

A RIGHT ROYAL SHAMBLES:

JUST THE WAY US BRITS LIKE IT

ritish summertime institutions wouldn't be British summertime institutions without the pesky rain (Latin. Precipitatum Irritatus) having its say in proceedings. The annual Wimbledon showers, Glastonbury mud baths and general raining on of any parade of note are as British as jam on toast, so it was with a warm, fuzzy sense of familiarity that the nation tuned into the Queen's Jubilee to witness an absolute shower, in more than one sense of the term. I must make clear that I'm not a republican or antimonarchist in any way; I'm more or less on the fence, if anything leaning slightly towards a pro-royal stance. That's a topic for another time, however.

So it wasn't with a sense of shadenfreude that I watched the BBC's coverage of the Jubilee River Pageant Soaking - well, no more than as if the celebrations had been in aid of anyone, literally anyone. More a sense of cosy nostalgia from seeing possibly the most shambolic live televised event since the nation bathed in Samantha Fox and Mick Fleetwood's embarrassment at the chaotic Brit Awards in 1989. Look it up younglings. It was the sort of charming shambles that Britain used to excel at. Once upon a time, awkward interviews, clunking links and overall shoddiness were a weekly feature on game shows, live news programs and the like. Now with television's typically slick professionalism and the general public's increased sense of media savvy-ness, howling TV moments are a rare commodity. Like an ageing boxer, there are occasionally flashes of our brilliance at this sort of thing,

but the glimpses are increasingly rare these days. Continuing the ageing boxer analogy (indulge me), the Right Royal Shambles was akin to George Foreman coming out of retirement to win the world heavyweight title at the grand old age of 45, a defiant middle finger aimed at time's winged chariot. In the case of the Jubilee River Pageant, a vintage display of quintessential English rubbishness.

I'm less interested than most commentators were in the BBC's misjudged decision to feature reports by Tess Daly and Fearne Cotton on such inane gimmickery as Jubilee sickbags. That element of the awful coverage was totally avoidable, down to

the BBC underestimating the intellectual capacity of its viewers, and therefore, just boring. What made the six-hour long live program such an absolute belter of a watch for me were the inescapable bloopers that were nigh-on possible to predict. It was so from the off, when the cameras cut from the studio to a village hall party in Norfolk, during which the reporter asked a four year-old girl, "So, how are you enjoying the Jubilee celebrations?"

Her response, with all the candour of a toddler untrained in diplomatic niceties, and all the enthusiasm of someone asked to bathe in hot tar:

"I've been here for HOURS."


And it continued, in this vein, for hours. Other highlights were the display of a 'special Jubilee buffet' aboard one of the flotilla of boats on the Thames, complete with waterlogged vol-au-vents and rain sandwiches. Oh, and let's not forget the BBC-commissioned attempts to recreate Canaletto's famous 1747 painting of the Lord Mayor's river procession. By the time the downpour was done with the artists' attempts, they looked more like Cornetto's.


Of course, who can forget the line of drowned rats regaling the Queen with the national anthem at the end? It would be impossible not to sympathise with the choir, for whom this clearly should have been a proud moment. But, with the rain lashing them and matted, soaked hair stuck to their dripping faces, it was a tiny bit very funny, and I for

one was hoping the Queen would lose composure and break out in hysterical laughter. The final piece de resistance came with the commentator's attempts to look on the bright side by noting that, "the wow moment is due any minute now, a fly past of nine naval helicopters in diamond formation, which will hopefully make the wait

in the rain worthwhile for these spectators." Followed, a heartbeat later, by "I'm getting news that due to the conditions, that wow moment has been cancelled." It was perfectly farcical, and farcically perfect.

But hey, this is what being a Brit is all about right? Leave the slick stuff to the Americans I say. A good old washout gives us the chance to exercise those classic British traits of turning the other cheek, taking it on the chin, stiff upper lip, all of which, if attempted simultaneously, result in sort of a gurn, as demonstrated by the Duke of Edinburgh as he braved the weather aboard the Good Ship Hopeless. Here's to another ten years and another Jubilee for dear old Queenie. If the next one's sunny though, tune in to something else.

ne of the most common questions we get asked about the rally is 'Don't I need a fast car?' Without a stable of cars to choose from we opted for our trusty steed, the Gallery Distro delivery van. There was some concern over conditions as a force 7 had ferries running for a harbour the night before we were due to depart. Fortunately, following our send off coffee and bacon rolls courtesy of the Royal Yacht Hotel, Poseidon and Mother Nature calmed things just enough to allow Condor Rapide to power over the undulating ocean and safely to St Malo. As usual, in addition to a first hidden clue in our competitor pack, we had a challenge for a ferry. To avoid Google's ability to answer just about every quiz question in previous years this year our organiser had a new plan; a massive word search. I'm sure it's been a while since you had the time or inclination for a wordsearch....you're missing out. Our 24 Jersey ralliers rolled off the ferry to meet the organisers, marshalls and a couple from the UK who, on learning the ferry from the UK to Jersey was cancelled, had driven to Folkstone and down through France early doors to meet us in time for the start.

Fortunatley we arrived there before all the others had left and joined a few teams for a croque monsieur. The day went well and we crossed beautiful countryside and passed through quaint towns. Evenings on the rally are everything you'd expect of a French holiday with good food in a rural French hotel; tasty morcels, flowing wine and good times as everyone waits to see how they've faired with clues during the day. We've been to the South coast of France three times, to Barcelona and through the Alps to Geneva. Each route covering spectacular countryside and breathtaking views. 



His stud career was rudely interrupted by masked gunmen in County Kildare in 1983, who towed him off in a horse box, never to be seen again. If he's still alive - which is a



THE HOLY GRAIL



Dogs don't want to watch you surf ...

The UK may be a nation of dog lovers, but it seems we are still putting man's best friend at risk as a new survey released today by Dogs Trust, the UK's largest dog welfare charity, reveals that over 66% of people have seen a dog locked in a car on a sunny day yet over a third of them did nothing about it. With temperatures easily reaching over 40 degrees in some parked vehicles (alright, it wasn't quite THAT hot in June) dogs could die within minutes. The UK has just launched a "Hot Cars Can Kill Dogs" Campaign. We may not get it in Jersey so Gallery thought we should make you animal lovers aware. The survey also reveals that 15% of those questioned called the police when they saw a dog locked in the car, 49% tried to alert the driver and 4% actually broke into the car to rescue the dog. Over the last year AA patrols have rescued 832 pets locked in cars and in recent years there have been several high profile cases of canine fatalities.

ADVICE TO MOTORISTS INCLUDE:

Never leave your dog alone in the car - even if it seems cool outside it can become very hot very quickly. Parking in the shade and/or keeping the windows down does not make it safe!

Make sure you keep your dog as cool as possible when driving: avoid travelling during the heat of the day, use sun blinds on the windows and consider opening a window a little to allow a cooling breeze to circulate in the vehicle.

Make sure you have a supply of water and know where you can stop off on route for water breaks. Dogs are not able to cool down as effectively as humans so could suffer from heat stroke and dehydration very quickly.

If you do see a dog in distress please contact your local police station or the JSPCA.

Contributory Fault

This month's article was written by Michael Salter, Ely Place Chambers.

The Employment (Jersey) Law 2003 was amended by the Employment (Amendment No. 4) Law to include a power by the tribunal to reduce compensation where it thought the Claimant contributed directly to his dismissal. As in the United Kingdom this is an understandably case sensitive assessment the tribunal makes in relation to the case before it. However, unlike, the UK, which has two separate awards for unfair dismissal: the Basic Award to which "any conduct" can be considered, and the Compensatory Award where only conduct that causes or contributes to the dismissal can be considered, in Jersey there is only one award and articles 77F(5) and(6) of the Law expressly permit the tribunal to take into account conduct which comes to light after the act of dismissal. The classic example of where a reduction would be allowed under the Law here in Jersey would be where an employee has been stealing items from the stockroom prior to their dismissal, but this was not known at the time of his dismissal.

Also, the wider scope for a reduction here in Jersey means that the conduct of the employee does not need to be linked to the dismissal. Indeed, in the UK there is a view that the conduct of the employee over the whole of their employment can be considered. Optikinectics Ltd v Whooley EAT 1275195. Employers, should not get too encouraged by this however as, understandably, applying a reduction for such conduct would, however, need to be subject to the requirement that the reduction be "just and equitable" in accordance with article 77F(3).

Notwithstanding this however, the power to reduce compensation is potentially very wide ranging. Yet, it is one that many employers overlook when in tribunal, and it is an area which can, if approached without due consideration and thoroughness be got wrong, and the employer left to pay to the ex-employee more than they deserve. Clearly, for the

discretion to be applied the conduct of the employee relied upon by the employer must be culpable in some regard. This necessarily requires tribunals to make findings of fact about whether or not the employee actually committed the act complained of. Whilst this seems logical to the layman, and is the normal role of a court in other areas, the experienced employment practitioner realises that for unfair dismissal claims the tribunal do not make such findings of guilt of the employee but rather investigate the mind-set of the employer. Normally the tribunal ask themselves whether the employer had reasonable grounds for believing the employee committed the act of misconduct, not whether the employee is actually guilty of those acts. This is turned on its head when the tribunal is considering contributory fault.

What then can amount to conduct worthy of a reduction? Clearly, it needs to be culpable. However, it need not be a breach of contract, and has been described in 1979 as including conduct which is "bloody minded" (Nelson v BBC). It obviously includes, dishonesty, breach of rules and regulations and unauthorised absences. What is clear however is that the employee must be to blame in some degree, so for instance where a claimant is dismissed for a genuine long-term sickness absence it is unlikely that their compensation would be reduced for contributory fault unless the Claimant. was at fault, for instance by not engaging in the sickness process of the employer.

Once these hurdles have been cleared it is up to the tribunal to consider the size of any reduction. Again, this is determined by the tribunal adopting a "broad common sense view" of the facts of the case it has before it. Such guidance as there is comes from the Court of Appeal in Holier v Plysu Ltd [1983] IRLR 250. Generally this falls into categories of 100%



reduction where the employee is entirely to blame, a 50% reduction when the employee is equally to blame and a 25% reduction when the employer is mostly to blame for the dismissal.

Employers need to get their ducks in a row when arguing for a contributory fault reduction. Evidence will need to be called to show the ex-employee committed the act complained of, this imposes a requirement beyond the mere evidence gathering for the defence of an unfair dismissal claim. If there is evidence of the employee stealing from the stockroom, it will need to be disclosed; be it a witness in person or CCTV, as without it the tribunal will not be able to consider whether the ex-employee actually did commit the act that led them to be dismissed. In cases such involving physical violence or personal abuse this often places employers in an awkward position as the complainant may not be willing to come forward and be cross examined by their assailant/abuser, yet without their evidence the employer may find it is unable to produce any evidence of the conduct complained of

From experience it seems that employers and their advisers need to be sware of the extra mile they will be expected to go in cases where they wish to argue for a contributory fault reduction, as by asking the tribunal to adopt the role of a criminal jury there are additional requirements of disclosure and proof that bite. Failure to do so can amount to a costly and expensive error.

Anthony suffered his stroke in 2007 following a football accident. It has left him with partial paralysis and severe aphasia, a communication disability that affects his ability to read, write and speak.

Stroke Association Jersey chairman Ian Black said that it was 'fantastic' that Bedell had agreed to be the main sponsor for the cycle ride.

'We cannot thank Bedell enough for supporting the charity in this way. The funds we raise from the ride will make a huge contribution toward allowing us to continue to provide rehabilitation services to those affected by stroke,' she said.

He added that all of the funds raised from the London to Paris Cycle Ride will be spent on providing support to stroke survivors in Jersey.

HAVE YOUR SAY ON THE FUTURE OF THE STATES

It's easy to overlook politics as a subject for discussion for sensible types at dinner parties. The beauty of Jersey is that our micro size means that politics is that much closer to the people. Now you have the opportunity to determine the future of Jersey politics. The reform of Jersey's States Assembly has been the subject of debate for some time. There have been plenty of discussions and debates about the structure of our government, but so far there has been little in the way of reform.

An Electoral Commission has now been set up to look at the way our government is constituted and to make recommendations on the future of the States Assembly.

The Commission is chaired by Senator Sir Philip Bailhache, with Vice Chairman, Colin Storm, who is the former Chief Executive of Guinness Ltd. and of the Burger King Corporation. They are joined by politicians Deputy James Baker and Constable Juliette Gallichan; as well as Highlands College principal, Professor Ed Sallis, and BBC producer, Dr. Jonathan Renouf. They want to know what we think about the way the States is made up.

THEY HAVE LAUNCHED A CONSULTATION TO FIND OUT OUR VIEWS ON:

- the classes of States member;
- their constituencies and mandates;
- the number of States members: and
- their terms of office.

Commission chairman, Senator Sir Philip Bailhache, said: "We hope to stimulate wide public debate on these important issues and would encourage everyone to visit our website: www.electoralcommission.je. Once we have finalised our recommendations, our proposals will be brought to the States for approval and then to the public for their vote in a referendum.....We are determined to do all we can to find out what Islanders think in order help with the development of our proposals."

At the moment there are 51 elected members of the States. As a result of changes agreed last year, this will be reduced to 49 in October 2014 when we will elect 8 Senators; 12 Connétables and 29 Deputies on the same day.

- How many members there should be in the States;
- How members should be elected (by Island-wide vote or by parish or constituency);

Financial provision What happens when a civil partnership breaks down?

Earlier this year, Jersey granted recognition for civil partnerships, including those entered into elsewhere.

In order to legally end a civil partnership, the couple must have been in it for at least 3 years. In the UK this period is only 1 year, but in Jersey, the period is longer as it mirrors the same requirement for married couples.

Demonstrating a 'ground' for dissolution of the partnership is also similar to the requirements for married couples but more difficult, is the question as to whether on dissolution, the parties to the civil partnership will have the same rights as a married couple when it comes to dividing the finances of the relationship.

In the first UK Court of Appeal decision on the subject of financial provision, a landmark case in England (Lawrence v Gallagher, March 2012), offers some guidance.

The court acknowledged that this case involving an actor and a wealthy financial analyst was a legal first, and made clear that the same principles should apply as to heterosexual divorce, with civil partners given 'identical' rights to husbands and wives in a similar situation.

The dispute between the couple, who had been together for 11 years although their civil partnership lasted just 7 months, hinged on the fact that Mr Lawrence owned a flat in London before the couple met. Lord Justice Thorpe said "This is said to be the first substantial appeal concerning financial orders made following the dissolution of a civil partnership" and "The fact that the claim arises from the dissolution of a civil partnership rather than from a marriage is of little moment since it is common ground that the language of ... the Civil Partnership Act 2004 is identical to the language of the ... Matrimonial Causes Act 1973."

It is likely that these principles will be followed in a court in Jersey as our laws relating to marriage and civil partnerships are also identical just as in England. This case therefore does provide a useful basis on which to advise any civil partners on their rights upon dissolution of their partnership. However, as in England, courts in Jersey have a great deal of discretion when deciding these cases. Indeed following the decision, the lawyer for Mr Gallagher stated that he did not think that his client had necessarily received the same financial award that might have been awarded in a case involving marriage.

Gay marriage is yet again in the headlines with the UK government defending plans to change the status of civil ceremonies in England and Wales. By law, civil partners must be treated the same as married couples, but the debate will continue as to whether true parity exists. It will be interesting to see how long it will be before similar cases come before the court in Jersey and what principles are then applied.



ife in the capital city of Nigeria is a far cry from the peaceful parish of Trinity where 28-year-old Forensic Psychology graduate, Samantha Power, grew up. For a start Abuja is hot, very hot - the last dry season brought temperatures of 43°C plus - it's also extremely crowded too. With the country's population capping 170 million, Nigeria is not only the most populous country in Africa, but for this ethnicity at least, it ranks even top in the world.

Yet it is also a place where the former States of Jersey Scrutiny Officer has adapted surprisingly well. "Nigeria makes me feel alive", she confesses, "no matter where you go there is laughter and music and noise ... and always something going on. I miss that when I'm not here."

A rather sobering fact, however, is that more than 3 million people in Nigeria are living with HIV/AIDS and this is where Samantha's work as a volunteer comes in. Her skill-sharing placement with Voluntary Service Overseas involves training locals working in a youth and reproductive health charity so that they can continue the work when she leaves. Sam says she genuinely loves her role as a monitoring and evaluation adviser - particularly as it offers variety as well as frequent opportunities to visit the charity's offices spread throughout the country.

"No two days are the same", she concedes, "from running training courses, to working in communities to collect data, data analysis, writing various reports and publications to help showcase the organisation's work - it's incredibly varied". She adds that an international health journal has just published one of their articles and that some of the charity's research has recently been submitted to a sexual and reproductive health conference in Namibia.

Sam was also present at the roll-out in Abuja of the United Nations' ground-breaking strategy "CrowdOutAIDS", in which her organisation played a part. It's an innovative approach using social media tools and "crowdsourcing" technology to engage young people on AIDS issues and is rapidly gathering momentum worldwide.

It's not all work though, and Sam has had plenty of time to acclimatise and make the most of her life in Nigeria. She recently took a trip to the scenic mountain resort of Obudu near the Cameroon border, which she says is absolutely beautiful, and certainly much cooler than Abuja.

Back in Abuja, there are frequent power cuts and water shortages which are part of everyday life in Nigeria. She has learned to manage without modern appliances such as a washing machine and vacuum cleaner and to adapt to living off the modest VSO allowance. As a special treat, she and her roommate pour a glass or two of the uniquely-flavoured Nigerian "Sangria", which comes in a box.

Now in the steamy wet season in Abuja it has "cooled down" to around 30C in the daytime (with a balmy 23C at night), so Sam is able to go out running again to keep herself fit. In the blistering dry season, she found the only way to cool off was to submerge herself totally in the local swimming pool.

Being vegetarian has also presented its own set of issues – a bowl of "vegetable" soup ordered confidently on her first night in Nigeria transpired to contain fish, cow skin and even a few bones! She has subsequently discovered a fondness for yams and is hoping to introduce the crop to her native Jersey. She remains nostalgic, however, for cheese, chocolate, and real rosé wine – items we take for granted here.

Not only has she had to be creative in sourcing food for herself, but Sam has also taken on a pet. Her love for animals meant she simply couldn't turn away from a tiny kitten abandoned in the street. "I did a VSO no-no and adopted a cat!" she admits, "I've recently been spending a lot of time at the vet trying to get everything put in place for her to come home with me, whenever that might be. Nigeria certainly isn't the easiest country in the world to own a pet just trying to find cat food is a nightmare."

Naturally, Sam misses her Jersey family and friends dearly and she has returned to the Island a couple of times in the interim, relishing the fresh air and beautiful beaches ... as well as the opportunity for shopping for "fixed-price" items, rather than having to haggle for everything. She says that on her last trip home she forgot where she was and tried haggling for the taxi fare, much to the confusion of the driver!

Of Nigeria, she says, "This has been the most amazing experience. I've made friends for life and I really like the country. I love my placement here and feel exceptionally lucky to have had the opportunity to do it – but there are limits to how many birthdays, Christmases, and other special occasions that I can miss back home..."



STITCH UP

Ulie de Gruchy East originally trained as textile designer at Winchester College of Art, specialising in print. Since then she has worked in numerous disciplines from illustration to sculpture and create diverse, themed pieces. She's recently moved to Gloucestershire and now lives in the beautiful town of Winchcombe. She send us some of her work to show us what she's been up to.

She tells us; "Being in a new environment has completely inspired me to capture the true essence of this working town. The folk here are lovely, extremely interesting, hard working and friendly. They remind me of the people back at the place I still call 'home' – 'the rock''. Being from St. Mary, Julie was used to 'a real community full of warm and friendly people'. For the last 6 months her work has focused on local tradesmen and classical portraiture on traditional materials as shown in the series above.. She machines and hand stitches her pieces with a faithful old retro sewing machine (borrowed from her Mum at the start of my University days, years later still not yet returned!). Her machine 'simply goes back and forth enabling me to create unique characteristics, much like the characters and content of my portraits'. Julie is now known as 'The Blanket Lady', a title she quite likes, due to her work being talked about around the town and constant requests to locals for their old blankets.

Julie is also developing a second, very different style of work running in parallel. Her second area is constantly developing and has formed a group of 'anthropomorphic' characters that have been adopted by admirers. These creations indulge a very playful, 'youthful' side. They are usually based on the people Julie sees; how they dress, their interests and the way they stylise themselves; 'I love to people watch and figure out what animal they would become in this strange 'anthropomorphic kingdom' of mine. I'm a squirrel'.

KEEPING UP WITH THE JONESES

LOCAL AND SUSTAINABLE were once the hallowed terms of a fastidiously conscientious foodie avant-garde; they are now the buzzwords of a more etiolated tranche of diners. The vast majority of us finally succumbed to a faint sense of debt to, and belief in, the integrity of eating local. At the forefront of this muddled epicurean consciousness is the knowledge that, in some way, a commitment to local provenance is the vital antidote to the homogenizing effects of supermarkets and cheap chain restaurants. I met with Dominic Jones, one of four brothers that together run the Jersey Pottery group, and their executive chef Tony Morris to discover that, fortunately, they are at the sharp end of it all.

Jersey Pottery has long enjoyed an iconic status with tourists and locals alike, representing all the best Jersey has to offer: from the cream teas that enraptured my German grandmother twenty years ago, to a contemporary quest to offer islanders top quality local produce at humane prices. These days the Jersey Pottery group operates 19 sites island-wide, including The Oyster Box, The Crab Shack and the Pottery

cafes alongside an outside catering branch, at the same time serving nine of the Island's schools. These branches unite to form an eclectic enterprise bound by an ethos of honesty and an unwavering commitment to all things local.

Overlooking Gorey castle, at their Castle Green restaurant, I was privy to taste the commotion. With a tray of local vegetables, Executive Chef Tony Morris retired to the kitchen, returning three times over the next twenty minutes. Each time proffering a dish that blazed with locality. Significantly, this was not a unique exhibition. Each dish could be traced to the specials board: this food was a wonderful response to season and availability, making it a reflection and celebration of the local environment. First was Mackerel and hand-dived scallops, poised between sweet local tomatoes, Jersey Royals, courgette and spinach with garlic butter. Each ingredient sang, as did all that followed: Jersey Bass with sweet local asparagus, royals, green beans and shellfish cream; delicate Chancre Crab Cakes with roast red pepper dressing and herby salad. Finally, Jersey Lily jelly with summer berries. Relishing the zenith of the summer growing season, these simple dishes epitomized the best of local food;

they were utter champions of soil and sea.

Dominic eagerly traced each ingredient to a web of local suppliers, stressing a buying ethos that wherever possible seeks to support local growers, fisherman and farmers. Whether it's the line caught bass from the Fresh Fish Company, the tomatoes from 3 Oak Vineries or their very own rare breed Manor Farm reared pigs; this is an enterprise emphatically committed to local produce. Their support doesn't end there; through a network of contacts in London the Pottery group are actively promoting Jersey produce on the mainland. And why not, as Dominic confessed, for it is a true pleasure to offer quality local food to lots of people.

Dominic and Tony spearhead a team that convinces of the Pottery group's staunch commitment to quality and transparency when it comes to local food. The quaint logistics of nine people tasting a single ice cream reassuringly conveys the personality that guides their business. Where this might not be entirely shrewd, it preserves an attitude toward their product that they believe benefits both them and the Island in the long term. Attempting to extend quality, local food to large numbers is an

enormous challenge. Catering, as any other industry, must evolve and develop to stay afloat and compete with mass produced but inferior products. The delicate balance of commercial savvy and a genuine passion for food is something extremely rare; they certainly come close. Indeed, the Pottery group's next venture, Banjo's, promises to be an exciting, urban, cosmopolitan and energetic endeavor that will pay homage to a British food heritage that cherished the drama of eating out. Jersey Pottery recognizes that food is theatre: it can be instructive, entertaining, satisfying, and is above all, absolutely necessary. What was offered me today seems to perfectly suit the temperate condition of our windward Isle. In raising the profile of local food you also raise the profile and the joy of eating. Consequently, the company that shells out 40,000 oysters a year is constantly looking for the perfect alchemy of local product, service and value. The Pottery group is grasping at a shared experience of the Island, and in doing so rather importantly entrenches a distinctly local identity onto their plates.

EAT YOUR WAY

AROUND OUR ISLAND

ne of the things Jersey does extremely well is restaurants, and especially restaurants in beautiful locations. There are few places in the world where you have so many opportunities to eat risotto whilst staring at a castle, digest lobster metres from the breaking waves or tuck into a cheeseburger whilst avoiding eye contact with a meadow full of bemused cows.

We also do ambiance, despite the best attempts of the architectural sadists who designed St Helier. No trip to the Island is complete without the chance to soak up the Bergerac/Hungerford aura of St Aubin's, the refined elegance of luxury hotel dining at Ocean or the pirate village charm of Gorey harbour. We are also well on our way to having more gastropubs per square mile than North London, but when a man is tired of creme brûlée, he is tired of life.

Most visitors won't find the time to enjoy all of our restaurants in one trip, but one of the pleasures of living here is that there are so many places to enjoy great food in an unusual setting. Some of them are posh hotels, some of them are non-nonsense greasy spoons, and many more are just picnic spots that offer the ideal opportunity to devour sandwiches and scotch eggs before the ants carry them away. The thing they all have in common is the memorable combination of good food in a great location. Well, that and the seagulls.

As a professional glutton, Gallery doesn't have enough space to list all the places I like to stuff my face, so make sure you pick up a copy of Appetite, our companion guide to eating out around the Island. To get you started, here's a quick guide to the reasons I've been having to undo my top button in the last month.

SEASIDE SPICE

If you're hungry, you can do a lot worse than just turning up at Gorey village and following your nose. They've got a new branch of Danny's serving his signature fusion cuisine, the ever-popular Suma's, a great selection of informal pub and hotel restaurants, as well as the Castle Green perched high above it all.

My new Eastern favourite is Sudu's Spice House on Gorey Pier, where Friday and Saturday nights see the Cafe Du Port transform into a venue to enjoy delicious home-style Sri Lankan food. It's lighter and, dare I say it, healthier than the typical Indian and Bangladeshi menus that have made me the chubby man I am today, which consequently results in me eating twice as much.

The trend of seaside cafes opening late and switching up their menus is one I feel the Island could do with more of - St John is much improved by Bonne Nuit Beach Cafe's weekend Thai menu, and St Ouen is a better place since El Tico rose from the rubble a few years back and started serving after dark. If only The Hungry Man was open 24 hours and sold burritos, I could just live in one of those huts and not leave Rozel until they carry me away on a taco stretcher covered in grated cheese and guacamole.

COLOMBERIE: PASSPORT TO INTERNATIONAL GLUTTONY

If I was lucky enough to have three stomachs, I've often thought how wonderful it would be to eat my way down Colomberie, and by extension around the world. This unassuming strip of town crams in two of my favourite Thai restaurants, great Italian and Portuguese food, a traditional tea shop, a Polish delicatessen for my pierogi fix and more cafes than you can shake a cinnamon stick at. The most recent arrival is a Transylvanian delicatessen, which sprung up overnight after a powerful storm caused a mysterious freighter to dock at our

harbour one evening. During regular hours, the owner assumes human form to tempt mortals with a fine selection of baguettes containing the smoked meat and cheeses of his bat-infested homeland, not to mention the unmissable 'chimney cake' - a sort of sugary kebab, if you can imagine such a thing. It's bloody marvellous, if you'll excuse the pun.

BURGER ME

Of course, it's not all fancy food in this Island of ours. What latte and sandwiches are to our capital, ice cream and burger fans are to Jersey's countryside. Chances are, if you can park your car and enjoy a view in Jersey, you can buy hot meat and a can of coke. You might have to fight off a mob of seagulls, but that's just a sign of how tasty the grub is, and who can fault a hungry bird from wanting to nourish its young with such fine food?

For starters, I recommend you get your burger on at Bouley Bay, the Line Up on the five mile road, or sample the outstanding home-made sausages by the entrance to Noirmont point. Both Le Hocq and La Rocque cafes have plenty of fans, and grease loving insomniacs can eat at the harbour cafe at the La Colette docks from the crack of dawn. The cycle path from town to St Aubins also has a decent cafe almost every hundred metres, so make sure your evening fitness ride is accompanied by the odd bacon cheeseburger, just to keep your spirits up.

Bon appetit, mes amis. Enjoy our Island, enjoy your food, and I'll see you at Weight Watchers.

CALLING ALL PYRO-GOURMANIACS!

'You like HOT, or you like, HOT HOT HOT??!' Ever been to Park House Thai Restaurant in Colomberie? If you have, that question will ring in your ears – especially if you've ever been daft, or drunk enough, or simply a liar, liar pants on fire and gone for 'HOT HOT HOT'.

Fact is, some like it hot. Some like it so effin' hot that chilli, Tabasco, Piri-Piri and the likes, are common, like seasoning.. Whereas most people opt for the ordinary duo on the table, for others, pepper just won't cut the mustard.

Gallery went on a quest to find out more about the fiery little vegetable known as the chilli and how come more and more of us are liking a bit of a kick in our food. There's no shortage of Chinese, Indian and Thai restaurants in Jersey... A bit of Japanese and now a recently opened Sri Lankan restaurant on the Island, there are plenty of hot dishes out there for any pyro-gourmaniac to indulge in. Plenty of fusion restaurants are adopting a selection of hot culinary delights into their menus too... It seems a lot like it hot.

Chillies represent the majority in terms of hot ingredients. The heat in chillies is measured in Scoville Heat Units (SHUs)... The common green jalapeño pepper, for instance, measures in at 2500-3000 SHUs whereas Tabasco hits 30,000. It's the Capsaicin levels that decide the heat factor: the higher the Capsaicin levels, the hotter the chilli. Size and colour is of no consequence when trying to determine the intensity of heat or flavour. I would say though, that more recently, hybrid and modified freak chillies - the mega hot ones, all have aliases that give you the idea that it's a 'blow your backside off', type of hot - like a porn name for a chilli... For instance, the Chocolate Habanero, or 'Congo Black' as it's otherwise known, another is the infamous Naga Bhut Jolokia or 'Ghost Chilli'. Or how about the record breaking, world's hottest, 'Trinidad Scorpion Butch Taylor', which made headlines in April 2011 when laboratory tests measured its heat at 1,463,700 SHUs... That little bugger sounds deadly hot.

Check out some of the YouTube videos of self-proclaimed 'dicks' who take up the 'Ghost Chilli Challenge'.. We do not recommend trying it at home. That particular chilli has recently been used to make grenades in India, replacing the usual explosives – it is equally as effective and better for the environment. Boom. There are a few local pyro-gourmaniacs out there who make powders and oils from the notorious Ghost Chilli. One of the powders I saw was labelled simply, 'DANGER', with the small print reading, 'Red-hot chilli powder. Do not allow contact with the skin. Do not inhale. Do not get in eyes. If handled do not play with yourself or anyone else for 6 hours.'



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

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

I want to get on the property ladder **but where do I start?**

Collas Crill's 'Queen of Apartments' Sharon Therin gives her top tips...

1 Visit your bank's mortgage team or mortgage broker to find out how much you can borrow;

it is generally five times your own, or your joint, salary. Beware: any outstanding debts could affect the amount you can borrow.

2 You now know what you can borrow and the fun begins - viewing properties!

Make a list of your priorities, for instance parking, private garden, the potential to extend. As a first time buyer you are in a strong position to strike a deal with a seller. Don't be afraid to make an offer at less than the asking price. They can only say no!

3 So you have found the property you want to buy.

You need to go back to your bank to make a formal application to borrow. The bank might have already said it would lend what you need but be aware their agreement is made subject to receiving a satisfactory survey on the property, which confirms that it is worth what you have agreed to pay. You pay the bank for this report, but it is undertaken for their benefit and does not look closely at the structure of the building. Therefore if you are buying an older property you might wish to get a more detailed survey. Bear in mind that the more detail in the survey, the more it will cost.

4 How do I find out what the legal fees will be?

Your estate agent will undoubtedly recommend some firms for you to call and get a quote for legal services. Friends and relatives may recommend their own lawyers. Do shop around and don't be afraid to ask what you are getting for your money. This is the biggest investment you are likely to make - the cheapest quote may not always be the best.

5 How do I make the best use of my legal adviser?

Within your first year of service you will also undertake a 9 day breathing apparatus course as well as the training required to obtain an LGV licence as mentioned above.

Whilst most employers are more than happy to allow their staff to be in a position to respond with no notice from time to time, it is important to ensure that your employer would be willing to release you when necessary should your application be successful.



FIRST DOCUMENTED IN JULY 2010 BY ROBERT BRADY IN CALIFORNIA, TARP SURFING IS A PURSUIT THAT CULTURALLY UNIFORMS SEVERAL LOVES OF THE CASUAL INTERNET VIEWER; SLOW MOTION FOOTAGE OF SKATEBOARDS, RELAXED SUMMER VIBE, AND A DIY INGENUITY FOR CREATING FUN.

This activity has been picked up and tried out by thousands of landlocked surfers (or those without swell) since becoming a viral hit online. So How do you tarp surf?

When there's little wind, lay out the tarp, weight down one side, grab one of the other corners and run towards and across the weighed down side. This makes the tarp billow up like a standing wave and gives something the tarp-surfer something to 'ride' through. The actual timing of when to start to running and when to start skating through is something that comes after a few tries and leads to a number of hilarious bails (especially if the tarp happens to be wet). Add a skateboard or indeed and device with wheels and Hey Presto, your a Tarp Surfer!

The 'surfing' part really comes alive once you start filming it. You have to picture the tarp-wave as if it was an actual wave and how it would be film as if in the water - this leads to footage that temporarily fools the eye into thinking the tarp is actually moving with force.

Our friends at The Observatory had been wanting to try out this activity for a while, but had never really had an excuse to do so, until **The Collections Group** asked them to look out for something special to announce

the opening of their new Quiksilver store in Queen Street. This married with the fact that there had been absolutely no waves for 8 weeks made for a no-brainer for the video making crew. The tarp surfing event at the drop of a hat and we at Gallery even got involved in creating some waves.

Within 24 hours the video was online a makingwaves. After putting together a quick edit of just the tarp surfing, we quickly realised that this had the potential to do incredibly well online by itself. A day after it being online it was picked up as a Vimeo Staff pick (followed by 73,200 subscribers) it was quickly featured on many other websites / feeds and blogs leading to the amazing stats and to the global reach of countries that have viewed it. So many businesses develop online promotions and seek a 'viral' campaign success. The tarp surfing project shows that a bit of creativity is what you need to truly elevate a campaign online,

Feel like you need to escape but know that if you're not back at your desk tomorrow morning your manager will be hunting you down with the ferocity of a pack of wild dogs? Gazing out to sea from your favourite beach after work not quite cutting it?

Jersey Seafaris is a brand new business run by local guy Richard Stevens, an experienced boatman with a love of the coastline and waters around our island who, in conjunction with local expert and marine biologist Gareth Jeffreys have formed the perfect team to take people away exploring anything and everything from sea and bird life to even the smallest of our Channel Islands. Or to France for lunch or dinner, if that's more your kind of thing.

Whether a short blast around the coastlands, a half an hour tour to Corbiere with complimentary drinks, a two or three hour trip to the Minquiers to the south or Ecrehous to the north east, an evening trip to the French island of Chausey or the French mainland for dinner or a whole day out exploring, they're able to cater for it all so don't be scared to ask. Why spend time queueing and checking in for the ferry when you could be sitting in a French restaurant enjoying your meal and a glass or two of wine less than an hour from when you finish work? Their boat seats up to 12, so there's plenty of room for a friend or eleven to tag along.

Setting off from either the Albert Pier, St Catherines or St Brelade's Bay depending on tides and intended destinations, we travelled from the Albert Pier out to the islets of the Minquiers - a mere 25 minute ride south of Jersey when you're in a 400hp RIB! If you're after an exhilarating, edging toward white knuckle ride I'm sure Richard and Gareth would be willing to endulge, but on the other hand if a more sedate ride works better for you that can be catered for too. They're nice like that

It almost goes without saying that safety is of the utmost importance and not only is Richard's seamanship second to none but all passengers are provided with compulsory lifejackets and offered nice warm, waterproof sailing jackets if they don't have their own so that any potential cold wind or water splashes don't dampen your spirits. That's another part of the joy of a trip with these guys - you don't even have to be particularly prepared for the potential rigours sea, they've got that covered for you.

A pleasantly warm day, we were surprised to see a Royal Navy vessel steaming past operating just out of St Helier before Jersey had passed over the horizon in the distance which is something you wouldn't usually notice let alone have the opportunity to see so closely. Within moments we were slowing to arrive at our first stop of the morning, a sandbank that forms part of the Minquiers only accessible when the tide is low enough. Twenty minutes of exploration upon this

fast disappearing spit of sand later we were boarding the boat once again to make the move onto more solid ground over on the main island that forms the southern most point of the British Isles, and believe it or not, part of Grouville! On the short journey to land alongside the pier we spotted a pair of grey seals playing before making our way to have a look at the small houses and outbuildings and even a helipad that seemed quite popular with the Greater Black Backed Gulls protecting their nests. Gareth was very clear to indicate and make sure that nobody interfered with any of their habitat and also that nobody was hurt as a result. These gulls are huge, but soon quietened down when they realised we meant no harm.

Returning home a couple of hours after our departure we passed by the seals from before and even spotted a pair of dolphins, a frequent (although not guaranteed) sight out there. The sandbank that we had once walked on was now but a barely visible submerged patch of contrasting water and closer to St Helier Richard even gave us a quick demonstration fo the boat's handling capabilities which was an exciting end to the morning. We were back in time for lunch, but couldn't help thinking that taking a picnic to enjoy whilst we were out there seemed like a missed opportunity so learn from our mistakes and pack something to enjoy!

ST LAWRENCE CHARITY HORSE SHOW

IIIMPING FOR INY – RECORD IIIMP PRIZE MONEY FOR IFRSEY!

his year's St Lawrence Charity Horse Show will once again be held at Tamarind Showground, St Peter, over the weekend of 3rd to 5th August. Generous sponsorship from many local businesses and individuals - including our Principal Sponsor, local investment management firm Spearpoint Limited - has allowed the organisers to put up a Channel Island record jumping prize of £500 for the Diamond Jubilee Senior Masters.

That jumping class will be held on the second day of the Show, Saturday 4 August. The first round will be a qualifier with the top 8 competitors going through to the next round. Each round is then drawn and the first competitor back in the ring must elect to raise a fence by one hole. With a starting height of 1.10m-1.15m and the potential to go much higher, this class will attract the more experienced competitors and promises to create considerable excitement, with riders drawing on their own strengths and letting their competitors fend for themselves!

Younger riders been forgotten either! The Snyman Family have kindly sponsored the Diamond Jubilee Open Pony Jumping, which will take place on the first day of the Show, Friday 3 August. This will be a two-round competition with fences set at a starting height of approximately 1.0m. With a top prize of £100, plus £75 for 2nd, £50 for 3rd, £25 for 4th and £12 for 5th place, this class will also attract a large entry and be exciting to watch as the young riders show off their skills in the jump-off by taking the tightest turns to give them the best time and possible victory.

In the Showing Section of the Show, a prize of £100 will be presented to the winner of the Diamond Jubilee Ridden Supreme Championship. Other popular classes at the Show will be the Ladies' and Gents' Championships with a top prize of £75 for each class, and the Senior Puissance with a top prize of £50.

The 3-day Show on August 3, 4 and 5 consists of over 70 classes and is run by a loyal band of volunteers who spend many months organising the showing and jumping events as well as the interisland-UK team jumping competitions. The organisers are most grateful to the many individuals and organizations who sponsor classes. The funds raised from the Show in excess of current requirements, are distributed to purely LOCAL Jersey charities, in time for Christmas and New Year. For the year 2011, donations were made to 17 local charities.

Of the many Jersey Parishes which ran horse shows in the past, St Lawrence Charity Horse Show is now the only Parish Horse Show to have survived. Its 50th Anniversary was celebrated in 2005. Formed in 1955 by Members of the Municipality of St Lawrence



and some equine enthusiasts of the Parish, the first meeting of interested parties was held on the forecourt of Three Oaks Garage in St Lawrence, and as a result the St Lawrence Horse Show and Gymkhana Club was born.

The first show was held in July 1956 at Biles Field, First Tower (now Clos St. Andre). Two years later the show moved to St Andrews Park where for many years the Show and evening fête was a very popular event drawing large crowds. From the start the intention was to make donations to charity out of funds raised; the first donation being made to a cancer charity.

After some years with an ever-increasing number of entries, a larger showground was needed to enable the Show to have space to accommodate two arenas, working-in areas, marquees as well as parking for the cars and horseboxes, so St Lawrence Horse Show has moved to various locations over the years. Since 1986, by kind permission of Mr and Mrs Andrew Tait, the St Lawrence Charity Horse Show (as it is now known) has been held at Tamarind, St Peter, which offers a large natural showground in a country setting. The 3-day Show consists of showing and show jumping classes for both adults and juniors, as well as inter-island and UK team jumping. Since 2011 an annual Heights Jumping Competition has also been held.

The organisers aim to provide good competition for the horse and pony world which will be enjoyed not only by riders and enthusiasts, but also a show which local people and holidaymakers alike will enjoy as spectators. As usual, there will be a variety of stands and kiosks, as well as canteen and refreshment tents. Entry to the showground at Tamarind, St Peter on 3-5 August is FREE to all spectators.

CHEAP, TOPLESS AND LIVELY

Sounds like someone you'd find on a Balearic island, don't you think? I'm not talking about that though, this is an article about convertible cars.

Originally considering the Peugeot 205 CTi, the definitive Gallic answer to roof-down hot hatching, I was shocked at just how expensive they are these days, probably because most of their constituent parts will have fallen off and required replacing by now. Around seven grand for a decent example, just in case you were curious.

The truly bargain basement yet still credible alternative? A BMW Z3 Roadster, of course! £1,750 is all it would take to pick up an example of the entry level 1.9i Z3, which I'd say is a decent wedge of Bavarian bang for your buck. Okay, so a 2.8 litre one is going to set you back around another grand but that's still relatively small change for a reliable, rear-steer roadster.

As much as it pains me to admit it, Mazda's MX-5 is probably the better car handling and performance wise, but when it comes to securing the maximum amount of motoring kudos for the minimum amount of pennies you can't go too far wrong with anything that proudly wears a blue and white propeller on its bonnet.

A SURE-FIRE STUTTGART STEAL

As long as you can steer yourself away from the stigma of Porsche's Boxster being a steed for stylists you can have a slice of German pie for mere pennies.

The earlier 2.5 litre Boxters have started going for under three grand in the UK (yes, the big island where people travel enough miles to weed out the niggles and fix everything that is likely to break then don't ask the original purchase price for their second hand motor) but a less problem prone 2.7 litre can be had for around four thousand pounds these days.

The chassis on these puppies from Porsche are absolutely brilliant and at but a tenth of the original sale price you can't go too wrong with a Boxster if you're looking for convertible fun with a little class.

The alternatives? Don't get me wrong, I'm a big fan of Audis with their stunning contemporary looks but they just tend to be a bit wooly and soulless sometimes. Why have a TT with its front wheel drive configuration and a puny 1.8 litre motor (a very solid, turbocharged 20 valve motor no less, but still) when you can have a mighty 2.7 litre flat six howling behind your head putting power down through the back axle?

GRANDEUR FOR UNDER 20 GRAND?

A fellow petrolhead of mine was almost driven to backhanding me across my boat race at Le Mans when I told him the going rate for a DB7 last month.

That somebody should have to consider violence for the sheer cheek of saying that an early supercharged six DB7 Volante can be secured for under £20,000 has got to mean something, and that something is that anything bearing the Aston Martin bewinged badging oozes such class, sophistication and exclusivity that it must cost a small fortune to own. Except when it's based on a Jag and made out of steel, it seems, so keep that under your flat cap.

Still, I'd be tempted at that kind of money and have caught myself looking at them many a time, I just haven't quite reached the age where I'm dependent upon a pipe with which to inhale the finest shag through and slippers with which to shuffle to my trusty Stannah in yet.

For only a few thousand of your English pounds more, the six litre V12 Vantage and Volante DB7s are within reach, and only an utter peasant would be caught wafting around in the supercharged 3.2 litre six over the mighty V12, daaaahling.

Another year, another session of Eurosport highlights to watch so that I'm capable of holding even the briefest hint of a conversation when asked 'So, how was Le Mans?' upon returning, a hung-over, bruised and broken shell of my former self.

Amusingly, I even managed to meet a group from the UK this year who departed with the sole intention of ensuring that one of their complement remained so incredibly intoxicated that he would miss the entire race. Four hours in when we met, they were certainly in pole position, the stickers as part of the Le Mans livery on their Ferraris and Lamborghinis bearing an illustration of a noble knight slaying onions and cheese whilst a bikini clad blonde bearing a bottle of Kronenbourg for a head waved a chequered flag above the words 'Race..? What Race?'. That's the spirit! Vodka, to be precise.

Is that not as pointless as those who go to Glastonbury to get messed up on a cocktail of allsorts only to miss all of the bands? Probably, but there seems to be a black cloud casting its shadow over the once vibrant spirit of the 24 heures du Mans at La Sarthe in any case.

Audi's seeming ownership of the event, from their incredible press area to what feels like 90% of the overhead track advertising and sponsorship of the 'Audi Hourly Update' on Le Mans FM as well as the phenomenal amount of pre-race PR focing its way into our eyes and ears coupled with their absolute dominance of the event has started to get old. Even the safety cars are Audis. An exclusively Audi-based podium and all of their R18s, both e-tron and 'ultra', finishing in the top 5. Yawn. Toyota's entry (the LMP1 underdog no less, would you believe) taken out by a Ferrari (a regular occurence now it seems after Ferrari drivers almost thwarted Audi's clean sheet of victories last year), it was all left to Rebellion Racing's Toyota-engined Lola to fight for fourth place. Of course, I knew little of this at the time, sliding into a drunken coma ashamedly soon after midnight having heard that Oak Racing's Morgan-Judd in the LMP2 class, my chosen team to support this year, were forced to drop out having lead the class and reached 7th overall. Game over, for both them and me it seemed.

Audi just seem to make winning look too easy, so easy in fact that the black cloud of apathy I mentioned has formed, but if you step back from the Ingolstadt manufacturer's advertising and merchandising that blinds you everywhere you go at La Sarthe it's not too hard to summon up sunny weather. The technology that they've either used or developed; full-carbon gearboxes, the e-tron 'flybrid' KERS system, full LED headlamps, a single piece monocoque chassis and highperformance diesel engines will almost certainly end up in their road cars - look at the SQ5, for example, the first S-badged Audi sporting a diesel engine and one that can deliver 30mpg whilst also packing a gargantuan 650Nm of torque. In my eyes, using such a prestiguous and highly revered motorsport event as a testbed for emerging automotive technology is nothing short of heroic. As Roman Dumas emerged from his crash-stricken R18 to rip off body panels and limp back to the pitlane (rules state that if a driver can singlehandedly return their car to their garage to be fixed they don't have to retire) it seemed all too easy to overlook his passion, the spirit of Le Mans, and not to care simply because it was an Audi.

It's almost a shame they're so typically efficient and German, just so damned good at what they do that they just make it look woefully easy.

Making your photos stand out from the crowd can be tough for the enthusiastic amateur, and with the easy to use post-processing capabilities offered by Instagram, Camera+ and the like all on your iPhone (other mobile telephones are available, incidentally) it may have never been easier.

Now though, there's the Lytro Lightfield camera too. Compact and with the appearance of a tiny, cubic kaleidoscope, it has an extremely clever trick up it's, er, tube.

Capturing the entire light field that enters the lens as opposed to just a single plane, the images produced allow you alter the focus after having taken the shot using clever software on your Mac. Sorry Windows users, they're still working on software for you guys.

With no auto-focus, no shutter lag and no complicated modes to play with and no flash (it's got an f2 aperture so is able to collect a phenomenal amount of light) the only thing you'll need to adjust is the 8x optical zoom and the direction you're pointing it in. This means capturing the moment you're looking for instantly and with no fuss or need to fiddle about. The rear screen is an interactive touch screen as you'd expect from technology these days and there's just one button on the entire device, cleverly positioned right where the camera's centre of gravity lies to give a perfectly balanced feel in your hand.

IT'S BOXY, BUT GOOD MEET THE SOMEWHAT ODD-LOOKING BOXX BIKE

It looks a bit like the illegitimate child of an old PowerMac and a white MacBook, but the Boxx is actually an electric bicycle. No pedals, just battery power and a mere metre long it boasts features such as a heated seat for those wintertime journeys as well as twin headlamps up front.

Also boasting that their creation is 'O MPG economical' (which at first sounds absolutely terrible for the environment, suggesting it couldn't even travel one mile on a gallon of fuel until you realise that it technically couldn't in any case as there's no fuel involved) they're available in a host of different colours from stealthy black, grey and white to the vibrant pinks, reds, yellows and greens and take just an hour's charging to transport you 80 miles if you go for the 'upgrade' specification. Power travels to both the front and rear wheels for extra traction and charging comes courtesy of a standard power outlet, although I'm guessing this means 110v as the Boxx is currently only available in the US.

You'll need a moped license to ride one on the street, mind, and whilst the Boxx is capable of travelling at a governed 35mph maximum, although I'm sure that with a little hacking this limiter could be raised slightly.

At \$3995 the Boxx isn't cheap, but it's definitely quirky as far as alternative transport solutions go.

We caught up with Tre to find out more about this classy trio.

Who are Tre?

How did you all come together?

We first met singing in the Musical Originals choir quite a few years ago, decided to enter the Eisteddfod two years ago as a trio (we won the small groups trophy for the last two years) and were then booked to perform for the W.I. annual lunch by the chairwoman who saw us at the Eisteddfod. More bookings followed and we haven't stopped since.

How would you define your musical style?

Our musical style varies, depending on our audience. We would call ourselves a classical singing trio combined with a dash of pop, a large glug of folk, topping of jazz and just a hint of rock. Bit of a cocktail really.

Who or what inspires you girls musically?

Who is your favourite local artist?

Grace:- Frankie Davies who used to go to my school, Beaulieu and who writes all her own material and Kevin Pallot.


Liberty:- I've recently heard Jordan Burrows playing and thought he was fantastic but I do love Nerina Pallot.

This month, we thought we'd introduce you to the brains behind one of the Island's premier DJ collaborations and music producers: Vanguard. Vanguard Audio has been making some serious noise both locally and off Island – so here's a little word from them on who they are and what they're up to... If you like Drum and Base, you'll LOVE Vanguard.

What is Vanguard?

Vanguard is a new concept from production and DJ outfit Terminal State, it was launched just over one year ago as a monthly club night representing the real happenings on the Drum and Bass scene, alongside the club night we have our record label Vanguard Audio which is now on its 3rd release and already the label's records have been supported heavily by the top DJ's and Radio stations.

Growing up, who or what inspired you musically?

I was first properly inspired musically in the early 90's when the hardcore/rave scene came about and then around 94' Jungle music started blowing up and from aged around 16 I would travel to some of the biggest raves such as Dreamscape, Helter Skelter, World Dance etc and this just reaffirmed to me that a huge movement was born which would never go away, I was hooked!!

Which new local artists have caught your eye recently?

DnB wise you've got to be checking out Night-Shift, Pranksta and Archetype and the extremely talented MC Wildee, all these guys can be found at out monthly Vanguard nights. We have also been recording with a couple great artists recently, we did a track with rapper UG Cameron called 'Space of the Earth' forthcoming on LifeStyle Records plus we just started recording with female vocalist Lesina which we are very excited about.

What's your favourite thing about working within music? Production or playing?

We all DJ under Terminal State which for all of us is the main reason we got involved in music, the production was just a natural progression and some studio sessions can certainly be just a rewarding as playing to a huge crowd.

5) What are your thoughts on the local music scene, is there enough balance between live acts and D.Is?

I think so yes, the main concern I have being a DJ and club promoter is the opening hours need to be extended in the clubs, at least 3am or 4am closing times. This is standard across the UK and Europe and I really thing the powers to be here need to address this, plus it would certainly ease the pressure on police, taxi firms etc with staggered closing times and not having 5,000+people put out on the streets of St. Helier at 2am.

6) Where is your favourite place to play in Jersey, or where would it be if you could choose anywhere?

Well Jersey wise it's Pure (best sound system in St. Helier) the Watersplash and of course Jersey Live, elsewhere it's got to be the Melkweg in Holland, one of the best clubs in Europe and we have been lucky enough to play there on many occasions.

7) Who is the biggest super star DJ in your humble opinion?

The DJ culture is in a very funny place at the moment, I had a good chat with Bailey when he was over and we both agreed about certain things. Global prominence and popularity of DJ's is at an all time high. DJ skill and ability required at an all time low. Unfortunately a lot of DJ's are now after the hype and the fame and forgetting the music, writing for the charts and forgetting what they are all about.

8) What's happening with Terminal States

Production wise we have records forthcoming on Soul Deep Recordings, Criminal Records, Dance Concept Records, Protect Audio and of course Vanguard Audio amongst other projects. You can catch us DJ'ing in Jersey in July at Havanna on 7th July with Danny Byrd for Chaka, 21st July at the Watersplash with London Electricity for Theology and Vanguard at Pure with Kasra on 27th July.

9) If you could remix or produce anyone, who

We have just done a collab with Jungle Drummer from London Elektricity (who you can catch at the Splash on 21st July!), which was a lot of fun and have an EP project with him and World Beatbox champ Ball-Zee on the cards. We would love to also collaboration with artists such as Break, Ed Rush, BTK and a dream collaboration maybe Adele or Chase and Status.

10) Where and when can the Jersey public catch a bit of Vanguard?

Our next night is Friday 27th July at Pure where we invite Critical Records boss Kasra over to Jersey for the first time, he recently had a Fabric LIVE CD out and we are very excited about this booking.
