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
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




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
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Project Trident


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## Hijacked Lives Your Money And Your Life



I am hijacking this space to raise my voice and to have it heard – loud and clear. This article is me doing my part for the greater good... like it or not. If you have heard of the Kony 2012 campaign, then you already know why.

As I began to type, doubts flicker across my mind. What if others have this exact same idea on this exact same topic, and what if they too write about Kony 2012? Good – then it means that the campaign is successful and that the end goal is that much closer. Indeed, wouldn't it be amazing to have a whole edition of Gallery entirely devoted to this issue?! Then again, what if my article is the only one on this subject? What if it stands out like a sore thumb, alone and out of place? How did this all come about? By chance, I happened to click on a link to a video that someone had shared on Facebook: "Kony 2012". At first I was sceptical; the video had a very onesided American approach to an issue that transcends national borders, while offering a simple solution to a complex problem. Yet, as I watched, the video's message started to hit me: it is a story of hope and inspiration; about changing history and making the world a better place for future generations.

The video details the campaign to bring Kony to justice by making him a household name worldwide. Through making him famous, it will draw attention to the cause, which will (in theory) result in government action to finally have him arrested. In the

end, Kony 2012's message will go around the world because it must. Though we can't change what happened in the past, we can stop it right now in the present: this year, once and for all. With enough publicity, Joseph Kony 'the world's worst' might finally be put to trial for his crimes against humanity. And why stop there? The ICC has a long list of indicted war criminals who should have been arrested long ago...

Whether or not you agree with the video, you cannot simply ignore it: already it has been viewed over 100 million times, making it the most successful viral video ever! Though you may not approve of the means it uses to reach its end, the result is that Kony is once again the topic of conversation. Arguably, anything that draws attention to the protection and ratification of Human Rights can only be praised, particularly when it reaches an audience that would otherwise be apathetic and, instead, inspires them to action.


While I was busy pondering my own troubles I forgot everything I have to be thankful for: I have the most wonderful fiancé, my family who loves me, and my friends who are always there for me. The future looks bright, I am in good health and I live in a safe country – one that is not currently torn by war and conflict. How many children don't have that same luxury? How many are suffering, right now, as life goes on oblivious to their plight. How many more have to die until the world unites and says: enough! They are not invisible any longer... their cries have been heard.

You see, of everything that I have to be thankful for, most importantly I have a VOICE. Moreover, I am able to have my voice be heard, which is why I am hijacking Gallery for you to read my words. Why? Because it means that I can give a voice to those who have none: those without food today or a place to go home to tonight, those who have lost their families forever

and whose very lives are in danger right now... all because of Joseph Kony and others like him. Though it has been several years since I graduated from university his name was still familiar to me. Of those, even less have been successfully prosecuted or resulted in a fair conviction. Meanwhile, life goes on regardless and, usually, at the expense and exploitation of African countries. Why? Because until now no one really cared enough to do anything about it: there wasn't enough interest so there wasn't any decisive action.

Now all this is changing; the Kony 2012 video has already reached millions of people around the world, people like you and me, who will spread the message even further. As I watched the video I was reminded that we do have the power to make a difference and we do have the power to change the world, because that power lies within us. It just so happens that April 20th is the Kony 2012 day of action: by then you will have read this article and watched the video; hopefully, you will be inspired to act too. Ultimately, life doesn't seem quite so bleak after all... there is hope for the future and sometimes that's all you need.

#### <sup>01</sup>/A brief history of the internet



JOHN MCCLANE: YIPPEE-KI-YAY MOTHERF\*\*KER. Before Titanic and Avatar, James Cameron directed the blockbuster action romp True Lies. Remember it? Of course you do, as it was the last relative commercial and critical success that Arnold Schwarznegger enjoyed before his career succumbed to such clunkers as Batman & Robin and Eraser.

It was the third highest-grossing movie of 1993 and pitted Arnie against the crazed Salim Abu Aziz, head of the nasty Arab terrorist cell Crimson Jihad. The film's climactic scene ends with Aziz dangling from a missile, which Big Arn then fires into his Crimson Jihad cohort's helicopter. # THE CHANGING FACE OF ON-SCREEN TERRORISM

# TERRORISM IS NO LONGER A SUBJECT TO BE TAKEN LIGHTLY.

Now, this illustrates quite neatly the radical shift in thinking towards the portrayal of terrorists in the movies. Just think about some of the cartoonish villains and outrageous plots in pre-9/11 cinema: Goldfinger in the Bond series, Hans Gruber in Die Hard, Dennis Hopper's Howard Payne in Speed. All pre 9/11.

Now consider some of the more successful movies portraying terrorism in the 21st century: Red State, Unthinkable, Four Lions - even Batman Begins. The big difference between the two approaches is that the 20th century take on terrorism largely tended to be a confused portrayal of terrorist motives; Hollywood screenwriters never seemed to be able to decide whether financial, ideological or purely psychotic reasoning lay behind their actions, often chucklng a bit of each into their villains' makeup. Take Dennis Hopper in Speed total nutcase, but also after a handsome ransom, and also trying to get back at the LAPD for retiring him unceremoniously. I mean, what's the message there?

We can probably attribute the decline in popularity of action movies in the last decade at least partly to a general acknowledgement that trivializing the subject is at best unhelpful, at worst, dangerous. That, and the advent of the information age, which has created audiences wiser to geo-political issues than ever before. Now, if cinema wants to talk terror, it must to do so in an even-handed way. Or go completely the other direction and lampoon the whole subject, a la Team America.

Of course, terrorists weren't really terrorists in 20th century cinema - they were always just handy devices to create drama and tension. Hitchock summed it up when he defined suspense as two characters having a conversation whilst a bomb awaits detonation under the table. Movie terrorists used to fulfill that role. Nowadays we have zombies and apocalyptic disasters to satisfy the high-octane blockbuster audience's needs. The modern general public are so aware of the complexities surrounding terrorism, that one of the runaway TV successes of the year is Homeland, which actively invites its audience to question its own prejudices and become entangled in the complexities of the matter, to the point that we literally don't know whether we're sympathising with Al-Qaeda or the Good Guys. Whoever they might be.

\_\_You may have heard that before. The phrase was originally coined by 19th century transcendentalist writer Ralph Waldo Emerson, and later became part of the lyrics to a classic Aerosmith song. It's a nice saying, as it imparts a sense of freedom, and implies movement - bolstering the urge to 'keep on keeping on'.

\_\_\_ We all value freedom, it's simultaneously a precious thing and a basic human right. It's something that we feel so strongly enough about, that removing it is the harshest penalty our Judicial System will impose, for the very worst of crimes committed.

\_\_\_\_ The feeling of freedom is spatial the ability to willingly go where we like is often the first thing we associate with the term. It's perhaps because of this, that when a journey is interrupted, seized and redirected for someone else's purpose; hijacked, it gets attention.

\_\_\_ The original pirates and highwaymen of history may still be with us, their modern equivalents busy taking ships for ransom in Somalia, and 'jacking cars on roads from Jo'burg to Los Angeles respectively, but the high profile hijackers these days aren't thieves, but people with a message.

\_\_\_\_ Of course the first thing to come to mind is the tragic events of September 11, 2001. Despite being more than a decade ago, the paradigm shift in how the world community views air travel is still apparent. Who hasn't endured the 'security theatre' - emptied their belongings into a tray and stood holding

up their belt-less trousers as the friendly officer breaks out the swabs to ensure their laptop isn't surreptitiously rigged to explode (note; we didn't use the 'B' word).

\_\_\_\_ It's hard to argue that the terrorists haven't won, when the actual 'travel' part of travelling has become something to endure, rather than enjoy. As crackpot as we may find their fundamentalist message, they made it heard.

\_\_\_ We live in an age of diminishing boundaries, transport can get us almost anywhere... and now, thanks to the revolution of social media and, the boundaries of time and space are forever altered.

\_\_\_ 'Space' is no longer just around us, but is also a network of interactions, and by old standards, time has almost become irrelevant, as we can communicate instantly - either synchronised with each other or by leaving and replying to messages.

\_\_\_\_ Thus, distance and time - the things that make a journey what it is - are beginning to take an entirely different form. It stands to reason that people with a message they feel is going unheard, would find a way to interrupt, seize and

Tellingly, when they do so, the result is just as attention grabbing. Enter the 'information super-highwaymen': 'Hacktivist' collective 'Anonymous' have recently begun protesting social injustice by hijacking, amongst others, the French Presidential website. They even developed a tool to hijack Twitter trends; pushing topics that "actually serve a cause" above 'pop culture' references in the rankings.

redirect this 'new movement'.

\_\_\_ In doing so, they have drawn the attention of the FBI, who arrested six of their members this month, and have acknowledged a 'declaration of war' from the group. It all sounds alarmingly familiar. Ironically, those groups championing freedom via hijacking, often shake the very foundations of what gives people outside of their number the feeling of being free.

All we can suggest is that you take on board another familiar saying; "nothing worth doing is ever easy", and continue travelling your life's path, for if you let hijackers keep you from making a journey - metaphorically or physically - they have already hijacked you.

\_ Just keep on keeping on.



MANY PEOPLE LISTEN EAGERLY FOR THE FIRST CUCKOO CALL EACH YEAR - A SURE SIGN THAT SPRING HAS ARRIVED. THE CALL - COOCOO - IS VERY DISTINCTIVE BUT IT IS POSSIBLE TO MISTAKE A COOING COLLARED DOVE FOR A CUCKOO WHICH MAY ACCOUNT FOR SOME OF THE VERY EARLY CLAIMS FOR THE FIRST CUCKOO OF THE YEAR. IT IS THE MALE CUCKOO WHICH MAKES THE CALL, OFTEN FROM A HIGH BRANCH.

The best time to hear the call is in the evening from mid-April to June. It is supposed to be good luck if you have money in your pocket when you hear a cuckoo. If you are single the number of calls you hear is the number of years before you get married.

Cuckoos overwinter in Africa and arrive in Jersey from late March to April. Males and females are usually alike with grey plumage, lighter barred undersides and a long tail. They are well camouflaged and difficult to spot in the trees.

The cuckoo is well known for being parasitic by laying its eggs in the nests of other birds such as robins or reed warblers. The female cuckoo flies over her chosen area looking for suitable nests. She removes one egg from the nest and replaces it with one of her own. This whole process only takes 10 seconds! She lays up to 12 eggs, each in a different nest

When the baby cuckoo hatches, it pushes the other eggs out with its back so that it gets all the food brought by its 'parents'. It soon fills the nest and dwarfs its adoptive parents.

The adult birds feed on insects and are fond of hairy caterpillars which other birds find distasteful.

In August the adult birds begin the long journey back to Africa. The young follow a month later and can find their own way to the wintering area despite never having been before. The maximum age they live to is seven years.







## What's Current in the Court of Law?

In Crawford v Suffolk Mental Health Trust, there was a note of caution on the use of suspension in disciplinary cases.

It was noted suspension was becoming near to a standard practice. It was observed that if it was unjustified it might amount to a breach of trust and confidence (the implied terms of every contract of employment) and that it should never be a "knee-jerk reaction".

Remember a breach of trust and or confidence by an employer to an employee could lead to that employee resigning and claiming constructive dismissall

## Easy rider

Ever wondered what it's actually like to head off on one of those charity adventures you see advertised? Johnny Rebours has just spent one month cycling 2,000km to raise money to support Vietanamese children through education and healthcare. Here's his report...

'H2H did work!' was the cry resounding over the din of cheers and claps and crashing bicycles as 19 riders triumphantly, if not elegantly, arrived at the Reunification Palace in Ho Chi Minh City after a life changing month of thrills, spills and drunken cartwheels, all in the name of charity.

Cycling through some of the most remote parts of the country meant that entire villages would line the streets to clap and shout 'Hello! Hello! Hello!' repeatedly for every rider. High-fiving children as we

whizzed past kept our spirits up, even on the coldest, longest days. Snacks became our life blood with Snickers bars and fruit Mentos giving our sugar boosts throughout the month.

As a group, we were all what one rider refers to as 'enablers'. People who seek the fun, and the alcohol, and the party, even at the detriment of the next day's 800m hill climb. As a group we forged intense loyalties and if one rider decided a bottle of Johnnie Walker was a good idea, we were all in.

From Hawaiian Shirt day to falling into ditches after too many shandies, every day was different and some were far more challenging than others. Ho Chi Minh City, where we are all based, is a hot sticky, flat urban jungle and, naively, we weren't prepared for the moisture awaiting us in the north. Armed with only our tiny tyred, no suspension road bikes we were forced over rocky mud slides, around gravelling mountain sides at 10% gradient and down sandy hills. Inevitably a few tumbles occurred along the way.

The grand total of \$40,000 will fund a kindergarten for a poor community in Hanoi. Another large chunk of the money will aid a vocational college where youths, mainly teenagers from troubled



#### Well done League of Friends!

The League of Friends was delighted to learn they'd won the Condor Ferries Community Award 2011 at the Enterprise Awards last month.

In just over three decades, the League, which is an entirely voluntary organisation, has raised more than £700,000 for the hospital and care centres. 'As Islanders, we know the League best for its shop and café. I think people would be surprised to learn just how much the League has helped the hospital to develop its resources for the benefit of everyone in Jersey' said Steve Bailey. 'In the last two years alone, they have agreed to purchase two kidney dialysis machines, provided a donation of £30,000 towards the cost of a baby transport system and have purchased two stretchers to help with the transport of patients to the UK.'

#### Trailwalking together

Training for an endurance event takes a huge amount of dedication and motivation - particularly if you're also adding a time challenge into the mix. Four islanders are taking on the major challenge of completing a 100km (62 miles) demanding trail in a limited time across the South Downs - a challenge originally set to test the stamina of Gurkha soldiers. The Oxfam Trailwalker, which takes place in July, involves teams walking or running from Portsmouth to Brighton in under 30 hours while raising funds for Oxfam and the Gurkha Welfare Trust.

Those taking part are Mulberry estate agent Bryce Alford, Phil Taylor, a client relationship manager from Minerva Trust & Corporate Services Ltd, Marcelo Rodrigues who works in the General Hospital's sterilisation department, and personal trainer Leanne Rive. Paul Burrows, who works at BNP Paribas, is acting as their support crew. They are not only preparing to take part in this endurance test, but have set themselves the ambitious challenge of completing the course in ten and a half hours.

Many of the teams who take part are members of the armed services, and if the group from Jersey succeed in finishing the course within their target time they will notch up for themselves a record for civilian competitors. Talking about the challenge, Bryce said 'Trailwalker is an extreme endurance event which we have been training for together since January. We believe that we are capable of finishing this course in ten and a half hours and the key to achieving that aim is the regular training sessions over the previous months and the remaining weeks ahead.'

Daunting for some perhaps, but all four participants bring to the team impressive sporting achievements and skills. Bryce holds two Guinness world records for treadmill running, Leanne was the first woman home in the 48 mile Round the Rock Ultra Marathon, and Phil and Marcelo are both sub three hour marathon runners. Their training sessions have covered a series of different routes around the island including some of its more challenging areas to test their stamina. 'We will be working towards running around the island in nine hours' Bryce said.

As well as entering the Trailwalker event to test their fitness levels the team are delighted to be supporting charities at the same time. Team Jersey had originally pledged to raise £3,000 for Oxfam and the Gurkha Welfare Trust, however, due to the generosity of many islanders the target has now increased to £5,000. The team have achieved tremendous support from the local business community and are grateful to SWG Trust, Select Recruitment, Collas Crill, Dandara and Fit 2 Function in helping them to make this epic challenge possible. #### Same-sex unions Civil Partnerships in Jersey

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In July 2011 the States of Jersey approved a new civil partnership bill. The bill was signed by the Queen in December, registered by the Royal Court in January and now exists as the Civil Partnership (Jersey) Law 2012.

This is the first time that same-sex unions have been granted recognition in Jersey. Ahead of the law's introduction, more than fifty other pieces of legislation applicable to marriage have been amended to include civil partnerships. These include laws and regulations in relation to social security, housing, pensions and adoption.

A civil partnership, for same-sex couples, is a union that is considered an equivalent to marriage between heterosexual couples. Heterosexual couples who do not wish to get married cannot enter into a civil partnership.

A civil partnership must be registered with two people serving as witnesses. The States approved an amendment to the Law that permits the ceremony to be registered in a church or other religious premises, if the religious organisation allows it. When dissolving a civil partnership, there are also certain formalities to follow, as with marriage.

The law comes into practice imminently, and for same-sex couples who have registered their partnership, will provide the same rights and benefits on a wide range of matters as married couples, marking a momentous change in many lives.

#### Areas affected by the new law include:

- Tax, including Inheritance Tax
- · Employment benefits
- · State and occupational pension benefits
- Income related benefits, tax credits and child support
- · Parental responsibility for children of the union
- Duty to provide reasonable maintenance for their civil partner and any children of the family
- · Immigration and nationality purposes
- · Domestic violence protections
- Adopting children (prior to this law, one party from the same-sex couple would have to make the adoption application on their own)

Recognition of this union will hopefully encourage more openness with regards to homosexuality and it allows same-sex couples to enjoy the same rights to a family life that heterosexual couples have, along with the responsibilities.



HITCH-HIKING IS REALLY ABOUT STAYING POWER.

Drivers will sometimes make wild gesticulations with hands and looks as if to convey, 'Sorry, I am going your way but my wife's cat is going into labour and I have to collect my dry-cleaning at 2 o'clock'.

There were at least four other hitchers vying for a lift when we arrived but whether through heat, exhaustion, boredom or a heady mix of all three they all dropped out leaving us there, kings of the road.

After a short time we were picked up by a bakery delivery truck with a grizzled, friendly Kiwi behind the wheel. After a brief exchange, "Sweet as, boys!" and we were chugging all 400 km to Christchurch the same day. I think he was in need of some company for his long trip since he regaled his colourful life story to us. Highlights include his ten year stint as long-distance 'truckie' in the USA, intimate friendship with film director Peter Jackson and his Las Vegas wedding. He radioed in for a new driver to take us on the second leg from Kaikoura to Christchurch.

JERSEY'S STYLE MAGAZINI

We asked to be dropped at the Occupy Christchurch camp in Hagley Park. I'd heard from some American backpackers in Nelson that although 'freedom camping' was mostly prohibited in New Zealand, the Occupy protestors in Auckland, Wellington and Christchurch were granted special exemption. Something to do with freedom of assembly, right to protest, no doubt. We arrived at 8 or 9pm and pitched our tent a good distance away, perhaps to dissociate ourselves politically. The security was extremely lax. The volunteer guard just looked a bit lost and asked for a cigarette. The next morning we picked up some of their pamphlets to read over.

The camp was a ragged bunch of around twenty tents, a herb garden, compost heap, improvised loo and was festooned with banners with slogans reading,

## 'WE ARÉ THE/99%/ AND OCCUPY TOGETHER'.

Their material was broadly anticapitalist and fairly generic of the Occupy movement. Being selfserving backpackers we only had eyes for preserving our own capital! We were half surprised and amused to hear the reactionary views of locals in the form of heckles from passing cars, 'Get a job you bums!' So much for class solidarity.

The elected President of the camp was a lean, toothless, forty-something with a pit-bull on a chain named Boof, Most of our conversations were about camp security and his jewelry wares. We formed the distinct impression that the founders of the movement had long since left leaving behind some homeless people; the apolitical refugees of an idea. A lot of teenagers were there also perhaps rooting for an alternative lifestyle. Sometimes it felt we were living in the land where the wild things are.

We had come to Christchurch for the International Buskers festival, a ten day celebration of street performance, comedy and music all free to enjoy in Hagley Park. Top acts included headliners from the Edinburgh Fringe Festival. It was outdoor theatre at its best, energetic, madcap and fun with an intimate circus tent set up for bizarre late night sideshows and burlesque. We saw 'The Boy with tape on his Face' perform his silent comedy in this tiny venue. He stood with a collection bucket at the exit and, being broke, I fished a small badge out of my pocket saying, 'This is a cool badge'. Having tape on his face 'The Boy' was unable to articulate his thanks but made some gratifying noises.

The burlesque show was weird and wonderful, an Australian put his arm inside a steel Dingo trap, a contortionist locked herself inside a tiny Perspex box and a magician threw playing cards like ninja-stars to impale ripe melons. All the fun of the fair.

The city provides a sobering backdrop to all this bedlam. We were struck by how much was lost during the September 2010 and February 2011 earthquakes. Vast districts of the inner-city have been cordoned off with security fences. During the day it resembles a scene from a postapocalyptic movie.


This makes the city incredibly difficult to circumnavigate on car or foot.

Nearly all the quaint Victorian architecture has been destroyed, removing the historic and cultural hub of the city. They are slowly rebuilding, however, and the few thousand who stayed are wonderfully stoical. The city continues to experience mild earthquakes and tremors. Indeed, as one busker comedian pointed out, 'Everyone here's a seismologist these days! And perhaps they need to be, as there is an ever-present threat of another calamity. Much like Londoners during the Blitz, these stalwart souls keep calm each day, and carry on.

## SWISSBLISS



So what had brought me to Switzerland? The chocolate? Mmmmm. The pristine ski slopes? The finance industry perhaps?

## NO.

In fact it was a small dog. A pug named Lucy, who lives in a little village called Founex.

This was my first time here. Usually, my travels are a bit more edgy. The Arctic, Azerbaijan and a number of conflict zones appear in a long, long list of expeditions. To be honest, Switzerland was making me slightly nervous with its rather too perfect, calm and neat first appearance.

Founex too, is pristine. The village has about three thousand inhabitants, more than half of it is farmed, vineyards lounge spread-eagled all around and about. There are three wine tasting venues along the main road, called, aptly, Grand Rue. There's a village shop, a school and about as many small dogs as there are people. I'm not a small dog expert but I definitely spotted sausage dog, chihuahua, westie, shih-tzu, maltese, lhaza apso, toy poodle

#### ... and of course Lucy the pug.

Lucy needed someone to look after her for a month while her owners went back to Montana for Christmas. They had emailed a local network of mums, which includes a friend of mine. She suggested a budget Swiss Christmas for le bebe and I. So an introductory Skype and a Blue Islands flight later, here we are. Oh how much do I love Blue Islands and their infinitely flexible tickets, their supremely helpful staff, their supply of entertaining snacks for le wriggly bebe. But back to the point, where are we again?

We are in an old apartment with a creeper climbing up the front of the building, with an elegant Madame and her husband living downstairs, with a mind-altering view of the lake, and with a pug to take walking every day. Well actually, about 5 times a day. This pug has a weak bladder and is very happy to pee on the floor if she doesn't get her walks. So we walk, and walk...

We walk across the cobbled yard, past the village Christmas tree, past the little shop, along the train tracks. We drink in the take in all its misty blue, light-grey, dark-grey-bordering-black moods and devour the mountains with their minty-white tops. I cannot get enough of them. I cannot get enough of wandering along the vineyards forcing their knobbly, brown arms up into the cold air. The apple trees a little tailer, offering up, even now, little round fruit. The birds flashing out of the hedges and the crows crowding in their hundreds in the tops of lines of the tallest trees, shouting like football hooligans. As Switzerland and its ordered variety of wilderness sinks in. I can't remember feeling such joy.

Le bebe loves the pug, and the trains, and the tricycle-with-a-handle that the owners' little boy has left for us to use. I love Lucy's enthusiasm for her little Swiss life. I love the abundance of brioche and the buffalo mozzarella, sold by Marcel from a kiosk in Nyon, a town a polite bus-ride away. I love the pizza flour sold in the supermarket there and the fact that one of the local winemakers brings a steaming glass of mulled wine across the road when I am waiting for the bus on Christmas eve. I have the best hot chocolate I have ever tasted in my life, sitting next to a fish tank in Boccard, a little tea room in Rolle. And le bebe and his friend go wild for the car carousel nearby on the lake front.


We meet dogs and their owners. Pedro, Lucy's friend who dances excitedly around her when we meet, Guiness, a beautiful collie puppy who she bites, and a licquorice allsorts assortment of hairy, bustling four leggeds dragging their owners along the road to tranquillity and better health. Guiness's owners Eric the firefighter and his wife Marie invite us to dinner. We become regulars at the Confiserie de ta Fontaine, an exquisite chocolate shop/patisserie in the next village, Coppet.

Just before Christmas we find the shop turned into an edible Cornavin station with chocolate swiss-roll trains parked on all the counters. A friendly husband and wife team own the shop. Guillaume shapes the sweets and Elodie charms the customers and sells it all. I dream of working there but find out that it takes three years of apprenticeship to become a chocolatier, and two even just to be a salesperson. We spend hours in Coppet, munching their patisserie and playing on the lakefront with the swans and ducks. Oh and we bump into Kofi Annan, who lives there too. I swoon a little and do myself proud with my Jersey-schoolgirl French.

Oh yes I nearly forgot the snow. It snowed. A thick, rolled layer of icing all over the cake. We stomped in it and slid in it and after Christmas was over, went up the mountain in the dark in it, to watch a Christmas tree bonfire and eat raclette, a local delicacy of melted cheese draped over potato and gherkin.

Switzerland surprised me. It gets inside you so gently you don't notice. While you aren't looking, it will fill you with mountain and lake; forest and fire; ice and snow; and treeful after treeful of wild, cackling crows. Oh, and chocolate of course.



## Call of the wild



Madagascar (the far flung land all children know how to pronounce, thanks to DreamWorks) is coming to the Arts Centre this month. The artist Matt Falle spent two months travelling around Madagascar with his fiancé Katya, sketching and painting the landscape, people and wildlife in his unique style, and you can see it all at the Berni Gallery for a special exhibition in association with Durrell and kindly sponsored by Kleinwort Benson.

Matt says: 'The Malagasy people are wonderful and very friendly - not affected by mass tourism. We travelled Madagascar using various modes of transport, as the road system is either good or non existent - depending on where you are. One trip involved taking a 4x4 and it took 24 hours non-stop! We had to cross 10 rivers - this is when you realise what 4x4's are really built for! We also took a 9 hour journey on Madagascar's only railway - which dates back to the 1930s. This was amazing, traveling from the central mountains, through lush landscapes and villages, to the coast on the Indian ocean. Whilst in Madagascar we saw some of its famous wildlife, most notably the lemurs - who are such loveable and charming characters. When you see them in their natural habitat, it is truly amazing and enchanting. Unfortunately, Madagascar's wildlife and habitat is severely threatened due to the usual story of de-forestation and hunting. It's not always outside forces who are responsible - often it's local communities who need to clear land for rice farming, and charcoal for cooking. Durrell do important work with communities, which helps to

prevent the loss of wildlife and its habitat.'

Durrell's Head of Conservation Programmes, Dr Andrew Terry said, 'Madagascar is at the heart of our conservation work. Madagascar is a very special place; it is colourful, mysterious and full of weird and wonderful creatures. The island is at the heart of our conservation work and for the last 25 years we have been dedicated to saving some of the most threatened species in the world there. Working with Matt is a great opportunity to communicate some of the vibrancy and to talk a little about the wonderful people and wildlife of the 'Red Island'.'

## Cutting edge

#### How did it all start?

#### Where did you study?

I went to Hautlieu, where I took A levels in Art and Design, Photography and History - it was just the best school I could have gone to as that was where I really started to focus on my Art. I then also took an extra A level in the evenings at the Harbour Gallery in St. Aubins (which really helped me gain my place at London college of fashion!) and that was a fundamental starting point to the skills I have now.

#### Who inspires you?

I think everyone that knows me knows that I have always been crazy about Vivienne Westwood's early work, but more recently I have been drawing a lot of inspiration from smaller London based designers like Felicity Brown who has just shown at London Fashion Week. I think what I like most about her is how she hand dyes all her own fabrics, I do this a lot with my work too.

#### How are you finding LCF?

It's a brilliant environment for me to be in, it's very diverse and you're surrounded all day long by some of the most creative people that are making some of the craziest unimaginable things! You're constantly competing and comparing yourself which I think is why the standard of my work has probably improved so much over the past 3 years that I have been there.

#### What's been your proudest achievement?

I think my proudest achievements so far are of course having my clothes sold at Pretty Vacant and also the seven garments that I have just made for my latest project at LCF, where we have had a live industrial project designing for a company called Core Spirit (they are a bit like Diesel and have a shop on Bond St) I really enjoyed this project and am very proud of my final garments for it which fingers crossed...one or two could be put into production at Core Spirit!

#### Who would you love to design

My dream design job would probably be designing for someone like McQueen or to be honest even more high street end, somewhere like All Saints or Topshop Boutique would suit me just fine!

'We have so many incredible locations here, from castles to countryside, manors houses to forts, beaches to German bunkers, and they're all within twenty minutes - that's a dream for a producer trying to organise a film shoot' says Film Jersey's Frank Toshack. In the last year Jersey's been the setting for Harrods and Laura Ashley fashion shoots, the BBC's production of Coast and a number of corporate videos. This year already has a well-known catalogue shoot in May followed by a major German TV production for a month in the summer. Together with the Olympics and Jubilee, 2012 is promising to be a busy year. Frank explains that the island's easy

air links to the capital and variety of scenic locations are making it an attractive and economical spot for film makers.

Currently the island doesn't offer quite the same financial benefits for filmmakers as locations such as the Isle of Man, which has attracted many big budget Hollywood productions over the years, but Frank hopes that the island's stunning scenery and unique mix of history and culture will catch the eye of producers. And with filming of Kenneth Branagh's production of 'The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society', taking place just across the water in Guernsey, the Channel Islands are making it onto the map for big budget movie locations. ## Old meets New Street

You'll have a one-off opportunity this month (if you're quick) to see a unique exhibition by Ian Rolls, who's brought the island's iconic National Trust properties to life on driftwood.

They're being displayed in the Club Room of the National Trust's refurbished Georgian property, 16 New Street, and will hang next to pictures of the same properties painted in a more familiar Rolls style. Working on driftwood was a departure from Ian's normal watercolour-on-paper style. 'They were very quickly and deliberately roughly painted in nost cases to complement the beaten driftwood panels. One of the reasons I think they work is because the driftwood itself has had an eventful life and stories to tell and so do the properties... they are like old friends discussing their adventures. I tried to alter the shape of the wood as little as possible, so I chose each one carefully to match the specific building'.

'I painted half the pictures in the exhibition in oil and the other half in watercolour and the difference in media demands a change in style. You can't paint the same way in oil as you can in watercolour, and these pieces of driftwood have a 3D presence - painted objects not just pictures. I'm looking forward to displaying them next to the watercolours which are very different, but have a certain quiet presence of their own, painted on torn paper and mounted as if they are floating.'

You'll be able to see Ian Rolls' pictures of the iconic properties on everything from mugs and tea towels to greetings cards, all for sale at the shop at 16 New Street. Choose your favourite – the timeless white house at St Ouen's or the quirky multi-dimensional Tesson Mill. 'It's quite funny, seeing my work on a tea towel when I'm doing the washing up, but that's part of the beauty of these images' says Ian. 'They have a sense of fun – they were fun to paint - and can take up residence quite happily on everyday items'.

Entry to the exhibition in the Club Room of the beautiful National Trust-restored Georgian house at 16 New Street is free of charge until the 4th April, when the historic building officially reopens to the public for the season, with an entrance fee of £5 for adults and £3 for children - Trust members and under 10s are free.

Ahh, those difficult decisions you have to make at work these days... like where to go for lunch. The café on the corner? Too noisy, and a high probability of Sue from HR overhearing the office gossip. Restaurants? There's a risk of everything taking too long. Let's be clear about this right now, two-hour lunch breaks are definitely not written into my contract.

So when someone told me Chambers had just been refurbished with a new menu that was designed to offer something for everyone, I was intrigued. Always an early adopter, I got some friends together to try it out.

Through the door and my first impressions are good. Chambers has had a bit of a makeover, introducing some modern touches alongside the traditional familiar wooden beams. It gets even better when we're shown to comfy seats, handed gin and tonics (Hendricks of course...) and take a look at the well set out and tempting menu. So tempting in fact, that we have to put the gossip on hold while we work out who's having which of the delicious-sounding dishes on offer. Sadly we have to skip the starters menu, although the spicy nachos and Moroccan chicken fillets with a harissa yoghurt dip sound like ideal grazing food while you're having a few drinks.

Thankfully there are enough choices on the menu to keep everyone happy, and in the interests of a fair review, we all agree to have different dishes. After much deliberation, we order the lamb tajine, barbecue ribs, smoked salmon platter and the paella, and then settle back down to the impor-

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tant business of Catching Up. The lunch company was excellent, which always helps, but everyone around us seemed to be having a good time, with friendly staff and food arriving promptly – exactly what you want when you have 55 minutes and counting for lunch.

Our food all arrived at the same time, nicely presented on blue oval plates and our server made sure we had all the sauces we needed. Now you might think that's a minor thing, but for a ketchup fiend like myself, there's nothing worse than ordering chips and finding yourself sauce-less while your waiter's nowhere to be found. I have been known to carry sachets around in my

topped with a pair of triumphant gambas. The tajine was a generous flavour-packed helping of lamb in a rich aromatic sauce, with plenty of couscous and a flatbread, which was particularly useful when it came to ensuring every last drop of delicious sauce was mopped up. The smoked salmon platter comes either as a starter or a main, and it's beautifully presented with capers, lemon crème fraîche and granary bread all arranged in a very elegant way, so you can create your own artistic sandwiches. After conducting extensive taste tests on each other's dishes, we were all very impressed.

Thanks to the quick and efficient service, we finished in time to make our way back

handbag in case of emergency, much to the shock of fellow diners... but that's another story.

The ribs placed before me are completely irresistible, especially when coupled with the crunchy coleslaw served in a little matching dish of its own. The tender meat is desperate to fall off the bone and the sauce is tangy and thick without being gloopy. And just as I'm wondering how best to manage this finger-licking feast, I notice a steaming bowl of water and lemon has been helpfully placed on the table so I won't end up wearing my lunch for the rest of the afternoon. Fantastic. Everyone digs in with similar eagerness, and of course I had to sample the rest of the dishes. The paella lived up to its gorgeous presentation, a mountain of saffron rice full of tomato-ey chicken, chorizo, squid and mussels and

to our respective offices without jogging (never a good idea straight after lunch), and I determine to add Chambers to my list of top lunch locations. The Chambers team have put a lot of thought into a diverse menu that'll suit most people, whether you're having a quick lunch (try their pulled (braised) pork, pickle and sour cream in a toasted roll with chips on the side) or having a few drinks over one of their sharing platters - the Chambers House Board is a meat-feast and a half with rare roast sirloin of beef and home baked ham with rilettes, pickles and crusty bread. Conveniently located with good food and great flavours all served in spruced up surroundings with a friendly vibe, it's ideal when you want to get away from the office and have an easy, relaxed lunch that won't take too long. Top marks.

We think we have a solution that doesn't involve dramatically restructuring your working week though – at the end of your day, instead of going home, loosen your tie and make a detour to pick up a friend / partner / someone interesting who won't talk about work (delete as appropriate), and head to St Brelade for a walk across the beach and a laid back supper at the Crab Shack while you watch the sun go down.

Eating at the Crab Shack feels like you're on holiday without the hassle of actually having to go on holiday. After all, an award-winning beach\* just a few sandy steps away, laid-back beach shack décor and local produce served in a relaxed atmosphere – what more could you want? With its flip-flop friendly wooden floors, you can wander in straight from the

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beach, pull up a wooden table and order a plate of olives, some homemade pesto houmous and freshly-baked bread while you look at the menu and wind down after a day at your desk. The menu's guaranteed to make your mouth water-oysters from Grouville Bay, locally caught fish and chips, Jersey scallops, lobster and crab share menu space with burgers, steaks, linguine and chicken and chorizo. Seafood lovers? It's a perfect wish list of summer dishes, with enough alternatives to keep non-crustacean consumers happy too. And for dessert – a whole range of Jersey ice-cream sundaes. Bliss.

I started with the crab and cognac bisque,

a velvety bowl of crabby gruyère-topped goodness with crab toasts on the side for sophisticated dunking. There's one word next to the description on the menu, Yum.' I think it's well deserved. My dinner date ordered half a dozen oysters, fresh from Gorey waters and alive-alive-oh. 'They taste of the sea' he said – meaning of course in a fresh, salty,

seafoody way, not as in the gulp of seawater you take when you wipe out on your beginner's board at St Ouen. They were absolutely delicious, and if you want Jersey oysters served properly, with a squeeze of lemon, a dash of Tabasco and a splash of shallot vinagrette, the Crab Shack and the next door Oyster Box are the best places to start.

For the main courses, you can't do better than share a seafood platter - just make sure you take someone who won't be selfish with their shellfish. The Highlands & Island platter is the perfect choice if you're a bit squeamish and don't fancy all the winkle-picking that comes with the usual fruits de mer package. It's a best-of platter when it comes to seafood - two massive crab claws filled with soft white flesh, prawns, salmon, king prawns and a few huge gambas with plenty of Marie Rose sauce and mayonnaise. Delicious. The other great thing about seafood is that it doesn't leave you feeling too full. It's a good thing really, as you'll have plenty of room left for the Crab Shack's speciality sundaes. Top of the list has to be the massive Knickerbocker Glory, or the Banana Split (definitely one of your five a day...), and even better, you can add your own selection of toppings from marshmallows to Oreo cookies at the dessert counter. So indulge your inner big kid, or take the kids along - the Crab Shack is one of those places you can eat out with children without having to compromise on food. There's a good value £6 menu for kids, which includes a few mini-sized versions of adult mains and ice-cream for afters, guaranteed to keep everyone happy.

So next time the sun's out and you're stuck in, don't get frustrated, get on the phone and book yourself an after-work table by the window at the Crab Shack. Hey, it might even make your 4 o'clock team meeting more bearable.




# WHISKYTASTING-HOW TO

You don't just drink the glorious peaty stuff straight down. Oh no. Swirl it around in the glass and take time to appreciate its rich honey colour.

Every whisky has a slightly different tone. Then you 'nose' it - adding a drop of spring water to release the aromas. Breathe deeply and savour the tonal range of aromas from toffee to tobacco. Then sip. Slowly swirl around the mouth and enjoy.

# FOR PEATS SAKE

Stuff you didn't know about whisky.



Whisky's that warm woody colour because it's coloured by the stuff. Wood that is. Spending years in barrels (normally oak) turns it golden. The depth of the colour depends on the oak used in the casks.

 $\overleftarrow{\mathbf{w}}$  Whisky can only be called whisky in the UK if it's been aged for 3 years.

American bourbon's produced by the sour-mash method which is a way of making sure the bourbon keeps its character from one batch to the next. Liquid from a previous distillation is added to the mix, or 'mash' rather like the process of using a 'starter' for sourdough bread.

The shape of the conventional whisky glass was originally designed to disguise the taste of raw grain spirit in inferior whisky by dissipating its smell.

To really appreciate whisky you'll need a tulip-shaped nosing glass which keeps the 'nose' or aroma of the whisky intact.

# Gaudins Chocolate Mini Hot Cross Buns 2 for £1.50, Iceland

Perfect as a snack before you rush out, or for those who don't like too much for breakfast. The tasty treats contain just enough chocolate to delight the senses, but not too much that it overwhelms the traditional spice and raisin flavours of the bun.

**7/10** They taste great, but a hot cross bun and then some chocolate would always be better than combining them.



Certainly different and I'm guessing not to everyone's liking, these huge hot cross buns which come in packs of two are not for the faint-hearted! Leave yourself enough time and room in your stomach- you'll need it. The flavour of the mandarin is much more pronounced than the Earl Grey, but the flavours (weirdly) seem to fit together like old pals.

**5/10** You'd have to be in the mood for these kings of the hot cross bun variety, and the general opinion is they are nice in an odd way, but aren't a patch on an original luxury bun.

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



We met up with Gavin Reid, Operations Director at Randalls to find out more about the new Chambers refurbishment.

### So what has gone on at Chambers?

There's an old saying if it ain't broke then don't fix it, and to be perfectly honest, Chambers was not broken. We were however conscious that having spent the past 17 years as a firm favourite with locals and tourists alike and having had some 8 million people through her doors that the old girl was in need of some special attention and TLC.

### Were there any problems?

One of the first dilemmas we encountered was how do we make changes without losing the soul of the place? It would be a very brave decision-making collective that would agree to a redesign and rebrand of what has effectively has become an institution to Mulcaster Street. We finally agreed on a design that would allow the venue a lift blending the introduction of some modern day chic whilst retaining the traditional heart of the original Chambers in the form of the infamous large wooden beams, the distinct long bar and the favourite comfy sofas by the fireplace. some of our customers! This was addressed with the inclusion of some stunning comfy chairs and stools to complement the dining and poseur tables, which allow for the introduction of some key vibrant colours to the overall design scheme.

### What is your new favourite part?

I would have to say some of my favourite areas now are the recessed booths where you and friends can happily seclude yourselves in your own space whilst still being able to take in the atmosphere (and people watch!). I gather that the creation of an extra two ladies' loos has also been something the young ladies have been very impressed with!

On the whole I am absolutely delighted with the end result. Chambers is now a venue that can compete with any stylish city venue not only in terms of décor, but adding an improved food and beverage offering (new speciality bar and hidden Speakeasy), new levels of customer service and an enhanced entertainment schedule, she really is Everyone's Chambers!



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

### So tell us, what inspired you to get this off the ground?

I'd been scuba diving for so many years but wanted to push myself further and explore my limits. Technical diving is not only expensive but also involves clunky equipment and doesn't feel as natural. Competition seemed the best way to realise this and as scuba doesn't have a competitive aspect, freediving was the only way forward. There also isn't anyone else teaching freedive in Jersey and I'm keen for more people to get involved, which is what led me to qualifying as an AIDA (Association Internationale pour le Development de l'Apnée – www.aidainternational.org) instructor.

### What did you do prior to starting this business?

I've lived in Egypt for 5 or so years teaching scuba as well as working in videography and photography, mostly in Dahab and Sharm El Sheikh. I've also been involved in underwater videography and photography and the lack of bubbles when freediving compared to scuba is an obvious bonus when it comes to getting still, clear shots and not scaring away the marine life. I've also previously taught scuba over here in Jersey.

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Bracken Rothwell's tip of the month

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### Did that teach you any lessons that helped you succeed?

Living in Egypt has given me the patience of a saint! I'd definitely say it's developed my people skills, so don't be scared if you'd like to give freediving a go but have never done any diving before.

What's the hardest lesson you've learnt since starting the business? The business is still only getting off the ground with courses due to start this June and run through until August so I'm sure I've still got a lot to learn.

### Have you got any funny stories?

I'm famous! If you've not heard of the Tank Bangers, look them up. We have a lot of fun promoting environmental protection in a lighthearted way, getting both young and old involved worldwide raising money without the drudgery of bucket shaking. Together with people in Malaysia, Thailand, Tenerife, Egypt and England to name but a few places, we write and perform songs about the sea, direct, film and edit amusing videos and do talks – look out for us at the London Dive Show on the 31st March and 1st April at the ExCeL Centre. If you search 'our blue' by the Tank Bangers on YouTube you'll see me at 1min 25sec.

### What advice would you give to would-be entrepreneurs?

Ask me at the end of the summer! Seriously though, never stop trying. If you love something and can use it to help make a living from sharing it with other people then keep at it!

### About Freedive Jersev:

This year's courses will run from June to August and Matt is taking bookings now. There'll be a competition at the end of the summer which is open to everyone but if you've taken part in a Freedive Jersey course it'll be free to enter. It's nothing too serious, more aimed at being a bit of fun and a way for anyone who has been involved to put their new skills into practice and push themselves in a competitive environment.

He's taking his AIDA judging qualification later this year to help put Jersey on the freediving map by allowing an internationally recognised record to be set. Also, if you take a course with Freedive Jersey, from then on training is free. If you've got a buddy you can use the line whilst Matt is teaching and get involved – he wants people to be able to remain active as a freediver and enjoy the sport. Times and locations for coaching so that people can come down and get involved will be updated on his website, www.freedivejersey.com along with all things freedive.

The courses are open to all kinds of people; those who enjoy the sea, yoga, gym training, surfers, anyone - not just for health freaks. Physical fitness is fairly important but being able to control your mind is possibly even more important. Matt says he's seen 60 plus year-old smokers freedive with 3 minute breath holds. He does a lot of yoga to help his freediving, but if you're strong willed and enjoy being in the water he guarantees you'll enjoy it.

# Spring cleaning for a quick property sale

The economic climate has created a buyer's (or tenant's) market. So, if you're selling or renting out your property, you must make it stand out from the crowd. Look at it with critical eyes – and if you need an impartial view, a quick chat with your lawyer could make the difference between a successful sale or a long wait.

# Keep shared boundaries and walls in good condition

Party-owned walls and fences are often left to manage themselves and have very often fallen, or are falling, down. When this happens boundaries can be lost forever or their exact position becomes unclear, which can cause legal issues in a sale and could require a contract to agree a new boundary line. The entrance is a buyer's first impression of your home and a granite wall can impress. But they're expensive to repair or replace and purchasers become cautious if they perceive future expense to fix it. Small but regular maintenance results in lasting – and better looking – walls and boundaries.

# Thinking of upgrading your property with an extension or conversion?

Lawyers regularly come to sell a property, only to find that a garage has 'become' a lounge or a loft has been 'transformed' into a master-suite. Such changes can increase the property's value but if undertaken without permission can seriously delay or prevent a sale. Internal works tend to have fewer legal implications then external, but it is vital to gain planning permissions for a number of material changes and any structural changes. Ask your lawyer to review your title-contract and confirm whether your planned works would breach your contractual conditions.

### Is maintenance down to the landlord or tenant?

It is vital that landlords are aware of local tenancy laws – in particular the changes which will be introduced when the Residential Tenancy (Jersey) Law 2011 comes into force later this year - and have a good grasp of obligations under the lease. It is sometimes unclear whether works needed are the landlord's or tenant's responsibility. It may initially appear that the works are internal and the responsibility of the tenant, when in fact it's a structural problem which is the landlord's responsibility. If you're unsure, ask your lawyer. This should help prevent complaints or actions being brought against you.





# What advice would you give yourself as a graduate considering the experience you have now?

Someone said to me not too long ago not to 'let time stand still'. If you have the opportunity to continue furthering your career through study, don't pass on the chance as you could lose momentum or determination. Try and complete what is needed to progress your career before other things in life arise and become distracting or time consuming. I would advise anyone graduating this year to line up as much work experience as possible, whether it be paid or unpaid, as in this current economic environment opportunities for trainees are not as forthcoming as in the past.






Steel wheels are best, sure they'll buckle if you hit them hard, but they're more resilient than alloys as well as drawing less attention to you.


#### NEED TO GO FURTHER?



#### What got you into selling cars?


