



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

Most impressive thing ever done:


Winston: I pounce on the ball like a cat-very impressive.

Love it or loathe it, the time you spend in education doesn't just leave you with new skills, a couple of certificates to put on your wall and friends you'll keep in touch with for years, it can also have an effect on the rest of your life. And when the education system works well, it won't just be you who feels the benefit. 'A good quality, successful education system will be vital for the future prosperity of Jersey and the wellbeing of people who live here' said Jersey's Minister for Education, Sport & Culture, Deputy James Reed.

Whether you're still studying, a recent graduate, or have kids who are starting school, you probably have an opinion about how things could be improved. So shout about it. Education, Sport & Culture have just launched a discussion paper to find out what can be done to improve the face of education across the island, and they want to hear from you.

The paper looks at all aspects of the current provision - from nursery education to adult learning - and asks the public to comment on what should change. Deputy James Reed says: 'This paper is a starting point for an open and honest debate on how education is provided. We know from recent events that education can be an emotive and controversial issue. That's why I have decided to issue a discussion

paper in this form. It is essential to give people the facts in context and provide everyone with the opportunity to make their views known.' So it's over to you. Did your education experience leave you with the skills you needed to survive in the real world? Were you prepared for university? Are there things that could be changed to make the transition from high school to university easier for the next generation of students? Yes, it's true - the sun's going to come up, your tent will resemble a dirtier version of Tracy Emin's bed and that's the last time you'll miss most of Radiohead because the idiot in front of you sat his girlfriend up on his shoulders during Paranoid Android.



ell, stand up and dry your eyes on that man dressed as a wookie, because I've driven here in a converted ambulance to pick up some hitchhikers, and we aren't stopping 'til we've reached a grassy paradise where we can pitch our tents, ignore an acoustic guitar/didgeridoo combo and stay up all night grinding our teeth to the screeching dubstep pumping out of Krazy Gomez 2nd Hand Blanket Stall. As far as I'm concerned, the party only stops when it's winter in New Zealand and Barcelona at the same time, and if you take a look at the festival schedule there's plenty of countries that apparently agree with me.

Britain: black market welly capital of the world

The only good thing about British summertime is that despite our horrendous weather we've reached a point where any community large enough to have more than three pubs is now legally obliged to stage a music festival at some point. Jersey has a few, Guernsey has several; even Sark apparently has one, although I refuse to attend in case it's just another devious ploy to lure fresh material into their stagnant gene pool.

I hear Jersey Live is great, but as a hardened festival veteran I refuse to attend unless there's enough mud to cause trench foot, and until I'm permitted to camp for at least five days without changing my underwear. Go green and use your own steam

Thursday 22 September is Green Travel Day here in Jersey, sponsored by The Channel Islands Cooperative Society. The aim of the day is to for as many people as possible to leave their cars at home and make their way to work by walking, cycling, taking the bus or car sharing.

Could you walk?

30% of car trips to work in Jersey are under 2 miles. It takes only 30 to 40 minutes to walk 2 miles. Bel Royal, Five Oaks and Le Squez are all about 2 miles from the centre of town. Walking is a great way to get to work. It doesn't cost you anything, other than a bit of shoe leather. It doesn't create any pollution and it's a really good form of exercise.

Could you cycle?

50% of car trips to work in Jersey are under 3 miles. It only takes 12 to 15 minutes to cycle 3 miles. For a lot of people it will be quicker to cycle than to drive and find a parking place! It'll be much cheaper too. Cycling is estimated to cost only 30p per day (AA derived -£75 p.a./2500miles). It's pollution free and you'll be getting some good exercise.

When was the last time you took a bus?

If it's been a while since you caught a bus to work, give it a try. You may well find bus travel has changed since last time. There are double-deckers on Route 15 and some of the newer buses have wi-fi access. With single fares ranging from £1.10 to £1.70, it's much cheaper than parking your car for the day in a public car park.

Constructive Dismissal:

What is constructive dismissal? This is when an employee decides themselves that they will leave their job as a result of the employers conduct towards them.

The employee therefore must show that there has been a breach of contract and that, that breach was very serious. The employee cannot have accepted the breach. This would be the case if for instance an employee was given a large reduction in pay on day 1 and some months later is still working in that job. This would amount to acceptance.

The employee must then resign in response. The longer the time between the breach and the resignation, the less likely that it is connected. That is unless they can show they remained under protest and it was economically impossible to resign immediately.

The breach can be a one off as above or a slow accumulation of acts. This is called the "last straw", and is often the case in bullying or harassment which we looked at last month.

The most common breaches of contract

- 1. Wages failure to pay or reduction.
- 2. Trust and Confidence.
- 3. Duties a significant variation of an employees duties.
- 4. Working hours insistence that an employee work overtime with no contractual obligation to do so.
- 5. Job location moving an employee beyond a reasonable commuting distance unless the contract holds an express mobility clause not often viable in Jersey.
- 6. Suspension without pay.
- 7. Swearing at or criticising an employee, especially if at a manager in the presence of subordinates.
- 8. Inadequate support.
- 9. Dealing with grievances / disciplinary
- 10. Failing to provide a suitable/safe work environment.

As you can see this is a reaction by the employee unlike unfair dismissal which is a reaction by the employer.

Unfair Dismissal

Unfair dismissal is the most common reason relied upon by an employee when bringing a tribunal claim against an employer. The question then is whether the dismissal was fair or unfair. The key to this is did the employer act reasonably in the circumstances and follow a fair procedure? Each instance would be looked at on the individual facts.

This is probably the most difficult for employers if a member of staff is caught stealing and the employer seeks to dismiss immediately - this could be unfair. In this situation the employer must act reasonably. The courts have held this to mean that a procedure must be followed that allows the employee to know all the evidence against them and have the opportunity to defend themselves. To see the act and dismiss would not give the employee the opportunity to see the evidence against them and have the opportunity to defend themselves.

What would happen if the employer saw a member of staff taking £50 from a till and so sacked the employee immediately, when, given the opportunity to defend themselves, the employer might be taking money that they themselves had put into the till earlier in the day for safe keeping!

A Tribunal will ask "whether the employer genuinely believed that the employee had been guilty of the misconduct when it dismissed. If so were there reasonable grounds for the belief. Finally did the employer carry out as much investigation into the matter as was reasonable in all the circumstances before dismissing." This is known as the "reasonable test" from BHS Ltd v Burchell. The question is would a reasonable employer have responded in the

A procedure must be followed that both employer and employee know and understand.

Tribunals pushed to be more pro active.

In a recent UK case Gayle v Sandwell & West Birmingham Hospitals NHS Trust the Tribunal was criticised for not being pro active.

Lord Justice Mummery commented,

"Procedural efficiency and justice are...... of direct concern to the judiciary: the courts and the tribunals are equipped with wide discretionary powers to ensure that cases are dealt with justly. One area of debate is about cases of little or no merit, but considerable nuisance value. All are agreed that they should be cleared out of the system as soon as possible. They should not be allowed to take up a disproportionate amount of time in the ET or cause the other party to incur irrecoverable legal costs and loss of valuable working time."

I for one would congratulate this view, it should not be a recommendation, it should be essential. In the UK the Tribunals have the opportunity to award costs against a nuisance claimant. We do not have this in Jersey, therefore I believe the Tribunal should be more willing to be pro active.

Using the court process in divorce is expensive, stressful and time consuming. Asking the judge to make a decision about the finances of the family means that neither party to the divorce has any effective say in how the money and property are split.

Are there other ways of resolving financial disputes after the marriage has broken down? The answer is a resounding "yes".

In my experience there are very few cases that are unsuitable for what is called alternative dispute resolution. In the vast majority of cases there is no reason why a compromise cannot be reached either before the court process has started or even once court proceedings have been commenced. In fact, some of the most successful settlements that I have helped negotiate have been reached quite a long way into the court process.

The advantages of settling are fairly obvious. The legal costs will be lower, stress levels reduced for both the wife and the husband but perhaps most importantly the decision will be reached by both parties and not by the court. This can have an incredibly beneficial effect in helping them move forward and be advantageous for any children of the marriage too.

I have successfully used 3 different approaches to resolving financial matters. These are traditional mediation, collaborative law and what I term private financial dispute resolution.

Mediation: During this process the independent mediator will attempt to get the couple to reach their own agreement. Often lawyers will not be present during the mediation and the mediator can be legally trained but this is not always the case.

Collaborative law: The parties and their respective lawyers commit themselves to trying to reach an agreement outside the arena of the court. A series of meetings are held called four-way meetings, attempts are made to settle matters and an agreement put before the court for ratification.

Private financial dispute resolution: The parties ask an experienced lawyer to effectively act as a judge in order to bring them to an agreement or at least to narrow the issues that are dividing them.

All of these approaches have advantages and disadvantages and every case is different. For example, it is unlikely that a case would be suitable for mediation if one of the parties were fearful or dominated by the other. However, I have successfully used the private financial dispute resolution method in such cases. Again in my experience none of the above will work if one party is seeking to hide assets from the other. These are the cases which will require the court process to assist at least to begin with until full disclosure is made.

Reasonable legal fees: the importance of appointing a quality conveyancer

Conveyancing fees have long been the subject of debate, particularly since the abolition of the 1% conveyancing scale fee in Jersey, in which a fixed price was charged for the service no matter what was involved.

As well as causing you a considerable loss, it is possible that a future sale of your property would be entirely jeopardised or seriously delayed.

You can't get more retro than Jersey Archive, which stores the island's written history – all 600 years of it. From a signed

copy of the King's speech (yes, that one) to witch trials and scandals

We just love facts and figures at Gallery - how many archives does the Jersey archive have?

There are 300,000 different volumes, files and papers dating back to 1378.

Yup. That's pretty impressive. So was Jersey good at keeping records?

In some ways. Before 1993 there wasn't an official archive, so records were stored all over the island, in States departments and parish halls. Normally to save space, archives get put in the cellar where it's damp and mouldy so we lose them. We've been lucky in that so much has survived.

What's the strangest thing you've ever discovered?

We came across some lab slides containing some rather unusual medical samples that were used in an old court case - I won't go into any more detail!

(Intrigued and slightly disappointed) Oh. Can you tell us the next strangest thing?

A woman in Australia contacted us about her great great grandmother who'd been sent there as a convict from Jersey. She never knew the reason why. We discovered that her relative had been a notorious brothel keeper in St Helier and had murdered a Centenier who was trying to close the brothel down! We were a bit nervous about passing the information on, but thankfully she was quite excited to find out her great great grandmother's history.

It sounds fascinating...

It is. The archives are about stories. When you come across a story that's unusual, it leaps off

How easy is it to trace your family history?

We're open to the public three days a week, (Tues-Thurs) and then one Saturday a month there's a 'What's your Street's Story' lecture on a different area of the island. This month it's Les Quennevais.

How long does it take?

It depends. If your family has lived in Jersey and hasn't moved very far and you want the bare bones, you can get a lot quickly. Then it's delving deeper to find out the stories - did any of your ancestors end up in to court, were they in hospital, etc.

Are people curious about their history?

here want to find out about their family history. But researching the history of your house is popular too. With family history you always discover things you didn't know, or find out the truth about family stories that have been passed down...

Give us an example...

One person had a family member that they though had died heroically in the war, but it turned out he didn't - he'd just left his wife

The Jersey Archive building is stunning - it's won lots of design awards. What's it like working here?

Amazing. It has lots of design references to the archive - there's a strip of glass around the central section to make it appear like a floating box of treasures and the divider glass in the reading room features quotes about Jersey. It's in the top 10% of archives in the UK.

What do you need to be an archivist?

When I did my archive degree they said you've got to be organized and love history and I think I'd add you've got to be quite nosy because you've also got to enjoy delving and finding out.

What would you have been if you hadn't become an archivist?

A teacher.

What time period would you have liked to have been around in?

I'm a mediaeval fan, so the 13th, 14th or 15th centuries.

What's your favourite place in Jersey?

When I came home from university, I always looked forward to seeing Gorey Castle, but I got married in Elizabeth Castle, so I'd have to say that one.

What's the most rewarding part of your job?




Who do you think you are? You can find out at Jersey Archive!

Pull together full names, dates of birth, marriage and death if possible and any other relevant details such as military service. On your first visit to the Jersey Archive you will need to bring a passport or driving licence in order to register as a reader. There is no charge for registering or using the Archive to view documents and there's a team of dedicated, professional staff on hand to help you with your family history queries and show you more about the records they care for.





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tart to learn some truth behind Bahrain's demonstrations on the half hour flight from Qatar. The (rather handsome) air steward is factual and passionate. Within minutes, I discover what the world yet hasn't. He tells me doctors are prevented from treating the injured, that Bahrainis of all faiths (including Sunni AND Shia'a) are protesting over being denied jobs and residency whilst foreigners from other Arab nations get all of these. One man's views, but two days later, I read about it in the international press.

Arrival in Bahrain is a nasty bite of reality. It's late night, my attention flits to blue lights outside surrounding the airport and men, en masse, lingering. I wonder what they're doing as I search for a placard... no placard, my car hasn't turned up and is unreachable. With no idea of my bearings, proximity to the hotel or protests, I feel uneasy. A kind shop assistant, who calls the hotel, proclaims, 'Not a good time to arrive!' Curious by his comment, I ask why, since the violence has paused and protests restricted to one area. He tells me fiftythousand people are at the rally tonight. That stops me cold; I had read of only a few thousand. He elaborates under his breath

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about the anticipated arrival of a known terrorist who's wanted in Bahrain. He may be arrested on arrival but for fear of raising tensions further, he may be granted a Royal pardon. His arrival would flare emotions, inflame numbers and whip the demonstrators into frenzy, particularly following recent deaths. I feel anxious at what's to come, having known none of this. The excitement that had built disintegrates into a cold slap of reality as danger becomes a valid possibility.

It's 1am. Entering the hotel is eerie. Security is colossal, which figures, as my sources tell me the renaissance-style hotel is also quietly owned by the ruler. The entrance is lined by guards and to access the poolside I pass security and swipe my room key. As I walk along the soft flour private beach to miles of silence in every direction, a guard appears keeping watch. I feel strangely safe but it raises questions in my mind. Being the only person there, with not a guest in sight, is the clearest signal of the current state of affairs. Most people have cancelled.

I'm a lover of seclusion and I certainly get it here. The law of supply and demand works in my favour; as people cancel, I gain discretion, tranquillity and added personalised service.

I hit problems that evening as I decide to explore Bahrain; top of my list are AdLiya and Bab al Bahrain old market. The head of security is summoned. 'Not advisable,' he commands, saying they've received embassy orders. I later realise that 'not advisable'

also means 'not possible' or just 'No,' as he explains that many market stall holders are demonstrators, thus a risk to my security. After a heated discussion, I'm dragged away by a friend who sternly reminds me to be mindful speaking 'in that tone' in an Arab male-dominated land. I return, massage the ego saying I appreciate his concern, but remind him he can't tell me what to do. Seems he can though, as the porters then refuse to send a car to Manama.

Turning away, I'm so overwhelmed with disappointment and feeling restricted; tears of frustration rush down my face. Being just a kilometre from Pearl Square yet learning nothing and speaking to no-one involved seems ridiculous...I need to see, understand and find out, for myself.

Unable to accept it, I decide that not going is not an option and prepare to walk. At that moment, I'm stopped by my first aide. A hotel boss approaches me as I blurt out raw emotion; I explain that although I'm on holiday, I'm a Journalist and beyond that, I'm interested. He spectacularly offers to drive me to the demonstrations, in his own car. I jump at the offer! Safety is a worry and I feel terrible walking past heads of security, porters, reception and concierge, who clearly disprove. But opportunities only knock once, I remind myself, and what an opportunity I'd have missed!

Eyes peeled wide, scouting, and heart racing like it's in the F1, I'm quivering with nerves and excitement. Within 3 minutes I see

protestors, in their hundreds. To my complete surprise, I see as many women as men, one group even ditching their white and red spray-painted car on a highway, carrying a young baby, draped in flags. Thousands more follow. Masses walk towards Pearl Square, the heart of the protests, where camping crowds have taken over the entire symbolic roundabout. Traffic is utter chaos. A few sweet words convince a traffic controller to let us drive into the start of the mass rally. Nearby, children play in the dust below the intimidating flyover, like a rainbow dotted with police, rising over Pearl Square. No gold at the end of this though; just days earlier police fired tear gas and rubber bullets from there, engulfing camps and killing several. I've never seen so many red and white flags. Ironically, the red symbolises love and white, peace. Women wear the flag as their Burka and young men, holding hands, are wrapped in it. A 5-foot flag undulates proudly in the night breeze by a tall metal structure bearing a Pearl, rising out of the heart of Pearl Square, an image beamed to TV screens the world over.

As we drive past the 'Exhibition Centre' sign, I get déjà-vu having seen it days earlier on the news. It's surreal; I'm here. Full-length posters of loved ones lost, two days ago, cling to the flyover emblazoned

with sprayed Arabic slogans. The emotion is electrifying; within seconds it stings, even to an outsider. Large soiled tents are erected all around but I can't see inside without looking too hard. I must not attract attention. Loudspeakers roar deafening Arabic chants. Like an outer-body experience; I'm there but it's in slow-motion, an anaesthetised moving picture; that is until we get caught in the start of the rally, shaking me out of shock and into the protest with a thud. A car has turned in behind us. A young protestor strains himself looking

into the car; I can hear his mind, 'do they belong here?' He's approaching with a large group. I panic and urge we leave, feeling a full-scale panic attack coming on. We hastily get away. On the way back, I ask my aide if he'll tell his family. He absolutely refuses saying they'd be furious. That tells me a lot, he's just like me.

Later that night, I convince him to get me a hotel car to Adliya, the Bohemian quarter, packed with restaurants from Vietnamese to steakhouses. It's trendy and hectic, usually. Tonight, it's vacuous.

Next morning I'm excited abut a private tour of Bahrain. It starts terribly, as my tour guide asks my occupation. I reply honestly, 'BBC Journalist', quick to identify that this is a holiday. 'I hate you, I'm against you,' he responds. Shocked by the hatred, I'm rendered momentarily speechless. He then subjects me to lengthy criticism of media coverage of protests. But as I soon learn, he's not alone. The papers extensively

report what they feel are shortcomings in international reportage.

Bahrain Fort suddenly appears, on a disused seafront, a corner of tranquillity. In this city of modernity, the Fort is incomprehensibly

old. The postcard view of the city skyline is inspiring for an afternoon with a drawing pad. Poverty borders the fort. It's fringed with improvised homes, strung under canopies, in which groups of men bicker happily over a game of dominoes. Many live on the breadline in Bahrain, not what most associate with wealthy Arab nations. Exploring the Fort's remains, unearthed just last year by international archaeologists, I'm overly excited about visiting the UNESCO World Heritage site.

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A short drive takes us to King Fahd causeway, a 27 mile four-lane engineering feat over sea linking Bahrain to Saudi Arabia. You may have seen striking news images of tanks drafted in from Saudi, along it. Saudi is so close yet a world apart, a dry nation, completely alcohol-free, much like my next destination, Kuwait. The shabby half-way tower is being refurbished but affords immense 360 panoramic views. The causeway fades romantically both directions, into a sandy mist.

That morning, news breaks that the Bahrain Grand Prix is cancelled, due to the unrest. It'll cost Bahrain millions. I sneak a tour of the track, although it's officially closed. The sprawling site, amidst desert landscape, is a fantasy world. I bolt up a stairwell, before officials can stop me, to catch breathtaking bird's eye views. My imagination takes off and I see thousands of onlookers cheering, hear performance engines whizzing past the chiselled bends, smell burning rubber and imagine royalty in the box ahead. I'm later told all the racing drivers stay at my hotel. I vow to return!

It's no wonder. The hotel is voted the best in Bahrain and on the Conde Nast Gold List of World's Best places to stay. I stumble upon its exclusive cachet; another entirely secluded beach hidden from view with private beachfront villas, each with butler and pool. Set against a backdrop of city skyscrapers, it's the most ironic bubble of serenity as, a kilometre away, tens of thousands rally battling for their lives. I'm disturbed only by government helicopters circling overhead. The still and peaceful retreat is the ultimate paradox as the country's torn apart down the road. I sip champagne into the afternoon, battling this paradox in my head.

Suddenly, I'm interrupted by an apologetic man from Concierge; someone is in the lobby asking to see me. He's 'received information' a BBC Journalist is staying there. We narrow down three possibilities; an undercover Embassy official checking if I'm working on a tourist visa, an antimedia protestor or a genuine story. I am on holiday, I remind myself, and meeting him would be unwise. He passes on a letter, swiftly removed from my possession by security. My status is turned to 'incognito,' which erases me from hotel records. I'm slightly shaken yet highly curious.

Lured in further by each successive event, I still intensely desire more. Light bulb moment: a 'night tour' of Bahrain, at the end of which I'll ask the guide to take me to Pearl Square. In reality, I pester repeatedly. He reacts furiously, parks up in a car park minutes away, and begrudgingly marches me in. His forewarnings are stark, 'do not run, under any circumstance, and act like

you belong.' On foot, it's immediately real. I can't back out but we've no protection. Courage seeps out of me, trailing back to the car but my feet take forced steps closer; I'm exposed as vulnerable and frightened, a fraud until now. Panic plagues me. He's marching on ahead with military determination, which I know I've caused. Hundreds of dumped cars litter the market square and dusty side streets, carloads of Bahrainis in standstill traffic cheer, jeer and chant, waving flags. Their display, expressing their opinions, forms part of a cult feeling of romantic primitivism. The final few steps plunge us directly into the soul of Pearl Square. My heart almost stops. I feel insignificant yet in the spotlight, as all around momentum gathers to rally. It's a blur as minutes feel like hours. A violent stench of human faeces penetrates the back of my nostrils inspiring the urge to vomit, or maybe it's just nerves. I stop myself. The danger is razor-edge, more acute than I ever recall feeling, a sense only heightened against the charcoal sky strewn with red firecracker smoke as flames of small fires burn profusely on the ground. I'm paralysed by the intensity of loudspeakers booming Arabic chants, inciting an entire population. Demonstrators glare at me; they can tell I don't belong but it just takes one to react.

Every step frames a new snapshot and I see something that amazes me; sofas, makeshift stoves, mattresses and bedding. People have actually moved into Pearl Square. To protesting Bahrainis, it's a sanctuary of hope and unity. As I look around, it's claustrophobic and crowded. I start to hyperventilate. Encircled by thousands of shoddily erected smeared tents, I glance in to see four generations cooking, eating dinner, feeding babies and the elderly. The megalithic monument that is the imposing symbol of Pearl Square is within touching distance. Instinct abruptly kicks in as I spot a large group of young men, who look particularly agitated, right ahead. I'm ready to leave, sensing trouble. I've come to my senses, which I'm proud of, but am later told is too late, having endangered our lives. I hadn't seen it that way. We make a swift exit and walk back. I later learn that the guide is Sunni, largely considered opposition. He's my second shining star this trip as I realise the risk and sacrifice he's made.

Back at the hotel, unravelling from sheer adrenaline and fear, a strange exhaustion seizes me, almost suddenly. The fear that propelled me has thieved my energy and I'm numb and shell-shocked, at what I've just done. 'Why did I feel so compelled and, worse, jeopardise others?' I question myself and my motivations. I 'crossed the line' but perhaps it was a step too far. Given the violence that's since suddenly erupted at Pearl



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Square, we are lucky to be alive.

The events only start to sink in the following day. I accept it ends there and focus on trying to enjoy the spa and hotel restaurants, the stunningly atmospheric Indian restaurant said to be a hit with Bahrain's Royal family.

Expecting a relatively tame time in Kuwait, I treat it as the beginning of the end. How wrong I am. Kuwait is a geode rock; dull on first glance, but slice into the middle and unleash an Aladdin's cave of gems. It's a dream finale to round off the trip of a lifetime, though still in keeping with the undercurrent of danger.

At 5am, I'm exhausted, fragile and unnerved in the airport waiting lounge. The entire crowd is giggling and staring. I'm the only tourist on the flight and they find my Western trouser-and-top combo amusing. Right now, I'm really regretting this choice of destination, echoes of travel agents, 'I told you so' resounding in my head. I'm prepared to fully cover up, possibly even having to cover my hair (I have a black Pashmina), and consciously tame the feisty feminist.

Arrival is explosive. Flag bunting's out, paparazzi flashes are blinding and the red carpet's laid. I've literally stumbled into the culmination of a triple-headed celebration, the biggest ever in Kuwait, with Prime Ministers, foreign secretaries and Presidents from 47 countries descending upon the small Arab country, and little old me. They're celebrating '50/20/5', the combination of 50th national day, 20th Liberation Day and 5th anniversary of the King's rule, who Kuwaitis seem to adore. Surrounding Gulf and Arab neighbours pour in to join the carnival mayhem. But not as we'd imagine - Kuwait is a dry state, completely alcohol-free.

Ruling representatives are welcoming foreign delegates, half of them, to my astonishment, staying at my hotel, Le Meridien Tower.

It's entirely sealed off and surrounded by military tanks, loaded with National Guard soldiers staring at me down the barrel of their guns. Walking past openly-armed soldiers, sniffer dogs and personal bodyguards is massively disconcerting. Seeing army tanks and rifles on TV, I thought I'd be immune so I'm shocked at my discomfort, but I'm certain my life wouldn't be spared at the slightest doubt. The final straw snaps in the lobby, where sheets fully cover all the windows to prevent anyone seeing in. I walk through metal scanners and have my bags checked into a lobby crammed with soldiers and Sheikhs, owning the space in a menac-



ing way and giving intimidating glares. On a normal holiday, I'm welcomed by in fitted jeans, designer bags and off-shoulder tops and boys sporting the flashiest supercars, show me up in my covered-up shapeless

I head straight for the single renowned symbol, the Kuwait Towers, lit up by powerful beams, forming the pulse of the carnival. It's a breathtaking sight and I snap away furiously on my camera, only to receive angry looks. Two days later, I find out photography is banned in Kuwait. OOPS!

Hundreds of thousands of party-goers are covered in green, white and red; Kuwait's flag. The climax is a dizzying display of music, fireworks, fire-propelled parachutes and graphics, set against a backdrop of the staggering Towers. Inside, leaders of the world are entertained by Emir Sabah IV Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah. I must share this – a common joke there, 'What could the Syrian president be saying to the Lebanese president? What's the Iraqi president chatting about with the King of Bahrain?' I do wonder.

As they're inside, a dazzling cavalcade silences the crowds; fireworks jut out of the bones of the towers, in an hour-long spectacular. Hundreds more fire from boats along the entire coastline. At one point, the entire towers are shrouded in the brightest platinum light with the sky filled red, white and green. The world is painted, momentarily. I'm moved to tears in an audiovisual feat as hovering helicopters reflect alongside actual war scenes depicted on the towers, incarnated as a military target. Onlookers are wowed, crying and hugging. It's a successful night of colossal numbers, with no trouble in sight.

For one weekend only, police allow most

things, although their presence is allencompassing. Car boots are open on highways; children rammed in them like cargo, more hang out of car windows by their fingertips, others sit on moving car roofs. They're dressed as terrorists and armed with super-soakers. The theme is to filter through hectic traffic and soak people in cars; anyone and everyone. I can't believe my eyes as children aged 4 or 5 weave through moving traffic, wrapped in headscarves, poking water-guns into unlocked cars. I assume it symbolises the Gulf war. Each car boasts 20+ flags, many are spraypainted and hazard lights flash permanently with constant hooting. The display leaves me astounded, putting New Year celebrations to shame, taking extravagance to a level comparable only to the Dubai Atlantis opening. The Gulf knows how to put on a show! At that point, I feel truly blessed for this unique experience.

Now, at the airport about to head home, the total lack of sleep, adrenaline, fear and self-questioning peaks. The iconic trip has twisted my senses, altered my perceptions and thrown me into uncharted territory with myself, mentally and physically. Fact is, I saw the authentic reality I sought. I think it's because it wasn't just a view, I saw into it and the landscape was seeing me back reflexively; unpolarised for a brief moment. A revolution continues across the Middle East but, inside, my own mini-revolution is well and truly alive.

Airport Car Park charges to jump

Thursday 1 September 2011 will see an increase in car parking charges at Jersey Airport for the first time in over two years.

Jersey Airport's Terminal & Security Manager, Steve Read said, 'Jersey Airport has maintained its current car parking charges since May 2009. These revised rates reflect the recent 5% rise in GST, together with the need for the airport to maintain a fair balance between aviation and non-aviation income.'

However, the area alongside the access road leading to the departures terminal will remain a designated free pick up zone. This allows drivers up to 10 minutes waiting time at no cost and has proved popular since it was first introduced in 2010.

The new rates are as follows:

The 'short stay' car park, which is located immediately in front of the arrivals terminal, will increase from 60 pence per half hour (or part of) to 70 pence per half hour (or part thereof).

The 'long stay' car park, which is located between the arrivals and departures terminal, will increase from 60 pence per hour (or part of) to 70 pence per hour (or part thereof).

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


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The Internet has played a positive role in transforming Ginny Rankin Carleson's life in the past five years. She and her husband met online and they subsequently moved to a country bordering the Arctic Circle, from where her website is based.

Without the Net, it's entirely possible she'd still be in Jersey, plugging away in the Finance Industry where she'd already dedicated seventeen years of her career. During those years, however, she'd always harboured a dream: to own a house with sufficient land attached to keep her horse...

Well, this dream has now become a reality, although Ginny's "house" per se is not a house at all, but an ancient farm in much need of renovation. Also, it is located far from Jersey - in southern Sweden - her husband's country of birth.

The path to fulfilling her dream hasn't been an easy ride, however. Those less resilient might have given up long before, and it's only because of Ginny's sheer determination that four years of struggling have finally paid off and she is starting to feel settled. Myriad problems arose along the way and Ginny is the first to admit it's taken them "a lot of blood, sweat and tears" to get this far. She confesses, "We've really had to learn the hard way about land ... and running a farm!" So, with Ginny's background in finance and her husband's profession as a dentist, why did they start farming for a living?

"The idea of us buying a farm was in the hope that I could create a small business looking after horses, a livery stables", she explains. "The thirteenth house we looked at and bought is a very old pig farm in Flyinge. We also have 23 acres of land. We could never have a property and land like this in Jersey – it cost us £250,000 and you can't even buy a decent flat back home for that!"

Flyinge is famous for the breeding of Swedish Warmblood horses and King Carl Gustaf himself established this place as a Royal stud back in 1661 although it is actually one of the oldest equine breeding areas in the world, dating back to the 12th century. These days Flyinge is synonymous with all matters equestrian: training, sports, veterinary medicine, seminars, courses and clinics, attracting experts worldwide.

So what sort of obstacles has she had to overcome? The winters are apparently becoming harsher in southern Sweden with temperatures dropping to -25C. With ice and deep snow for several weeks they've even had to buy a snow plough to clear their own driveway! The isolation has often led to loneliness, and although Ginny is learning Swedish and is married to a native (with in-laws visiting from Stockholm whenever possible) she says, "Swedes are notoriously private and tend to keep to themselves, so we have found making friends very hard. The blessing is that English is very much a second language."

On top of this there's the recession, bureaucracy (which she describes as "beyond excessive"), xenophobia and employment difficulties for immigrants despite mastering Swedish, high taxes, and their own continuing problems with the farm. "Our property needs a fair amount of work doing to it," she admits, "and finding the right tradespeople who are both good and affordable has proven very tough".

When the full livery idea proved unviable even with stabling for six horses, the couple concentrated on growing high quality eco-friendly haylage (hay and silage) using environmentally-friendly fertilisers. Ginny is convinced that this healthy diet contributed to the survival of her own horse

last year as well as to the rehabilitation of several others. She says, "The owners were sure the horses were on their last legs, but good grazing and a stress-free environment helped rejuvenate them." As a result, she says word has spread and she receives many calls now asking for her assistance with horse rehabilitation. As a bonus, they have even had a foal born there.

And it's not only a four-legged youngster they have delivered. The Carlesons are now the proud parents of two little girls, aged one and two, and Ginny acknowledges their move to Sweden was prompted by the country's reputation for being very familyfriendly. Maternity leave lasts a whole year and education is highly subsidised – she pays just £120 per month per child for nursery. "Our children are enrolled into an "alternative school" here – Rudolf Steiner. The nursery is beautiful and the happiest place you could wish for a child to begin but not something that is available in Jersey... yet someone should do it!" she suggests.

Ginny still has family here in Jersey and returns every year although it's an expensive and epic journey that routes them through Copenhagen and Gatwick by air. "We actually prefer driving", she says, "it's about 1,500 km and takes 15 hours in total, but we've done it often now, so it's just a big adventure".

Interestingly, Ginny reckons the summers in Flyinge are actually better than Jersey's. "Even though the weather is much more extreme here, it seems to be much more fixed", she explains, "and we get longer sunlight hours. In midsummer, the sun is up at 4 a.m and sets at 11 p.m."

Would they ever return to Jersey to live? "I think this winter will play a big part in our plans for the future", she admits. "It hit me quite hard last winter. You have to make an effort to get out during the daytime, even if it's just to walk the dogs". However, she adds that she finds Jersey quite claustrophobic now and is appalled by the excessive development and huge number of cars on such a small island. "Every time I return I am always stunned by all the changes" she notes.

"But I miss my friends in Jersey terribly and nothing – no matter where you live – can replicate great friends and family. Jersey will always have a huge pull and home will always be where the heart is...."

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

t isn't often you get to shake hands with a gorilla, but in Pippa Barrow's studio, life casts of gorilla fists share shelf space with lobster claws, baby feet and even a crab on castor wheels.

The jewellery designer turned zoologist left London to work with the gorillas at Durrell, allowing her to continue her passion for sculpture, life-casting the hands and feet of Durrell's best-known residents, from gorillas to gibbons. The casts are irresistibly tactile; 'It's one way to get close to an animal that you're never going to be able to touch in real life' says Pippa. Now working as a full-time sculptor and life-caster, Pippa has turned her attention to local wildlife, creating ornate decorative bronzes and quirky home accessories from casts of crabs, lobsters and even snail shells.

Life casting is a long process. Pippa explains: 'You start off by making an alginate mould - it's a dental impression material which hardens really quickly. Then you can remove the mould and pour the plaster in to get a rough cast. Then you work on the plaster, taking

off any rough edges and correcting any faults from air bubbles, and create a second mould that will take resin mixed with bronze powder.'

As well as casting the hands and feet of Durrell animals, Pippa can also create baby hand and feet casts. 'The animals were sedated for regular health checks when I took the casts, but the babies of course are awake. But they're actually really good -I've had little boys that just love the messy, squishy feel!'

Pippa's recently started work on more local designs, inspired by the countryside around

her cottage in St Peter and the coastline at St Ouen. T've life-cast a lobster door handle and a range of claw coat hooks, and I've just finished a commission of a decanter covered with navelwort, ivy and tiny snails. I was in London for such a long time working on geometric shapes, so it's probably a reaction to moving

to Jersey and being surrounded by fluid softer shapes. I find myself recreating them in my work.' How does she approach a commission? 'I tend to go straight into the wax if I'm carving, and assemble more than design so it grows and develops organically. As you work on a piece, it changes - you see how it comes out and you work with what you've got, without trying to control it too much. Life casting is like that, you have no idea what you've got before you pour the plaster in. Especially the children, they move while they're in there!'

THE GALLERY GUIDE TO **BAD TATTOOS**

Once the mark of sailors, Japanese criminals and the audience at Judas Priest concerts, the tattoo is now a rite of passage so common that the physical transformation of the late Amy Winehouse from buxom London warbler to doodle-covered fairground skellington barely raised an eyebrow when compared to her other activities.

he drinking and crack might have made her a bad role model for the children, but parents ignored the crude skin art because they were well aware that tattoos are now so ubiquitous that many children already have arms like a smudged Beano comic before they've even got their GCSEs. Celebrities have them, your parents probably have them, I honestly wouldn't be that surprised to discover that Wills and Kate had marked their taxpayer-funded honeymoon with some arse-crack butterflies for the lady and a giant portrait of Nan for the balding future monarch.

At least if the prince gets inked up with a motley assortment of Asian letters he can plausibly claim that they're all from places his great-grandparents once invaded, but this excuse is not available to the common folk, many of whom return from holidays abroad with the local equivalent of "drunken British slag" and "go home, white man" etched permanently onto their sunburned bodies.

To help you avoid the same mistake, I've knocked together this short guide of tat-dos and tat-don'ts. I wish I'd read something similar before agreeing to two facial spiderwebs and a portrait of Pat Butcher drawn onto one of my buttocks.

Make sure to pick something you won't regret

Tribal designs and foreign languages

Before you consider a tattoo, remember that any design that looks edgy and original now might burst into the popular consciousness and end up decorating Essex strippers and Justin Bieber in five years time. There are many people out there who got tribal tattoos and celtic designs to represent either cultural heritage or genuine interest, and have since lived to rue the day when even a centenier can tear off his shirt and reveal enough spiky drawings and Koi carp to make him resemble a lowranking MMA fighter.

At the very minimum, make sure you stick at least vaguely to one style or culture. We've all seen people who decided to reflect their "global consciousness" via cheesy buddhas and a headache-inducing jumble

of languages they can't even read. The end result is less "spiritual traveller" than "toilet instructions at Dubai airport" and usually ends up resembling the manual of an alarm clock you bought from Poundworld.

This isn't just restricted to hippies and their colourful tributes to the exotic East - an even worse spectacle is presented by white people with too much 'Olde English' lettering, the mystifying popularity of snarling bulldogs and pictures of Tupac on people who grew up in Grand Vaux. Mind you, if you genuinely want to look like a burglar, at least you know where to start.

Tattoos won't make you sexy if you aren't already

Tattoo parlours should be required by law to display this commandment outside their premises, although a survey of any British nightspot will demonstrate that the inky enhancement of ugly people is a thriving business for the creators of inappropriate butterflies, sweaty flowers and the general purpose bum-crack decoration known as the "slag tag."


Sexy skin art seldom looks good unless you were taut and stunning to begin with, and the sexy tattoo is far more vulnerable to the ravages of age than alternatives like the Anthrax logo or a portrait of Optimus Prime. If you really must, pick a part of your body that won't change much, or run the risk of piling on the pounds and warping once-discreet bows and cherries into a melted landscape of nasty blotches beneath a forest of midlife stretch marks. Not hot.

Hairy donuts, ironic unicorns and the type of wolf art modelled by middle-aged women at jumble sales: all these and more have

been harnessed to illustrate the passionate non-conformity of a group of people who somehow all seem to have the same glasses and haircuts.

On the other hand, the sheer power of randomness means that hipsters strike tattoo gold more often than anybody else I've mentioned in this article. I'll take a join-the-dots giraffe or some dead Pokemon over tacky roses and football team logos any day, although I do draw the line at pictures of serial killers, self-portraits and naked Hitlers.

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

STEVE'S Festival Guide



IF BRANCHAGE AIN'T YOUR THING THERE'S STILL PLENTY OF OTHER CINEMATIC DELIGHTS HEADING TO THE BIG SCREEN THIS MONTH.



FRIGHT NIGHT is a remake of a 1985 lesser known but well thought of horror from writer-director Tom Holland. The story revolves around a teenage boy who discovers a vampire has moved in next door. To protect his family and his girlfriend he decides to stop the creature by any means necessary. It's an interesting choice of material to adapt due to its slightly idiosyncratic

nature but the producers have assembled an interesting team. Director Craig Gillespie was behind the weird but heartfelt man-doll love story <code>Lars & The Real Girl</code> whilst screenwriter Marti Noxon has huge experience in the genre having come from <code>Buffy</code> and <code>Angel</code>. Colin Farrell is suitably menacing and seductive as the villain of the piece and David Tennant has the potentially film stealing role of the inept Las Vegas magician hired to take him down.



Let me make this clear, **FRIENDS WITH BENEFITS** is not a remake of *No Strings Attached.* Yes they have the exact same premise (Two attractive friends decide to have sex for fun – feelings ensue) but from what I hear this is far superior. For a start Justin Timberlake is in every single way better then Ashton Kutcher.

The rest of the cast are no slackers either

with Mila Kunis, Woody Harrelson and Andy Samberg joining JT. Director Will Gluck scored a genuinely unique entry in the teen genre with last year's *Easy A*. Hopefully, he can carve out something as unique here even if the pitch is a little more familiar.



It's been too long since the last James Bond film. **TINKER, TAILOR, SOLDIER, SPY** might help fill that gap in our lives until the release of Bond 23 in 2012. Directed by Tomas Alfredson (*Let The Right One In*) from a novel by spy master John Le Carre this is the tale of a semi retired agent brought back in to uncover a traitor in MI:6. This will satiate espionage cravings but don't expect Gary

Oldman's George Smiley to be quipping and bedding as much as 007. Played famously in the seventies TV mini series by Alec Guinness, Smiley is quiet, mild-mannered and middle aged – in many ways the Anti-Bond. Both Le Carre and Fleming (Bond's creator) are able to draw on personal experience of these covert agencies. Le Carre's work is all the more compelling because of his refusal to glamourise them.



The month is dominated by adaptations including two from the Bronte Sisters.

WUTHERING HEIGHTS comes along a good two years after the most recent film version.

There is a lack of star power (Natalie Portman was originally attached) but it is worth noting as the first big screen adaptation to have a black actor play the Heathcliff role. At one point

Michael Fassbender had been lined up as Heathcliff but dropped out in the early stages of production. He obviously fancied at least one of the Bronte sisters though as he finds himself taking on the lead male role of Edward Rochester in this month's **JANE EYRE**. This has a little more to pique my interest with Carey Fukunaga of *Sin Nombre* fame in the director's chair and a script from the 2008 Brit List of best unproduced screenplays. Go and see one, it'll make you feel smart and sensitive.

STARTER

DANNY MOISAN'S Prawn Cocktail

Hands-on time **10min**. Cooking time **5min**. *Serves 6*

350g (120z) raw peeled king prawns, approx 18

1 litre (1% pint) hot vegetable stock

2 medium egg yolks

1tsp white wine vinegar

150ml (5fl oz) olive oil

a squeeze of lemon juice, to taste and grated rind and wedges to garnish

½ tsp brandy

1tsp tomato puree

2tbsp double cream, lightly whipped a small pinch each cayenne pepper and smoked paprika

120g bag mixed salad leaves



ZOE'S TIPS

- Although homemade is better, if you're are really struggling for time then you could cheat and use shop bought mayonnaise.
- For the vegetable stock, try Marigold Swiss Vegetable Bouillon Powder, available from Waitrose, it works a treat and with so much flavour it's by far the best I've found.
- When making the mayonnaise take extra care when adding the oil to the egg yolks, being slow is crucial. If you add the oil too fast the sauce will curdle. However, if it does curdle, beat another egg yolk into a separate bowl and add the curdled mixture drop by drop.

GET AHEAD

Prepare to the end of step 2 up to a day ahead.

METHOD

- 1 Put the prawns in a medium pan with the stock and bring to a simmer, cook for 1-2min, until pink and cooked through. Drain and leave to cool.
- 2 Put egg yolks in a small bowl and whisk in a few drops of the vinegar. Slowly add the oil, starting with a drop at a time, the sauce will then thicken. Add the remaining vinegar and ingredients, apart from the salad leaves, check for seasoning.
- 3 Divide the salad among 6 glasses. Top with prawns and pour over the Marierose sauce. Garnish with lemon wedges and grated rind if you wish. Serve immediately.

MAIN

MARCUS CALVANI'S Steak Diane Alla Jersey

Hands-on time **10min**. Cooking time **10min**. Serves 6

6 x 125g (40z) Jersey-Angus fillet steaks*

1 garlic clove, halved 50g (20z) Jersey salted butter

1tbsp olive oil

4 shallots, thinly sliced 150g (50z) log-grown Funghi Delecti shitake

mushrooms**, sliced

3tsp Worcestershire sauce

1 ½ tbsp Dijon mustard

50ml (2fl oz) La Mare VSOP Apple Brandy*** 400ml (14fl oz) Jersey double cream

a small handful of freshly chopped parsley, optional

ZOE'S TIPS

- The high heat is necessary to sear and colour the steaks, but by frying the steaks in half butter and oil, it'll help avoid them from burning, which would result in a bitter taste.
- Don't season the meat in advance as the salt can draw out any moisture.
- * Jersey-Angus fillet steaks (Try farm shop butchers like Holmecuts at Holmegrown or the Classic Herd Farm Shop at Manor Farm, St Peter)
- ** Fungi Delecti shitake mushrooms fungidelecti.com; 01534 863591 *** La Mare Apple Brandy (Waitrose or La Mare Vineyards shop, St Helier)

Pound steaks, but do not season, wrap in cling film and chill. Complete step 3 of making the sauce. Both can be done up to a day ahead.

METHOD

- 1 Using a meat mallet or rolling pin gently pound out the steaks to flatten until they are 1cm (½in) thick. Rub the garlic all over the steaks and season on both sides. Crush and reserve garlic for the sauce.
- 2 Heat half the butter and all the olive oil in a heavy based pan, until it is beginning to smoke. Brown the steaks quickly for approx. 1min on both sides, remove from the pan and set aside to rest.
- 3 Add remaining butter to the pan. Fry shallots, mushrooms and garlic over a medium heat for about 5min. Add Worcestershire sauce, mustard and brandy and fry for a further 1min, to allow the alcohol to burn off. Pour in the cream and season to taste. Make sure you scrape the bottom of the pan so as to add all the meaty bits into the sauce, which will add flavour and colour.
- 4 Add the steaks and any juices back into the pan and heat through. Sprinkle over the parsley, if using, and serve immediately with new potatoes, grilled cherry tomatoes and seasonal greens.

DESSERT

PETER BREWER'S Baileys & White Chocolate Cheesecake

Hands-on time **15min**. Cooking time **5min**. *Serves 8*

200g (7oz) white chocolate, broken into small pieces

125g (4oz) butter, melted
250g (9oz) digestive biscuits, crushed
3 leaves of gelatine
100g (3½ oz) caster sugar
100ml (3½ fl oz) Baileys
500g (17oz) Philadelphia
125ml (4fl oz) double cream, lightly whipped
white and dark chocolate gratings, to garnish

GET AHEAD

Complete recipe up to a day ahead without the chocolate gratings on top.

ZOE'S TIPS

- Although it is tempting to stir the chocolate whilst it is melting, don't, you'll end up with a grainy mess, the same would also happen if you overheated it. However, if this does happen, put the bowl in the microwave and heat for 10 seconds at a time until the lumps have melted.
- Put the biscuits in a freezer bag and crush with a rolling pin, quick and easy, don't forget to keep the bag sealed though!
- If the gelatine does not completely dissolve when added to the warm Baileys mix, your cheesecake may not set and you could find horrible gelatine lumps.

METHOD

- 1 Put the chocolate in a heat proof bowl, set over a pan of barely simmering water and leave to melt, do not stir. Once melted, remove from the heat and leave to cool.
- 2 Meanwhile, mix together the butter and biscuits and press into a loose-bottomed 8in (20.5cm) round cake tin. Cool in fridge. Put gelatine leaves into a small bowl and cover with cold water, leave to absorb for 5min.
- 3 Put the sugar and Baileys into a pan over a low heat and stir until the sugar has dissolved. Remove from the heat and add the gelatine, stirring constantly until also dissolved.
- 4 Put the Philadelphia in a large bowl and add the cooled melted chocolate, Baileys mixture and lightly whipped double cream. Stir to combine. Pour into the prepared cake tin and leave to set in the fridge overnight. Serve garnished with chocolate gratings.

In the bedrooms it's all about layering textures, high gloss surfaces with soft textiles. It's a marriage made in design heaven.



A simple guide on how to choose an Interior Designer.

Having an interior designer should be a joy and will save you a lot of disappointment and money in the long term, however, selecting an interior designer can be an arduous task.

Here are a few pointers to head you in the right direction:

Clearly establish the level of work required and ask the designer directly have they experience in these areas: property remodeling, furniture design, lighting design, audio visual design, architectural design, landscape design, colour co-ordination, soft furnishings. If you are aiming for higher level design for example house remodeling, you do not want an interior designer who only has experience in colour co-ordination.

Ask the designer to show you examples of their work, photos of the finished schemes and their designs that led up to the finished room sets. Clearly establish this is all their own work and that they were responsible for every element of that interior, not just photographs from stock brochures. Ask how many years they have worked within the industry and establish the clientele they have worked with.

Interview a number of prospective interior designers and ensure their personality, positive attitude and confidence in their ability meets with your expectation. The relationship between the client and the designer is vitally important.

When you have been through all these steps select the designer and establish a clear working brief, outlining what you expect from them and agree a fee.

It should be a very enjoyable experience working closely with the designer to create a home for you and your family that reflect your tastes, life style and aspirations.

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

Getting your career in shape is a walk in the park

This month's career shaping tips

Creep on your future employer.

When you are interviewing for a job, it is important to remember that just as the employer is evaluating you, you should be evaluating the employer. An interview is a two way street (a polite street, with traffic rules). Prior to an interview you should review the company website and marketing collateral to learn about their history, achievements and philosophy. You should also find out about the person interviewing you, google them, check out their linkedin profile, ask friends and family. You should then use the interview to gather as much information as possible to determine if the position and the organisation are best suited to utilise your unique blend of talent, experience, skill and character. Get googling!

'I speak English and Spinach.'

Although it does sound impressive to be able to communicate with vegetables, we doubt it is a skill your future employer will require. Common spelling errors and basic grammar mistakes found in your CV are inexcusable. A sure way to blow your chances of securing an interview for a position that could potentially be your dream job, is by using poor language, incorrect spelling and inaccurate grammar. Proof read, spell check and double check your CV, then ask someone else to review it for you. After all, you don't want your application to be dismissed over some spinach.

Dress for Success.

Impress us, and impress your employer. Everyone likes their clothes to reflect their personality, but make sure you are making the right statement for an interview. Employers will judge you immediately on what you look like (it's natural, we all do it!), so make sure you look the part according to the job title. You can still wear quirky little pieces with a smart dress, or a suave suit with a kooky tie to let your personality shine. That said, be careful and always err on the side of caution as you do not want to be remembered for the wrong reasons!

It is a skill that anyone would be proud of, but maybe you shouldn't include that weird party trick in your CV. Your CV is your marketing tool, so use it as a branding statement or professional summary to tell recruiters and potential employers exactly what you are about, and what you have to offer. It's fine to include a hobby or interest or two, as long as they aren't the type to raise eyebrows. Avoid listing hobbies such as "knitting sweaters for my 12 cats," and "twisting balloons into animal shapes." Stick to less detailed and more generic hobbies, like "reading," "gardening," "mountain biking" and "playing tennis." And keep them to a minimum.



Meet the Maker

hen you consider manufacturing in Jersey you'll either be picturing a big empty void or you'll talk about the days when newly built ships would roll down ramps on the beaches to the East and West of St Helier.

This island is unlikely to gain any widespread recognition for the things it makes, however that does not mean that manufacturing in Jersey is dead and buried. Our economy has moved on and found far more lucrative, less noisy and smelly ways of earning a crust. Still, one percent of the money this island earns comes from manufacturing.

In cash, that's about £53 million, a figure that has declined by about 7% in real terms

over the past decade, but still more than many people would have expected.

A long and winding path

Shipbuilding is dead and Jersey clearly has no factories. So where do you go if you want to find the people who make things?

I found Rylance Limited, an architectural ironworks, at the end of a long, dusty track cunningly disguised as a farm set amongst the rural beauty above Rozel. Look inside the pink granite barns and instead of finding stacks of potato boxes or cows chewing mindlessly as they're milked, you'll find people hammering, twisting, bending and stretching bars of red hot steel into delicate flourishes or smooth curves that will ultimately form the impressive gated entrance to someone's home.

The business employs ten people and has been going since 1963. For the past 12 years it has traded as Rylance Ltd,

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run by the impressively bearded and eternally youthful Steve Rylance but began operations almost half a century ago in 1963. Steve joined in the late eighties and took over in 1999. Since then, he has built the firm into arguably the island's leading ironworks with a reputation for quality both in terms of the standard of its work and the unique designs that the company creates.

Rylance is perhaps best known for its gates which you'll see standing at the entrance to many of the island's most impressive homes but it also does sheet metal fabrication, produces strap hinges for wooden gates, restores heritage ironworks and does an excellent sideline in antique fireplaces, operating as an agent for London-based Chesney's.

In today's world of high finance, when you visit the Rylance workshops it's impossible not to get a sense of stepping back to a time when business was less complex and less ephemeral than now.



This is a company which makes things - it's a simple idea but in our island dominated as it is by the professional service industries, it's almost a novel one

Healthy but tight

Although it's unusual for the island, Steve is adamant that the industry is doing well and the fact that there are four or five other decorative ironwork firms out there supports this. His order book is healthy and he hasn't seen any sign of demand slowing down, something he puts down to the unique designs that Rylance creates.

"In the last ten years I've seen the majority of our customers come to us because our work is bespoke. That doesn't mean that it's more expensive, just that I put more time into making it unique," he explains.

Whilst business is healthy, it is not without its challenges and the main one is a direct result of the financial crisis.

"Everything's gone a bit tight as far as credit is concerned. The banks are inflexible but now we've finally got a bank manager who takes an interest and has actually come out and visited us, which makes a big difference," he says.

As far as the wider picture of manufacturing in Jersey is concerned, Steve is upbeat and clear that the businesses are there. "Manufacturing businesses exist, you've just got to go out and look for them."

If Rylance is anything to go by, that should mean some wonderful walks along some of Jersey's most beautiful and lesser known country paths.

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Retro Surfing

hen Captain
Cook sailed to the
Hawaiian Islands
in 1778 and recorded sightings
of natives riding waves,
stood on wooden boards he
unintentionally entered Britain
into the history of surfing. In
the first half of the 20th century,
pioneering individuals carried
British surfing forward in the
Channel Islands and established
a microcosm of surfing culture,
that still exists today.

The ingredients of active water users, foreign lifeguards and enthusiastic board shapers, combined with a tidal range of 40 feet and west Atlantic swells provided a perfect recipe for surfing to flourish in Jersey.

Jersey has been a surf destination for more than 80 years and in the 1960s it was considered to be one of the most celebrated surf spots in Europe, hosting numerous European championships. By 1923 there were enough people surfing in Jersey to establish "The Island Surf Club of Jersey" which was created by Nigel Oxenden. However during the Occupation the Germans mined the beaches and surfing stopped until the 1950's when a group of South African lifeguards arrived. These lifeguards revitalised surfing in Jersey and surfing as we know it started, as it was at this time longboards were first used in Jersey.

By 1959 Jersey Surfboard Club was formed with Dr Peter Lea elected as the first club president. More than 50 years later the Surfboard Club is still going strong with more than 500 members. In the 1960's thousands of people packed St Ouen's Bay to watch the British Surfing Team (which was over 50% local) riding boards made locally. During the 1970s Jersey was one of the most important places in Europe for shaping surfboards, with Steve Harwood founding Freedom Surfboards in the early 70s. Although Freedom no longer manufactures boards, in recent years many of the shapes and designs of this period have seen a significant comeback in the world of

Not only has Jersey's surfing heritage inspired a generation of surfers, it has also encouraged a recreation of the style and design of the 1960s of both the classic Twin Fin set up and the ever more popular Quad Fin. The Fish is recently responsible for enticing surfers to look to their past as an alternative to the "kook"*cutter mentality of modern surfing. Retro Fishes offer exceptional speed and manoeuvrability, classic wave riding charm and fantastic wave catching ability—even in small surf. Understandably Retro Fishes have become a popular board to have in Jersey, due to their versatility in a variety of surfing conditions. The fish offers a quality and responsive performance whilst simultaneously maintaining a style more retro than a VW Camper Van with a jukebox in the back.

In modern surfing it is easy to forget the sport's origins and heritage but there is something strangely comforting knowing that surfing has kept its base around the Watersplash in St Ouen's Bay the true birthplace of surfing in Jersey.



Championed by rally drivers on the world stage and seventies boy racers in Essex and beyond alike, the mark one Escort is today swooned over by enthusiasts and 'those who remember' whenever one rolls by.

Forget the RS2000 though, my pick of the bunch is the now lesser seen Mexico with its 1600 Crossflow engine, subtler side stripes and the 'X' that extends out of the logo. It's the little things.

It is a well known fact that even your Grandma could keep an old Ford sliding effortlessly sideways around a leafy corner or roundabout at about 10mph. Which is why even though these cars are positively sluggish by modern standards, they're still incredibly good fun to engage with. Sit down, strap in, start up and pretend you're Hannu Mikkola, tearing up the tarmac and gravel tracks way back when.

Expect to pay absolutely astronomical prices for a solid, original Escort because the aforementioned rally boys and boy racers have been systematically destroying them in great numbers over the past thirty years or so. If you're handy with a welder and have a shed that's propped up by a money tree, you could quite easily restore your very own Dagenham classic and revel in the envy of all who pass. As long as you don't end up getting carried away and landing in a hedge.

For those of you eager for local pub knowledge, a very small number of four-door Mexicos were built, all finished in plain white, which were a special order for the Jersey Police. After all, if you can't beat 'em.. at least give yourself a chance of keeping up.

When it comes to Lotus' Turbo Esprit, need any more be said than James Bond drove one? Granted, your average Turbo Esprit wouldn't be any good at driving under water like in For Your Eyes Only (mainly because composite materials tend to be fairly buoyant outside of a cine-reel). For those of us who grew up watching Bond movie repeats on ITV and frantically stuffing 50 pence pieces into arcade machines emblazoned with those beautiful british racing green and yellow 'Lotus Turbo Challenge' graphics, the original Esprit will forever hold a special place in our childhood hearts.

Beware though, rebuilding the 9xx series engines these days isn't cheap and parts aren't exactly in plentiful supply, with reserves of new old stock about as dry as Mr Bond's wit.

Snap one up now before the new Esprit rolls out onto our roads in 2013 as I can forsee a resurgence of these cracking composite creations heading our way.

Don't forget to open the taps and smoke the rears every once in a while though old boy - as I said earlier, this cruiser was engineered to handle!


It'd be hard to deny that with only Oldsmobile

here's a supercar out there that costs roughly the same to run as a family saloon, yet will outgun a 911 GT3.

A car that performs effortlessly come rain, snow or shine that you really can use every day. And better still, if you drive one you'll never have to queue up at the pumps before waiting for somebody who passed their driving test on the back of a horse to incorrectly enter their PIN three times in a row ever again.

It's been let loose on local roads and we met up with a couple of the guys from Tesla during their recent visit to take the Roadster Sport for a quick spin.

It's actually cheaper to run a brand new £77,000 using a well-known electric sportscar than a late nineties BMW. Oh, and

If you've ever sent received money online payment did I mention that the Tesla is much, much more fun? service you may have indirectly funded the

development of this car. Co-founder of PayPal Elon Musk launched Tesla Motors in 2003 with a single focus: to build the absolute best electric vehicles on earth. This isn't a major car manufacturer leaping onto the battery-powered bandwagon, bound to the profitability structures and manufacturing practises of the automotive industry of yesteryear but a specialist manufacturer purely developing electric vehicle technology that is a viable and acceptable substitute for internal combustion as well as being the only manufacturer globally producing a zeroemissions sportscar.

When you think about it for a while it makes perfect sense for Jersey. A full charge will propel you for around 211 miles, roughly the same as a tank of petrol in the average performance car, which should last 2 or 3 weeks for the average commuter over here. Tesla recommend that you keep the Roadster plugged in overnight to keep the cells in top condition in any case, so charging shouldn't be a problem unless you're planning a lengthy trip away. Having said that, it's as easy as plugging into almost any wall socket, with charging times ranging from 3 to 16 hours dependent on the power supply and battery

After 100,000 miles (over ten years in local driving terms) the cells will retain at least 70% of their original capacity. You can either continue to drive around at the cost of having to plug in more frequently, or you can replace

them for the latest, undoubtedly more powerful and efficient version at a cost of around £9,000. When you factor in the yearly service costs capped at £500 (I've seen local garage invoices reach over £600 for belts and fluids before, believe it or not) and even the cost of electricity to travel 100,000 miles the whole running cost boils down to a mere £1,500 per year and at the end of it all you end up with a brand new set of cells that'll then be good for another 150,000 plus miles. Curious, I couldn't resist dusting off my calculator to discover that I spend around £1,800 per year on fuel alone in a sub 3 litre car which suddenly puts things into perspective: it's actually cheaper to run a brand new £77,000 (£76,952.40 list price including 5% GST to be exact) electric sportscar than a late nineties BMW. Oh, and did I mention that the Tesla is much, much more fun?

gallery JERSEY'S STYLE MAGAZINE Usually I'd be inclined to side with Carrol Shelby in saying that 'there ain't no substitute for cubic inches', but you see, driving the Tesla is, well, different. The first thing you notice is the noise, or lack of it, which not only might prove a difficult barrier to overcome for the most die-hard of petrolheads, but also might get you in trouble with those speed gun wielding, high-vis clad pests at the side of the road.

There's no denying that the Tesla Roadster is fast - it can deliver and sustain a peak torque of 400nm for nine seconds, which is enough to see you up to almost 100mph and will get you to sixty in 3.7 seconds, each time, every time and onto a top speed of 125. There's no gearchange to worry about, no transmission loss; the position of the accelerator determining your intended speed more so than the rate at which you'd like to accelerate. Pressing the throttle hard the whole car squats, lurching forward at a fearsome pace that doesn't seem quite right with no fight, no balancing of the clutch or feathering of the accelerator during the launch, just no nonsense, instantaneous acceleration. It's all a little bit surreal, but not so much a novelty as a wake-up call - why isn't all driving like this?

Contrary to popular belief despite the chassis being assembled by Lotus and the Roadster Sport's Lotus-esque aesthetic, it shares less than 6% of its parts with an Elise and is far less spartan; with heated seats, a generous amount of leather, carpet and touch screen displays adorning the interior. Outside, the carbon composite bodywork is as stunning as you'd expect from a premium brand vehicle with even the smooth finish on the underside of the panels being beautiful to behold.

The regenerative braking system applies resistance when you lift your right foot, which means that you're not only increasing your range as you slow but you'll also rarely need to use the brakes unless you're being a real eco-hooligan or coming to a full stop. With the batteries slung low underneath to provide an extremely low centre of gravity and as few moving parts as possible it not only exhibits precise handling but has also proved astonishingly reliable, with the motor having a lifecycle of around 800,000 miles. Add to that a traction control system that makes driving in rain or snow an absolute breeze and instant cabin heat on tap as there's no need to wait for it as by-product of combustion there's little excuse not to allow driving one to cheer you up on even the most miserable of days.

Believe it or not, apps are currently being developed for the upcoming range of Tesla vehicles – my suggestion being a trackday timer that takes full advantage of GPS tracking and the car mounted cameras to record and plot your laps before you download them from the very comfort of your own home. You need not visit a dealership to receive upgrades either - Tesla send them wirelessly from California via the internet to your car as it sits quietly in your garage overnight. Welcome to modern motoring.

Some of the large car manufacturers have been openly buying Teslas in an attempt to reverse engineer the technology inside, but when it comes to the automotive world's finest engineers versus Silicon Valley's finest programmers in what is essentially a computer hacking race there'd be no prize for guessing who I'd be betting my car keys on to win.

As an overgrown schoolboy I still buy every console that comes out, but deep in my faltering heart I know that exploding virtual prostitutes in high-definition 3D will never approach the simple joy of battling endless waves of ninjas or the compulsive monochrome mania that is Gameboy Tetris.

King of Kong

Old games may not be as flashy, might lack the multi-million dollar budgets of Call of Duty, but any ageing arcade loiterer will tell you they're every bit as compulsive and enjoyable. I've been hopelessly addicted to Pac-Man since the Atari 2600, and still periodically abandon my PS3 to haul out the Super Nintendo and play through the delightful Super Mario World with my creaking, arthritic fingers. their own lives fiddling with Angry Birds or flailing wildly at Wii Sports.




How to get your retro game fix



So many! Where do I start? I've been doing a cover of Crazy in Love by Beyoncé and I'm obsessed with that song. I wish I'd written Can't Get You Out of My Head. One of the songs I really love that people always know when they hear it but they don't always know what it's called is You Get What You Give by the New Radicals.

What's your favourite place in Jersey?

The white hut at St Ouen's. Even when it's raining that spot is beautiful and aweinspiring. It's really elemental. When I was younger, my motivation was slightly different, it was where the hot guys were hanging out, now it's the landscape I go for. Good looking men are just an added bonus.

Recently recovered from Grassroots and looking through excited eyes, eagerly awaiting Jersey Live (not to mention my upcoming jaunt to Paris, where I'll be indulging in the magnificent line up at Rock en Seine), I ponder the current richness of music afforded to us in Jersey. Where did the scene begin here? What were the trends 'way back when...'?

The euphonic spree that has flourished throughout recent times has been evident to me and my peers; growing up with a diverse selection of DJ's coming to the Island throughout the 90's and 2000 onward Island (when dance music was the main musical entertainment offering) to the influx of International live artists over the past 7/8 years. Oh, and not forgetting Technotronic, Oceanic and the then heartthrob... Jason Donovan (*grimace) at Fort Regent. What did people here in previous decades have to delight their ears in Jersey? Which musicians graced our shores, recorded here, or performed here...?

Chatting to the people who have or are bringing music to your ears, I found out that Jersey has plenty of musical memories... Some noteworthy and some a little cringe worthy – I'll let you decide which is which (music is, after all an eclectically appreciated art)... One man's noise is another man's music.

Mums and dads will remember the old Caeser's Palace at Greve de Lecq, where many a show was put on to entertain locals and tourists alike – with acts such as Stuart Gillies performing on stage. A true Cabaret venue, Caeser's Palace was a proper night out; table service, dancers, feather boas and autographs in the bar after the show...

Caberet was where it was at back then

Another institution, which has played host to many a musical treat, is the 150 year old Jersey Opera House. From local musicians to International atists, the Opera House has seen many a performance since it's opening in 1900 where the Jersey Lily, the famous Edwardian beauty Miss Lillie Langtry performed to the crowd.

The legendary Inn on the Park indeed, where much musical mayhem and magic happened until it sadly closed down in 1996. From cabaret to all night raves; under 18 nights and an array of live acts, Inn on the Park played host to them all. An iconic, local institution, Inn on the Park was undoubtedly one of the hotspots when it comes to looking back at Jersey music.


Chris Tanguy was smiling down the phone as he recounted just a handful of massive nights of music 'back in the day'... "So many names played that place, I actually feel lucky to have been a part of the scene back then," he said. Seemingly, the 70's really rocked in Jersey, do you remember Suzie Quatro playig here? Or, Squeeze? Chris remembered being a young sound engineer and going up to the then keyboard player from Squeeze and making small talk... It wasn't until afterward that he realised he'd been chit chatting with legend, Paul Carrack from Mike & The Mechanics (writer of the song, 'How Long')...

Chris, like many of his peers from those years, recalls

We caught up with the local troubadour, the soulful singer songwriter that is Lloyd Yates, following his recent success and signing. Meeting up with Lloyd at the Watersplash (a poignant setting as this is where it all started), the sun shone down on us as we had a deep discussion about from where his career flourished and where it is headed... Having known Lloyd for some time, it is with utter pride and endearment that I listen to his version of events, which led to him getting noticed and evenutally signed to one of the biggest and most prestigious music publishers in the world; EMI. With over one million copyrights under their direction, EMI is undoubtedly a great place for Lloyd Yates' music to get heard by many ears and hopefully take flight. EMI is renowned for picking up only top stellar songwriters and artists and Lloyd Yates certainly fits that category - one of

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Jersey's finest and most sincere artists; no ego, just music from the heart, delivered with love.

With a voice that has been compared to that of Cat Stevens (and unusually, Tracy Chapman!), Lloyd Yates has been mastering his craft locally for the past few years and has managed to gain popularity across the water in the UK. Having played a mini tour of Cornwall at the start of the inception of the Lloyd Yates Band; Lloyd is confident that his career has been steered in the right direction, establishing a proper foundation before taking off to pastures new.

We asked Lloyd to tell us, from the beginning, where his music comes from, who and what inspires him and if he ever believed he would be such a success from the offset...



When did music first transpire to be something important in your life, and when did you first pick up a guitar?

Before I picked up a guitar, I always believed in everything I wanted to do... I always knew whatever it'd end up being, it would happen. I guess that has a lot to do with my parents. I always liked singing, even in school, I'd always have the lead roles in plays, singing solos and whatever... Mehdi, who plays guitar with me now, he was always the guitar dude. Mehdi was my friend from school since the age of four... We've been close all our lives man, we became best frends around the age of 8. He was a big inspiration to me – having been something of a guitar prodigy from the age of 12... We both adored music and I guess we always have that in common.

Which musicians inspired you back then?

Probably the mainstream acts that were about then; Lenny Kravitz, Led Zepplin and one less mainstream artists, Ben Harper... Me and Mehdi both grew very fond of Ben Harper – he was real, singing about the earth, about love...

You are very much a child of the universe aren't you?

That's something I'm very proud of man. It's something I continually aspire to be... It's about keeping it real. There's a truth out there and I like to tap into it and I tend to stay close to people who do the same.

Do you reckon that when you started out in music, you were really conscious of that importance?

There was a very spiritual moment in my life – some people call it a chemical reaction in the brain; I feel like I got the message of a high moral perception of that time of my life... It inspires me to this day. I remember, it was a close encounter with growing up... Around that time, my sister had gone off to Uni and had left a guitar in my room. Within a week, I had two songs of my own... From there I realised the importance of playing for yourself – it's true and sincere then. Luckily, after those two songs were formed, I was encouraged by Ali McGovern (now Ali Moffat) to get up, stand up and sing at the Splash Open Mic...

So she was an inspiration to you?

Absolutely man, her energy and ability – I remember being about 16 and dancing on the tables outside the Splash, listening to Ali on her guitar – she was a great inspiration to me... She first got me to come on stage and showcase my first couple of songs, after only 2 weeks of me having picked up a guitar.

Lloyd went on to emphasize that first feeling of nerves on stage; he still harnesses those nerves, allowing them to be felt... As he progresses, he still feels those nerves each time he gets up to perform, but they have a humbling and grounding effect on him and that again procures a necessary truth in his performance.

Did you feel anything serious happening from the offset?

Not really, I guess I was happy playing – not really taking it all too seriously... And then Seb died (Seb Sharp was a treasured friend of Lloyd's who tragically passed away when they were both around 24 years old), it was the first jolt in my life for sure. He taught me loads; got me into inspirational artists such as Aphex Twin and all manner of other things; other worlds even. To lose that sort of soulmanship was a massive blow, but massive things came from it. The experience of losing him opened my mind and soul to who I continue to be today.

So, following the impact of a life changing experience, what was next?

My then partner and I got together after Seb died, we became parents and when motherhood and fatherhood come into play, you really start to appreciate the universe and what part you play in it. Things get more real after that.

So as your life became more serious, did your music follow suit?

Absolutely, things began to happen quite organically with regard to meeting Niall, who has managed and guided my career since around then. He is together with my eldest sister, who I got to know better around that time. She welcomed me and my other sister into her life and we all felt the love you know? Niall loves his guitar, he loves music he writes songs too and had written on called 'Morning Sun,' which I sang... Tudor Moore then sent the track to Steve Miller; it got released on Ministry of Sound compilation – that was the first hint of things to come... From there things went up and up.

So, I guess this is when you formed the Lloyd Yates Band with the help of Niall?

AbsoluteNiall and Wilson (Nash) (the two of them make up Cowshed) they hooked us up; myself, Mehdi Padidar (guitar), and Polo Olivier (percussion). Later, Alex Moody (drums) (Jackson Moody band), then Scott (Badger) Keane (Bass) (Malarky) & (Kat Ince Cello) & again after Badger - Aaron (Shaggy) Brown new Bass player.

So now, it's myself, Mehdi, Kat, Polo, Alex and Aaron... The Lloyd Yates Band is set.

How important is it to have a good team around you?

Completely important – the team as it is, is awesome man. Niall and Wilson have put so much into what we've got, we also have a great music lawyer, Paul Lennon who is a total legend. In the past, contribution from the likes of Ray Hedges (who is also a legend!) has been invaluable and we're really grateful for the input from everyone around us like that.

What's coming up from the Lloyd Yates Band now you're a signed artist??

Working with Jason Boshoff, we have some early mixes up on MySpace, but the new ones, well I can't say too much at the moment – bit watch this (My)Space... I've been writing like a demon and the new tracks are hits man... I can just feel it.

*Lloyd gave me a sneak pre-hear of one of the tracks... A blessed kiss in the ear, a hit indeed... Gallery would like to congratulate Lloyd Yates on his latest success and a high five to the entire Lloyd Yates team for making it happen...



there being a lot more choice back then. Most venues offered a variety of performances, comedians, dancers and singers gallore. He recalled fond memories of Billy Butlin's fantastic bookings; Dame Shirley Bassey, Moorcambe and Wise, Danny Le Roux and many more. There was many a gig at Fort Regent dating back to decades past; with performers such as Australian Pink Floyd, Chris de Burgh and Status Quo bringing the hall to light, acts such as Hot Chocolate as well as an array of tribute acts have also played here. Before it closed down, Inn on the Park earned the title of 3rd Best Club in the UK. Warren Le Sueur recounted a list as long as his own hairy arm, of International DJ's, ranging from The mighty Carl Cox, Legend Paul Oakenfold, Sasha (who is also playing this year's Jersey Live), Digweed and Laurent Garnier (who played a staggering 8 hour set, impromptu, just because the feeling took him). Warren foldly remembered the time when he was involved in establishing the 10pm till 6am all nigters after a successful few at Fort Regent earlier on... (Havana Club's Biko started the 'all night' party and continues to do so to encourage hard partying to this day).


For Warren, Inn on the Park was his foundation in the local music scene and following his stint there, he went on to become hugely successful with the Venue (another iconic Jersey club) and now he is the founder of Jersey's most famed music event, Jersey Live.

A few famous facts:

Heavy-metallers Iron Maiden once spent time in Jersey writing new material. They befriended a chap called Mark in their local boozer, who they invited to roadie for them on their world tour. All he had to do was wake up in the morning and meet them at the airport. Hungover, he overslept. When frontman Bruce Dickinson phoned Mark to see where he was, his mum picked up the phone. 'He won't wake up, can you call back later?' she said. Hours later they were embarking on the Asian leg of their tour, and Mark was nursing a sore head.

Jersey resident Gary Hamilton once set up a record company with the sole purpose of recording and releasing an album by world champion Irish boxer Barry McGuigan. He did so, it was called 'Never Give Up On a Dream', and it's almost as good as The Beatles.

This lengthy association with the electronic music scene led to him playing at some of world's most iconic venues such as the Manchester's legendary The Haçienda, Shelleys in Stoke and Paul Oakenfold's Spectrum at Heaven in London. And ever since George has maintained a constant touring schedule, notching up hundreds of thousands of air miles and tak-

ing in destinations from the snow capped mountains of Vancouver to the golden sun kissed sands of Bondi beach.

Ever the consummate superstar DJ, his travels have seen him pack out events in over 70 countries around the world, from super-brands in Godskitchen, Cream, Manumission and Spundae to global powerhouse venues like Space in Ibiza, Ministry of Sound in London, Zouk in Singapore and Guvernment in Toronto. More recently artists such as Jamie Woon and MC Xander have chartered the more harmonic vocals arrangements in their music, utilising soul and dancehall influences respectively but Australias DUB FX (Benjamin Stanford) has taken a different route altogether.

Primarily a street performer, Ben left Melbourne in 2006 to travel throughout Asia and Europe busking in capital squares, street corners and roof tops in just about every city he passed through. His live act consists of beatbox, vocal, loop and FX sampling but with a heavy element on bass and a love of the breaks. Moving through hip-hop to jungle and dubstep he creates layer upon layer of ambience and rhythm that are as memorising to watch as they are infectiously rhythmic and hard hitting on the dancefloor. If you've seen any of his performances on YouTube in the last few years you will have a good idea of what his show entails. It was only in 2010 however that Ben made the real transition from street performer to the bright lights and big soundsystems of the club; but its the heavy sub bass elements in his music and the incredibly skillful means by which he creates

his music onstage that have made the transition so formidable in the live arena. It was a chance encounter with Bristol filmmaker Ben Dowden in 2008 who shot Dub performing 'Love Someone' in the street that suddenly brought his music to the worlds attention. The next track they produced the following year, together with Mr Woodnote, a Bristol based saxophonist was called 'Flow' and since then these 2 videos alone have racked up a combined 20 million hits on YouTube...astonishing considering they were unknown and unsigned artists but their appeal is undeniable and has spread rapidly across the globe . In 2009 Dub FX released his debut LP 'Everythinks A Ripple' and continued to tour Europe in his van to promote the record with his partner Flower Fairy (Shoshana Sadia) and record new videos with guests and MCs in all manner of locations across the continent. Having completed the European festival circuit this summer including Glastonbury and the main stage at Woodstock Poland in front of 400,000 people they have spent much of August on a Canadian tour and played their first US shows. In September however they are back in the UK for their biggest club nights to date, including a night in Jersey for a big end of summer slam.

As if this wasn't exciting enough the promoters Phonetic Freefall also have invited the incredible Mr Woodnote as main support to Dub FX with Bristol based MC Lil Rhys and special guest vocalist Eva Lazarus of Dub Mafia. Mr Woodnote feeds

from the same style of beatbox loops as his contemporaries but he has the added element of heavily FX laden sax that allows him to create genre defying sub bass jams taking in every turn from heavy electro and dub to old skool and hip-hop at its finest. Their debut album is mixed and ready to drop at any moment. Two exciting international acts backed up by local heavyweights Schema, Terminal State, Oneofakind & Carrie Cooper to complete the billing means it is not one to be missed!. No doubt it promises to be a performance as exciting and unique as anything seen at the Splash in recent memory and is a fitting way to end a huge season of summer music events in the island.

His passion for playing is clearly infectious and 2009 alone has seen him rock dancefloors across Brazil, Madrid, London, Abu Dhabi, Greece and beyond. And the best thing he says about getting behind the decks on the finest floors across the globe? "Getting to play the music you love to people who love to party!"

Led Zeppelin visited the island in the 1970s when singer Robert Plant was recuperating after a car crash. They were refused entrance to one pub for looking too scruffy, found another one, and played an impromptu gig to a handful of lucky drinkers.

The Jam once cut a gig short at Fort Regent because there were too many people in the crowd spitting at them. A far cry from the reception given to Mod Father, Paul Weller at last year's Jersey Live.

Jimi Hendrix has two con-nections with the island; he played in Jersey as a session musician, before finding fame with The Jimi Hendrix Experience, whose bassist, Noel Redding also played a show in Jersey, and accidentally left all of the Hendrix touring gear in a St. Ouen's pub. A member of staff at Jersey's East Coast Music allegedly acquired one of Hendrix's Marshall cabs...

In 1963, at the start of Beatlemania, The Fab Four played four dates at the Springfield Ballroom, and were paid the modest sum of £1000 pounds. Iconic journalist Janet Street-Porter once described how star-struck she was encountering them in King Street whilst on holiday here.

A Rolling Stones gig the following year resulted in four thousand people rioting at the gate after being refused entry for not adhering to the dress code. Inside, Mick Jagger was getting pelted with fruit; a peach and four tomatoes to be precise.

Memories of Dan Hegarty from late 70's band, The Darts playing the legendary Inn on the Park; climbing the speaker system, up to the first floor balcony to entice the crowd... Rock 'n Roll.

Debbie Harry played the legendary Inn on the park back in the 70's... After releasing her solo album, swapping her stage name and image from Blondie to Deborah Harry, she went down like a lead balloon, being boo'd off stage... Jersey audiences were no walk in the park in those days.

Other big acts to play in Jersey, either at Inn on the Park, or Fort Regent include Paul Rogers from 'Bad Company' (Rogers was the guy who brought you the song 'Free... to do what I want, any old time..'), The Drifters (orignal line up), including Ben E King, The 3 Degrees and Sister Sledge to name a few. More recently, you'll remember Joan Armatrading and Dick Ray's great booking of Meastro, Jools Holland and Kathryn Jenkins...

Who do we predict/hope for in the next couple of decades...? As promoters get more savvy in bookings for big acts, and live music becomes more and more accessible to Jersey - I'm already wondering who might be on next year's Jersey Live line up...





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
