I'd just bought her a box of chocolates. Unfortunately, when it came to my turn I begged my lifters to stop less than halfway up, a decision I was to regret the minute I prayed to the valley spirits and yanked the release cord. Yes, the adrenaline was there, as was my girlish shrieking, but the sensation is extremely pleasant, a smooth descent like the rope swings in St Catherine's woods but minus the danger of bum splinters.

Next up was the Zipwire, which enables you to fly across the entire site whilst suspended on a length of wire, like Data in The Goonies but without crashing into a pile of bins at the end. It doesn't look terrifying from the ground, but the height of the tower is twelve metres, which reduced me to a quivering wreck by the time I was halfway up the stairs. My condition was not helped by a comprehensive goading from children small enough that they would probably just float down if they fell off.

For aerial cowards, the view from the top of the tower is so steep that one of our party almost threw up, but was nonetheless coaxed by our patient instructor into a wailing journey between the trees. The staff did a fantastic job of giving us that extra bit of confidence, helped by the fact that the harness on your back is so secure that the largest sensation of falling you experience is actually the four inch step down towards the edge of the platform. I really wanted to slink back down the stairs, but rather than face the accusing eyes of children I opted to harness up and step off the edge, and was swiftly amazed at how afraid I wasn't. Yes, I may have made some stupid noises, but I shot over



Creepy Valley like a sweaty-palmed Superman and ended up enjoying the sensation so much I would have quite happily had a second go if the opportunity had presented itself. For a man who gets vertigo playing Mario Galaxy, I really felt this was something of an achievement. Perhaps my fear of heights was cured?

Well, I've learned that you should never overestimate yourself. At the end of a session, the instructors will usually encourage you to take one of two ways back down to the ground. The Zipwire is the first, but for those who fancy something a little more direct there is the Powerfan jump. With your harness connected to a special mechanism, you walk to the end of a plank and step out clear into space, plummeting 12 metres downwards until the machinery slows your fall and lightly touches you to the ground.

I'm ashamed to say that my new-found confidence only stretched so far, and I wasn't able to bring myself to experience the undoubted adrenaline rush offered by the Powerfan jump, or even to watch it from close by. The Zipline lets you focus off into the distance, effectively ignoring the drop below you until you're zooming over it, whereas in the case of the Powerfan it's the very nature of the drop that provides the thrills.

From below, you can admire how cleverly the apparatus works to keep you safe even as you're in freefall, but the logical part of my brain merely dived under the blankets when it came to my turn to try it for myself. I watched adults screaming as they shot downwards, and tiny children stepping out with barely a fuss, but even thinking about it now is making me dizzy.

I'm proud to say that I emerged from Creepy Valley without requiring a change of underwear, but the question remained: were I and my group any less afraid of heights? A short poll reveals that the answer is a hesitant 'maybe'. Despite wussing out of the Powerfan jump, the moment where I stepped off the tower onto the Zipline was incredible, but it must be said that the disarming confidence of the instructors made us braver than we would have been if we were forced to scale cliffs or walk a tightrope. The fact that I'd happily repeat the experience means that I must have made some progress, but I won't be shopping for a parachute just yet.

Everybody goes surfing...

Having moved to Jersey from a big city a few years ago I fairly quickly took the rather clichéd step of learning to surf. Actually, in reality I took the first and easiest two mini-steps - I bought a wetsuit and the kind of board that seems to make more accomplished surfers walk just slightly ahead of me on our way down to the shore.

However, I am able to effortlessly reel off virtually every memorable quote from the early 90s classic, Point Break, and I do have a moderately sun-tanned face, so up until the critical moment at which I enter the water I can just about pass as a surfer (that last part of the image is actually due more to golf than surfing, a fact that would see me banished from beaches across the surfing world, but since I am writing under a pseudonym I feel it can be safely included).

Anyway, the key point to this rather extended introductory waffle is that despite my half hearted efforts to look and act the part, ultimately I am still unable to stand up on a surf board, thus was delighted when Gallery Magazine offered me a much needed surf lesson with the guys at Laneez Surf Centre.

As I pulled into the Laneez/EI Tico shared car park with Jack Johnson gently strumming away on the car stereo for chilled out authenticity, I was met with the sight of xchange students

30 or so Swedish foreign exchange students (steady chaps...mostly male and in their early teens) readying themselves for an aquatic battle.

I was immediately struck with the terrifying thought that I had been stitched up and would be joining their group lesson. Having squared away with my ego a one-on-one display of surfing ineptitude, the thought of full-scale humiliation in front of a much larger audience consisting of unsympathetic teenagers (think Inbetweeners) was unimaginable. Luckily, as I was vowing through gritted teeth to never peruse an issue of Gallery ever again, Nina and Cole (two of Laneez's Surf Instructors) heroically frog marched my would-be-tormentors safely down to the beach, leaving me in the calming company of my Instructor, Dan.

As we strode down to the water I tried to explain my problem. Paddling out is easy. Floating around expertly spying waves on the horizon, whilst making small talk with the guy next to you about sky diving or bank robbery, is also a doddle. I can even catch more waves than I miss. It is however, at that point, as I am hurtling along with my body still flat to the board, that it happens. The attempted 'pop-up'. For the non-surfers amongst you this can best be described as a momentary fit of flailing limbs and gargled expletives in which you are involuntarily

transferred from board to water, left dazed with seawater spouting from every facial orifice, wondering what on earth just happened.

Editor of The Surfer's Path Magazine, Alex Dick-Read, had this to say about him in a recent profile "Are you the solo-wanderer type, like Ian Battrick? The kind whose companions on the road are a small

tent, a mosquito net or a 6mm wetsuit, an iPod and a well loved quiver of boards? You spend as little as possible and stay for as long as you can. You make plenty of friends out there - fellow travellers and friendly natives - but you're essentially a free radical, beholden to no one, bound to no place or schedule. Malaria, guns, bears - whatever."

lan has had to fight off bears in Canada, camped through volcanic eruptions in Iceland, and has sat for literally months at a time on the edge of jungles and islands in Indonesia in search of perfect waves.

Every year, Ian and two friends get dropped off in the Canadian wilderness by boat (as there is no other possible way to access it) at a very far out and remote wave they know about, telling the boat driver, 'please come back in six weeks time'. It is a good couple of hours away from any kind of habitation, so they take everything they need for the stay. "We iust get dropped off with a few things the boards, wetsuits, tents, and some supplies we hope the bears won't be interested in... and a gun. You are pretty out there, no telephone reception or way of leaving in an emergency or if anything happened... and even if you had a boat there ready, it is hours from the nearest help. But the wave can be perfect and you are 100% guaranteed you won't see another person."

On his most recent expedition, bears raided the camp during the second week whilst they were out surfing, eating all their supplies for the next month, as well as chomping into surfboards, wrecking tents and anything else that took their fancy. "It wasn't a problem, after that we were just living off the land, catching fish, picking the gooseneck barnacles off the reef, shooting and getting the odd duck or goose on the fire and drinking the river water. The salmon run was also on at the time, so we were catching salmon barehanded out of the river at times too. Every day we would have bears and cougars in and around the camp when we were out of the water, and killer whales and sealions around when we were in the water. It's out there, but well worth it for the waves and camping with just your friends."



s a thoroughbred petrolhead, not much more could be asked of just one week than the passenger rides around the live action arena at the Credit Suisse International Motoring Festival, getting on the track at Circuit Faye de Bretagne in Nantes and the weekend at the 24 Heures du Mans endurance race that I was fortunate enough to experience last month. All within 7 days.

f jumping from things isn't quite your warm beverage of choice but you still seek the occasional hit of adrenaline to remind your heart what it's supposed to be up to, you probably find it either inside, on top of, or possibly even underneath something that is travelling really fast.





Sometimes, you don't even have to be attached to said projectile to get a buzz though. Sometimes just the sight of, or the noise from such a machine is enough to get the hairs on the back of your neck (even if you firmly deny their existence) standing on end. Those of you who have inappropriate minds will be way off the track by now, whereas those of you who visited any of the events surrounding the three-day Credit Suisse Jersey International Motoring Festival last month will undoubtedly know what I mean; be that the moonlight sprint, the Westmount and Mount Bingham hillclimbs or the Live Action Arena around Victoria Park.

Onlookers were faced with a dull start (weather-wise, of course) but the Relentless Live Action Arena participants weren't going to let it get in their way. The action wasn't restricted to the live action arena though, with speed events taking place on Victoria Avenue, West Park, Westmount and Mount Bingham over the course of the weekend as well as the various static displays where you could view first hand anything from a Ford Model T to the latest road cars, via Minis, classic BLMC marques, Jaguar E-Types, classic motorbikes, Land Rovers and much, much more.

This was an event attended by all sorts of different people - not just petrolheads. Motorsport isn't just something for smelly blokes down the pub; there's no sexual divide, no class divide and people of all ages were there to experience the noise and atmosphere, which was spine tingling at times. Welcome to the world's longest established endurance race: 24 heures du Mans.

With fireworks. And water pistols.

This year saw the favourite to win the LMP1 class, the number 1 Audi R18 TDi crashing spectacularly barely an hour into the race with Allan McNish at the wheel, with one of the sister cars also being taken out in a nothing short of breathtaking smash later in the evening after clipping yet another Ferrari. The number 9 Peugeot 908 in second place later had a pop at the remaining Audi just hours from the end resulting in the Peugeot race-director developing a sudden inability to speak English when quizzed by commentators. Strange, that.

Guernseyman Andy Priaulx's car, the number 56 BMW M3 GTS finished third in the GT class despite a huge accident in qualifying, although Corvette took the overall GT win yet again once the 24 hours of non-stop racing came to a drizzly close.

I'm inclined to agree, and know people who feel that their performance up Bouley Bay has been improved following a Delta Racing trackday at Loheac purely because of the confidence you build in your vehicle.

Speaking to the islanders at the Nantes trackday last month the overwhelming answer to the question 'what do you enjoy most about these events' was the camaraderie as well as the social element enjoying une bière ou trois back at the hotel once the day is over. The camaraderie was more than evident at Nantes when a Caterham 7 came unstuck, quite literally, as its throttle cable snapped. Twice. However, a crowd

of entrants soon mucked in to get it fixed in time for the return ferry crossing and the day was saved. If the worst comes to the worst though, a trailer is on hand to recover vehicles back to Jersey. Nothing is left to chance.

With a broad mix of vehicles, driver ability, background and experience as well as absolutely no elitism, these events are a must for any self-respecting petrolhead. Even the short blast through the French countryside and back on to the D137 to St Malo is a pleasure, but be careful – once the bug bites, there's little chance of it loosening its grip. Next up from The Gaa Gaa's (and the generous Gaa Gaa's at that!) are two tracks from their newest collation, 'The Black Tapes'. Tracks 'Statues' and 'Bitter & Twisted' have all the much loved darkness and Gaa Gaa sound, but with a slightly more mature approach. It's a given as the boys are morphing into a professional rock band and growing day by day into their big boy band shoes.

Of the new tracks, Gavin Tate says...

"We wanted to work more on getting our minimal electronic sound dialed in the new songs, inspired by prog acts like Errors and Moving Units as well as German Krautrock bands like Grauzone and Neu! We decided to go for a path that would make us more accessible and open to a wider audience. We started off as a Garage Punk band but over the years have progressed. This new material has helped us explore a side to our song writing that I thought we would never reach at this stage; lots of break downs, Jazz-influenced bass lines and spirally synths. The main aim since 2009 was to become more dance orientated because we were being compared to bands like The Horrors due to having similar influences. We wanted to be seen as ourselves and not an offspring even though we had been around for a lot longer."

We are excited and nervous about playing; this is our biggest show to date so we don't want anything to go wrong, we're also hoping we bring in a good crowd.

Will you get a chance to catch Brave Yesterday there?

We will be able to watch most of their set, but we have to be at our stage an hour early so we may miss the end.

How's the band progressing in Brighton?

We've found that moving here has been more of a development phase for us, we haven't had loads of gigs but our sound has progressed a lot and we have been practicing more than ever.


You're all off to uni in September - what will happen to the band? We are going to keep gigging and writing new music, it will be harder as we are further apart but we are determined to keep doing this as it is what we love to do.

Tell us about your new EP - where was it recorded/who recorded it/what does it sound like/where's it going to be available etc? We recorded and mixed the tracks with Ben Parker at Magic Lyrebird Studios, we then sent them off to be mastered at Stakeout Studios by Jason Wilcock who has worked with Quick and the Dead and Rueben who we are big fans of. The EP sounds great, we feel it captures our live sound and we can't wait for everyone to hear it. It will be available to buy from our bigcartel store (http://piratevideocompany.bigcartel.com/) which will be live on June 28th.

When will you next be playing in Jersey?

Our next Jersey gig will be August 13th at Live Lounge, it is in memory of our friend Lauren Bree and all the money raised will be going to Cystic Fibrosis Trust and Robin Ward, everyone should come and support the cause.





Having only recently met Cameron and being that he isn't local, it was a true 'find' once I heard the tracks he's been writing and producing. A range of heavy tunes were magnified with his poignant and often rather cutting lyrics; spat at the mic with vigour and deliberation, U.G certainly doesn't mince his words, nor does he hold back on saying what he sees. A diverse assortment of styles of track; from housey dance tunes, to deep and dirty dub step was the backdrop for the lyrics which had me nodding along and feeling the thought-provoking messages U.G had to share.

Who is U.G?

I'm 24, my real name is Cameron Johnson but I go by the name U.G, which is associated with the word underground, but can mean anything you want it to mean. I was born in Streatham, South London, I grew up there for half of my life then spent the other half in Leicester in the Midlands and other parts of London. I've been MCing for 14 years but before that I was writing poetry which I can remember doing from the age of about 6. Writing has always been a big part of my life. I would describe my content as blunt and unforgiving but truthful. I would describe my style as old skool with a new skool flow and delivery...

Growing up, who inspired you musically?

Talkin' old, I'd say John Holt and Bob Marley were up there. Then I'd say Naz was the one artist who made me sit up and take notice. Naz spat lyrics which were more than just rap – rap always seemed quite simple until he came along and tore it up with honest lyrics, ones that had meaning, they're relatable and from the heart. He was a proper artist...

Who would you say is up there as an inspiration now? Who's doing things that make your ears take notice?

Well lyrically, I'd say there's no one better than MC Ghetto. As for other genres, I like what Chase and Status are doing; they've really managed to bring underground to the forefront.

What inspires you day to day? The feeling of wanting to get a message across is really important to me. It is definitely what drives me, and I have quite a lot to say. Music is an ideal platform for people to use to get their point across – it helps if their point has some depth, some meaning... then as a tool, music has no boundaries and you can say exactly what you think.

What are your thoughts on the local scene?

I've not really integrated into the scene in Jersey yet, I've not really been here very long. Back in London the scene is jumping, there's loads on and a lot of talent there. I'm looking forward to getting involved over here. I'll be playing around and about soon; look out for my name at Tanguys and a new night starting on Wednesdays in Pure.

Who are you most looking forward to seeing at Jersey Live?
Katy B. I like her harmonies and I'm really looking forward to seeing her perform that live.

Who would you say is your musical 'hero' and why?
Naz. For all the reasons I said before.
The guy's a genius. And a bunch of old skool garage MCs like Wiley...

Well, thank you for introducing yourself U.G and we look forward to you cracking the 'scene' in Jersey!

After years in the musical wilderness, Jersey is beginning to produce more than its fair share of bands, musicians and producers that are doing the island proud in the UK music scene; from Ivor Novello-nominated Nerina Pallot to Jamie Lovatt's goth-rockers ROMANCE (signed to Polydorsubsidary Fiction Records and recently confirmed to perform at the world famous Reading and Leeds Festivals), to young up-and-comers Pirate Video Company and Brave Yesterday who recently flew the flag for Jersey on the hallowed stages of Glastonbury Festival, it seems that Jersey has its finger firmly in England's esteemed musical pie. Yes, the pie of music.

Another group of Jersey's talented young things are dance producers Schema. Receiving glowing reviews from the likes of International DJ Magazine, and Radio One airplay, they have been catapulted to the status of one of the most exciting dubstep/breakbeat acts around. A new EP on Jay Cunning's Sub Slayers label, entitled 'The Revival EP' is due out on August 12th and sees them explore the murky world of jungle. Which, incidentally, is massive.

Tell us a bit about the new EP, and why the foray into jungle? Is this a one-off project or do you see it as part of a wider evolution of the Schema ? Well the EP is made up of 140bpm Jungle, or 'Future Jungle' as it's been coined, and dubstep. We've also got collaborations with Terminal State and Future Jungle superheroes Pyramid. We grew up listening to Jungle, so the current resurgence of Jungle is more of a homecoming. It's great we can pull out all the old Jungle samples that we used to use, it's definitely part of our sound going forward.

This is your biggest release yet - does it feel like a risk veering away from your tried and tested sound?

No, we just write what we like really and we've had great feedback so far from the label so we're excited about it!

Do you have any collaborations in the pipeline?

Yeah, also alongside a couple remixes we have to keep quiet, we're currently writing with Afghan Headspin, Jay Cunning and Atomic Hooligan. Which is

The release party's Friday August 12th at Pure. It'll be a Sub Slayers label night, we'll being playing all our new material, and will be joined by label boss, KissFM & RAM resident, Jay Cunning. We'll also have the up and coming talent of Markie P in support.

Do you have any plans to base yourself in the UK, or can you do what you want to do from Jersey? No we don't really need to. A lot of our gigs are in England, and we've been taken on by Cut La Roc's Rocstar agency recently so it poses no real issue, just an inconvenience. The mainland is only a 35-minute flight away. If anything, being over here has added a uniqueness, when at festivals or UK gigs, a lot of the time the first thing people say when meeting them is, 'ah, so you're the Jersey boys'. Being just another Dubstep producer from London wouldn't really help.

Are any of you working on any new projects other tha

Robin has returned from Amsterdam so him and Dozza have reignited Terminal State and they are working with Zero Zero on a label, Vanguard Audio.

You've done very well to get yourselves out there and hear without having to relocate so far - what advice would you give to other Jersey producer and musicians wanting to do the same thing? Thanks! Just don't be shy about reaching out to mainland artists and labels; the world's smaller now than it's ever been so the old rules don't neccesarily apply anymore. Or just book them to play in Jersey and ply them with booze...

Jack your body

Jackmaster, or Jack Revill to his mum, is a rare breed. In a day where you don't 'make it' unless you're an established producer he has managed to win DJ Mag's 'Best of British Breakthrough DJ award' and has recently recorded a critically acclaimed Fabriclive mix for the London super club, which he was asked to do on the back of some extremely well received performances there. All this and he's only 25. Now usually this type of talent makes me slightly sick with envy, however there's no doubting his passion for the scene in which he operates nor his dedication to pushing things forward. Mixmag recently described him as 'upfront, unrelenting and loaded with invention, this party DJ is way ahead of the pack' and resident Advisor had his Fabriclive mix on their RA recommends chart for weeks. It's fair to say he's hot property, and his attitude and determination have only seen his stock rise and rise in recent months.

As the head of Glasgow based record label Numbers he is passionate about putting out forward thinking music made by British artists, and counts artists such as Hudson Mohawke, Jamie XX & Deadboy as close friends and collaborators. It's clear that he's having the time of his life, travelling the world, playing parties and hanging out with his pals. In recent interviews of his I've read, when quizzed upon the roots of his label, most of his stories tend to start with 'We'd been up all night, and...' It's a hard job but someone's got to do it I suppose.

Although apparent that Jack is living the so-called dream, what is not so clear is exactly what kind of music his label releases and indeed, what he plays. Some people have described it as 'post-dubstep', as if that particular genre has already had its day. Some have been referring to it as 'UK bass music', a catch-all term that refers to the bass heavy, glitchy sounds coming out of London, Glasgow, Bristol and beyond. Jack's not a fan of either of

these terms, preferring to just refer to what he plays and releases as House & Techno. Although this is technically an accurate description, the end result of their output is some mutant form of both of these strains of electronica, their DNA heavily altered, but at the end of the day it's not too distant from a 4/4 beat and you play it in nightclubs. So there you go. If you're planning to attend come prepared for an onslaught of Dubstep flavours, with a House sensibility, and don't be surprised to hear a few classic tracks thrown in for good measure. Loves a classic does Jack - the numbers website has examples of him playing anything from saccharine sweet 80's pop through to Drexcyiastyle Detroit Electro. He's also not ashamed to admit his love of classic house, having played a set of, in his words, '90's commercial house bangers' in Fabric not so long ago. I wonder how the hipsters handled
