Jersev eniovs a reduction in crime figures

We are constantly bombarded by horror stories from the mainland concerning the evident rise in violent crime. As election battle rage on, and Britain pushes blame into various corners of its government's domestic policy, Jersey has enjoyed crime statistics at the other end of the anti-social behaviour spectrum. Last month the Jersey Evening Post revealed that there were 1,173 recorded crimes in the first quarter of 2005 - the lowest figure for three years and six per cent down on the same period in 2004. The police cited the downward trend as evidence that their targeting of known offenders, using sophisticated intelligence is working. Special teams have been sent out 200 times in the past six months to crack down on key burglars, joyriders, shoplifters, those who receive stolen goods and lower-level drug dealers. Good on them.

Inflation rates continue to drop. Is our economy turning a corner?

The cost of living on our Island has been a bone of contention for years. Whether we dispute the price of a loaf of bread or petrol in our vehicles it often amounts to atmosphere of disgruntlement. But is our economy turning a corner? The headline rate of inflation in the 12 months to the end of March was 4.5 per cent, compared to 5.3 per cent in the 12 months to the end of December last year. However, perhaps more significantly for the local economy, the underlying rate of inflation was 2.7 per cent in the year to March 2005 - the lowest increase since the States Statistics Unit started compiling the figures in 1999. The underlying rate was 3.4 per cent in the year to the end of December. This was the seventh quarter in succession that the underlying rate - known as the RPI (X), which excludes the cost of housing - had fallen.

The seriousness of the St Peter's Quarry fire was centred around the possibility of either a big fireball or the six foot by one foot acetylene cylinder turning into a 'projectile' and flying into the air. Houses within 200 metres of the quarry were evacuated and the residents had to spend the night with friends or relatives. Assistant divisional officer Mark Johnson added, however, that high explosives used for blasting were stored some distance away and the risk of them going up was limited. He said his officers were treating the incident very seriously, as a firefighter in the UK was killed last month when a similar cylinder exploded.





drien Brody has done some harrowing work in his career. Playing a Polish Jewish musician in Roman Polanski's The Pianist gained him an Oscar but covered disturbing territory, The Summer Of Sam was similarly provoking. In his latest outing Brody takes on another tough project. Rather than a cushy paycheck rom-com set in the Florida Keys, he's taken on The Jacket where he gets to lie in a body drawer in a morgue wearing a urine-stained straitjacket. Sounds like a man worth talking to. He plays Jack Starks, a Gulf War vet who returns home after suffering a bout of amnesia caused by a gunshot wound to the head. Riddled from the traumatic effects of war, he's having trouble distinguishing reality from imagination and when committed to an institution after being accused of murdering a police officer, Starks is subjected to brutal treatment. Injected with an experimental drug, placed in a straight jacket and locked inside a body drawer in a basement morgue Starks flashes through the horrors of his own mind, possibly seeing his future and fate.

Did you do any kind of preparation for being stuck in a morgue drawer for a while?

Yeah, I grew up in New York living in an apartment. Pretty small. Well, yeah. I did. I found a sensory deprivation chamber in Glasgow. If you're not familiar with them, you lay in these tanks in this dense saline solution. You become very aware of how your mind works and how cyclical thoughts are. It's an interesting way to meditate.

How would you describe the film "The Jacket"?

It's pretty amazing to go to a movie and not be spoon-fed. I love the ambiguity of it. Just like things in life are ambiguous, and peoples' interpretations of people are ambiguous. That's actually part of what attracted me to this role was the fact that the character is not really defined by any of it. His ethnicity, his religious beliefs, where's he from. Nor does he have any allegiance to his own past which defines us. How we are raised, how we are told who we are and what we are. It's a remarkable place to be as an actor, liberating to make a character come alive without being tied down to normal character descriptions.

What kind of conditions was the set and space like?

We shot in the basement of a mental institution. It had that... certain vibe. We used gurney and medical instruments that were, well, frightening. The crew was nice in terms of how they responded to my state of mind. See, I don't even try to communicate with anyone when I'm working. I'm restrained in the jacket. I often asked to be left alone on the gurney. I'd wait in (the straitjacket) while the crew was preparing for the next shot instead of letting the crew getting me out of the jacket. No sitting around and having conversations. I don't feel that is conducive to staying in that state of mind of the character. It's important for me to stay centred. I stay in my own space. I'm kind of oblivious to what's going on while I'm filming. When we're done (shooting), it's cool. "Good night, everyone."

How many hours would you spend in that straight-jacket?

It depends. I'm sure we did days with lots of overtime. Nothing will ever be more difficult than The Pianist, because it had a six week slot with no other actors. It had a tremendous amount of pressure and it was all day with Roman Polanski, myself and the crew. You could shoot a whole movie in six weeks, in that time period. It was relentless, and Roman never liked me using a stand-in. I was there from morning to night on the set doing everything. I learned probably more than I could learn from any film making class from that experience. But it's made everything else in a way.

So "The Jacket" was a relatively easy shoot?

That is not to say it wasn't difficult. It was difficult. There were long days being [stretched-out] on a metal gurney. The environment in Glasgow was cold and damp.

Adrien, what's your favourite way to blow \$1,000?

Oh, I don't know. Um... (The publicists drag him out of the room) Goodbye!

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ew movies have made more of an impact on popular culture than the Star Wars films. Since they began in 1977 they've gone on to become a world-wide phenomenon that virtually created the summer special-effects blockbuster. If you found yourself disappointed by Episodes I and II we're willing to bet that the third in the series will represent a return to form.

The new film is the last in a series of three prequels that began in 1999 with Episode I - The Phantom Menace, was followed by Episode I I - Attack Of The Clones and is completed with Episode III - Revenge Of The Sith. In the first film Anakin was a cherubic nine year-old, and in the second he fell in love. Now in the final Episode III he succumbs to the dark side and becomes bad-ass Darth Vader.

Compared to the other Star Wars movies, Episode III is going to be "...much darker. It's much more emotional", according to director George Lucas who has called it a Faustian tragedy, "... we're going to watch him make a pact with the devil".

Although Lucas has gone on record as saying that fans that want to see "... Vader running around killing people" are set to be disappointed there are some huge set piece fights to enjoy. It immediately launches into a gigantic space battle elaborate even by Star Wars standards as Anakin (Christensen) and Obi-Wan (McGregor), lead a mission to rescue the kidnapped Palpatine, Nothing looks set to overshadow the climactic battle though which takes place in a sea of fire on a planet filled with nothing but volcanos. According to Lucas "It ends in hell" - may the force be with you indeed.

deNova Blues



f you were under the impression that the Blues was dead you're in for a surprise - daNova Blues are here to show that it's very much alive and kicking. Although the Blues grew in the sweaty hothouse of the North Mississippi Delta following the American Civil War it's spread far and wide and can be found alive and well on the rock. Influenced by African roots, field hollers, ballads, church music and rhythmic dance, it's evolved into an art-form steeped in mythology and legend.

Our foremost representatives, daNova Blues, kick off the year with a new album out this month and look set for a big year. Their line-up contains five huge talents - Giles Robson leads the way with gritty vocals and powerful harmonica, lan Tomkins and Phillip Kozlowski rock on guitar, Brian Andrade provides ample bass support and Steve Queree on drums pushes it all on. A favourite of the Jersey live music scene this long awaited album was recorded completely live in the Blue Note it includes

songs that represent the unique deNova Blues mix of Chicago Blues Shuffles, North Mississippi Boogies and emotional slow blues. Demonstrating their blend of spontaneity, intuition and luck, crucial to any successful blues album and live performance the album captures the trademark, almost telepathic ensemble playing that deNova Blues have become well known for. With the production well handled by bassist Brian Andrade and local DJ Phil Adams, it cleverly captures the raw, gritty stripped-down feel of a classic Chicago Blues Album.

You never know - the Blues may be just what you're missing from your life and now you've got two chances to check it out. To see them live and direct (and this is fully recommended), get yourself down to the Blue Note and Moody Blues. After you've heard them once you'll be singing the blues yourself if you can't get your little hands on a copy of this album.

Lullabies is aptly named, as on first listen this album will send you to sleep. It lacks the edginess of Songs For The Deaf but stay awake long enough and you will discover a more mature sounding masterpiece. The man who killed Bergerac?

ere's a common scenario. You're on holiday and start chatting to someone: "So where are you from then?" Says your well meaning new acquaintance. "Er, I'm from Jersey", (here we go). "Oh Jersey, the place with the cows and potatoes! One of my uncles went there once and they saw Bergerac's car, oh they said it was beautiful. Does he still live there? And are you a millionaire? What's your butler called? Oh, wait a minute, do come back...'

Paul Bison took this kind of conversation as one of his inspirations when writing The Spurs of Jack Langtry, a novel set on the island from the point of view of a Jersey-born narrator returning after a lengthy absence. Born in Jersey in 1976 and educated at Grainville and Hautlieu, Paul graduated from Liverpool University in 1998. After spending four years teaching English in London the idea for The Spurs of Jack Langtry came about in early 2003 after making the decision to return to Jersey later that year.

There being little to nothing in the way of modern Jersey fiction on any bookshelves, it struck Paul that it would be a truly 'novel' project. The story lines, characters, and many of the central chapters were written long before he finally arrived back on the rock and owe more to imagination than they do to any real experiences he had over here. Saying that, he confides that a certain amount of it is autobiographical. Above all the novel sets out to entertain a local audience, to give islanders the enjoyment of seeing the places they know represented in a fictional setting. It's obvious that the author is very interested in what it means to be from Jersey and he seems as eager as any to prove that there's more to our island than Bergerac, that we have a unique and separate culture worthy of wider recognition than that it currently receives.

Still in the process of seeking a mainland publisher, Paul himself financed the books hitting the shops this month through Channel Island Publishing. He finished the novel a year ago and was hesitant to see it gather dust while trying to organise a book deal. It's a bold move and a testament to how much he believes in his own work. This current edition is only available across the Channel Islands but he's got big plans. If they come to fruition the next time you meet a stranger on holiday and tell them you're from Jersey they maybe, just maybe, might not ask if you know Bergerac. Now Imagine that.



Restaurant Review

La Cala



If you're getting bored with your husband — I think I might have found the perfect solution. Take someone else's out for lunch instead. It's quite the latest thing, you don't have to put up with your own hubby's noisy chewing, and you're not in the least bit concerned when he starts checking out the young PR girls at the next table. Being a singleton myself. I've always found married men delightful company. They're so thrilled to not have the same arguments about school runs and why the nanny should be fired, that they make charming lunch dates.

Piers was a case in point, witty, well trained and an expert in this season's Chanel collection after buying most of it for his wife. Lucky woman. And he knew I'd been wanting to try out the new lunch menu at the revamped La Cala. La Cala is a swanky restaurant that thinks it's a club — or perhaps a club that thinks it's a swanky restaurant — either way, it looks good. Sleek dark wood, and chic leather give the place a rather classy contemporary look, the perfect place for an aesthete like Piers.

Centring around fresh local ingredients, the set lunch menu sounds impressive — and works out to be impressively inexpensive too at £12.95 for three courses. Piers started off with the scallops — plucked from local waters of course, served with an asparagus and prawn salad. It was a good size starter — four plump scallops, which tasted "just like scallops should", said Piers. My goat's cheese and red onion tart was large and yummy, with a spoonful of tapenade perched on top.

Piers was so busy explaining how the new GST would affect my LK Bennett habit, that he almost didn't notice Lesley the ebullient restaurant manager waiting to bring us the next course. It had been hard to make a choice, everything sounded delicious – but in the end I'd decided on the chicken with a spinach and puy lentil terrine. Piers' ears had pricked up at the sound of the plat du jour – pan-fried duck with caramelised onions. Both dishes arrived beautifully presented – sculpted into the most amazing culinary creations. Piers proclaimed his a great success,

big chunks of fondant duck breast and melting crispy onions. I managed to snaffle a forkful; it was rich and sweet – just like Piers. My chicken was very tasty, lemon-scented, and contrasting with the rich, aromatic puy lentil base. We were delivered a dish of extra vegetables, but they weren't needed – the dishes may have been presented as nouvelle cuisine, but they certainly weren't stingy - Piers had to finish off my chicken for me.

As amazing as the first and second courses might have been, things were about to get even better. Lesley insisted we order the cheesecake - apparently it was head chef Steve Baker's speciality. She wasn't wrong – could this be the perfect dessert? A divine round of vanilla-speckled panacotta, sitting on it's own digestive biscuit and topped with a sprinkling of fresh strawberries. I begged and begged Steve to divulge the recipe - but he wasn't budging. Despite it's diminutive size though, by the end it was starting to get a little too sweet... again rather like Piers, who wanted me to join him for a few more drinks. Hmm. Thankfully I was rescued by the ever-observant Lesley who whisked me away to have a quick look at the plans for the stunning new roof terrace. Can't wait for that - what a great excuse to buy those DKNY aviators. Anyway I managed to slip out of the side entrance while Piers was finishing his coffee. I did feel a bit bad, but after all, I didn't want to make him late for the school run.






High Maintenance Woman

kick you out at 11pm. It would solve crime



Homebuyer's Guide: Step 6 The BIG Move

The Homebuyer's Guide is a six-part feature for Gallery aimed at helping all of you that are thinking of making the jump onto the property ladder. Maybe you've had enough of making someone rich paying rent, or maybe you're finding yourself staring longingly through estate agent's windows - whatever the reason, we'll break down a specific area of the buying process and show that it really isn't all that complicated.

ongratulations! You've bought your house and it's over. Well almost. In the long drawn out process of buying a house it's often forgotten that actually buying the property isn't the end of it all - you need to actually move in! The move can be one of the most stressful aspects of the whole process if not handled correctly. The key to making it easy (as with many things in life) is planning ahead and with this in mind, *Gallery* have put together this guide, which if followed will assure you a hassle-free move.

Do It Yourself?

When the day of the move arrives, you will have the unenviable task of getting all of your possessions from A to B. Many will leave the task to a removal company, while others decide to do it themselves. Factors to consider include cash, distance of the move, quantity/size of belongings, and accessibility.

The Pro's

It's a good idea to approach a few removal firms and get quotations. This can include a brief visit from the companies to assess your belongings. The quote will usually be based on the expected number of hours needed to complete the move, as well as extras, such as special containers needed. Check to see if the quote is inclusive of some form of insurance. Expect to be charged anything from £300 upwards and remember cheapest is not always best. Tips are likely to be welcomed.

Amateurs

There are various factors to consider. Firstly, make sure your insurance covers you for goods damaged during transit as it's likely something will get broken. Ring around for a good quote on van rental - your license should be good for vans up to a laden weight of 7.5 tonnes. Are you sure you want to do this?

Timeline

There are many things that need to be done when preparing for the move. The best way to do this is to chronologically break down when they need be accomplished:

The Art of Packing

Think how much trouble you have packing your holiday bags. Multiply that by several thousand and you'll see how much work is involved You'll get there though. Eventually.

Refore

Plan - An extra box from the supermarket each time saves hassle. Throw out all the accumulated junk that you know will never be of use! Defrost freezers so they are clear of ice on the day of the move.

During...

Clearly label all boxes stating which room they should go to.

Avoid a slipped disc... keep the weight of boxes to a minimum.

Pack a separate "emergency" box with things you'll need on the day before the move.

After...

Open a bottle of Champagne/Gin!

One Whole Month To Go...

- * Notify your landlord (if applicable).
- * Contact JT/Jersey Gas/Jersey Electricity.
- * Start collecting packing materials.
- * Book time off work.
- * Have a clear out!

Two Weeks and Counting...

- * Book removal company or van.
- * Arrange transit insurance (if necessary) for the move.
- * Inform people of your change of address.
- * Tell Post Office to redirect mail.
- * Organise pet/babysitter.
- * Notify parish hall.
- * Make plan of new home and decide which rooms will be used for what.
- * Start packing (it's never too early).

One Week Left!

- * Arrange for any final bills to be paid.
- * Pay any outstanding housebills.
- * Cancel any services, e.g. window cleaner, milkman, newspaper delivery.
- * Confirm arrangements with your utility companies.
- * Arrange the exchange of keys. Collect yours as soon as possible.
- Find some old blankets to put down in new house to protect carpets.
- Make map of new property for the removal company.
- * Start cleaning the house.

The Day Before....

- * Label boxes and finalise packing.
- * Pack a container for emergency supplies.
- * Defrost fridge / freezer.
- * Finish cleaning the house.
- * Get some sleep!

D-Day

- * Disconnect any remaining appliances.
- * Have one last final check.
- * Close and lock doors and windows.
- * Check that all containers have been successfully delivered.





ITH A TRACK RECORD

or citizens of Jersey who understand the true meaning of the Muratti, the battle between the best eleven footballers from Jersey and Guernsey is an occasion loaded with hope and anticipation and is filled with a sense of pride and patriotism towards our fair isle. You need only flick through the archives

occasion's magnitude.

George Orwell offered the sentiment that serious sport has nothing to do with fair play. He suggested that it was 'bound up with hatred, jealousy, boastfulness and a disregard of all rules: it is war minus the shooting'. We would all condemn such an anarchistic mindset in our players and supporters, and in this day and age the penalties for such motivations are severe. But looking back at the Muratti's one hundred year history, the bitterest possible sentiments of this intense rivalry have on occasion, reared their ugly head. Take the Muratti of 1983 in Guernsey for example. At its height, officials and eyewitnesses counted roughly 600 brawling fans that had tracked each other from the game to the weighbridge, St Peter Port. The police arrested 50 islanders who had either found defeat too hard to stomach or victory too sweet to suppress.

When the two teams line up next, although it may not be their 100th fixture, it will mark a century of sporting warfare that has given much to the character and complexion of both islands. Over the generations, though they may not have seen it in themselves, the Muratti has produced legends. The talents of individuals like Le Maistre, Venton, Bruelly, Carlyon, Santos, Muddyman, Crick and Dixie A'Court, to name a few, remind us that Jersey cherishes its own cult heroes. In an age where Manchester, Liverpool and Chelsea win the attention of our young football fanatics, the Muratti is a tremendous occasion for the simple fact that we realise, as a little island, we possess our own home-grown idols.

From whichever vantage point you choose, whether from the stand, the embankment or behind the goal-mouth, the same prematch situations occur. As the scent of frying onions and bacon meanders its way amongst a sea of children perched on adult shoulders, listening closely, one can hear the aforementioned names being mythologised to young sons and grandsons. You can decipher the banter between kids as to who will score first; their favourite player, and the possibility of hearing that, 'my dad's brother plays football with him and he says he's as strong as Wayne Rooney'. Fundamentally, Muratti day is lore-building, with every fixture adding a further brick to the foundations of our popular culture.

With every thump of the billboard panels, and 'ohh-ahh' as the keeper makes his run-up, hundreds of new experiences are being created for young individuals, previously unaware that our small society takes such a intense involvement and pleasure from supporting our local team. The Muratti is more than ninety minutes of football. For the players it is the proud culmination of a season of graft and eye-catching form. For the rest of us present, it is an opportunity to flex our national muscle in sporting manner, the result of which will either hearten or deflate.

PLAYERS >

Jersey's most capped player is Allan 'Nash' Venton with 23. A prolific finisher, it is believed that he score over 20 in his Muratti career.

Some notable nicknames for Jersey's Muratti cult heroes are; Reg 'Iron Man' Jones, 'Taffy Pamplin', 'Tubby' White, Barry 'The Cat' Breuilly, 'Topsy' Cronin, Allan 'Nash' Venton and 'Tot'de Gruchy.

One of Jersey's most well loved players was the late Graeme Le Maistre, capped 21 times.

We can attribute the strength and depth of our junior leagues to the inception of the war. With depleted numbers of senior players, the JFA turned to the Island's youngsters to keep the divisions afloat and ball rolling, so

DID YOU KNOW?



Springfield was used as a military vehicle depot during the war, the playing surface and drainage were ruined. Our German occupiers had kindly built a metal road across the site. Excavators attempting to return the pitch to its former glory after the war were still finding vehicle parts and metal debris in the playing surface for months.

In the JFA's inception in 1905, there were only 7 teams affiliated to the former Jersey Football League, Jersey Wanderers being the most recognisable. Other teams include Post Office F.C, the Royal Garrison Artillery F.C and St. Luke's F.C. By the time of the league's Golden Jubilee year over 70 teams were either directly or indirectly affiliated with the JFA.

Coming on as a substitute in 1984, Peter Fleury hit the fastest ever hat-trick, taking just five minutes. The record attendance for a Muratti Final is 13,200 for the 1951 match at The Track which Guernsey won 3-1 after extra time.


Jersey hold the record for the highest number of consecutive Muratti wins. Starting in '58 they won the tie eight years in succession.

The only time the Muratti was shared was in 1937 when Jersey and Guernsey drew 2-2 in Jersey and 3-3 in the replay at The Track.

pencer Bourne is a well known figure in the Jersey club scene and beyond. Controlling Platinum, Mint, Buddha Bar, B-Bar, clubs in Guernsey, and the successful London club, Umbaba, he's well placed to judge the future of clubs and bars on the rock.

What do you think of the Jersey club scene?

If you look at how much the clubs that I'm involved with have changed, it's clear that things change fast. When Follies first opened we had a French, oldie-worldy look, with dark woods and ornate decoration - that was in then - but it wouldn't work now. It's very important in this game to respond to demand and that's what we've done with Platinum with the bright clean contours, LED lighting and all that. Jersey will keep changing - becoming more cosmopolitan, being influenced by people travelling more - but at the end of the day it depends on the strength of the economy.

How do you think the economy will pan out?

In the short-term I think things are going to stay static for the next year or so. Looking beyond it depends on whether the States can encourage new business to Jersey. Everyone knows that there's less footfall in all Jersey's clubs than in years gone by. The club season these days focuses on when the students return - in the past it was when the hotels opened for business and the tourists arrived in thousands. With tourism it depends on how the States and Tourism manage to push things on - obviously they're aiming for a younger demographic so we'll have to see how things pan out. For us though it's important to appeal to a local market and we'll continue to do so.

What are your plans for the future?

Well we've got all our bars and clubs up to a good standard after a series of refurbishments and our first unit in London is doing well - for now we're looking forward to the summer season - I just hope it's sunny.



Directed by Ridley Scott this film is viewed by many as Gladiator 2 - in reality such comparisons aren't really all that accurate. Starring Orlando Bloom, Liam Neeson, Jeremy Irons, and an entertaining turn from Edward Norton predictions are that Kingdom Of Heaven is set to be a huge success.

Machuca (15): IMDB: 8.5

Set in the revolutionary days of Chile, Machuca follows two young boys, one poor one rich, who observe the world changing around them. The cast is almost entirely filled with children (which means that the set must have been an absolute nightmare) and the cinematography is of a very high standard. A beautiful looking film covering a very traumatic period in Chile's history.

Palindromes (15): IMDB: 7.1

A fable of innocence: 13 year-old Aviva wants to be a 'mom'. She does all she can to make this happen, and comes very close to succeeding, but in the end her plan is thwarted by her sensible parents. So she runs away, still determined to get pregnant, but instead finds herself lost in another world, a less sensible one, perhaps, but one pregnant itself with all sorts of strange possibility. Like so many trips, this one is round-trip, and it's hard to say in the end if she can ever be quite the same again

Rebel Without A Cause (PG): IMDB: 7.8 National Film Theatre

Showing at the NFT Rebel Without A Cause is an absolute beast. Starring the unparalleled James Dean, he plays Jim Stark, the new kid in town. Here hopes to find the love he doesn't get from his middle-class family. Although he finds some of this in his relation with Judy, and a form of it in Plato's adulation, Jim must still prove himself to his peers in switchblade knife fights and games of chicken on seaside cliffs.

Friday 13 May Friday Night Lights (12A): IMDB: 7.0

A straight coach leads his team to the 1988 Texas state semis in a west Texas city, where high school football is king. Expectations of classmates, coaches, and community exact a toll on all the athletes. Economic and racial undertones pervade this adaptation this Billy Bob Thornton film. He's always quite good, and if you're into yank sports movies this could be good for you.

A Good Woman (PG): IMDB: 6.3

Starring Helen Hunt and woman of the moment Scarlett Johansson A Good Woman is set on the Amalfi coast of 1930's Italy. The photography beautifully captures the jet-set at play and gossiping with Hunt in particular shining in her role as Mrs. Erlynne.

A military veteran goes on a journey into the future, where he can foresee his death and is left with questions that could save lives. Starring Oscar winner Adrien Brody, *The Jacket* should be worth watching for seeing him lie in a urine-stained straight-jacket alone.

Javier Bardem (Before Night Falls) in the story of a Spanish town that goes downhill after the shipyards close, leaving thousands without a livelihood. Bardem's defiant ringleader tilts at windmills in rage while the world around him crumbles.

A teenage hustler and a young man obsessed with alien abductions cross paths, together discovering a horrible, liberating truth. A quite disturbing but beautifully told story handled with honesty and sensitivity.

First off this is a French film, (that's some of you gone). Second, it's by Jean Luc Godard (most). Lastly it follows the structure of the Divina Commedia, with a rhetorical twist (close the door when you leave please). An indictment of modern times

Only Human (15): IMDB: 6.7

A very good comedy that mixes the necessary ingredients: love, humor, misunderstandings and a little mystery. The basic plot (lewish girl and Palestinian boy go to girl's home to meet her family) soon turns to quirkier subplots that make the viewer not only amused, but also intrigued and moved.

What The Bleep Do We Know? (TBA): IMDB: 5.5

Part documentary, part story, and part elaborate and inspiring visual effects and animations. The protagonist, Amanda, played by Marlee Matlin, finds herself in a fantastic Alice in Wonderland experience when her daily, uninspired life literally begins to unravel, revealing the uncertain world of the quantum field hidden behind what we consider to be our normal, waking reality.
